
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Local Man Charged After Massive Garda

From New York — To Medjugorie

— To Dungarvan

Medjugorje which up to a short few years ago was but a small insignificant village in the poor mountainous area of Montenegro in Yugoslavia has now become known worldwide as a place of pilgrimage since three local teenagers first claimed to have seen a vision of the Blessed Virgin. Pilgrims from all over the world are constantly travelling to the spot where the trio undergo regular transportment as the vision appears to them with Ireland very high on the list in the numbers that travel.

Among the very many pilgrimages that went to Medjugorje in 1987 was a group from Dungarvan and parts of West Waterford which included Rev. Fathers Pat Butler, Kilgobinet and Peter Ahearne, Abbeyside, Fred Forsey and Kevin Power and John O'Rourke and others. There, in the course of performing the pilgrimage exercises, they met and mingled with pilgrims from other lands and, as is usual in such circumstances, made new friends.

Among the latter, were three girls from New York, Angela Ford, Sharon Fitzpatrick and Tara Kamara. During their stay in Medjugorje a warm friendship developed between the two groups and when the time for parting came, the Dungarvan pilgrims issued an invitation to the New Yorkers to come to visit them in Ireland at a future date.

This year the New York girls availed of the invitation and arrived in Ireland in April with a plan to spend one week in Dungarvan, one week in Dublin and one week in Galway before again returning to the U.S.

CEAD MILE FAILTE

On their arrival in Dungarvan they were met and welcomed by their Irish friends and enjoyed their first traditional Irish dinner of bacon and cabbage at Fred Forsey's home in Abbeyside. Then Fr. Pat Butler, Fr. Ahearne, Kevin Power and John O'Rourke joined and in the ensuing days they were afforded a cead mile failte. Indeed so overwhelmed were the U.S. visitors by the hospitality shown them that they stayed on, first in Lawlor's Hotel and then in the Fountain Guest House and instead of one week they lingered in Dungaryan for all of two and a half weeks. During that time they went on tours over the Comeragh Scenic Drive, to the

Vee and around the Gaeltacht area of Ring and Old Parish. They also visited the Melleray Grotto and Mount Melleray Abbey while they also went to see the Waterford Glass Showrooms.

As a result, the remainder of their Irish visit had to be cut short and the girls had to return to New York but not before they promised to return again at some future date.

Then last month Ursula O'Rourke from Melleray went to New York and while their paid a visit to Angela Ford. Angela gave her a poem which she had composed about their wonderful visit to Dungarvan and Co. Waterford and she passed a copy of it to John Clancy, Abbeyside, who was then due home on one of his regular visits from New York. On arriving in Dungarvan, John brought the poem to the "Leader" and we then followed up the story. The following is the poem which tells it all:

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

OPEN YOUR EYES!

The first reading for last Sunday condemns the exploitation of the poor, and reminds those, who pay little or no attention to God's law, that one day they'll have to answer to God. In the second, Paul tells us that we all have a duty to share in the work of salvation, and indicates that prayer ought to play an important role in this work.

The Gospel at first sight would seem to be saying that we should not allow ourselves to become slaves to money; and sadly, as we know only too well, the disregard for the Seventh Commandment is wholesale and widespread.

However, the message Jesus had in mind for us was, man is worthy of commendation for the ready and clever way he deals with his ordinary business affairs; and He wonders why, when it comes to working out his salvation, he fails to manifest anything like the same quality of spirit and zest. He even asks the question, why are people so half hearted and lackadaisical when faced with the most important function of their existence? The answer lies with our faith. We must pray, and keep reminding ourselves that life here is not an end in itself, and should be used to serve God. If people were motivated by a desire to serve and to love God, they'd approach life with a determination and dedication that would more than match the ingenuity of the business barons. And they'd allow no one or anything to rob them of their heritage.

Actually, when you consider God's position and man's humble state, you immediately become aware of the need for some sort of commercial exchange. After all, what have we that we have not received? And, when God gives, He does require some form of service in return. "Were not ten made clean, where are the other nine?" Being ungrateful to God is short-sighted, because when thanks are offered, He always responds with still more blessings. "Well done, good and faithful servant because you have been faithful. . . I will place you over many things." So, God gave first, and he also gives last. It is clear that a happy relationship established with God creates a form of exchange.

Let us consider the norm which governs this spiritual commerce. It is evident, since we come from God, and then continue to depend on Him, that He must make the first advance, for as we know, in the spiritual order all graces have their origin in God. Even after souls respond to God's promptings, they still need God's graces to maintain the relationship. Should one fall into serious sin and break the friendship, one would stand in need of help, a help the Lord would never refuse if asked. The position then is, God gives and

sustains: we must receive, acknowledge and use.

Do remember, we are doubly indebted to God. God created man for greatness, and then Adam went and sold himself and his children into bondage, thereby losing all his rights to live in Heaven. Jesus through His passion and death rescued man from slavery, and provided him with the means to make reparation, and win back his lost inheritance. However, the Lord did not force man to accept His offer. He left him a free agent. But, when man responds to God's help, justice is done, honour is given and favours are won.

IN REAL TROUBLE

Sometimes God seems to ignore our appeals, and we lose heart and even feel regret at having bothered. If God treated us as we behave towards Him, we'd be in real trouble. I could not see Moses accepting the cold shoulder. He'd beg and beg. He'd plead and plead. God always answered him. The generous souls would always be happy to leave matters in God's hand: they know He is the best judge. They ask only because they trust, and they hope because God is their Father. Prayer itself is an act of respect, an act of honour, an act of submission and an act that always bears fruit.

When the Father welcomed back the prodigal, He never charged him with having abused his patrimony. Likewise, should misfortune befall us, we may confidently ask for pardon. It will not stop at just a welcome: He will load us with even greater benefits. Oh! we have a great God. He never rejects the sinner. He always leaves the door ajar. If He sees the slightest spark in a soul, He'll blow it into a flame. No wonder we call Him the Good Shepherd, the Saviour. Alas! man being a volatile creature must place his trust in God, and then back it with care and prayer.

It all boils down to this. God is good to us. No one could do more. It is up to ourselves to recognise the implications, and discharge the duties that arise. You know the feelings created by ingratitude. "It is a bad dog that bites the hand that feeds him." Turn the coin. Look at what God has to endure. Jesus experienced the same pangs when deserted by His friends in His hour of need. He is now looking into your heart. In commerce, success is won mostly by hard work, attention, timing and ability. They must know that their successes are transitory, yet! they'll stretch themselves to the utmost to attain them. This glory trail is closed to very many, whereas the race for the Heavenly Stakes is open to all. Yes, the poor, the crippled, the rich as well as the not so rich, all start from the same mark, but there is no wild rush. Why this apathy! We do need to open our eyes.

The Boss of Chicago, America's "Windy City" was greeted by gale force winds which lashed the countryside and which prompted him to remark, "when I jumped off the coach I said to myself — from the Windy City to Windy Old Parish," as he was welcomed and introduced to family relatives.

ther, Richard J. Daley, former Mayor of Chicago, paid a visit to the scene from where his greatgrandfather had emigrated to the New World over 100 years before. On Wednesday of last week, the new Mayor, "young" Dick Daley, who has been following in his father's footsteps politically, came to literally retrace that visit, 25 years on.

A traditional Irish welcome was extended to Mayor Daley and his entourage in which the Sagart Pharoiste, Very Rev. Conchubhair O Dalaigh and the 44 pupils of Old Parish School figured largely. An address of welcome was read by one of the pupils, Mike de Paor while the children then entertained the visitors with Irish songs, music and dance.

Gifts were exchanged and Mayor Daley invited the children to set up a pen-pal correspondence with schoolchildren in Chicago.

The Mayor was then shown a stained glass window marking his father's contribution to the Old Parish Church Building Fund in 1964 and he unveiled a plaque to the late playwright and author, Fr. Victor Power, who was the Curate in Ring at the time

Visit Of French County Councillors

Closer working relationships between the counties of Wexford and Waterford and the province of la Manche in France were the subject of discussions last week between a delegation from that area of France and statutory and local authorities in the two counties.

The French delegation man of the County Counwas headed by Mr. Tony Watts, Commercial Attache of the Chamber of Commerce of Cherbourg and Granville, and consisted of - Dr. Jean-Francoise Le Grande, 1st Vice-Chairman of the Manche County Council and a member of the French Senate; Dr. Claude Halbecq, County Councillor, Chairman of the Environment and Tourism Committee; Monsieur Jack Breton, County Councillor, Chairman of the Economic Affairs Committee; Monsieur Francois Lecoeur, Chief Executive of the Chair-

During their visit to Waterford, they were received by the City Mayor, Alderman Pat Power, and the Assistant City Manager, Terry O'Sullivan, and subsequently had meetings with South East Tourism, Waterford Chamber of Commerce, the Industrial Development Authority and Waterford County

These wide-ranging discussions covered areas of co-operation in the tourism, education, industrial and social contact areas which will be progressed further by all the parties concerned.

Mr. Watts has been a frequent visitor to Waterford and, in September of last year, took a party from the Wexford Chamber of Commerce and South East Tourism on a conducted tour of the la Manche area.

Traffic **Improvement** At Kilrush Junction

At the September monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan, Cllr. B. Kyne said that since the new lay-out and traffic lights had been installed at the junction on the by-pass road at Kilrush, the traffic situation there had improved 100 per cent. As a result he heard complimentary remarks about it passed by the local residents. Cllr. Kyne added that it all proved that the initial job there had been unable to cope with the volume of traffic passing through the junction.

In regard to the delay in repairing the traffic lights at Abbeyside last month, Cllr. Kyne has been informed by the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, that the Contractors, Phillips Electrical Ltd., were phoned on August 14 by the Area Engineer reporting the fault, but their repair man did not arrive until August 21 when the lights were repaired.

Suspended Sentence For Stealing **Bottle Of Wine**

A 27-year-old itinerant who stole a bottle of Sandeman Port from a Dungarvan supermarket had it practically consumed when gardai arrested him, District Justice W. F. O'Connell heard at the last Dungarvan Court.

James Cawley, a separated father with one child, with an address at the Halting Site, Shandon, Dungarvan pleaded guilty to stealing the bottle of port valued £6.50 from the L. and N. Supermarket, Main Street, Dungarvan.

Supt. P. J. Hayes said Cawley had already "plenty to drink" in him when he walked into the supermarket and "helped himself" to the bottle of port. He said that Cawley, who had previous convictions, had the bottle almost consumed when the gardai arrived on the scene and arrested him.

Mr. Joe Lavan Solr., said Cawley was under the influence and that was primarily responsible for the offence. He pleaded for leniency, stating that the defendant is looking after his young son.

"He won't be for long more if he continues to behave like this," retorted District Justice O'Connell.

Dungarvan Harbour Needs Management **And Control Plan**

The interest in and concern for the environment was obvious from the capacity audience who attended a talk by Ms. Anne Deacon, Master in Environmental Science, on "Shellfish quality in relation to the pollution status in Dungarvan Harbour."

This study is welcome, particularly on account of the discussions it gave rise to, regarding the harbour. A full report follows, but again it must be emphasised that it is still dangerous to eat unpurified shellfish from any part of the harbour, and as mentioned by Ms. Deacon when answering questions, that even when boiled there is still a danger of viral infection. The area of Helvic mentioned is deep water, where shellfish would not normally be gathered.

The Dungarvan Environment group again wish to thank Ms. Deacon. We need commitment like hers. We need members and we need a good working committee.

To this end, a general meeting will be held at Lawlor's Hotel on Tuesday, October 3 at 8.30 p.m.

Ms. Deacon said that estuaries were complex biological systems. As her study was equal to about six months full time work, she studied only some of the possible angles and was giving only a general overview of her study. The shellfish examined was the common mussel, and the pollutants measured were sewerage bacteria and the metals copper, zinc, cadmium, lead, chromium and nickel. Her examination was completed in 1988.

She said that cultivation of shellfish is a new industry which is expanding very quickly in Ireland, and Dungarvan is one of the locations where it is proposed to have a shellfishery. Two government departments are directly interested in shellfish — the Department of the Marine and the Department of Health. Planning and Local Authorities are also interested.

Since 1975 the bacterial load in the sewage had been assessed on several occasions. Some water and mud samples had been analysed for metals, and the South Eastern Health Board had a sampling programme for mussels since 1980. Ms. Deacon analysed the existing data, and sampled at extra sites to fill

Ms. Deacon emphasised that she did not take oyster samples as other studies were being done in that regard. The number of samples taken in the Helvic area was small, and a longer term study was necessary to draw conclusions about the proposed oyster fishery. Overall, it was her finding that the shellsan system alone was too narrowly based to safeguard the public health.

The Pollution Load Index (PLI) could be used for up to 20 pollutants. For each of the pollutants there is a baseline figure which is the normal background level, and a threshold value above which toxic effects can be detected. These two figures and the sample concentrations are put into a formula and a figure is produced between 0 and 10. This number is the Pollution Index.

Values of 10 are not polluted, values below 0 are polluted, and there is a gradation

SWIMMING POOL AREA WORST

Ms. Deacon pointed out that some anomalies were present in the figures. Overall the estuary showed little pollution with regard to the six metals studied. The worst site was the area of the swimming pool in regard to the metals chromium and nickel. The chromium was coming from the untreated effluent from the tannery. The effect of chromium in food was unknown, although the level in the mussels was more than twice the limit set by the Hong Kong authorities. The origin of the nickel

was not known.

Finally, Ms. Deacon made the following recommendations -- that a management plan and controlled area order for Dungarvan Harbour was necessary, that a biological quality index assessment be done, that a re-survey be done to assess the effect of the new sewer.

Ms. deacon responded to a number of points raised by the audience. She was thanked by Mr. Sean de Paor, Committee Secretary, and by the Chairman, Mr. Gerard Whelan, and the meeting was closed. — PRO.

As the originator of this column, then under the title "Spotlight On The Unknown", Tom and yours truly worked together in the early years of the "Leader" before he left to follow his photographic and journalistic career in other fields. In the latter years he again renewed his contacts with what he always referred to as his "Old Alma Mater, the "Leader", where he took his first steps in his journey into journalism.

In those early days Tom was always controversial in his writings as he sought to right wrongs as he saw them especially where the underprivileged and weaker sections of the community were concerned. He was, in a way, a modern Don Quixote who was never afraid to have a tilt at those who lived in ivory towers and he was ever the crusader who was always concerned about the welfare of his fellow citizens.

And although he spent most of the latter part of his life in Limerick City he never severed the old link with his native Dungarvan and maintained a lively interest in all that went on there up to the very time of his last illness.

His passing is a great loss to us all. May the light of heaven shine on him.

OLD PARISH PROSPECTING LICENCE

We understand that furthis column in recent weeks lucrative offers have been made to a number of farmers in the Old Parish area particularly in the Minehead area. Although no firm money offers have been made, suggestions that upwards of £5,000 an acre might be available have been mentioned, but what the land is wanted for is still a matter for speculation. WASTE DISPOSAL **PLAN FOR** COUNTY

The following are some points from the 1989 Co. Waterford Waste Disposal Plan presented by the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn to the members of Waterford Co. Council at their September monthly meeting in Dungarvan.

Co. Waterford has experienced major industrial development and a modest population increase of 14.1 per cent over the last ten

The purpose of the Plan is to collect and co-ordinate information on estimates of future volumes of waste.

The Plan relates to the entire County of Waterford (excluding Waterford City) which covers approximately 700 square miles or 181,300 hectares.

From the geology of the County it can be seen that the location of Waste Disposal sites must be chosen with great care to prevent contamination of one of the country's greatest assets, its groundwater.

As of 1986 a total of 9,220 houses (including Dungarvan) are served with 10,843 tonnes of refuse an-Parish including Rea- nually being collected. The cost of this service is £208,239 which allows for an income of £40,000 from refuse charges.

> Under the heading "Toxic Wastes", the report states that the picture frame factory at Tallow disposes of its waste by transporting it to Shannon Environmental Services in Co. Clare. The Dungarvan Crystal factory first passes the sludge through a settling tank and later neutralises it before having it transported by private carrier to the Waterford City landfill where it is buried.

Pharmaceutical industries in Dungarvan export their waste to Lanstar, Manchester. A Kilmacthomas based seed firm returns used containers to Dublin while the Tannery in Dungarvan disposes of flesh and hide shavings in the Dungarvan landfill

In regard to medical waste, the report estimates that about 3 tonnes of this type of waste arises each year from hospitals, veterinary and medical practices. The majority of this is burned and the remainder is taken to Council tips. Dungarvan Hospital has its own incinerator for burning offensive and dangerous waste and also has a contract with one of the local collectors for the disposal of other waste.

The foregoing should give readers a rough idea of the magnitude of the problem which the disposal of waste under its various categories presents to the Local Authority and One of the most important the need which exists for the operation of an overall orderly plan.

We garaged the 'plane, having made a safe landing, Dan gave him the news of our great tariff war, He settled his wireless as per understanding, And then we took off for the feminine star.



Death Of Mr. **Tom Tobin**



It is with the deepest regret that we record the death of Mr. Thomas (Tom) Tobin, 18 Parkview Drive, Greystones, Limerick which took place after a period of illness at Limerick Regional Hospital on Thursday, September 21.

Son of the late John and Mrs. Tobin, Shandon, Dungarvan, Tom first worked as a young man in the clerical department of the local Dickens Leather Company before taking up photography and turning to journalism. He began his journalistic career with the "Dungarvan Leader" and during the ensuing years he became well-known for his "Spotlight On The Unknown" column in the "Leader." Subsequently he started up on his own by publishing the pictorial 'Waterford Gazette" but when this failed, he became a free-lance journalist, contributing to a number of newspapers and journals.

He then went to Limerick and served for a period as Editor of the "Limerick Leader" and "Limerick Chronicle" before he joined the Publicity Division of the Shannon Development Company. He also continued in his capacity as a free-lance journalist to contribute to a number of local papers including the "Dungarvan Leader" and worked also, for many years, as the representative in the Mid-West region for the national newspapers.

Apart from widespread journalistic activities, Tom Tobin became noted as an outstanding photographer and his keen eye and ready camera were ever ready to record the Passing Parade of life. As a result he developed, down through the years, a huge library of wonderful pictures, many of which have appeared in our "Remembering Other Days" in recent years — a series which he did much to encourage.

TRIBUTES

Chairman of the South-Western branch of the National Union of Journalists said that he gave long and sterling service to the NUJ and was always foremost in his demand for the rights and proper working conditions for journalists.

On last Friday evening, a large and most representative cortege attended the removal of his remains from the Lynch Funeral Home to the Church of the Holy Rosary, Ennis Road, Limerick and at 12 (noon) on Saturday the spacious church was crowded for the Requiem Mass for his happy repose, celebrated by Very Rev. Canon Tynan, P.P., who was assisted by Fr. Irwin and Fr. John Daly.

Paying his tribute to Tom before the start of the Mass, Canon Tynan said that Tom Tobin had always been a most exemplary and supportive member of the parish and was ever ready to help in parish affairs. He referred to his outstanding journalistic ability and said that while he had suffered a great deal because of his own ill-health he was never given to self-pity as was evident in his wonderful article "My Fight Against Cancer."

'We cannot say," said Canon Tynan told the huge congregation, "that Tom Tobin died in old age (he was 63 years) but he now knows the peace and eternal rest which he so richly deserves.

Poignancy and solemnity were provided during the Mass by the singing of the hymns "Nearer My God To Thee" and "Panis Angelicus" and the playing of "The Coolin" on the violin.

Another 33 out of 35 was scored for "Presentation of Buildings" with the judges commenting that all buildings in the village were also recommended as was presented on a high standard. A minor exception was the school behind the church and an area around Baron Hall which needed

some weeding. Under the heading, "Natural Amenities," there was another 'pat on the back' for Stradbally residents with a score of 27 out of 30. Here the judges commented "flower displays, planted areas and green open spaces throughout the village are presented to the highest standard. Well done to all concerned! The Cove was well presented also and litter free.'

The mark for "Approach Roads" was 33 out of 40 and some were obviously lost under this heading because of the overgrown appearance of the verge on the road by the church while the elimination of potholes in the village was

Week-end Fixtures

Record Crowds Expected For Attractive Programme at Fraher Field

Barring a draw in one of the semi-finals listed for Dungarvan on Sunday afternoon, the pairing for the county senior football final at Fraher Field on October 15th will be known by 5 p.m. on this Sunday.

Needless to mention the meeting between Stradbally and Kilrossanty is the big attraction of the afternoon, but it is not outside the bounds of possibility that the Nire/St. Saviours clash in the opening game, will be the one best remembered. Anyway, it is in prospect, the most attractive programme to be staged at this end of the county this season.

As well as the above semi-finals, there are a number of attractive games of lesser importance, but nevertheless vital for the clubs concerned.

KILROSSANTY V STRADBALLY

As far as football reputations go, I suppose it is true to say that Kilrossanty and their neighbours and rivals, Stradbally are regarded as the big two in the game, in the county. This must now be written, even though there have been times when the mediocrity of their performances have left some of us wondering if all this traditional thing was just a figment of our imagination. There have been times when the performances of other teams put Kilrossanty and Stradbally in the shade, but somehow these occaare forgotten overnight and passed off as just a flash-in-the-pan.

Anyway we must take things as they are and write about the magic spell which they cast over the place when they are drawn against each other in football combat. There was a "buzz" about the place at onship games and that was the meeting last week when the names were drawn and I saw a few people rubbing their hands in a kind of gleeful anticipation of seeing one whale of a game at what became the obvious venue, Fraher Field for this semi-final. They met quite recently in the league section of the championship, but as the teams were playing for match points rather than for a place in a county final very few people got excited about the clash.

It turned out to be an extraordinary game, with Stradbally scoring just a single point in the first half and Kilrossanty who had a commanding half-time lead, scoring only one point in the second. The final score saw only a point be-

tween the teams (2-7 to 0-12) in favour of Kilrossanty. If that game had been a county final, posterity would have it listed as one of the all-time great finals, while in fact it was a very ordinary football match.

MISLEADING

Of course it would be very misleading to convey the notion that all their meetings have not produced great football and tremendous glamour and excitement. When writing in this vein, I have in mind their great clash in 1987 at Dungarvan, when in the dying seconds, Jim Maher kicked over the equalising point at the end of a fine semi-final. The replay was spoiled by a very strong wind on a sunny day two weeks later and in what was another fine contest, Stradbally emerged as worthy winners on the score 0-12 to 0-6. The winners became county champions after a controversial final against the Nire.

In the following year, Saviours, the rising power in Waterford football came out of the East, again in the semi-final and put the champions out of the race for another title. That was last year and what Kilrossanty achieved during that game will still be fresh in the minds of followers of the game. Munster Council Chairman Outlines Hurling and Football Coaching Scheme

Michael Maher, addressing last week's County Board meeting, said that a new coaching scheme was being initiated by Munster Council to promote hurling and football in all six counties of Munster.

work in this area, Mr. Maher said that much experience had now been gained through, initially, the Eamonn Young Coaching Scheme, followed by that of Eoin Liston and latterly by the activities of Colum Bonner in coaching at the Regional College, Waterford and with a number of clubs in East Waterford. Experience was also being gained from the work of Brian Finn at the NIHE in Limerick and with a limited number of National Schools adjacent to Limerick.

Mr. Maher said the object of the present coaching scheme was to establish a structure for Coaching right through Munster by employing twelve coaches, each of whom will be a Physical Education Graduate or a person of recognised coaching ability, who will give practical support to existing teachers/coaches and assist others in developing coaching skills.

The scheme will, he said, be promoted, controlled

Outlining the previous and monitored in each county by a small committee of nine to twelve people appointed by the County Board. Non board members with special expertise in this area, should be seriously considered for appointment. However, it was obligatory that the Development Officer and Youth Officer of the County Board should be members. In addition to improving

the standards of games with special emphasis on skill, he said the scheme will emphasise discipline, good conduct, attractiveness and safety aspects in-

Mr. Maher emphasised that high profile players should be used where possible to assist in this coaching programme, and he was glad to say that some such players had already generously offered their assistance. It was, he said, intended to have the scheme in place in October and to run it for a period of three years.

CLUB STRUCTURES The Munster Chairman said he was reiterating an appeal which he had made in other counties in relation to the restructuring of the club units in each area. He asked that they meet over the winter months and think seriously about their organisation. He said that too many of our clubs are only there in name and have little or no back-up organisation.

He said that clubs will be surprised at what they can achieve if they get down to the business of improving their administration. He asked the Divisional Officers to take back the message to the clubs under their control.

Board Chairman, Eamon Murphy thanked him for attending and assured the Munster Council that the proposed coaching scheme would be given immediate attention.

Following a 'question and answer' session on the subject, Mr. Maher thanked the members for their obvious interest and for having invited him to attend.
