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WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL Y RATE IS E28 IN E

At their resumed estimates meeting in Dungarvan last Monday, Waterford Co. Council ended their marathon effort to strike a rate by approving of a rate of £27.99 in £ for the coming year. This represents an increase of 4.5 per cent in the current rate which stands at £26.77. However the Council by majority vote rejected proposals to increase domestic water and scavenging charges. The charge for non-domestic water, which is an executive function, was increased by 4 p.c.

In a supplementary report cations, the task facing the to the Council, the Deputy County Manager, Mr. B. J. McNally stated that since the last meeting on November 13, they had received notification from the Department of the Environment that Road grants were being increased by £225,000 over the current year, the rate support grant allocation was being in-creased by 3.5 p.c. or an in-crease of £80,000, while in the Housing Capital Programme an adjustment would make it possible to charge approximately £20,000 to Capital Expenditure. "In the light of the implications of these notifi-

Council in arriving at a balanced budget for 1990 is somewhat brighter," the report stated.

Mr. McNally then informed the Council that the effect of these adjustments together with a reduction of £10,000 for the issue of polling cards for local elections would result in a deficit of £89,500 which could be eliminated by the following increases: Rates 5% (£62,000); Non-domestic water 4% (£10,000); Scavenging -25p per label to 30p

DUNGARVAN U.D.C. URBAN RATE GOES UP TO £26.30

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council succeeded at their initial attempt on Monday night in striking a rate and adopting an estimate of expenses for 1990.

In brief this provides for a town rate of £26.30 (up by 4%), an increase in parking charges from 10p to 20p but no increase in the existing level of water charges. In his report to the Council, the Deputy Co. Manager, Mr. B. J. McNally, submitted a gross estimate of expenses totalling £1,190,014 and stated that the figures had been based on the following cost factors: an inflation rate of 5%; an increase in remuneration of 6%; no major expenditure to be undertaken; increase of 5% in water charges, a rate increase of 5%; an increase in parking discs from 10p to 20p. Cllr. A. Hallahan described the proposal to increase the cost of parking discs as a retrograde step which would be particularly detrimental to shopping in Dungarvan. It could, he said, also result in a loss of revenue to the Council as smaller numbers would be inclined to come into the town with such higher

parking charges. Cllr. M. O'Riordan agreed and said that by doing this they would further alienate people from coming into Dungarvan. "By increasing this charge, I feel that we are going down the wrong road as it will also affect locals who have to park their cars in the town every day," he said. Cllr. T. Wright proposed

SOLDIERS OF CHRIST

The first reading tells us how the people chose David to be their king. It is evident that they clearly understood that he'd not only rule them as an ordinary monarch, but that, over and above, he'd hold the sacred office of leading God's chosen people. So, he had not only the task of ruling and of defending, but he was also entrusted with the duty of shepherding, and leading the people of Israel in the service of God. He was to be their hope and their guarantee that God was with His people. This was the ancient and revered idea of kingship that had been handed down in the Jewish tradition.

The same notion, though in reference to Christ, is expressed by Jeremias, when he said: "A virtuous branch rising out of the family of David, and one who'd reign as true king and save his people." Ezekiel, another great prophet and a contemporary of Jeremias, added his support to this viewpoint when he declared: "he foresaw a time when a future king would be a true shepherd, and gather together a scattered nation." These prophesies were fulfilled in Christ.

The prophetic message of the angel at the Annunciation "the Lord God shall give unto him the throne of David His father, and he shall reign in the house of Jacob forever, and of His kingdom there will be no end," adds the heavenly seal to His kingly role. And He, Himself, when questioned by Pilate in the face of death answered: "I am a king." Jesus did indeed succeed to the throne of David, but with the difference that His rule and His kingdom would last forever. After Jesus made His entry on the world scene and gathered His flock, He gave His life to establish a kingdom that would never end.

St. Paul in the second reading spells out the greatness of Jesus by telling us, He is the image of the unseen God. Then, he gives the purpose of His coming, namely, to establish His kingdom, and bring salvation to all. And he goes on to explain how Christ, by the shedding of his blood, freed man from the powers of darkness. You might say, Jesus opened the door into His kingdom, and thereby gave man the option of accepting His invitation to become part of God's Body, His Church. You know with ordinary bodily functions that each and every faculty must co-operate for the wellbeing of the whole body. Likewise, if you hope to fulfil your role in the Church, you must concur with God's appointed plan. Just as the body responds to every beat as the life-blood pours through every vein and fibre, so too the spirit of Christ

should animate Christ's Body, the Church.

You regularly hear people on TV openly declare that they reject Christ's teachings on certain moral matters, and choose to live by their own standards. Well, wherever their feet are resting, you may safely accept that they rest not within the foundations of the church! I leave conscience for another time, but I believe many people are fooling themselves: they will not fool God. Of course, I know it is not always easy, but then, we are at war, and we must always be on our guard from dangers from ourselves as well as from without. God's kingdom is not of this world, but my! it is worth fighting for.

THE MASTER OF SALVATION

In the Gospel, Jesus hanging on the cross is declared king of the Jews. Even in His agony, He did not forget His mission. He granted eternal life to the good thief, who believed, and thereby proclaimed the purpose of His Sacrifice, man's salvation.

We cannot, having witnessed the Divine Mercy in action, but be inspired with confidence in the working out of our own future. His words were not a mere promise, but a statement from the Master of Salvation. He showed us too that death is the gateway to life, and thereby extracted the sting of fear and uncertainty. Life is indeed changed, but it is not ended. "This day you will be with me in Paradise." It is told of a lady who died in the recent past in our midst. She tried to rise in her bed of sickness, and cried "Jesus do take me" only to fall back lifeless on the bed: the smile never left her face. Mostly, we stifle and try to keep our meeting with God out of our minds, which is a great pity and a great loss.

We should never forget our end. By all means we have to work in order to live, but always, always with journey's end in mind. The words of last Sunday's Preface sums up the meaning of sharing in the life of Christ. It is "a kingdom of truth and life, a kingdom of holiness and grace, a kingdom of justice, love and peace." It is up to each of us to strive to live as a son of God, and, as Paul said, "put on Christ," which means opening our hearts to Jesus, and asking Him to take possession of our very being. You will be a new person, and so filled with the love of God that it will spill over into the lives of your neighbours. We have a great and a good God. He is our Maker. He is our Saviour, He is our friend. Give Him your hand, and He'll lead you safely to the green pastures in His Heavenly Kingdom.

CONCERN AT GARDA CUTS

Lismore Town Commissioners have expressed their concern at a cut in the permanent Garda strength in the town and surrounds. Their disquiet reflects the feelings of the general public and West Waterford business community at any reductions in Garda strength. At a special meeting on last Thursday night the Commissioners had before them replies to letters which they had addressed on the subject to the officers of the Minister for Justice and the Garda Commissioner. The content of both was merely an acknowledgement of the communication received and a statement that the matter was receiving attention. It was the opinion of all members that these replies were totally unsatisfactory, and that this very urgent matter should continue to be pressed in all possible ways. It was pointed out by several members that, not alone in Lismore, but in the neighbouring towns of Tallow and Cappoquin, that financial institutions and business houses would be increasingly vulnerable if such cuts became operational. Finally it was decided to communicate with the Oireachtas members in the constituency urging them to make representations against any reductions in Garda strength in the strongest possible terms.

In a perfect world they would have liked a longer gap between the two acquisitions, from the point of view of getting fine details out to shareholders, but they could not set their own pace in these matters and they took the opportunities as they presented themselves.

It remains a fact that the company expanded by design, in response to its well-publicised plan.

We wish to voice our protest and dismay at the manner by which Sterling Drug treated people following their fairly recent big advertisement.

At the time one thought, great, 40 or 50 jobs, endeavouring to fulfil their promise of X number of jobs within a specified time, my son being one of the fortunate or unfortunates who had two interviews, at the expense of time off work. His next and surely one would imagine his last step being a medical and on the same day an X-ray in Ardkeen Hospital, emphasising its urgency. Having had work conditions explained with interimpeccable views, references, and a clear medical, he eagerly awaited letter giving a starting date. Yes, a letter did arrive but stating candidates with more experience and qualifications (in what) would be filling the positions. It took two interviews and a medical to determine that! The irony of the whole farce was that whilst my son and two others whose parents feel exactly as I do, were awaiting their X-rays in Waterford, six of the seven or eight people being given employment were already notified to start work. I fail to see the logic in this.

ceived. Unable to convince me by repeating the letter contents, he pointed out that it was not company policy to discuss an individual case, adding that references had to be checked. Imagine checking one's references after a medical, inferring his references were inferior; not just casting a slur on my son but also on the referees. The fact is these people weren't even

contacted. Totally dissatisfied, I wrote to the General Manager, with the signatures of two more irate parents and a meeting was arranged with me presenting my own case. Again I found him pleasant, but he took more or less the same line to justify their deed, adding that it would not happen again, clearly to defuse the situation, but unable to explain satisfactorily the totally different and contradictory reasons for my son's failure to secure the position.

LOCAL **ELECTIONS IN** 1990?

Whether or not local elections will take place in 1990 has been a subject which has merited quite a deal of publicity in recent months. As a matter of fact it has been used a few times in press reports with the obvious view of stirring up trouble between the political parties in the present government arrangement - Fianna Fail and Progressive Democrats. Would-be political pundits have been focussing on the matter by pointing out that while the PD's are anxious to see the elections go ahead - it is, according to law, an election year alwas a sum of £30,000 to cover the cost of the elections but this has been reduced by £10,000 as the Council, as an economy measure, decided not to issue polling cards for the elections.

Perhaps the information given by Mr. Ger Connolly, Minister of State, in the Dail within the past fortnight may be relevant. In reply to a question put down by Deputy E. Gilmore as to whether local elections would be held on their due date in June 1990, he stated that under the law local elections were due to be held next June and the question of postponement had not been considered as it did not arise.

There the matter should rest for the moment at any rate.



Monitoring Operation Reduced Poaching On Colligan River

which has 40 paid up members, has actively monitored fishing on the Colligan River.

During winter 1988 and spring of '89 teams of club members kept watch on a regular basis on the river to minimise, in so far as possible, interference with spawning and running of fish. The monitoring operation proved very successful and prevented the poaching activities of known poachers on the river. Club members liaised on a regular basis with Officers of the Fishery Board and were given great assistance by the Gardai from Dungarvan as well as Fishery Protection Officers.

Members reported that there was a large amount of salmon/sea trout reds visible on the river bed during the spawning season. Notwithstanding the large amount of fish in the river, catches were poor. This was attributable to the extremely low water levels during the long hot summer.

The monitoring operation resulted in the prevention of large scale netting which used to take place in former years in the vicinity of the Ballyneety Bridge to Kiladangan Bridge stretch. Members reported that the first run of fish of about 200 sea trout appeared on the lower stretches of the river in early May. A reasonable catch of fish was reported in May/June. MAIN FISH RUN At the end of June 1989 due to increased rainfall water levels increased and this resulted in the main run of sea trout and several grilse appearing in the river. During July and August it is estimated that several thousand sea trout entered the river. Over the entire summer period in

During this year the club, spite of low water levels there was a constant run of fish into the river.

Members feel that this was attributable to the absence of netting/poaching on the estuarine water. The curtailment of poaching meant a steady run of fish into the river uninterrupted during the year. The fact that Helvick Pier was closed early in the season meant that the Helvick trawlers had to operate out of Dungarvan harbour. It is known that the coming and going of the trawlers from Dungarvan harbour resulted in the poachers who net the inner harbour not being able to carry out their activities as in other years and many nets were destroyed by the trawlers coming to and going from Dungarvan harbour.

During early September there was a flood on the river and this resulted in a good number

salmon/sea trout entering the river. A number of convictions for poaching were recorded during the year in the Courts.
