> The IDA commenting on the Merrell Dow decision denied the pull-out would be seen as a victory for the "green movement.

However, Mr. Pat Dowd, Cork County Manager described it as "a multi-million loss for Cork."

Mr. Jerry Ring, head of the company's public affairs division stated that they had not contacted the opposition group in regard to the decision taken, "nor have we planned to do so," he added.

LONG HARD FIGHT

Reacting to the Merrell Dow announcement, a statement from the Concerned Citizens of East Cork and West Waterford said that they were "vastly relieved" at the news. "This has been a long hard fight sustained by enormous, non-stop effort by ordinary citizens who want a safe, clean future for this and future generations," the statement added.

To date the group which has fought the project through the High Court (and only last week announced their intentions to follow on with a Supreme Court Appeal) had incurred costs of up to £100,000, but Stephen Pearce, a prominent member of the group, declared on Monday night, "it was money well spent."

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Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

"O LORD IT'S SO HARD TO BE HUMBLE"

You will, I expect, already have imbibed the message of last Sunday's readings, namely, pride and humility. The Gospel recounts an experience of Jesus, which illustrates the hateful sin of pride. The Lord, having been invited to a meal, noted that the other guests were all conscious of their own importance, and, as was their custom, they sought the honoured seats at table, and none of them were prepared to give way to anyone whom they considered of lesser rank. Jesus always availed Himself to teach on these occasions. He proceeded to comment on their arrogant conduct, and pointed out that patience, restraint and respect for others were the hall-mark of a distinguished person. You see, the outlook of the Pharisee was, I'm good, and I'm entitled to the best, so others should not intrude on my rights. Mind, we are all a little over conscious about our own importance, and I would suggest we should all take a good look at ourselves. Still, I feel even the worst of us would censure the puffed-up conduct of the Pharisee. It is not only an inordinate desire to be seen to be more important than others, but it is also a most hateful sin.

There is nothing wrong to strive to achieve the best out of our abilities, but let our endeavour have God's blessing. And, when we do good, let us not preach about it, but leave it quietly in God's hands. "Let your lights shine that they might give glory to your father in heaven." Do not be lured into depending on yourself. That would be stupid pride, on a moderated

The first reading stresses the virtue of humility. The writer is saying, "the greater you are, the more you should exercise humility." We ought to bear in mind that his virtue does not mean we should be indifferent to our work and rewards. It is rather the proper understanding of our true relationship with God and our neighbour. After all, everything we have, we have received from God. We are completely dependent upon Him. The due recognition of that relationship and what it involves is what we call humility.

St. Paul in the second reading explains that this relationship functions and operates through the new life to which we were born in Baptism. Our new state brings us into a close and intimate union with God. And, as His children, we strive to fulfil our duties and prove ourselves worthy. There's no room for boasting, unless we boast about the goodness of God. What have we that we have not received?

Take a leaf from Mary's life. When Elizabeth welcomed and praised her, Mary's humble reply was: "For the Lord who is mighty had done great things to me . . . " Let us then not deny our great benefactor. Too, recall how Jesus at the Last Supper instructed His Apostles to wear the cloak of service. The instruction was meant for our benefit. It is simply a matter of giving honour where honour is due. It follows, God would not approve of His gifts being used to make little of our neighbour or being employed in any forbidden manner. Principal St. M. Gotetti GOOD EXAMPLE

There's nothing wrong with good example, when done to draw others to God. Here we are not seeking esteem for ourselves, but for God. We believe, God gives to all an equal portion, but to understand the inequalities of life has not been given to us. The more talents received, the greater the responsibilities to God, and one's neighbours. Whilst some will rail over it, one cannot but remind them that it is God who is asking them to humbly accept their cross. Always, always, salvation must be our priority.

Lucifer refused submission, and found himself in Hell. Our first parents wanted to be equal to God, and brought ruin upon mankind. Luther rejected Peter's authority, and caused deep wounds in the Body of Christ. Now, few, if any of us, would dare challenge God's honour, because we know all we have we have received. However, sometimes in our foolishness, we rebel against His laws, and frequently, we sell Jesus for

less than thirty pieces.

Humility, the opposite of pride and which flows from the heart, helps us to realise our own nothingless. From this springs the urge to venerate God, and submit to His will. As a result, we recognise the rights of our neighbours, and our own corresponding duties. I feel we are all far from being blameless in clearing the air, so let our every word and act bear the stamp of this virtue. Hence, clothe yourself with the mantle of humility, and remember it is woven from the thread of obedience. And, you will inherit the kingdom.

Bloody Affane — 'he End OF An Era

This is not a derogatory comment on this beautiful part of the Blackwater Valley but a description, by a sixteenth century chronicler, on a fierce battle that took place there in 1565. The Earl of Desmond, Gerald Fitzgerald, and Thomas Butler, Earl of Ormond, with their followers, came to blows at the Battle of Affane, the last conflict in these islands between private armies.

Each of the great Lords was laying claim to rents and levies from the lands of the Decies but in reality their quarrel was for the control of the province of Munster. Supporting Gerald were his feudal tenant

class, the McCarthys, O'-Sullivans, McSheehys and O'Connors, while ranged on the side of Ormond were the fighting men of. the O'Kennedys, Gillpatricks, Cahills and Burkes. The fighting centered around the ford crossing the Blackwater, near to where the present bridge spans the river (the first bridge at Affane was built

in 1610). The battle raged all day, first one and then the other faction seeming to gain the ascendancy. Eventually the greater number on the Ormond side prevailed and the Geraldines were driven headlong into the river, or hacked to pieces along the banks. Gerald himself was left lying on the battlefield, his right leg broken by a musket ball. As he was lifted on to the shoulders of his opponents, his enemies jeered him, "Where now is the great Earl of Desmond" to which he replied, "On the backs of the Butlers where he belongs.

QUEEN ELIZABETH **ENRAGED**

The affair at Affane enraged the young Queen Elizabeth who exclaimed,

"No sword shall be drawn in the realms but those of the Queen." Both Earls were summoned to London, Desmond being carried there on a stretcher and was lodged in the Tower. This was a grievous blow to this powerful magnate, who was at this time at the zenith of his power. He owned more than 800,000 acres of land, had built castles throughout his estates, and even kept a private army of 4,000 men.

At his trial, Gerald was found guilty of treason and to escape being hanged, drawn and quartered at Tyburn, he was forced to give up his lands and titles. Affane was the start of a process that saw the end of the rule of the old Gaelic aristocracy and the ascent of such famous "runners-in" as Walter Walter, the scientist Robert Boyle, and the poet Edmond Spenser. The latter was granted lands between the Blackwater and the Suir, rivers he immortalised in his poem the "Faerie Oueene"-

"Sweet Awniduff, which of the Englishman, Is called Blackwater; the first the gentle Shure* That making way by sweet Clonmel,

High Demand For Adult Education Continues

The continuing success of the adult education activities of University College, Cork throughout Munster is evidenced again this year by the fact that two separate conferrings have to be held in the College, as the number of students to be conferred is approximately three hundred and twenty.

On Sunday next, 10th September, classes from Cork City, Limerick City, Croom, Listowel, Dungarvan and Killenaule will be conferred, whilst on Sunday, 15th October, classes from Cork City, Bandon, Midleton, Newmarket, Ballincollig, Carrigaline and Fermoy will come to the University to receive their diplomas and certificates. The number to be conferred on each occasion is approximately one hundred and sixty.

Since the courses were founded in Cork City in 1946, in the region of 6,500 men and women from all walks of life in Munster have benefited from them. These have been students of over three hundred classes conducted in centres located in the area between Castletownbere and Clonmel, Cahirciveen and Waterford, Cork and Limerick.

COURSES OPEN TO ALL

The courses are open to all, whether they have matriculated or not. An adult of average intelligence and with good application is well able to pursue a course successfully. In selecting those to be admitted, however, prior consideration is given to applicants who have already shown an interest in community affairs, as evidenced by membership of statutory bodies, political parties, voluntary and farming organisations, trade unions, etc., or in further education.

The Universities in providing these courses with the cooperation of the ten Vocational Education Committees of Munster, Teagasc and other bodies, make a very real contribution to the economic and social development of the province as the great majority of the people in the classes are active members of trade unions, political parties and of a variety of voluntary organisations, urban and rural. The knowledge and training they receive in their two years' course of studies is reflected in the attitudes and the development of these organisations.

Organising for the next cycle of courses has just commenced and judging by the applications to date from all over the province, it appears that there is no diminution in demand.





Lismore community and district were deeply saddened by the news of the death of Hugh Colgan, B.A., B.Comm., H.D.Ed., born in New Jersey, U.S.A., late of Derrimogue, Balla, Co. Mayo and formerly of 'Lios-na-Greine,' Fernville, Lismore

where he lived for 28 years with his wife, Anne Mary (R.I.P.) and seven children.

Hugh was held in high regard as a Professor at Mount Melleray College and taught in the Friary College, Dungarvan for a couple of years before retiring into an active retirement period in 1975.

His love of education and ability to impart knowledge was recognised by his early Masters at the young age of 12 years in his native Mayo where he was regularly put in charge of teaching younger pupils the three R's.

Having studied at St. Jarlath's College, Castlebar, he proceeded to University College, Galway from where he graduated with First Class Honours Degrees in B.A., B.Comm. and H.D.Ed.

Prior to his appointment to the staff at Mount Melleray, Hugh taught in his native Mayo and Roscommon for a short period of time and then at the De La Salle College, several Ardee. For decades, Hugh also took a great interest in rural and adult education in West waterford. He lectured on behalf of U.C.C. for the Extra Mural Diploma Courses in Rural and Social Sciences. With these courses, he was noted for inspiring new generations to greater achievement and to motivate and influence new community developments.

Hugh was a very gifted and prolific man when it came to putting pen to paper. He has to his credit many prizes for his short stories, articles, letters to national newspapers and publications, RTE and professional journals. He has always been greatly ad-

mired and respected by his colleagues and all those who came his way for his power of speech, his scholarly ways and his generosity and dedication to the community at large. He was an active man in Conradh na Gaeilge, organised Feiseanna, participated in and supported many voluntary organisations.

During his years of retirement he undertook Rural Courses, Records for the Census Statistics Office and acted as Returning Officer during election times — through which he gained new friends and created a new spirit of care and interest in community life.

Hugh died in Dublin after a short illness and went to his eternal rest and reward in the presence of all his seven children and grand-children. 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PENSMAN Takes You. . . . Behind The SPOTLIGHT

ARCHAEOLOGICAL DISCOVERY IN DUNGARVAN

Workers of Waterford County Council have been engaged in the major town centre sewerage scheme in Dungaryan throughout the summer months. The pipe laying process involved deep excavations and while engaged in this, the workers ran into some major problems when they ran into solid rock veins in Mary Street and Western Terrace. Let us say at once that they dealt with these in a most efficient and expeditious manner.

excavations at Friary Street Tone Road. were proceeding, the workers came upon evidence that indicated something that could be of archaeological importance and an expert in this field was called in.

Under a scheme operated by the Office of Public Works in Dublin it happened that an Archaeologist, Ms. Catherine Power was on call and she carried out an examinations of the "find" which consisted of a circular walled well which was about one metre under the road surface and which extended down for a depth of three or four metres. Some artifacts of the 16th century period were found in the course of the "dig" but whether these significantly date the find remains to be seen.

The "well" was located just outside the entrance to the Town Hall while nearer to the Friary side of the street there were indications of what might well be part of the old town wall.

After a preliminary survey of the find, the excavation was again filled in and it is planned to have a further and more thorough examination of the area at a later date.

THE LANES OF DUNGARVAN

It is of interest to note in regard to the find that the old name for Friary Street was Clubberts Lane and this set us on a trail which led us to Canon Power's "Places Names of Decies," the first edition of which was compiled and published in the early 1900's.

In this we found reference to a big number of streets in the town which were then known as lanes. There was Parsley Lane, later New Lane at the Upper end of Church Street; there was Chapel Lane and River Lane, later Cox's Lane and now Carbery's Lane. There was Poore's (Power's) Lane later Dirty Lane; Fox's Lane now Galwey's Lane and Kennedy's Lane later Short Hair Lane and now Thomson's Lane. And there was Windmill Lane where the Catholic Church and cemetery now stand, Strameen or Stramey's Lane now Bridget Street and of course Fair Lane

TELEPHONE KIOSK THAT DISAPPEARED

Some weeks ago, workers of Telecom Eireann erected a new modern public telephone kiosk on the roadside at Tarr's Bridge a few miles outside Dungarvan. It remained there, in working order for a few weeks and then suddenly it disappeared as mysteriously as it had appeared in the first instance.

Its disappearance created a deal of public curiosity and some queries about it which landed on our desk set us on the trail of the story about the mysterious phone kiosk that had first appeared and then disappeared or as one witty gentleman put it - the kiosk that was, is and is now no

No one could or would

tell us what the originating factor in the placing of the kiosk at Tarr's Bridge was. In other words who applied to have it put there. But an interested party who stood to benefit from it (apart from Telecom Eireann) was not slow to point out that it was on the N25 primary route and was the only roadside kiosk between Kilmacthomas and Grange and consequently an asset for visiting tourists, not to mention continental truck drivers. A query to the local office of Telecom Eireann brought the information that they had placed the kiosk at Tarr's Bridge following a verbal agreement with the engineer. However when a problem arose over its location they at once agreed to remove it, pointing out that the relations between Telecom locally and the Planning Section of the County Council were very good and they wanted to keep matters that way.

We then made a call to the Co. Council Planning Department about the kiosk and were informed that when the existence of the kiosk there became known to them, they objected to it on the grounds that it constituted a traffic hazard because of the heavy volume of high speed traffic passing along that stretch of road and its proximity to a

major junction. The spokesman added that all the legal aspects of the matter were being looked into at present and pending the outcome of this, the position would again be fully reviewed.

And that's how matters stand about the mysterious phone kiosk as of now.

gradually adding a new dimension to match reporting by some sections of the media and I have heard enough about this innovation in the past few months, to predict that before very long statistics about the various aspects of games, will become the 'in' thing in reporting.

In the not too distant future a book will be published on the subject by a very well-known media personality who has already compiled an amount of data that will interest readers. Some of this information may even shock members who will find it difficult to believe that the 'playing-time' of an ordinary 60 minutes match seldom extends beyond 35 minutes. The statistical analysis of the Leinster

Statistical analysis is Football Semi-Final between Laois and Meath, played on July 7, 1977, showed that the overall amount of 'lost time' in the game was 41 minutes and 05 seconds.

In his review of playing trends in senior All-Ireland Football finals, F. J. Lennon - 1983 to 1987 wrote that on average there are 107 stoppages per game and if we multiply this number by the number of seconds which it takes to get the match restarted, we find a sizeable amount of 'lost time' that is never (or cannot) be taken into account by referees.

An analysis compiled by Mick Dunne of R.T.E. which extends from 1958 to 1988 gives interesting details of the frees awarded in the hurling All-Irelands. In the 1959 replay between Waterford and Kilkenny there were 29 frees (60 minutes).

The 'official' average number of fouls in a 70 minutes championship which is compiled by the experts is 46 (football) and it is something lower for hurling. In the Munster Senior Hurling Final there were a total of 37 fouls and the referee in his report described the match as a nasty foul-ridden game. This submission was a bit misleading as the figure of 37 was very close to the average.

It is an interesting subject and I will return to it again. I thought it might be an interesting preamble to the scoring achievements of the various teams in the league section of the hurling championship, which is now completed.

Other Results

The Under-21 championship got off to a good start over the week-end with games being played in both codes:

In the Abbeyside/Lismore game, the challengers, Abbeyside put up one of their best display's in this grade for a very long time and led the hot favourites by a point at half-time. A couple of opportunist goals by the champions, in the second half, decided the issue in their favour.

Dungarvan and Cappoquin played a cracker also in their first round game which saw Dungarvan win by five points from a spirited opposition.

There was a shock result in the Under-21 football when Tallow proved far too good for the Brickeys and won surprisingly and very decisively.

In the football relegation battle, it remains for Dunhill and Ferrybank to decide who goes up and who goes down next year. This game will not be played until the week-end of September 17.

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
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
