STORM DAMAGE **It's Beyond Council's Financial Ability To Repair**

In a preliminary report dated December 21, Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, has set out the extensive damage to coastal protection, marine structures, roads, car parks and amenity schemes along the entire Waterford coastal area by the storm on December 16/17 last. The report was considered by members of the County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungaryan last Monday.

The report stated that in tensive flooding. many areas the damage and consequential flooding was worse than anything in living memory. Damage included very severe erosion and/or breaching of sand dune protective barri-ers; demolition of sleeper protection barriers; damage aprons or slipways; demolition of car parks and amenity areas; ripping of road surfaces; blocking of roads and car parks with sand, gravel, rocks and ex-

Listed as the worst affected areas were:

Whiting Bay, Ardmore, Cunnigar, Dungarvan, Clonea, Ballyvoile, Bunmahon, Annestown, Benvoy, Kilfarrassey, Garrarus, Tramore, Clohernagh, Creaden Head, Rathmoyto sea walls and concrete lan/Ballymacaw, Dunmore East, Woodstown, Passage East, Portlaw, Glencorran and Ballymacart. Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy HAVE YOU HEARD OF THE

FOURTH KING?

Christmas is over, and already we're wondering what the New Year will bring. Anyhow, whether it is back to the old routine or not, we can all pray and hope that it will be a happier and a better year for everyone. God likes help, so let us play our part in taking the Christmas message along with us. The Epiphany theme is an ideal to be adopted. Hence, we might well listen to the readings for the feast. Isaiah in the first is so filled with joy at the thoughts of Christ's coming that he is unable to restrain his feelings. He must tell others. He must stir up his listeners, and make them eager to share in this great blessing. St. Paul in the second is saying, your welfare and your life rest with God. Trust Him. He is your friend. Indeed, He announced the good news first to the Jews, but He made it clear that Salvation was for all peoples without distinction. The Incarnation, which was manifested through a star, was the start of the process. The Gospel by the example of the wise kings shows us how to walk in the light. They not only recognised their Lord, but falling on their knees they worshipped Him, and paid Him due homage.

Jesus told us that the unique adoration to God must be given to no other. "You must worship the Lord your God, and serve Him alone." The Magi found Jesus through the light from a star, but that same light did not disperse the darkness from Herod's mind. We are the Magi of today. We have seen the light, and we follow. I would suggest as we journey along that we use O. Henry's Christmas story as our guide. He wrote that a fourth king had agreed with the other three to meet at Karbala, the place where the sages predicted the star would appear. The three arrived on time, and they grew anxious when the star appeared, and began to move. They had no option, but to follow. The fourth king had set off in good time, but met up with a traveller who had been waylaid, beaten and robbed; and he felt he could not leave him until he was well enough to travel. When eventually he himself reached the appointed place, he found his brother kings had been and gone. He read the signs, and the direction they had taken.

He hastened to try and make the rendezvous, and, having failed, he prudently called for a rest to prepare for the morrow. He and his men were under way at first light, but though hurrying, they failed to over-take them. Eventually, after facing dangers and enduring trials, they entered Jerusalem. The king sensed something was in the air, and sent a few of his men to scout around. Soon, they returned with the news that the three kings had gone to Bethlehem. The trouble was, they promised to return to Herod, but after six days they failed to show up. He decided to leave quietly, and head for David's city. Disappointment awaited him. The three kings had already left; and Joseph with Mary and the child had fled to Egypt. He was at the inn when a soldier with a bloody sword rushed in and was about to kill the child, when he cried: "no, spare the child and this pearl is yours." The city was filled with wailing, and they joined to avert attention. One could feel sorry for this good king. He'd received the light, and responded despite the hardship he'd to face. Yes, down into Egypt he went, but success did not await him. One

day as he passed by the slave market in Cairo he heard a cry in his own tongue, and stopped to watch a young man being offered to the highest bidder. Again, he offered a pearl of great price, and succeeded with his bid. The young man was to prove useful. When the king explained his mission, the young man was able to tell him that he'd slaved on the river-front at Cairo, and that a man named Joseph was often called upon to repair the boats. He sighed as he said: "he was a good man." Everyone was sad, when a different carpenter turned up one day, and said "Joseph and his family had returned to Palestine."

FULFILMENT IN HEAVEN

After months of weary travel the good king was once more back in the streets of Jerusalem. He was on his way to the inn, when he heard cries for help. He realised the cries came from a house engulfed in flames. He rushed fearlessly into the flames, and fell down over-come and choked by the fumes. He was heard to say as he lay dying, "Oh! Lord, I have sought to find you, but to no avail." A voice was heard to reply: "My son, you found me when you helped the abandoned traveller. You found me when you saved the babe at Bethlehem. You found me in the market place at Cairo. And now, you have found me amidst the flames in Jerusalem. Your searching is over. Your love has reached its fulfilment in Heaven."

The Sunday readings are telling us that we are now the new Magi. We follow the light from the star of faith. And, as we journey through the highways and byeways of life, we, like the fourth king, have but one goal, namely, to find God in all we do. Hence, whether we speak or sing, work or play, kneel or stand, we try to do everything in God's honour. And, it is not merely the offering of external works. We give them with our whole being. The wise kings showed us how to act in the presence of God. Humbly we follow in their footsteps. Our homage, our worship will confer no benefit to God, but it will help us to grow stronger in our love. The more we express that love in kindness, gentleness and faithfulness, the closer we will draw to our final fulfilment.

Warning At Lismore Court For Drunk Driving Motorists

Motorists who were convicted on charges of drunk driving during the coming year received a warning at Lismore Court last Wednesday (January 3) that having been disqualified for the mandatory period of twelve months they would not have their driving licences automatically restored after six months.

District Justice W. F. O'-Connell who issued the warning, said that motorists need not expect to walk into his courts in the coming year and walk out again with their driving licences restored after serving only half the mandatory period. He said that in assessing each application for restoration he would take a whole range of circumstances into consideration before making a decision.

District Justice O'Connell added that motorists who exceeded the legal limit by a wide margin or who did not co-operate with the gardai when arrested

A 37-year-old Dungarvan motorist who punched one off-duty Cashel Garda in the chest and gave another Garda a bloody nose when they attempted to bring him to Cashel Garda Station, appeared before District Justice W. F. O'Connell, at a recent sitting of Cashel Court.

John Torrence, Clonea House, Clonea, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty to charges of assaulting Garda Noel O'Brien and Garda John Ryan on July 16 last at Boherclough Street, Cashel.

The defendant also pleaded guilty to charges of failing to provide a specimen of blood or urine and driving a Land Rover and horse box while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Garda Noel O'Brien said

that he came across the de- car but Garda Ryan got a fendant slumped over the wheel of his Land Rover. The defendant was very drunk. Garda O'Brien said that he was off duty at the time. He introduced himself and a struggle ensued. Witness received a number of punches in the chest.

Garda Ryan was passing at the time and he came to his assistance. Garda Ryan was also off duty. They succeeded in getting the defendant into the patrol He paid compensation for

DAIL DEBATE The Plight Of **Tanning Industry** In Ireland

In a recent Debate in the Dail, Deputy Austin Deasy referred to the plight of the tanning industry in Ireland.

Mr. Deasy: Ten years ago over 1,200 people were employed in the tanning industry. Today the number is barely 100, despite a huge increase in cattle slaughtering resulting from the phasing out of live exports. In addition, the quality of hides nowadays is far superior because of advanced skinning techniques and the virtual elimination of the warble fly. The Government proposed to create jobs using native raw material wherever possible, but the reality is very much the reverse where tannery jobs are concerned. The traditional tannery towns of Carrick-on-Suir and Portlaw have been devastated by unemployment. I challenge any Member of this House to tell me that there is a town in their constituency which has a higher rate of unemployment than either Carrick-on-Suir or Portlaw. I could virtually say that Portlaw is a ghost town because of the collapse of the tanning industry there, which was better known as Irish Leathers. Carrick-on-Suir is not much better. In my own town of Dungarvan there was an announcement this week that the 55 jobs in the local tannery are going to be reduced by 15. Even at that it is still the largest tanning enterprise in the country. I am aware that there is also some tanning of leather going on in Clonmel by the Ronan family, but it is all very minor in comparison to what we had. The extent of the treatment of hides is not what it should be. I am not criticising those doing

it, but there is enormous scope for further value added in this sphere. Instead of having 100 jobs we could have several thousand jobs if we processed the raw material to its ultimate value. If the full value added product, that is finished leather and leather goods, such as shoes and. clothes, were manufactured in Ireland we could have thousands of extra jobs.

The related meat industry has gone ahead in leaps and bounds while the processing of the by-product --- the hide — has virtually stopped. The vast majority of hides are exported and we then buy them back as the finished product at a multiple of the original cost. We may get a measly few million pounds for the hides we export, but more than likely we buy back leather clothes, shoes and handbags for hundreds of millions of pounds. These products are manufactured in countries such as Germany and Italy and fetch premium prices. It is abso- Italian industrialists are lutely incomprehensible and extraordinary that we cannot have a tanning industry which will bring the raw material to the final stage for manufacturing purposes and that manufacturing itself is not carried out in this country. As I said, seeing that the meat industry, a related industry, has advanced so far, it is hard to believe that the tanning industry has gone backwards.

will have to be a green field operation; there is no doubt about this. The fact is that tanning is very harmful to the environment. There is a very high environmental risk involved, and I can foresee problems setting up a new tanning industry. It has caused problems and with a growing awareness of the value of a clean environment it is going to be extraordinarily difficult to set up a tanning industry which will satisfy the environmentalists, but it has to be done. As I said, it is ten years since the industry first got into serious trouble. I am not criticising anybody because previous Governments as well as this one have to face the same problems in attracting foreign investment and I am aware that the IDA have been trying hard, I wonder if they have been trying hard enough.

ICMSA President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, has warned farmers to avoid exceeding their quotas at all costs. He said that if the present level is maintained - 3.5% above out national quota - we will be faced with a national bill of £4.5 million.

EVANGELICAL GROUPS AND "BORN AGAIN" CHRISTIANS

Dear Sir,

On a recent Pat Kenny Show on RTE Radio 1, concern was expressed by a number of correspondents and callers regarding "born again" Christians and evangelical Christian groups. This concern, mainly from parents, centred primarily on the problem of young people joining such groups and leaving those churches in which they had been brought up. For many, the fear that their son or daughter may be involved with a cult is very real. As an ordained minister in a historic denomination and a lecturer in an evangelical Bible College, I had an opportunity to respond on air to some of these fears. I was able to state that, contrary to the opinions of some, evangelicalism is not a new phenomena in Ireland. It

has existed as a part of Irish religious life for centuries (it is the cults that are relatively new in Ireland), although in more recent years there has been an increased activity by evangelicals in terms of evangelisation and mission. Also, I was able to explain what evangelicals believe, and something of the significance of the term "born again".

There are extremists in every religious grouping, and evangelicals are no exception. However, the vast majority of evangelical Christian leaders and pastors are responsible people. Their lives and activities are open to public scrutiny, and it is to be hoped that they always conduct themselves as honest and upright citizens. And as such, they should be willing at any time to explain their beliefs and actions to anyone who asks. I would, therefore, encourage any of you who may be deeply concerned about the involvement of a son or daughter or even a friend in a particular group to go and talk with its leaders. In this way you will be able to find out who they are and what they are about, and from this you will know whether the

group in question is a bona fide evangelical Christian group or a cult. And if you should feel that you are not sufficiently qualified to do this yourself, then take someone along with you who is.

If any leaders claiming to be evangelicals, refuse to talk with you or have encouraged those with them to dissociate from their families, the evangelical community, and in particular its leaders, would view this with extreme concern. Evangelicals are not cultists, nor would they want to identify themselves with any who, while claiming to be evangelical, engage in cult-like activities. Alternatively, if you do not feel that you could approach the leaders of a particular group, I would be very happy to help you in whatever way I can in terms of information and advice. POSTAGE RATES NOW 4th HIGHEST IN EC

The new postage rates which came into operation on January 1 now gives us the dubious honour of having the fourth highest postal charges in Europe. Letter post was upped by 2p to 26p and 30p while provincial newspapers now cost an extra 2p to send to the UK.

When the matter was raised in the Dail on December 31, Dr. Woods, deputising for the Minister Communications. for agreed that Ireland was now ranked fourth in the EC postal charges table and he said that these charges reflected the operating costs of An Post, almost 80 per cent of which consisted of payroll and related costs.

A number of deputies referred to the grave widespread concern felt by the ordinary people who would be affected by the increased cost of communicating by letter writing and particularly by the business community at the adverse impact which the increased charges would have on business performances and competitiveness in the year ahead.

Deputy Jim Mitchell made the point that the old postal charges were already too high and that the formula laid out for the success of An Post was to increase the volume of postage. This had not happened and the reason for this was, he said, because of the poor quality of the postal service.

When Minister Woods attempted to make a case for the quality of service which An Post provides, the best he could do was to accept that there was scope for improvement and that such an improvement was obviously very important. The Minister's remarks prompted Deputy Mitchell to retort, "it is a disaster".

The increased cost of posting local newspapers drew a protest from the West of Ireland Newspapers Group which accused

quality of service provided by An Post made during the Dail discussion on the sub-

ject. Dungarvan is a case in point. Being the County town it is strange that we do not have a top grade Post Office located here while it also appears to be understaffed for counter service which results in constant delays and more often than not, especially at peak times, frustrating queues.

Paddy Kenneally, himself an enthusiastic and regular racegoer, interjected, "they had no choice in the matter, they got no tender for it!"

Whether or which, the fact that the racecourse has been saved for the foreseeable future can only be good news for racegoers.

cember when the total stood at 231,128 while on another page we read: "IDA Predicts A Boom For The Nineties". This headed a story which stated that the IDA now predicted that the jobs despair of the eighties would give way to boom times in the early

nineties! Whatever can be said of the IDA, it cannot be denied that they always take the optimistic view. They invariably claim to be "on target" in providing the jobs which they forecast at various times. The Government, too, are old hands at looking at the jobs scene through rose tinted glasses. But the fact is that in the claims which the IDA and the Government make concerning improvements in unemployment, the figures given make very little sense when put beside the negative factor of emigration.

People who have to live with unemployment and emigration will not be fooled by the misleading propaganda intended to show that the unemployment problem is really being solved.

While we accept that in general, the economy of the country is improving, we would appreciate more honesty by State and Semi-State agencies when they issue statistics and figures on jobs and unemployment. The public are not as gullible as some people seem to think and in future their claims would carry more credibility if they were based on accurate information which would take all aspects of the problem, the unemployment figures, the extent of involuntary emigration and the number of jobs created, into consideration.

Know Your Rights

Q. - I am an unmarried mother claiming the Unmarried Mothers Allowance, (UMA). I am interested in taking up a place on a FAS Teamwork Scheme. How would my participation in such a scheme affect my claim for UMA?

A. - Your UMA claim will be affected by your taking up the scheme but it will not be withdrawn entirely. In effect your participation in the scheme is a 'change of circumstances' which must be notified to Social Welfare.

You can notify the Department by getting a letter from the Teamwork sponsor stating when the Scheme begins and what your gross wage will be.

As childminding is an allowable expense, you should get a letter from your childminder stating the weekly cost to you of this service.

Send these two letters and your UMA book along with a covering letter stating the amount of travel expenses, (which are also allowable) to:

> The Pensions Service Office, College Road, Sligo. Tel. (01) 748444 or (071) 69800.

You will receive a new book back with the reduced rate of UMA payable to you while you are on the Teamwork Scheme.

Three points to note are:

(1) That you should still receive your fuel vouchers while in the scheme;

(2) Your income from the scheme will be less than the Tax Free Allowance per week which you are allowed as a single parent, so you shouldn't have to pay tax;

(3) While you will be insured at the Class A rate, as a UMA claimant you will not have to pay the Employees share of PRSI. You should check this with the Teamwork sponsor. You should also let the Department know whether the Teamwork sponsor intends to deduct the Employers PRSI contribution from the £60 gross rate. Most Teamwork sponsors exercise this option and it does reduce the nett rate of pay.

When the scheme finishes, you should send your book back to Social Welfare with a letter from the sponsor stating the date of termination of the scheme. You should receive your book, restored to the full pre-Teamwork allowance within, at most, a fortnight. If you send off your book on the Thursday you make your last week's claim, Social Welfare will endeavour to get it back to your Post Office within a week.

Ewe Premium Changes Will Help Sheep Farmers

The decision of the E.C. Sheepmeat Management Committee to pay a 60% advance of the 1990 ewe premium to all sheep farmers throughout the country along with the 1989 ewe premium payment next year has been welcomed by the Chairman of the IFA National sheep Committee, Mr. Tom Parlon.

Under the current arrangements advance payments of the Premium are only available to farmers in disadvantaged areas. This year farmers received a 50% advance payment of £9.50 per eligible ewe.

He added: "This broadening of the advance payment system will be a major help to the cash flow of Irish sheep farmers as 30% of the advance payment will be 30% in December 1990." The payments will be based on the number of eligible ewes on farms next Spring which will be inspected by personnel from the Department of Agriculture & Food. Farmers are advised that they must have their application forms for the premia submitted to the Department of Agriculture & Food by March 1, 1990, at the lat-

MASTITIS

The risk of E Coli mastitis is very high before calving. Make sure that cubicles are kept clean and dry. Concrete cubicles should be bedded with ground limestone or straw, preferably chopped.

SUPER LEVY

As the quota situation is now very serious in the county, farmers who are well over quota should manage supplies to be on quota on April 1. Late calving cows should be dried off and cows after calving should receive low levels of meal feeding. New milk should of course be fed to calves.

CALF REARING You need to get the calf house in order now. Clean out and thoroughly disinfect the entire house including floors, walls, open divisions, gates, roof, etc. Check the ventilation - the calf needs plenty of fresh air but no draughts.

Decide on your feeding programme if either new milk or milk replacer and the calf ration you are going to use. SILAGE FEEDING It is important to match the feeding face area to the stocking rate in order to minimise secondary heating at the silage face. Do not disrupt the face removing silage with grabs or front loaders for easy feeding. The cover should not be rolled back from the top until the silage is ready to use. Keep fresh silage in front of stock at all times. WINTER CEREALS Late sown crops are susceptible to damage from slugs. The risk is higher after grass and root crops.

Torn leaves, bare patches in fields are symptoms of slug damage. Bait placed under in polythene bags will bring slugs to the surface. Slug pellets should be spread where necessary.

SHEEP

Fat ewes in mid pregnancy can be allowed to lose some weight with safety. Thin ewes being outwintered on grass should now get some hay or roots. Ideally ewes should be housed. At housing they should be dry and free from lameness. Ewes within three to four weeks of lambing being housed for the first time should be trained to their indoor diet before going indoors.

MOTIONS

With about one third of the county conventions now held, there appears to be very little concern about the introduction of the compromise playing rules. I also understand that of the remaining counties, only a small number have motions tabled on the subject. I suppose, like Waterford, most of the counties are leaving it to the others to submit motions to change. In the expectation that there would be a flood of motions calling for change of playing rules, the Central Council took the unprecedented step of adding another night to Congress in order to allow sufficient time for discussion. As far as we are concerned, the matter will have to be discussed now by the County Board as delegates to Congress will have to be instructed as to how they will vote on the rules-change

motions.

The absence of motions dealing with the above is not the only surprising feature of the agenda for convention. The expected 'flood' of motions seeking a return to the knock-out system in the championship

did not materialise and only two motions - one from Lismore in hurling and from Ballinacourty in football are listed for discussion. Even having regard for the fact that eventually it will be the County Board who will de-

cide on such matters, it was expected that more clubs would try to test the feeling of others on the subject. In the next couple of

weeks, readers will be kept informed on convention matters as news becomes available.

Western Board secretary Anthony Walsh has his very comprehensive report published in good time and clubs will have an opportunity of discussing the bits that interest and concern them, at their meetings before convention.



In the course of his very comprehensive report to this year's Western Convention, Western Board Secretary, Anthony Walsh states: "It is pleasing of course to place on record, that there exists within the Division, many clubs of the right calibre and there is now scarcely a club who cannot claim "a field of their own." Yet we cannot turn a blind eye to the fact that there still exists a number who remain clubs in name only. The number is getting smaller each passing year but the fact that such still exist hardly calls for complacency.

"Perhaps it is high time year under review, the that we took a closer look at affiliations in the light of late withdrawals, non fulfilment of fixtures, unavailability of players, more so in 1989 than in previous years. Affiliations should be curtailed where necessary in order that we can have meaningful competitions at all levels and in both codes. Let's maintain uniformity and avoid the unsatisfactory situation which again prevailed in 1989, where in order to make up teams, juveniles are pressed into "under 21" and indeed adult grades. This surely is not in accord with the promotion of playing standards and more often than not, it has the diverse effect of holding up and prolonging an already over-burdened championship programme. "If we have too many teams and grades then surely it would be in the best interest of all to streamline and gauge what is best for the overall good and playing standards." **CONDUCT AND** DISCIPLINE On conduct and discipline the report says: "Considering the fact that what must constitute an all time record number of games played under the auspices of the Board during the

number of breaches of good conduct were virtually non existent. However, unsavoury incidents that necessitated Board action did take place and while they were few and far between, the fact that they took place at all, should be a good reason for greater vigilance and attention in the future. STORM DAMAGE It's Beyond **Council's Financial Ability To Repair**

stated: "The immediate cost of remedial works is estimated at £325,000. However, the expending of such funds will not provide adequate future protection. Rock armouring at the critical locations listed above as well as remedial works at the many other locations would cost an estimated £4.75 million, while the provision of more costly sea walls at the critical locations would raise the cost to an estimated £11.5 million. Our Estimates in 1989 and 1990 allow £20,000 for Coast Protection, so obviously the cost of remedial works must be funded externally from the State or the E.C.

A report from the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, dated January 8, stated that a reserved preliminary estimate indicated the cost of clean up and emergency repairs, repair of sea defence barriers and repairs to car parks, roads, etc. to come to a total of £745,000. "The extent of the damage done," the report then stated," is beyond the financial ability of the Council to repair and unless assistance is forthcoming I see no option but to limit our over expenditure to the clean up and emergency work currently being carried out. This will result in many access points to beaches being closed off, car parking being restricted and sea defences remaining unrepaired."

GOVERNMENT MUST RESPOND

When Cllr. B. Kyne asked whether there had been any progress to the Council's request to the Government for financial help, the County Engineer said that they had received no indication as yet nor had his problem, in the near future.

colleagues in the other maritime counties affected received any either.

Cllr. Kyne said that major damage had been done to such places as Bonmahon by the storm and in the circumstances he said the Minister would have to respond. "There is a problem in the south-east as a result of the storm and an investment now could save this maritime area. However if it is not done then we could be in very serious difficulties as it is not beyond the bounds of possibility that we could have another major storm," he said.

Cllr. James A. Walsh agreed that the Government would have to make a response as they had an emergency situation which must be dealt with.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Hurley said that there should be a concerted effort by all the counties involved to obtain EC or Government funds needed for the repairs. "The work cannot be funded by the Local Authorities and it will need a lot of concerted political pressure on the Government to obtain the necessary funds to carry out there repairs," he said.

Cllr. Jackie Fahey T.D. said that the problem was a two-tier-one. First, there was a lot of urgent work to be carried out but secondly some preventive measures would also have to be taken to prevent a recurrence of the damage in the future.

The discussion ended with the Chairman, Cllr. Michael Queally, expressing the hope that they would have a response from the Minister for the Environment that he would receive a deputation from the Council to discuss the
