REPAIRS TO COASTAL DEFENCES Cushnahan Says Government "Behaving Like Modern Day Canute"

In a statement issued from his headquarters in Limerick yesterday, Tuesday, March 6, John

The big news of the week in Dungarvan broke on Monday evening last when plans were announced for the amalgamation of the Mercy and Presentation Primary Schools into a single girls primary school on the Presentation Convent School site; the setting up of three voluntary secondary schools as follows: Christian Brothers (for boys), An amalgamation of the Mercy and Presentation Convent Schools (for girls) and the Friary (co-educational), the Mercy/Presentation amalgamated school to be on the Mercy Convent schools site; and also the setting up of liaison groups to involve all the primary and second level schools in the town.

Discussions between the trustees and staffs of all the schools concerned in regard to the rationalisation of education in Dungarvan have been proceeding for the past few years and the end result of these meetings and negotiations came with the announcement from the Trustees of the Augustinian, Mercy and Presentation Schools to the members of their staffs which was released to the Press on Monday evening last.

FULL TEXT OF STATEMENT

The following is the full text of the statement from the Trustees:

1 — For some time the Augustinian, Mercy and Presentation Trustees have been meeting with other interested parties to explore ways of future collaboration, and to investigate possible rationalisation both at primary and second levels.

2 - Having met on several occasions and consulted Boards of Management, staffs and other interested bodies, the Trustees have now decided on certain steps which we hope to implement as soon as possible, The Minister has been informed of our decision. PRIMARY

SCHOOLS 5 — Having consulted rationalisation programme involving all five second level schools in Dungarvan is not feasible at the moment. Accordingly, we have decided to propose as an intermediate stage that there will be three voluntary secondary schools in Dungarvan:

- a boys' school (Brothers)

a girls' school (Mercy/Presentation amalgamated)

- a coeducational school (Friary)

5 - The Mercy/Presentation amalgamated school will be on the Mercy schools site. The Mercy Sisters will be the Trustees of this school.

6 — Apart from the issue of rationalisation we believe it is in the interests of all pupils in the Dungarvan area that the cooperation between schools, which already exists, be encouraged and increased. We intend to write to the Vocational Education Committee, and to the Christian Brothers Trustees with the aim of setting up some kind of a liaison group involving all the second level schools in the town. We would be interested in setting up a similar group at primary level.

Cushnahan, Fine Gael MEP for Munster called on the Government to stop acting like a modern day King Canute and instead to provide the necessary money to repair coastal defences.

Mr. Cushnahan in the course of the statement said:

reason why such monies cannot be used to repair the social and economic infrastructure. In Waterford alone, some £20 million is needed to provide adequate coastal defences.

The Government must act and act now. We cannot afford any further procrastination. Our coastline has been eroded to such an extent that a repetition of these storms would have

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Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

THE LORD IS MY STRENGTH

The first reading depicts the peacefulness of the lot of Adam and Eve. They'd no worries, no disturbances and no suffering. Their life was blessed with happiness. The devil, who saw all this, was determined to upset God's plan for man. He'd already brought ruin on himself: and he was now planning to destroy man's happiness. In his subtle and scheming way he started by sowing seeds of doubt by suggesting and by eluding them into thinking that God's Commandment was aimed and intended to deprive them of their rightful equality with God. And, in their greed and envy, they fell for the ruse and broke the Commandment. Their rebellion, their sin shattered the peace of the world, and upset the harmony of the whole of creation.

Often, you hear people blaming God for the mess in the world. It is, why does God permit suffering? And, why does He not do something about it? How easy it is to forget that when God created the world, His work was good and wholesome. And so it was until He placed man in charge. All he had to do to maintain the happy and peaceful state was to observe one Commandment. Today's reading tells us how he failed. He chose to assert himself by trying to make himself independent of God. He'd been warned of the consequences of such disobedience. So, there is no excuse for the way in which he invited the devil to sow his evil seeds in God's creation. Adam's fault was not only personal, but was far reaching in destroying the grace-life of all his descendants, Our Lady being the exception. The result was that the whole human family, having lost the state of original justice, was not only enslaved in sin, but was powerless to undo the harm. His only hope lay in God's promise.

Paul in the second reading examines the evil effects of the fall, and goes on to tell us how these may be counteracted by the liberating work of Christ. He points out that "By one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by one man's obedience many will be made righteous." The Sacrifice on Calvary made salvation available to all. As we know, sin had severed man's union with God, and had God not sent His Son to make reparation, the breach would have remained. He came down on earth. He became one of us, so that He could represent and act for us. He, as Son of man, paid in suffering for man's fault, and won redemption for us. His offering satisfied God's justice; and pardon and forgiveness were made available to all mankind. The nightmare was over. We were restored to God's favour, and, because of the helps that flow from the Cross, we are able to walk with confidence. Man needs these graces, because he has been weakened by the fall. He is, however, now able to rise to new heights in his union with God, heights that would never have been possible prior to the fall. Hence, if God permitted the evil of the fall, He mercifully turned it into man's benefit. I feel, if the Angles could envy us, it would be on account of our close relationship with God at Mass. Indeed, the fall did weaken man, and left him prone to evil, but the graces of the Redemption are so powerful that they'll shelter him from danger.

TEMPTATIONS

The Gospel assures us that even if life is now a valley of trials and temptations, we have only to place our trust in God. It tells us clearly that temptations, whilst they hold danger, are not sinful in themselves. The sin is in the consent. In fact, they provide us with opportunities to express our love for God. The Lord's ordeal with temptations, teaches how to dismiss, reject and invoke God's help. Of course, they are a nuisance, but, I said, they do provide us with openings to prove our love to God. Yet! we must not over-look the strength of the devil. Hence, we have got to watch and pray, and, above all, nourish ourselves with the Eucharist.

We've just entered the Season of Lent, and it comes to mind that many loved ones who were with us last year now rest in the Lord. We ought to ask ourselves, what did Lent do for us last year? Adam ignored God's command, and brought sin, suffering and death into life; and left us a prey of the devil. In his weakened state man would be unable to cope with such a powerful enemy had not God relented, and given him hope by the promise of Redemption. And now, as the people of God, we ought to live as befits our high calling.

The situation was and is, man is so prone to evil that he'd have no hope without God's helping hand. God's promise of Redemption included all those who died before Christ as being able to share in the fruits of Calvary. Otherwise, God's justice and mercy would not have been satisfied. It is a teaching of our faith that God gives sufficient grace to each and everyone to save their souls. It is not enough to just accept the talent and bury it: it must be used. And, enlightened as we are by the revelations of Christ, we must dip into the treasury of God's graces if we hope to survive the dangers of daily life. Lent is a time for taking stock, and seeing to our defences. All the necessary helps are available. We have only to ask. So, keep company with God through your prayers, and feed regu-larly at God's holy table. And, you'll become so like Christ, you'll talk like Him, you'll act like Him, and you'll. tive-like Him.

New "Helpline" For Dungarvan And West Waterford PAYE Taxpayers

The annual issue of Tax free Allowance Cerfificates to PAYE Taxpayers dealt with by the Waterford PAYE District takes place during this week commencing Monday, March 5, 1990. These certificates will be effective from 6 April 1990 (tax year 1990/91).

To coincide with this issue the Waterford PAYE Office will operate a "HELPLINE" specifically to deal with queries in this regard. While every effort is made to ensure certificates are correct on issue, invariably some errors will occur. In keeping with current Revenue Commissioners policy of upgrading services to the taxpayers the "HELPLINE" will be available from Monday 12th to Thursday 15th March. Individuals using this service are more likely to have a revised certificate if required issued to them before the commencement of the new tax year (6 April 1990).

When telephoning, to avoid delays, it will be necessary to have your Tax Free allowance Certificate to hand and be able to quote your Revenue and Social Insurance Number. The "HELPLINE" will operate from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. and 2.00 p.m. to 5.00 p.m. each day. The telephone number is (051) 73565, callers should ask for "PAYE HELPLINE." Normal counter and telephone service will continue to operate at Government Buildings, The Glen, Waterford during this period.

Basic tax free allowances were not altered in the 1990 Budget. The item which will most effect PAYE taxpayers are as follows:—

For the 12th successive year the Dungarvan Pipe Band has taken on the onerous task of organising the annual St. Patrick's Day parade in the county town, and the confident expectations are that next week's event will be the biggest and most colourfully spectacular todate.

For months past the officers and committee members of the Pipe Band have been formulating the parade plans, and now with little more than a week to go virtually everything is ready to role.

Clubs, organisations, in-dustry, and individuals are likely to swell the entries to record levels, and if the mercurial weatherman is in benevolent mood on the big day the expected thousands of viewers can look forward to a really superb

parade. This year no fewer than nine bands (a record) will be taking part. AN ROINN COMHSHAOIL **GRANTS FOR WASTE RECYCLING PROJECTS**

Applications for grants are invited from persons or bodies proposing to establish waste recycling projects involving glass, paper, cans or plastics.

Grants of up to 50% of the capital cost involved in setting up recycling projects are envisaged but grants of up to 75% may be considered depending on the nature of the project. Grants will be available to meet start-up costs only and any operations assisted will be expected to become viable in a short time. While all suitable proposals will be considered, the grants scheme is particularly suited to voluntary bodies and community groups.

Projects which involve commercial-scale recycling operations, with collection and subsequent processing of waste being carried on by one person or body, may qualify for assistance from the Industrial Development Authority. Such projects will not be eligible for second grants under this scheme.



Sincere sympathy is extended to his sorrowing wife, family and relatives.





Teenage Girl Threatened To Burn Down Youghal Garda Station

A 15-year-old Youghal girl who was "blind drunk," went completely out of control and threatened to burn down the Garda Station, District Justice Joseph Mangan heard at Youghal District Court last Friday.

Hayes also told the court that the girl came into the station shouting and roaring and using the most abusive and offensive language. Finally, she had to be arrested.

The drunk and disorderly charge was marked "taken into consideration."

Pig Farmers Still Losing Money Says IFA

The Chairman of the IFA's National Pigs & Pigmeat Committee, Michael Murphy, commenting on the 4p to 6p per kg. increase in the price of pigs said the increase was inadequate and was just the start

of a long haul towards 120p per kg., the target figure for the bulk of Irish pig producers.

Pig farmers are still losing money, he said, and prices need to go much higher than the current average nett figure of 106p per kg.

IFA had campaigned strongly for this price rise by a nationwide series of protest meetings with the owners of eleven slaughterhouses during the past few weeks.

Mr. Murphy said the increase had been deliberately delayed by many processors, despite a firmer pigmeat market, apart from the pork slaughterers, many of whom have increased prices so afar by 8p per kg. "Dealer activity is very widespread on both sides of the border with prices of 110p per kg. freely on offer," he said. Mr. Murphy said the Association had asked Department of Agriculture officials to push for further EC Export Refund support at the Pigmeat Management Committee meeting.

SET BACK IN CONSTRUCTION OF WATERFORD REGIONAL **HOSPITAL?**

Last month the disappointing news was announced that a Receiver had been appointed to the Kilkenny construction company of Mahon & McPhillips Ltd. who were the main contractors for the major development of the new regional hospital at Ardkeen, Waterford.

In his report to the March monthly meeting of the South Eastern Health Board due to take place at the Board's head office in Kilkenny this Thursday, March 8, the Chief Execu-tive Officer, Mr. P. G. Mc-Ouillan informs the members that at a meeting held on Friday, February 16, the Receiver indicated that a proposal for a buyout of the construction section of the Company's operations was being formulated. However, a week later, on February 23, the Receiver stated that the proposed buy-out was not going ahead and that he would be issuing redundancy notices to the staff. A decision on the determination of the regional hospital contract was deferred at the time to allow for further developments which might take place over the weekend

The CEO's report then states that on Monday, February 26, the Health Board was informed by the Receiver that he had sold the assets and commit-

ments of the construction company to a new firm, Mahon & McPhillips CEM Ltd., a subsidiary of the Clonmel Company of M. F. Kent & Co. Ltd and that he was now requesting the Board's consent to the assignment of the contract to this new company.

Mr. McQuillan's report then informs the Board members that following this development a meeting was held with Kents when much of the details of the proposal were clarified and that the conditions applicable and further clarifications necessary were in the process of resolution. The report concludes by pointing out that the Board's commitment to completing the construction of the hospital on time was a primary consideration in dealing with this matter.

It is indeed to be hoped that the moves at present in train will, as the CEO's report states, have the desired result of ensuring that the construction of the hospital will be completed in, or at least as near as possible to, the original time schedule of the contract.



Youth United '90: National Youth Parliament

From April 20 to April 22, the National Youth Council of Ireland's 'Youth United '90' — National Youth Parliament — will take place in Dublin's Castleknock College. This promises to be an unique opportunity for 200 young people from all over the country to come together to discuss, debate and decide on issues which affect them.

There are many reasons behind the decision to hold such an event. Young people seem to have been dropped from the political agenda in recent years ---their needs are often uncatered for, their opinions unlistened to, their participation in decision making unasked for - hopefully this Parliament will begin to resolve these problems. It is also felt that with the loss of any real civics programme from school curricula, few students have any real chance to properly inform themselves as to just how decisions affecting their lives are reached, who makes them, and how they can be influenced. At an even more basic level, many have no real idea as to how the Irish political process works, why political parties exist, how they, and members of the public, can lobby.

KILL NOTES

Hedging Your Bets With An Evergreen Screen

By Pete Moss

MARCH is a key month if you are planning a hedge to either screen or become a feature of the garden.

It is the month when you should complete planting deciduous hedge varieties or aim to start planting evergreens and conifers if you live in a southern or other mild area of the country

Latitude will play a major role in your choice of hedge and you will also need to consider the situation, soil, cost and, a factor often forgotten, how much care and clipping is required

The role of the hedge is also an influence. They are most commonly used as a private and attractive garden boundary so this will also dictate a sturdy and taller variety. The site should be pre-

pared as carefully as for a specimen plant and as the hedge plants have to be squeezed in tight to do their job properly you must feed them regularly.

Allow for a bed of at least two feet for a boundary hedge, but a small scale internal hedge will need



couple of years.

Their rapid growth is a marked contrast to old favourites like Yew but not for nothing has it been part of the garden scene since the days of Henry VIII.

It takes its time but will make a superb and long-lived hedge up to about ten feet. It has also been a traditional choice for topiary or ornamental hedge trimming and shaping. Also popular:

HAWTHORN - dismissed as drab when it sheds its leaves but it does go through an attractive period before this, producing scented white, pink or red flowers and colourful red/ orange 'haws' or berries. It is also cheap and its spiny nature will create a dense and impenetrable hedge. BEECH - mid-priced but

it produces an interesting hedge and will not shed its leaves in winter if growth is restricted by occasional trimming.

Fruit and Cheese Salad Platter Ingredients:

1 head iceberg lettuce, shredded 1 red eating apple 1 ripe pear 2 tablespoons lemon juice 1 kiwi fruit, peeled and sliceed

thinly 100g (4oz) pecan halves 100g (4oz) samsoe cheese, cubed

Dressing:

150ml (1/4 pint) soured cream 2 tablespoons, mayonnaise 100g (4oz) Danish blue cheese, grated salt and pepper Method:

Spread the lettuce over a large platter. Core and thinly slice the apple and pear. then toss in the lemon juice. Arrange the apple, pear and kiwi fruit over the lettuce. Sprinkle evenly with pecans and cubed cheese.

Double-digging is advisable with the plentiful addition of well-rotted organic compost deep into the trenching. Remember that this planting needs to be right first time to guarantee a hedge that will last for years and years.

Conifers have become by far the most popular hedging material in recent years because they are attractive and fast-growing. None more so than the hybrid Leyland Cypress, which can add two feet a year and create a thick healthy hedge within a few years.

Stakes

.But these varieties tend to. be shallow rooted and will need staking for the first

BOX a traditional favourite like Yew and similarly slow growing so it is easily kept as a hedge, but it is one of the more expensive varieties.

HOLLY - no prizes for guessing that spiny Holly makes an impenetrable and attractive hedge but it grows slowly and is expensive

HONEYSUCKLE - certain varieties - check with your garden centre - make good inexpensive medium-height hedges

PRIVET - an old favourite that is cheap and produces a hedge quickly but does require regular clipping.



Dungarvan Credit Union Celebrates '25th' ESTABLISHED 1965.

Dungaryan Credit Union, which this year celebrates its 25th anniversary, has eminent reason to be proud of its loyal and dedicated service to the community. This tender sapling, planted twenty-five years ago by a group of concerned citizens, was inspired by a desire to encourage people through co-operation in a Credit Union to practice the inestimable value of thrift, self-help and neighbourly service. No sapling now, Dungarvan Credit Union has grown from twenty members in 1965 to a current membership of 4,501, holding savings of £3,121,305.

Let us look then at the phenomenal growth of this little sapling which stands today as a living example of economic democracy at work, powered by the inspiration and idealism of its members.

FORMATION AND DEVELOPMENT

FOUNDATION

On November 24, 1964, the organisational meeting of Dungarvan Credit Union was held at Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan. Sixteen of the people present at the meeting paid an entrance fee of 2/6d and £1 for one share each and were accepted as the first members of Dungarvan Credit Union. It was decided that the Common Bond area of the Credit Union should be confined to the Urban District of Dungarvan. The meeting also elected the first Board of Directors:

Dr. P. K. Murphy, Mr. James Foley, Mr. Tom Kyne, T.D., Mr. Humphrey Kelleher, Mr. Michael J. Curran, Mr. E. P. King, Mr. Jonathan Cullen, Mr. Eddy O'Doherty, Mr. Patrick Walsh, Mr. T. T. McCarthy, Mr. P. J. Foyle, Mr. Tadhg O Loinsigh, Mr. Denis O'Donovan.



The first monthly meeting was held on December 7, 1964, and Dr. P. K. Murphy was elected as the first

At a subsequent meeting of the Board it was decided to use the Courthouse as the place of business on Friday, February 26, 1965, and to continue every Friday thereafter. On March 15, 1965, Dungarvan Credit Union's application for membership of the Credit Union League of Ireland was accepted. FIRST LADY

On May 24, 1965, after the resignation of Dr. P. K. Murphy, Mr. P. Walsh was elected as the second president of the Credit Union, and it was decided to fill the vacancy on the Board with a lady. The position was offered to Miss B. Whittle and subsequently accepted by her. FALTERING STEPS

During the formation years, the Credit Union relied solely on voluntary workers, and growth in the number of members and shares was slow. There also appeared to be a general reluctance on the part of the local population to use the Credit Union to obtain loans. It would take many years and a lot of endeavour on the part of many before the Credit Union would achieve its present strength and its present position in the local community. The following is an attempt to highlight some of the events and developments which characterised this growth.

CAR £180 On March 4, 1967, the Board granted the first car-purchase loan. The amount of the loan was £180, and a condition of the loan was that the borrower would obtain comprehensive insurance with the Credit Union's interest noted.

INCORPORATION At the 5th AGM held at the Courthouse on January 23, 1969, it was announced that due to the increase in business, loan applications would now be taken on

> Monday nights and collection of shares would continue on Friday nights. Also the Credit Union Act 1966 had been passed in the Dail on December 13, 1968 and under its provisions, Dungarvan Credit Union Ltd., had been incorporated. **GROWING UP**

> During these early years one

of the main difficulties hindering the progress of the Credit Union was the lack of its own permanent premises and the unsuitability of the Courthouse and subsequently the Town Hall. At a Board meeting of July 15, 1969, the purchase of a premises by the Credit Union was first mooted and over the next four years this topic was the main ambition of the Credit Union.

At a subsequent meeting it was suggested by a Field Officer from the League Board that, due to the increase in business, the Credit Union should also consider employing a paid manager to co-ordinate the efforts of the voluntary workers.

Maurice McGrath served as Manager from 1971 to 1979, and was much respected by the members for his kind, considerate nature. Following his retirement, and up to a short time before his death, he took an active part in committee and office work. His contribution to the growth of the Credit Union is recognised by all who worked with him and he is sadly missed.


At a Board meeting on April 6, 1971, it was decided to set up a Delinquent Loans Committee. This was the forerunner of the present Credit Control Committee which is necessary to ensure that all members honour their commitments to the Credit Union. PERMANENT HOME

On January 24, 1973, it was announced at a Board meeting that premises at Mary Street, Dungarvan, had been purchased as the permanent offices of the Credit Union. The purchased property required extensive renovations to adapt them for this use and eventually the new offices were opened on October 20, 1973. There was an Ecumenical Blessing of the premises, followed by the official opening by Mr. Richard Walsh, the then Vice-Chairman of Dungarvan UDC.

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COMMON BOND

At the November 1973 Board meeting, a discussion took place concerning the possible extension of the Common Bond to cover areas outside the Dungarvan Urban area. At the December 1973 Board meeting, it was decided to propose to the next AGM that the Common Bond should be extended to include:-

(a) The postal area of Dungarvan;

(b) The postal area of Kilmacthomas;

(c) That part of the postal area of Cappoquin, east of roads D.11 and D.63; (d) That part of the postal area of Cappagh,

east of roads D.68. D.118, D.26, L.71 and T.27; (e) That part of the postal area of Clonmel,

east of road T.27 and south of a line from the junction of roads T.27 and T.75; (f) The townlands of Kilsteague and

Castlecraddock in the postal area of Tramore.

The above proposal was subsequently passed by the AGM held in December

£1,000,000 - At a Board meeting on February 20, 1978, it was announced that £1m, had been advanced in loans since the foundation of the Credit Union. PATRICK RYAN

At a Board meeting in November 1979, Mr. Patrick Ryan, who had indefatigably served as Treasurer from 1967, was appointed as full-time Office Manager, a position he has filled with distinction until his recent retirement.

Under Patrick's management, the membership of the Credit Union has had an enormous growth and has extended its Common Bond to most of mid-Waterford. It has also seen the purchase of its own premises at Mary Street and the full computerisation of office facilities.

Patrick has been a dedicated and efficient servant of the Credit Union. He has worked continuously on behalf of the Credit Union movement, not only in Dungarvan but right throughout Chapter Ten, which covers sixteen Credit Unions in both Waterford and Tipperary. Because of his expertise in

Credit Union affairs and his perception of the need for growth and improvements for the benefit of all members, he was much sought after for seminars and workshops on Credit Union affairs.

Patrick's quiet, gentle and

unassuming nature made him extremely popular within the movement. Patrick's approachable manner was but one of his many fine traits and contributed to his excellent success as manager. He earned the respect and affection of all members as is evidenced by the large number of people who speak of him with such high regard and esteem.

PRESIDENTS

Feehan (R.I.P.), Miss C. Greaney. Mr. A. Colbert, and the movement continues to thrive today under the presidency of Miss Alicia Browne.



(continued from Page 15) over the past ten years, has been the co-operation received from the larger local employer, and employees, in allowing pay-roll deductions to be introduced. This method was first introduced to the local Credit Union in co-operation with Dungarvan Crystal in March 1980. It was subsequently introduced into Waterford Co-op. in June 1980, and into Waterford County Council and Stafford Miller and it is hoped to develop this facility further in the future with other firms in the area

COMPUTERISATION From 1980 onwards the size of the Credit Union and the complexity of keeping accounts by the full-time staff and voluntary workers, led the Board into researching the possibility of purchasing a computer. Eventually, after a lot of consideration, a Monroe Computer was installed on October 1, 1982, and this was updated in 1988.

At the same time, an Xerox Copier was installed and two counter machines. Sometime previously the Credit Union had purchased a large strong-room for the safe-keeping of records. The Credit Union has continued to update these facilities to ensure that the service given to the public is as efficient as possible.

A VIEW FROM MID-WATERFORD

The Credit Union Movement extended to the Bonmahon, Kilmacthomas, Kill and Stradbally areas of Mid-Waterford in 1973, thanks to the efforts of Rev. Michael Enright, who had just been transferred to the

parish to serve as curate in tion of the community, and of whom have been in-Ballylaneen, which is situated half-way between Bonmahon and Kilmacthomas. Fr. Enright, a native of Abbeyside, was familiar with the benefits of Credit Unions in communities and due to his initiative and foresight, and with the help of Patrick Ryan, the backbone of Dungarvan Credit Union, he organised the first meeting at Ballylaneen Parochial Room, beside St. Anne's Church.

A handful of interested people attended that first meeting, but, little did anyone realise at the time, the huge benefit to this area that would follow that first inaugural gathering. A number of meetings followed in Bonmahon and Kilmacthomas, after which a savings group was set up with the intention of forming a Credit Union in the area. However, following a feasibility study and taking into account the wide area to be covered, it was decided more prudent to join with Dungarvan Credit Union.

The time was very appropriate, too, for Dungarvan 1987. Up to that time, Nicky Credit Union to extend their Common Bond, to take in the mid-Waterford area as the Credit Union was then moving to their own new extensive premises in Mary Street, which was a milestone in their twenty-five years existence.

Sub-offices were then set up in Bonmahon, Kill, Kilmacthomas and Stradbally and were served by voluntary officers from the locality. Since 1973 the Credit Union movement in the above areas has grown from strength to strength with a weekly-increasing membership from a wide cross sec-

small beginnings in 1973, the benefits that are now enjoyed by members of Dungarvan Credit Union in this area are enormous, thanks to the efforts of Rev. Fr. Enright and Mr. Patrick Ryan, and are very much appreciated.

It is appropriate that a fifth sub-office was opened in Ballylaneen in 1987, scene of the inaugural meeting in 1973 and the Credit Union in the locality continues to grow, so much so, that after much deliberation it was decided to build a sub-office in the mid-Waterford area of the Common Bond. It has taken quite a while for this project to get off the ground and thankfully it is now nearing completion and we look forward to the opening of the new office in Stradbally in the very near future.

One cannot reminisce about the last few years without mentioning the late Mr. Nicholas Fitzgerald, Carrigcastle, who passed to his eternal reward in January was involved in the Credit Union in the area from day one in 1973 and his dedication was widely known.


STAFF

County Board Meeting

It was argumentative and noisy and at the end of three hours there was very little progress made. It was the first and by my reckoning one of the worst meetings of the County Board held for a very long time.

It began a bit late as the County Fixtures Committee had to examine the sechampionship nior groupings that were to have been announced to the meeting, but the chairman, Eamon O Murchu said that this matter would have to be deferred because of the acceptance of Tallow in senior hurling.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

Following some discussion it was decided to continue to run the senior championships on a league system, even though a proposition to run the football on a knock-out arrangement was put to the meeting. This proposition was put by Ballinacourty Club. Tom Cunningham, Munster Council, asked the meeting to consider the idea of having the football on a knock-out and at the same time run proper leagues, with a promotion and relegation arrangement built in.

The bye-law dealing with the structuring of the championships was next discussed and when the meeting finally accepted that what was included as a bye-law, was only a regulation, they agreed to discuss the Tallow application for re-admission to the senior hurling championships. Ned Power was the club spokesman and having clearly outlined his reasons why the club should be accepted back in senior ranks and it was obvious that a majority favoured the application, even though there was quite a number who had reservations.

Following their accep-

tance, an application from An Rinn/Seana Phobal/Ard Mhor for permission to enter a group team in both senior hurling and football was read. This proposition took a hammering after delegates referred to the enormous problems that would result for the Western Board if this suggestion was accepted. It was also pointed out that the policy of having group teams in league-style championships had long changed. HURLING

SUPPORT GROUP

Its real title is the Waterford Hurlers Finance Support Group and a document before the meeting gave details of how, why and when it was set up. It comprises of a group of people, all of whom were deeply involved at some stage in the past, either in the playing of the games or in the administrative field, with the Boards in the county. The main purposes of the group are defined as: "To enable the county senior hurling team, through the provision of additional funding, to achieve its full potential and maximum success by alleviating the heavy financial burden on the County Board."

The group will operate and generate finance from its own efforts and sources separately from any County Board fund-raising body and the finance raised will permit the County Board to engage in a programme of organised training comparable to that already in operation in Tipperary,

Waterford's New York Club Galway, Wexford and Limerick. The group expressed the hope that its financing will allow the County Board to divert funds to other promotional activity to the obvious general advantage of the game in the county.

The County Chairman explained that the document had been discussed with a delegation from the group and the county hurling selectors and a couple of points that needed to be cleared up, had been ironed out. There was one other matter that also needed to be discussed with the group. The proposal was given an enthusiastic reception by the meeting and it was described as a very welcome development that would help hurling - particularly at senior level in the county.

The unanimous decision was to welcome the group and permission was given to an Coisde Gnotha to inform the Support Group of its decision, when the one outstanding point had been cleared up.

(The group consists of fifteen people and is not to be confused with the Waterford Hurlers Supporters Club.)

REGRADINGS

After the Divisional Boards had submitted their packages of transfers and regradings, an appeal was read from Faha seeking to have a decision of the Western Board reversed. It stated that the Divisional Board had approved the regradings of five players to junior status, but the Board had changed this when they were given a County Board ruling on the matter. The chairman undertook to have the bye-laws researched to confirm that

the particular bye-laws, which decided against Faha, were inadvertently included in the book and

were described as outrageous and disgraceful by some members.

Former County Board Chairman, James Tobin proposed that the increases be rejected. Others agreed. The Chairman then stated that the procedures adopted were like those adopted by Russia and the Iron Curtain countries in the Bresnev era and said that he could not understand why the proposals, which were put to the Central Council meeting only ten minutes before the meeting began, were not put to the county officers who had attended a meeting in Croke Park on the previous Saturday. He said these procedures were like those of Bresnev's Russia. This statement was described as being outrageous and irresponsible and was totally rejected by the Central Council representative.

At the conclusion of this fiery debate, the county chairman proposed that he be allowed to request that standing orders be suspended at Congress in order to have the matter debated there. He was advised by the Central Council delegate that this would not be accepted, since the price of tickets was not a matter for Congress.

It was agreed however that the County Board should proceed along these lines.

NEW PLAYING RULES

Because of the lateness of the hour at which this item on the agenda was reached, it was agreed to defer a debate until the March meeting which is now scheduled for Monday 26th.


