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ANNUAL ESTIMATES

Co. Counci **Gan't Pay** Its Way

The Council should now do the honourable thing and declare that we are bankrupt and we should go back to the Minister and tell him we're broke and that we just can't balance the books.

In making this statement £1,373,000. at the annual estimates meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday, Cllr. B. Kyne summed up the gen-eral attitude of the full membership of the Council in their efforts to grapple with the Council's budget for 1990.

In his report to the meet-ing, the Deputy County Manager, Mr. Brian Mc-Nally stated that the continuing effect of reduced funding from Central sources had now reached the stage that the ability of the Council to deliver services at any reasonable standard had passed. Over the past three years the rate support grants had de-clined by a total of

Mr. McNally expressed regret that after many years acknowledging that something must be done to re-form Local Government, a Dail Committee was still only considering the matter.

The estimates provided for a total expenditure in 1990 of £15,962,100 and in addition to the usual sources of income, a 9.6% rate increase (£29.34) with domestic water charges up from £96 to £106, metred water up from £1.30 to £1.35 and scavenging tags up from 25p to 30p would

be required to balance out. The Deputy Manager added that until such time as a decision was made re-

garding the future of Local Government and its fund-

ing there was little point in the provision of additional services, even if the capital cost was met 100% unless there was money provided for the ongoing running costs.

MEMBERS VIEWS

Cllr. C. O Riain said that he never felt so helpless about anything as in order to just maintain the services at the present level more money was needed. "It's a frightening situation and the eyes of the whole county will be upon us," he said. Cllr. J. A. Walsh said that even if they were to increase the charges they were talking about a minimal amount of money and would just create a great amount of trouble in doing so. "The Local Authorities throughout the country are dying slowly and we have reached the stage where we must be funded from Central Funds as we just can't increase our charges," he said.


Cllr. P. Cahill then proposed that they adjourn and send a request to the Minister to receive a deputation to discuss the position. "We're just wasting our time here now," he added.





Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

THE BROKEN RING!

I reminded you recently that marriage was far too serious a contract to be approached without due and careful preparation. You'll recall too that I proposed various steps to be followed as well as precautions to be observed. Then, I invited you into the inner sanctum to watch marriage in action, and take note of the difficulties, the ups and downs, the dragging and wrangling etc., and suggested ways and means to mend the cracks and prevent major eruptions. I asked you to dwell particularly on God's law of love, which He'd fashioned to smooth and iron out problems, and bring peace where there was discord. The Lord Himself emphasised the fact that love of neighbour was paramount among those who were closest and dearest. It's disappointing when so many reserve their restraint and good manners for visitors, and then crawl back into their hard shells once the show is over! In their blindness these people are sowing seeds of trouble, and will have only themselves to blame.

However, the truth has got to be faced. The best laid schemes do go adrift, and marriages do break up. In fairness, the vast majority of people do contract marriage with the best intentions. They not only want their marriage to work, but they also dedicate and commit themselves to creating a happy home. Sadly, things do go wrong. It may be drink or violence or unfaithfulness etc. And, what once offered so much promise now lies in ruins. As well informed people now say, " it has irretrievably broken down." Whatever the reason, it is a tragedy, and one that is bound to be followed by anguish, heartaches and suffering.

History shows that man was never slow to pick himself up from the ruins. Moses had to deal with the problem. Henry VIII 'twixt instituting laws to accommodate his marriage break-up and employing the deft use of the axe, had no marriage problems! Well, to be fair, he tried unsuccessfully to obtain a divorce from Rome. He set the ball rolling, which due to many reasons including a decrease in the moral power of religion, is now almost out of control. One in every three marriages in England end in the divorce court. It is to be noted that divorce settlements are now turning many off marriage: they just set up house. Facts prove that once divorce is introduced, it is almost impossible to keep it in check. I believe we are supposed to have 30,000 marriages on the rocks in Ireland. I know some claimed during the Referendum that the number was 70,000 which was a gross and misleading untruth. Anyhow, all is not well in our country. Marriage is definitely under pressure. It needs looking at. Divorce is not the solution. It creates more problems than it solves. It undermines every marriage. It opens the door to adulterous unions. And, is a blatant disregard of the law of God.

God's law is unalterable. It applies to all marriages, and it can never be deprived of its force by civil legislation. Yet! the wording for the proposed Irish style divorce did promise the full treatment! Jesus did say "Everyone who putteth away his wife, and marrieth another committeth adultery." His teaching is clear. Apart from the exception mentioned by St. Paul, no one can break the bond of a valid and consummated marriage. Yet, the Pope is powerless as well as every other human authority. It is easy to claim the power, as some do, but having it, is another story.

If a catholic is party, as many are, to a divorce, and does not remarry, then he or she is fully entitled to practice their religion. Whereas, if he or she did enter another marriage, then the new couple would be wise to keep going to Mass, but they could not avail of the sacraments. Of course, in danger of death, all could be put right. It does happen that good Catholics do get caught up in the web, and they almost find the burden intolerable. If, they strive to live honestly as brother and sister, I say to them, do keep praying, do keep going to Mass and take yourself to confession. The confessor will listen patiently, and he'll direct you accordingly. People love to talk about scandals, so in such cases I would always advise people to keep their own counsel.

THE BOND REMAINS INTACT

In England and other countries when a divorce is sought, it is necessary, especially for the wife, to participate in the case on order to secure their rights re. children, and property etc. Catholics do require permission to co-operate, but it is no more than a question of asking. Of course, it is understood in such cases that the bond remains intact.

People say "The Church is too rigid on divorce." Excuse me. They are mistaken. The Church did not make the law! Divorced people may attempt marriage again, but never in the Catholic Church. You hear of people getting annulments, which is not the same as a divorce. but rather a declaration based on facts that a true marriage never existed, because of the absence of an essential requirement. I heard people talking about a more Christian attitude to divorce, which is the same as saying, "there's a flaw in God's blue print for marriage." It is like saying, "He should have allowed exceptions." The fact is, He made no such exceptions. The simple fact is, God made the bond unbreakable. More good would be achieved if people promoted stable and permanent marriage. Look at your own marriage. Ask yourself, could you contribute more towards making your home ring with happiness? If all were to join the crusade for happy family life, those who would visit our area would ask: what's the secret of Christian marriage. So, let the world see that love does work.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Q. - I am a single woman in receipt of Unemployment Benefit. I am expecting a child shortly and am anxious to know how the birth, and the fact that I intend to keep the child, will effect my entitlements.

A. - As an unmarried mother you should apply for the Unmarried Mothers Allowance from Social Welfare. This is a means tested payment but you might note that should the father contribute to the maintenance of the child, this contribution will not be taken into consideration in the means test. Further details of how the means test is conducted are contained in the Social Welfare Guide which you may consult at your Community Information Centre.

In the weeks surrounding the actual birth, you will probably be incapable of, or unavailable for work. This will disqualify your Unemployment Benefit claim. However, you may be covered for this period by the General Maternity Scheme. Details of this Scheme are again available from your local CIC or Social Welfare Office. Provided you continue to meet the other qualifying conditions, you may renew your claim for Unemployment Benefit subsequent to the birth of your child. This claim, if awarded, will be paid at half the full rate on account of your then being in receipt of the Unmarried Mothers Allowance. Even if you do not qualify for a payment of Unemployment Benefit you would still have the option of signing on for PRSI "credits" in order to maintain your insurance record.







IT'S TIME TO FACE THE ISSUE

Members of Waterford County Council should have the courage of their convictions and should once and for all face up now to the scandalous manner in which local authorities are being underfunded by the Central authorities.

when they met in Dungarvan to consider an estimate to cover a gross expenditure of roughly £16 million for 1990 last Monday. One after another, the members stressed the dire financial straits in which the parent body found itself. Statements that the Council was bankrupt, broke and that they were facing a frightening financial situation were heard on all sides.

The Deputy County Manager in his report on the estimates stated that the last few years had been a period in which reduced overall spending had been the norm and with reduced Central funding they were still expected to improve services. In these circumstances such aims were not reconcilable.

Pointing out that the cost of pensions for retired Council employees now totalled £1.084 million which represented 21 per cent of the Council's annual payroll, Cllr. Kyne stated that while Environment Minister, Mr. Padraig Flynn, looked after his own Mayo constituency exceptionally well, Waterford and most other counties were expected to do more and more on diminishing budgets. Now they were even being expected to pay pensions which they could not afford. This is just not possible.

The lifetime of the present membership of local Councils will come to an end next year (barring a change in present policy) and in anticipation of the Local Elections due in 1990, a sum of £30,000 to cover the cost was included in the current Co. Council estimates. This being so, we believe that a definite stand should now be taken Minister in Dungarvan on this whole problem of funding, in adequate fashion, the services which local authorities are charged with administering. And if the worst comes to the worst and the Minister decides to disband the Council for refusing to strike a rate because of continued underfunding it could well bring this festering problem to a head. And then the members could seek re-election within the coming year when the Local Elections take place and in such circumstances all could face the local electorate with clear consciences. Certainly matters cannot

The Council failed to be permitted to drift along strike a rate for next year as they have been doing for the last few years. The time for action is now!

DUNGARVAN TO HONOUR NOBEL PRIZE WINNER

Responding to the promptings of a joint deputation representing Abbeyside Pattern Committee and Dungarvan Junior Chamber, members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting last Monday night unanimously agreed to accord a civic reception to Professor Ernest T. Walton, winner of the Nobel Prize in Physics in 1951, when he visits Dungarvan to address a public meeting at Lawlor's Hotel on Wednesday, November

Son of John Arthur Walton, a Methodist Minister and Anna Elizabeth Walton, the world renowned Physics Professor was born in Abbeyside in a thatched house at Strandside South which stood on the site now occupied by the residences of Mr. Pat Fahy and Mr. John Cartwright on October 6, 1903. His father was the which at that time had a sizeable Methodist Community with a Church in Friary Street now incorporated into Shaw's Stores. The following year, in July 1904, the Waltons left Dungarvan when John was transferred to Rathkeale, Co. Limerick after spending three years in Dungarvan and later they went to the North of Ireland where the young Ernest was to grow up.

"Father of Nuclear Science" for seven years. During this period Ernest developed and constructed jointly with Sir John Cockcroft a method to split lithium atoms. However the significance of their discovery was not fully recognised until 1951 when they were jointly nominated for the Noble Prize in Physics and on December 10, 1951 at the Concerts Palace in Stockholm, the Swedish Academy of Science awarded the Nobel Prize to a son of Abbeyside.

Now a frail man of 86 years, Professor Walton lives in Dublin but came to Dungarvan some 10 or 15 years ago in an unsuccessful effort to locate the thatched house in Abbeyside where he was born.

Prime mover in this proposal to honour Professor Walton is Dr. Jim Stacey of the Abbeyside Pattern Committee who has carried out a great deal of research into the Walton family association with Dungarvan and Abbeyside in the early years of the present century.

The joint deputation which were received by the Urban Council last Monday night, in addition to their request for a Civilc Reception further suggested that the new leisure area at the Causeway might be named Walton Park in honour of the Professor and the erection of a suitable plaque which would be unveiled by the Professor during his forthcoming visit to the town.

When the members of the deputation withdrew, the Council members discussed the proposals at length, agreeing to all the suggestions in principle with the finer details in regard to the type of plaque and the wording of it to be the subject of further discussions with the promoters.

We are sure that the people of Dungarvan and Abbeyside will give this decision of the Urban Council to accord this honour to Professor Walton, the only Irishman to win a Nobel Prize Award in a scientific subject, their wholehearted support.

harbour. Population of parish 1,276, of village 402. The parish contains portion of the Drum mountains, and stretching into Dungarvan bay is the long promontory of Helvick head. Part of the land, more especially that bordering on the sea and adjoining the villages of Ballynagaul and Shanakill, is of good quality and well cultivated."

It then goes on: "The principal manure is sand and sea-weed, which is found in abundance in the bay and on the coast. The refuse of fish is also used as a manure; it is placed in heaps in the fields, covered with sand and clay, and when decomposed applied to the land; it produces most luxuriant crops of potatoes, etc. Yellow sand is plentiful, and forms the greater portion of the subsoil of the district; good stone quarries."

The entry then states: "The surrounding scenery is bold and in some parts strikingly romantic and picturesque. The village is near Helvick head and has a small pier and harbour for boats. The haak fishery is carried on here to a considerable extent. The want of proper boats and nets is a great drawback to the fishermen who are a hardy and robust race, and expert fishers. Protestant and catholic churches; near the former is a well dedicated to St. Nicholas. Parish of Ballymacart (pop. 384) served from this post office.'

The entry goes on to give the full postal address as Ringville, Dungarvan, and names the Postmaster as John Murphy. The Medical officer and Registrar is named as Dr. Richard Graves and the Relieving Officer as J. Mahony. It then details that the area was in the Petty Sessions and Constabulary district of Dungarvan with Sergeant M. Connolly in charge of Ringville station and Stephen Pilcher as Chief Officer of the Coastguard station at Helvick head.

James Walsh stated that Faha had, in fact, won this game by three points and not one point. He expressed regret at having walked off during the game, but was disappointed that no officer or member of the Board had made personal contact with him after the game to discuss the matter.

Having discussed the matter further, the chair-

clubs advised the Board that their grounds were closed for repairs and would not be available for a couple of months.

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
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In the course of a letter to members of Waterford Co. Council which was considered at the Council's monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday, Mr. M. Lynch, the Community Care Programme Manager of the South Eastern Health Board stated that it was not possible to resume the Dental Clinic in Lismore in September as Board members had been advised because of an objection by the dental staff to the state of the building where the clinic was held.

Although an appreciable amount of money had been spent to upgrade the building to a reasonable level further issues subsequently arose, the letter stated, and it added, "I now have had further discussions with the principal Dental Surgeon. As a result some further work on the inside of the building is planned so as to bring it up to a more ac-



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ceptable level for both patients and staff and it is hoped to proceed with this work very soon. This should then enable the Board to provide the services at the clinic.

Cllr. B. Kyne, a member of the Health Board, stated that Mr. Lynch had only been recently appointed as the new Community Care Programme Manager and when this matter was discussed at the monthly meeting of the Health Board held in Kilkenny on the previous Thursday it was stated that negotiations in the matter were proceeding and were now at a very delicate stage. He said that Mr. Lynch had offered a further £5,000 for repairs at the building and hoped that this would solve the impasse which had arisen.

"I am prepared to wait a month to see what the outcome will be," said Mr. Kyne, "but if there is no progress in that time I will ask for the names of those involved in creating this impasse. I know this further delay will not be welcomed by the public in the Lismore and West Waterford area but this further investment may solve the problem, if not then we should take the gloves off."

Cllr. J. Quirke said that he hoped that this extra money would be spent on the building and that then the dental service would be resumed there.

Cllr. O. Wilkinson said



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that while a certain amount of money had been spent on the building, it had not been enough. He would like to see this additional money spent and the place then inspected by the dental people whose requests in regard to the building he described as being reasonable. "It's a great pity that the clinic has been held up until now and it's a disgrace that the situation there was not looked into before now," he said.

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
