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Successful Liver Transplant Gives Young Dungarvan Girl A Future

[Exclusive To "THE LEADER"]

Seven years old Caroline Dee, daughter of Eddie and Nellie Dee, Childers Estate, Dungarvan is at present in the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Birmingham, recovering following a 6-hours liver transplant operation.

A few weeks ago, the bouncy, dark-haired girl was at death's door as she lay in a coma with hepatitis in a Dublin hospital where her parents were told that she had but hours to live unless a liver donor could be located.

Fortunately, as it happened, an adult liver was located in Birmingham. Caroline was immediately flown there from Dublin at the height of a storm and then rushed, with a police escort, from the airport to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Edgbaston. There Eddie and Nellie were forced to endure an agonising wait while surgeons battled for six hours to save their daughter's life by implanting an adult liver which had been cut down to size.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

HELP THE BLIND!

In the first of last Sunday's readings we heard how God inspired Samuel to choose David to be both king and spiritual ruler of God's chosen people. It was a surprise in the way David's brothers were passed over. Even Samuel was puzzled for many of them would have seemed to possess the ideal qualities. However, when David was presented, the Lord said "this is the one." He was selected to lead his people and win glory for them and for God. Indeed, God's ways are not always our ways. He does not judge by outward appearances. He looks into the heart, so when His choice even favours the "unlikely", it is wise not to question His will. Indeed, we are not all called to play important and outstanding roles in life, but, be under no misgivings, because, whatever part you may be chosen to play, there you will find fulfilment.

Frequently, you do hear criticism, especially in the papers, about Church appointments. It does not happen, as was in the case of David, that the apparently best candidates are passed over. I have a particular case in mind, where subsequent events would seem to have indicated that the Holy Spirit had taken a hand, and said "he is not the one." Of course, human nature reacts and feels slighted, which is, after all, a very human reaction. The danger lies in resentment and jealousy. The sensible and humble person would banish all resentment, and bow to God's will. That person would be very close to God. There's a lot in the old saying "what is one man's cure, is another man's poison." Anyhow, you'll forgive me for twisting a quote from Canon Sheehan: "The Lord often sends people the one they deserve." The Christ like approach, as I indicated, in all these matters, is to humbly welcome God's will, and then strive to give it unselfish support. Those who give unquestioned obedience to their superiors, will tell you that their cups were so filled with happiness that the overflow spilled into the lives of those around and beyond them.

To ensure we have got the right attitude, we ought to ask ourselves, is it God's honour or that of our own we seek? "He wants to be prince. I want to be prince. Who will drive the donkey." God looks into the heart. He knows best. Surely then, if God offers us the opportunity to acquire greatness in the doing of little things, we'd be most foolish not to accept. Some of our greatest Saints were rejected in their lifetime. They found greatness in obscurity. Indeed, Mary was chosen for greatness, but look at her life, and you will find comfort and encouragement. We cannot all be leaders, but we can all find greatness through faithful service. Lent is a good time to ask ourselves: how goes it with our stewardship? It is a pity, when we are blessed with so much time and energy, that we give so little back to God. The ideal would be to let God have every moment through your daily consecration. You'll find, as the Gospel illustrates, each moment will draw you closer to God.

St. Paul in the second reading is telling us that God picked us out in Baptism, when He called us to share in His life. He filled our souls with the spirit of light; and we have only to follow that light to fulfil our vocation. It means spreading the spirit of Christ. And, there's so much scope for action that if we should

dered our responsibilities, we'd transform the world. The big problem is, we are ashamed to acknowledge openly our friendship with Jesus. The sad part is, we have so much to give, and there's so many in need. We do keep our religion up our sleeves! Remember, we have not got all day. If night comes, we will no longer be able to lead others into the light.

BEHAVE LIKE CHRIST

The Lord warned us that the devil is a very active and a very dangerous person. He is always on the prowl. Now, we can all help to put a stop to his canter. God has marked out the safe road to Heaven. If we follow His instructions faithfully, others will find their way out of the darkness. You know the rich reward that is at stake. Let others into God's secrets. He is depending on you to influence your neighbours. You don't have to do anything. You behave like Christ. I assure you that you'll rejoice on the last day, when you behold the numbers that found salvation through your example.

In the Gospel, Jesus gives evidence of His power. He heals a man born blind. The miracle, which should also have opened the eyes of the Pharisees, only confirmed them in their own blindness. When they questioned the man, it is interesting to compare their reactions with those of the one who'd been cured. When finally they declared Jesus to be a sinner, whose power and authority was unknown to them, the man said: "that is rich. A man works a miracle, which no one else has been able to do, and yet! ye say "ye do not know from whence he came . . ." Why! if this man were not from God, how come that God gives him such power?" They made no reply, except to tell him to get out and not come back. This man was not afraid to speak for Jesus. The Gospel tells us how Jesus rewarded him.

When Jesus heard the news, He sought out the man who'd confessed Christ to the best of his knowledge; and rewarded him. Jesus told him who He was, and he immediately believed and worshipped Him. Undoubtedly, God teaches and enlightens the teachable. Jesus did not allow the behaviour of the Pharisees to pass. He said "they were responsible for their own blindness," so, there was no excuse for their sin. It is a warning. We know what He said. We know what He wants us to do, and the reasons why. It is God who has spoken. So, listen and take heed, and open your eyes.

WHY NOT GIVE US A TRY?

Ardmore Fisherman Convicted For Assaulting Fishery Inspector

District Justice W. F. O'Connell said at Youghal Court last Thursday that he would give every possible protection to fishery officers, who, he said, appeared to be fair game for fishermen who resented being investigated and prosecuted. He said that the officers were carrying out an unpleasant and at times even dangerous duty and were virtually always at risk.

The Justice made his comments at the conclusion of a case in which John Farrissey, a fisherman of 8 College Road, Ardmore, was prosecuted by the Southern Regional Fisheries Board for assaulting Fishery Inspector Edward Casey at Ardmore on August 17 last, and being in possession or in control of two illegal monofilament fishing nets on the same occasion.

The Court was told that Fishery Officers seized the nets, which were in a fixed position, in Ardmore Bay. Subsequently John Farrissey approached Inspector Casey and accused the officers of "taking my f---nets."

Inspector Casey said that when Farrissey had been cautioned he repeated that the nets were his and said that the officers "had cleaned him out." He added that the defendant called him a tramp and told him he wasn't wanted in Ard-

more and invited him to fight.

Witness went on to say that Farrissey then tried to pull him from his car a number of times and threatened he would shoot him when next they met.

John Farrissey in evidence denied that the nets seized by the officers were his or that he had assaulted Inspector Casey. "I never laid a hand on him," he told the Court.

District Justice O'Connell having made the comments quoted at the outset dismissed the charge in relation to the nets stating that he had some doubts about their ownership. However, he convicted Farrissey on the assault charge and fined him £200 with £100 costs and £30 expenses. In addition he bound the defendant to the peace for a period of 12 months.

Mr. D. A. Keane Solr. was for the Fisheries Board and Mr. P. J. Lavan Solr. was for the defendant.

First National Conference Of Fianna Fail Councillors

Nearly 400 Fianna Fail councillors from all over the country attended the first ever National Conference of Fianna Fail councillors held in Athlone last Sunday. The conference was addressed by the Taoiseach and Party Leader Mr. Charles Haughey and by the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Padraig Flynn.

Members of Waterford County Council present at the conference included Cllr. Tom Cunningham, Stradbally, Fianna Fail Councillors Whip on the Council, Cllr. C. O Riain and Cllr. S. Dunphy. Cllr. Nuala Ryan, Dungarvan Urban Council was also in attendance.

The principal announcement at the conference concerned the postponement of the June local elections which are now unlikely to take place for more than a year. Making the announcement the Taoiseach said that the postponement would allow a major review of the structures and funding of local authorities to be carried

out. Mr. Haughey said that the Government had abandoned plans for an all-party consensus on the reforms needed and would now present its own proposals. That, he added, was one of a number of clear, compelling reasons why the elections should not be held next June. "There are a lot of major events in June, particularly the Dublin EC Summit, a lot of examinations are held then and the World Cup. There is general agreement, particularly amongst councillors and all parties, that it would not be advisable to hold them until the reforms are in place," he added.

CO. AGRICULTURAL COMMITTEES TO BE RESTORED

Cllr. Cunningham told the "Leader" on Monday that the conference had proved most satisfactory from the councillors' point of view. In addition to the postponement of the local elections he said that the Taoiseach also announced that the old Committees of Agriculture would be restored in a new format on a county basis under Teagasc. "That", said Cllr. Cunningham, "is a most important decision as far as we are concerned at local level."

Cllr. Cunningham said that the conference was also informed that the up-

keep of courthouses, the concern of Co. Councils up to now, would, for the future, become a charge on Central Funds.

They had also been told, he said, that the pay-out to cover the funding for storm damage repairs would be done "very soon."

Cllr. O Riain received a spontaneous ovation from all his colleagues when, during the course of an hour long "question and answer" session before the conference ended, he told the Taoiseach and the other Ministers present that "if they had listened to the local councillors before the last election they would not be in the position they now found themselves in."

Cllr. P. Kenneally Replies To Accusations By Youghal School Principals

In the course of a statement which he issued on Wednesday of last week, Waterford County Councillor, Mr. Paddy Kenneally, Aghish, replied to accusations levelled at him by the three Principals of Youghal's Second Level Schools following a statement which he made at the January monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee held in Dungarvan.

Cllr. Kenneally had claimed at the meeting that a majority of the parents and students in the Clashmore area had a definite preference for Dungarvan schools as compared with the schools in Youghal. And arising from this he called on the Department of education to review the schools catchment areas in the county so that transport could be provided to bring Clashmore students to the second level schools in Dungarvan.

Following the publication of the report of this meeting, the Principals of the three second level schools in Youghal, Sister Patricia of the Loreto Convent, Mr. Peter Nolan, Christian Brothers School and Mr. George Ward, Technical College held a Press Conference at which a joint statement was issued strongly denying that a majority of Clashmore parents and students had a preference for the schools in Dungarvan. The statement pointed out that two separate surveys carried out

among the parents and students in the Clashmore district showed clearly that their preference was for the Youghal schools and it accused Cllr. Kenneally of casting a slur on their educational establishments.

In his statement of last week, Cllr. Kenneally hit back stating that he was not answerable to "vested educational interests in Youghal." He said that representations had been made to him to try and get transport for Clashmore students to bring them to the second level schools in Dungarvan. He went on to claim that for a number of years past, students from the area had been on the road from as early as 6 a.m. hitching their way in to the schools in Dungarvan. Now due to the intervention of a private bus operator he was glad to say that the situation for the students concerned had greatly improved.

"The parents in the Clashmore area are well aware of the high profile which Dungarvan's second

level schools enjoy and their examinations success rate over the years," said Cllr. Kenneally in concluding his statement.

Dungarvan Executive Fine Gael AGM

The annual general meeting of Dungarvan District Executive Fine Gael was held in Dungarvan recently. There was a good attendance of delegates from the branches, including Cllr. Michael O'Riordan and Cllr. Richie Walsh.

During a general discussion, grave disappointment was expressed at the failure of the Department of the Environment to make funds available for the repair of the storm damage in the area. Grave concern was also expressed at increasing interest rates, with its dire consequences for mortgage holders.

Addressing the meeting, Deputy Austin Deasy also referred to the high interest rates and its potentiality for destabilising the economy and as well as the hardship for young couples with mortgages, the danger of causing a lot of unrest.

COMPROMISE SOLUTION TO DUNGARVAN BANK DEVELOPMENT CRUX

The good news announced at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night was that County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley had successfully intervened in the controversy surrounding the proposed development to be carried out by the Bank of Ireland at their premises in Grattan Square.

The controversy centred around the height of the new development for which planning permission had been granted by the Council and to which the local Museum Society objected on the grounds that it did not match the height of the building opposite it and thus destroyed the architectural symmetry of the Square. They accordingly appealed the matter to An Bord Pleanála.

At last Monday night's meeting of the Urban Council, the Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White, informed the members that there had been a new development in the issue following a meeting during the previous week between the County Manager and Officers of the Museum Society. In the discussion which took place at the meeting he said that the Museum Society had indicated their willingness to withdraw their objection provided that the

County Manager would use his good offices with the Bank of Ireland to get minor amendments made to their development plan which would not be a material change and have low cost implications.

Mr. White said that the County Manager agreed to initiate discussions with the Bank as suggested and had, in fact, succeeded in doing so. As a result he said that a message had been received from the Bank people on Monday evening stating that they were prepared to fall in line with the proposals put to them by Mr. Hurley.

The Town Clerk added that as the problem had now been solved it could be expected that a builder would be on site to start work on the new extension and development within a month.

The members generally welcomed the good news as did Cllr. B. Kyne but

who, in doing so, said that he wished to totally reject the remarks directed at him from some quarters over this issue. At the end of the day, Cllr. Kyne said, it was the elected members of the Council who represented the people of the town and no one else.

DANGEROUS ROADSIDE TREES

Further to our reference in this column last week concerning dangerous roadside trees and whose was the responsibility for removing them we noted that our colleagues on "The Kingdom", now one of County Kerry's widest circulating papers and published in Killarney by the MacMonagle family, were also on the same subject.

In "the Captain's Corner" of the last issue of "The Kingdom" it was stated that "lest anybody be in any doubt about the law relating to falling trees, here it is enunciated by Colm Kennelly, Kerry County Engineer: the person on whose property the tree stands is responsible for it. It is up to that person to ensure that trees are not dangerous to the public."

Obviously they have experienced the same problems down in Kerry as we have here in Waterford following the many fierce storms which lashed the countryside over the past winter. While many trees were blown down by the gales a big number still standing along our roadsides must have had their roots weakened and could consequently now drop without warning at any time. It is therefore incumbent on landowners with roadside property to ensure whenever such tree overhang the roads to have them examined and if found dangerous to have them removed, otherwise they could be paying out dearly in insurance claims.

COUNCILLORS GET AN EXTENSION — WITH EXTRA PAY

Following the announcement by the Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey, when he addressed up to 400 Fianna Fail councillors at the first ever national assembly of Fianna Fail councillors held in Athlone last Sunday that the local elections, due next June, were to be postponed, it now seems likely that

these elections will not be held until next year and possibly not even until 1992.

Mr. Haughey said that the elections were off pending a major review of the structures and funding of local authorities adding that the Government had not decided when they would be held but that they hoped to be in a position to do so "shortly."

While this excuse may be valid in its own way, the fact of the matter is that the shelving of the elections was forced on the Taoiseach by increasing demands from Fianna Fail councillors throughout the country who feared the party would lose seats because of the present dissatisfaction among the electorate because of the Government cutbacks on roads, housing and services generally.

But the reform of local government is something which has now been on the stocks for the past five years and nothing has so far been done about it. The legislation required must now start from scratch and this will take at least a year if not more to prepare and enact into law so the existing councils must carry on with the same personnel until the Government does decide when the elections are to be held.

However the extension has been given a "sweetener" by Minister for the Environment Pdraig Flynn who announced last week that the expenses paid to Councillors for attendance at meetings and conferences were to be increased with retrospective effect as from January 1 last.

The mileage rate for those who have to travel to meetings has been increased from 53p to 72p while the new subsistence allowance is £18 compared with the existing rate of £14.45.

In the case of Urban Councillors and Town Commissioners who live within five miles of the meeting places, the allowance to be paid per meeting now goes up to £20.

The mileage allowances payable for attendances at conferences have been set as follows: 70p per mile (for cars over 1138 C.C.) and 52p per mile (for cars under 1138 C.C.). In addition an overnight allowance of £50 in respect of each night during which a councillor is absent from home on conference business is payable.

While councillors gener-

ally have welcomed these increases it remains to be seen what the reaction of the general public to them will be especially at a time when local authority budgets are under severe strain.

NOT A TIED VOTE

The election of Cllr. Michael Queally (FG.) at

last week's Co. Council meeting as the Council's representative to the Moorepark Regional Advisory Council as set up by Teagasc was on an 11-9 vote for Cllr. Tom Cunningham (F.F.) and not decided by the Chairman's casting vote as reported last week. The vote taken was by a show of hands. This is just to set the record straight.

The Yankee boys with stars and stripes came flocking round to see
This gallant band of Fenian men from Erin's Lovely Lee.

Or could I tell where Crowley fell, his native land to free,
Or the tower that Captain Mackey sacked down Erin's Lovely Lee.

When he gave the word we raised a cheer that made the tyrants frown
We raised the Shamrock on our flag, the Harp without the Crown.

TIME FOR THOSE EARLY POTATOES

By Pete Moss

NEW warmth in the soil usually means that early varieties of potato can be planted by the end of March.

These early and hardy varieties, such as Duke of York and Home Guard, mean you could be enjoying superb new potatoes fresh from your own garden - the best of all - in June.

Later varieties such as the ever popular Majestic and King Edward are equally rewarding with their weighty crops.

This speedy and profitable growth and the fact that the potato is unfussy about where it is grown, have helped make it a popular part of the British diet.

At worst they are not happy in a lime-type soil but are otherwise tolerant, though some soil preparation is advisable the previ-

ous autumn. Dig in lots of well-rotted organic compost and leave the bed rough dug so that the winter weather can break it down nicely.

It is a good idea to order your seed potatoes or sets a while before planting and try to buy ones clearly guaranteed disease-free.

Trays

Early types should be given a start before planting by being slightly spaced apart in trays in cool, light but frost-free conditions a few weeks before planting.

This allows the tubers to sprout ready for a prompt start when you plant them, which should be about 4-5 inches deep and about a foot apart, divided into rows about two feet apart, in the case of early varieties.

For main crop varieties such as Majestic you should increase those spacing allowances by about a third.



The planting technique is very much a matter of preference - some gardeners plant individually with a trowel while others hoe a narrow trench.

But you must protect the early varieties from possible frost by layering straw around the young shoots or gently raising soil around them.

Weeds

The latter method is a curtain-raiser to 'earthing up' to encourage the side roots which form the potato tubers you are so keen to harvest.

The method also protects the tubers which can turn an unwholesome green otherwise.

Weeds may be a problem because the earthed rows cannot be hoed easily without possible damage to the young tubers and roots, so mulch the surface with straw to starve the weeds of light and retain moisture.

One of the nice things about early potatoes is that you can also start harvesting them as soon as the tubers are big enough to eat. They taste best then and if you harvest the first growth carefully and gently mound soil around the plants again, there will be further growth for harvesting.

However, Majestic and other main crop types are harvested at full size at the end of the summer, to be dried for a few hours before careful storing.

WHETHER you are barbecuing or grilling meat, it is a good idea to marinate it first. This helps to tenderise, moisten and give added flavour to the cooked meat.

If you are going to marinate chicken or duck portions, make slashes in the meat to allow the marinade to permeate as much of the meat as possible. Some people may also prefer to remove the skin as well.

Honey combines well with ingredients such as chopped herbs, onion, garlic, fruit juice and wine which mixed with a little oil gives a delicious flavour and glaze to the cooked meat.

Leave the meat to marinate for up to 24 hours, covered in a cool place. Turn the meat occasionally and do allow it to come to room temperature before cooking. Try these recipes.

Honeyed Duck

Ingredients
4 duck breast portions (or chicken or turkey fillet)

Barbecued meats with honey

4 tablespoons clear honey
2 tablespoons oil
2 tablespoons fruit juice - apple, pineapple or orange
1 clove garlic, skinned and crushed
1 tablespoon finely chopped fresh ginger root
1/2 teaspoon ground pepper
salt to taste

Method:
Remove the skin from the



duck and make 3-4 slashes in each portion. Mix together the honey, oil, fruit juice, garlic, ginger and pepper.

Marinate the meat in this mixture for several hours, or up to 24 hours, turning occasionally. Remove from the marinade and cook under a hot grill, basting with the marinade, for about 30 minutes until cooked through.

Sprinkle with salt to taste. Serve garnished with tomato halves and parsley sprigs.
Serves 4

Keep meat moist — Greek Lamb Kebabs

Ingredients
450g (1lb) lean lamb, cut in to cubes
4 tablespoons clear honey

2 tablespoons oil
grated rind and juice 1/2 lemon
1 tablespoon dried rosemary
1/2 teaspoon ground pepper
1 medium onion, skinned and quartered
salt to taste

Method:
Place the meat in a shallow dish. Mix together the honey, oil, lemon rind and juice, parsley, rosemary, pepper and pour over the meat. Marinate for several hours, or up to 24 hours, turning occasionally.

Carefully separate the onion layers. Thread meat and single pieces of onion alternately on to each of four skewers. Cook under a hot grill, basting occasionally with the marinade, for 15-20 minutes until cooked through. Sprinkle with salt to taste. Serve at once garnished with lemon slices and parsley sprigs.
Serves 4.

While the main theme for the week will be walking, the public will be able to try activities like badminton, tennis, canoeing and swimming.

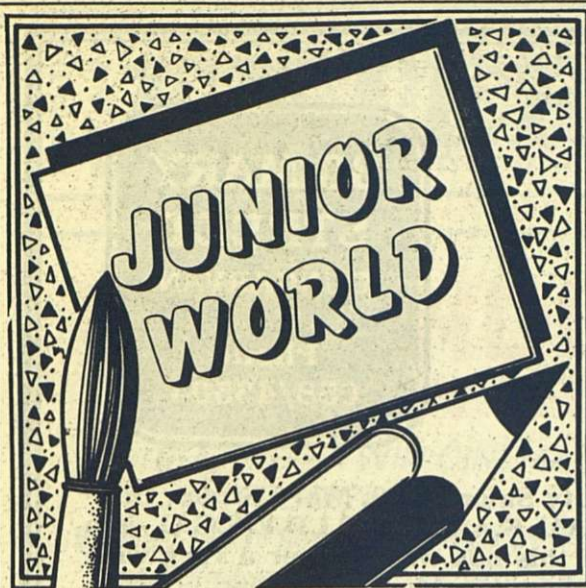

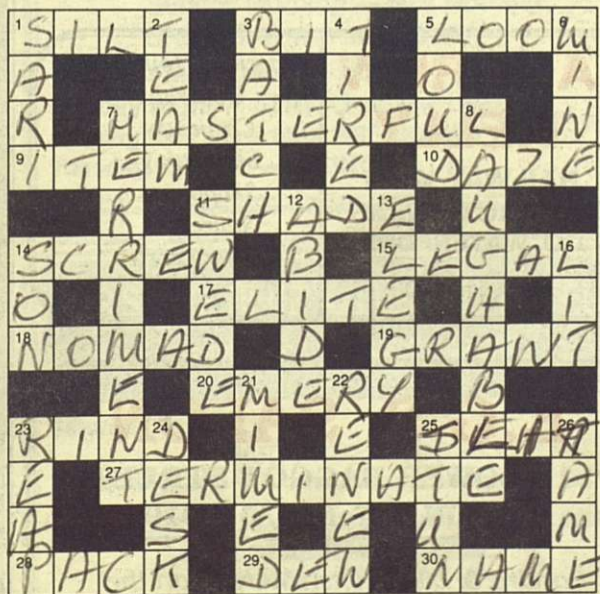

Along with Tony Cascarino's move to Aston Villa, Niall Quinn has finally got away from Arsenal, his first club. His £800,000 move to Manchester City plunges him in a relegation battle, but first team football is vital to his chances of making the final panel of 22.

Martin Russell, a skillful midfielder has also left Scabo for Middlesboro for a fee of approximately £180,000.

David Kelly has been given a release from West Ham so his fortunes have slumped in the last season. Joining him on a free release from Upton Park is Eamon Dolan who has been with West Ham for a number of years.

On Saturday week Tony Cascarino made his league debut with first division league leaders Aston Villa in an away victory against Derby County.

The £1.5m. transfer fee is a million miles away from this second generation international with Italian grandparents on his fathers side.

Like a lot of boys in Orpington outside London, Tony liked sport, cricket, athletics and football. As a youth he had trials with Millwall and Arsenal but nothing came of them, so it was amateur football and a combination of day jobs. At 17 he took up hairdressing, it meant the end of his football for 18 months. When he finished with hairdressing he worked on a building site with his father Dominic and this allowed him back into football with Crockenhill in the Kent League. Recommended by the club's sponge man, Peter Willard, to his brother-in-law Gillingham manager, Keith Peacock, Tony Cascarino signed for Gillingham for the same pay he had on the building site — £100 weekly.

During his 6 years at Gillingham he scored around 20 goals each season and it was at Gillingham that the Irish connection was discovered. Irish international goalkeeper, Seamus McDonagh, then on loan with Gillingham, learned from his team mate that his mother was Teresa O'Malley, daughter of Michael O'Malley, formerly of Westport, Co. Mayo. Via McDonagh, Eoin Hand called him up to play in Jimmy Holmes benefit game. He scored and made his international debut against Switzerland on September 11, 1985, in the European Championships.

Millwall then lowly placed in the 2nd division secured his services for £200,000 and his goal scoring ability helped Millwall gain promotion to the 1st division and while things went well

for Cascarino at the Den his international career seemed to end when Charlton replaced Eoin Hand.

At first Cascarino didn't rate in Charlton's plans but under the guidance of Millwall's John Doherty the Irish player with the Italian connection made the squad for Euro '88 as understudy to Frank Stapleton.

The World Cup campaign thrust Tony Cascarino further into the international limelight and goals against Hungary and Northern Ireland confirmed his place in Ireland's first World Cup finals.

While Millwall were fighting for their 1st division future and sacking their manager, Cascarino's goals dried up. But the Aston Villa manager, Graham Taylor's, long admiration for Cascarino saw him get his man for a new Aston Villa record of £1.5 million. His weekly pay is now reckoned to be £3,000 — a long way from the building site and Gillingham.

With the Villa, Cascarino has the perfect stage to confirm his position as the first choice striker with Ireland. He also has reversed the Euro '88 position with Frank Stapleton, now an outsider for the remaining spot with Aldridge and now Bernie Slavin on the scene.

In my view Cascarino at first was slow off the mark. He has improved in this department and his new club can only help Cascarino get back to his Italian roots with Jack Charlton who will be depending on his size and strength to unlock defences for the likes of Ray Houghton and Ronnie Whelan to score goals, to take him from the islands of Sardinia and Sicily, nearer to where the Cascarino's originally came from — Monte Cassino.

Married now to Sara, Tony Cascarino has a 6 month old baby boy called Michael — after the other side of the Cascarino family — Michael O'Malley of Westport.

On Dave's behalf I think it only fitting that such a person had the honour of captaincy because as

a committee member he has been a tireless worker over the last three years and has always followed through with his commitments and responsibilities, irrespective of what pressure he had to endure.

And, speaking of committees, a special thanks to caretaker chairman, John Cliffe who stepped into the gap following the unexpected resignation of Dermot Kelly. I only sincerely hope that he may consider staying in that position proper next year as he epitomises what every committee member should be, unselfish to the point of putting their own goals and ambitions aside and putting the club first every time.

It's also very nice to see former Minnies No. 1 Michael Mernin back on the court again, looking fitter and trimmer than ever, playing his part by coaching two of our more enthusiastic newcomers, Sean Woods and Joe Power of tennis fame. Such valuable experience is always appreciated and welcome and I hope it's not too long before we see Michael participating in our own internal competitions. Of these, there are two left, the individual championship (which has commenced this week) and the top 24, a new tournament designed for those who finish between 1-24 in the ladder. This competition should make for very entertaining and enjoyable games and I urge all eligible players to enter as soon as they are posted, to avoid disappointment.

I would also appeal to our leading players to get involved in refereeing club games, a feature of which they have been noticeably reluctant to participate in and set the proper example in their own games which will ensure that referees can do their job without fear of hassle or intimidation.

Our next outing will, I hope, be when our ladies reach the knock-out stage of the Country League and if Gerry Foley can only organise an advance on next year's £40, will guarantee the biggest support the club has ever seen.

Waterford did have their chances of snatching victory over Dublin in this rather disappointing quarter final match of the National Hurling League at Thurles on Sunday, but had this happened it would have been a travesty of justice, as on the day the Leinster side fully deserved to win.

Over the hour Dublin were faster and sharper and appeared to show greater eagerness in hunting every ball. Waterford, on the other hand took far too long to settle and allowed their opponents to run up a six points lead before registering our first score. As well, a few of our players failed to play anywhere near their full potential, which was required if we were to have any hope of winning here. It was a match from which Waterford mentors will have learned a lot — that is if they can find the material to replace the obvious weaknesses that were exposed here.

Reputations can no longer be accepted as a reason for persisting with players who for some reason, do not, or cannot produce their best form in an important game, such as was the case at Thurles.

It was in the 14th minute after a splendid cross from Billy Sullivan, who was our most dangerous forward, that Mossy O'Keeffe tapped home a goal to give us an opening score. This seemed to have a good effect and we raised our game considerably for a while. Delahunty pointed and minutes later Damien Byrne missed what might have been a second goal when hesitating before striking. Shortly before the half-time whistle a wrong decision by a linesman, allowed Dublin to mount an attack from which Brian McMahon, Dublin's All-Star, rounded full-back Ryan for a goal that put his side into a 1-8 to 1-3 half time lead. This was a crippling blow and in my opinion had an effect on the eventual outcome of the game.

Waterford made a number of switches which saw

Jimmy Beresford moved to full-back and Liam O'Connor taking over at centre back.

Waterford helped by the breeze mounted two unsuccessful attacks and despite winning a lot of the ball in the first ten minutes, could manage only a single point by Delahunty. Shane Ahearne who was far from his best form hit a penalty that was saved and cleared. Both sides missed chances and Waterford were in real hard luck when Damien Byrne in goal for the Dubs., brought off two wonder saves.

With about seven minutes remaining Mossy O'Keeffe sent a 40 metres

shot all the way to the Dublin net, but this came too late to generate a resurgence of sufficient intensity to make the difference between losing and winning.

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Successful Liver Transplant Gives Young Dungarvan Girl A Future

proved to be 100 per cent successful and while Caroline is now recovering she is going through a rather critical period as her immune system adjusts to the new liver and she will remain in Birmingham under observation for a number of weeks to come. After the operation she remained in intensive care for five days in Queen's Hospital but made a sufficiently rapid recovery to be then transferred to the nearby Children's Hospital.

Caroline's parents are looking forward to her full recovery and to the day when she can return home to Dungarvan to see her four brothers and sisters. But in the meantime as her Mum has said, "Birmingham has now become like a second home for us. Everyone has been brilliant to us and we are deeply grateful to everyone who has helped us through our ordeal."

PIONEERS OF LIFE-SAVING OPERATION

It was Dr. Tom Higgins, Dungarvan, who made the arrangements for the trans-

fer of Caroline to Birmingham where surgeons at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital are pioneering a life-saving liver transplant technique which saved her life.

The head of Birmingham's liver transplant team at the hospital, the biggest in Britain, described the six hours operation, in which an adult liver was cut down to size. The operation which was carried out by a team of surgeons led by transplant expert Mr. John Buckels, would have been impossible two years ago.

Once transplanted, the liver adapts within the body and remains with the patient for life.

Incidentally, down the years, the Irish community in Birmingham has raised many thousands of pounds for the Queen Elizabeth Hospital and its various specialist units such as cancer and heart research. Money has also been raised by local Irish people for the Children's Hospital.

Youghal Fishermen Fined For Illegal Salmon Fishing

Anthony Hennessy, 140 North Main St., Youghal was convicted at Youghal Court last Thursday on three counts relating to illegal salmon fishing in Youghal Bay on August 25 last.

Evidence was given on behalf of the southern Region Fisheries Board, who brought the prosecutions, by four Fishery Officers.

The charges were vehemently denied by the defendant but District Justice O'Connell holding that Hennessy's denial was unconvincing convicted him and imposed fines totalling £200 together with costs and expenses amounting to £160.

Patrick Twomey who was a crewman in Hennessy's boat on the occasion was fined a total of £50 with £50 costs.

Mr. D. Keane Solr., was for the Fisheries Board and Mr. P. J. Lavan Solr. appeared for the defendants.

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
