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The Big Bank Holiday Blow-Out

The October Bank Holiday last week-end was blitzed with torrential rain and storm force gales which almost completely disrupted the holiday arrangements throughout the entire country and left a trail of flood damage costing millions of pounds in its wake.

Worst hit areas were the west and north-west coast where counties Mayo and Donegal and to a lesser extent, Counties Clare and Galway suffered most when rivers burst their banks and caused severe and widespread flooding after 36 hours of incessant rain.

Fortunately County Waterford escaped the brunt of the storm but nonetheless there was quite a deal of

damage caused to the ESB network while trees were brought down in some areas.

Mr. Michael Norris, ESB Area Supervisor, Dungarvan, told the "Leader" that the worst hit area as far as the ESB was concerned was Clashmore. Here a 10-thousand volt line and transformer, located near the Parochial House, was knocked to the ground while another 10,000-volt

cable was damaged at Rathnasilloge, Stradbally. In addition, numerous cables in the Ballinamult, Kinsalebeg and Kilmac-thomas areas also suffered damage.

"All our crews were in action repairing the damage on Saturday and all day on Sunday in these areas," said Mr. Norris.

At the Saturday evening Mass in Abbeyside, prayers were offered for those in the West of Ireland who were suffering most because of the terrible storm and in thanksgiving that people hereabouts had been spared the worst rigours of the gales and floods.

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Taoiseach Announces His Senate Nominees

The Taoiseach, Charles Haughey, ended the speculation of the last several weeks when he announced the names of his 11 nominees to the Senate on last Friday evening. With an eye towards harmony within the Government and in an effort to appease the difficulties which have arisen in certain areas, principally Waterford and Wexford, Mr. Haughey has chosen eight Fianna Fail stalwarts and three Progressive Democrats.

As a result, the PDs have three seats in the Senate, a

chamber which the party pledges to abolish in the long term.

Here in Waterford, the nomination of the P.D.'s Martin Cullen, defeated in the June general election, came as no surprise, despite the repeated signals sent to Dublin from the Constituency that there would be a general revolt by Fianna Fail party members should the Taoiseach persist in carrying through

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Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

FOREWARNED IS FOREARMED

This week the theme on prayer, the proper approach and the driving force shine through the readings, and, as I've dealt recently with an aspect of prayer, I felt it might be the opportune time to deal with divorce. Then I realised it amounted to putting the cart before the horse, and decided rather to focus attention on the causes of the growing break-up in marriages.

Marriage is, after all, a serious contract whereby a man and a woman pledge to live together for better for worse till death do them part, so that the contract of its very nature presupposes preparation and reflection. When people are influenced by physical attractions or worldly possessions etc, they do not always read the small print, and live to nurse their regrets. The Bishops now insist that three months notice must be given, which helps to eliminate certain dangers, and allows the parties time to take care and use their good sense.

Naturally, you'd discuss and talk over the whole situation as well as seeking the advice of your parents. There's an old saying: "sense does not come before age." It frightens me to hear it said: "young people know it all." The startling facts are, they are unable to cope with the problems of married life. Admittedly, many of them are too young and too immature to cope with and shoulder the burdens. Hence, preparation (in one's mind) should begin the moment one forms a steady relationship. You have to make sure you are on the right track! Ask yourself, is she the girl for you! And could I live, be happy and faithful to her all my life! If you've doubts, then heed the warning.

People find their way into marriage through all kinds of circumstances, so a general rule might be helpful. Like should marry like. Adam had a close affinity with Eve: she was bone of his bone. On October 20, I asked a pensioner, who'd worked hard all his life and reared a fine family, what he considered was the most important factor in married life, and he replied without hesitation, "Companionship." He added: "my wife and I can sit and talk, and love to be in each others company". This wise man had put his finger on what is the most important and most supportive aspect of married life. You see when you love someone, you respect and you are ready to share even your life with your loved one. The caring man will love and show concern for his wife as if she were his own body. So, when problems do arise, as they inevitably will, he'll exercise patience and control. They'll stand as one. If forgiveness is necessary, it will be present. If support is necessary, it will be there.

The first marriage was of its very nature permanent. And, God ordained that it would be a source of companionship, of mutual help and enjoyment and have the privilege of sharing with God in the begetting of children. So, there's an involvement of serving and loving. Now, we know God still loves us when we're wayward, so the love that leads two people into this binding union should flourish not only when happiness floods the home, but also even when darkness clouds their skies. If you are the cause of an upset, always say

sorry. Never let the sun go down upon your anger. Experience proves that when things are clipped in the bud the flower does not blossom!

I think we'd all agree that preparation is necessary, and I've stressed some points to be considered. It is true some can put up with more than others, but still marriage should not be based on risks. If a man has no job or no home, he'd want to think. Frustration would rock a marriage. Too, do not ignore the red flag if your partner to be is flighty, intemperate and bad tempered. We are human, and can only endure so much. What is essential to getting a marriage off the ground is a genuine love, because the experience of being loved is a binding factor, and helps greatly in the understanding of God's love. When the couple generously share their love, and communicate openly and lovingly, you'll find two people united in whatever comes their way.

There are 101 other things which bear an influence on a good relationship, such as, children, money, cooking, flowers, etc. The absence of just the ordinary means places an undue strain on a marriage. I'd like to say that husbands should remember that the first call on the wage packet is the family. This is a grave duty. I knew a family who bought two pianos! You see, common sense is also valuable.

LET GOD IN

We have had a look at preparation and considered rules, so it is time to let God into the picture. Bring Him into the relationship from the word go. If He is with you, you'll respect your future wife. Nowadays, the nest is often robbed of the joys intended by God for the launching. Indeed, the fences have been pulled down. In England in 1988 over 170,000 children were born out of wedlock, and that does not include those aborted. The figures for Ireland are startling!

Marriage is the arena where God expects most people to work out their salvation, which suggests a consecration of one's married life to God. God wishes all to live by His law of love. Hence, He expects that that spirit would be exercised with gentle care by all those who embrace service in the field of marriage. Do remember, forgiveness is love. Strive to do your best. Ask the Lord daily for His blessing. Then, come what may, you'll find God's promised happiness.

Did you hear Fr. Buckley on the Pat Kenny show? He claimed to approach people's problems with compassion by sweeping them under the carpet. I remember when I was a boy, an old Dungarvan lady saying: "He might as well be married to the lamppost." Fr. Buckley, even if he claims powers greater than the Pope's, is sincere, but that is not the argument.

641 Graduates Conferred At WRTC

The annual conferring of academic awards ceremony took place in the Waterford Regional Technical College (WRTC) on Friday, October 20. A total of 641 graduates of the College were conferred with degrees, diplomas and certificates. This is substantially up on previous years.

A total of 34 different courses were conferred on the day. Due to the large number of graduates, parents and guests attending, it was necessary to hold two

sessions. The four year professional degree-level course in Construction Management was conferred for the first time. This is a unique course in the Republic of Ireland. All the graduates are successfully employed with construction companies both at home and overseas.

The first part-time BA Degree award in Public Administration was made to a group of six students who attended their lectures in the college in the evenings and at weekends.

The Director of the National Council for Education Awards, Mr. P. MacDiarmada was in attendance to confer the academic awards.

Representatives from public life and the local business community also attended the ceremonies.

This most successful day marks another important milestone in the work of the college in providing well qualified young people to the employment market.

National Lottery Launch "Joker's Delight"

The Joker symbol will appear on four £5,000 segments, seven £7,500 segments, six £10,000 segments and three £12,500 segments.

CHILD MURDER TRIAL

Father Found Guilty But Insane

The grim details of how 4-year-old Aileen Daly met her death were revealed when the trial of her 37-year-old father, Eamonn Daly, a former national school teacher of Modeligo, Ballyduff Upper, Co. Waterford, on a charge of murdering her by drowning at Lismore Bridge on Wednesday evening, February 15 last, took place in the Central Criminal Court in Dublin last Thursday.

Following the evidence given by two psychiatrists, the jury found the accused guilty but insane at the time.

The jury heard that on the day of Aileen's death the accused tried to grab her and her 3-year-old sister, Linda, around teatime at the Daly home but his wife Eileen managed to get Linda back from him after a struggle. He then drove off in his car to the bridge. There, the accused dragged Aileen screaming from the car to the parapet of the bridge over the river Blackwater in Lismore, threatening to drown her.

The little girl grasped her father and begged to be taken home crying, "I love you, daddy, don't throw me into the river. Please bring me home to Mammy."

But her father, suffering from psychiatric illness, tossed the terrified child over the bridge into the flooded river 35 feet below.

On her way down, the child's fall was broken by the branches of trees growing on the river bank. Later, the accused told the gardai that he could see Aileen on the bank and she shouted:

"Daddy save me." When he shouted down, she ran into the river and was swept away. During a subsequent examination of the mud on the river bank, detectives found the child's footprints.

The body was found some weeks later near Villierstown about 8 miles downstream from where she was thrown in.

A CLASSICAL TRAGEDY

Dr. Charles Smith, Medical Director, Central Mental Hospital, Dublin, described the tragic event of the child's drowning as "a classical tragedy attached to a classical mental illness."

He said in his opinion, the accused was legally and medically insane at the time. He was suffering from psychotic depression and from the delusion that he was destined for poverty and that his children would be better off not living.

A second psychiatrist, Dr. Art O'Connor, also testified that the accused was insane at the time of the child's death.

Mr. Kevin Haugh, S.C. who prosecuted on behalf of the State said that the facts of the case were not in dispute and neither was the

mental state of the accused at the time.

Mr. Patrick MacEntee, S.C., who was for the defence, then read an agreed statement to the jury which detailed the onset of mental illness for Mr. Daly after a critical report of his work by a schools Inspector in 1987.

Counsel said that Daly had to give up teaching the following year and he had developed an "obsession about destitution which was genuinely held but irrational."

Mr. MacEntee added that when Eamonn Daly threw his daughter from Lismore Bridge he was "totally deranged."

THE KEY

The accused pleaded not guilty because of mental illness when arraigned and before the jury retired, Mr. Justice Vivian Lavan told them that the medical evidence of the two psychiatrists should be the key to their verdict.

When the verdict of guilty but insane was returned, the trial judge ordered that the accused be detained in the Central Mental Hospital pending further order of the court.

LOCAL ELECTIONS AND ITALIA '89 TO CLASH

When a motion from Athlone Urban Council calling on the Minister for the Environment to introduce the promised reform of Local Government before the next local elections was submitted to the October monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council for adoption, the question as to whether the elections would take place next year or not was referred to. While a number of members held the view that the elections should go ahead, Cllr. Billy Kyne, an ardent and enthusiastic soccer fan, expressed concern that if held in June, they would clash with Italia 89 and the World Cup competition in which Ireland is expected to play a big part.

It now seems certain that the local elections will be held early in June next year despite the strong opposition to the proposal by the Fianna Fail Organisation at local level. In most constituencies, Fianna Fail feel that it would be most inopportune for the party that the elections should take place in 1990 and they have been seeking a postponement to enable the party to regain its strength and support with the electorate.

However it appears that the PD Party are more than anxious that these elections be held next June to enable them to try out prospective candidates for future general elections. Whether this weak wing of the Government will succeed in winning the point on this issue remains to be seen.

If it is decided to go ahead with the elections next June, the clash with the World Cup series in Italy would undoubtedly prove a great distraction as most people would be glued to their television sets and have little or no time for the door-hopping candidates seeking election to the various local authorities.

Incidentally it is worth noting that the Munster Council GAA at a meeting in Limerick last Friday night decided that the top Munster Championship fixtures next season will not clash with Republic of Ireland games in the World Cup series in Italy — that is, of course, should the Ireland team qualify, which now looks more than likely.

TRACING FAMILY ANCESTORS

A couple of months ago we received a letter from Mrs. Mary Mulligan with an address at 241-09 86 Ave., Belleose, Long Island, New York, asking us to assist her in tracing her Irish ancestry. She informed us that her father's family were Fitzgeralds who all went to the United States in 1889. Her grandfather was the son of a Patrick Fitzgerald who was reputed to be Town Clerk of Dungarvan and an active

supporter of Parnell.

This was all that we had to go on and in a rather forlorn hope we passed Mrs. Mulligan's letter to Dungarvan's present Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White to see whether he could come up with anything that might be of assistance to her in her quest.

Then the marvels of modern day technology came to the rescue. Mr. White contacted Waterford County Librarian Mr. Donal Brady at the Dungarvan Library headquarters which houses the recently installed computer data bank and he put the computer system to work and to make a long story short it came up with an extract of the minutes of a meeting of the Dungarvan Town Commissioners held on Friday, February 6, 1885.

In the finest copperplate handwriting it is recorded as follows: "Election of Clerk, Dungarvan, February 6th, 1885. To the Chairman of the Town Commissioners. Sir, I beg to offer myself as a candidate for the position of Town Clerk, vacant by the death of Mr. Jas. Hannigan. I am capable of discharging the duties of the office. My character is well known to the residents of Dungarvan. I name as my securities, James Mooney and Edmund Hannigan, Crobally, Old Parish. I am, Sir, Your Obedient Servant, Thos. Fitzgerald.

"Mr. Thos. Fitzgerald have been appointed our clerk to the Town Commissioners at a salary named in the advertisement by a majority of one. — Richard Curran, Chairman.

"Ordered, that Mr. Fitzgerald attend his office duties at the hour of 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. each working day, and Mr. Fitzgerald is requested to perfect his bond within one week from this date. February 6th, 1885. Signed, Richard Curran, Chairman."

An additional entry in the minutes of the same meeting stated as follows: "Ordered that Michael Keily of Ballinacourty and his assistants be paid 35/- in full

discharge of his claim for salving a Buoy and placing it in a field of Mr. Stephenson's."

The Town Clerk, Mr. White has most obligingly, forwarded a copy of these minutes to Mrs. Mulligan who we are sure will be more than pleased to note the information they contain.

MICHAEL KEATING'S "DAY OF RECKONING"

Former member of the Dail and Junior Minister Michael Keating who retired from the political scene some time ago has now turned author and his first effort entitled "Day Of Reckoning" is described as an "explosive international super thriller, impossible to put down."

Published by Astra Books, Dublin, "Day Of Reckoning" is a story of international intrigue, big business, desperate revenge and love. The author says most of the incidents and event which constitute the background context of the novel are factually based.

Michael Keating was born in Dublin in 1946. He worked for some years as a journalist and a secondary school teacher before he opted to go into politics as a member of the Fine Gael Party. He was elected as a Dail Deputy in 1977 and was appointed a Junior Minister in a subsequent Coalition Government. He has been a member of Dublin City Council since 1974 and has served as Lord Mayor. He joined the Progressive Democrats on the formation of that party but earlier this year he announced his resignation from the party and retired from the political scene.

"Day Of Reckoning" is indeed a powerful first novel with the action moving from the U.S. to Canada to Italy and England before a thumping good read of more than 350 pages finally ends in Rome.

TROUBLE STILL BREWING IN WATERFORD

If even half of what we have read about the Fianna Fail reaction to the Taoiseach's nomination of PD Martin Cullen as one of his eleven Senate nominees is true, then trouble is still brewing for the party in Waterford. The officer Board of Waterford Comhairle Dailcheantair is still breathing fire and brimstone and is to meet on this Thursday night to decide what action they will take. They have already told Party headquarters that if the former PD Deputy was included they would

not hold the national collection in the constituency.

On top of that, the Dailcheantair Chairman has been reported as declaring out-and-out war on the PD party declaring that the aim of Fianna Fail must be the utter annihilation of the PDs. On the domestic front, the Dailcheantair Chairman has issued an ultimatum to Deputy Jackie Fahey to rejoin the Fianna Fail Parliamentary Party or prepare to have his bluff called about resigning his seat to precipitate a by-election in which he would stand (and win) as an independent candidate. The Chairman states that Deputy Fahey is barking up the wrong tree by thinking he could do this.

It all adds up to some further very stormy interludes for Fianna Fail in Waterford.

Of Abdulla Bulbul Ameer!"

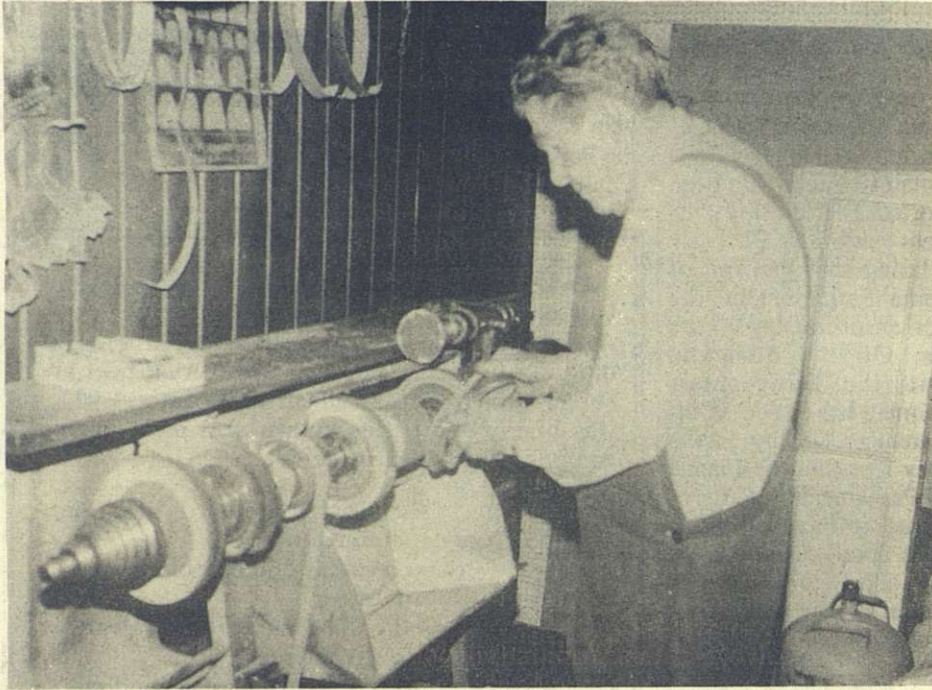
"Take your ultimate look upon sunshine and

Society of Ireland, the first of its kind, is aimed at educating the public about asthma and about the proper usage of the medications available. We find this necessary because we know that asthma medications are being underused, for one reason or another, and, consequently, people are suffering needlessly."

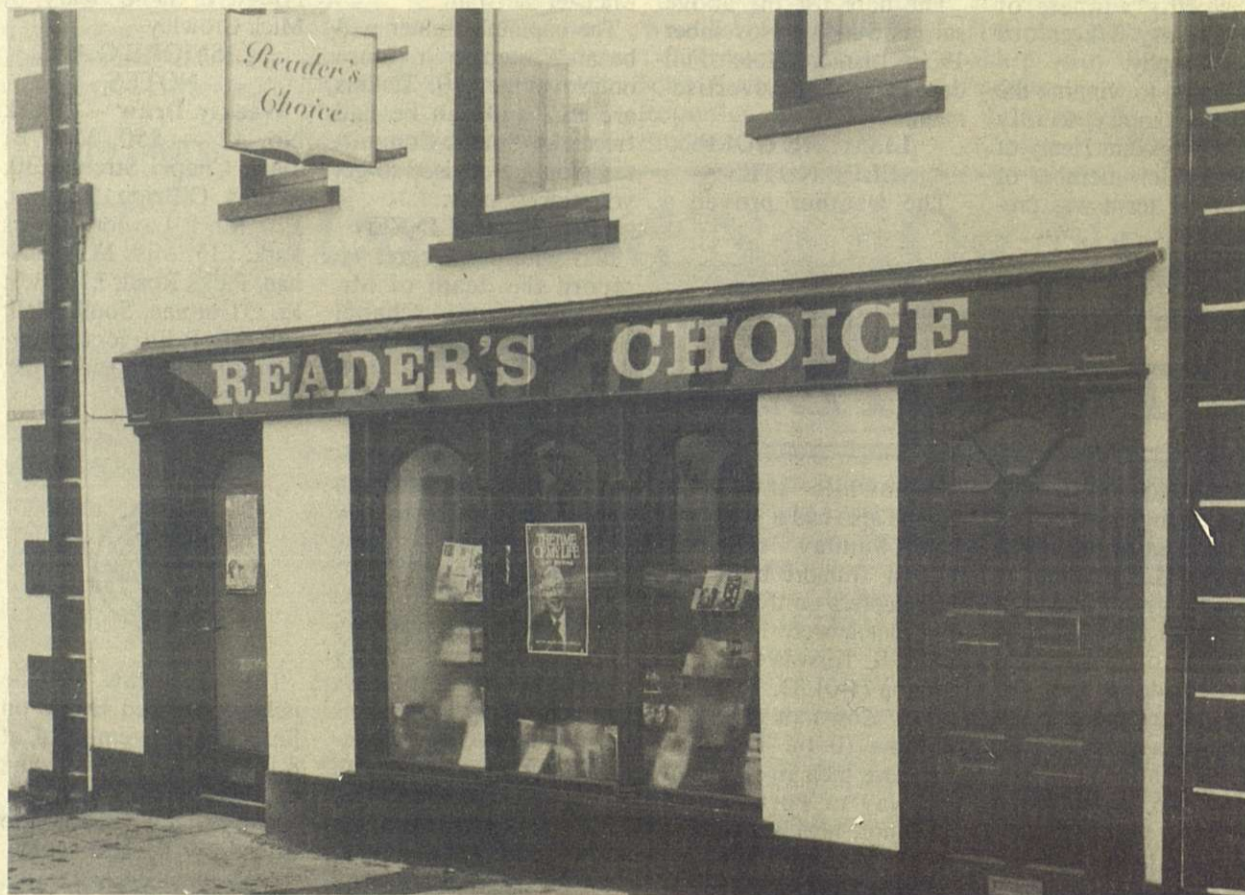

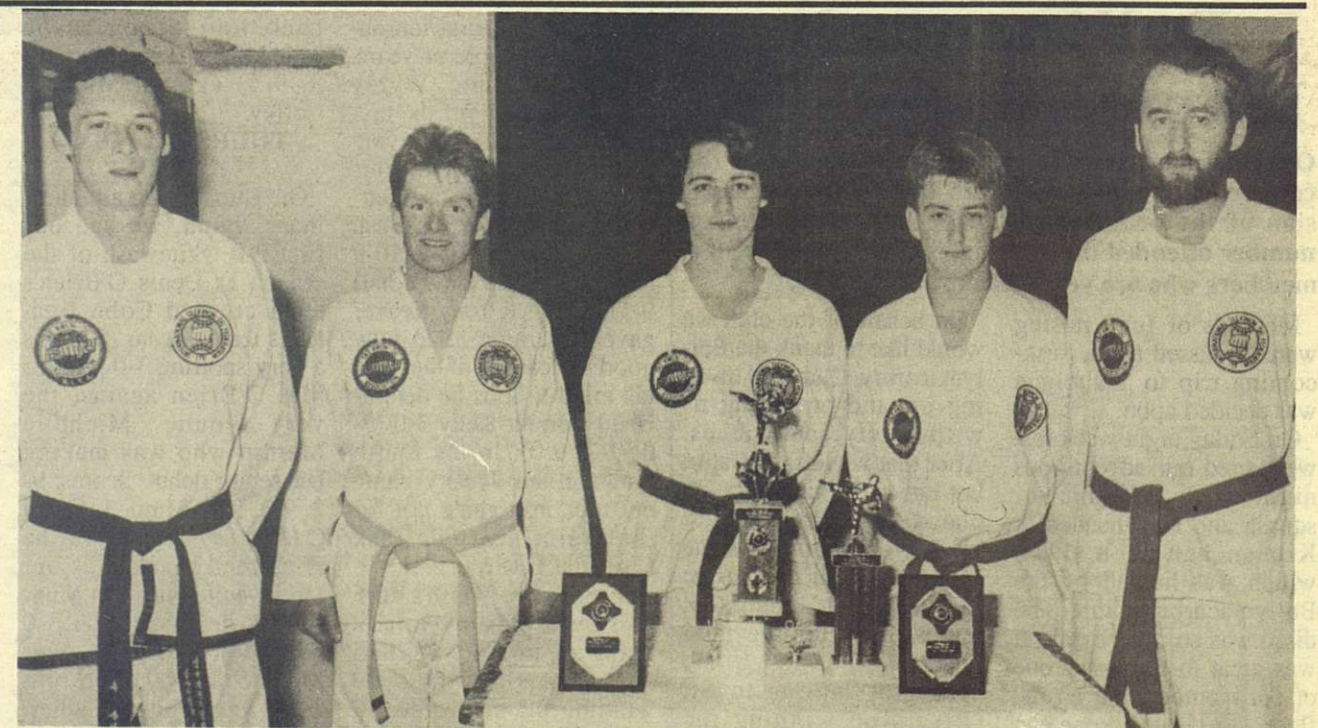

Nire May Beat Kilrossanty In Football Final Replay!!

Sliabh gCua Fancied To Beat Portlaw In Intermediate Decider

Everything bids fair for a splendid afternoon's entertainment at Fraher Field on Sunday, when for the first time ever the two top grades in football will be brought to finality on the same programme. With no counter attraction and all going well weatherwise we should see another record crowd begin to gather when the intermediate final gets underway at 1.30 p.m. The early start to the proceedings may not please everyone, but the possibility that extra time may be needed if the senior final is not decided after the allotted 60 minutes, the fixtures committee had no other option in the matter.

Since the drawn final three weeks ago, supporters of both clubs as well as the huge numbers of neutrals have been speculating about the outcome of the replay and as usual, we have heard opinions go both ways. Many of the people who are banking on a Kilrossanty victory are doing so because they are convinced that no team will beat Kilrossanty in a replay because of their record. This can be dismissed as nonsense as the records show that they have lost as many replays as they have won. There will be many Comeragh people here who will well remember the Sunday in October 1946 when Dungarvan annihilated Kilrossanty by 3-3 to 0-0 in a replay of the county final. Of the replays that they have won, I'm sure the one that they will remember best is the 1951 replay at Walsh Park when they beat Kill by the most controversial goal in the history of our championships. Midway through the second half the score stood at Kill 1-0, Kilrossanty 0-1 when the ball, going wide, was supposedly stopped by a spectator and was lashed into the Kill net to give Kilrossanty a 1-1 to 1-0 final win.

Not that such records mean much, since we have often written about the number of occasions on which records were made look silly when a team with practically no record of success came along and upset all the odds.

The results of replays, just like all other game, depend entirely on how well a team can perform on the day and in the game. Anything that happened in the past doesn't make one iota of difference to a team's chances. A team can win only if it is good enough and this truism holds good for all situations.

This brings me to the big question who will win on Sunday? This will be their fourth meeting in the same championship and having won a game each and drawn the third meeting in the same championship which was the final, I find

it impossible to give a very confident vote to either.

The news from the Nire camp is contained in a very interesting article submitted by Paddy Phelan and from this it appears that they will have no injury worries.

The story from Kilrossanty is that Michael 'Hauleen' Walsh, is not one hundred per cent sure of being fit enough to field out. He will undergo a late fitness test to make certain that he will be O.K. to play. The signs are that Walsh will field and enable the selectors to line out the same side as that which started in the drawn match. In fact the chances are that the thirty who fielded for the 'throw-in' on the last day, will again face each other here.



THE OUTCOME???

It certainly poses a problem for someone who is expected to make a forecast and with so little between them after three meetings, it means having to take a chance with one or other.

Both will have seen the video and analysed the drawn game over and over with a view to correcting their mistakes and changing their tactics and strategy and perhaps being so over careful that instead of improving the situation they will only make things worse for themselves. I don't believe that this point can be laboured too strongly as we do have situations where there has been too much concentration on what the other side may and may not do, rather than motivating the side to do their 'own thing'.

After the drawn final, I got the notion that Kilrossanty played far more to their potential than did the Nire. I thought that the reigning champions could not have played much better while the Nire left a lot of room for improvement. Both had some hard luck, but in the case of the Nire it was mostly of their own

making. In fact there were times when they looked a bit amateurish when mis-handling the ball and expecting it to burrow its way through a crowded square when the points were there for the taking.

Yes, I feel that the Nire have a good bit more to give if they have used the breathing space intelligently and that they are now presented with a chance that may not come their way again for a long time. As I have said, it can go either way, by my feeling is that the Nire will survive this time.

SLIABH gCUA v. PORTLAW

In this intermediate county football final, the sides will be meeting for the first time in this grade so there are no yardsticks by which their respective standards can be compared.

Sliabh gCua qualified for the county final in their grade last year but were heavily defeated by Gaultier, who did remarkably well in the current senior championship. Throughout the present season, Sliabh gCua have shown very

good form, improving as the championship progressed.

Their last two matches were fine exhibitions of good football for the intermediate grade and I would rate their performances against Shamrocks and Affane in the concluding stages of the Western championship as having surpassed the displays of many of our senior teams this year. It would, of course, be foolish to create the notion that they are unbeatable. They can, at times, find it difficult to propel themselves into top gear and once or twice this year, when this happened, they suffered unexpected defeats.

Playing at their best their experienced players, John Fitzgerald, who will again play in goal, Michael Hearne, John Dalton, Brendan Tobin, Roger McGrath, Michael, Eamon, James and Gerry Butler, Tom Condon, Tom Whelan, James Condon, Kieran, Joseph and Dermot Hallahan, Pat Hearne, Ml. Ahearne, Kieran Power, Davy Whelan, etc., will be very difficult to beat here.

When I spoke to some of the Portlaw officials on Sunday down there, they felt that they are good

enough to take the title. Like the Touraneena team they have been around in the game for quite some time. They won a football championship at the expense of Ardmore about twelve years ago when playing as Ballyduff/Portlaw, but for them this was not the real thing. They now mean to achieve a county title in their own rights.

So far this year they have been beaten only once and that was by Newtown, whom they subsequently beat in the divisional final.

With players like John Galvin, Davy Foran,

Jimmy Power, Jimmy Hennebry, Pat Burrows, Eddie and Anthony Rockett, Kieran Laffan, Mossy Whelan, Ger O'Brien, Liam Callaghan and company they will have no worries on the score of experience. Maybe the fact that hurling is their first love in Portlaw and football is the first choice in Sliabh gCua territory, will be a factor.

Like the senior final it may be close, but my reckoning is that Western champions will have the edge in the matter of skill and that they will take the title at their second attempt.

A recently published piece about the Nire team of 1958 which played in Bushy Park created a lot of discussion, particularly in the local hostelries. Thirty-one years is a long time even for those who preserve their brain cells by abstaining from all alcoholic beverages, and there seems to be a lot of confusion about who played where on which team in the years 1956, '57 and '58. This confusion is compounded by the fact that both Ballymacarbry and Nire fielded football teams in 1956 and '57, leaving Nire without players who figured regularly on their side before and after this hiccup.

The Nire Club intimated early in '56 that they were not fielding a football team. This resulted in a Ballymacarbry football team being affiliated for the first time. However, Nire decided to affiliate at the last moment, which gave the rather unique situation of the two teams drawing on a limited pool of footballers. Prominent Nire players of that era like Jack Brazil, Tom and Kieran O'Ryan, Walter Wall, Tommy Wall, Denny and Willie McGrath, Liam Ryan, Michael Whyte and John Phelan had thrown in their lot with Ballymacarbry and this left Nire in the position of having to recall older servants of the club who had hung up their boots some years previously.

The '57 team, which was beaten by Ballymacarbry at Clonea, had a good few of the victorious '42 squad in action. With a couple of doubtful positions, the lineup was: M. Ryan, T. Wall, J. Walsh, J. O'Donnell, J. O'Loughlin, J. McGrath, S. Whelan, T. O'Grady, G. O'Grady, L. Tobin, M. Wall, M. Halpin, M. Browne, P. Coughlan, P. Wall.

Jimmy O'Loughlin, who played on the day, recalls that their performance was quite a good display by a hastily put together team and maintains that if goalkeeper Michael Ryan had been luckier that there would have been very little between the teams at the final whistle. 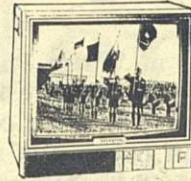

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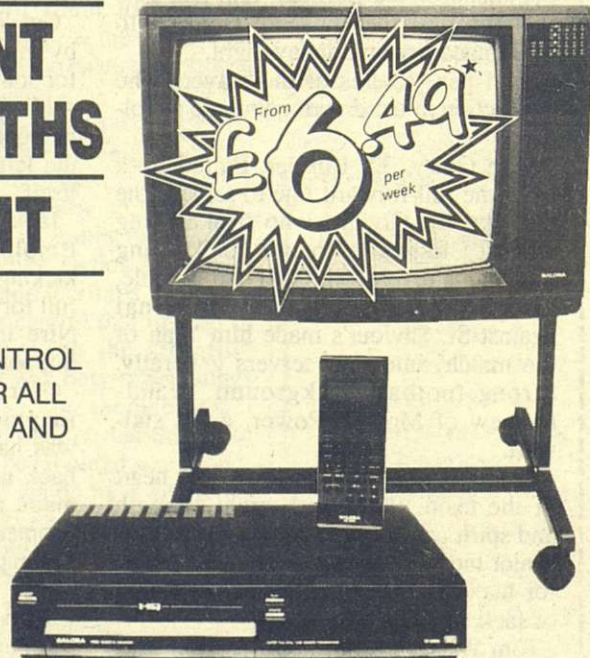
