Co. Council **Facing Budget Bankruptcy?**

Next Monday will be Budget Day for Waterford County Council when the members will meet in Dungarvan in an effort to balance their budget for 1990 the year which marks the beginning of the last decade in the present century. Total expenditure for the year is projected at a massive £16 million and councillors are facing a most unenviable task in their efforts to balance the books for the coming year.

In facing some of the unpalatable options open to them, the councillors will be bearing in mind that next year will very probably be local elections year and they will want to shy away from decisions which could jeopardise their chances as far as the electorate is concerned.

As matters stand, the councillors are faced on the income side of the budget with proposals to increase rates by 10 per cent and to

increase service charges by the same amount. It is unlikely, in the circumstances, that councillors will readily approve of such proposals but in the absence of any other source of income, the only other option will be to reduce the existing services.

The Council has already had a "milkrun" over the estimates when they met with the Council's senior officials behind closed doors in Dungarvan last Friday but despite their best efforts at paring and pruning expenditure, they could only agree cuts totalling £200,000 after their two hour meeting. One member put the Council dilemma in a nutshell when he declared that they just didn't have the next.

financial resources to run the county in 1990 and that they were close to bankruptcy.

REQUEST TO MINISTER As a result of last Friday's meeting the Council has now sent an urgent request to the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Flynn, to provide the Council with additional funding to enable them to meet their financial commitments in providing the necessary services without drastic cutbacks for 1990.

In the absence of any positive reply from the Minister it is quite likely that a final decision on the estimates will not be made by the Council on Monday

YOUNG BALLYDUFF MAN AND HIS WIFE KILLED IN HORROR CRASH



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

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

THE THIRD RING

If I am brief with the Sunday message, I'm sure you'll have realised I ran out of space last week when dealing with preparation as a spring-board for successful marriage. Hence, the themes for the 31st Sunday can be summed up under the heading: The compassion of Jesus, who brings salvation and the Church providing the sign of His presence in the world. So, it is back to marriage, and having started I feel I should now venture into the inner sanctum. We all differ greatly in our abilities, character, health, etc. It follows we take our shortcomings, bad habits and weaknesses as well as our good side into marriage, and it is inevitable that marriages will have to endure the strain of growing pains And that is not allo r for a the daily upsets that crowd into everyday life. Hence, one requires patience, tolerance, forgiveness, kindness and generosity to enable one to cope successfully. The Lord, the author of marriage said: "Charity begins at home," and therein rests the solution to building a happy home. Your neighbour who is nearest and dearest is your wife. Need I say more! The experience of couples, who stand united in the shouldering of problems, is, it is a binding force. We know, with God's help, that virtue is perfected in weakness, so likewise, sharing the marriage burdens helps to make homes havens of love and happiness. We live in a valley of tears, so if there were not dark clouds, it would be most unusual. As I said, sweep away the dark clouds together, and your love will blossom under the sunshine of God's love.

I must stress here that the unbreakable bond instituted by God is one of the greatest and telling factors in the preservation of marriage. It is like an anchor in a storm. It should make couples realise that they should not allow selfishness to wreck and to destroy what God had planned. There's too much at stake, and too much to lose. There's no room to be head-strong. You see, marriage will not make you, you must make the marriage. So, it is a joint and a united effort. You've had your engagement ring, and your wedding ring. Now, you have your "suffer-Ring." This ring is no symbol. It is a reality, which, if dedicated to the marriage, will add richness. The great majority work out their salvation in the marriage arena, and, by the very nature of their vocation, they have duties to God as well as to their partners. Love is the pivot on which everything works. The home then ought to be a storehouse of understanding, consideration, support, patience and forgiveness, and when these are practised you have two people living as one. I did mention some guidelines for preparation, but as no two are alike in character, commonsense must be brought into play. You know that what's a mole hill to one is a mountain to another.

The old proverb, "Those who suffer for love feel no pain," is based on the experience of life. Why do you think the old pensioner said to me "he'd have it no other way." He was not talking of money. He had to work hard all his life.

Those entering marriage have had a choice, so that that should be to their advantage. However, in the best laid schemes things do go wrong. And, when they do, do not allow them to become complicated. Follow the Lord's advice, "do not allow the sun to go down upon your anger." Be generous in forgiving and be bountiful in expressing gratitude. FAMILY PRAYER If I mention family prayer I do so with the conviction that it consolidates every aspect of married life. Generally, if you are at peace with God, you will be at peace with your partner. The one who loves God is one who'll strive to love his home.



Know Your Rights

Q — I have been in receipt of Unemployment Benefit and have now been transferred to Unemployment Assistance. If I go to work abroad, will my social welfare deduction there help me to requalify for Unemployment Benefit upon returning to this country.


A - Having exhausted country, having worked your entitlement to Unema PRSI based payment, you will need to get at least 13 weeks employment, insurable at Class 'A' or equivalent in order to requalify. These contributions can be paid in any E.C. country.

However, if the employment is outside Ireland then it will be necessary for you, on returning, to register at least one class 'A' contribution before your E.C. record can be taken into account in deciding your enti-tlement to Unemployment Benefit, i.e. you will have to work for at least one week.

If you become unem-

there for a period and if ployment Benefit, which is you qualify for Unemployment Benefit in that coun-try, then you will have the option of transferring that claim back to Ireland for up to 13 weeks. You would have to be in receipt of the Unemployment Benefit payment for at lest four weeks before you would be allowed transfer the claim. This transfer-of-claim facility will not extend to Spain and Portugal until January 1st, 1993.





WHAT DOES EMIGRATION MEAN?

The decision to emigrate is probably one of the biggest decisions a young person ever will make as it is one which will change and effect the rest of a person's life.

Whatever the reason is for leaving Ireland, emigration means leaving home and family in search of work, better opportunities and a new life elsewhere. It means the leaving behind of friends and colleagues and starting afresh in a strange, unfamiliar and foreign place with unfamiliar people in a strange and foreign culture.

It also means that a person will probably never again live permanently in Ireland and in future will go back just for holidays and family visits. In the circumstances people owe it to themselves to make an informed decision about emigration before embarking on such a very serious step in their lives.

In an effort to enable them to do so, the Action Group for Irish Youth (AGIY), a London based voluntary agency which aims to promote the interest and welfare of young Irish people in London launched its revised edition of "A Guide To London For Young Irish People" in Cork yesterday, Tuesday, November 7. The Guide provides over 160 pages of basic survival type information on finding a place to live, getting a job, social security provision and entitlements, information on training courses and further education, Irish contacts in London and other similar vital points.

At the launch, members of the AGIY group also highlighted the situation facing young Irish emigrants in London and stressed the need for increased awareness about the implications for intending emigrants of the everchanging legislation in Britain.

DEATH OF AN BRATHAIR O CATHAIN

A Christian Brother who numbered among his former pupils the Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey and former government Ministers Austin Deasy, Kevin Boland and the late George Colley died on Sunday last, November 5, at St. Patrick-'s, Baldoyle, Co. Dublin at the age of 81.

Brother Tomas O Cathain, a native of Kilnamona, Co. Clare, taught at a number of Schools in Dublin, Templemore, Doneraile, Dungarvan and Limerick before he retired.

He graduated with an MA in Irish from UCC in the 1930's and in the mid-60's was author of the first mathematics book in Irish for the new mathematics course which became a standard work in that sphere in subsequent years.

Brother O Cathain taught at Dungarvan CBS between 1950 and 1956 during which time popular Waterford T.D. and former Minister for Agriculture, Austin Deasy was one of his pupils. Paying tribute to Brother O Cathain on Monday before he left to attend the funeral, Deputy Deasy said he was a superb teacher with a brilliant mind dealing with such difficult subjects as Honour Mathematics, Physics,

Mathematical Physics and Honours Latin while he was also an expert on ancient Irish manuscripts. He attributed much of his success and that of his fellow classmates of those years to the training they received under Brother O Cathain.

An outstanding sportsman, Brother O Cathain also did much to encourage G.A.A. and coached a fine hurling team at the CBS during his years in Dungarvan.

The news of his death was received with much regret in Dungarvan where he is still fondly remembered. Go dtuga Dia Suaineas Siorrai do ins na bhFlaitheas.

CONCERN CONGRATULATES WATERFORD

Over the past 21 years since Concern first initiated its overseas service for underdeveloped countries, nurses, doctors, agriculturalists, teachers, engineers, mechanics, administrators, accountants and social workers from many parts of Ireland have all played their part.

Co. Waterford has been well represented and Ann Kiely, a civil engineer from Cappoquin, is just one example. She was a volunteer in Sudan from 1987 to 1989 during which she supervised the construction of two health clinics and also worked on existing water projects, including water filtration and hand dug wells in Kosti.

Concern first responded to famine and suffering in Biafra in 1968. Now, 21 years later, Concern is still responding in Ethiopia, Sudan, Tanzania, Mozambique, Bangladesh and Thailand and will continue its work in the years ahead.

A message from the headquarters of Concern in Dublin which has come to hand states: "The encouragement and assistance of the Waterford people and the commitment of our network of local supporters has enabled us to continue this tradition of service to the poorest." strictions on the services provided when they hold their Annual Estimates meeting in Dungarvan next Monday.

For the superstitious, the fact that the calendar date for Monday is the 13th may suggest that it would be an unlucky day on which to arrive at any positive decision but apart from that it is hardly likely that the Council will reach approval on the figures at their first discussion of the problems in public on _____

Monday. Briefly, the principal options open to the councillors are increases in the county rate and service charges or a reduction in services and this makes the task all the more daunting.

In the circumstances we are sure that the members will recite with more than usual fervour on Monday the following prayer in Irish which is recited at the commencement of each Council meeting: "Iar-raimid Ort, A Thiarna, T'anal naomhtha do chur fuinn chun sinn do stiuradh in ar ngniomhartha agus neart Do ghrasta do bhronnadh orainn chun iad do thabhairt chun criche, ionnus gur Uait-se tosnofar ar n-uile bhriathar agus ar nuile ghniomh feasta, agus gur Triot a chriochnofar iad, tre Chriost ar dTiarna. Translated the prayer is: "Direct, we beseech Thee, O Lord, our actions by Thy hold inspirations and carry them on by Thy gracious assistance, that every word and work of ours may always begin from Thee and by Thee be happily ended, through Christ our Lord, Amen.'

Certainly because of the rather drastic options open to them, the councillors will need all the courage and inspiration that they can get in reaching an acceptable solution to the problem when they gather to consider the matter on Monday. here in Ireland where we have been experiencing the renewed curse of emigration in recent years.

In reply to questions in the Dail last week, the Junior Minister at the Department of the Taoiseach, Mr. Vincent Brady revealed that the number of people estimated to have emigrated during the last three years was as follows: 1987 — 27,000; 1988 — 32,000; 1989 — 46,000. This comes to a total of 105,000 persons who have left us in the short space of three years, surely a damning indictment of the way the country is being run.

These 105,000 have gone off in ones and twos and threes, slipping quietly away. In this way the impact of their departure is nothing as dramatic as is the mass exodus of the East Germans. It is, nonetheless, a tragedy of similar proportions.

THE FACE ON THE BAR ROOM FLOOR

In order to respond to a very special request from a longtime reader of this column we will devote this corner, usually reserved for a ballad or old song, to the words of a famous and once very well known recitation this week. The request which comes from Dungarvan is for the words of "The Face On The Bar Room Floor," a recitation in the same powerful mould as "The Shooting Of Dan McGrew" and "The Green Eye Of The Little Yellow God."

"The Face On The Bar Room Floor" was composed by one, H. Antoine D'Arcy and, inspired by the poem, it is related that Herndon Davis, the famous artist from Denver in the U.S. painted the face of Madeline on the bar room floor of the Teller House in Central City, Colorado when he was in Central City doing other painting in 1936, having decided that it was just the spot to put it. Whether the Teller House is still there we do not now know. But anyhow, here is what the story is all about.—

As songs and witty stories came through the open door, A vagabond crept in slowly and posed upon the floor.



Huge Crowds Attend All-night Vigils at Melleray Grotto

They come in droves, busload after busload, every Saturday night; from Ballymena, Ballycastle, Ballymurphy; from Antrim town and from Armagh; from Downpatrick and Drogheda; from Portadown and Portlaoise; from Tralee and Thurles and from many other places.

On Saturday night, October 7, the Feast of the Holy Rosary, 13 buses packed the parking lot and some 600 pilgrims packed the grotto grounds all night long, saying the rosary and singing hymns. The weekend before, there were 12 buses there, mostly from the North of Ireland. Todate, 2 bus drivers from the North have driven 100 buses each from Belfast to Melleray Grotto for allnight vigils.

Do local people realise what's going on? There are headlines in the papers and highlights on t.v. when they burn buses in Belfast, but nobody reports the Peacethrough-Prayers buses that travel the length of Ireland (they only burn tyres), to pray at a simple grotto in Deise country at the foot of the Knockmealdowns.

They are welcomed by members who belong to the steering Committee of Melleray Grotto, and who voluntarily give their time and services to keep the grotto in order. They have erected shelters near the grotto, provided toilet facilities, keep the grounds tidy, conduct the prayers, pro-vide transport for bus-

drivers to Cappoquin, etc., and keep the kettle of hospitality on the boil (free tea, coffee and biscuits all night long). It is a burden gladly borne by a small but generous band of people who believe Our Lady came to Melleray 4 years ago, to warn us of the dangerous times, to encourage us and to bring us special blessings and favours from God. In a few words: a Lourdes at our doorstep.

VISIONS AND CURES Have the people from far away more faith? Do they get more visions or more positive answers to their prayers? That is a difficult question to answer. Every week, pilgrims report seeing different things like crosses in the sky, signs in the sun, various heavenly visions at the grotto; others report being cured of different ailments, etc. The hardworking committee haven't the time or the facilities to follow up and investigate all these reports.

They are indeed impressed by many of these reports, but their main concern is to see that proper order is kept and that Our Lady's request for "Prayer and more prayer" is an-

swered. The all-night vigil is one answer to that request and they are happy to co-operate with any and every group that comes and prays the traditional prayers of the Church. Pilgrims come at all times to the grotto but the vigil type of prayer seems to have a special appeal as it combines prayer with penance. These vigils have been going on for almost 2 years now with hardly any break. 45 buses attended the October vigils. Vigils are from midnight to 6.30 a.m. and are also held on the Friday before the First Saturday of each month.

One of its greatest results is the number of people who go to Mass and Confession. The Church does not provide any liturgical facilities at the grotto, but Mass and Confession are available up at Melleray Abbey each Sunday morning.

To sum up: the Gospel test and invitation of Our Lord to his first hesitant inquirers could be applied to Melleray Grotto. When they asked him: "Lord, where do you live?" He replied: "Come and see." (Contributed).



We are all well aware," said Deputy Kenneally," of the changes coming about in 1992 because of the Single European Market and I believe that industry in Ireland in general is well prepared to meet the challenge. But it will be a case of the survival of the fittest and those who do not have their act together will not survive and cannot blame anybody but themselves.

Deputy Kenneally said that the Horticultural In-

dustry was not facing any new challenge in 1992 as it had been subjected to the open market forces for some time now. "The professional and more competent and more organised growers survived and still prosper but unfortunately there are many others entering into this business sector who are not qualified to do so and as a consequence are lowering the reputation of all Irish producers," he said.


