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Upgrading Dungarvan's

Public Lighting System

A report submitted by the Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, informed members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting that the final phase of the upgrading of the public lighting system in the urban area was now in hand by the E.S.B. and was due for completion by the first week in March.

The report stated that the cost would be financed over a 5-year period and the expected savings on the maintenance of the new system would go a long way towards defraying the extra costs.

Mr. Hurley's report then stated that during his meeting with ESB representatives he discussed the possibility of having the overhead networks in and around the Square area put underground. "I have always held," the report went on to state, "that the undergrounding of these services would be a vast improvement in the town centre area."

Pointing out that road resurfacing following the recent completion of the major sewerage scheme would take place early in Spring, Mr. Hurley said that he had agreed that the Council would pay the ESB a contribution of £7,000 towards the cost of undergrounding the cables, the main ducting for which had been laid in conjunction with the sewerage scheme.

Mr. George Taylor, Town Engineer said that the new system would ensure a better spread of light on the streets and would prove a big improvement.

The Co. Manager's report was approved.

West Waterford Drama Festival

This year the festival will take place in Ballyduff between Thursday. March 1st and Sunday, March 11th, excluding Wednesday 7th. This is the tenth festival and from humble beginnings in 1981, it is now recognised nationally as being one of the top festivals, requiring a decade of stringent endeavour and giving hours of splendid entertainment.

This year's festival is of funds raised from this to miss them. Glenside particular significance as it shall be the last in St. Michael's Hall, as we now know it. Major development plans are being pursued by the local Community Council, and as the festival will be one of the major beneficiaries of such development, all

year's event will go towards the project. Thus supporting and aiding this year's festival is not alone a guarantee of current enjoyment but is an investment in the social and cultural life of West Waterford and East Cork.

Without a doubt, the major coup for this year's festival is the acquisition of Sundrive Players from Dublin. In historical terms, this is probably the prime amateur theatre group in the country. Having first appeared in Athlone in 1964, they won the Esso Trophy there in 1968, 1971 and 1975. Having accomplished all that was achievable in Irish amateur drama they thus left the festival circuit but continued to perform both here and abroad. Their return and especially their coming to Ballyduff cannot but be welcomed.

The local aspect of the festival is very strong with Ballyduff, Killeagh and festival newcomers Dungarvan and Palace Players, Fermoy in the line-up, thus ensuring elements of local rivalry.

Last year's winners, Brewery Lane, Carrickon-Suir, are back with 1988 Best Actress in Athlone, Peg Power, in the role of Juno. Kilmeen, the winners of the festival and already this season All-Ireland one-act champions, also return. Anybody who has seen Kilmeen perform a play with an Irish background and especially a John B. Keane play, will not want will be attempting to qualify for Athlone for the third season in a row while the Thurles group were All-Ireland confined champions of two years ago. Completing the lineup will be last year's festival confined competition winners Kilmuckridge.

One disappointing aspect of this years festival is the enforced absence of Enniscorthy. They are, this year, also performing "Juno and the Paycock" and so in fairness to season-ticket holders one or other had to be left out. Hopefully, they

shall soon be back.

THE ADJUDICATOR This year's festival adjudicator is an import from "The Land Of Our Fa-thers." Thus Graham Suter becomes the first Welshman to adjudicate at the festival. Now living in London, he is Chairman of the Guild of Drama Adjudicators, and had been adjudicating for nearly forty years. He had regularly adjudicated at the All-Ireland Finals in Athlone but has not confined his activities to the British Isles. He has also operated on the Conti-

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

MY GOD! YOUR LOVE IS MY HOPE

Isaiah in the first reading tells his listeners that God will never desert His chosen people. The people were in rebellion and were grumbling against God, because of the misfortunes that had befallen them, and, I might add, misfortunes that they might have avoided, had they but taken the advice of the prophets. This attitude was nothing unusual. When all was well, they forgot about God; and, when things went wrong, they were on His doorstep. Isaiah is now telling them that no matter what happens, God will be faithful to His promise, and watch over them. He is saying, no matter what the problems, no matter who fails them, they can depend on God for nothing will alter or change His love. His love is true, and is always there for the taking. Even, as S. Scripture told us, if a woman forgets the child of her womb, God would never abandon His loved ones. In short, it means that God's love surpasses all human loves. The moral in that would be: never lose your confidence in God.

It is wonderful to think that if in the past we have been stiff-necked like the Israelites, and abandoned God in favour of bestowing our love on earthly idols, we have but to turn from our evil ways, and He'll welcome us back with open arms. Imagine, we have only to express our sorrow, and He would never again charge us with our sins. He is a most forgiving God. He is a loving God. And, there is no God either in Heaven or on earth to compare with His bountiful generosity. You go and do harm to your neighbour or cause him an injustice. Then, after you have considered your wrong-doing, go to him, express your regrets and ask for pardon. Afterwards, come and tell me how you feel! Truly, no one forgives like God, and no one forgets like He. However, we must bear in mind that God's unfailing care refers primarily to our salvation, which is the w purpose of our existence. He will never deny or revoke His promise. He has promised to take every care and to provide every assistance to enable us to reach our home in paradise.

Isaiah might well be preaching to the modern world, where God is being pushed aside to make way for what they term progress. Man is in a rebellious mood. He wants to be free or rather, he wants a licence to do as he pleases. Indeed, man has achieved dreams almost beyond the wildest imagination, and, as he searches for still greater achievements, he almost persistently ignores God. History shows that the Jewish people invariably met with set-backs and disasters when they tried to go it without God. Isaiah is warning the people of our time to bring God back before it is too late. Usually, when the bubble bursts, the blame is laid at God's feet. We forget we make our own beds! What did they expect God to do? He endowed them with free will. He will never force anyone to act against their own will. He will not beat us into submission. He'll call us. He'll remind us. He'll even knock on our doors, but it is we who must open the door.

We must let Him into our lives. The lock is on the inside; and it is we ourselves who must open the door.

St. Paul in the second reading writes about his confidence in God, and tells us that he bases his trust on the faithfulness of God's promise. He is trying to engender that same trust into our lives by reminding us that God has given a special call to each one to serve. And, he points out that he is presenting us with the ideals of Christ for our guidance. His idea was to bring his listeners into contact with Christ, so that they'd strive to be like Him, and thereby be a help to others by their example.

St. Paul had already reprimanded the Corinthians for not looking beyond the preacher and his message. He told them that a true preacher would be a servant of God, and be faithful to His mysteries. If question we must, then our right must centre on his mission and his message. A helpful conclusion in these days, when there are so many prophets in Israel is, that it is a serious matter to pass judgment on the Church considering her appointed role.

THE WORLD IN HIS HANDS

The theme of the Gospel is in unison with the other readings, namely, God holds the world in His gentle hands, and takes a fatherly care of all His children. The Gospel points out the lavish care He expends on creation, and takes us through the countryside to admire the beauty and workmanship of nature, and note the delicacy and the beauty in colour of nature's creations. It tells us that if God showers so much love on things for our benefit, surely man, whom He made in His own image, will be the object of still greater satisfaction. Man is the centre-piece of His earthly creation, and so, because of what he is and the purpose of his existence, he must be very precious in the eyes of God.

Too well we understand the transient nature of life on earth. We know what God wants from us. Hence, we must watch and not allow ourselves to be mesmerized by things that have no lasting value. There's no peace or happiness to be found in sin. For, if it is happiness you seek, you must look for it in God. The old saying goes: "Do not put your trust in princes." If God is by your side, you will not have to worry about tomorrow. That does not mean we need not work. We have a duty to keep bread on the table, and for that we need money. And we do have to see where the next meal is coming from. God is saying to us, get things into perspective, but keep first things first. The past is gone. Tomorrow has not come yet. All we have is now. Whatever you are engaged on now, offer it to God as a sign of your love.

Glass Splinters On Dungarvan **By-Pass Road**

At the February monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, Cllr. Austin Hallahan referred to complaints he had received about glass splinters on sections of the Ring Road. He said that he was given to understand that the splinters landed on the roadway when they fell off lorries while being taken from the Glass factory for disposal at the town dump.

Cllr. Hallahan said that the glass splinters created a hazard for pedestrians as well as for motorists using the road.

The Town Engineer, Mr. George Taylor said that splinters do fall from the lorries at times but whenever this happened a sweeper was used to remove them from the road surface.

STORM DAMAGE

Co. Council Deputation Meets Minister Of State

The following statement was issued by Deputy Jackie Fahey on Friday last, February 23:

At a meeting of Waterford County Council held on 12th inst., it was agreed that Deputy Jackie Fahey be asked to arrange a meeting with the Minister for the Environment and the Marine to discuss storm and flood damage.

A meeting with Mr. Ger Connolly, T.D., Minister of State, Department of the

Environment took place last Wednesday in Dublin. The deputation consisted of Deputies Austin Deasy, Brendan Kenneally, Brian O'Shea, County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn and Council Chief Executive Engineer, Mr. Tom Linneen.

The deputation was introduced by Deputy Fahey. After a lengthy discussion, the Minister stated that the damage would be examined by Inspectors from his Department and that the Department of the Marine would be inspecting the damage to the coastline. The report from the inspectors and the case presented by the deputation will then go to Cabinet where the matter will be fully consid-

Deputy Fahey is awaiting a reply from the Minister from the Marine on his request to receive a similar deputation and it is hoped the meeting will take place within the next week.

Fined For Assaulting Children

A doctor was so alarmed by the injuries he saw in two children that he reported the matter to the gardai, Youghal Court heard last Thursday.

James Lucey (42), Grattan Street, Youghal, was charged with assaulting a 12-year-old boy and a 7year-old girl, the children of his common law wife by her first marriage, on Jan-

Supt. M. Murray said that on January 6 the children's father collected them to take them to his home in Cork for their normal weekend visit. He noticed bruises on them and took them to hospital. After a doctor there made a complaint, the gardai investigated and found Lucey had assaulted both children,

who were now in care.

The court was told on behalf of Lucey, who pleaded guilty, that he had been left in charge of the children that day and they disobeyed orders not to go out. As a result he "gave out very forcibly" to them, especially the boy with whom he had "an unhappy relationship."

District Justice W. F. O'-Connell said the offences were inexcusable but to impose a severe penalty would do no good. He then fined defendant £25 on each charge.

IFA Slams Vets' Man For T.B. "Cover Up"

The Chairman of the IFA's National Animal Health Committee, Bernard Halvey, said recently that Mr. Peter Dargan of the I.V.U. was simply attempting to cover up the scandal reported by ERAD that vets were leaving up to 30 per cent of reactors behind in annual round tests.

Mr. Halvey said that Mr. Dargan's continuous outbursts in recent years were well-documented. His recent statement on the use of growth promoters were refuted by the Department of Agriculture but highly publicised in Europe and were damaging to the exoport meat industry. 2100

1990 IS INTERNATIONAL LITERACY YEAR

The Organisers of the Dungarvan Adult Learning Group, Helen Whelan and Anne O'Donnell have asked that the attention of the general public be drawn to the important fact that 1990 has been designated International Literacy Year.

The local Adult Learning Centre is based in accommodation beside the Courthouse at Bridge Street, Dungarvan, and is open for information each week Tuesday - Thursday from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

The service provides tuition for any adult who may be interested in acquiring the necessary skills in reading and writing. A trained tutor is provided for each learner; tuition is carried out on a weekly basis, usually for one or two hours at times to suit the individual concerned.

Small groups meet once a week to talk, read and write in a relaxed atmosphere at the Centre. The members of the group also produce booklets, the latest of which under the title "Words From The Deise" was launched last December.

The Organisers would welcome into the group anyone who might be willing to encourage and support another adult in literacy and who would have at least one hour a week to devote to act as a tutor. Contact can be made with the Organisers by ringing 058/41100 and asking for extension 272.

It is important for us all to realise that despite all the educational facilities here in Ireland more than half of the people receiving help under the scheme operated by the National Adult Literacy Agency throughout the country are aged be-

tween 16 and 20. Literacy difficulties do not just affect an older generation. Should you know anyone who would like to be helped by the local Adult Learning Group tell them not to be shy in coming forward and should you feel you'd like to volunteer as a tutor, then don't hold back either.

HARDLY A SUITABLE SOLUTION

Complaints by the two lady members of Dungarvan Urban Council alleging traffic hazards at the Murphy Place-Kyne Park-New Line junction in Abbeyside have resulted in a proposal to place a mini-roundabout at the junction but many of the residents in the locality do not agree that this will solve whatever problem which seems to exist there.

The road width at the junction would hardly appear to lend itself to a roundabout, even one of mini size, and the result, if this is done, could well just cause more traffic confusion there.

Perhaps, rather than complicate the situation in this way, a simple solution would be the placing of "go slow" signs on the roadway on the junction approaches from the McCarthyville and New Line ends. This and a little more care and attention by motorists to

the speed at which they negotiate the junction should suffice to remove whatever dangers are seen to exist there.

Dungarvan Man Jailed For 15 Years

A man who viciously assaulted a woman who had become his "Good Samaritan" was jailed for 15 years by Mr. Justice Vivian Lavan in the Central Criminal Court in Dublin last Friday.

John Murray had carried out a savage and motiveless attack on Mrs. Emily Armstrong (39), at her home in Rathdrum, Co. Wicklow on September 23 last, stated the Judge.

In the circumstances, and given the fact that Murray, a native of Ballinameela, Dungarvan, had shot dead a woman in a previous attack, Mr. Justice Lavan felt the minimum sentence he could impose was 15 years.

The Judge said Mrs. Armstrong's Christian charity towards the accused led to her partial maiming by Murray, who repeatedly had struck her over the head with her husband's shotgun.

Mr. Justice Lavan rejected an application by Murray's lawyer, Mr. Barry White, SC, for leave to appeal on the severity of the sentence.

Murray (56) of Main Street, Rathdrum, was originally charged with attempting to murder Mrs. Armstrong. But the State withdrew the charge when he pleaded guilty to the lesser count of assault with intent to cause grievous bodily harm.

A PRISONER WITHIN HERSELF

Mrs. Armstrong was repeatedly struck across the head and face with the shotgun, and her husband Leslie, told the Judge she suffered life-threatening injuries to her head. Her sight and hearing also were damaged and she was now "a prisoner within herself."

Supt. William Ryan had testified that Mrs. Armstrong had been like a "Good Samaritan" to Murray after he arrived in Rathdrum in 1982, when he was released from custody in Shelton Abbey.

He said Murray had been tried in February, 1979, for the murder of Mrs. Helen McGrath, Ballinacourty, Cappagh, Dungarvan, six months earlier. He had been convicted of manslaughter and jailed for five years.

Supt. Ryan said the Armstrong family had given him a flat in Rathdrum in return for his doing caretaking work on property they owned.

Mr. Justice Lavan also heard psychiatric evidence that while Murray had a low intellect, he was not suffering from mental illness nor did he have a history of psychiatric disorder.





WHERE WILL THEY ALL GO?

The Irish made a big impression in Malta, so much so that representatives of the Maltese Tourist Board have begun meeting Irish Travel Agents, pushing Malta as a base for Italia '90. By all accounts, Malta made a favourable impression on those Irish fans who went there for the Malta game - so the crack should be 90 on a different island next June.

Packie Bonner, as he prefers to be called, has played over 400 games with Glasgow Celtic. He shared his early football activities between Gaelic football with Rossa Rovers and soccer with Keadue Rovers.

At the age of 18 years he played senior football with Donegal. His soccer career l also prospered and he progressed via the Donegal Youth Team selection for the Irish Youths Team.

Following trials with Leicester City and Glasgow Celtic he eventually signed for the late Jock Stein and Celtic before his 19th birthday. He made his debut for Glasgow Celtic's first team, appropriately, on St. Patrick's Day 1979, in a 2-1 victory over Motherwell.

Although he made his international break-through in June 1981, he was second choice under Eoin Hand to Jim Mc-Donagh and Gerry Peyton. The arrival of Jack Charlton saw him confirmed as Ireland's first choice goalkeeper and his international career really took off.

His displays in the European championships in Germany made him the choice of the Sports Writers as the no. 1 goalkeeper of the tournament, despite being in great pain with a back complaint which needed an operation after the

An athletic goalkeeper, Bonner has made some vital saves, often blocking shots ice hockey style, with his body. Reared in Burtonport, Packie is half a twin, one of a family of seven and is a vital member of Ireland's team for Italy. His form and freedom from injury will be closely watched by all Irish fans between now and June.

Fifty Years Ago

Somehow I got my lines crossed when writing about the minor hurling championship of 1940, and I am grateful to those who were able to point out the mistake. I had in fact found out the right account even before the paper was published. Dungarvan, as was listed, did win that championship, which was the first of five or six in a row. The particular objection referred to was won by Dungarvan who went on to beat Clonea in the county final.

Clonea then objected to Dungarvan, alleging that they had an illegal player on their team, but this was not proven.

So the full list of champions who are now entitled to celebrate their Golden Jubilee this year are: Senior Hurling - Mount Sion, Runners-up, Dungarvan; Senior Football - Stradbally, Runners-up, Kilrossanty; Junior Football Knockanore, Runnersup, Newtown; Junior Hurl-Lismore, Runners-up, Erin's Own; Minor Football — Butlerstown, Runners-up, St. Carthage's (Lismore); Minor Hurling - Dungarvan, Runners-up, Clonea.

Lismore who also won the Dr. Hackett Cup, (Colleges) when beating Mount Sion C.B.S. by 4-4 to 4-2 in the final, had a unique club championship scoring record in that year. In the knock-out junior hurling championship they scored a total of 32 goals and 15 points in their five matches. Their 22 points average per game is not ever likely to be equalled.

On the intercounty front in 1940 we had no jubilee victories to celebrate but for the record we did reach the Munster final in football, having beaten Clare in a replay. That was reckoned to be one of our better football sides of all time. Kerry were the reigning All-Ireland champions and having beaten Waterford by 1-10 to 0-6 went on to retain their All-Ireland

The Waterford team in the final at Walsh Park was:- John Kett, P. Hahessy, Tom Veale, M. Coffey, A. Fleming, Dick McGuire, J. Fennell, J. Lonergan, P. Kiely, W. Barron, C. Moylan, P. Dalton, J. Veale, J. Waters, Dec Goode.

The great Kerry team included Joe Keohane, Sean Brosnan, Dan O'Keeffe, Paddy Kennedy, Murt Kelly, Dan Spring, etc., who were among the alltime greats of the Kingdom during that era.

In senior hurling we drew in the first round with Lim-

erick and lost the replay by just two points. Limerick went on to beat Kilkenny in the All-Ireland final. We were beaten in both junior championships and suffered the same fate in minor hurling and football.
