Councillors Rap Dungarvan's Poor Postal Services

The manner in which the public was treated at the local Post Office in Dungarvan over the pre-Christmas period was an absolute disgrace said Cllr. Tony Wright at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last Monday night.

His remark came in a discussion initiated by Cllr. Nuala Ryan who asked whether there was a reason for the late delivery of letters in the Abbeyside area during the period. She said that it was often after 5 o'clock in the evening when mail was delivered and where urgent matters were concerned this gave no chance of making a same day reply.

Cllr. Wright said that this was the first Christmas that no extra workers were

taken on by the local Post Office to help in deliveries. As a result in his area in town letters were being delivered up to 11 o'clock at night and this was not good enough.

And referring to the standard of counter service at the Post Office, Cllr. Wright said that the situation there was worse than at the town Labour Exchange in the way people had to queue out on the street in the cold and rain waiting to get stamps and other services while inside two or three of

the service hatches were closed. "It was an absolute disgrace the way the public was treated and we should protest against it in the strongest possible terms," he said.

Cllr. P. Power, Chairman, said that he understood that An Post were trying to cut down on the number of postmen employed in Dungarvan.

Cllr. B. Kyne said that the population of Dungarvan had exploded and the town had grown and expanded to such a degree in recent years that the existing staff at the Post Office were no longer able to cope.

Cllr. Mary Dixon remarked that while we had a new post office, the service was the same as it had been

Home From US And Caught For Drunk Driving

A 25-year-old man home on holidays from America was fined £120 and disqualified for 12 months when he was convicted on a charge of drunk driving by District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Dungarvan Court last week.

He was John Walsh whose address was given as 45 Mayfield, Zenack, New Jersey, USA. The case was dealt with in his absence.

Gda N. Clifford of the Traffic Corps gave evidence that at 12.55 a.m. on December 30 he was on check-point duty and flashed a light at an on-coming car to stop. The car made to stop but then pulled away again. Witness said that he then gave chase and caught the driver who was John Walsh at Garranbane outside Dungarvan. Walsh smelled of drink and having spoken to

him, witness formed the opinion that he was under the influence. He arrested Walsh and took him to Dungarvan Garda Station where he was charged.

Supt. R. McAndrews who prosecuted said that when initially charged, the defendant had pleaded guilty and lodged recognisances. He had since returned to the U.S.

District Justice O'Connell having imposed the fine of £120 and the driving ban directed that the conviction be endorsed and ordered that the amount of the fine be deducted from the sum lodged by the defendant.

Supt. Ray McAndrews, the newly appointed garda superintendent for the Dungarvan Garda District, was formally welcomed by District Justice W. F. O'Connell when he made his first appearance at Dungarvan Court last week.

District Justice O'Connell referred to the fact that in the past, Dungarvan had been singularly fortunate in the high calibre of the garda officers who had served there and he said he came to them from the Dublin Metropolitan area would maintain and even embellish the standard of service rendered by his predecessors.

Mr. E. P. King, Solr. (J. F. Williams and Co.) speaking on behalf of his legal

Ms. Mairead O'Neill on behalf of the District Court staff associated herself with the expressions of welcome.

Replying, Supt. McAndrews thanked the District Justice, Mr. King and Mairead O'Neill for extending such a gracious welcome to him. He said he was conscious of the outstanding relationships that existed locally between the District Justice, the members of the legal profession and the gardai and he would do nothing to mar that. "I look forward with pleasure to serving in Dungarvan," he added.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

**YOU WILL ONLY HAVE YOURSELF
TO BLAME!**

Whether one is the choice of the people or of a select body etc., one experiences satisfaction and elation. When one, seeking an appointment, presents oneself for interview, and then is later recalled, after six others had been through the same procedure, to be informed that the position was his, that one would feel like clapping oneself on the back. Likewise, the man who, desiring to serve his country, presents himself to the electorate whom he'd wooed for many months, would rejoice should victory come his way. Again, the young and beautiful maiden, whose hand is sought by many would-be lovers, is over-joyed when finally she is led to the altar by the man of her dreams. One could go on almost indefinitely relating cases of choice and selection, where the victor glories in success, and the also rans baffle their disappointments, and nurse their hurts.

Certainly, one could not but admire people for the spirit, the tenacity, the effort and the hardships they display and endure to achieve success. Yet! when it comes to answering God's call, and seeking work in His service we are not the same people. We'd really grumble if God had His favourites. He calls all to follow Him, and find greatness in His heavenly kingdom. Remember, He will not force you into His service. The choice is yours.

St. Paul tries to gain our attention and goad us into action by reminding us of the greatness of the heavenly reward. However, for the present, let us take a closer look at last Sunday's readings. In the first, Isaiah is asking the people to serve God. He proclaims that the Messiah would soon come among them, and bless all peoples with His peace and enlightenment. He'd no doubt about the fact and the purpose of His coming. He even signified that He'd be of David's stock, and that His arrival was almost nigh. He wanted the people to abandon their sinful ways, turn back to God and be ready and waiting. And, he explained that he'd been chosen to bring them this good news.

Paul like Isaiah stresses that he too had been chosen to preach the Gospel, but do not overlook the fact that his listeners were also chosen to embrace the same life of holiness. Yes, we are God's chosen people. Through Baptism we have been born into the new life of grace. It follows we have a duty to live and to sustain this new life, and share our light with those who live in darkness.

In the Gospel, John the Baptist recognises that Jesus is the promised Messiah. "I have seen Him

and I can bear testimony." Many of his own disciples had asked him, if he were the Christ, but he made it clear that he was not the one. John was the one chosen to declare that Christ was the fulfilment of prophesy. He was the one who unveiled Jesus. For when He came to him for Baptism, he pointed to Him and said: "Behold the Lamb of God." His listeners would readily have understood the reference and the implication. He was reminding them that their forefathers were saved by the blood of the lamb, and he was telling them through his prophetic words that the Lamb was once more to be the sign of their deliverance from the slavery of satan. He was telling them that Jesus was the one who'd free them from their sins.

THE MESSAGE OF JESUS IS CLEAR

When Jesus spoke to them later about giving Himself, the Lamb of God, as food, there's no doubt they understood His teaching, but they refused to believe Him. Jesus left them under no misunderstanding. He repeated His message. "Unless you eat my flesh and drink my blood, you will not have life in you." Had their forefathers not marked their door posts with the blood of the lamb, they'd have suffered the same fate as the Egyptians. The message of Jesus is clear. If you do not use the Bread of Heaven, you will fail to gain salvation. The crowd on the particular occasion were chosen, but great numbers of them refused to accept God's word. Too, Judas was chosen to be an Apostle, but he failed to live as a follower of Christ. It is a truth of our religion that God has called everyone to work in His service.

The readings then are saying to us: remember your calling. As you go through life, bear in mind the importance of saving your soul. People often get so involved in daily affairs that they forget all about their calling. Indeed, their lives are blazoned with achievements without ever a thought of the after life. True, the material world is not interested in God, so beware of the false prophets. God has called you. No one will offer you as much. If you fail, you fail yourself. We all know only too well the feelings of rejection. You perhaps have experienced being passed over for one of lesser ability. It happens. Life can be unjust. God does not work like that. He treats everyone fairly. He'd never refuse help when asked. Imagine a soul, who rejected God, standing before the Judgement Seat. He'll never know peace again; and he'll have to live with his remorse for all eternity.

A.I.B. Launches New Image

Allied Irish Bank last week launched its new corporate identity at a ceremony at Bankcentre, its Dublin headquarters. In future, the major associated bank will be known as AIB Group and its subsidiaries will be identified by the AIB prefix.

As a result, Allied Irish Investment Managers will, for the future, be known as AIB Investment Managers and so on with the bank's other divisions.

The other key feature of the change of corporate identity is a new four colour corporate symbol based on an early Celtic depiction of Noah's Ark.

To mark the new group identity, AIB is establishing a new awards fund, worth £1 million, to support groups making a significant contribution to the quality of life in Ireland. The AIB "Better Ireland Awards" will be presented annually commencing this year.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Q. — What is the difference between a Medical Card, a Hospital Services Card and a Long Term Illness Card?

A. — All three of the cards you mention are issued by your local health board. A brief outline of what is covered by each card is set out below.

MEDICAL CARD

A Medical Card is a person's proof of entitlement to a range of free health services. Your medical card must be presented whenever services without charge are being claimed. There is a means test to decide eligibility for a medical card but there is no fixed income limit as such and each case is considered on its merits.

The income guidelines presently in use are: Married couple (under 66) — £103.50; Single person living alone — £72; Single person living with family — £62.

In addition there are age allowances for those over 66 or over 80, child and dependents allowances, and allowances in respect of outgoings on your house and travelling expenses to work. Full details are given in the 1989 Social Welfare Rates Book which you may consult at your local CIC.

The Dept. of Health issued a circular in October 1989 recommending that applicants for medical cards should not be disqualified on the grounds of income from the Family Income Supplement or the Social Employment Scheme. It is not yet clear whether this recommendation is being taken up by the individual health boards.

HOSPITAL SERVICES CARD

If you are not entitled to a Medical Card and if in the previous tax year your income was less than £16,000, you would be eligible for the services provided for persons in Category 2. If you are in this category you may apply for a Hospital Services Card but your entitlement does not depend on your actually having the card. If your earnings were less than the qualifying amount, you could simply produce your P60 (End of year statement of earnings from your employer) at the hospital.

Your wife/husband will be separately assessed if s/he had an income in her/his own right in the qualifying year.

Where there are two incomes, the children will be regarded as dependents of the spouse with the higher income. Students aged under 25 who do not have Medical Cards are in Category 2, even though their parents may not be.

Certain people who were voluntary contributors to Social Insurance either on 31 March 1974 or 5 April 1979 may have an entitlement to Category 2 health services regardless of income.

LONG TERM ILLNESS CARD

Persons suffering from any of the following conditions can obtain without charge the drugs and medicines prescribed for the treatment of that condition:

Mental handicap, Mental illness (for persons under 16 only), Phenylketonuria (mental retardation in infancy), Spina Bifida, Hydrocephalous, Diabetes Mellitus, Diabetes Insipidus, Haemophilia, Cerebral Palsy, Epilepsy, Multiple Sclerosis, Muscular Dystrophies, Parkinsonism, Acute Leukaemia and Cystic Fibrosis. A person who suffers from any of the listed conditions may apply for a Long Term Illness Card. Asthma is not included on the list of illnesses covered by the Long Term Illness Card.

Jailed For Vicious Assault On His Mother

Noel Gray, an unemployed labourer, Main Street, Clogheen, appeared at Dungarvan Court in custody last week on a charge of assaulting his mother, Mrs. Nora Gray and causing her actual bodily harm at her home in Clogheen on the night of January 4. He pleaded guilty to a lesser charge of common assault which was accepted by District Justice W. F. O'Connell following agreement by Supt. R. McAndrews who prosecuted.

Garda P. Ryan, Clogheen stated in evidence that when he arrived at the Gray home on the night of January 4 he found Mrs. Gray seated shoeless in her car. She was trembling and was very shaken and distressed after being kicked about the body by her son. He said that Gray abused him and ordered him out of the house.

Garda Ryan went on to say that the situation in the Gray home was very bad and the gardai were being called there at all times of the night. Mrs. Gray, whom he described as a frail woman, was terrified of her son and had now gone to reside with her daughter in Ardfinnan. He added that the defendant had been bound to the peace last July.

Mr. B. Looby, Solr., who was assigned under the legal aid scheme said that Gray had a drink problem

and had been attending AA. He was off the drink for a period but had gone back on it again. He said that there were mutual tensions between the mother and son and the defendant accepted that he and his mother should not be living in the same house.

VICIOUS AND VIOLENT

Convicting the defendant, District Justice O'Connell described the assault as vicious and violent and said that Gray was lucky he was not before the Court on a more serious charge. "His mother is in grave danger from him and any undertakings he may now give will cut no ice with me," added the District Justice.

He then imposed a sentence of four months imprisonment and in addition bound Gray to keep the peace for a period of twelve months.

Department Want Full-Time Appointment For Part-Time Job

The appointment of a full-time veterinary Inspector for the County as required by the new Abattoirs Act was further discussed by Waterford Co. Council at the January meeting held in Dungarvan.

At a previous meeting it was agreed to see whether the appointment could be shared with either Waterford Corporation or Tipperary (S.R.) Co. Council.

A letter from the Veterinary Division of the Department of Agriculture

pointed out that a mandatory requirement of the Act made it essential to appoint one or more whole-time veterinary inspectors to carry out the functions required.

The County Secretary, Mr. B. J. McNally, report-

ed that it was found that the proposals for a sharing arrangement had proved not to be feasible and the Department had turned down a suggestion of a part-time appointment on the grounds that a full-time appointment was not justifi-

fied by the volume of work involved.

Cllr. James A. Walsh said that if the Department wanted to have a full-time post created for a part-time job then they should fund it and not expect the Council to pay for it.

On the recommendation of the Co. Manager, Mr. Hurley it was agreed to again write to the Department requesting that a departure from the strict regulations of the Act be permitted in this case as a full-time appointment was not warranted.

Church Call For Reduction In Church Gate Collections

Church authorities in Clonmel want to see a major reduction in the number of church gate collections held in the town on Sundays. According to SS Peter and Paul's Parish Priest, Canon Patrick Queally, some people are intimidated into supporting collections that have nothing to do with the church. Now he wants to see moves initiated to drastically curtail the number of such collections.

He would like to see the Gardai limit the number of permits they issue for Sunday collections and in some cases restrict collections to one every two years for certain groups and organisations.

He also wants collectors to position themselves at least one hundred yards away from the church gates as the collections are not linked to the church itself.

And Canon Queally has also called on clubs and organisations not to hold collections on Sundays when the church has its own major collections.

He urged the clubs to leave free the Sundays when collections are held for the Missions, for the support of priests, for the Pope (Peter's Pence) and the first Sunday of each month when the Society of St. Vincent de Paul hold collections for the needy in town.

A letter from Canon Queally on the

subject of church gate collections was read out at Masses in the three town parishes on a recent Sunday. So great has the number of collections become that people have said that they are tempted to stay away from Mass on Sundays, Canon Queally remarked.

"People feel that they are under a certain amount of pressure to give to these collections. You could even say that there is intimidation involved," he says.

And Canon Queally went on — "I am concerned that people are asked to give to three collections some Sundays — a church gate collection, the offertory collection and another church collection. Is it not fair. People come to Mass with a certain amount of money and it's too much to ask them to give three times."

Canon Queally added that he was also worried that some people felt

that the church gate collections were in some way linked to the church and supported by the church authorities. The permit is granted by the Gardai and the church has no input even though the collections take place outside the church. "They are not related to the purpose of people gathering for Mass. The church is not a collection area, it is where people go to worship on Sunday, and people who hold collections are taking advantage of this situation."

[Editor's Note: Canon Queally's letter in Clonmel is every bit as relevant for parishioners in Dungarvan, Abbeyside and most other parishes here where Mass-goers are subjected to similar situations. It is worthy of note that Canon Queally is member of a very well-known Dungarvan family.]

Clashmore Parents Prefer Dungarvan

A majority of parents in the Clashmore area would prefer to have their children receiving their secondary education in Dungarvan than Youghal, it was claimed at a meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee held in Dungarvan last Monday.

The claim was made by Cllr. Patrick Kenneally who had proposed at a previous meeting that they call on the Department of Education to provide school transport from Clashmore to Dungarvan.

Cllr. Kenneally said that for the purposes of the school transport scheme Clashmore is in the Youghal catchment area. That meant that children could only be transported to Youghal for their education.

"The majority of the parents however would prefer that their children attended second-level schools in

Dungarvan," said Cllr. Kenneally.

The CEO, Mr. Donal Kelleher, said the resolution from the committee had been forwarded to the Department of Education and an acknowledgement had been received. Nothing more had come of it since however.

Cllr. Kenneally said it is an issue that they should not let "fade away." It is a very important one as far as parents and students alike in Clashmore are concerned.

"I am not denigrating the Youghal schools in any way," he stressed, "but

there is a definite preference for the Dungarvan schools with the parents and the students in the Clashmore area."

ADJOURNMENT

There was a brief adjournment of yesterday's meeting as a mark of respect to the late Ita Coffey (22), daughter of the Committee Chairman, Cllr. Pat Coffey, whose death took place with tragic unexpectedness on Christmas Eve.

Proposing the formal vote of sympathy and the brief adjournment of the meeting, Cllr. Declan Goode said Cllr. Coffey and his entire family had the deep sympathy of everyone in the county on their tragic bereavement.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan seconded.

Council Call For Retention Of Ballinacourty Rail Line

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting last Monday night gave unanimous support to a call from the Cork Railway Restoration Society for the retention of the old rail line from Waterford to Ballinacourty. The line serviced the then Quigley Magnesite Plant opened in Ballinacourty in 1972 and following closure of the plant 12 years later, the line was and continues to be the only railway line now left in the county.

In a letter to the Council, Mr. C. Creedon, Magazine Road, Cork, writing on behalf of the Cork Railway Restoration Society stated that he had been reliably informed that Irish Rail were planning to lift the Ballinacourty line in the near future.

Asking that the Council make overtures to have these decisions reversed, the letter pointed out that "if the track into Ballina-

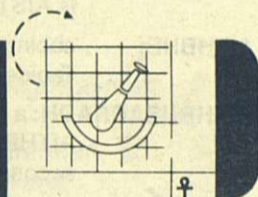
courty factory was lifted and relaid back to Abbey-side it would be a most useful railhead," adding that Waterford Co-op Society might be willing to invest some money in such a project.

Cllr. B. Kyne said that the Council should thank Mr. Creedon for his diligence in writing them about this matter, as he believed that the line there should be kept.

Cllr. D. Goode said he al-

ways thought that it would be a good idea to keep this old rail line between Waterford City and Ballinacourty open. If it could be re-organised it would be a great thing for the town of Dungarvan to bring people to and from Waterford and to the adjacent beach at Clonea. He proposed that the Council take the matter up with Iarnrod Eireann as suggested.

The proposal was unanimously approved.

Dungarvan Man Jailed Following City Drinking Spree

A recent sitting of Waterford District Court was told how a 26-Years-old Dungarvan man who went to the city to attend a Charismatic Renewal meeting became depressed when he met a former girlfriend who snubbed him and as a result stole a car and went on a drinking spree leaving a trail of damaged cars behind him as he drove around the city.

Before the court was Derek Moroney, Boreenatra, Dungarvan who pleaded guilty to taking a car without the owner's consent on December 7 last and driving it while having excess alcohol in his blood. He also pleaded guilty to driving without insurance and to dangerous driving.

Garda Inspector John Howard who prosecuted told the Court that on the occasion Ms. Geraldine Whelan drove to Waterford to attend a Charismatic Renewal meeting and she offered a lift to Moroney who told her he wished to attend the same meeting. The defendant went to the meeting but left after a short time and took Ms. Whelan's car without her consent from where it was parked in Olaf Street.

DAMAGED CAR

Inspector Howard went on to say that Moroney then visited a number of pubs and drove about the city causing damage estimated at £1,000 to four cars. The gardai were alerted to the situation and when Sergeant Tom Duggan approached the defendant at The Mall he attempted to run away. However, Sergeant Duggan took him into custody and a subsequent blood test showed a reading of 208 over 100. The defendant was single, unemployed and had previous convictions, added Inspector Howard. In fact, he was disqualified from driving at

the time of the offences.

Mr. Brian Swift, Solicitor for the defence, said his client had attended the Charismatic meeting but had left to purchase cigarettes at Michael Street. He met a former girlfriend, with whom he had a strong attachment, but, when she refused to speak to him, he became very upset. He had a few drinks and didn't want to return to the meeting so he

sat into the car. He started the car with his own door key and drove to his former girlfriend's house before having more drink. The defendant's attempt to run away from Sergeant Duggan was just an initial burst of panic, added Mr. Swift.

APPALLING RECORD

District Justice Patrick Keenan Johnson said the defendant had a "appalling record" and, on the night on

question his behaviour had been "criminally irresponsible." For stealing the car he was sentenced to 1 year in jail and disqualified for 5 years and for driving with excess amount of alcohol in his blood he was sentenced to 6 months in jail and disqualified for 5 years. The sentences were concurrent and the other offences were taken into account. Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

WILL FAHEY KNOCK HAUGHEY IN "NO CONFIDENCE" VOTE

The question being freely asked in political circles over the past week is whether Dungarvan Deputy Jackie Fahey is set to bring about the fall of the Government led by An Taoiseach, Charles Haughey, when the Dail comes to vote on the Opposition "No Confidence" motions on February 13-14.

The no confidence issue arises from the claims that the Health Services under the Government are in crisis in all parts of the country and that as a result some people have died needlessly.

That an emergency situation exists in regard to hospital accommodation there can be no doubt but the claims made that the entire health services system is in crisis can only be described as an exaggeration. The widespread 'flu epidemic — accepted as the worst of its kind in 20 years — has been the main factor which has put all hospital accommodation up and down the country under severe strain.

Because of the concurrent risk of pneumonia to 'flu victims in the present instance, doctors are sending their patients, especially those with respiratory ailments, to hospital for treatment. When the epidemic passes, the demand for hospital beds should drop and the emergency or 'crisis', as some of the extremists prefer to call it, will pass.

The public should bear in mind that the colossal sum of £1,235 million will be spent on our health services this year. This is an enormous amount of money for such a small country as ours and when demands continue to be made for further extensions to these health services it must be remembered that the extra cost will have to come from the same source, the ordinary tax-

payer. So out-of-hand has the cost of healthcare become that the Government has ordered a top-level investigation into the efficiency of the organisations concerned with the running of it.

So now, back to the question of Deputy Fahey's stand when the "No Confidence" motion comes before the Dail next month. He has hinted quite clearly in his public comments last week-end that he may not support the Government because of the affect the health cuts have had in Waterford. He went so far in one instance as to describe the health services as "a shambles," adding, "I will find it very difficult if not impossible, to oppose the vote of no confidence when it is tabled."

Deputy Fahey who resigned as a member of the Fianna Fail Parliamentary Party because of the alignment in Government with the Progressive Democrats could well be the deciding factor if and when the no confidence vote takes place as Independent T.D. Tom Fox, Roscommon, has also declared his intention to support the no confidence motion. Up to now the Government has been able to rely on 83 votes — 77 Fianna Fail, 6 PD's and also Tom Fox, against the combined opposition of 82. But with Mr. Fox's declared intention to join the opposition, Deputy Fahey's position has become vital.

Should he, as he has hinted, support the no confidence vote then the Government must surely fall and the country would be plunged into another general election. Such a decision must also surely affect Deputy Fahey's political future. Should the fall of the Government be brought about now at a time when Ireland holds the Presidency of the European Council it would be a major catastrophe for Mr. Haughey and for Fianna Fail and Mr. Fahey could then hardly expect to have his nomination as a party candidate in any ensuing election approved by Fianna Fail headquarters.

However in the event of

Mr. Fahey deciding to abstain in the vote, then the casting vote of the Ceann Comhairle would bail out the Government and allow them to weather the storm. We can only wait and see but in the meantime speculation continues that the Government intends to defuse the situation by the provision of more money. As we say, time alone will tell.

WAS IT RIGHT OR WRONG?

Our reference in this column in the issue of January 5 to a new year and a new decade has been called into question by a reader who has noted remarks on the same subject which appeared in the correspondence columns of the "Clonmel Nationalist."

He points out that 1990 marks the end of a decade which is now referred to as the 80's basing his claim on the fact that the first decade commenced in the year 1 A.D. and ended in the year 10 A.D. and so on. He says that the 90's will not really commence until 1991 and that the year 2000 A.D. will mark the end of the 20th century.

Apart from whether it's right or wrong, it's certainly rather confusing.

LOTTERY FUNDED GRANT SCHEMES

We had a note from Tallow County Councillor Willie McDonnell during the week asking us to call attention to the Amenity/Recreational Grant Scheme to be financed this year from the National Lottery Funds.

Cllr. McDonnell says that it would be advisable for all clubs who are interested in benefitting under the scheme to contact their local Council office without delay. He points out that applications lodged with the Department of the Environment over the past two years were at present being processed and it would be important for any club which had submitted such an application to recheck the position with the Council just in case there were any difficulties.

Cllr. McDonnell added that new applications may still be submitted and the relevant forms are still

available from the Council. "The Minister for the Environment, Padraig Flynn is expected to announce the allocation of funding by mid-March next," he told us.

ERRONEOUS REPORT CAUSES SOME CONFUSION

A report in the other locally published paper in Dungarvan last week under the heading "Dungarvan UDC Proposed Revision Of Refuse Collection For 1990" and purporting to be a new schedule for refuse collection in the town for 1990 created a headache for a few people who read it and prompted a few inquiries to the Town Hall.

It was at the Urban Council's monthly meeting last Monday night that our attention was drawn to the matter and we were asked to set the matter right by pointing out that the report was completely erroneous. It appears that the report was based on the minutes of a Council meeting held in February last year when a proposal to introduce a "commercial" refuse collection to cover shops and business concerns in the town was discussed but was then never proceeded with as the proposal found no support.

The usual schedule for the collection of domestic refuse continues to remain unchanged and any residents who may have been perturbed by the erroneous report can rest assured that there is no change. The Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White very positively told this column following the Council meeting on Monday night, "there is no change in our existing refuse collection schedules and it would be just as well to let people know that."

DURATION OF SCHOOL WEEK

Fine Gael spokesman on Education Deputy John Bruton directed a big number of questions to Education Minister, Mary O'Rourke, on December 14, just before the Dail went into recess for its long Christmas holiday.

One of these dealt with the duration for the school week in which Deputy Bru-

ton asked the Minister the way in which the hourly duration of the Irish school week at primary and post-primary levels compared with other European countries.

In her reply, Minister O'Rourke stated: "The minimum school week in national schools is 20 hours 50 minutes secular instruction. This is exclusive of periods assigned to religious instruction and of as-

sembly time and recreation periods. It is generally comparable with the position in other European countries. From information available to me it appears that the length of the school week at post-primary level varies from country to country and ranges from 24 to 33 hours approximately. Post-primary schools in Ireland provide about 28 hours of class contact time per week."

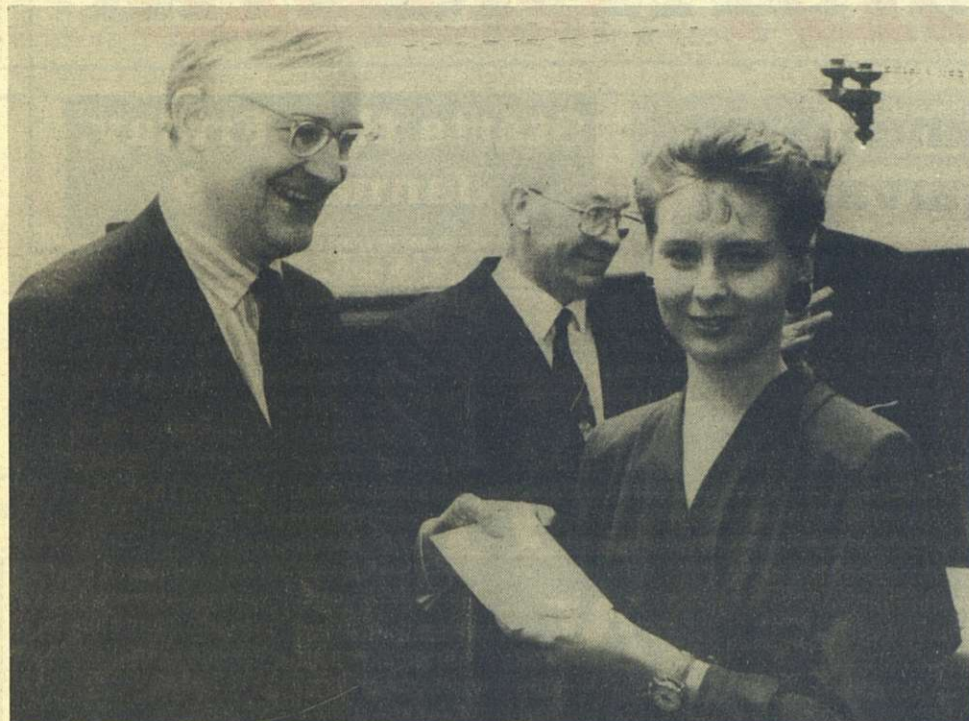

Annual Ferryhouse Pantomime

Here we go, here we go, here we go, it's pantomime time again. The annual Ferryhouse Pantomime, founded in 1970, ventures into the '90s with this year's production of Aladdin. Shows do not survive for twenty years unless they have something special.

At each show, your guarantee of admission lapses if you do not turn up before the appointed starting time, as there are always people queuing

for unoccupied seats.

The show Aladdin, written as always by Michael Ahern, is up to the usual Ferryhouse standard. Highlights this year include a stunning cave scene, with real running water, which won acclaim in many of the big city pantos; an orchestra which provides the backing for the enthusiastic belting-out of songs by the boys, and a performance of the song 'Crazy' by Maggie Morrissey, which would grace a West End cabaret.

It has become the norm for the past number of years that the boys of Ferryhouse School are joined on stage by some members

of the Staff who work with them. This is not because the boys could not carry the show on their own — they did so with great success for many years. Rather it is to develop the integration and bonding of the staff with the boys — "we're not asking you to do something which we are not prepared to do ourselves". The whole business of the annual Ferryhouse pantomime has become a vital element in the overall training and character-building of the boys.

The thirty musical numbers in Aladdin are the usual mix of classic sing-along and modern pop.

There is a very successful tribute to Neil Diamond with a trio of his songs, Beautiful Noise, Forever In Blue Jeans and Sweet Caroline. Lilli Marlene vies for attention with Island in the Sun, all supported with style and panache by the best theatre orchestra operating in these parts.

This is the sixteenth straight year that the Ferryhouse pantomime has visited Dungarvan. For sheer professionalism and entertainment, Aladdin will scarcely be equalled and hardly surpassed as value for money in the town during this year. Don't miss it. (See advt. this issue.)

Convention Commentary

The latest news about the Western Board convention is that no elections will take place during the meeting at An Rinn on Thursday night. If nothing happens to upset this fairly reliable information, we will have just two newcomers to the Officer Board.

Jimmy O'Gorman will take over as chairman and his former clubmate Ollie Wilkinson, will be his vice chairman. For the remainder it will be an 'as you were' situation leaving Anthony Walsh as secretary, John Moore as assistant secretary, Paddy Fitzgerald treasurer, Seamus O'Brien registrar and the three outgoing members, Paddy Walsh, John Lyons and Tom Cunningham, Stradbally as County Board representatives. This shows that there are a dozen withdrawals from the original list.

Many will perceive it as a very quiet convention, with absolutely nothing to cause controversy, or even animated debate.

Convention will commence with Mass in the Convention Hall and delegates are appealed to, to be present on time. After the Balance Sheet and secretary's report have been taken, outgoing chairman Denis McGrath will deliver his final address to convention as in accordance with County Bye-law, he having served the maximum term, must stand down from his post. He is perfectly entitled to contest any of the other positions for which he is nominated, but I understand that Denis will not be contesting any of the positions, for the time being, at least.

So for Denis it will be a nostalgic occasion, he having loved every minute of the six years which he spent working with the Board. Even when the 'going was a bit rough', the Affane/Cappoquin man always seemed to stay on an even-keel and was very seldom ruffled. He was an able dealer when it came to debating Board matters and always made a point of keeping himself up to date on the rules. (As he told me on one occasion, keeping abreast of the rule changes meant that he was always a step ahead of the posse).

Popular with all delegates and fellow officers he was never known to hold a grudge in for anyone who might have challenged his rulings on Board matters.

Denis will now retire happy in the knowledge that he has served the clubs in a very satisfactory and impartial way and that he leaves office with the goodwill and respect of everyone with whom he has come in contact during his

term.

Although Lismoreman, Jimmy O'Gorman who takes over from Denis, has but one years experience in this role, he has plenty of administrative experience.

Jimmy who lives at Ferndale, Lismore, was born in Ballyea, Lismore on January 19, 1941 (his 49th birthday is the day after the convention). He was educated at Presentation Convent, Lismore, and Christian Brothers Primary and Secondary Schools, Lismore.

Jimmy, who is self employed, married Ann Ormonde in 1970 and they have five children as follows — Elizabeth age 19, Pat 18, Siobhan 15, and 12 year old twins Alan and Jennifer. His sons and daughter play hurling and camogie with Lismore.

Jimmy himself commenced his playing career at the local C.B.S. school in the days of Bro. M. J. Blake, R.I.P. and continued at club level with Tourin. He played in four county finals with Tourin — two hurling and two football and he was secretary of that club for two years and Treasurer for four years in the 1960's.

He also proved a very capable "Knight of the Whistle" over a 15 year period.

With his sons Pat and Alan playing for Lismore it was only natural that Jimmy should become involved in the club and he has been the very efficient and courteous secretary of Lismore G.A.A. for the past five years.

Jimmy who has a deep interest in the local community is a great supporter of point-to-point racing and is secretary of the local point-to-point race committee.

It is interesting to note that Vin O'Donoghue, R.I.P., who was the last Lismore man to be Chairman of the Western Board, later went on to become Chairman of the County Board and President of the G.A.A.

Ollie Wilkinson, who for many years was a club and team mate of Jimmy's will return as vice-chairman. Last year Ollie opted out to contest the county chair and while polling very well, his total was short the required amount and this left him with no positions on the Board. I suppose the reality of Ollie's situation is that had he not challenged for the county chair, he would

now take over as Western chairman. (If I am not presuming too much in saying this?)

MOTIONS

The Geraldines are the only club in the division who are expressing their clear opposition to the present league system in all the adult championships and they are seeking the support of convention in recommending a return to the knock-out system, with a losers group. While this motion will certainly be given far more support now than it might have been given some years ago, it is difficult to visualise it being given enough to have it accepted. Several of the bigger clubs have hinted that they will give their support, so one never knows how it will fare.

Clashmore are seeking to have the weak second string teams of senior and intermediate clubs included in the draw for the junior 'B' championships. Some of the junior clubs who may wish to agree with this will require some guarantees about the non-involvement of regraded players, before they give it their blessing.

Lismore are asking that second string teams be given the option of playing in the junior championship proper for a trial period of two years. This shows a club taking the direct and opposite view of things from the motion which is preceding it.

The appointment of a Divisional P.R.O., who would be an addition to the present Officer Board, is proposed by Ballyduff. This proposition has been given a mixed reception by clubs and it is difficult, at this stage, to forecast the outcome of the motion. If successful the appointment will be made at the first meeting of the new board.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Hopefully clubs will show a greater than usual interest in the report of the secretary. This is really the only opportunity that delegates will have of making their views on matters relating to administration, known to the incoming Officer Board. All too often delegates sit silent while these reports are being dealt with and comment at a later stage, sometimes very criti-

cally about the way things are being done.

Championship medals will be presented at the conclusion of convention.

BIGGEST GATE!

The biggest 'gate' of the entire championship year was recorded for the Faha v. Kilrossanty junior football, divisional final. The 'B' Under-21 hurling game between An Rinn/Ardmore and Ballyduff was played with it and it totalled £1,565 which is a record for a game in this grade in the county.

FINANCE

Even allowing for the fact that the board were compensated to the extent of eleven hundred pounds for the loss of the intermediate hurling championships, the total receipts from gate receipts for the year are down in the region of £1,500. Our total intake from gate receipts this year are approximately £10,000. The shortfall is partially explained by the fact that we did not have the same number of attractive draws this time.

Among the heavy items of expenditure is the amount of £2,706 paid out for trophies. This means that out of every pound collected, approximately 30p goes for the purchase of trophies.

In spite of all this, there was a handy profit of £866 on the year and which leaves the Board's assets at approximately £5,500 which is more than adequate to ensure that the Board will not find itself at a financial loss in the near future.

The balance sheet is presented in the usual efficient manner by the Board's finance officer Paddy Fitzgerald, who must again be complimented on having done another splendid job during the year.

MEETINGS

What is not so good is the record of attendance by some clubs during the year and this is outlined in an addendum to the secretary's report. It is interesting to study this document and to see the clubs who rarely miss a Board meeting and the ones who are seldom represented at the draws and fixtures.

G.A.A. NOTES

BY "COMMENTATOR"

New Hurling Scheme Launched

A new chapter in the development and promotion of juvenile hurling amongst the youth of Waterford is about to commence. Recently the Waterford Co. G.A.A. Board announced the name of its new full-time hurling coach. Applications for the position were received from outside the County and from within. After interviews, the successful candidate was Peter Power of St. Patrick's Club, a man with great experience in juvenile coaching at both club and school level. His own record as coach to club teams and Co. juvenile teams speaks for itself.

MUNSTER PLAN

Five months ago the Munster G.A.A. Council came forward with a new coaching plan for the six counties of Munster, whereby a full-time coach, one in hurling and one in football would operate in each County. The Munster Council would contribute towards 50% of the overall cost, with the County financing the other 50%. It is true to say, I believe, that the success of the scheme in East Waterford involving Colm Bonnar as full-time coach for the last 2 years, inspired the Munster Council to set up a similar coaching scheme in all the counties and to contribute financially towards them. This is being done.

NEW COACHING SCHEME

The present situation in Co. Waterford, as we launch into a new decade, is, that we now have 2 full-time hurling coaches operating in all departments within the County; 54 primary schools, 11 secondary schools, 38 juvenile clubs and 3rd level education, i.e. the Waterford Regional College.

A new Co. Coaching Plan has been devised by a special committee. The new scheme embracing the whole county involves the two coaches, with the work shared equally between them, bearing in mind the very high density of population in the city area and East Waterford generally.

PROGRAMME

From September to the end of February, Colm Bonnar will function in the Regional College as coach to the 12 College G.A.A. teams and as administrator within the College G.A.A. Club. From March to early September he will coach in Primary Schools and clubs in the city and East Waterford.

Peter Power, on the other hand will be coaching in the Primary Schools, the Secondary Schools and juvenile clubs all the year around.

He will operate in all the

Western schools and clubs and in some of those in the East.

While Peter Power will have far more schools and clubs to visit, he will have a whole year to do it as compared to Colm Bonnar's 6 months.

Also it must be remembered that the schools in the Colm Bonnar area are very large in their number of pupils. There can be no comparison between a large city school with 500 boys approx. in it and a small 3 teacher school with 50 boys and 50 girls in it.

Peter Power will commence in the schools on February 5 and Colm Bonnar will start on March 5.

POSTERS

Special coloured posters, containing the full schedules for the year will shortly be available to all the schools and clubs of the County. Two separate posters are being printed. At present, during January, Peter Power is visiting each school and club introducing and explaining the scheme.

COLM BONNAR AREA

The following will be the Primary Schools visited by Colm Bonnar:— St. Saviour's, St. Paul's, Mount Sion, St. Declan's, St. Stephen's, Ferrybank, Ballygunner, Tramore C.B.S., Portlaw, Ballyduff, Dunhill, Scoil Lorcain, Killea, Faithlegge and Passage.

The following clubs will be visited by Colm Bonnar:— Roanmore, De La Salle, Mount Sion, Passage, St. Mollerans, St. Saviour's, Erin's Own, Kilmure, Ferrybank, St. Mary's, Kilmacthomas, Clonea, Ballygunner.

PETER POWER AREA

Primary Schools — The vast majority of the schools in the Peter Power area are small rural schools in the West and mid-Waterford Region. He will coach in two schools per day in most cases, half day each.

The schools are as follows:— Aglish, Villierstown, Ballyduff, Knockanore, Clashmore, Piltown, Ballycurrane,

Ardmore, Grange, Modeligo, Touraneena, Coolnasmeear, Kilbrien, Carriglea, Glenbeg, Stradbally, Seafield, Kill, Knockmahon, Rathgormack, Clonea, Crehana, Newtown, Currabaha, Kilrossanty, Fews, Fenor, Butlerstown, Rinn, Old Parish, Ballymacarbry, Lismore, Garraunbaun, Tallow, Cappoquin, Abbeyside, Dungarvan C.B.S., Scoil Gaelach.

Peter will operate in all the Western clubs and in the following Eastern clubs:— Dunhill, Ballyduff, Tramore, Portlaw, Fenor and Butlerstown.

He will be available to operate as a hurling coach in each of the 12 Secondary Schools of the County.

DIVISIONAL AND COUNTY TEAMS

Peter will also be available to the divisional and Co. selectors, if invited to coach the East and West U-16 divisional panels and U-14 panels and the Co. U-14 team.

He already has many years of experience in these areas and he is presently a Co. minor hurling selector.

DEVELOPMENT AND PROMOTION

While the main area of their work will be focused on the actual field of coaching, they both will also function as organisers and promoters of the game of hurling amongst the youth. They will help and advise the weak clubs and schools where the game is struggling.

Their work of coaching is certainly not intended as a substitute for the great work being done already in clubs and schools but as a support. Both men bring to their work an obvious enthusiasm and love of hurling allied with their own very professional approach to coaching.

We wish them well, while expressing the hope that the co-operation of all Waterford clubs and schools will be forthcoming. It is essential.

Once chairman of the Western Board and then the County Board, Vin moved on to become chairman of the Munster Council before being elected President of the Association in 1950.
