

Moving the motion Cllr. McDonnell said that he was aware that no progress was being made in the laying of this road to run from Chapel Street to the Youghal Road. At present there were 240 pupils attending the school and cars bringing children to and from the school are involved in traffic problems.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, agreed that no progress was being made because the chances of money being made available for the project were nil. "A sum in the region of £50,000 would be needed for a job like this," he said.

Cllr. McDonnell — People in the area will not be pleased to hear this. All I can say is that this road is urgently required if the traffic hazards in the vicinity of the school are to be solved.

The County Engineer then said that all he could do at present was to progress the design for the project further and then if the landowners concerned were prepared to provide the land required for nothing they might be able to do something over a number of years.

Urban Gouncil Approves 1990 Roadworks Scheme

The Urban Roadworks Scheme for 1990 as prepared by Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, was considered and approved by the members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting held last week.

scheme as submitted by him, Mr. O'Flynn stated that the allocation of £26,250 for maintenance was the minimum amount needed to carry out the var-ious road maintenance works which included

minor footpath repairs etc. A sum of £21,000 was included for footpath replacement at Mary Street, O'Connell Street, Mitchel Street, Bridge Street, Childers Estate, Cathal Brugha Estate and Strandside South and in this regard, Mr. O'Flynn new sewerage scheme. commented that the deterioration in footpaths throughout the town has far outstripped the Council's financial ability to replace defective sections. To avoid further escalation of the problem and in the interest of public safety he had stepped up the level of activity on this work.

On the allocation of £11,500 for surface dressing at Park Lane, Western Bay and Springfield, Mr. O'Flynn said this was a very modest requirement but essential to prevent extensive potholing in the areas listed.

A sum of £84,000 is included for work at Scanlon's Yard Car Park (£18,000), Fr. Twomey's Road (£25,000), Shandon (£18,000), Duckspool (£18,000) and Castle Street (£5,000) and Mr. O'Flynn stated that reshaping and strengthening of the road structure in each of these areas was long overdue.

Engineer stated that Commenting on the the commencement of the new housing development in the area could result in a hazardous traffic situation unless the planned realignment was quickly complet-

TOWN CENTRE STREETS

A sum of £339,300 with a credit of £60,000 from the Sewerage Scheme (for trench width repairs) is provided for restoring and resurfacing the town centre streets most of which have suffered from trench excavations in the course of the

Mr. O'Flynn stated that he felt that the resurfacing of full street widths was warranted here and he pro-

posed a hot rolled asphalt wearing course underlain by base course macadam. "This has been done in several other towns such as Clonmel and surely Dungarvan deserves equal treatment," said Mr. O'Flynn.

Pointing out that this, together with the enhanced street lighting, would upgrade the whole appearance of the town centre and that surface maintenance costs would be reduced when the work was completed, Mr. O'Flynn recommended that the Council should seek grant assistance for this work which could be phased over 2/3 years.

Following a brief discussion during which Mr. O'Flynn was complimented and thanked for the Scheme as submitted, the Council unanimously approved it.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

UNGRATEFUL CHILDREN!

Watching R.T.E. 1 on Saturday, November 4, '89 at 11 a.m. I was shocked to see teenagers brazenly proffering reasons for not going to Mass. One said "she went odd times," but Mass meant nothing for the rest. They said "it was boring". One compared Mass to the playing of an old record over and over. They indicated they were not prepared to accept any direction. They questioned the right of the Pope to tell them what to do. They all felt capable of guiding themselves. The idea of listening to the Bishops was dismissed with laughter. One boy claimed to have his own line with the Holy Spirit. Whilst morals were not discussed, it was evident too that they would not accept or be bound by any law. They said, it was a matter for themselves. When asked about Confession, the question amused them. It was obvious, it played no part in their lives.

A discussion followed, and this involved some practising Catholics as well as some of the participants from the first part. One wee girl was excellent, but I felt no one put their finger on the heart of the matter. No, not even the priest who was present. Relative to the Mass missers, he was asked: "if they sinned." He simply side-stepped and evaded the issue. He had a duty to give direction, but he simply went on to say, it was a phase of growing pains, and that eventually all would come right. He baffled me. Surely, the Church's precept should have been mentioned. It says, unless excused, we have a grave duty to hear Mass etc. The Church is simply telling us how frequently an obliga-tion arising from God's teaching should be discharged.

We believe that the Mass is the offering of the Lamb of God to our Father in Heaven to acknowledge Him as our Lord and Master. Jesus offered the same Sacrifice on Calvary. And, He made it abundantly clear at the Last Supper that He wanted His Church to continue saying Mass for all time. He wanted us to have a memorial of His passion and death to be used both as a source of nourishment and as a means of worship. It was as if Jesus made His last will leaving all His riches to His children. Those young people may not accept that all they have, they have received from the hand of God, but, whether they like it or not, He is our Father. He loves us. When Adam made a mess of things, God sent His own Son to put things right. He restored the friendship, and then outlined the ways and the means to protect and develop it. How could anyone ignore his debt to God? We should be on our knees in humble acknowledgement and grati--tude.

Speak to one of our emmigrants, and that one will tell you "he is happy to be working, but his heart is in Ireland. He longs for the day when he'll be back with his family. It means so much to just sit and chat with his loved ones. It's natural. Surely, considering all we owe to God, you'd expect people to yearn for His company.

We are His children. Adopted we may be, but look at the rank to which we have been raised with all the rights to a rich inheritance. It should follow that having been so highly honoured that we'd crave to be in His company. Those who do go, strive to create a lasting companionship. Whatever the basis for any friendship, communication is necessary to sustain it. Friendship with God is more. It is a privilege. And, those who say, "it is boring" know not what they say. If they only half realised the import of God's offer, they'd be on their knees praising God for His goodness.

When the devil tempted Jesus with the promise of greatness if He'd but bow down and adore him, He replied: "The Lord thy God thou shalt adore, and Him only shalt thou serve." Further, the First Commandment tells us that we have a grave duty to acknowledge, and pay due worship to God. And, having bound man, and supplying him with a ready made form of worship to be followed, man has no choice but to use the Mass. In fact, the same Commandment forbids man to put anyone or anything before God. So, we know what's to be done, how to do it, and the Church, whose office it is, tells us how often.

THE FINAL WORD

As I implied, had God not imposed this duty, man on account of his indebtedness to God, should be only too ready to express his deep gratitude to his Maker. However, the matter is not left to us to decide. God has superimposed his law on the law of nature. So, God has spoken. That is the final word.

The Mass is the same as the Sacrifice of the Cross. It is an honour to witness that great event. The Mass is an ocean of riches, and yet! we mostly fail to reap all the benefits that are available, because we fail to grasp the significance. You see, we are usually rushing. It is simply a matter of getting a duty done. We give little thought to the fact we are going to have a meeting with God, and witnessing the greatest event of all time. Indeed, the Mass is a mystery, but the more we know and appreciate what's happening, the more we will love it. Be in time next Sunday, and have a wee chat with the Lord to prepare you for the meeting. Try to draw close to Him in spirit, and promise to bring the spirit of your Mass into your daily

Dear young people, the Lord is calling you to greatness. He knows what. is best for you. Remember, He promised: "If you eat my flesh and drink my blood, you will have life in you, and I will raise you up on the last day." If you treated your parents like you treat God, I would say "you would be a bad son." Sorry, I have to say it that those who chose to go their own way will not inherit their share of the Kingdom. Admittedly, there's a problem for many in the land, and so, I suggest to the faithful goers, make your Mass count. The richness is there. Dig it out, and offer it up in reparation

Plans have now been completed for the Civic Reception to be accorded Professor Ernest T.S. Walton, who now resides in Dublin, when he visits Dungarvan to address a public meeting at Lawlor's Hotel on Wednesday of next week, November 29.

Professor Walton was born in a thatched house which stood in Strandside South, Abbeyside, on October 26, 1903, on the site now occupied by the residences of Mr. Pat Fahy and Mr. John Cartwright. He is renowned internationally for his work in splitting the atom and for which in 1951, jointly with Sir John Cockcroft, he was awarded the Nobel Prize in Physics.

the occasion will be unveiled at the Park by the Professor himself.




Got Blood Transfusion Service's Most Prestigious Award

Kyne who complained about its contents and the manner in which the report had been published. He said that the publicity given to the matter was justified as people were entitled to know that such statements about the hospital had been made. "Councillor Kyne has become divisive by his statements and he has now made a political football of this very important issue," said Cllr. O'Halloran.

SCARE HEADLINES

Cllr. Kyne said that despite what Cllr. O'Halloran had said he would second the motion. He pointed out that in regard to the matter all he had ever said was that a proper balance should be maintained about the position in the hospital. "If they were to encourage scare headlines about fire hazards all they were doing was to frighten the old people in the hospital," he said.

Cllr. Kyne went on to point out that very good work was at present being carried out at the hospital. However he felt that promises made in the past of a new 100-bed unit for Dungarvan had starved the existing hospital of significant funding for upgrading the facilities there.

Cllr. Kyne again referred to the scare headlines which had been given to the Hospital Visiting Committee report and said that this had raised unnecessary fear among the patients and there was no need for that.

The motion was then put to the meeting and passed. PHASED

DEVELOPMENT

Subsequently Cllr. Kyne passed to the "Leader" a letter dated November 8 received by him from Mr. M. Hynes, Special Hospitals

South Eastern Health Board. This stated that major improvement work on St. Anne's and St. Michael's wards commenced last September and at present a new heating system was being installed together with new floors, new windows, two bathrooms and toilets. Some small additions were being built to provide extra space for beds and improved day dining facilities. Kyne then said that following the Health Board meeting on November 9 he expressed his appreciation of the work done at St. Joseph's to the CEO, Mr. Peter McQuillan, who then confirmed that the promise of the new 100-bed unit had deflected funding from St. Joseph's. "He felt that from now on the best approach would be for a phased development of the new unit as this would be more likely to get the approval of the Department of Health," said Cllr. Kyne.

COUNTY COUNCIL TO TRY AGAIN

Members of Waterford County Council will re-assemble for their reconvened Estimates meeting in Dungarvan next Monday when, for the fourth time, they will try again to balance the Council's financial estimates for 1990.

The members have al- heard. ready met twice in Committee and once in open meeting without reaching a decision and whether the position has radically changed since the adjourned meeting last Monday week remains to be seen by the outcome of next Monday's effort.

The revised estimates as presented on the last occasion call for a 10 per cent increase in the County rate (up to £29.34 in the £) together with a £10 increase in domestic water charges (up to £106) with charges for metered water up from £1.30 to £1.35 and scavenging tags up from 25p to 30p each. These adjustments were estimated to realise a total of £185,000 which would bridge the gap between expenditure and receipts following the variations in the various allocations decided at the two previous meetings of the Council held in Committee.

The Council members are wisely shying away from any proposals to increase the service charges as they are already deemed to be high enough and as local elections are anticipated next year such increases would be frowned on by the public with the Council members having to shoulder the blame.

It is extremely doubtful that the Council's request to the Minister for the Environment for additional support grants will have met with any success and this will mean that the members will find themselves back in square one when they reconvene in Dungarvan next Monday.



County Board Meeting

The report of referee David Kiely stated that it was a very clean and sporting contest and that he did not have to take the name of a single player.

The County Chairman described the affair as intolerand most unacceptable. He further said that the allegations and insinuations in the letter were of the most serious nature and he doubted if these could be substantiated. The whole matter was then referred to the Board's Disciplinary Committee (comprising the three chairmen and secretaries)

and their findings will be _man, Liam O'Connor, who submitted to the December meeting of the Board for ratification. The meeting was later fixed for Monday night of this week.

AFFILIATIONS

The system of affiliation in Waterford is completely out of line with the system in operation in all other counties and since the matter was highlighted last year, the matter has been discussed with a view to finding a formula that will be acceptable to clubs and which will not cause too much of a disruption for clubs or players.

When the new recommended system was outlined, not everyone fully understood the implications of the new proposals. These relate to adult affiliation and if accepted, will mean that a club will in future cater for both codes and dual players can play hurling and football only with the same club.

This system could pose certain problems and would eliminate minor units like St. Patricks, St. Olivers and St. Marys and there would also be other complications.

A decision must be taken on the matter when the Board meets for the December meeting at Dunhill on December 11.

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
