Deep and profound shock was caused throughout the entire country when the news was announced last night (Tuesday) that Cardinal Tomas O Fiaich, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of all Ireland had died unexpectedly in Toulouse hospital, in the south of France at 7 o'clock (Irish time) that evening.



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Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

WHAT MUST I DO?

It is evident from the first reading that people were flocking to hear Peter preach on the necessity of being a follower of Christ, and they were so impressed by his teaching that great numbers believed, and wanted to know what they had to do. Peter's response was: "you must repent," and therein lies the key to bringing about a transformation in one's way of life. In short, you must turn away from sin. And, having thus prepared the way, you must wash yourself in the waters of Baptism; and from thereon, the Holy Spirit, whom you will have received through the Sacrament, He will help and guide you. Of course, you will have to go to Him, talk to Him and ask Him for counsel and guidance. There are times when He'll speak to you through hearing the Gospels, through the Mass, through discussing the Faith etc. Do listen, because He will always respond in one way or another.

The reading also reminds us of our own Baptism, and so, to ensure that we are living as befits a child of God, we ought to ask ourselves: are we Christ-like in our lives? Do we adhere to the standards ordained by the Master or do we follow the ways of the world? I followed part of the debate in the House of Commons regarding the unborn child, and especially the duplicity with which some members dealt with the sacredness of life. They meant it was sacred all right, but! For when the vote was taken, you immediately realised that their ideas of morality were bounded and limited by human interests. It is no wonder the world is in a mess, and, I'm afraid, so it will continue unless man finds the God solution. So, we have got to beware of the many false teachers, who do not always mean what they say! Hence, we have not only to guard against false shepherds, but we have also to make sure that we ourselves live by the spirit of Christ. That means we try to fulfil God's will in all our ways. Just ask yourself. Do you find joy in giving and helping? Where God is concerned, are you a fair-weather friend? As a father or a mother or child etc., do you discharge your duties faithfully? Are you the sort who relishes in destroying people's characters. There are times when we all fall short of what is good, but, are we prepared to put our finger on the black spot and root it out?

I asked someone recently what he thought of those who behave like "dynamite" when talking about their neighbours. Well, he said "I once told a priest that I'd spoken badly about someone", and his reply was "you take a pillow full of feathers, and throw them to the wind as you walk from here to the Pike. Then, try to gather them as you walk back to town." It brings home the irreparable harm caused by gossiping. It also tells us how sometimes it is almost impossible to undo the harm caused by the wagging tongue. So, whatever our weakness, let us take immediate steps to wipe the slate clean. You see, we've no problem about putting our finger on the other fellow's faults, and, if you are honest, you'll have little difficulty in locating the centre of your own trouble. Then, having made your peace with God, it is essential you continue to nourish yourself on the Eucharist.

Peter in the second reading and John in the Gospel portray Jesus in the role of a Shepherd, but do note that this

Shepherd was prepared to suffer and to die for His flock. Peter is saying to all those, who were so moved and converted as a result of the Easter triumph, that following the steps of Christ is hard and difficult. He suffered. They too must be prepared to shoulder and bear the trials and troubles that may come their way. Of course, the message is also for our benefit. Hence, being faithful to the Christian life is our opportunity to make reparation to God for all His goodness. Have no fear. Jesus will be by your side. And, you'll find, the more you do for Him, the more you'll love Him.

THE GOOD SHEPHERD

In the Gospel John paints a picture of the relationship that ought to exist between Christ and His sheep. The shepherd watches carefully. He is ready to ward off dangers. He leads them to rich pastures. And, when evening falls, he sees them back to the safety of the sheepfold. The sheep know him. When they hear his voice, they listen and follow. Clearly, the well-being of the Christian depends on his listening to Jesus, and abiding by His words. There are many false shepherds looking for followers. Because they have not the true interests of their listeners at heart, they make rash and foolish promises. Be warned. The blind do not lead the blind! Christ is the one who came so that His followers might enjoy life to the full. He is the one who so loved His sheep that He laid down His life for them. He is the true Shepherd. In the second reading we saw that Christ is the shepherd and guardian of souls. John unfolds the same theme in the Gospel: he, however, takes us a step further. He points out that the inevitable result is unity. All members are one in spirit both among themselves and with God. They all entered through the same gateway, Baptism. Those who enter, like the sheep, follow Christ, the Good Shepherd. They live within the fold, which is God's will as expressed through the Commandments. And, when they move into the pastures of prayer and the Sacraments, they grow strong, and become more like God. They remain close to their Shepherd. They know His voice, and they listen. Linked together through Baptism, they all believe the same truths, and sit at the same Eucharistic table. They are one with each other, and they are one with

Know Your Rights

Q. — My husband has been out of work since he was made redundant in 1987. I have been offered a place on a full-time FAS non-craft training course which I would dearly like to do. However, I have been told that if I take this course my husband will lose the increase he gets for me as well as half the rate for our children. If this is true there would be no point in my doing the course. Can you advise?

A. — The Social Welfare (No. 2) Act 1987 amended the definition of "adult dependant." Since this Act came into force in early 1988, a person participating in a full-time FAS non-craft training course is no longer regarded as a dependant.

However, in your particular case, as your husband's claim commenced prior to the coming into effect of this Act and his claim has remained unbroken since then, the old rules apply and your husband should continue to receive the full-rate for your children and the in-

crease for you if you take up the FAS course. Q. — My Unemployment Benefit is almost used up and I am about to go onto Assistance. For the past few months I have had part-time job for two evenings a week, with the permission of the exchange which pays me my full benefit. What effect will this part-time evening work have on my assistance?

A. — A person on Unemployment Benefit who has 78 weeks of PRSI paid in the previous three years may be allowed to do spare-time work i.e. work which is done outside their normal working hours and still be paid their full benefit.

However, the position will be different when you go on to Assistance. In this case if you do any work whatsoever in the 24 hour period, you must sign off for that day and you won't receive any payments for the day at the exchange. The earnings from your job will not be assessed against your Unemployment Assistance.

If this part-time work is likely to last for at least two months, it could be worthwhile going onto the part-time Job Incentive Scheme. Under this Scheme you can do part-time work of up to 24 hours each week and, in addition, you can be paid a supplement of £30 per week, if you are single or £50 if you are married, at the exchange. Enquire about this at the exchange.

Kilmac' Man **Exhibits His Paintings** In Cork


'Horses, Hurlers and Hookers,' an exhibition of paintings by Paul Downey was officially opened by former Taoiseach Mr. Jack Lynch at the Lavitt's Quay Gallery in Cork last Monday, May 7. The exhibition which is presented by the Frank Lewis Gallery, Killarney will continue until Saturday, May 19 (Tuesday to Saturday, 11 a.m. to 5.30 p.m.).

In this exhibition Paul Downey's paintings are attempting to convey "the power and urgency and sometimes danger" of the split second highlight that makes sports memorable; the "animal passion" of hurling, the "game of all skills — of striking running with, and controlling the ball." For Downey hurling is one of the most tremendous games. "There is nothing to compare with the atmosphere and the special buzz of a Munster hurling final," he says. But he is also a keen fol-

lower of sports in other codes such as horse racing, football, rugby, golf, soccer, bike racing and even American football. Over

the years he has developed the ability to freeze a sporting highlight in his mind and his artistic ambition is the expression of the essence and the spirit of a particular sport. He can focus attention on these particular elements in a way that could never be done in a photograph.

£9,000 Court **Award For Injured** Lismore Woman

A two-car collision near the village of Rathcormac on March 28 last year was recalled at Youghal Circuit Court before Judge Anthony G. Murphy last week.

A housewife and sheep farmer, Mrs. Diana K. Dungan, Glencairn, Lismore, claimed £15,000 damages for injuries sustained as a result of the negligent driving on the occasion of an English holidaymaker, Peter R. Bell, Tramier, Merseyside, Liv-

Liability was admitted by the defendant for whom an offer of £6,000 had been made to Mrs. Dungan.

However after hearing details of the injuries sustained by the plaintiff when Bell's car crashed into the back of hers, Judge Murphy ruled that the £6,000 offer was not enough.

He awarded Mrs. Dungan a decree for £9,000 general damages together with £375 agreed special damages, plus costs of the ac-

Mrs. Dungan told the court that as a result of the crash she developed a serious neck injury which effects her work in the home, on the farm, and also her social activities.

Waterford Regional Airport plc, the newlyformed public company established to take over the future development of Waterford Regional Airport, is to benefit from a major investment programme aimed at raising £1.3 million.

Ryanair Tourism and Leisure Limited and four prominent Waterford businessmen, Thomas J. Sheridan, Sean Power, Nicholas J. Fewer and Dominic Ellickson, are together investing £337,500 in Waterford Regional Airport plc and have underwritten a further investment of £162,500 in the company.

The grouping has undertaken to have a substantial and attractive terminal building commenced and completed at a very early



HE DIED 85 YEARS AGO THIS MONTH

James Francis Xavier O'Brien had the rather doubtful distinction of being the last man to be sentenced under British law to be hanged, drawn and quartered.

That was in 1867, following his participation in the Fenian Rising of that year

but the death sentence was commuted to penal servitude for life. However, in 1870 a new Act came into force which appointed hanging or beheading as the worst the law could do to a man or woman convicted of treason.

Born to wealth and industry, James F.X. O'Brien was a native of Dungarvan, where his father was a merchant, owning vessels trading with Britain and the Continent of Europe. Though he joined Fintan Lawlor in 1848 and later devoted all his talents to the Fenian movement, in between periods of revolutionary activity displayed the business acumen which he had obviously inherited.

He travelled widely in America and took part in a colourful military expedition to Nicaragua but with the rise of Parnell he became attracted to parliamentary politics.

James Francis Xavier
O'Brien was elected M.P.
for South Mayo but he later
switched to Cork City
which he represented until
his death which took place
on May 28, 1905.

We are indebted to Nioclas Graves of Ring for this interesting bit of history and wonder if any further background information as to the family and associations of James F.X. O'Brien with Dungarvan might be available.

MAJOR IMPROVEMENTS TO BALLYDUFF COMMUNITY HALL

St. Michael's Hall in Ballyduff Upper is at present

undergoing major improvement and extension works which, when completed, will increase the accommodation space and provide for a larger stage area.

In recent years the village of Ballyduff has been winning widespread publicity through the marvellous success which the Annual West Waterford Drama Festival has won and which now attracts entries from drama groups from all over Ireland.

The festival is based in St. Michael's Hall, the building of which has proved to be one of the outstanding achievements of the Ballyduff Branch of Muintir Na Tire, but so great has the public demand for tickets for the festival grown in latter years that the Community Council has now taken the brave step of taking on a £20,000 extension and improvement scheme at the Hall.

The work is proceeding quickly and the fine weather has greatly facilitated the contractors on the job, the local firm of Dave Feeney & Sons, Kilcoran, Conna. It is expected that the work will be completed by September.

Speaking to local member of the Community Council, Mr. Eamonn Bolger, during the week, he told us that they had hopes, with the additional accommodation and extra facilities including a larger stage which will be available at St. Michael's once this latest "face-lift" is completed, of staging the All-Ireland Drama Festival in Ballyduff at a future date.

He also mentioned that as part of their fund-raising drive to pay for the work now being carried out, there would be a sponsored benefit night at Youghal Greyhound Track on Friday night, May 18.

Indeed the members of the Community Council in Ballyduff are to be congratulated on their initiative and courage. They are certainly proving that nothing succeeds like success and deserve the fullest support.

Those of us whose memories can stretch that far backwill remember Ronald Ibbs playing at the Town Hall in Dungarvan as a member of Lord Longford's touring theatrical company when they brought wonderful theatrical entertainment to the town in those bygone years shortly after World War II.

How to store your food

HOW long can you safely store food in the 'fridge? Use these storage times as a guide to keeping food.

Joints - 3 days Poultry - 2 days Sliced meat - 2 days Minced meat - 1 day Offal - 1 day Sausages - 3 days Bacon - 7 days Fish - on day of purchase Milk - 4-5 days Soft cheese - 2-3 days Hard cheese - 7-14 days Semi-hard cheese - 7-10 days Eggs - 3 weeks Pies - 2 days Ham - 2 days Casseroles - 2 days

Raw food carries bacteria which are killed when the food is cooked properly. As pre-cooked foods are not cooked again, it is important to prevent them from becoming contaminated with bacteria and

Always cover raw foods and place them on the bottom shelf of the 'fridge so that they cannot drip on to cooked products (preferably keep cooked foods on a separate shelf).

Check and clean the salad tray regularly in case the raw food, such as meat, has dripped on to it.

Remember that when opened, canned foods should be removed from the can and treated as cooked food, ie wrapped, refrigerated and kept apart from raw

Azaleas' chance lies in the soil

WE ARE now at the peak of the flowering season for some of our favourite yet fussier trees or shrubs - rhododendrons and azaleas

They are closely related although most rhododendrons are larger and some varieties can reach 20 feet, though six feet is the usual limit for a garden type.

Azaleas tend to be less dominating although some will grow to 10 feet high and there are varieties of both that will bloom at other times of the year.

These plants are particularly popular with visitors to public gardens at this time of year, but many attempts to recreate such colourful displays of blooms and rich green foliage in the garden at home are doomed to fail-

This is due to the types and carefully in the first

preference for acid soils and a hatred of limey soils, which cause yellowing and a generally weak growth.

The way to raise them if your soil does not fit the bill is to create a special environment, either by filling a bed or tub with the soil type they prefer.

Problems

If space is a problem then you will be better off looking at dwarf rhododendron varieties such as lavender coloured Blue Tit or Red Elizabeth, which reach a maximum of three feet

Azaleas are also a better answer to space problems and generally look more delicate and less overpowering as well as offering more pastel shades.

Look out for popular varieties such as the pink Cecile, Orange Beauty and Koster's Brilliant Red.

Providing they are plant-

place, rhododendrons and azaleas do not require much looking after.

To maintain blooming you should break off dead flowers with finger and thumb and prune rhododendrons if they start to lose their bushy shape.

You can increase your stock by pegging down low and cutting them away and replanting once they have rooted - the practice known as layering - and you can increase your azaleas cheaply by sowing seed if you have a greenhouse.

When you buy your stock it is probably best to pay a little extra for a proprietary brand of soil or compost recommended for these two

Choose a site which gets some sun but remember that these trees are shallowrooted and like a lot of shade and moisture at their base so water when the soil



dries out and use a peat mulch to retain water.

If you live in a hard water area you should also avoid using tap water but collect rain water or even use the water left from defrosting the 'fridge.

Popular

Once you have prepared the site you will find yourself spoilt for choice when trying to decide what colour blooms you prefer, particularly from the rhododendron branch of the family, where virtually every shade is possible apart from a true blue.

Red remains one of the favourite hues with the crimson Britannia a popular variety and Doncaster and Lord Roberts others worth considering.

Pink Pearl is a favourite for pink displays but may be too large for most gardens, while Purple Splendour lives up to its

It's freezing cold - even in summer

We were lucky this year to have a very mild winter (even if we did suffer from the gales and flooding in some area).

But even in the coldest winter in Britain we are still lot warmer than in many other countries. But what about the places which are so cold that no-one can live there at all.

In the Antarctic for example, where there is a frost every single month of the year and even in the summer (if you can call it that) the average temperature is below freezing.

The Antarctic is the continent surrounding the South Pole (not to be confused with the Arctic, which is around the North Pole). It covers about four and a half million square miles and may once have been connected to South Africa and Western Australia. That may seem strange since both those countries enjoy very warm climates.

The great ice sheet which

covers the Antarctic reaches a thickness of about 2,000 sq

The continent includes a number of islands in the South Atlantic, the most famous of which are probably the Falkland Islands, which are a British protectorate.


In fact all the islands in that area, plus all parts of mainland Antarctic are now claimed by various countries. These claims began when whaling expeditions earlier this century revealed the region's possibilities. Countries which have control over parts of the continent include France, Norway, New Zealand and

The first person to sail into the Antarctic Seas was Captain Cook in 1772, while the first person to cross the great ice sheet and actually reach the South Pole as a man named Amundsen in

The largest expedition ever attempted was in 1946, consisting of 4,000 men, 13 ships and an aircraft carrier with 20 'planes.

Visitors would find little to excite them, as the only occasional inhabitants are whales, seals and penguins which are found in the seas and on the shores, plus many sea birds which nest there in the summer months.



Red Kettle For Dungs

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

PAUL McGRATH (Aston Villa)

When ever football fans discuss the Irish team or Alex Ferguson (Manchester United Manager) the name of Paul McGrath inevitably comes up in the debate.

McGrath, born in London of an Irish mother and a Nigerian father, was brought back and reared in Ireland from the age of 3 months.

Football was a big part of the youngster's life and he came into organised soccer with Pearse Rovers! and from there graduated

into the Leinster Senior League with Dalky United as a centre forward. His skill and athleticism were such that after 3 years with Dalky he was i signed by Charlie Walker, then manager of League of Ireland club St. Patrick's Athletic. Walker a canny manager, soon switched McGrath to midfield and then back to centre back. McGrath's form was very good and he still could score vital goals and soon attracted the atten-! tion of cross channel clubs. Manchester United's scout the legendary Billy Behan was so convinced of McGrath's potential that he persuad-! ed his manager that McGrath should be signed straight away without trials. Ron Atkinson took his advice

and Paul Mc-Grath, once known as the "Black Pearl of Inchicore," joined Manchester United for £100,000 — a windfall for St. Pat's, small change for United.



Paul McGrath made his English League debut in November 1882 but his stay with United was troubled by injuries especially his knees, one operated on 5 times, the other 3. But i his courage and his skill saw him establish himself in the first team! where he played with a list of several other centre backs such as Martin! Buchan, Gordon McQueen and

ITALIA '90

Kevin Moran, International football was to follow and he made his Irish debut in a friendly against Italy on February 2, 1985. In May '85 he picked up an English Cup winners medal when United beat Everton 1-0.

Reports of discipline problems in United often threw up the names of McGrath and Whiteside and the arrival of Alex Ferguson was the beginning of the end. Despite his growing international stature highlighted by the Euro Finals in German, Ferguson was keen to unload his centre back. At a knockdown price of £450,000 in July 1989, Graham Taylor signed the Irish defender who rewarded his new manager with outstanding displays which won him Aston Villa's player of the season award this year. Ferguson never really replaced McGrath and eventually had to pay over £2 million for Garry Pallister

from Middlesboro — a sum which was a far cry from the £100,000 paid to St. Pat's for McGrath.

Under Jack Charlton, Paul McGrath! has blossomed even though he is usually picked in midfield. His ability to score vital goals remains and he proved this against Luxembourg and Bulgaria in the European Championships and Hungary in the World Cup last June.

Paul McGrath's career has been threatened by injuries but this year under Taylor's shrewd managership he has been free of serious trouble! and his display against the U.S.S.R. as excellent.

In June Paul McGrath will be vital to Ireland. Where will Charlton play him - full back to mark Barnes or centre back? At midfield he hits hard, tackles cleanly, heads the ball well and scores vital goals. I would start him there but where ever he plays he won't let you down.

Manchester United play an F.A. Cup Final next Saturday. The debate still lingers on — should he have! been pushed out by Alex Ferguson. If United lose it will confirm that his season has been a disaster for United, a cup win may hide their poor league form, it will also confirm that Ferguson was wrong in his treatment of Paul McGrath the "Black Pearl of Inchicore." -(B.K.).

Knockanore/Shamrocks To Celebrate Junior

[By "Commentator"]

Football Title Win

Half a century ago there were great celebrations up Knockanore way when the local junior football team won the county title for the first time ever and now, just fifty years later the club, which is renamed the Shamrocks, plan to commemorate the great event by holding a special function in honour of that team.

1940 was a year of turmoil and trouble. Hitler's armies were winning the war in Europe, England was being bombarded from the air and here in Ireland food, clothing and petrol rationing had been introduced. But in spite of all this, the Waterford junior football championships had to be played and won, the same as in the previous year, when Mount Sion took their first adult football title and the same as in 1911 when Lismore won the first of its kind.

Petrol rationing wasn't a problem, because if they had an abundance of the stuff they would have had no use for it since they had no motor cars. It was the bike, shanks-mare or the pony and trap and for long distances, a loan of a lorry from the job. In those days too, while skill was very necessary, toughness was a quality which always played a role in winning and without it

Around that time, junior football was a championship with a much higher profile than it enjoys to-day. Winning it was a singular honour and many of the established football clubs in the county were not one bit pleased when a John Keane led Mount Sion club, who were more readily identified as a hurling unit, came along and won the

Knockanore, Brickey Rangers, Newtown, Ballyduff, Lismore, St. Stephen's, Sliabh gCua and others were the strong contenders at the time, so here in the West it was no surprise when Knockanore and Brickeys qualified for the divisional final. Brickeys had won it in 1927 and their 1940 team included a few of that side.

WESTERN FINAL

The Western final was played on the fifth Sunday of September, the week after the All-Ireland and the records tell of a big crowd coming to see the game. At half-time the sides were level at 1-1 to 0-4, but at the finish a goal separated them with the Knockanore team having 3-1 as against 1-4 for their disappointed opponents.

Having scrutinised the list of players, the Brickeys were satisfied that there were good grounds for an objection which was not unusual for clubs in those times, but when they went up to Knockanore country to obtain the evidence they were soon to realise that they were on a "mission impossible."

There was big trouble in the East between Newtown and St. Mary's in the divisional final. Liam Walsh, Eastern Board chairman stated that both should be suspended, but in spite of this, Newtown were awarded the game and matched to play Knockanore in the county final on November

There was a very big crowd in attendance and despite rationing of petrol several cars were seen outside the

Dungarvan referee Jimmy Good, lined up the teams and spoke in strong terms about behaviour. He threw in the ball bang on time at 3 p.m. Knockanore had won the toss and decided to play with the 'hill' and the breeze. LIVELY

Play was very lively from the start with an amount of tough tackling. Newtown pressed very hard, but with the Neville brothers, Donovan and Barry solid in defence the efforts of Mansfield, Dug-

gan and Flynn were unsuccessful. Then in the 10th minute after Knockanore had missed 2 points, Newtown broke away to open the scoring with a point. Revins, Barry and O'Neill were very prominent for the side representing the West. O'Donovan took down a high ball, sent to J. O'Neill who sent over the bar for Knockanore's first score. A "50" to Newtown was taken by Larry Veale, but P. Neville cleared well to T. O'Neill who set up an attack, resulting in a great goal. Supporters went wild. Knockanore had made several switches and Murray, Moloney and Kelly were causing all sorts of problems for the Newtown defence. Baldwin was great in defence. Cunningham sent in a shot that was saved and sent over for a 50. This was taken by Mick Neville, saved by J. Dunne, who sent Newtown attacking and Nugent was almost through for a goal only for Barry and Revins. Eleven minutes from half-time, Tom O'Neill went high for a ball, drove hard to Cunningham who sent to P. Kelly who in turn dodged several Newtown defenders and shot to the net for a great goal to leave it 2-1 to 0-1 at half-time.

Knockanore made more changes and Baldwin was in goal and brought off two great saves in the second half which was more tough than good. Mick Neville fielded a high ball, sent it to the wing where it was met by Murray and passed to P. Kelly to raise Knockanore's only flag of the second

TREMENDOUS EXCITEMENT

A hug crowd of Knockanore supporters rushed on to the field to cheer their heroes amid tremendous excitement and the players were shouldered to the dressing rooms. Afterwards the team were welcomed home and greeted with bonfires as they arrived back on home ground.

Co. Waterford Allocated £28,000 **Additional Grant For Road Repairs**

Grants worth £4m, to help repair roads, bridges and culverts damaged during last February's storms have been allocated to a number of local authorities by Mr. Padraig Flynn, Minister for the Environment.

biggest grant, £484,000 goes to Laois, followed by Galway, £350,000 and Limerick, £349,000. The money now being distributed is in addition to £1m. in February for storm and flood damage caused last October and December and to road repair grants already allocated.

ADDITIONAL GRANTS

The above grants are additional to the allocations made in respect of the road damage caused by the storms of last October and December and under which Waterford has already received £62,000.

In regard to the damage to coastal defences by the winter storms, an allocation of £710,000 has been made to Co. Waterford for repairs to harbour installations and other works, some of which will be recouped at 50% and some at 75% according to the type of repairs involved.


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
