WATERFORD CRYSTAL STRIKE

Council Calls On Minister For Labour To Intervene

As the strike at the Waterford Crystal plants in Dungarvan and Waterford City seems set to enter its fourth week on this Thursday, a call went out from Dungarvan Urban Council at its monthly meeting last Monday night to Mr. B. Ahern, Minister for Labour, to intervene and to use his good offices to get talks going between management and union.

Cllr. Tony Wright raised the issue when he moved a motion requesting the Council to call on both sides to enter meaningful negotiations without pre-conditions with a view to ending the dispute.

Moving the motion, Cllr. Wright said that at the outset of the strike he felt that the less said publicly about it the better but in view of "the outrageous statements" made by a local senator and a former government Minister inferring that the industry might be moved to an eastern bloc country if it was not settled he felt that it was time to put in this motion.

"The strike is now in its third week without any move towards a solution," said Cllr. Wright, "and I feel that a Local Authority

such as the Urban Council should use its good offices to bring the parties together to discuss the problems without any pre-conditions." Adding that they should attempt to see that sanity prevailed, he suggested that the County Manager or the Town Clerk should try to get talks going between the parties.

Cllr. D. Goode thought that the workers were adequately protected by the union representing them and it was a matter for the union to enter any negotiations in the matter.

NOT FOR COUNCIL TO DECIDE

Cllr. Austin Hallahan said that it was not for the Council to decide who was

right or wrong but it was their duty as public representatives to encourage the sides to meet without pre-conditions on either side to see if a solution acceptable to both could be reached. "The situation is that everyone in the town is affected by the dispute," he

Dungarvan Store Gutted By Fire

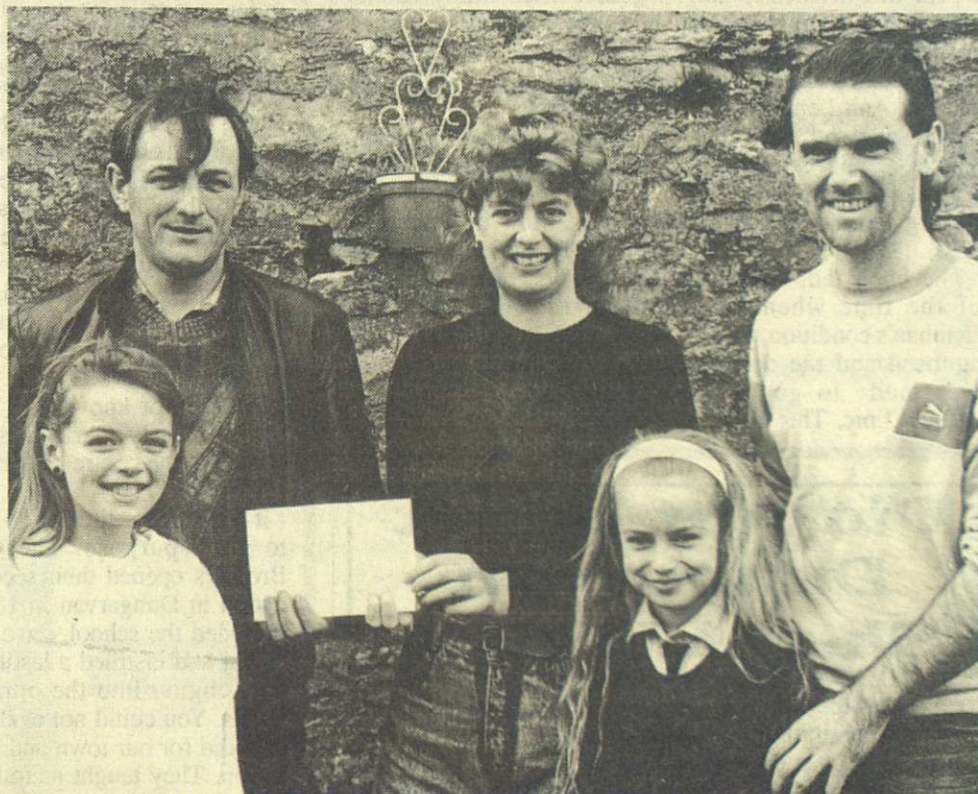
Members of Dungarvan Fire Brigade fought a fire at an unoccupied store at the rear of the old Apple Factory at Shandon, Dungarvan, the property of Bord Telecom, for close on two hours on last Monday night before eventually bringing it under control.

The alarm was raised at 9.20 p.m. and for some time after that, clouds of dense smoke billowed into the night sky as plastic materials burned fiercely and the roof collapsed. The Brigade members withdrew from the scene at 11.15 p.m. having extinguished the blaze.

Manager's Orders For Dungarvan Urban Council

Among the orders made recently by the County Manager on behalf of Dungarvan Urban Council were:

Extinguishment Of Public Right Of Way — That the public right-of-way over Bridge Street-Davitt's Quay be extinguished subject to the approval of the Minister for the Environment.

Planning Permission — That planning permission be granted to Robinson Keefe & Devane, Chartered Architects, Dublin on behalf of Stafford Miller Ireland Ltd., Youghal Road for single storey warehouse extension to existing factory, associated car parking and site development at Clogherane, Youghal Road.

That planning permission be granted to J. M. Mulligan, Waterford on behalf of Adam F. Torrie Ltd., Broad St., Waterford, for extension and renovations to existing premises and provision of 5 small retail units in addition to Supermarket at Carberry's Lane/Main Street/The Quay, Dungarvan.

That planning permission be granted to Maire Ni Chonail, c/o McGrath's, Mardyke, Cork for change of use from residential to shop to sell electrical machines, and accommodation at 4, Davis Street, Dungarvan.

BOOKS

Tanaiste Launches "No Problem . . . To Mayo And Back"

An Tanaiste, Mr. Brian Lenihan, T.D., launched his wife Ann's book "No Problem . . . To Mayo And Back" at a reception in the Westbury Hotel.

The book, which is written by Angela Phelan, of the Irish Independent and published by Blackwater Press, is Ann Lenihan's story of her husband's illness and subsequent liver transplant.

All proceeds from the book will go to the Kidney Transplant Foundation of Ireland, a research orientated body benefitting all organ recipients.

"I wrote the book because I felt I had to get it out of myself. I do feel much better for it. I decided to do it also to give courage to a lot of other people suffering from serious illness," explained Ann Lenihan when asked why she decided to share her and her family's feelings of those dark days during her husband's illness.

The book tells the story of the time when Brian Lenihan's condition was diagnosed and the decision was made to go to the Mayo Clinic. This also co-

incided with the busiest period of his political career, which he describes in the book. "No Problem . . . To Mayo And Back," which includes the account of his decision to contest his seat in the General election, while his family orchestrated the campaign in Dublin, is a moving story which will touch the hearts of many families faced with serious illness.

Members of the Government and family friends attended the launch together with many of the medics and nursing staff who helped nurse Brian Lenihan back to health again.

The book, which is a laminated paperback including a 16-page full colour section is both printed and published by Blackwater Press, the general publishing division of Folens Educational Publishers. It is now available in leading bookshops throughout Ireland.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

GOD IS YOUR BEST FRIEND

The first reading provides us with an account of the Church in action after Jesus departed. The members were so close to the life of Jesus that they literally lived and practised His way of life. Being hounded and hunted by the authorities, they were wont to live in ghetto communities, which not only offered them a measure of protection, but had the advantage of allowing them to celebrate the Eucharist secretly. You could say that their way of life was the forerunner that gave inspiration to religious leaders to found their communities.

Take any religious order, and examine their roots, their spirit and their objectives; and you'll find them deeply rooted in the life of Christ, and set in His framework of love. Indeed, Jesus did lay down the requirements to possess eternal life, but, over and above, Jesus did invite those willing to follow Him in a more active service to do so. This I trust, I make clear, when I remind you that God instituted and blessed Marriage as a holy way, but He also offered blessings to those who denied themselves this form of love in order to give Him total service.

In many religious communities, the members dedicate and consecrate themselves to live Christ's life to the full. They own nothing. They bind themselves to Christ by vows of chastity. They observe and submit to their holy rules, and reverence them as if they were the voice of God. And, the axis on which their whole life rotates is Charity. Invariably, the object of their consecration is to bring God to souls, be it through the sick, the poor, the promotion of knowledge, etc. And, like the early Christians, the Eucharist is the centre of their life and activity.

If I diverge a little, I do hope it is to good purpose. The Christian Brothers opened their second foundation in Dungarvan in 1807. They provided the school, gave free education and instilled a lasting love of our religion into the minds of the pupils. You could not evaluate what they did for our town and the whole nation. They taught us to believe in ourselves and in our God. No, I was not a favoured pupil. I had not much sense, and I paid for it, but that would in no way blind me to the great work done by the Brothers. They made great sacrifices in

their lives and in their work not to mention that their salaries or the greatest part of them was poured into mortar and stone. Dungarvan, you are in debt to the Brothers. In humility I say, do pray for them. May I suggest as an acknowledgment of what they did for us that you offer a daily prayer for the canonization of their Founder, Edmond Rice.

Recall how Jesus asked the rich young man to sell all his goods, etc. Those, who serve in the various Communities answered that call. They left everything, and became servants for God, which is the same as giving others a right to their ministrations. Life has changed a lot since Christ founded His Church. Numbers have so increased that it would not be possible to organise life like the early Christians. Still, God's law of love has not altered, but it is up to us to make it a living reality in daily life. It is true to say, many of us are not pulling our weight. What's happened to the spirit of Christ in family life? Do we really help the poor as much as we should?

The second reading reminds us that the new life, which Jesus won for us on Cavalry, comes to us by faith, and not through human evidence. We have reason to rejoice, because our faith will urge us to reach out and live by what we believe. And, even if we are plagued by trials, the fruits of the Resurrection will give us the strength and the courage to persevere. We'll allow nothing to deprive us of our share in the victory of the Cross.

TIME TO PUT FIRST THINGS FIRST

The Gospel reminds us that our encounter with the risen Christ does

not take place in Jerusalem or Emmaus, but within the community into which we were born in Baptism. We know how the first Christians responded to their meeting with Jesus. We are no less human than they. We serve the same Lord. We have the same helps, the same motivation. So, why is Jesus so absent from our lives? Let me tell you. We don't take our religion seriously. There are times when we get weary, and we allow our weaknesses to obscure our view of God's presence. It is time we started putting first things first. Now, I'm not saying, we do not at least in some measure, keep God's memory alive, but, I am saying, if we were more alive to the purpose of life, we'd be more conscious of God's presence in our midst. Parents generally lavish care on their children, but they do not seem to shoulder their greater responsibility with anything like the same zeal.

I did draw your attention to the great changes in society, and, certainly, our days have witnessed immense change in moral values. One had only to listen to what is said in the media! I know we may be only in the junior league compared to the behaviour and attitudes of other peoples. It seems to be emerging that they want to change the goal posts! It is time to cry halt. Sin, decked out in any guise or name, is still wrong. Hence, be wary of the modern prophets. The remedy is not to ignore it, but is to be found in turning back to God. The Gospel is in fact telling us that we can free ourselves from the chains of sin through a humble confession. Remember, God is your best friend. Do not let Him down.

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Jobs At Sterling Drug Plant On Target Says Plant Chief

It was confirmed by Sterling Drug (Ireland), the Dungarvan based pharmaceutical manufacturing plant, at their first annual Visitors' Day on Sunday last that they were on target to reach the projected 220 jobs initially promised over the next three years. In addition, Mr. Donnacha Hurley, General Manager of Sterling Drug announced a new educational award scheme for schools in Dungarvan to be sponsored by the company.

More than 400 people from Dungarvan and other parts of West Waterford visited the plant set in its

spacious landscaped grounds at Knockbrack on the outskirts of the town to see for themselves how

such well-known products as Panadol and Hedex were manufactured and packaged.

Mr. Hurley told the visitors who were entertained to a buffet after completing a tour of the plant that the number of jobs proposed initially was 220 and that with nearly 100 employed now, the plant is on target to achieve these numbers.

Mr. Hurley indicated that the jobs target would be achieved by 1993 as

planned. "Of the 98 people in the plant, 51 are from within a 15 mile radius, and fifteen of the last 20 employed came from within 10 miles," he said.

Mr. Hurley stressed the company's policy to maximise the number of people employed from the locality, explaining that in the initial stages they had to employ a high percentage from outside the immediate area, but that has been changing.

"It is the policy of Sterling Drug to have and maintain good relationships with the local community. We are your neighbours and good neighbours should expect to talk and to visit each other from time to time. Our Visitors' Day is our way of bringing you into the parlour so to speak; have a chat, exchange views, let you see our facility, explain the operation and answer any questions," Mr. Hurley told the visitors.

The General Manager paid tribute to the employees at the plant stating, "their dedication, commitment, diligence and professionalism has contributed to the success of the operation to date."

FINANCIAL VALUE TO TOWN

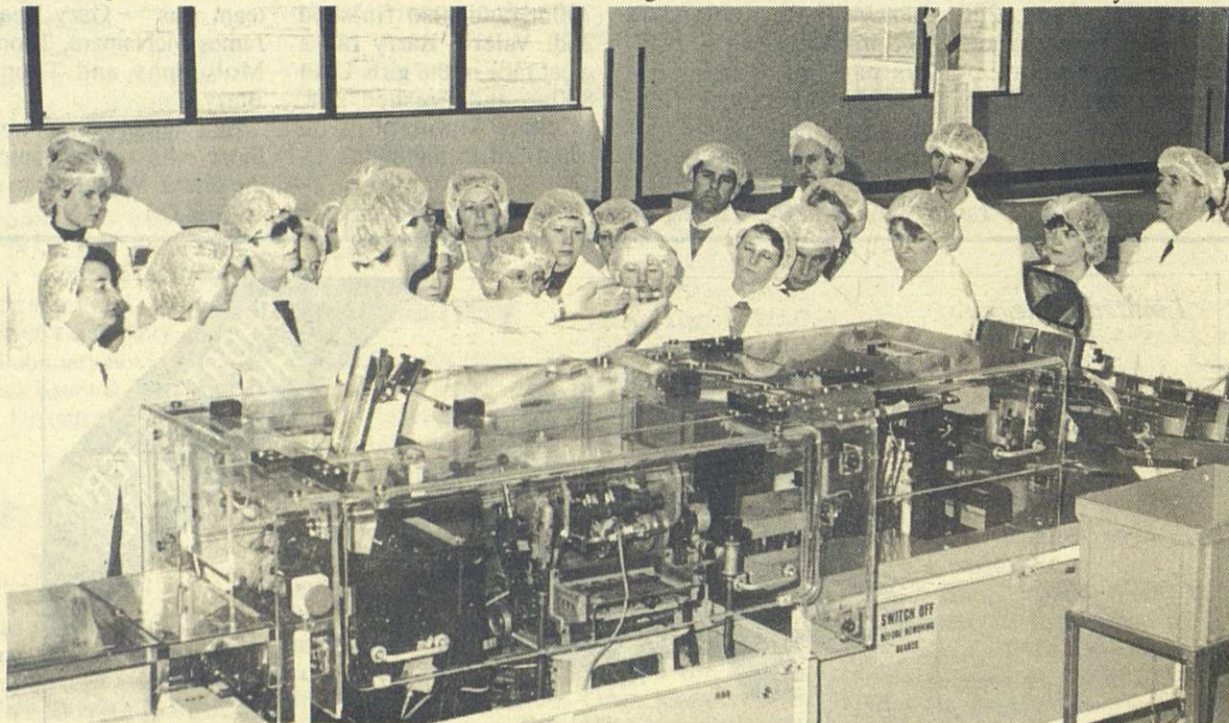
And he stressed the financial value of the company to Dungarvan. "We pay out £1.6 million annually on wages and

spend a further £0.5 million on locally sourced goods. These amounts will continue to grow," said Mr. Hurley.

The Dungarvan plant manufactures the equivalent of 3 billion tablets per year at current volumes. Product is exported to 14 countries throughout the world. In addition to the Panadol and Hedex brands, the plant manufactures ingredients for other commonly known products, such as Andrews Liver Salts, Solpadeine and Panadeine Co.

Mr. Hurley then announced that under the Company's Corporate Citizenship Programme they would sponsor an Education Award Scheme which would assist one student annually in their first year at University. "Briefly we are offering an annual award which will be given to one student going on to third level education. The student selected will get the award for one year to help defray expenses during the first year's study for a science related degree. A different student will be selected each year," said Mr. Hurley.

In order to manage the number of people involved, two tour sessions were arranged, one in the morning and the other in the afternoon after which the visitors were treated to a buffet and on leaving each person took home a commemorative pen and information

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

RIGOROUS ENVIRONMENTAL CONTROLS AT STERLING DRUG

At a time when there has been such an amount of bruhaha by environmentalists, many of them of the "Johnny-come-lately" type and which has seen the Merrel Dow project at Killeagh scrapped last year and a similar plant for Cork Harbour under direct threat at present, it was good to hear of the rigorous controls for the protection of the environment which are in place at the Sterling Drug Plant in Dungarvan.

The close on 400 visitors who attended the Plant's first visitors' day last Sunday heard Mr. Donnacha Hurley, the Clonakilty born General Manager at Sterling, affirm that as a pharmaceutical manufacturing and packaging plant they were fully committed to having in place a very strong safety programme for the benefit of all employees and of the neighbourhood. "We are very much aware of our responsibility to provide a safe and healthy environment for employees and the local community," Mr. Hurley said.

As part of this awareness he said that Safety came first and the plant had modern systems and controls, detailed procedures and fully trained emergency teams to deal with any emergencies.

Mr. Hurley went on to point out that the manufacturing process at the plant was quite simple which in fact gave rise to minimal

environmental impact. The liquid discharges were not dissimilar to domestic discharges but nonetheless these were subject to quite rigorous controls and monitoring. This monitoring was done by the local authority, by third party experts and by members of the plant staff at frequent intervals to ensure that they abided by local statutory requirements and relevant EC directives. The air and noise emissions from the plant were similarly monitored and controlled.

That the system is operating successfully is proved by the fact that since Sterling Drug commenced production back in October of 1987 everything has gone smoothly and without a hitch. Long may it continue so.

BUS EIREANN SAYS WE WERE WRONG

Some weeks ago we referred to complaints received concerning delays and break-downs experienced by travellers on the Bus Eireann Dungarvan to Dublin service and also to the freeze-box conditions which existed on occasion during the winter in the early morning service leaving the town.

Last week Mr. Frank King the Waterford Area Manager of Bus Eireann was in touch with the "Leader" to refute the complaints we had referred to in this column. He stated that in the course of one thousand scheduled runs they had received only three complaints and that all the buses on the Dungarvan-Dublin service were in fact, new vehicles.

In regard to our complaint about the ice-cold buses on the early morning run, Mr. King explained that the heating system in their buses operates in three sections — front, centre and rear, and it is a matter for passengers, if they find they are in an unheated section, to inform the driver and the heat will then be turned on to that section.

Our only comment in the matter is that when we raised this subject in the first instance, the complaints were made to us by

people who had travelled on the service. In view of what the Bus Eireann Area manager now avers there must have been no substance in these.

WLR IS DOING WELL

Figures released last week by the Independent Radio and Television Commission (IRTC) arising from a survey carried out by Landsdowne Market Research indicate that local radio stations in many areas are denting the listenership of RTE Radio 1.

Doing well according to the survey is Waterford Local Radio, WLR FM which has not only met its audience target but more importantly its financial target.

In regard to the latter some interesting marketing link-ups between the more profitable of the country's local radio stations may be expected in the near future. We learn that the Big Daddy of such a group, Downpatrick Radio in Belfast is discussing joining 98 FM, LM FM in Navan, TV South in Cork and WLR FM in Waterford and that the combination to be called Radio Ireland will jointly sell their advertising.

NEWS FROM THE EUROPEAN COMMISSION

Among the items referred to in the latest issue of "Eurofocus," a weekly news sheet issued in Brussels on behalf of the European Commission, are the following:

Euro-MPs want a total ban on cigarette advertising according to a decision taken by the European Parliament, without a moment's hesitation, on March 14. The Euro-MPs stressed that each year some 440,000 people die in the European Community because they are heavy smokers while 85% of lung cancers are caused by tobacco.

In regard to the Environment which is, very correctly, becoming more and more of a hot potato, the European Parliament has decided that the public is entitled to find out everything — or virtually everything — about the air we breathe, the water we drink, the state of our forests and beaches, the health of the animals and plants which surround us, the polluting or noisy activities that go on around us, and last but not least, the measures taken to protect our envi-

ronment.

According to the Euro-Parliament decision, all anyone who is anxious about the matter has to do is to ask the competent local, regional or national authorities and they will have to provide the information because the European Community's Environment Ministers agreed on March 23 to guarantee, by means of a "European law," free ecological information for all Community citizens.

The News sheet states also that in regard to Summer Time, the Commission wants to synchronise all clocks to ensure the success of the single transport market. For the moment, it points out, the rhythm of every day life in the European Community is set up by a Community directive which requires all clocks to be re-set twice a year — at the start of Spring (for summer time) and Autumn (for winter time). However, voices have been raised in several Member States, criticising this system because it upsets the rhythm of schoolchildren's lives and leads to problems of health and the organisation of work. Both the British and Irish in fact have received a waiver under the directive: we re-set our clocks at the same time as the Continentals in the Spring but a month later in Autumn (in October).

The European Transport Commissioner, Karel Van Miert, has come out in favour of a single system for all 12 EC countries, which he considers to be essential for the single market. He believes that the multiplication of different systems, and the fact that clocks are re-set at different dates would only disorganise transborder transport and result in higher costs for manufacturers and hauliers and inconvenience to passengers.

For Mr. Van Miert, it is "more than desirable" that the Twelve synchronise their watches and the European Commission in fact plans to submit fresh proposals to this end as from next year.

THE NIGHT WE RODE WITH SARFIELD

This year marks the third centenary of the Williamite Wars in Ireland which saw the rise of William of Orange and the start of the flight of the Wild Geese from the country. One of the greatest protagonists on the Catholic side in the 17th century struggle which had such marked historical results for Ireland, down even to the present times, was Patrick Sarsfield. Our ballad choice for this week, "The Night We Rode With Sarsfield," recalls one of the most daring exploits of the famous Irish hero of those times.

The night we rode with Sarsfield, out from Limerick to meet
The wagon train that William hoped would help in our defeat,
How clearly I remember it though now my hair is white
That clustered black and curled, 'neath my trooper's cap that night.

For I was one of Sarsfield's men, in years though still a lad,
And to be one of Sarsfield's men what boy would not be glad?
For Sarsfield chose, of all his troops, the best and bravest ones
To ride and raid those convoy camps, that brought those English guns.

'Twas silently we left the town and silently we rode,
Till o'er our heads the silent stars in silver beauty glowed,
Thus silently and steadily we were led by one who knew,
We crossed the shining Shannon at the Ford of Killaloe.

Then Galloping O'Hogan, Ireland's fiery-hearted son,
'Twas he by many a byway led us confidently on,

The password of the Williamites was Sarsfield — strange but true.

Teatime recipe for kids

DUCKPOND COBBLER

CHEER up children's teas with this recipe from Colman's Kitchen that's bound to get the children crying out for "More, Mum!"

Ingredients:

- 1 onion, peeled & chopped
 - 1 stick celery, chopped
 - 1 tablespoon oil
 - 450g (1lb) minced beef
 - 1 sachet Colman's Farm-house Mince & Tomato Casserole Mix
 - 45ml (1/4 pint) water
- For the scones:
- 35g (1 1/2 oz) butter
 - 250g (8oz) self-raising flour
 - 1 teaspoon paprika
 - 75g (3oz) finely grated Cheddar cheese

1 egg, beaten with enough milk to make up to 150ml (1/4 pint) liquid

Method:

Gently fry the onion and celery in the oil for five minutes. Add the meat and brown; drain off any excess fat.

Mix the contents of the sachet with the water, and add to the meat. Simmer for 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, prepare the scone mixture by rubbing fat into flour and paprika until mixture resembles breadcrumbs. Stir in cheese, then add egg/milk liquid.

Stir to make a soft dough. Roll out on a floured surface to about 1.5cm (1/4") thick. Cut into duck shapes with cutters, or plain rounds if you don't have a suitably-shaped cutter.

Place simmered meat and sauce into a shallow oven-proof dish. Arrange duck scones on top. Bake at 220C, 425F, Gas Mark 7 for 10 minutes or until well risen and golden brown. Serves 2-3



Don't Be Caught By An April Dry-Run!

CURRENT debates about climatic change may have prepared you for an April different from its traditionally showery image.

But a quick check on the statistics would soon make you suspicious of that damp reputation any way.

It's really quite a dry month and, as plants are starting to push up strongly after the dormant winter period or early planting this year, this can catch the gardener unawares.

He may see his vigorous young plants being dried out by an increasingly powerful daytime sun or caught by a sudden frost.

You should be ready to stand by with water to combat any dryness in the soil and fragile plants should be

protected from frost by cloches or have tents of hessian, plastic sheet or polythene placed over them.

But the risk of frost damage can be reduced in the first place by careful selection of sites for planting. Low-lying areas will bear the brunt of the frost so avoid them for weaker varieties.

However, the risk of being caught out is high with the increasing instability of our weather in recent years, so be ready to mount a damage limitation operation if you wake up to a surprise frosty morning.

Havoc

Tepid water can be sprayed on affected plants and will hopefully reduce the worst of the frost damage and also minimise further havoc from the contrasting temperature of the sun's rays.

Unfortunately, the satisfaction of seeing April inject vigour into your garden can be spoiled by the even more vigorous surge in the weed population.

There is no doubt that tough action now will make the long drawn out summer anti-weed campaign a lot easier.

And you can do it largely with a 'green' approach by hoeing flower beds and vegetable plots to remove the heads of the pervasive weeds before they are firmly established.

You might also apply a loose mulch about 2cm/1in deep around flowers, shrubs and small trees.

The mulch can be anything from well-rotted garden compost or peat to old sawdust and will not only smother the weeds around your plants but also help maintain the moisture con-



tion in the soil if we have a typically dry April.

Sensible and natural methods like these should avoid the need for weedkillers which can so easily damage or kill your plants and are hazardous to pets and ourselves.

The most difficult to apply accurately are sprays, especially in blustery conditions, so if you do need weedkillers then use a spot treatment approach.

Many brands now come in gel or another form allowing a small amount to be applied effectively and more safely.

Remember, too, that flower beds and the vegetable patch are not the only potential problem areas. Gaps in paths should be watered with a weedkiller to prevent weeds gaining a start before spreading elsewhere.

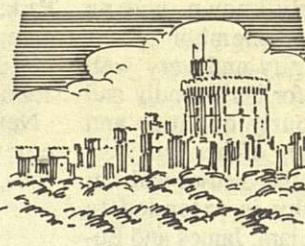

WORLD CUP PREVIEW

This week in our build up to the World Cup we preview two of Liverpool's and Ireland's key midfield players Ronnie Whelan and Ray Houghton.— B.K.

RONNIE WHELAN (Liverpool F.C.)



The first time I cheered a Ronnie Whelan goal was in the famous League of Ireland defeat of the English League at Dalymount Park in 1963, brought to us via Radio Eireann and the special qualities of Philip Green.

Ronnie Whelan senior, brought his experience and love of soccer to his son, who like his father, started his career in one of the worlds most renowned schoolboy and youth football clubs, Home Farm. He made his League of Ireland debut on his 16th birthday against Bohemians. Manchester United, Coventry, Everton and Glasgow Celtic were keen to sign Whelan but once again Liverpool got their man, he signed for Bob Paisley on his 18th birthday.

In his third season, 1982, he made the 1st team and confirmed his status with two spectacular goals against Spurs in the 1982 League Cup final at Wembley. He again scored at Wembley in another victory 2-1 against Manchester United in 1983. This was a forerunner of a fantastic decade that saw him play Under-21 and full international for his country and win — 6 League Championships, 2 F.A. Cups, 1 European Cup, 5 Charity Shields, 4 League Cups. Success by any standards — but under Eoin Hand, Whelan's form for Ireland was erratic. Under Charlton, like other club stars, he got more direction and responsibility and his Euro '88 performance was outstanding, highlighted by his now famous volleyed goal against the U.S.S.R.

Ronnie Whelan is typical Liverpool — first touch pass and move — his goal scoring rate has drooped with his deeper more central role at Anfield. He is vital to them and Ireland and with Houghton much will depend on them in the sizzling heat of Italy.

Ronnie Whelan's pedigree has been proven. He comes from a football home via Home Farm and Liverpool into Ireland's 1st World Cup finals. A lot will depend on him, but that pedigree will stand him and Ireland in good stead. What a time for another spectacular goal — just like in Dalymount in 1963 — Philip Green would surely approve!



RAY HOUGHTON (Liverpool F.C.)



Ray came to play for Ireland in a round about way that must still haunt Scottish manager, Andy Roxburgh. For the first 10 years of his life this son of a Buncrana emigrant lived in Glasgow and supported Glasgow Celtic.

When his family moved to London his football skills saw him sign schoolboy forms with West Ham United. He progressed well with West Ham and as a youth he was invited to play for Scotland but Andy Roxburgh, the then youth team manager, didn't give the young midfielder a game.

His progress at West Ham didn't satisfy John Lyall and to Houghton's surprise, as he had scored 17 goals in the reserves, he was released by West Ham at the end of the 1981 season. Snapped up by Fulham's Malcolm McDonald, Ray Houghton saw out his 3 year contract and he moved on to Oxford for the start of the 1985-'86 season. At Oxford with John Aldridge, Ray Houghton became one of footballs best midfield players and a host of clubs were interested in signing him. One option offered to Ray Houghton was a return to his birth place with Glasgow Rangers in what would be their first Catholic signing. But it was Liverpool, who always interested Houghton and once again he joined John Aldridge and he had arrived — one of the best players in one of the world's best club teams.

The F.A.I. were aware of Houghton's Irish connection and he made his Irish debut in Jack Charlton's first game as Irish manager in March 1986. Without doubt Houghton's progress as an international with Ireland has helped his career and in his final move to Liverpool, but he has repaid in full with sterling games and vital goals for Ireland.

Following one of his best games in a shock 1-0 victory over Scotland in 1987 he again met up with Andy Roxburgh, who suggested that Houghton should be playing for Scotland. Remembering his snub in the youth trial for Scotland, Houghton replied: "you had your chance."

Ray Houghton has come a long way and he has earned a special place in Irish soccer history with his first international goal. At 2.36 p.m. in the Neckar Stadium, Stuttgart — his goal against England gave us our greatest victory — a victory that was to launch thousands of T-Shirts in celebration of our win over the "old enemy."

RULE CHANGES

The new playing and refereeing rules come into operation in all games on next Sunday, April 29 and as promised, here are the full list of changes that will affect players.

HURLING

(1) — **Scoring with the Hand** — A score may not now be made with the hand other than by adding to the ball in flight with the fist or open hand.

(2) — **Restriction on Size of Hurley** — The restriction on the length and weight of a hurley have now been removed from rule, but the restriction on the size of the bas remains — "at its widest point it shall not be more than 13 cm."

(3) — **Blocking of Goalkeeper's Puck** — A player may now attempt to block the goalkeeper's puck in hurling inside the small rectangle. Note he still may not be challenged for possession of the ball.

FOOTBALL

(1) — **Hand Pass** — There is now a more detailed definition of the hand pass but it is still governed by the previous restriction i.e. there must be a **visible striking action**. A **two-handed pass** — "In a two handed pass the striking hand, open or closed, must not be in contact with the ball immediately before delivering the strike."

One-Handed Pass — On a one-handed pass the ball must be released from the hand before being struck with the same hand, open or closed.

(2) — **Definition of Throw** — A throw is now defined as — "when the ball is held in one or both hands and played away without a visible striking action."

(3) — **Points with the Fist** — Points may now be scored by striking the ball from the hand with the closed fist but not with the open hand. Goals or points may continue to be scored by adding to the ball in flight with the fist or open hand.

(4) **Free Kicks** — The player fouled, other than for a penalty, will now have the option of taking a free kick from the hands or from the ground. The same choice will be available where a technical foul on the ball is made by the opposition i.e. any member of the team awarded the free may take the free from the hands or off the ground. However, where the player fouled doesn't opt to take the free himself, the free

must be taken from the ground.

When a player is awarded a free kick he must indicate to the referee if he is going to take it from the hands and, having indicated, he may not change his decision.

● Note that penalty kicks must be taken from the ground and 45m. frees must also be taken from the ground.

● **Divots Not Allowed** — A player is not allowed to create any type of platform for taking a free kick from the ground. If a player makes a divot of any sort for a free from the ground the free will be cancelled and a throw-in ball awarded.

(5) — **Sideline Kicks** — Sideline kicks must be taken from the hands from behind the spot indicated by the linesmen.

Kickout must be taken from the ground as formerly.

GENERAL CHANGES

Authority of Referee — The referee now has authority to over-rule the umpires, even where they agree, with regard to a score.

Advantages for Frees — That where a player stands closer than 13m./20m. to the person taking a free kick/puck in football and hurling, the referee awards a free 13m. more advantageous.

● What this means is that the ball need not necessarily be brought forward 13m. but it can be moved to a maximum of 13m. in any direction at the discretion of the player taking the free.

● Note that this discretion is only allowed in the case of a free as a result of a person standing too close to the free taker.

I don't know if Tallow have ever beaten Dunhill in the senior championship, but the two occasions on which they clashed in the past five years are not among the most pleasant memories of the Western club.

On a lovely evening in mid-July 1986 I remember doing umpire with Vincent Mulligan and seeing Dunhill destroy Tallow to the tune of 3-24 to 1-5. When they met for the next time, which was last year, Dunhill again trounced Tallow and had fourteen points to spare over the Western club.

Last week, Tallow played very well against Lismore in the Walsh Cup final, which seems to indicate that things are being taken

more seriously now and it will be a big surprise if they fail to, at least, make a very good impression in the championship this year. It is far too soon to write about the prospects of any club in this championship, but if Tallow do as badly as they did last year, I know a number of people who will 'have egg on their faces' before the season finishes and the 'wise ones' will all be asking why they were allowed back.

Backboned by players of the calibre of Pat Murphy, Timmy Sheehan, Jim O'Donoghue, Johnnie Geary, the Henleys, Curleys and so on, they must be in with a reasonable chance of making this a winning start and getting some of their own back on Dunhill for two severe beatings.

BALLYDUFF V. MOUNT SION

It being the second match, it will be regarded as the feature game and if it compares with the game in which they drew in last year's championship, it will be exciting and enjoyable.

When they met in '88, Mount Sion who were out-

siders in the game because of their lapse of form in the previous season's championship, stole a march on Ballyduff and Jim Green's three goals won the day for the once very famous Monastery side.

If we are to accept last year's form as a true guide to their relative standards at the moment, Ballyduff, I suppose will be favourites.

Mount Sion backed by Shane Ahearne, Ger Fitzpatrick, Pat Ryan, Donal Loughnane, Kevin Ryan, Ml. Fanagan, Pat McGrath, etc., etc., will, as always make a bold bid to get off on a winning note, but with the likes of Michael Leamy, Seamus and Seamie Daly, Seamie Hannon, Michael and Richie Walsh, Paudie Prendergast, Liam Power, John Quirke, Moss Casey, Mce. Geary and company to overcome, the task of Mount Sion, may prove too much.

Ballyduff are given the vote.

DUNGARVAN V. PASSAGE

There was a scoring difference of 17 points when they clashed at Walsh Park last year, but on that occasion, Dungarvan were without a number of their players. It should be a different story here, even though the visitors will again be fancied to take the points.

Dungarvan appear to be more geared towards football this year and may have decided to concentrate on the big ball.

Fraher Field, will of course, be to their advantage and they may spring a surprise, but on the basis of what happened last year, this is unlikely.

DIVISIONAL MATCHES

As will be seen on our fixtures list, Sunday also marks the start of the Western junior hurling championships and while the standard might not be very good at the start of the season all three games are likely to provide close contests.

Ardmore, having won the marathon against Fenor in the junior 'B' hurling last year, are back in the higher grade in which they will meet the regraded Kilgobinet. Last season these clubs

were two grades apart and now in the same grade, the odds must favour Kilgobinet. Otherwise the result will produce a surprise.

Modeligo will play Faha in Abbesside and Modeligo will be the slightly more fancied team in this game, while Melleray and Tourin will also be pretty close, with Tourin going in as slight favourites, expecting to capture their two points.

Three junior football games (under old rules) are fixed for Saturday and of these the Kilrossanty/Stradbally clash at Abbesside will certainly be the attractive one. Stradbally on the basis of their tremendous display against Ballinacourty at Lemybrien on Sunday will be favourites.

LISMORE V. CAPPOQUIN

This local derby senior hurling championship first round is likely to credit Lismore with an opening brace of points. They have recently won the Walsh Cup and I understand, played very well in preparation games for this championship.

I believe that the clubs have not met in senior championship since 1987 and on that occasion Lismore won handsomely as the final score of 2-12 to 2-2 shows.

Last year's form points to a Lismore win in this one and if anything else happens it will be a surprise.

Refereeing

In order to ensure that referees in the province will be educated in the new playing rules before they come into operation on Sunday, a special course of instruction will take place at Limerick on this Thursday night.

Counties are expected to do their own thing in instructing their referees for club championships. The fact that we have no football championships due to be played on our next Sunday programme, will give us a little more time and the brief course of instruction could take place next week. There should be no problem about the hurling.

Weekend Results

The match of the day was the game between Kilmacthomas and Dunhill at Kill and the surprise of the day was that Kilmac' didn't win. Liam Og Daniels in goal for Dunhill gave a masterful display and saved certain goals on a number of occasions. Overall Kilmac' had 18 wides and knocked paint off the crossbar on two occasions, so it was not their lucky day. For Dunhill it was some compensation for losing to the Nire on the previous Sunday, but this is poor consolation for Kilmacthomas.

BALLINACOURTY BEATEN

Whether it was due to overconfidence because of their good win against Tramore on the previous Saturday, or whether it was a case of they just not being able, I don't know but Ballinacourty will certainly have to pull their socks up if they are to hold out any hope of getting to the K/O stages.

Rathgormack who lost badly to Saviours in the previous week were far better here and fully deserved their win.

ST. SAVIOURS BEAT CLASHMORE

About midway through the first half of this game at Lemybrien on Sunday, Alan Greene had a goal for Saviours, but had this score not been recorded, the favourites might have been in serious trouble as Clashmore looked the better side in the first half and should have been ahead instead of trailing by 1-1 to 0-2. Fitness and confidence told in the second half as the city team got gradually on top and took their second brace of points to head the table in their group.

STRADBALLY JUST BEAT BUTLERSTOWN

A great goal by former county player Pat Curran and an outstanding performance by Eoin O'Brien were the big factors in deciding this close and exciting game that gave Stradbally an opening two points and Butlerstown their second defeat in two weeks. The display here will mark Stradbally as serious contenders this year, if they can improve as they progress.

KILROSSANTY DEFEAT TRAMORE

The county champions had it easy here even though Tramore would have been closer if their

shooting had been nearer the mark.

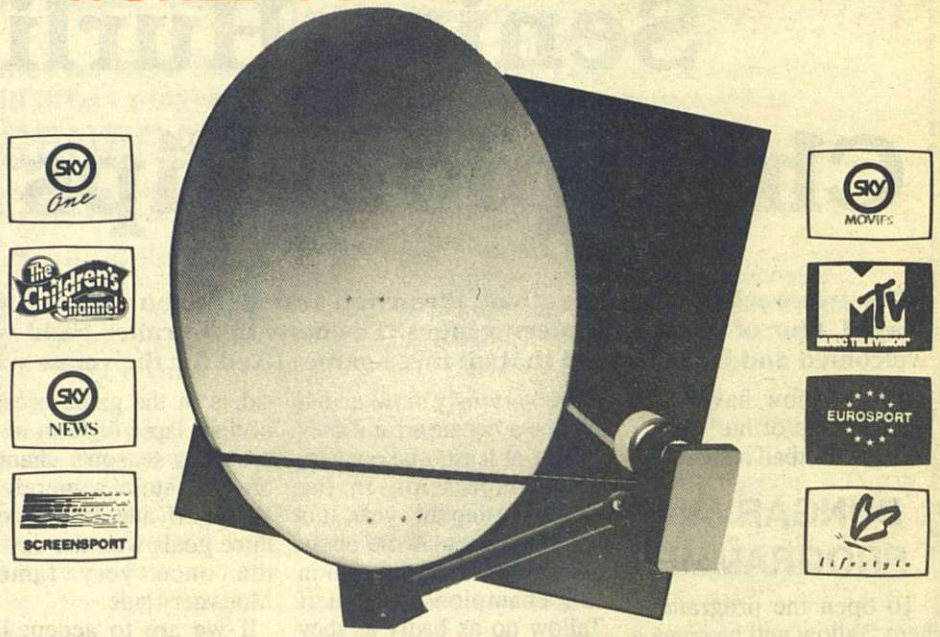
Cllr. Kyne then said that he would support the motion with the addendum that the Minister be called on to use his good offices to get talks going between the sides.
