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Co. Council Discussions On Waste Disposal And Pollution Control

Waste disposal and the control of pollution within the county were the two principal items discussed at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday.

The comprehensive Waste Disposal Plan running to 48 foolscap pages with maps was prepared by Mr. J. V. O'Connor and Mr. D. McCarthy of the Council's Engineering Dept. and was presented by Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer.

Mr. O'Flynn told the Council members that in accordance with an E.C. Directive on Waste, competent authorities were to be established or designated for the planning, organisation, authorisation and supervision of waste disposal operations. The plans as drawn up and presented

related to the type and quantity of waste to be disposed of; general technical requirements and suitable disposal sites. It also covered the persons empowered to carry out the disposal of waste; the estimated costs of the disposal operations and the appropriate measures to encourage rationalisation of the collection, sorting and the treatment of waste.

Having discussed the matter briefly, the Council, on the proposal of Cllr. B. Kyne seconded by Cllr. P. Cahill unanimously approved of the report.

NEED FOR REPORTS ON POLLUTION

The discussion on pollution control arose from a motion proposed by Cllr. G. O'Halloran which requested that the Council include a "Pollution Report" item on the agenda for all future monthly meetings of the Council.

Moving the motion, Cllr.

O'Halloran said that while they had nothing to hide in this regard as Waterford Co. Council and the County Engineer were to the forefront in fighting pollution, he felt that there would be more than sufficient to make up such a re-

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LISMORE DENTAL CLINIC

Excuses For Delay Unacceptable

Cllr. O. Wilkinson speaking at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday said that despite all the promises made, nothing had been done so far to restore the dental clinic in Lismore. "I am very disappointed at the way we have been treated as we were never told why the clinic was closed," he said.

Cllr. Wilkinson said that they had been told that the clinic was to alternate between Lismore and Cappoquin but that had not happened and recently he had received a complaint from a woman from Tallow who had to thumb a lift to Cappoquin to take her child to the clinic there. "We were never told why the Lismore clinic was closed and I now propose that the Council write to the Health Board Programme Manager to request that he meet a deputation from the Council to discuss the position as a matter of urgency," he said.

Cllr. B. Kyne said that he had been trying to solve this problem but the delay could have been created because the Programme Manager was now being replaced by a new person. "A lot of 'Mickey Mouse' excuses have been made about this issue including one that the place where the clinic was located was

'scary'," he said, adding that he believed that there was a certain feeling among the dental profession not to just use the facility in Lismore.

Cllr. J. Quirke said that the place being used was certainly a desperate place and anyone would be afraid to go in there. He added that every effort was being made locally to get a proper centre for Lismore.

Cllr. Kyne said that what mattered most was to have the dental service for Lismore restored. "I don't accept the excuse that the place is too scary at all and I will be raising the matter again at the Health Board meeting on Thursday of this week," he said.

Cllr. Wilkinson — I would not accept the excuses made at all. What is happening is just not good enough.

It was agreed to await the outcome of Thursday's Health Board meeting on the matter.

District Justice Congratulates Lismore Garda

A Lismore garda was warmly praised at Lismore Court last Wednesday by District Justice W. F. O'Connell.

Garda Joseph O'Sullivan was complimented and congratulated by the District Justice for his investigative work which resulted in a court appearance by Thomas Or-

monde, Townparks, Lismore.

The defendant pleaded guilty to charges of failing to keep his car at the scene of an accident on the night of June 2; failing to report

the accident, and failing to stop. District Justice O'Connell imposed fines totalling £30 on Ormonde. Two endorsements were imposed on his driving licence and he was also directed to pay £75 compensation to the lady into whose railings he crashed.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

THE PRICE OF PEACE IS LOVE

The central theme of the readings for the 23rd Sunday is to learn to meet the demands of our calling. The first reading reminds us that man, encumbered with a mortal body, is unable by himself to understand and discover God's will, so he ought to give thanks to God for His goodness in making His plan known to us. The writer, as if to press home our limitations, draws attention to our inability to unravel matters that lie directly before us not to mind uncovering the secrets of God's mind. Indeed, in our own days man had succeeded in exploring the hidden depths of the cosmic world, but, beyond telling us more wonders and vastness the of outer space, and thereby establishing still more the need for a Creator, it nevertheless does not unfurl God's plan for man. Of course, man could draw many conclusions, but, as I said, without providing the answer to the point at issue. Hence, we have reason to express our gratitude to Almighty God for removing our darkness.

I feel that St. Paul's advice in the second reading would not at first meet with general approval, yet! when one considers the laws and social conditions at the time (wrong though they were), he had little choice. The purpose of his story was to remind us that God's teaching must take priority over every other law and circumstance. I have said it before, and it is worth repeating: when we place God first we will always act rightly. It is obvious that Philemon, the owner of the slave, was a Christian. Paul is gently asking him to treat his slave as a brother. Put the Ulster problem into this setting, and you'll realise what is wrong. We might well borrow the wisdom idea from the first reading, and apply it here to the master-slave relationship or the Ulster situation, namely, do not allow yourself to be weighed-down and influenced by worldly wisdom.

St. Luke in the Gospel advises us to accept and to follow the charter for Christian living as unfolded by Sacred Scripture. He warns us that acceptance of Christ's plan will inevitably involve us in the renunciation of anything subordinate to love of God. He is asking for a preferential love, and he wants us to open our eyes and see what we are letting ourselves in for. Luke leaves us under no misgivings. He stresses that a disciple of the Lord must be ready to put God before everything, everyone and even one's very self. Christianity is a way of life in which there is no

room for compromise. You just do not follow any person or take any cross; you are called to follow Jesus and bear His Cross.

GIVE YOUR DAY TO GOD

You know what is meant by following in the steps of the Master even to sharing in His passion and death. It is the way of a committed Christian, and yet! it is so simple and so privileged. All you do is give your day to God, and thereby, you minister daily to Christ's Body, the Church. "Paul, Paul, why are you persecuting me? I am Jesus the Nazarene . . ." As you know, Paul was engaged in persecuting the Christians, and God spoke to him as if he were inflicting the harassment on Himself. Christ's Church is still active and operating, and suffers from attacks from within and from without. Veronica grasped the opportunity to wipe the face of Jesus. Will you step forward and stem the blood that flows from the wounds in Christ's Church? Many others saw Jesus carry His Cross, but only Simon the Cyrene stepped forward to ease the burden. Will you offer your day to God's service? How often when we are tried and tempted, do we not fail to use them to express our love? Yes, we have to be watchful. We have got to be determined not one day, but every day. You must realise that we draw strength from our daily renewal.

St. Paul in the second reading appealed to Philemon to deal with his slave in a Christian manner. He advised the slave to return to his master, because he wanted Philemon to be free to exercise brotherly love, which form of treatment would have been completely foreign to the social conditions existing at the time. You can say, Paul was attempting to better the unhappy lot of slaves by instructing a Christian master to behave like Christ. It is clear, if you want to walk with Jesus, you must be prepared to forgive, to forget and to love. It may be hard sometimes, but that is the way God wants things.

Todate, there seems no end to the problems in the North, and the sad part is, they are all supposed to be Christians. I am afraid, they will never have peace unless they learn to forgive and to forget, and behave as children of God. Here in the South we have been somewhat unconcerned, so may I make a suggestion to you. Let us look at ourselves, and resolve to bring brotherly love into all our dealings at work and at home, and tell God that this is our offering for peace among our brothers up North.

BACK TO SCHOOL TIME —

How To Avoid Unnecessary Accidents

Every September, a major change in the pattern of road use occurs amongst children, parents and teachers. The National Safety Council has issued some guidelines to help prevent the more common types of accidents with school-going children.

WALKING TO SCHOOL

Young children should be shown a safe route to school and taught the necessary Rules of the Road on the way. They should be accompanied until they are able to cope with the journey on their own. Make sure each child has a pair of reflective armbands.

TRAVELLING BY BUS

Children should be trained to stand well in on the footpath or grass verge. Before crossing the road they should wait until the bus has moved off and they can see clearly in both directions.

CYCLING

Think twice before allowing a child to cycle to school. A bicycle is a vehicle, not a toy and a child cyclist is very vulnerable, even when trained and experienced. Make sure that Rules of the Road have been thoroughly understood and that he or she can at least look behind and signal without wobbling. Check that the bicycle's brakes, lights, reflector and bell are in

good order. A reflective belt is important too. No child under the age of ten should be allowed out in any sort of traffic. If the route is used by trucks, consider carefully whether allowing your child to cycle is worth the risk.

DRIVING YOUR CHILD TO SCHOOL

Children should sit in the back seat and each should have his own safety restraints. Set down and collect your children on the school side of the road whenever possible. Co-operate with the school warden and never overtake a school bus when it is stationary. Don't park within 20 yards of the school entrance.

Dangers Of Toughened Glass Windscreens

The National Safety Council has a message to motorists unfortunate enough to have a windscreen breakage.

The National Safety Council strongly urges all drivers to make sure the replacement screens fitted are of laminated glass and not toughened glass.

The basic reason for this recommendation is the different reactions of each type of glass to a crash situation:

— On collision laminated windscreens offer a cushioning effect to the head and high resistance to penetration so that eye injury is rare.

— By contrast, on impact toughened glass shatters into millions of tiny fragments offers little resistance to the head with serious risk of laceration of the face and eyes.

Laminated glass replacement windscreens are widely available and should be purchased. Beware of offers of windscreens at low cost, which are probably of toughened glass. In your interest insist on laminated glass.

"Apple Day" To Aid Irish Heart Foundation

The Irish Heart Foundation in the course of a Press Release states: Our next big event will be "Apple Day" on October 6. On that day, hopefully, apples or the "Appleman" token, will be on sale in every village and town in Ireland. The apples will be supplied in special attractive bags but as an alternative, an "Appleman" token will also be available.

As this national event will get widespread coverage on TV and radio, we expect a lot of support from the public. What we need is outlets for the sale of apples, and we appeal to shopkeepers for help. We'd also like to hear from anyone who would organise a stall to sell the apples in public places. Also, it is hoped that firms, e.g. financial institutions, Building Societies, etc., will buy the apples to supply to their customers.

A sponsored "Heart Walk" is being organised

for the week-end of October 20/22, and the venue is Killarney. On day one a six mile night walk around Muckcross Lake is planned. On day two there will be a 15 mile walk along Kerry Way and on day three a 7 mile walk around Toamies Wood. Accommodation will be in hostels or similar type accommodation. New York Tributes For Father Virgil Power, Stradbally

The following is an extract from the "Irish Voice" published in New York from its issue dated Saturday, August 19, 1989 which has been passed on to us by Mr. John Clancy, New York who is presently on a visit to his home at Abbeyside:

Rev. Virgil Power, pastor emeritus of Our Lady of the Isle parish in Shelter Island, N.Y., has celebrated the golden jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood. Until his retirement four years ago, Fr. Power was chaplain to St. Patrick's Division Two in Babylon, N.Y.

The joyous occasion was marked by a special celebrated Mass on Shelter Island, at which Bishop John McGann and his four auxiliary bishops of the Rockville Center diocese presided. The Suffolk Hibernian Choir sang and the Saffron Kilts Pipe Band of AOH Division Two performed, adding color to the

occasion.

Bishop McGann presented the jubilarian with a special papal blessing and a gold medal of honor. The bishop paid tribute to Fr. Power's devoted service to the people of the various parishes where he ministered.

Later, following the religious service, the jubilarian was honored at a dinner in the Irish Coffee restaurant, East Islip. The president and members of St. Patrick's Division Two, wishing to honor Fr. Power for his thirty years of devoted service as their chaplain, also organized a special Mass followed by a dinner dance at the Hiber-

nian Cultural Center in Babylon. Monsignor Thaddeus Rooney, associate chaplain to Division Two, spoke in glowing terms of all Fr. Power had done to promote Irish culture and keep alive Irish traditions on Long Island since he came to the U.S. 33 years ago.

Virgil Patrick Power was born in Stradbally, Co. Waterford, 76 years ago. He received his early education from the Sisters of Mercy. He pursued his secondary education and minor seminary studies at the famous Abbey of Mount Melleray. The young cleric entered the Cistercian novitiate at Mount Melleray and was ordained on May 7, 1939.

Like so many Irish religious, he left his native land to minister abroad. He arrived in New York on November 24, 1956 and was welcomed by his two sisters, Sr. Eileen Marie and Sr. Angela Patrice, and by his uncle, Msgr. Peter Quealy, pastor of St. Agnes Church, Rockville Center and the builder of what is now the cathedral there.

Fr. Power's first assignment was chaplain to the Sisters of St. Joseph in Brentwood. There, he met two well-known Hibernians, Mike Rice and Jack

Farrelly, members of Division Two. They introduced the Waterford native to the AOH. He became a member in 1958 and Division Two elected him their chaplain. Two years later he was appointed Suffolk County AOH chaplain and chosen chaplain of the Ladies group. He is also very active with the Saffron Kilts Pipe Band which he saw grow to become one of the finest pipe bands.

Fr. Power retired from his parish on Shelter Island in 1985 and went to live in Beverly Hills, Florida. On weekends he assists the clergy at Our Lady of the Springs parish in Ocala. The folks there also honored him at a special function. Fr. Power is vacationing in Ireland at present and attending a family celebration. That function will be attended by two brothers, three sisters, 26 nieces and nephews, 84 grandnieces and nephews.

Division Two past president, Leo Murphy, told me, "It will surely be a powerful celebration in Stradbally. We all wish our venerable jubilarian many more fruitful and enjoyable years of retirement."

Another Million £ Acquisition By Waterford Foods

Waterford Foods plc, with headquarters in Dungarvan, last Thursday announced its acquisition of the Manchester-based independent dairy Heald in a £47.5 million deal just two months after a successful \$55 million purchase in the U.S. of another independent dairy concern, Galloway West of Wisconsin. And, according to Waterford Foods Chief Executive Stephen O'Connor, these purchases have not diminished the eagerness of Waterford Foods to win control of Premier Tir Laighean (PTL) in partnership with Express Dairies.

The new acquisitions now put Waterford Foods among the big players in the sector giving an annual turnover of almost £500 million with some 3,000 employees.

HOW IT ALL BEGAN

The rise and rise of the Dungarvan-based company has been nothing less than phenomenal. From the humblest of beginnings it has now consolidated and copperfastened its place as a leader in Ireland's dairying and food processing industries to a degree that makes it one of the most envied companies in the land.

Waterford Foods is today a striking tribute to the seven wise men who gathered in Dungarvan's Grattan Square back in 1921 and took the bold decision to set up Dungarvan Co-op. The seven, all of whom have long since passed on, were Thomas Flynn, John McCarthy, Daniel Dempsey, Philip Beresford, Thomas Kiely, John Beresford and Edward Beresford. All were from Dungarvan and its environs.

In due course Dungarvan Co-operative Creamery Ltd. was registered as a company by the founding seven members together with Patrick Egan of Ballygagin. The seeds of today's Waterford Foods plc success had been sown.

The turnover for the first trading year came to just over £22,000 and the co-op proudly recorded a net profit for the year of £513.

Today, Waterford Foods,

including its most recent British and US acquisitions, is expected to reach a 1989 turnover of something in the region of £500m.

Difficult decades followed, but Dungarvan Co-op, as it had become known, soldiered successfully with the late Ned Maher as its general manager for a total of 27 years.

Steadily the operations were expanded until on May 1, 1964, five co-operative societies in County Waterford pioneered a major new development by amalgamating under the umbrella of a new co-op, Waterford Co-operative Society Limited.

A NEW GIANT

The quintet of merging creameries was Dungarvan, Kilmeaden, Gaultier, Millvale and Rathgormack. A new giant in the Irish dairy industry had been created.

In 1972 the now flourishing Waterford Co-op expanded its sphere of activities by bringing the Castlelyons Co-op in East Cork and the South Eastern Farmers' Organisation and the IDA Co-operative Society in Wexford under its wing. A year later Glenmore Co-op Society in South Kilkenny became the latest to throw its lot in with the Dungarvan-based Society.

After more than a little hesitation Knockmeal Co-op joined the growing ranks in 1976 followed two years later by the Shelbourne Society in Co. Wexford.

Apart from all the amalgamations, Waterford Co-

op also completed a whole series of major new and exciting developments. A new cheese factory was opened in the village of Kilmeaden in 1965; major new spray drying plants were built, and then in the mid 1970's came one of the most exciting developments of all — the launching of Yoplait yogurt.

Today, Yoplait dominates the Irish market; has made enormous inroads in

Northern Ireland, and since its launch in Britain six years ago, is now enjoying record sales and profits.

However, the most significant developments of all have been crammed into the past two years. None have been more significant than the Waterford Co-op decision "to go public" under the new name of Waterford Foods Plc in 1988.

Know Your Rights

Q. — Can I get any help with footwear for my four school-going children?

A. — If you are receiving any of the following payments then you would be eligible for help under the Children's Footwear Scheme: Supplementary Welfare Allowance, Disabled Persons Maintenance Allowance, Infectious Diseases Maintenance Allowance, A Social Welfare Payment.

This year the Scheme will operate from September 1 to January 1990 and it covers children under 18 years.

The assistance is given in the form of vouchers which can be exchanged at most shoe shops.

Where the parents/guardians are receiving either Supplementary Welfare Allowance or short-term Unemployment Assistance vouchers will be given to the full value of the footwear, subject to the following limits: Shoe size 7 to 10 — £11 maximum; 11 to 5 (large) — £13 maximum; 6 (large) and upwards — £16 maximum.

In other cases the assistance doesn't cover the full cost. The Department of

Social Welfare recommends: (a) that people on long-term Unemployment Assistance pay a contribution as follows: Sizes 7 to 10 — £1; Sizes 11 to 5 (large) — £2; Sizes 6 (large) and upwards — £3; (b) that others pay a contribution as follows: Sizes 7 to 10 — £3; Sizes 11 to 5 (large) — £4; Sizes 6 (large) and upwards — £5.

These guidelines are only a recommendation from the Department of Social Welfare to the Health Boards who have discretion in running the scheme. They have remained the same for the past few years. Application should be made to the Community Welfare Officer at your local Health Centre.

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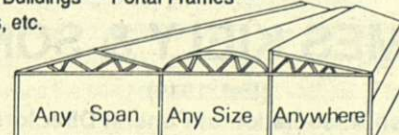


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MAYOR DALEY'S FLYING VISIT TO OLD PARISH

Barring any last minute hitches, the planned visit of Chicago's newly-elected Mayor Richard M. Daley to Old Parish will take place on Wednesday next, September 20. It will really be in the nature of a flying visit as only three hours have been allocated in the timetable from arrival to departure of the Mayor and his 60-strong party.

The Father Victor Power Commemoration Committee (Cuimhneachain do'n Athair Victor de Paor) comprised of former members of Aisteoiri an tSean Phobal (Old Parish Players) have arranged their Memorial Programme to synchronise with the Mayor's visit and Mayor Daley has accordingly agreed to perform the unveiling of the plaque to the memory of Fr. Victor in Old Parish that morning.

According to the timetable for next Wednesday, released this week by the Memorial Committee, the Mayor and his party are due to arrive in Old Parish from Cork Airport at 10.30 a.m. Twenty minutes later at 10.50 a.m. the Mayor will visit the local National School and at 11.35 a.m. he is timed to visit Old Parish Church where he will see the stained glass window which is dedicated to the Daley family in honour of his late father's contribution towards the building of the present church.

Then at 12 o'clock (noon) the Mayor will unveil the plaque to the late Fr. Victor following which Mayor Daley and his party will make the short journey to Monamean on the main Dungarvan-Youghal road to view the site of the 10 acre plantation purchased by his late father and planted to mark the occasion of his visit 25 years ago in May, 1964. The "Mayor Daley Monument" recalling the visit, still stands at Monamean.

Following this, the Mayoral party will return to Old Parish and then go on to the Seanachai Restaurant where they will be guests for lunch before departing to continue the next stage of their journey which takes them on to Wexford.

Later in the evening the celebrations organised by the Fr. Victor Committee will continue with a Memorial Mass in Old Parish Church at 7 p.m. during which the memorial plaque, unveiled earlier in the day, will be dedicated and blessed.

Then at 8.30 p.m. a dinner will be held in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan, and this will be followed by an evening of music and songs by the well-known Irish singer Sean O Se and other

local singers, interspersed by readings of extracts from Fr. Victor's plays and writings.

The late Fr. Victor de Paor was a curate in Ring and Old Parish from 1957 to 1964 who subsequently went to America and where, after completing a course in media communications at the University of Illinois, he worked for a period in the late Mayor Daley's office in Chicago before pursuing a full-time career in teaching and writing.

As the Memorial Committee remarks in its Press release, the events pertaining to the Memorial Ceremonies and to the visit of Mayor Daley should certainly prove to be as memorable as the visit of the late Mayor Daley twenty-five years ago. We feel sure that Wednesday next will prove this. (See also "Remembering Other Days" on page 8.)

WHAT THEY MEAN

While Old Parish will be the focus of attention next week due to Mayor Daley's visit, other happenings to which we have previously referred in this column have continued to arouse growing curiosity among local people there. These concern inquiries about land purchases which are shrouded in a cloak of "confidentiality."

Perhaps it is of interest to note that the entry in the late Canon Power's "Place Names of Decies" under the side heading "Mine Head" reads as follows: "Mian Ard — High Mine," so called from lead and silver mines worked here by the Earl of Cork. . ."

"Monamean, Moin na Mian — Bog of the Mines. Iron ore was quarried there in the 17th century. . ."

Whether these references to mining in the area now have any significance remains to be seen but a query which we directed to the County Council during the week about the situation in Old Parish brought the reply that planning permission for any particular activity in the area had not been applied for to the Council.

THE BLIND ROAD

A few weeks ago we were asked if we could identify where "The Blind Road"

was in Abbeyside. We thought at the time that it could have been an old name among the Villagers for Home Rule Street but while searching through Canon Power's book, we found that "Boithrin Caoch — The Blind Road" is given as King Street.

EXHIBITION BY DUNGARVAN'S ADULT LEARNERS

We dropped in to view the exhibition of work put on by members of the Dungarvan Adult Learners Group on last Thursday afternoon at the Learning Centre which is located in a couple of rather small rooms in the Courthouse Building in Bridge Street. In the display area we saw the work of 22 learners who are at present availing of the facilities available at the centre and which represented the progress being made under the guidance of their tutors in more or less learning from scratch how to read and how to write.

Funded by the County Vocational Education Committee, the Dungarvan Centre has been in existence since 1986 and as a result, a total of 46 persons have reached the target set for them as members of the writing group. Ms. Helen Whelan who is in charge at the Centre explained the methods they follow in dealing with each case on an individual basis. Tutors and learners work usually on a one-to-one basis and time schedules are flexible.

The end results as displayed in the exhibition were indeed very impressive and most of the samples exhibited showed a standard of writing which would very well put many of our present day second level students to shame!

As a result of this visit to the Dungarvan Learning Centre we became more consciously aware of the publicity focused at the week-end on the problem of literacy as it affects the country as a whole. A recent survey by the National Adult Literacy Agency has revealed that at least 400,000 are said to be in need of adult literacy education in Ireland. It is almost incredible in this day and age with so much hassle going on about education at all levels — primary, secondary and even third level — that there are still so many people in the country who can neither read nor write.

It is a major problem and one which deserves far more serious consideration by the Department of Education than can be achieved

by the £500,000 which has been allocated to it by the Department in the current year — £1 per person for a whole year cannot possibly be enough to rectify this rather sad state of affairs.

[N.B. The exhibition was held to mark International Literacy Day.]

RATHER HYPOCRITICAL

Over the past few weeks we have been bombarded through the media — the press, radio and television — about the decision of some Irish Rugby players and officials to participate in a rugby tour of South Africa. Church and State have joined forces in outright condemnation of this decision by those concerned to go to South Africa to play sport.

While everyone must abhor the policy of apartheid and the regime of tyranny and oppression which goes on in South Africa one cannot but wonder at the vehemence which has been directed at the attitude of the Irish Rugby Football Union to the South African tour. Government Ministers and leading politicians have made blistering attacks on the rugby people — Junior Minister for Sport, Frank Fahey, has stated that rugby will be deprived of a grant of some £40,000 a year while Minister for Foreign Affairs, Gerry Collins has announced a boycott on all the home internationals in the coming season.

But do not these gestures smack of a great deal of hypocrisy? Which is the more reprehensible — a couple of players going to participate in a few rugby matches or the carrying out of a multi-million £ import/export trade as carried on between Ireland and South Africa with no objection from the government of which Mr. Collins and Mr. Fahey are members. One would imagine that this major trading arrangement with South Africa would rank as a greater support for the apartheid regime in operation there than the visit of a handful of sportsmen.

Without doubt the Anti-apartheid lobby is a very strong and very strident one and once they targetted the rugby tour for a high profile publicity campaign it became fashionable to jump on the bandwagon. In doing so, the inhibiting factors that would follow an embargo on trading which would involve loss of profits and possibly jobs, did not exist!

Waterford Firms Suffer From Merrell Dow Pull Out

Cllr. P. Kenneally referring to the decision of the Merrell Dow Corporation to pull out their plans to build a pharmaceutical plant at Killeagh at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday, said it was bad news especially for a number of business firms in Co. Waterford. He said that these firms had negotiated contracts with Merrell Dow and as a result of the pull out now stood to lose millions of pounds. "It is a sad commentary that they have to suffer such losses because of this pull out," he said.

Cllr. O'Halloran said that the reason for the pull out was not because of the local opposition but rather because of the merger entered into by Merrell Dow with another American chemical

corporation. "The situation is," said Cllr. O'Halloran, "that those who opposed the plant have now saved the IDA millions of pounds as no factory is to be built." Referring to possible job

losses, Cllr. O'Halloran said most to be employed, had the plant gone ahead, would be chemical engineers and not many ordinary jobs would have been available there.

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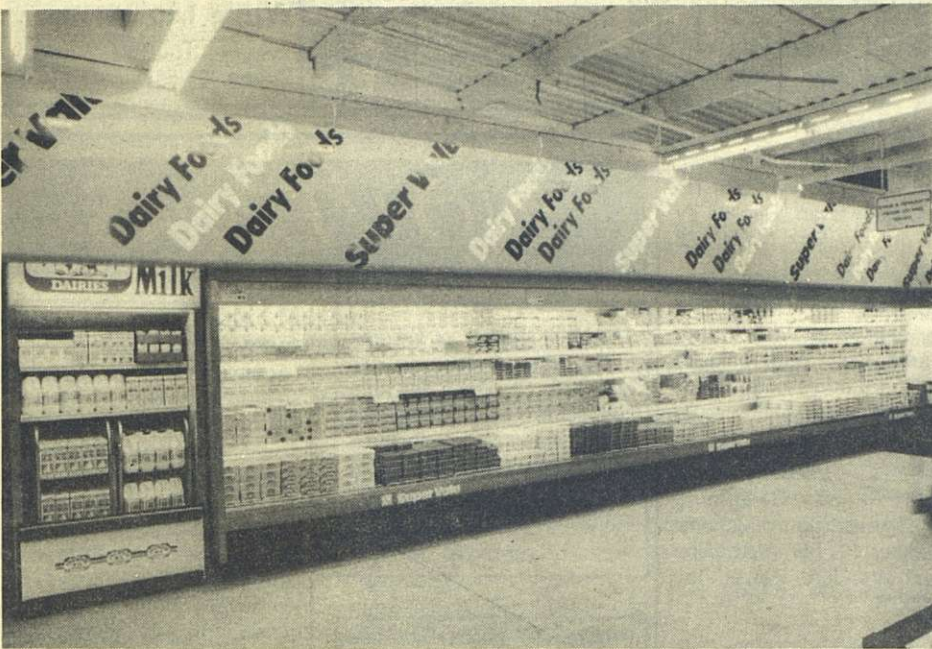

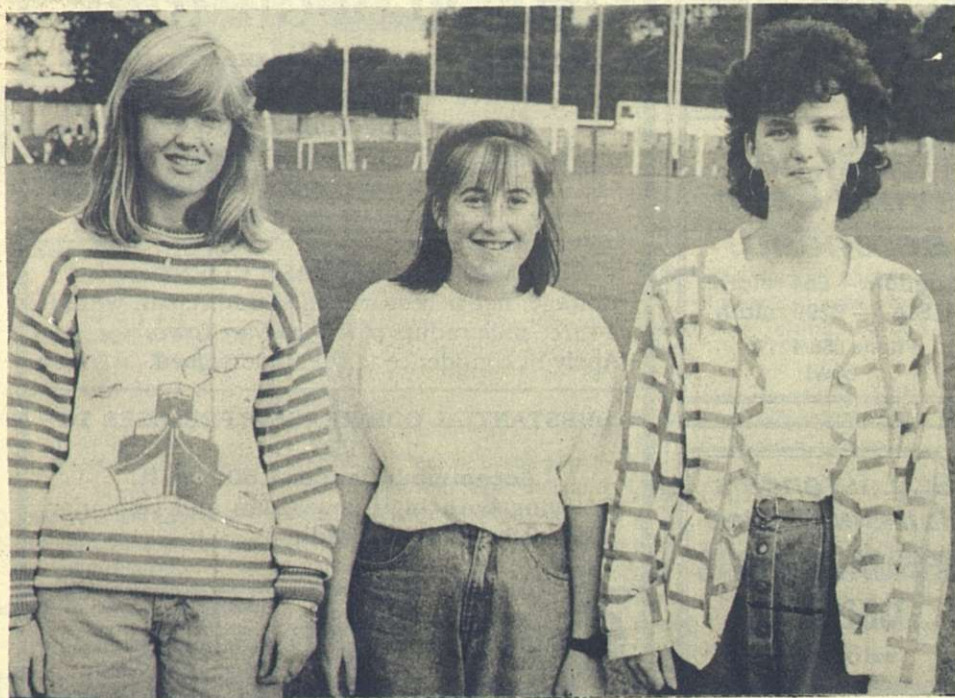

Next Week-End Fixtures

As expected everything that happens over the coming week-end, will be over-shadowed by the All-Ireland senior football final between Munster champions, Cork and Mayo, which will be seen by a capacity crowd at Croke Park on Sunday; Cork are making their third attempt in three years and Mayo have come bang into contention after a great provincial campaign and a semi-final victory over Tyrone.

Every season we hear of the unprecedented demand for stand tickets and this time I know it is true that the demand has surpassed anything that has ever been experienced at Croke Park. The reduction of 70 tickets in this county has created untoward problems with many of the regulars having to be let down.

It seems certain that the game will be a better contest than the hurling final but expectations are that Cork will win and give Munster the senior double.

On the home front the second senior football quarter final between Stradbally and Gaultier at Walsh Park and the Western intermediate football final between Affane and Sliabh gCua at Dungarvan are the main events of the week-end. The replay of the drawn and exciting minor hurling 'B' divisional final between Ballyduff and St. Patricks at Cappoquin and the semi-final match in the Under-21 hurling involving Tallow and Dungarvan, also at Cappoquin will each attract its own support.

Veale, James Crotty, Brian Hennessey, Eamon O'Shea, Donna Cummins and company.

Having made desperate efforts to get back to the top in football over the past few years, a win for them here would prove to be of immense value and it would be a very popular result, but the odds seem to be against them.

A number of people have contacted me during the past week on subjects which have from time to time been touched upon in these columns.

A few showed a great interest in the Statistical Analysis article and would like to read more on the subject. Connie Ryan, well-known Tallow Gael and Eddie Cunningham were particularly interested. I will give more information on this subject at a later date and will devote a long article to it when the slack season comes round.

Tom Butler from London wrote to me to complain that the columns of the weekly papers in Waterford devote too much space to adult and juvenile activity and not enough to the more important grades which he claims to be minor and under-21. His chief interest is hurling and he has spelt out ways in which minor progress can be made. I promise to pass this on to the minor selectors who are the best group that we have had in this grade for a long time.

My long-term friend Bob McGrath, who is very much a memory man and from whom we hear too little, wrote me a long letter on subjects of interest to both of us. Some years ago, when referring to the same Bob, I wrote 'God be good to him' and he inferred from this that everyone thought he was dead. Anyway, he wrote to tell me that he wasn't and we have been in close touch ever since. The former Tourin man was on the ball with a contradiction of a claim made on the day after the All-Ireland hurling final that by scoring 2-12, Nicky English had set up a scoring record for All-Ireland hurling finals. Just for the record, writes Bob, in 1905 the All-Ireland hurling final (it was the 1903 final) between Cork and Kilkenny at Dungarvan ended on the score: Cork 8-9, Kilkenny 0-8, and Andrew Buckley, playing for Cork, scored a personal total of 7 goals and four points. So Nicky will have to come again to equal this record. My old Tourin friend also gave me some other interesting information regarding Dungarvan field and I will refer to this in the future.



I had a call that seemed to be from outer space until I recognised the voice of Johnnie O'Connor, former Waterford, Munster and Abbeyside hurler who rang to chat about things generally in Waterford. He is as interested as ever in what is going on down here (he lives in Mallow) and he asked if we are ever going to write the history of the GAA in the county. After a couple of years more, Johnnie hopes to be in a position to be more in touch with the county. This will be welcome.

County Board Meeting

Michael Maher, Chairman of the Munster Council will address the meeting of the Senior Board which is scheduled for Tuesday next at Dungarvan. The Provincial Chairman will speak on the subject of coaching and the appointment of coaches both in hurling and football who will help out clubs and schools within the county. port for each of their meetings. He said that in the light of modern high-tech developments, people wanted to have such information and he felt that it should be a function of the Council to provide it.

Cllr. O'Halloran proceeded to quote from a newspaper article when Cllr. Kyne made a remark to which Cllr. O'Halloran objected. He complained that he was a target regularly for snide remarks by Cllr. Kyne and he sought the protection of the Chair as far as this was concerned for the future stating "as soon as I have finished, Cllr. Kyne is welcome to take the floor." He then concluded his submission.

Cllr. Kyne said that while he would support Cllr. O'Halloran's motion he felt that it would be a case of getting a report for the sake of a report. Had Cllr. O'Halloran taken the trouble to ascertain the limitations under which the Environmental Section of the Council had to work he would realise that such a report would hardly be worth the effort of compiling it as it would not be giving a true assessment of the situation. "Until such time as more money is available not only to monitor pollution but to try to prevent it, Councils will only have a hit and miss approach to the problems," he said.

Cllr. Kyne then referred to the survey carried out by the Council in the catchment area of the river Clodagh which showed that of the 271 farms surveyed, 117 had problems varying from major to significant and all of these had been advised of their problems. At present the Council staff were trying to monitor the response to their directions and in

some cases court action might be needed, he said.

SLURRY STENCH

Cllr. Kyne went on to say that all over the county the spreading of slurry and the now long-term use of nitrates were polluting water supplies. "In recent weeks" said Cllr. Kyne, "the stench of silage or slurry in the Abbeyside and Dungarvan areas has been so bad that people have been complaining about it as it has reached a totally unacceptable level and is happening too often."

Referring to pollution in Dungarvan harbour Cllr. Kyne said that an obvious requirement for the future was a sewage treatment works and the only way he saw this being undertaken was a joint venture by industries in the urban and the Council.

In conclusion Cllr. Kyne said that while he would support Cllr. O'Halloran's motion, he felt it would not be significant as the Council did not have the manpower to back it up.

Cllr. James A. Walsh also supported the motion and pointed out that farmers were not mainly responsible for pollution. "I think," he said, "That Cllr. Kyne is running in blinkers where farmers are concerned."

Mr. John O'Flynn, Co. Engineer said that he was very well aware of the slurry smell in Abbeyside as it was spread only yards from his own house. In regard to the motion, he felt that monthly reports would be too frequent and suggested that quarterly reports would suffice. Cllr. O'Halloran then said that if such a report was submitted every second month he would be satisfied and it was agreed that this would be the procedure for the future.

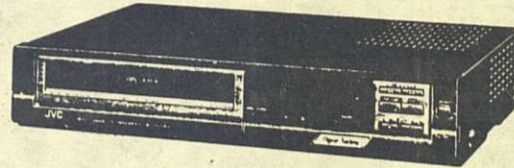
