REMEMBERING OTHER DAYS 6

Pause For **Thought With** Fr. Paddy

"HE THAT BELIEVETH NOT SHALL BE CONDEMNED"

Mother Church seems almost loath to take us away from the Easter scene. She wants us to immerse ourselves in the happenings of those eventful days. Her aim is to have us not only to soak up the spirit of Christ's Passion, death and resurrection, but also that we might incorporate its message, and be guided by its light. She knows that if our faith is rooted in the Risen Christ that it will be firm as a rock. Hence, it is part of her mission to see that we are all well versed in this great truth. So, in last Sunday's first reading she asked us to listen carefully to what Peter had to say. He asks us to notice the very definite way in which all the great prophesies regarding the Messiah were fulfilled in Christ. He was the one they fitted, and he was the one who not only claimed, but also proved that He was the Son of God.

St. Peter is again the preacher in the second reading. He had first hand and personal information about Christ's death and resurrection. He reminds us that Jesus saved us and freed us from sin by the shedding of His Blood. And, he makes it clear that it is through the Sacrifice Jesus offered on Calvary that we are now able to believe, live and hope for the future. You know already that Jesus called us all to come and follow Him, and we have His word that He'd lead us to life, eternal life. Christ's resurrection, about which Peter has provided us with assurance on his own testimony, is our guarantee that He'll take away our sins, and open for us the way to glory. Summing it up, Peter is saying that the Easter triumph provides us with the grounds to believe and to hope in God's word.

The Gospel relates the story of the two disciples on their seven mile journey from Jerusalem to Emmaus. They were discussing, and it was with heavy hearts, the recent happenings in Jerusalem. They, as followers of Jesus, had been hoping for great things. They accepted and believed that Jesus was the promised Messiah, even if their ideas of His role and mission were coloured by their yearnings for freedom and the greatness for Israel. They felt so shattered and upset that they scare noticed a stranger had joined them until He questioned them on the matter of their sorrow. And, when they told Him, He went on to endeavour to allay their fears by pointing out that the Scriptures not only foretold His mission, but also that the Christ would have to suffer before He entered into His glory.

You must be wondering why the disciples did not recognise Him. Don't forget that Mary Magdalen, when she saw Him, thought He was the gardener; and, on another occasion, the Apostles thought He was a ghost. How often have you not heard the words at funerals: "his life is changed, not ended." Likewise, it would follow that the Body of the risen Christ would have undergone change. Jesus did not just come back to life. He had risen to a new life. It was not, as I said, a corpse revived, but rather a body transformed and glorified. We are not told in what way His appearance was different, but I feel it is reasonable to conclude that Jesus did cloak the major changes leaving just sufficient to prevent immediate recognition. Hence, mere observation was not enough. Faith was also necessary. That is why it was not obvious who He was. The change that was now obvious allowed for a call to faith.

Faith is necessary for salvation for each and everyone. Jesus posed a question, a challenge. It is clear that He did hide the fulness of His glorification, and what He did allow to be seen did require a measure of faith from the Apostles. The necessity of faith is the reason that He did not reveal Himself openly. The Apostles like everyone else had to comply with this rule.

GOD SPEAKS REGULARLY TO US

The two disciples were so wrapt in their troubles that they failed to see Christ in their companion. Often, because we become so involved in daily affairs, we too fail to hear God speaking to us. He speaks regularly to us at Mass, in the Scriptures, through conversations, cries for help etc. There are no bounds to His ways of communicating. Sometimes, when He has important things to say to us, our minds are miles away. We should go to see Him and talk to Him more frequently, and then, when He calls, we'll know His voice. It was when the two disciples asked "the Lord" to stay longer with them that the grace of recognition came. We are wont at times to feel the Apostles were privileged to be with the Lord, yet we have the same benefit if we'd but open our eyes to His presence. He keeps an open door. He'll talk to you any time, any day. And, He keeps a regular place at His table for you.

Having seen the Lord the two disciples were now so happy and excited that they could not get back quickly enough to tell the brethren. God, in His mercy, has blessed us with the Good News. He is asking us to share it and tell the world. He wants everyone to know. Recently, I mentioned a dark pall was spreading over the world. You hear more references to devil cults, and, make no mistake, they exist all right. It is a warning to arm ourselves with the Eucharistic shield. Then, as soldiers of Christ, we should work to let God's love shine on the world. You may be God's link for a struggling soul. You may be the only person that will have the opportunity to introduce him to Christ. I'm certain that if we all resolved to spread the spirit of Christ we'd smash the power of evil.

Cllr. Tells Of World Traveller Who Got Lost In Dungarvan

Cllr. R. Walsh related to his colleagues at the April monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last week the story of a tourist who was unable to find his way out of Dungarvan recently because of the hopelessly inadequate signposting within the urban area. He said that this tourist had told him that he had travelled through 27 countries around the world and Dungarvan was the only place where he had got lost.

Cllr. Walsh was speaking in support of a motion in his name asking that the Co. council "as a matter of urgency, examine the present very inadequate directional sign-posting in the

general urban area."

with the motion on the grounds that for the most part the signs around the town were alright. "The only thing wrong is that some of them may be turned around at times by people who are in 'good humour' in the middle of the night," he said. Cllr. B. Kyne said that he

did not believe that Dungarvan was as bad as Cllr. Walsh was attempting to make out.

At this point, the Town Clerk, Mr. B. White in-

formed the Council that the County Manager had approved the appointment of a Traffic Consultant to examine and report on the traffic problems in Dungarvan and the consultant had informed them that the survey and report would be completed within four months of his appointment.

Mr. White added that the feasibility of erecting a multi-storey car park in the town would be included in the brief for the consultant.

In the circumstances it was decided to defer Cllr. Walsh's motion.

ACC Announce Increase In **Profits**

Agricultural Credit Corporation plc at their Annual General Meeting announced an increase in profits for 1989 to £3.6m (1988: £1.6m.) together with an increase in assets to £595m (1988: £536m). These results have been achieved after a provision for bad debts of £14m, enabling ACC to fully retire Government guarantees which two years ago stood at £18m.

Mr. Dan McGing, Chairman, ACC, stated: "The 1989 results reflect a considerable achievement and provide us with a number of sources of great satisfaction in that we retired all Government guarantees in relation to our loan book and, in an increasingly competitive environment, deposits (which of course, continue to attract the valuable Government Guarantee) increased by 8% to £423m (1988: £392m). This performance, together with a liquidity ratio of 36% of deposits, positions us to continue to make significant developments and broaden our base while continuing to compete vigorously in our core market - the farming sector."

Abbeyside Man Convicted And **Bound To The Peace**

Sean Needham, 74 Murphy Place, Abbeyside, appeared at Dungarvan Court last week where he was charged on two counts of assaulting a 16-years-old schoolgirl, Elaine Fraher, 45 Murphy Place, on November 3 and February 28 last. He was convicted on both but a third charge alleging an assault on the girl on March 2 was dismissed.

Elaine Fraher told the he complained to the girl's Court that on November 3, Needham spat in her face and on February 28 he struck her on the arm with his shoulder. She further claimed that he assaulted her in similar fashion on March 2.

Giving evidence on his own behalf, Needham, who suffers from a physical disability, admitted spitting in the girls face but added that he could not take any more of the taunts which she and others had been directing at him. He denied the assaults in February and March and said that when

Convicting Needham in respect of the assaults in November and February, District Justice O'Connell remarked that while they were not of a very serious nature, they must have been extremely distressing for the young girl. He imposed a fine of £10 in respect of each charge and ordered the defendant to enter a bond to keep the peace for twelve months.

Industrial Enterprise Display In Tallow

Tallow's magnificent new Enterprise Centre may not have had everything from a needle to an anchor under its resplendent roof on Tuesday of last week but on display was a most impressive range of 19 small industrial projects as diverse as worm farming to a car repair and dismantling service, all born out of a Fas Community Enterprise Training Programme which has been in full swing in the town since last October and which concluded last weekend.

The official launch of the new business projects was performed by local parish priest, Very Rev. Fr. Michael Walsh, who told his audience that it was a revelation to see all that is happening at the Tallow Enterprise Centre.

Fr. Walsh lauded the enterprise and initiative of the people who decided to provide themselves with their own "self-help" and turn their backs on the "begging bowl" attitude which has plagued the country over the years.

Fr. Walsh too was strongly critical of those multi-national companies who set up in Ireland through the generosity of IDA grants which come from the pockets of already overburdened taxpayers. When things go anyway wrong they then pull the plug and get out of Ireland, he said.

"The people now starting up their own small businesses here today are deserving of success, and I am confident they will go on to achieve great things for themselves and their projects in the future," Fr. Walsh said.

He added that while the Fas Training Programme is now drawing to a close in Tallow it is just the beginning of a long and hopefully productive commercial life for the participants.

The Chairwoman of the Tallow Enterprise Group, Mrs. Helen McCarthy, said the commitment, dedication and achievements of those now embarking into the business world through the Fas course will be a source of great encouragement to small communities everywhere.



First Irishwoman To Be Declared Venerable

On behalf of the Sisters of Mercy of Ireland, Sr. Regina Kelly, President of Mercy Ireland, wishes to express gratitude to His Holiness, Pope John Paul 11, whose proclamation of the Decree of Heroic Virtue on 9 April, conferred the title "Venerable" on their Foundress, Catherine McAuley. The fact that Catherine is the first Irishwoman to be accorded this honour by the Church makes this a landmark in the history of religious life in Ireland, and a source of joy to all Irishwomen.

Born in 1778 in North Catherine Dublin, McAuley established her first community in Baggot Street in 1831, with the intention of providing for the poor, the sick, the uneducated and the marginalised the services she felt they needed and to which they were entitled. By 1841, the year of her death, she had established twelve convents in Ireland and two in England. In less than a century Catherine's Sisters of Mercy were recognised as the second largest congregation (either male or female) ever established by English-speaking Catholic, and the only one to have convents in every Irish diocese.

INTRODUCED IN 1937 Catherine's cause was first introduced in 1937, by

Archbishop Edward Byrne.

The setting up, in 1975, by Archbishop Dermot Ryan, of the Dublin Diocesan Commission on Causes brought increased momentum. Since then, the cause of Catherine has passed successfully through the initial Dublin process, and then the Apostolic process in Rome. This latter entailed a close scrutiny of Catherine's writings, life, work and reputation for holiness.

All of this painstaking work had its happy outcome on April 9. Mercy Sisters worldwide owe a debt of gratitude to Fr. Martin Nolan, O.S.A., Postulator of the Cause, and to Sr. Angela Bolster, R.S.M., Vice-Postulator, for the untiring and dedicated work which has brought the cause of Catherine McAuley to this stage.

"Remembering Other Days"

REPRESSIVE **PARKING LAWS** A DETRIMENT TO BUSINESS

At a recent meeting of Midleton Urban Council a Senior Garda Officer warned the members against introducing repressive legislation against those who violate the Council's parking by-laws in the East Cork town.

Supt. Maurice Murray who is no stranger to Dungarvan where he served for a period 'in the good old days,' told the Midleton Councillors that while inconsiderate and bad mannered motorists were causing serious traffic problems by double parking around the town he was of the opinion that repressive legislation could drive shoppers out of Midleton to the serious detriment of the economic and business life of the town.

Parking by-laws and the manner in which they are enforced have always been the subject of sharp controversy and critical comment. Here in Dungarvan many feel there is an unequal enforcement of the by-laws and some traders feel aggrieved by the manner in which they are regularly targetted.

It is from the traders, shopkeepers and business premises in the town that the local Council receives a major share of its annual finance in the form of rates - private houses are not subject to rates at present - and it is the owners of those business premises located in the town centre who have, as part of their business, to have van deliveries on a regular basis throughout each day, who feel aggrieved in this regard.

In the hope that some allowance would be made where these town centre traders are concerned we direct the attention to the Council members and officials to the views expressed by the Garda Superintendent in regard to the traffic laws as they affect the traders in Midle-

MEDJUGORJE —A BOMBSHELL

According to the Catholic

Bishop who administers the Yugoslav diocese in which the shrine is located, the Blessed Virgin has not appeared in Medjugorje.

This claim will come as a bombshell to the huge number of Irish pilgrims, many from our own localities. But in a 15-page re-port to the Vatican, Bishop Pavo Zanic states that pilgrims to Medjugorje have been victims of a fanaticism. Bishop Zanic in the course of the report described devotions at the remote mountain shrine in Yugoslavia where six local children — two boys and four girls — are said to have daily visions of the Blessed Virgin for the past eight year, as religious blindness.

The bishop is in Rome "to speed up the investigation work of the Yugoslav Epis-copal Conference" into the claims. Here in Ireland individual bishops of the Irish Episcopal Conference have requested Catholics not the make the Medjugorje pilgrimage until the local hierarchy and the Vatican authorities have given their approval for groups to travel. So far no Irish bishops have led any pilgrimage parties.

Without doubt this latest development about the authenticity of the visions at Medjugorje will come as a great disappointment and be learned with much sadness by the thousands of Irish Catholics who have visited the shrine in recent

Fishy Ideas For The Barbecue!



ALTHOUGH summer does not officially arrive until next month, May usually signals the beginning of some warmer weather providing ample opportunity for eating outdoors.

Meat is usually the obvious choice for barbecue fare, but fish is an excellent alternative. The following recipes are easy to prepare and look impressive.

Salmon Nicoise

A classic Nicoise salad with delicious flakes of canned salmon; ideal to serve as part of a barbecue

Ingredients:

- 1 small iceberg lettuce 150g (6oz) trimmed and
- cooked French beans 3 tomatoes, sliced 1 small red pepper, de-seeded
- and chopped 1 small red salad onion, sliced,
- bunch spring onions, chopped
- 430g (15oz) tinned salmon, 12 black olives, halved and
- 50g (20z) tin anchovies. drained and rinsed

vinegar

1 clove garlic, crushed Method:

Shred the lettuce and

the lettuce. Flake the salmon into a bowl, removing as much skin and bone as possible. Arrange this over the bean

Decorate the top of the

Nicoise with the anchovy fillets and the black olives, chill in a refrigerator until required.

Whisk together the remaining ingredients and spoon this dressing evenly over the salad just before Serves 4.

Salmonburgers

Ingredients:

400g (151/2 oz) can pink salmon

50g (20z) each chopped onion, finely chopped green pepper and fresh wholewheat bread-

1 tablespoon lemon juice 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel 1/2 teaspoon rosemary, crushed pinch of pepper

1 tablespoon cooking oil Method:

Drain the salmon reserving two tablespoons of the liquid. Combine flaked salmon, egg, onion, green pepper, breadcrumbs, pepper, breadcrumbs, reserved liquid, lemon juice, lemon peel and seasonings. Mix well.

Form into four or five burgers. Fry in a lightly oiled pan for about five minutes on each side, or place under the grill or on top of the barbecue.

Top with any of the fol-lowing: sliced tomato, sliced pickles, chopped onion, sliced cheese, pickle or mustard relish, ketchup, mayonnaise, mustard, tartare sauce or Thousand Island dressing and lettuce. Serve on toasted hamburger buns.

She had been down at Abbeyside strand that day and had found it in a deplorable condition, Cllr. Nuala Ryan told members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their April monthly meeting. Greenhouse gives early start

By Pete Moss

MAY is the time of year when a greenhouse really proves its worth.

It has given an early start to flower and vegetable seeds which are now being transplanted to produce strong displays and healthy

And it is also a haven for cuttings and varieties that prefer more protection from our changeable climate, such as begonias, cucumbers, melons, vines and peaches.

Diseased

But the disadvantage is that the warm enclosed environment can also allow pests and disease to thrive, so greenhouse hygiene is essential if you are to make the most of the asset.

Always remove any diseased areas on plants, such as mould, rust and mildew and follow up with the appropriate treatment.

Even healthy plants can start a problem if they die and are left to rot, so always remove spent flowers and leaves promptly and keep them from littering the

Obviously, you also need to inspect plants regularly for signs of insect pests.

No prizes for guessing that aphids or greenfly are the worst culprit, increasing rapidly to weaken the plant and deposit sticky honeydew, as will many of the other serious pests such as white fly.

This fly is a particular problem on fuchsias, yet is difficult to see unless the plant is brushed against causing the tiny flies to flutter up like dust.

Scale insects are one of the hardest to spot and worst to get rid of. The first sign is the stickiness they cause and closer inspection reveals the small brown shell-like adults.

But the waxy covering makes them almost impervious to pesticides so they need to be wiped off as



much as possible before the plant is treated.

The worst of the rest of the pests are: leaf hoppers, mealy bug, red spider mite, thrips, leaf miners and ants.

Most shops and garden centres will stock a range of treatments administered in the form of sprays, dust or smoke, but if the problem is small then it is probably best to go for one of the allround spray treatments though these do tend to be dearer.

Take care to use the treatment at the right strength and check to see if any plants are excepted from the treatment or you may kill both plants and pests.

If you are spraying veg-

etables and fruit you should also check when the crops can be harvested after spraying.

Needless to say, weeds need to be picked out as soon as they appear. Not only are they unsightly but they will compete, usually with more vigour, for the food and moisture available in the greenhouse environ-

Spoiled

Now is also a good time to give the greenhouse its annual clean by scrubbing down the structure, glass and staging with a weak solution of disinfectant.

All this hard work will all be spoiled as well if you don't clean and disinfect any plant containers and sticks as well and maintain the habit with any you bring in later.

You could follow up on this "spring clean" later in the season by using a proprietary smoke treatment for the greenhouse interior.

Sometimes, if you write to your favourite star through the BBC or one of the independent television companies, you may be lucky enough to get an autographed photo.


Radio stations are another good source of autographs for serious collectors.





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

Ireland 1 USSR 0

Success yet again — 43,570 fans turned out for a friendly game which saw Ireland's unbeaten home run extended by Steve Staunton's first international goal.



But success can bring impatience and a hard to understand reasoning from some fans and reporters. Some insist on highlighting the problems with the pitch and the quality of the game itself. It must be re-

membered we beat a very good team short two of our best players and during the game limited the Soviets to one half chance.

The pitch, in my view, looked worse than at the time of the Welsh game but seemed to play better. Maybe this was because the USSR played much better than Wales technically. Either way the second half was good, Ireland were better than against Wales and we won, maybe I'm too involved, but what more do you want!

The game itself pushed the claims of David Kelly and Niall Quinn — Andy Townsend seems definite for Italy with Chris Morris also much improved.

David O'Leary played very well which again has resulted in Eamon Dunphy highlighting the deficiencies of Mick McCarthy. The whole question of the Irish defence causes endless controversy and debate.

My reading of Charlton's approach is that he prefers his centre backs to attack the ball and not to pull back into the penalty area. Moran and McCarthy do this well — O'Leary, fine player that he is — has a tendency to hang back. Both full backs must be fast and quick turning, which means that they can push forward with the goalkeeper being a type of sweeper — quick off his line.

That is why David O'Leary finds it hard to hold the centre back position. He had a fine game in Dublin and could now be putting pressure on Kevin Moran. Mick McCarthy needs games — he is a strong hard hitting player — Charlton's type. I felt in the last two games he did well and if he keeps free of injury he will be in Italy. Many push for Paul McGrath as a centre back, he had a great game for Ireland last week. His work in midfield is vital for Ireland and he is versatile so he could be switched to full back if needed. All in all, I would keep him in midfield, if you feel your back-four don't need his presence — that is the dilemma!

Up front I think Quinn is sure of his Italian spot but I would like a smaller busier player as a front man also, as an alternative to two big strikers. David Kelly is knocking at the door but Frank Stapleton's position seems very doubtful now. Kevin Sheedy's form is erratic, with Alan McLoughlin and Mick Milligan doing well with their clubs.

The Irish Manager has suggested that he is slow to pick untried internationals for pressure games. He has proven in the past with Liam Brady that he won't persevere with a player because he has given good service in the past. I feel Kevin Sheedy is definite for Italy but from what I have seen of Milligan he would be an addition to the Irish panel.

A lot of advice will be offered to Jack Charlton in the coming weeks but he will do it his way — it has worked so far, long may it continue.

Real Sociedad's Irish international once refused to play soccer because it would prevent him watching his local team Liverpool. His boyhood hero was Roger Hunt, a goal scorer of note and the youngster who had a regular spot in the Kop went on to become an idol of the same soccer mad supporters.

While he was an apprentice tool maker with British Leyland he began to make his mark in amateur football and he signed for 4th Div. Newport County on a one year contract in 1879. His goals saw him spend six years at the Welsh club before Oxford United signed him to bolster a push for promotion. Five goals from Aldridge helped Oxford into Div. 2, with 34 the next season pushing Oxford in with the big boys of Div. 1,

for the first time in the club's history.

The goals continued, 25 in his first season and his Irish connection was established following an enquiry from Dave Langan a club mate at Oxford. He made his debut with Ray Houghton against Wales in March '86.

All wasn't well at Oxford and Aldridge was keen to move on but all his dreams were realised when he signed for Kenny Daglish and in his first season he scored 29 goals and 31 in his second just like his boyhood idol Roger Hunt.

At this time Ian Rush was rescued from his problems in Italian football but his form wasn't great but an incredible offer meant John Aldridge was to make the biggest move of his footballing life.

He left the security of Liverpool, his family home, for a club which was in turmoil for even considering a non Basque player. But it was an offer he just couldn't refuse — a weekly wage of £3,500 to sign for Real Sociedad of San Sebastian for £1.1 million.

Would he fit in with the Spanish style often isolated up front — would he suffer like Rush did in Italy? Once again he succeeded — 20 goals from 27 matches confirms him as one of Spain's top scorers.

Now nicknamed El Zorro (The Fox) he has scored over 200 league goals for his clubs from Newport, Oxford, Liverpool (64 in 104 games) and Real Sociedad.

For Ireland, Aldridge had difficulty scoring, finding Charlton's tactics frustrating but in fairness to him he works very hard, often unrecognised by some sports commentators.

In Euro '88 for me he was one of the stars — his leading of the Irish attack, unselfish and hard working.

The goals have arrived, 2 against Malta and he will be one of our main hopes in Italy in June, what a time to extend his goal scoring records. Will he, like his boyhood hero Roger Hunt, score goals in a World Cup Final series. Let us hope so.

With a number of players out injured Dungarvan had Tommy Egan back after a very long lay off, and both Pat Roche and David Sheehan were recalled to the team by managers John Walsh and Kealan O'Neill. However Tommy Egan lasted a mere 15 minutes before a recurrence of a back injury led to him being replaced by Bryan Kirwan.



Both sides were very lethargic in the opening stages with Dungarvan in particular giving away possession on numerous occasions through bad passing. However, Brian Whelan and Derek Lyons held the side together with impressive performances until the 38th minute when B. O'-Sullivan caught Barry McGrath off his line to put Avondale 1-0 ahead.

The Minister also told the delegates that for the future the cost of repairing and maintaining courthouses would be recouped to the local authorities by the Department of Justice. He also disclosed that between now and 1993, the government planned to spend £900 million on road improvements with the EC providing £451 million in

No Seat Belt **Damages Award Cut By**

A High Court judge said in Dublin last Thursday that a man who was seriously injured in a road accident should suffer a 10 per cent cut in his damages because he had not been wearing a seat belt at the time.

Mr. Justice Hamilton, President of the High Court, awarded £86,116 damages and costs to Brendan Wallace (62), married, a commercial traveller of Bushy Park Lawns, Newcastle Road, Galway.

Mr. Wallace, who brought his personal injuries action against Edward Flahavan & Sons Ltd., Kilmac-thomas, Co. Waterford, suffered severe whiplash injuries to his neck.

He claimed that a van be-longing to Flahavan & Sons was in collision with his car at a bend on a narrow road between Ballyhaunis and Kilkelly in Co. Mayo on September 15, 1987.

In a reserved judgment, Mr. Justice Hamilton said he was satisfied that, as a direct consequence of the injuries, Mr. Wallace was unable to continue his duties as a commercial traveller in the north-west for the multi-national firm of A. H. Robins & Co. Ltd. and had thus been dismissed from his employment.

The judge held that the defendant's van was being driven too fast and was not as close as it could have been to the lefthand carriageway, and that this was the cause of the accident.

He said the evidence was that Mr. Wallace had not been wearing a safety belt and this contributed to his injuries. He made a deduction of 10 per cent because of this.

There were other deductions from the overall award of £103,680 and the president entered judgment for the final figure of £86,116 in favour of Mr. Wallace,

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
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
