Continuing Problems Created By Travelling People

Problems created by groups of travelling people, described by one Councillor as 'knackers,' in many parts of the county were referred to by several members at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday.

Cllr P. Cahill said that it was an absolute scandal the way trees on a green space set up by the Council near Tramore had recently been damaged and broken by a group of these travelling people. He asked if the Dept. of the Environment

could be asked to bring in some law to control their movements.

Cllr. O. Coffey complained about the nuisance and damage which groups that were camped at the Pike (Killineen) and Leamybrien had created.

Mr. Dan Hurley, County Manager said that these problems continued to arise throughout the county and the views of the Council on the subject were now well-known to the Gardai. There was a constant battle being waged to ensure that acces-

sible places where camping was prohibited were not taken over by these people.

Cllr. P. Kenneally suggested that the introduction of parking bye-laws might be a help.

Co. Councillors Criticise Huge Salary Increases For Oireachtas Members And Others

The recent increases announced by the Government for members of the Oireachtas — Ministers, T.D.'s and Senators, as well as for members of the Judiciary and higher civil servants and chief executives of State and Semi-State bodies, health boards, etc., came under fire at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday.

The matter was raised by Cllr. C. O Riain who said that he wished to raise a matter concerning a recent article in the "Dungarvan Leader" which had been very ably put by "Pensman." This concerned the huge salary increases which had recently been granted to 700 civil servants which in many cases were more than some people had to live on for a full year.

Cllr. C. O Riain then instanced two cases of people in his area who had recently applied for social welfare assistance and who had been granted what could only be described as miserable weekly allowances. He had, he said, to take this into consideration in regard to the increases for the Oireachtas members, Judges and others, some of whom were already being paid £1,000 per week. He said that "Pensman" had stated that the people could either take

it lying down or could stand up and be counted.

"Well," said Cllr. O Riain, "some people may sing dumb but I won't sing dumb as I want to protest. I can see absolutely no justification for such increases and I propose that we protest against them." Cllr. O Riain said that he also wished to congratulate "Pensman" for his very interesting article on the matter.

Cllr. James A. Walsh supported fully what Cllr. O Riain had said. He had, he said, protested when the last increases had been granted and it was only right that this latest round of increases should be highlighted. "When an impoverished country such as ours gives increases like those to people who are already highly paid then it is time we should register a protest," he said.

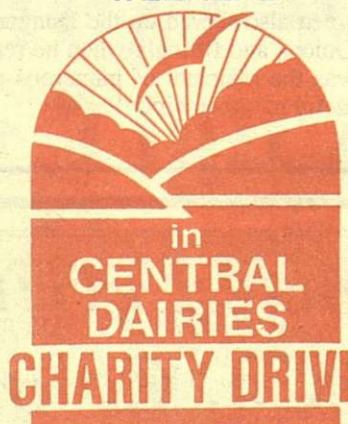
The protest as proposed by Cllr. O Riain was carried.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

THERE'S A PRICE TO PAY

The readings for the 20th Sunday remind us once again that Jesus asked us to come and follow Him, but this time the writers emphasize that acceptance will involve the bearing of trials, sorrows and sacrifices. The first reading relates how Jeremiah the prophet was faithful to his mission. He spoke as he'd been directed, but his message was unwelcome, and landed him in dire trouble. Events proved he prophesied correctly, and the king and his subjects paid dearly for refusing to listen to God's servant. The reading is saying, if you live and behave as a disciple of Christ, do not expect the plaudits of the world. They did not welcome Him: they will not welcome you. They'll even hate and resent you for what you are, because your way of life pronounces judgement on them.

The second reading tells us that Jesus suffered, and proceeds to explain the reason why we too must take the same road, and allow nothing to impede us. Jesus achieved victory over sin by way of the Cross. He now sits at the right hand of God. It is because we hope to share in His glory that we are determined to follow His example. To be happy with God is the purpose of our existence. If a price in love and service has to be paid, we gladly meet the demand. And, because we know what is at stake, we'll resist any attempt to rob us of our birthright. Yes, we have a fight on our hands, and it is one we can and must win. It behoves us then to prepare and arm ourselves with the helps that God has made available. Everyone is called, in whatever way providence has decreed, to share in this struggle.

Many seem to think they can serve God, and be free to compromise God's law when it suits them. St. John says "the Lord will vomit them out of his mouth." Many reputedly good Catholics voted for divorce and indirectly voted for abortion. Listening to a radio panel on Saturday, August 12, I noted T. P. Coogan spoke of the abortion referendum, and, whatever anyone may think, that's what was at issue. A recent decision in the Australian Courts declared "the unborn child to have no rights." Mr. Justin Keating, on the same panel, called the two referenda a disaster. Truly, God's law is a divider. You are either for God or you are against Him.

The conclusion is that trouble lies ahead that will test your allegiance. We must teach our children not to be swayed by those, political or otherwise, who espouse causes contrary to God's

teaching. Of course, we must obey Caesar in all that is not sinful. Sadly, many seem to think that if the State sanctions the marriage of divorced people that all is well. Not so!

The Gospel portrays Jesus establishing His kingdom "by casting fire upon the earth." Fire here obviously means the fire that purifies, which the Lord called baptism by fire. We too must undergo this purification. Hence, a choice has to be made. We elect to take the road to Calvary or we go our own way. Following Christ is like throwing down the gauntlet at the world, and thereby issuing a challenge to ourselves.

BALM TO THE SOUL

The Gospel is forcing us to face the fact that if we follow Christ, tension and conflict will be our lot. Jesus is open and honest about the matter. He never offered a care-free life on earth. Experience shows that troubles borne for God are like balm to the soul. Still, some find them a stumbling block. Some say, "I try my best, and I'm harnessed with burdens. Look at "him." He never goes to Church, and he is tops." These people lack trust, and their hearts are eaten with envy. God expects us to use our set-backs in His service. It will not be easy. It is a problem for all, but when endured in God's name, it bears rich fruits.

During the week I was half listening to Pat Kenny discussing euthanasia with one who'd like to see it legalised. Now, whether it is legalised or not, it will remain murder in the eyes of God. Undoubtedly, when God's influence wanes, respect for life diminishes. Look at Ulster. They are all supposedly Christians, but look at the wanton killings. Hundreds of Catholics have been murdered because of their religion. Of course, the I.R.A. stand equally guilty, and one could put large question marks after the R.U.C. and the Army. Do not get me wrong. I've said many times that if the price of the unification of Ireland was one murder, the price would be too high. There's far too much hatred in the hearts of far too many, and the fires that desolate their land will not be quenched unless the spirit of God that moved Mr. Wilson, and those many other broken-hearted parents to say, no revenge, takes possession of their souls.

It is not that Jesus set out to provoke and create division, but His law cannot be answered with "may be." It must be yes or no. When we want something, be it an exam, a career, a position, a contest, etc., we do not hesitate about the cost. Apply the same principle to going to Heaven, and you'll get there.

A Tribute To The Late Patrick J. Breen

The recent death of Mr. P. J. Breen removed from the local scene one of the central figures in the growth of the Trade Union movement in the Dungarvan area.

Paddy Breen took up duty as Branch Secretary of the AT&GWU in October, 1951 and he served with distinction in that post until he retired in early 1977.

It is interesting to look back at some of the changes that evolved over those twenty-six years while Paddy Breen worked quietly and efficiently at negotiating improvements in the range of benefits available to his members.

An increase on 11/- (old shillings) a week was negotiated for the Outdoor Workers in the Urban District Council in December 1951 to bring their weekly pay up to £4 12s. 6d. per week; one year later in 1952 the "Town Rate" as it was known was £5 per week. (Wage rates have moved a long way since then).

In July 1954 a decision by the Management of the "Chocolate Crumb Factory" to cut the members basic wages by 5 shillings and 5 pence per week resulted in an Official Dispute, the outcome of which saw the Union negotiated rate being maintained.

In those days a five-and-a-half day week was worked and in 1960/61 the short day, i.e. half-day was changed from Thursday to Saturday in all the smaller firms in the area in line with the bigger employers.

In 1960 an Incentive Bonus Scheme, one of the first of its kind in Ireland, was negotiated in the Leather Factory. By 1963 a five-day 45-hour week had been introduced in most employments.

In the mid-sixties the first ever Pension and Sick Pay Schemes for Manual Workers were negotiated.

In those days the AT&GWU Office in Dungarvan was in rented property in Main Street, and finally on the 3rd April, 1970, their current headquarters at 35, O'Connell Street was officially opened, and a part-time Office Assistant, Mrs. Mary Cooney, was appointed in 1951.

TWENTY-SIX YEARS OF NEGOTIATING

The 42.5 hour working week was gradually introduced and it was followed in 1972/1973 by the introduction of the 40-hour working week.

Over these twenty-six years, Paddy Breen negotiated on behalf of the workers in the following employments — Kilmeaden Co-op, Waterford Co-op, Waterford County Council, Dungarvan Leathers, John A. Wood Ltd., M. J. Keane Ltd., T. Power & Co., M. J. Curran & Sons Ltd., Dungarvan Urban District Council, Dungarvan Sand & Gravel, William Fennell & Sons Ltd., R. A. Merry & Co. Ltd., Glue & Gelatine Ltd., Quigley Magnesite Ltd., K. Williams & Co. Ltd., A. Moloney & Sons Ltd., M/s. E. Flahavan & Sons, Kilmacthomas, Dockers Section, Dungarvan Crystal (when it commenced first), Co-Operative Fruitgrowers Ltd., John Phelan & Co., South Eastern Health Board, Plunder & Pollak, Carrick-on-Suir, Irish Tanners in Portlaw, and many other smaller employers.

And over the period from 1951 to 1977 he worked for the betterment of workers and their families with the various shop Stewards and Branch Committee Representatives. Interestingly, a total of three Branch Chairmen served during his period of office, namely: T. A. Kyne (R.I.P.), John Organ (Snr.) and J. G. Byrne.

Paddy Breen also served on the Dungarvan Council of Trade Unions and fittingly when he retired in early 1977 he was the recipient of numerous presentations from a grateful membership.

A PUBLIC WATCH-DOG

THE OFFICE OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS

The Office of Consumer Affairs and Fair Trade is there to prevent manufacturers, wholesalers or retailers from making false or misleading claims about goods and prices. It deals also with false statements made by service industries generally as well as misleading advertisements, catalogues or price tickets. The aim is to protect the consumer from such practices. The Act from which the Director of Consumer Affairs gets his powers is the Consumer Affairs Act 1978.

The onus is normally on the consumer to complain and to be able to substantiate his complaint. Even if the claim is not, strictly speaking, false, it can still be against the law if it misleads people by giving them the wrong impression. It does not matter how the claim is made — whether in an advertisement, a notice in a shop, a picture on a package or even orally by a salesperson.

Examples of statements by sellers of goods could relate to watches ("loses less than a minute a year") or cars ("one previous owner only"). Claims about services could relate to holiday apartments ("only two minutes from the sea") or to repairs ("we changed the oil").

The Act prohibits false or misleading indications of the price or the previous price. For example, if one price is crossed out and another put in (as in a sale) the previous price must be accurate. In the absence of any indication to the contrary, the goods must have been on sale in the same place at the previous price for at least 28 successive days in the preceding three months. Equally, if a de luxe model of, say, a liquidiser is displayed with a price ticket one may not be told that the price applies to the basic model only.

ADVERTISEMENT CLAIMS

When it comes to advertisements the Act is equally strict. If the advertisement for goods makes certain claims, the claims must apply to all of the goods advertised, and not to some only, unless that is clear from the advertisement. For example, if a trader advertises "Kleeno" washing machines as "good for washing wool" that claim should be true for all the "Kleeno" machines sold in that shop.

If an advertiser has a number of shops and advertises goods at a certain price, that price should apply in all the shops where the goods are sold — Unless, of course, the advertisement says something different such as "Dublin branches only." (However, advertisements actually in one shop will not usually be taken to apply to other shops in the same chain unless there is some indication to that effect).

Traders are not prevented from drawing attention to genuine bargains but, if they have genuine bargains to offer, the terms of the bargain must be set out clearly and accurately.

While the Act encourages more truth in selling, buyers must, nevertheless, exercise normal care in their buying since words like "luxurious," "great value" etc., are hard to define. Besides, the Consumer Information Act, though it seeks

to prevent false descriptions, does not confer rights on consumers, who have suffered loss. They must follow up their rights directly with the trader.

The Director of Consumer affairs publishes an annual report on the activities of his office. This shows that the main complaints about false or misleading descriptions involve holidays abroad, food and drink, clothes and cars. Clothes and cars also figure high on the list of complaints about unsatisfactory goods or services, closely followed by furniture/carpets/floor coverings, electrical appliances and footwear.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

What can the consumer do if goods are not as they should be? Much depends on how serious the fault was and how soon the complaint was made. In general, if goods are not as described there is no obligation to accept them. A consumer can refuse a repair and can seek a refund if he/she rejects the faulty goods immediately and has not used them. If the complaint is valid a credit note does not have to be accepted; the consumer may insist on cash. On the other hand a consumer has no rights in the case of defects brought to his/her attention before purchase. The right to reject goods may be lost if there is unreasonable delay in bringing them back.

New Booklet On Early Waterford Glass

Recently published by the National Museum of Ireland was an illustrated booklet on early Waterford glass.

Penrose Glass which was sponsored by The Society of Waterford Con-

noisseurs concentrates on glass made in Waterford between 1783 and 1799

at the Penrose family glass-house. They, who had a successful merchant and exporting business, were encouraged to diversify into glass manufacture because of a relaxation in tax laws. The items illustrated in the booklet are documented pieces of their glass made for table and for personal use. They show that the clear and coloured glass produced was of the highest quality and that although there were certain popular shapes, the factory made a wide range of items to different designs, for home and export markets. This booklet, the first in a proposed series, is intended particularly for those interested in antique Irish glass — a part of our heritage.

NATIONAL PRIMARY ROAD IMPROVEMENT WORKS

Kiely's Cross — Earthworks continuing and pavement construction underway. Crash barrier being erected.

Gold Strike In Waterford?

What could prove a significant find of gold concentrates by mining company Ivernia West in an area of Co. Waterford was described last week by the company's Managing Director, David Hough as "highly encouraging."

Initial exploration between Kilmeaden and Kilmacthomas, off the N25 Cork-Waterford road, has shown primary gold traces of up to nearly two ounces per tonne.

This is an enormously viable ratio, well above what is seen as a commercial working in the United States.

It has led to the start of a second phase of exploration by Ivernia West, which has eight licences in the district, and Mr. Hough stated that the success of the first survey compared favourably with gold discoveries in the West of Ireland.

EXCITING RESULTS

He said the initial results were exciting because they were in a place where primary gold mineralisation had not been indicated by previous exploration efforts.

A geological reappraisal of the licensed area, which includes Bunmahon where copper deposits were found in the 19th century, shows "it has the potential for significant gold mineralisation," according to a statement from the company.

PENSMAN Takes You... Behind The SPOTLIGHT

IN THE AFTERMATH OF THE SENATE ELECTIONS

While the political eyes of the national media have been focussing on the rumblings of discontent at the various levels of the Fianna Fail organisation in Waterford and its spread to South Tipperary and some other areas, from the defection of Deputy Jackie Fahey to a revolt by a section of the so-called "grass-roots" of the party, a more subtle upheaval has taken place within the Fine Gael party in the county over the past few weeks, which has culminated in the fall from the national political scene of one time Women's Political Association activist, Waterford City Councillor Katharine Bulbulia.

A former member of Waterford Co. Council, she was a high profile Garret Fitzgerald supporter who in many past Senate campaigns had the full support of the Waterford F.G. County Councillors. Indeed Deputy Austin Deasy is known to have canvassed strongly and actively on her behalf in the past as did other FG deputies in strategic areas throughout the country. This vital support, coupled with Cllr. Bulbulia's own personal ability to gather support, saw her re-elected to the Senate since 1981 in what is admitted to be the toughest campaign trail of all.

The recent Senate election saw Cllr. Bulbulia back on the campaign trail again but the harsh political realities of Fine Gael loyalties, Waterford style, were staring her in the face on this occasion. It was no secret in the city that a full muster of support from her F.G. colleagues on the Corporation would not be coming to her while the repercussions of the attempt by the Bulbulia election machine to snatch No. 1 votes in the city and Tramore booths for Cllr. Bulbulia at the expense of Deputy Deasy in the June general election were still reverberating in the County. That ploy — the distribution of cards bearing the official F.G. logo with what was claimed to be a personal endorsement of Cllr. Bulbulia by Party Leader, Alan Duker, didn't work. Deputy Deasy retained his seat but the Bulbulia vote remained at around 3,500 in an election in which the PD's lost their seat to Labour poll-topper Brian O'Shea.

Then came the Senate race with Cllr. Bulbulia seeking re-election on the Administration Panel and the omens, at least here in Co. Waterford, were ominous as the failed General Election stroke was set to backfire on her. Deputy Deasy had his much publicised leadership challenge to Alan Duker but he also had a Senate vote and the loyalty of many of the Fine Gael City and County Councillors. From sources available to us it appears

that Cllr. Bulbulia did not have the support of the Deasy Camp and indeed at least one other small but vital packet of No. 1 votes in the West of Ireland were lost.

Although in the end she put up a good showing with a total of 62 votes, the FG seat on the Administration Panel held by her was lost to Labour Party activist Joe Costello, who incidentally was seen actively campaigning in Dungarvan and West Waterford during the Senate election with Labour Party colleague, Cllr. Billy Kyne. Whether Cllr. Bulbulia can relaunch her political career now remains to be seen. Apart from the politically fatal mistake of the failed attempt to gain last minute advantage in the general election at the expense of the immensely politically shrewd Deputy Deasy, Cllr. Bulbulia may also regret her decision to step down from her seat on the County Council for the 1985 Local Elections as she lost an excellent publicity platform here as well as contact with the public and with her colleagues on the Co. Council.

By and large these can be said to be the main factors contributing to the defeat of Cllr. Bulbulia, one time acclaimed as the darling girl of the Garrett Fitzgerald-New Look Fine Gael Party who has, for now at any rate, lost her fight to hold her place on the national political scene.

And a further indication of disunity within Fine Gael ranks in the county, probably also arising from the recent Senate election, was a rather fiery but brief contretemps which involved Cllr. Pat Coffey and Cllr. Gary O'Halloran at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan. Cllr. Coffey was a candidate (first time) seeking a Senate seat on the Industrial and Commercial Panel and probably felt let down in certain quarters although he did score a very good 32 votes.

OIL ON TROUBLED WATERS

In what has been seen as an attempt by Taoiseach Charles J. Haughey to pour oil on troubled waters, a major overhaul of the Fianna Fail Party throughout the country has been ordered by him. The overhaul must be completed and a new strategy in place before the holding next year of the Presidential and Local Authority elections.

Mr. Haughey has stated that both elections would be held next year and the party would have to be ready to enter the contests with a completely new approach. Admitting that the June general election had revealed serious shortcomings in the party organisation, he said that these would have to be identified and corrected before Fianna Fail could be prepared to meet the new challenges.

As regards the situation in the organisation in Waterford we have learned from Cllr. Tom Cunningham, Stradbally, Secretary of the Fianna Fail Group of County Councillors, that since they sent their resolution of support in the leadership of Mr. Haughey to Party Headquarters in Dublin, no official contact had been made with them. He added that a meeting between the Councillors and Officers of the Comhairle Dail Ceanntair has been requested but it was unlikely that this would take place until after the Taoiseach had announced his eleven nominees to the Senate. And we wonder, what then — ?

OLD PARISH LAND INQUIRIES

We understand that a well-known local estate agent has been seeking land purchases in the Minehead district of Old Parish, one whisper mentioning as much as 700 acres!

Whether the queries have anything to do with an offshore oil strike or a holiday

and leisure centre for a continental group is anyone's guess!

THESE SALMON NOW SWIM TO GERMANY

According to the August issue of the "Marine Times" just to hand, Irish salmon have started swimming to Germany and, from now on, they will be making the trip in increasing numbers.

The secret of the incredible journey is a vivier-tank lorry with a remarkable bacteria-based filtration system capable of handling the highly toxic effluent.

Specialist cargo handlers, MSAS Cassin of Shannon and the German firm of Aquamedic in Osnabruck, are the two halves of the equation which has resulted in a regular weekly run from Ireland to Germany by road and ferry bringing live salmon to wholesale and retail customers prepared to pay for the privilege.

And right from the start — and for the foreseeable future — each lorry load will contain a number of "salmon of knowledge", from Galway University to the School of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Hanover, as part of a collaborative research programme between the two institutions.

The whole idea of trucking live fish, rather than sending them by air, resulted from the very high mortality rates which often followed the air freight method. Sometimes as many as 40 per cent of a cargo died en route, multiplying the cost of those that survived.

*** ARE JUDGES POLITICAL— AND ISOLATED?**

In the course of an interview published in the current issue of the Incorporated Law Society of Ireland Gazette, the Hon. Mr. Justice Thomas A. Finlay, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court deals with, among other things, the questions as to whether judges are political — and isolated. The interview was first published in a book entitled "Judging The World: Law and Politics in the World's leading Courts" by Gary Sturgess and Philip Chubb and published in 1988 by Butterworths.

Pointing out that appointments to the bench were controlled by the government and that a lot of Irish appointments seemed to have been of people who has formerly been politicians or connected with political parties, the interviewer asked, "Is that good or bad?"

In his reply, Mr. Justice Finlay stated: "Speaking in ideal terms, it is a bad thing. In a perfect society one should be able to devise a better method of appointing the judiciary. I would have thought, however that in my experience — as with many apparently unjustifiable theoretical procedures — it has worked extremely well. I can't remember any example of a person appointed to a judicial post of any importance in my time (and I came to the Bar in the mid 40's) whose previous political loyalty had the slightest effect on his judgments or in any way affected his capacity, as it were, to stand up for the individual against the existing government.

"At the end of the day", the Chief Justice continued, "Somebody must be accountable for the standard and type of judiciary that is appointed. There is a significant amount to be said for making politicians accountable for it. They are the ones to whom the people in general can turn if bad judicial appointments are being made. If appointments are made by some body of people who are relatively anonymous then there is no one to turn to and to blame."

To the question, "To what extent would you say that judges are political?" Mr. Justice Finlay replied, "It depends on the sense in which you are using the term political. I think that a person's politics consists of a whole bundle of thoughts and philosophies apart from adherence to a party. He may be a person who is naturally conservative; he may be a person with a very considerable regard for the rights of the individual, a regard that is greater and deeper than his regard for law and order. There are all sorts of balances of political approach in any person who is interested in politics. In so far as that is so, that there can be politics with a small 'p', I think that, necessarily, every judge must have a bundle of these ideas and philosophies. They are bound to have some effect, though they should never be allowed to dominate his

judgments. . . .

The Chief Justice added: "I don't accept, certainly as far as the Irish judiciary is concerned, and particularly the Court of which I am the President, that there is a clear-cut cleavage between a right and a left wing of the Court . . . and I think the performance of the judges shows that they approach individual cases in a different and individual way."

On the question as to whether he believed judges were isolated, Justice Finlay had this to say: "They must be isolated because in a small community such as this, a very considerable amount of ordinary social activity is unwise. They become identified with people and points of view, and litigants may not think they are getting a fair trial. If you say: 'Are they being isolated from life as it goes on?' I don't think so. We haven't a very pompous or severe form of isolation. I drive myself, I travel where I want, and engage in any sporting activity I want. I meet people, not as a judge but as an individual. Also, don't forget that watching cases going on before you every day in court is the closest you will get to humanity. So I don't think you become isolated in the full sense of the word at all."

So now you have answers from the most authoritative source in the land to a few of the questions which we have heard asked and discussed time and time again in the past.

Even though Paddy had not enjoyed the best of health, his passing was unexpected.

To his wife Peg, sons, daughter, relatives and friends we tender our condolences on the passing of one who served this community with great dedication and contributed so much to its well-being.

Paddy was generous with his time and energy,

He gave and did not count the cost,

He fought and did not heed the wounds,

He toiled and did not seek for rest,

He laboured and he looked for no reward,

And he did God's holy will.

This is the Paddy Breen we all knew and will remember. Born in the small village of Killena, near Gorey, Co. Wexford on January 7, 1912, he was a member of a family of twelve. When only fifteen he moved to live in Blackrock, Co. Dublin, where he worked in his aunt's dairy farming business and enjoyed working as a milk roundsman for a couple of years before joining the army at the age of seventeen.

A modest income of less than fifteen shillings a week did not interfere with his interest in soldiering and he continued to serve as a Military Policeman until his time of enlistment came to an end in 1937.

With employment at a premium, Paddy moved to England and joined the Hoover Enterprise in Thornton Heath and became one of their most accomplished salesmen.

When in 1939 the National Emergency was declared he was recalled to the army and was attached to the Military Police Corps. In 1941 he was promoted to

the rank of Corporal and soon afterwards he was appointed Sergeant, a rank he held until the General Demobilisation in 1946. During this period he was stationed in a variety of places — Curragh, Clonmel, Cork, Waterford, Lismore and Dublin.

It was while in the Metropolitan City that he met his wife-to-be, Margaret Byrne — Peg, as she was, and still is, popularly known.

In 1951 he was appointed Branch Secretary of the Dungarvan Branch of the AT&GWU and his involvement in Trade Union affairs was to span a period of 26 years. He was greatly troubled by the many problems confronting the workers whose lot was anything but a happy one at this time.

Problems and confrontations did arise, but thanks to Paddy's skill as a negotiator and his reasonable attitude, a happy ending was always forthcoming. Politically he had no illusions and was a great admirer of the legendary Tom Kyne and a staunch supporter of the Labour Party.

A look at the list of organisations to which he was attached and the major roles played by him in their development and progress makes one wonder how so much activity could be packed into one's spare time. He was a founder member of the Credit Union, Community Information Centre, Friends of St. Martin and Lourdes Invalid Fund — just to name a few. His simple philosophy of life was to live everyday as if it were his last.

Paddy was a man of exemplary character, first-rate ability, who knew the ordinary folk, their anecdotes, their language and their problems. He trusted upon himself a life of service, he was the champion of the down-trodden, the underprivileged and the underdog.

Because of his outstanding qualities he won the respect and the acclaim of all. His passing removes a colossus from our midst, a man whose contribution to our community was enormous. To have met, talked and to have known Paddy Breen is much to be grateful for. Go ndeana Dia trocaire air.

Following a short service at the Kiely Funeral Home on Saturday evening, Paddy's remains were brought to St. Laurence's Church, Ballinroad. A guard of honour comprising of members of the Labour Party, Trade Union movement and colleagues in O.N.E. was a tribute richly deserved.

The tricolour draped the coffin which was blessed and received by Very Rev.

Canon Ml. Farrell, P.P., assisted by Rev. Fr. P. Ahearne, C.C. and Very Rev. Fr. Brennock, O.S.A.

An overflow congregation was present on Sunday morning for Paddy's Requiem Mass, celebrated by Rev. Fr. Ahearne, at which grandson P. J. read the Lesson and the voice of Tommy McShane, accompanied by organist Christina Tobin, added to the solemnity of our gathering.

Graveside prayers were recited by Fr. Ahearne, assisted by Canon Farrell and Fr. Brennock, and after which Paddy Breen, a man of many talents, was laid to rest.

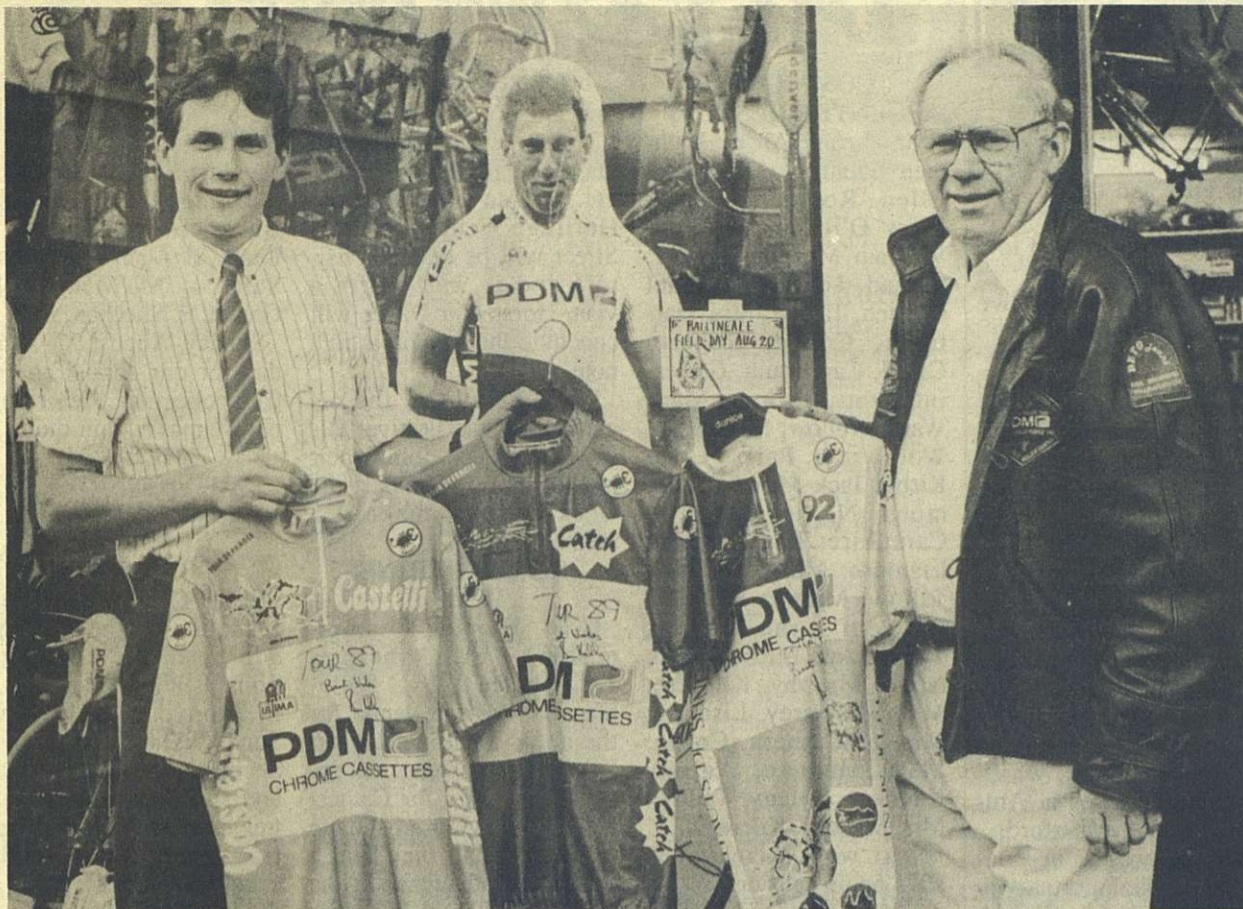

CAPPOQUIN GUIDES AND SCOUTS IN FRANCE

Heads did not roll as we made our way to France for the Bicentennial of the French Revolution, but a good few tummies did! Twenty-one Catholic Guides of Ireland and Four Venture Scouts and their five leaders were invited to participate in an International Camp in Yvetot, France to celebrate the Bicentennial of the French Revolution — the central theme of the camp was Liberty and Human Rights. After a choppy but otherwise uneventful journey we arrived in Yvetot to be welcomed by many of the Scouts and friends we had made two years ago. The campsite was in the grounds of the Agricultural College and we availed of most of its facilities.

We arrived on Thursday, July 27 (having left Ireland on July 26 after celebrating Mass — celebrated for us by our Chaplain, Father Frank Lloyd — to whom we owe our thanks for his encouragement and support).

We reached the Campsite in Yvetot at 6 p.m. and with the help of the Venture Scouts erected our seven tents in the area designated on the perimeter of the sportsfield. We were flanked on one side by Germans and on the other by Scots and Belgians.

On Friday afternoon we visited the pool in Yvetot. That evening the impressive opening ceremonies were held with national Anthems and Flag raisings of all participating countries. The Irish were the single biggest group present. All our meals were eaten in the open on long tables, 140 teenagers and their leaders — an impressive sight. At campfire after dark we excelled ourselves with Padjo Kiely's story-telling about the Corner Stone, the Guides set dancing, tin whistle playing, singing and step dancing, and the Ventures action song.

On Saturday a treasure hunt was held in the town of Yvetot — twenty teams had to collect 12 sections of a huge map of Europe from 12 different shops in the town — before collecting any one map, section clues had to be deciphered and problems solved relating to the names of famous people closely associated with freedom and human rights, e.g. Martin Luther King, Archbishop Romero and Abraham Lincoln, etc. As each team returned to camp a huge map of Europe was gradually assembled. In the afternoon the same teams were supplied with the raw

material of a kite. Each team manufactured the kite having coloured it in the national flag of whichever country they represented. A stiff Normandy gale made it possible for the 20 kites to be adorning the skyscape over Yvetot. Later novelty races were held between the twenty teams. That night we paraded to the local Community Hall where the French Scouts and Guides presented a spectacle again with the theme of liberty.

RAIN AND GALES

On Sunday a hike routed through Alouville with challenging tasks for each team was marred somewhat by torrential rain and gales. We rendezvoused in Alouville for a beautiful meal in the local Community Hall — we enjoyed it very much in spite of being drenched to the skin. Later we completed the second half of the hike, 18 miles in all. That evening an Ecumenical service was held for all the camp in the local Roman Catholic Church in Yvetot. All prayers were read in three different languages. A great feeling of unity was felt by everyone. Later back at camp the Irish Guides and Scouts attended Mass said specifically for us by the local curate. A disco brightened everyone up later that evening followed by a fireworks display and an impromptu campfire.

On Monday the Jamboree ended with an impressive closing ceremony attended by local politicians, dignitaries and pressmen. It was sad to see all the different groups pull up stakes and break camp — a few Irish hearts were broken and by 3 p.m. the Irish tents stood alone, as we did not leave till Wednesday. Plans to visit Paris and Rouen the next day kept us going.

Tuesday was eventful — the Scouts took Paris on in the Minibus — the Guides, Rouen by train. All arrived home that evening broke, exhausted and full of stories of a great day.

On Wednesday we prepared to leave saying fond farewells to all our old and new friends in Yvetot. St. Patrick II left Le Havre with Guides and Scouts well pleased with their trip and planning their return again soon. Nevertheless, Cappoquin was a truly welcome sight on Thursday at 7 p.m.

Our grateful thanks to all who made this memorable trip possible namely parents leaders and bus drivers and everyone who contributed with sponsorship etc. Your support and encouragement is always appreciated. — Bi Ullamh. Guide meetings start

Fundraising Race Night For Cappoquin Day Care Centre

Cappoquin and District has a population of about three thousand and of that, 340 are over 65 years of age. A significant proportion live alone or with an elderly relative and naturally may suffer from the difficulties of isolation, loneliness and daily problems with shopping, cooking and laundry.

Recent health cuts have brought the problems closer to home and forced everybody to reassess their attitude to the elderly. It is no longer possible for an ailing, elderly relative to get into a long stay hospital bed, so more responsibility is passed onto the family and community. The people of Cappoquin and District are taking this task seriously and plan to build a propose-built Day Care Centre which will be tailored to individual needs. Services will include transport, a hot meal and laundry service. A person can have a bath, see the Public Health Nurse etc, but most important can socialise and exchange news and chat with neighbours and old friends.

It is current Health Board policy to promote care for the elderly in their own homes with Community Services providing valuable back-up for sometimes hard-pressed relatives. We

all accept that living in one's own home in a familiar environment is far more conducive to good health and mental well-being than any form of institutional care. The South Eastern Health Board have shown considerable interest in the project to date and we are optimistic that financial assistance will be available from them as part of the budget for 1990.

These sides have not met in the championships in the past two seasons, so we have no guide to their relative merits in this regard, but we do have the indicators of the present championship to influence our vote on the result of this one. It points to a victory for the Western team, who

apart from their extraordinary lapse against Lismore, are away better than Portlaw, who are one of the many clubs badly hit by emigration. Their form so far has been disappointing, their only win, being against Dungarvan who were understrength on the day.

Ballyduff are a team well capable of picking themselves up when things seem to have gone wrong and now with a slight chance of being edged out of the championships, they will get their act properly together and win this one, unless we are completely misreading the situation.

PASSAGE

V. DUNGARVAN

This could be Dungarvan's final chance to avoid being involved in a relegation game. A win against Passage could give them a game against Portlaw, who may have been beaten by Ballyduff. Somehow I don't believe they will beat the 1988 intermediate champions, Passage who have given some top-class performances already, including a win against Mount Sion.

Oddly enough, Dungarvan's best display so far was when they almost, and should have beaten Mount Sion last month. There may be very little in it but, the vote must go to Passage.

ROANMORE

V. CAPPOQUIN

I must rate Cappoquin as having very little chance here against the table-toppers who are playing brilliant hurling this year and are one of the highly fancied sides to win out. It is important for Roanmore, if they want to make sure of being in the semi-finals without having to play-off.

Cappoquin are but one point clear of Tallow at the bottom of the table, so they are not yet absolutely free from the possibility of being involved in a relegation game.

BALLYGUNNER

V. TALLOW

The 'Gunners are certain of qualifying for the play-offs and don't seem to have any chance of catching Roanmore at the top, so this game is not of vital importance to them. It is important to Tallow in that a win would (maybe) put them ahead of Cappoquin and clear of relegation.

It is, in the present circumstances, possible that Tallow can raise their game sufficiently to beat Ballygunner who are now rated to be one of the top four contenders for the title.

DUNHILL

V. CLONEA

Here the contestants are actually fighting for a place in the quarter finals. A draw would suffice for Dunhill who are the slight favourites, but for Clonea who have shown erratic form again this year, they must win to put them a point over their opponents. I expect that it will be Dunhill.

KILROSSANTY

V. ARDMORE

Those going to Fraher Field on Saturday evening could see history in the making as Kilrossanty attempt to win their very first adult hurling championship. Over the years, there has been a gradual improvement in the hurling standards of this traditional football centre and the recent introduction of the 'B' grade in junior hurling has been a big help to them and others who are out of their debt in the 'A' grade. Ardmore may have too much experience, but by all accounts, Kilrossanty are taking the game very seriously and will make them fight every inch of the way. Ardmore are given the vote.

AN RINN V.

MODELIGO

The Gaeltacht team, who moved down from intermediate grade, will be fancied to beat Modeligo to qualify for the semi-final of the championship.
