Major Conference Will Mean Boom Week-End For Dungarvan

A major Local Authorities Conference is set to bring a boom week-end to Dungarvan on April 26, 27 and 28 when 250 delegates will attend the Annual Conference of the General Council of Co. Councils due to take place in the town.

The delegates will be representing every County Council in Ireland and as each will have accompanying persons, there will be quite an influx of visitors to the area and hotels and guesthouses are all fully booked out for the week-end.

The conference centre will be based in Lawlor's Hotel and following the registration of delegates on Thursday evening there will be a meeting of the Executive Committee of the General Council with Representatives of the County and City Managers' Association at 7 p.m.

The Address of Welcome to the delegates will be delivered on Friday morning by Cllr. T. Browne, Chairman of the General Council and following the Conference Blessing, the official opening will be performed by Mr. Ger Connolly T.D., Minister of State at the Department of the Environment.

THREE SESSIONS

The main business of the conference will be dealt with in three sessions, the first two on Friday, one before lunch and the other after lunch with the third session taking place on Saturday morning.

Following lunch, there will be a choice of tours for delegates to scenic areas of the county on Saturday afternoon and the proceedings will close with the Conference Banquet on Saturday night at which the

guest of honour will be Mr. Padraig Flynn T.D., Minister for the Environment.

Speaking to the "Leader" on Tuesday last, Mr. Maurice McHugh, County Development Officer, a member of the Conference Organising Committee said that this major conference, coming at an off-peak tourist period, should prove a big boon not alone for Dungarvan where all available accommodation has been booked, but for many outlying areas also.

More Comforts And Extensions For Lismore Library Service

A letter from the Department of the Environment considered by members at the April monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last week approved in principle of proposals for the development of the library service in Lismore subject to a number of minor conditions.

Mr. Dan Hurley, County Manager said that the Department's letter now gave approval for the proposals adopted by the County Libraries Committee a year ago which would mean more comforts and extensions for the service in Lismore. They also had a unique remnant of the old Carnegie Library still in Lismore and he would like to see this retained, he said. Mr. Hurley added that he

hoped that they could have the opening of the new development about next October and referring to the improvement in general and progress achieved by the County Libraries in recent years he said that Waterford was now way ahead of most counties in computerisation.

Cllr. W. McDonnell said that the news was most welcome and the people of Lismore and surrounding areas would be most pleased about it.

KILMACTHOMAS NEEDS A LIBRARY

Cllr. Tom Cunningham then moved a motion standing in his name that a library be provided in Kilmacthomas. He said that the people of Kilmacthomas were very annoyed that a public library service had not been provided for them up to this and he pointed out that this was a matter concerning which he had made representations on several occasions in the past. He proposed that the matter now be treated without further delay.

The Co. Manager said that he would prefer to stand back from this proposal until such time as the

situation about Courthouses in the county had been rationalised.

Pressed by Cllr. Cunningham, the Co. Manager promised to keep the matter under active consideration.

Co. Council Votes Sympathy

At the April monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan votes of sympathy were passed with Cllr. O. Wilkinson on the death of his father-in-law and to the family of the late Jerry Harrington, Farnane.

Proposing a vote of sympathy to the O'Brien family, Abbeyside on the death of Mrs. A. O'Brien, Cllr. B. Kyne said that the firm of E. O'Brien & Sons had a long history of house building for both Urban and Co. Councils and had contributed a great deal to what the town of Dungarvan was at the present day.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

WILL YOU HELP?

Easter Sunday: St. Peter told us he'd been an associate and disciple of Jesus, and was a witness to all He did; and assures us that His whole life was a fulfilment of all that had been foretold. Peter now feels compelled to bear witness to Jesus, and he is saying to all those who believe that they, like he, must proclaim the news that Jesus lives. We must convince the faint-hearted by our good example that Jesus is eternal life. No one would dare question the wonderful faith of the great majority of our people, but, particularly of late, many would seem to be abandoning their religion. Worse still, many are falling foul of sects espousing man-made teachings, which amounts to listening to anyone but God. Who is to blame?

St. Peter is emphasising that we all have a duty to proclaim the Good News. Sadly, there's a lot of merited criticism directed at Catholics. Many have lost all respect for God's law. When it comes to stealing, it is, do not be caught! It is, I'll please myself when it comes to chastity. It is win by any means when it comes to court cases. And, when it comes to life itself, it is no longer held sacred. One could go on and on, so, let me say, these people are doing untold harm to themselves as well as to others.

I just caught the tail-end of Mr. Hanley's RTE television programme on April 1. He asked Mr. McRedmond, whom I must confess is usually most reliable, the question: how do you feel about meeting God? I should say, Mr. McRedmond is endearing in the very happy way he approaches religious subjects. He replied, I asked Fr. E. Schillebeck, the famous Dutch theologian, the same question, and his reply was: "God is love." So, his answer is good enough for me. Indeed, no one doubts that fact, but I feel such an answer is incomplete. We too have to prove that we love God, which is the same as saying, we have got to keep the Commandments.

Reading the Gospel for April 6 I noted the Jews were angry with Jesus, and they made it evident that their anger was not because of His works, but because he claimed to be the Son of God, which in their book amounted to blasphemy. If you read through the Gospels you'd notice that the words of the prophets were fulfilled in Jesus. They foretold His coming, His place of birth, His family background, His works and the purpose of His coming. And, when Jesus claimed to be the Son of God, they asked for a sign to prove His claim. He replied: "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up again." They knew He was talking about His own body, and it was because of this claim that they ensured a guard was placed on the tomb. They were determined not to allow the disciples to steal the body, and then say, He is risen. Had His origin been only from human stock Jesus would have been foolhardy to make such a claim, when already by his life and works He'd won an honoured place in history. If He were not God his outlandish claim would have dubbed Him as a charlatan for all time. The fact is, He rose as He said He would, thereby defying all human experience.

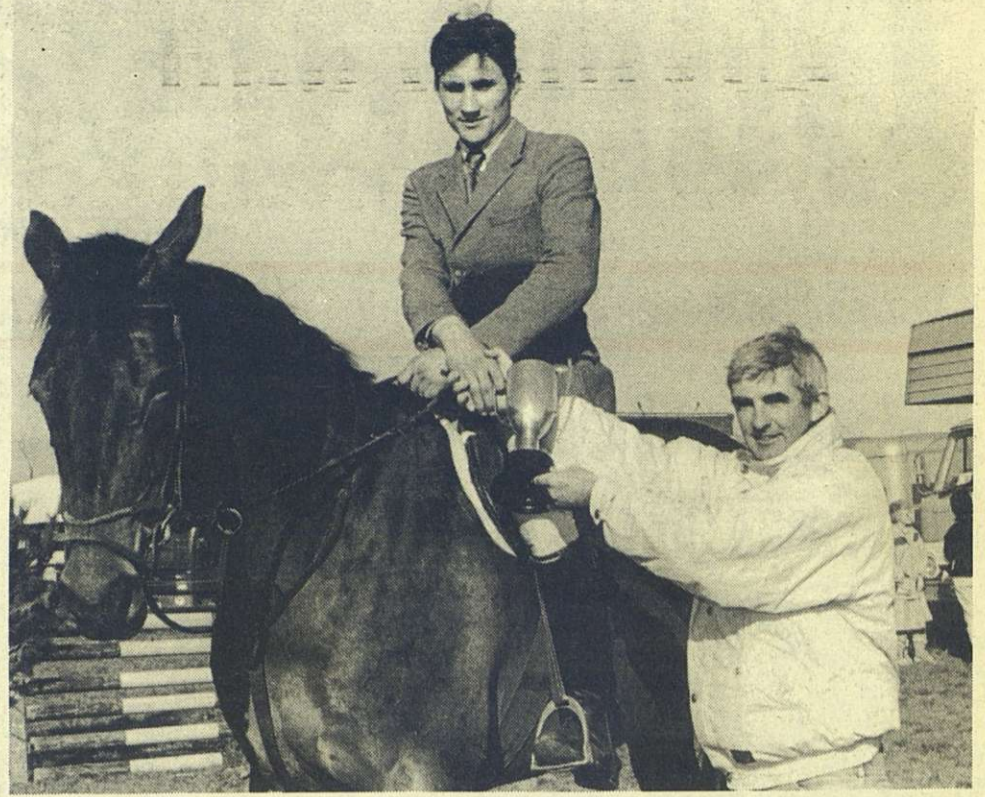
Now let us select as our witness to

the Resurrection one who was an avowed enemy of Christ. Yes, Paul is the man. He was a rabid adherent and staunch upholder of the Jewish traditions, but, when God showed him the error of his ways, he preached Christ's death and resurrection, and gave his life in defence of that teaching. He preached that "if Christ did not rise from the dead, then vain is our faith." It was the sign that Jesus gave to prove He was the Son of God, and as St. Paul said, the foundation on which our faith is founded. I have only touched on a few points, but S.S. presents us with irrefutable facts proving beyond doubt that Jesus was the Son of God, that He died, was buried and rose from the dead.

WHAT JESUS DID FOR US

Paul in the second reading spells out what Jesus did for us, as a result of which, we are now able to share through Baptism in the new life of Christ. St. Peter, who had lived and worked with Jesus, told us that he felt impelled to let everyone know about the Good News. We therefore, who now enjoy the privilege of living in the light, should gladly share our blessing. If Jesus is to have a place and a home in the world, it is up to us to make provision. Likewise, if Jesus is to show His love to the world, we must be His instruments. We must keep His presence alive and active. With the vast changes that have swept through society in recent times, I am afraid that parents must prepare themselves to shoulder responsibility in fulfilling their paternal duties. And, in this matter it is well to keep in mind that example talks louder than words. Parents! God has chosen you to share in the sacred work of begetting of your children. You must not only care and nurture them, but, above all, you must help them in the development of the new life to which they were born in Baptism. You must introduce them to God, and help them to grow in this relationship. You may be assured: if you love God, they will love Him too.

The world is sick, yes, very sick. Every day you hear and read of her deadly symptoms, but, like the little boy, she does not like God's medicine. It is up to us to insist on pouring the healing influence of Jesus into her wounds. Otherwise, many, many souls will be lost. They are hungry. Will you help in bringing them the Bread that gives life?

Know Your Rights

Q. — I was recently referred by my GP to our local hospital for physiotherapy. As I have a Hospital Services Card I understood that I would only have to pay £10 for the course of treatment. However, they informed me at the hospital that I would have to pay £10 per treatment up to a maximum of £50. Is this correct?

A. — No, this is not correct. As the holder of a Hospital Services Card the course of treatment should only cost £10 provided it is for the one condition and the condition didn't arise from a road traffic accident.

From time to time the Department of Health issue guidelines to the various Health Boards on such matters. The Health Boards in turn issue guidelines to the hospitals in their region. Sometimes these guidelines are misinterpreted or misunderstood. This may have happened in your case. You should bring the matter to the attention of your own Health Board.

Civilian and Gardai Assaulted In Midnight Fracas In Dungarvan

When a man who was observed assaulting another man at Bridge Street, Dungarvan shortly after 1 a.m. on Sunday, April 1 was being arrested, he assaulted three gardai who were taking him to the Garda Station and when he was brought there he then assaulted the Station Sergeant. This was stated at Dungarvan Court last week when Frank Keniry, 19 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, appeared on charges of assaulting William Whelan, Childers Estate and also with assaulting Garda M. Murphy, Garda R. Dunne, Garda J. J. Duggan and Sergeant M. Blake on the same occasion.

Garda M. Murphy stated in evidence that they were in the garda patrol car in Bridge Street at 1.40 a.m. on April 1 and outside the hotel they observed Keniry fighting Whelan. Keniry was punching and kicking Whelan. They stopped the car and Keniry then walked away. They found Whelan in a very bruised condition.

Garda Murphy went on to say that he went after Keniry and told him that he was arresting him and took him back to the car. Whelan was in the patrol car at that stage and when Keniry saw him he became very violent and started kicking and lashing out. Witness was knocked to the ground as Keniry still kept kicking. With the assistance of Garda Dunne and Garda Duggan they succeeded in forcing Keniry into the car and took him to the Garda Station. There they had to force him inside as he still was acting violently and when they got him in he punched and kicked Sergeant Blake who was the Garda Sergeant.

In reply to Mr. N. King, Solr. who appeared for the defendant, Garda Murphy said that he saw an iron bar at the scene of the fight and that Keniry had alleged that Whelan had struck him with it earlier.

Garda R. Dunne giving evidence said that he was in the patrol car with Garda Murphy and he saw Keniry fighting with Whelan in

Bridge Street and punching and kicking him. He then corroborated the evidence as given by Garda Murphy and added that as they were forcing Keniry into the patrol car he was kicked in the leg and punched in the shoulder by Keniry. When they arrived at the Garda Station Keniry refused to go in and lashed out again but after a struggle they eventually got him inside.

Garda J. J. Duggan gave evidence that he was on foot patrol duty on the night in question and on receiving a radio message he went to Bridge Street. There he saw Garda Murphy on the ground and Keniry was on top of him kicking and punching. Keniry then refused to get into the patrol car and was very violent and continued to kick and punch.

GOT A BROKEN NOSE

William Whelan then gave evidence and said that at about 1.30 a.m. on April 1 he was walking along the Causeway coming from Abbeyside when Keniry came along and started pushing him and kicking and punching him in the back and in the face. He ran over by the hotel but Keniry kept kicking and punching him and he got a broken nose. He did nothing to provoke Keniry on the occasion.

Witness then said that he had been approached outside the Court that day by

Keniry who threatened him and said "before I go I'll kill you."

Cross-examined by Mr. King, witness admitted that he had an iron bar which he had taken earlier that night from Stephen Duggan who had also tried to assault him. He denied he used it to strike Keniry.

Frank Keniry giving evidence in his own defence said that as he was coming from Abbeyside that night Whelan came along. He had an iron bar in his hand and struck witness across the back with it. He got away but Whelan followed him and caught up with him outside the hotel in Bridge Street. Witness said that he then turned around and hit Whelan in the jaw. He admitted that he resisted being arrested as he felt that he was being wrongly blamed.

To a question by Supt. R. McAndrew who prosecuted, witness denied that he had spoken to Whelan or said anything to him outside the Courthouse that day.

District Justice O'Connell convicting the defendant said that he would not tolerate assaults of this kind on members of the Garda Force and he sentenced Keniry to 4 months detention on each charge, the sentences to run concurrently.

On an application by Mr. King he fixed recognisances for the lodging of an appeal.

Election Proposal "A Load Of Rubbish"

"There might be a lot of people who wouldn't agree with this," said Cllr. P. Cahill at the April monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan when he proposed a motion "that the Minister for the Environment be asked to amend the regulations for local elections so that first time candidates make a deposit of £10,000 which if subsequently lost, be expended on community development works in the electoral area concerned."

"It doesn't concern anyone here," Cllr. Cahill then added amid laughter and he went on to say that the present deposit of £100 was far too low as some candidates who stand get as few 6 votes. If £10,000 was considered too much then he thought £5,000 "would be fair enough," he said.

The motion was seconded by Cllr. P. Coffey.

Cllr. S. Dunphy, the youngest member of the Council, was at once on his feet stating that such a motion should at once be declared lost as this was a democratic country and anyone who wished should be able to stand for election. "They shouldn't want to have £10,000 or £5,000 and I think this proposal is a load of rubbish," he said.

Cllr. G. O'Halloran said that at present they had democracy in action in their elections and such a motion as this would mean taking this power away and

placing it in the hands of a wealthy group.

Cllr. B. Kyne said that when he first saw the motion he thought the date

over it should have been April 1.

On a show of hands the motion was overwhelmingly rejected by 15 votes to 2.

Public Lighting In Stradbally

Cllr. Tom Cunningham proposed a motion at the April monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council calling on the Council to extend the public lighting from Stradbally Village to the Catholic Church as this was a dark stretch of road in winter time.

The Co. Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn said that his proposal was already on the Council's waiting list and as soon as money became available it would be provided.

TELEPHONE KIOSK AT KILROSSANTY

Cllr. Cunningham also moved that a telephone

booth be provided in Kilrossanty Village. He proposed this motion he said as a lot of people in the locality had been on to him about it and he thought it was very necessary.

The motion was approved and referred to Telecom Eircann.

LEPROSY FUND APPEAL

Dear Sir,

I would like to tell you about Mariama, a young girl from Sierra Leone on the West Coast of Africa. Mariama developed the early symptoms of Leprosy when she was 9 years old — a small patch on her face caused through nerve damage due to microbacterium *Lepra* — Leprosy.

Because of the way villagers felt about contact, she was sent away to a typical African Leprosy village about 40 miles from her home. Unlike most children, she could not look forward to visits from her family and friends — the scourge of Leprosy still strikes fear into the hearts of many people.

While living in this village Mariama had to submit herself to the many herbal preparations her fellow sufferers so desperately

tried in a vain attempt to cure themselves.

It was only when trained medical field staff visited the village that correct treatment became available. Many of the patients had suffered from Leprosy for many years and this treatment was now years too late.

Mariama however was found in the early stages of the disease — before the hideous crippling and deformities had taken place, and so here was someone to give hope for a complete recovery from Leprosy. Mariama was taken to the Leprosy Hospital run by the government of Sierra Leone and funded by many European Organisations — including Lepra. Here she was put on to MDT — Multi-Drug Therapy Treatment, and now has completely recovered.

£15 treats a non-infectious child or adult who has a mild form of leprosy and £35 pays for a year's treatment of an infectious patient.

Easter always brings the Christian message of hope and Mariama's story shines out as an example of hope. Could you please help Lepra to fight Leprosy? Your action can mean so much to some of the estimated 4 million children suffering from this disease.

Council Planning Dept. Blamed For Stradbally Job Losses

He was amazed at the inconsistency of the planning department as some people can get permission "at the drop of a hat" while others find it very difficult said Cllr. Tom Cunningham at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday week. In making the statement Cllr. Cunningham said that he had a case in Stradbally in mind where a man had his business "blown out of production" with regulations imposed on him by the Council's Planning Department.

"As a matter of fact," said Cllr. Cunningham, "he is a former member of this Council and he employed seven people who have all now lost their jobs as a result of this decision. Seven people may not seem a lot, but to a rural village like Stradbally, it would be equal to 100 employed in Dungarvan and there would be a lot of noise if that happened."

Cllr. Cunningham went

on to say that this man spent thousands of pounds trying to satisfy the planning department but in the end he was informed that he was still 2% short of the requirements laid down. This 2% proved to be a physical impossibility and in frustration the man relocated his business elsewhere where he was received with open arms, he said.

Mr. B. McNally, Co. Secretary pointed out that in this case the conditions of the planning permission granted were not complied with.

Mr. J. O'Flynn, Co. Engi-

neer said that Cllr. Cunningham had given no prior notice that he was going to raise this matter and he had therefore not looked it up. He said that it was most unfair for the Councillor to attack the planning department as he had done. The charge of inconsistency was a serious one and he said Cllr. Cunningham should reconsider what he had said in this regard.

Cllr. Cunningham replied that he stood by what he said and added that it all had meant the loss of seven badly needed jobs in Stradbally.

Stole From Ladies' Handbags — Put Back For Report

Paul McGovern, Kilrush, Dungarvan pleaded guilty to two charges of stealing money from ladies handbags at Dungarvan Court last week. The offences took place at local discos and in the first he was charged with stealing £63 in cash from a handbag left under a table by the owner at Zeta's on March 22. The second offence was committed at Whitechurch House Hotel on March 31 when he stole £2 from a handbag which had been hanging on the back of a chair.

Det/Gda. C. Kiely gave evidence of arresting and charging the defendant.

District Justice W. F. O'Connell convicting the defendant said that he would adjourn his decision in the case until the next Court on April 25 and asked for a report on the defendant from the Court Welfare Officer to be submitted to him in the meantime.

"The fact that Jerry attended our last National Council meeting in a wheelchair says enough about his personal commitment to his beliefs. He was a member of the ICMSA National Council from 1967 until his death and during that time he faithfully reported on national ac-

tivities to members of the Waterford Executive and likewise he communicated regional problems to the National Council. Jerry will be sorely missed, both nationally and at county level," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

In addition to his membership of the ICMSA National Council, Mr. Harrington was a member of the John Feely Foundation, ICMSA Representative on the Waterford ACOT Committee and he picketed the Dail on several occasions in pursuance of improved economic conditions for farmers.

Waterford Foods Plc Show Significant Profit Growth for 1989

The Board of Waterford Foods Plc is pleased to announce another year of record results. Profit before taxation for the year ended 31 December, 1989 increased by 43% to £11.3 million (1988: £7.9 million), while profit after taxation rose by 39% to £10.9 million (1988: £7.8 million).

Earnings per share increased by 23% to 7.6p (1988: 6.2p) and funds from operations increased by 28% to £17.0 million.

In the five year period 1985 - 1989, Waterford has achieved consistent growth in profits and cash flows, while earnings per share have grown at a compound annual rate of 24%.

STRATEGIC DEVELOPMENT

In November, the Group acquired A. Heald Limited of Manchester, one of the last remaining major independent dairies in Great Britain. This company has a turnover of STG£100 million, mainly in liquid milk and fruit juices, where it has a major market share.

Also during 1989, Waterford Co-op entered into a 50/50 joint venture arrangement with Express Dairy

Company, Ireland to acquire Premier Tir Laighean Society Limited ("PTL"), the IR£100 million turnover liquid milk supplier to the Dublin market where it has the dominant share. This acquisition did not become effective until March 1990 and it is intended that the Group will also have option arrangements with the Society in relation to PTL.

The effect of these acquisitions and arrangements is that Waterford Foods has developed a strong international base of profit and cash flow with excellent potential for future growth.

TRADING PERFORMANCE AND OUTLOOK

All divisions of the Group performed satisfactorily with the continued growth of the consumer products division and the performance of both Galloway West and Heald being particularly encouraging. The results of Galloway West and Heald have been included for approximately 12 weeks and 5 weeks respectively.

During the year the Group continued its relentless drive for cost efficiency within its core activities while at the same time investing heavily in market and product development.

The Directors view that 1989 performance and financial position with satisfaction and look to 1990 with confidence, particularly in light of the geographic spread and product portfolio of the Group.

The Board intends to seek approval from shareholders to exercise the option to acquire Galloway West from the Society during 1990.

WINTER RETURNED TO US FOR EASTER

As the man from the Met Office put it when he was giving out the weather forecast for the week-end, the weather we'll have for Easter is what we should have had for Christmas while the weather we had last Christmas should be what we should now have for Easter. Indeed winter returned with a vengeance to us for Easter and it is still very much so as we compile this column on Tuesday.

SUNDAY NEXT IS EARTH DAY

The walk will commence from the car park at the wood at 3 p.m. and last for about two hours and points of interest at this location to be noted are the reforestation of the old woodland area and the amenity and wildlife association it has.

The walk will be led by Michael Fahy and Seamus Gavigan and should provide an enjoyable outing for all taking part. Coillte encourages as many as possible to join with the thousands of others who will go down to the woods next Sunday.

WHAT ABOUT A NO NAME CLUB?

The Minister of State at the Department of Education, Mr. Frank Fahey T.D. launched a 15-minute colour video at Department headquarters in Dublin last

week about the work of the countrywide No Name Club, set up 12 years ago to show youngsters that there is a positive alternative to reliance on alcohol.

In the video Minister Fahey points out that his own research reveals that youngsters no longer see "drunk in a group" activities as being socially acceptable.

No Name Club Vice-President, Fr. Tom Murphy of Callan, Co. Kilkenny stated that 25 branches nationwide hold discos, dances, cabarets, encourage interpersonal relationships through young hosts and hostesses and run a series of self-development courses administered by professionals.

Eamon Doyle, executive officer, explained that the Club currently has four young development officers responsible for the growth of local No Name Clubs. ROD AND NETS O.K. — BUT NO MONO, SAYS MINISTER

Commercial salmon fishermen have been reassured by Minister for the Marine, Mr. John Wilson, T.D. that their industry would not be sacrificed to allow development of rod angling tourism. But they were warned also that the Government had no plans to legalise monofilament netting for salmon and, in the meantime, the law would be strictly enforced.

Mr. Wilson was speaking at the March monthly meeting of the Northern Regional Fisheries Board. He said that during the rod licence dispute, which has fortunately now ended after a two-year period of controversy, it was brought in on him that our sea fisheries were worth £150 million per annum to this country and that the balance of interest and the balance of effort should lie with the huge sector of our national economy.

But the Minister is then reported as saying: "It is my belief that the development of our sport angling and the development of our commercial fishery industry is not in any way — even infinitesimally — the one or the other. Differences will arise, no doubt about it, but there is only

one way to resolve differences and that is by discussion and agreement and working out rationally a 'modus operandi' for both."

However when it came to the question of any moves to legalise the use of monofilament nets, the Minister was quite specific when he stated that he had no intention at the moment of changing the law with regard to monofilament netting.

SEEKS INFORMATION ON OLD ABBEYSIDE HOUSE

In the course of a letter Mrs. Mairead Keohan, 19 Landau Way, Turnford, Herts. EN10 6LW informs us that during a visit to Abbeyside last year she became very interested in the old house there known as

The Hermitage and heard some strange stories about it dating back to the last century. She then states that she learned it was owned by a Mr. W. H. Barron in the 1830's but in latter years it was the home of the Morrissey family in whose possession it still remains.

Tragic Story Behind Sad Court Case

This is indeed a very sad case behind which lies a very tragic story said District Justice W. F. O'Connell at last week's sitting of Dungarvan Court after hearing lengthy evidence in a case in which a mother and her two sons appeared before the Court on charges which it was stated had a tragic and poignant background.

Pearl O'Shea, St. Patrick's Crescent, Dungarvan was charged on two counts of assaulting Noreen Wright, Mitchel Terrace on November 19 and also on January 10 last. Her son Thomas was charged with assaulting Mrs. Wright's husband, Tony Wright and her father Patrick Tutty, on January 21 and 31 respectively while her second son, John was charged with using language towards Tony Wright calculated to lead to a breach of the peace on January 19.

The Court was told in the course of evidence that the tragic background to all the charges was that Mrs. O'Shea's eldest son, Pius had died under tragic cir-

cumstances last January. This was some months after his wife, Theresa, a sister of Mrs. Wright, had, with her two young children, eloped with a married man.

To a question which was asked by her own solicitor, Mr. E. P. King, whether the ill-will towards the Wrights had now disappeared, Mrs. O'Shea stated in evidence that it had. But she added that the pain of losing her son would never leave her.

A VERY SAD CASE
Having heard further lengthy evidence relating to the charges, District Justice O'Connell said that it was indeed a very sad case behind which there was a very tragic story. He said

that at this stage his main concern was that there would be no further incidents between the parties. He added that "given all the circumstances of the case" he had the deepest sympathy for Mrs. O'Shea.

Adjourning all the charges against the three defendants until June 13, the District Justice directed that in the meantime they pay compensation amounting to £203 together with expenses totalling £111. In addition he directed that Thomas and John O'Shea enter bonds to keep the peace and be of good behaviour for periods of six months.

Supt. R. McAndrew prosecuted.

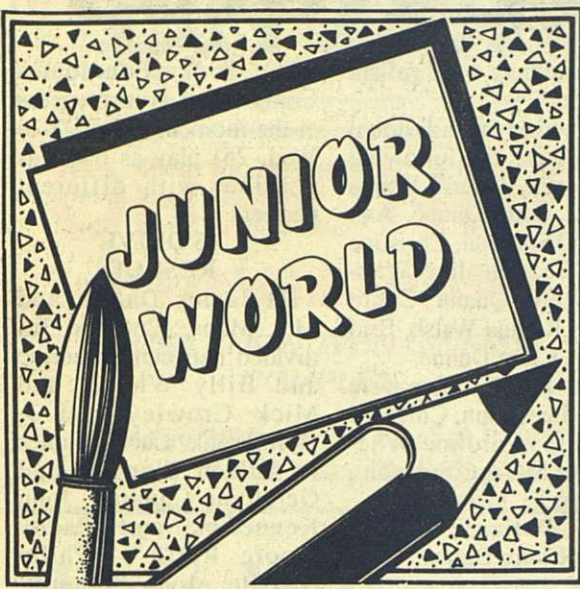

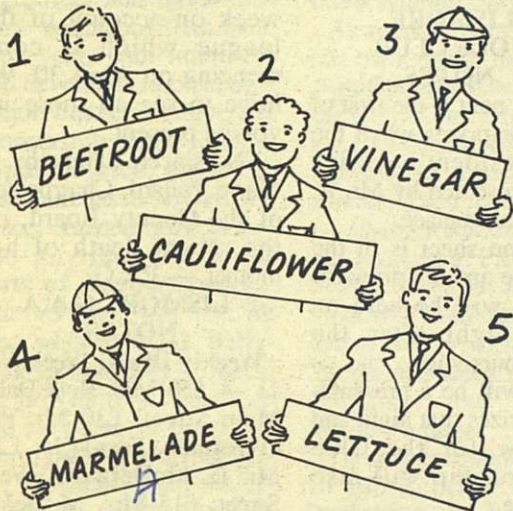

This Week Teagasc Co. Waterford Says

GRASSLAND MANAGEMENT

Trials carried out by Teagasc at Moorepark have shown that one of the most important aspects of grassland management is to graze pastures tightly to about 2.5 inches in the April/May period.

However, should weather conditions change and ground conditions deteriorate, cows should be moved quickly off paddocks to avoid damage by poaching. If too much grass remains, this should be grazed off or topped as soon as ground conditions allow.

A stocking rate of 2 to 2.5 cows per acre of well fertilised pasture is recommended up until silage ground becomes available in June.

HEAT DETECTION IN DAIRY COWS

Up to 90% success rate can be achieved when three times per day observation is used with tail painting. Paint should be applied on a strip along the backbone and tail head, using ordinary thick non-drip emulsion (vinyl or silk emulsion should not be used).

Check the paint for signs of chipping or rubbing off at each milking and note the time, up to 80 per cent of all bulling cows will have all the paint removed,

20 per cent will have varying amounts removed.

Served cows should be cleaned and painted with a different colour when they go off heat.

Cows not showing heat in the first 42 days should be examined by your vet.

For repeats to second service, a third colour paint should be used. Bright colour paint should always be used.

SHEEP

(a) **Grassland** — Remove stock from hay/silage fields immediately and fertilise — any further delay will cause yield losses. Again graze swards tightly to avoid poor quality pastures during June and July. Mixed grazing of drystock or sucklers with sheep has definite advantages and should be practised where possible. On well stocked farms a further application of Nitrogen, possibly containing Sulphur, is well worthwhile.

(b) **Parasite Control** — Early Lambs — Dose at three weekly intervals. Mid-Season Lambs — Dose at 4 to 6 weeks old, 3 weeks later and at weaning.

Ewe Dosing — Where ewes are heavily stocked (over 4 ewes/acre) there is a case for dosing ewes at three and six weeks after lambing to reduce contamination of pasture for lambs.

The senior footballers have a tournament engagement against Limerick, and this will be played in Stradbally at 7 p.m. on Sunday.

STRADBALLY v BUTLERSTOWN

Butlerstown never expected the kind of challenge which they met on Sunday last when they took on Kilmacthomas in their very exciting first round match and they came away a little shattered by the results. They will have benefitted from the game and might compensate their supporters when they play Stradbally on next Sunday.

All the advantages seem to be with Butlerstown here, as apart from having the benefit of a championship game they are meeting a much depleted Stradbally team who have suffered from retirements and transfers, as well as

having had to sit it out last week-end, while the others in their group had a chance to shake-off the winter blues.

Alo Curran and Joe Roche have both retired, Liam O'Connor has transferred back to Erin's Own and Sean Dec, who moved residence to Limerick, has also transferred out.

So for them it is going to be very much an uphill battle to stay in the championships, with even a reasonable chance of getting to the knock-out stages. I don't fancy their chances here and I expect Butlerstown to win.

NIRE v SLIABH gCUA

They are perceived by many outsiders to be deadly enemies, but in the concluding stages of the senior and intermediate football championships last year their supporters roared

themselves hoarse in support of each other and in so doing showed that there was never anything more than keen sporting rivalry between these northside neighbours.

The form book at the moment points to a clear win for the Nire, if they play to form and there is no reason for supposing that they won't. They are not fully geared yet (or they were not last Sunday), but on a comparison of their respective performances in the first rounds, a win for the Nire looks certain.

Sliabh gCua did just enough to win the intermediate championship last year and I don't expect that the club will be very surprised if they are back, playing in that grade again next year.

CLASHMORE v ST. SAVIOURS

When these clubs met in the championship two seasons ago, Clashmore were at the receiving end of a nine points beating by the up and coming St. Saviours who had won the intermediate championship in the previous year.

Not until last Sunday did St. Saviours show the kind of form that had the whole county talking in '88. A colleague who saw their games with Rathgormack reported that the city side were in dazzling form and if they keep it up they will take some beating this year.

Like Stradbally, Clashmore are going into the second round without a serious test and this must militate against their chances. They have suffered a little from retirements and it will be interesting to see how many newcomers they will have on board for this one, which is switched from Dungarvan to Lemybrien.

Saviours are favourites and will be shocked if they don't win.

KILROSSANTY v TRAMORE

Both sides suffered disappointments over the week-end so for obvious reasons neither side can very well afford to lose here. It will be more serious for Tramore, who have no point as they will find it very difficult to recover lost ground if they lose two matches in a row.

They will certainly need to improve considerably on their form at Kill on Saturday if they are to have any hope of victory.

Kilrossanty have quite a bit of 'waking up' to do as well if they are to have a chance of holding on to

their title. They didn't play like champions when almost failing to Gaultier and whether or not this display can be taken as an indication that Kilrossanty are on the way out, we will have to wait a while and see. They will need to survive this one if they are to convince their supporters that they have a chance of retaining their title.

BALLINACOURTY v RATHGORMACK

When they met last year, the Eastern team shocked Ballinacourty when beating them by 0-10 to 0-8 and then went on to the knock-out stages in which they lost narrowly to the Nire. They have since reached the county Under-21 football final and have won a couple of rounds of the current Under-21 competition. In spite of this, they were very well beaten by St. Saviours last Sunday.

On the basis of their very fine performance last Sunday, I would go all out for another win for the club, but problems have developed since then. John McGrath, who was injured in the game is a doubtful starter as is Jimmy Healy, who was injured in the Abbeyside/Fourmilewater intermediate game at Colligan on Monday. Mark Reynolds and David Mulvihill who also came off injured in the game against Tramore will have to undergo a fitness test later in the week.

On the credit side, Brendan O'Gorman, who was one of a number who missed last week's game, might be able to play. Ballinacourty's chances will depend on the availability of the above named players. If all were available, I would tip them to win.

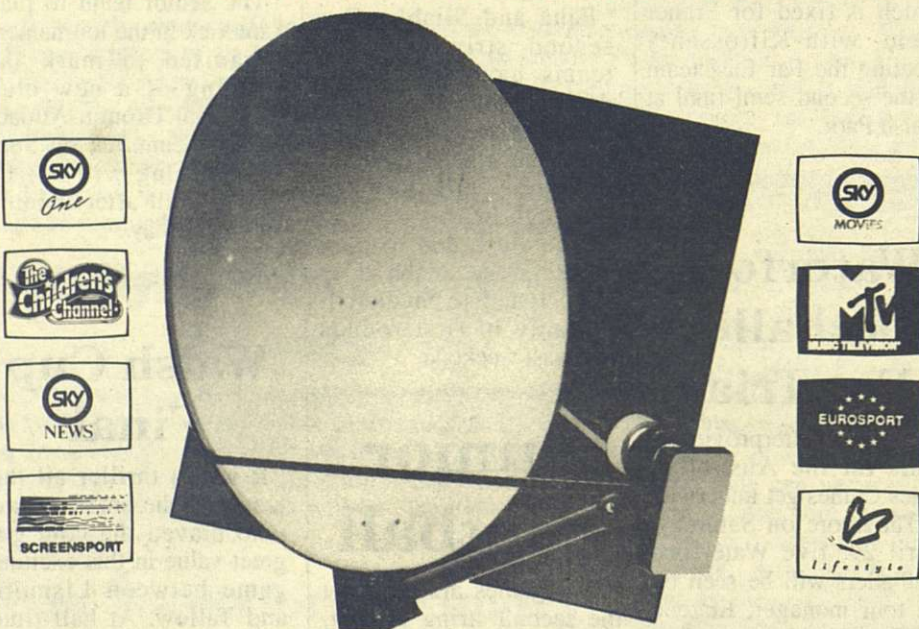
