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While the identity of the woman who was one of the eight winners who divided the £2 million plus National Lottery jackpot last week still remained a secret up to Tuesday evening, her winning ticket which netted her £254,000 was purchased by her at The Central Newsagency, Grattan Square, Dungarvan.

On Monday, rumours were rife around the town as to the identity of the winner but the owner of The Central Newsagency, Mr. Bob Pugh while confirming that the ticket was purchased in his shop would not budge as to the person's identity.

However the "Leader" was informed on Tuesday that while lightning was supposed to never strike in the same place twice we were not to be surprised if the mystery winner turned out to be a fairly near neighbour of Mr. Michael Browne, Rathmeaden, Kilmacthomas who was himself one of the first major Lotto jackpot winners. All we can say, in the circumstances, is maybe!

- But Time Is Running Out Says Labour Minister

As the strike at the Waterford Crystal plants in Waterford City and Dungarvan enters its eighth week there is still deadlock between the workers and management and efforts to bring the parties to the negotiating table have so far proved unsuccessful.

The latest of these was the move made by Minister for Labour, Mr. Bertie Ahern, to get the sides together last week-end but

this also failed when a mass meeting of the workers refused to accept the provisions put forward by the Minister in his peace

initiative. Later the Minister, in a radio interview, expressed his deep concern at this latest failure to get talks going between the sides stating that time was running out as only a week to ten days remained for some settlement to be reached between the Union and Management before the Board of the Company would step in.

On Monday night, Dr. P. Galvin, Chief Executive of Waterford Crystal said that the jobs of the 2,300 workforce at the three plants were now "seriously at risk." He said that he was "deeply concerned" at the Union's refusal to participate in discussions with management on the basis proposed by the Minister which was rejected because

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

THE HOLY SPIRIT IS LIFE

The universality of the Church, which we profess in the Creed, is an evident characteristic in the Church from her very foundation. It is to be seen in Philip's mission to the Samaritans as described in the first reading. You'll remember, a few Sundays back the Gospel presented us with a scene at Jacob's well. A woman was drawing water, and Jesus asked her for a drink. She responded: "how come that you a Jew asket me, a Samaritan, for a drink." As you know, there was hostile relations between their two peoples. Yet! following Philip's sojourn among them, they were so eager for the word of God that Peter and John went among them, and laid hands on them so that they might receive the Holy Spirit.

The Church's beginning may well be compared to the mustard seed, but it was one that was bursting with the power of the Holy Spirit. The early Christians had the task of spreading the Good News. They not only understood that the Lord had not left them orphans, but they were fully aware of the support of the Holy Spirit. They knew that just as the soul was to the body, the Holy Spirit was to Christ's Body, the Church. Too, they believed that the Church was for men and women irrespective of their race or colour, and so it would be till the end of time. The Lord did not want His followers to isolate themselves. Whilst their homeland was not of this world, He expected them to be at home wherever they were. They were not to employ force to subjugate others, but, like their Masters who never exercised compulsion, they were to feed them with the word of God. They were to persuade by example. Hence, we should be conscious of our responsibility. Remember, you may be the only Gospel that many may see and read. You represent Christ. He is depending on you to let His light shine, and dispel the darkness. However, I feel there's a need to ask on account of the way the world is going: have we put the lid on our spiritual life? Or, are we keeping our religion up our sleeves?

Our world today is very different from the world in which the Church was launched. Nowadays, most have heard, at least vaguely, of Jesus. Yet, not only are there greater numbers, but the need to present the living Christ is more vital. People are so caught up in their achievements that there's little room for God. Added to the difficulty of popularizing God, where He is not wanted, hindrances from false prophets cloud the day. Had the Apostles allowed themselves to be swayed by the circumstances that prevailed in their time, we'd be still in our sins. It is clear the world is sick. It is also evident that she requires signs to convince her that Jesus is her salvation. It is up to us to let the world know that Jesus is alive and active. And, we have got to convince her that there's life beyond the

It is of the very nature of the church to be universal or Catholic. Her function is to bring the message of salvation to all peoples irrespective of who or what they are. And, as the Lord Commanded: "I have made you, My Church, a light for the nations, so that my salvation may reach to the ends of the earth." So, "Go and teach all nations . . ." Already, I have stated that the Church's role is not to beat people into submission or impose her teachings on the subdued. God's power is in His message. It is inevitable that the Church will experience persecution and suffering and rejection, but she can never forsake her role. She must persist in the saving of souls.

THE POWER OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

The second reading and the Gospel both teach us that the Church is sustained and invigorated by the power of the Holy Spirit. He is one who directs, purifies, strengthens and supplies the zeal to urge us into action. Without His help our moral life would be in tatters. Hence, if we hope to take our place in extending the frontiers of the Church, we must gird ourselves with His Spirit, which we're able to draw from the Sacraments, especially Confession and Holy Communion. And, if it is happiness and contentment you seek in life, then this is your road. There's no other way.

The Irish people are not without their faults, but to me they are still God's own people. Ireland, like many other nations, has experienced tremendous progress and success, and she has reaped a fair share of riches, thanks be to God. However, it is very true that many get so absorbed in worldly affairs, that they lose their taste for God. Now, whilst it is true to say that greater numbers than ever are more aware of the Holy Spirit in their lives, growing numbers too on account of the din of the world, are failing to hear His voice. These people need help. Unless we help to kindle the fire of love in their hearts, they'll fall a prey to unbelief. It means, we pray and invite the Holy Spirit to be our guide and our help, and we promise to be His light to the blind. Most of us will never accomplish more than the little things. The secret lies in knowing they hold our greatness. Do them for God. It is a most potent way of bearing witness. Above all, bring that spirit into your homes, and your homes will ring with the sound of joy and happiness, and help to make Christian Marriage a light to the world.

Waterford Regional Airport Will Become South-East Gateway To Europe

Plans on foot for Waterford Regional Airport would make it the gateway to Europe for the south-east region and in time the best regional airport in the country, Mr. Dan Hurley, County Manager, told members of Waterford Co. Council at their May monthly meeting held last week in Dungarvan.

In the course of a special report which was placed before the meeting, Mr. Hurley referred to the Council's association with the Airport project since it was first mooted in 1980. Originally funded by government grant aid, local authority subvention and local voluntary subscription, a new public liability company was established last February in order to broaden the capital base to finance the future development of the airport. A prospectus for 500,000 ordinary shares of £1 had been issued towards this

The Manager's report went on to state: "The Council has in the past number of years provided a subvention of £10,000 per annum towards the ongoing costs. Under the restructuring that has taken place and the proposed issue of shareholding, I would not see the necessity for this continuing. However, I would recommend to the Council that the Council subscribe for shares to the extent of £30,000 and maintain our continuing interest in the develop-

end.

Mr. Brian O'Shea, T.D., proposed that the Co. Manager's recommendation to subscribe £30,000 for shares in the new company be endorsed by the Council. He added that the public response to the shares issue had been most encouraging.

The proposal was seconded by Cllr. Paddy Cahill who said that the new company was deserving of the fullest support.

Cllr. B. Kyne supported the proposal but warned that the project should not be seen to be just a Waterford City Airport. If it is to succeed as it should he felt that the new company should sell its facilities throughout the hinterland of West Waterford and even farther afield. "It must be marketted as a regional airport if it is to reach its fullest potential," he said.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Hurley agreed with the

point made by Cllr. Kyne and added that the airport was on its way to becoming the best airport in the country. "It will be the gateway to Europe for the entire south-east region in the years ahead," he said.

The Council unanimously approved of the Manager's recommendation to subscribe £30,000 for shares in the new company.

Know Your Rights

Q. — Can you give me details about the new Carer's Allowance?

A. — The new allowance for Carer's will come into effect in October and it will replace the existing Prescribed Relatives Allowance. The full rate will be £45 with increases for the carer's child dependants.

There will be a means test similar to the Non-Contributory Old Age Pension. If the pensioner has other income in addition to their Social Welfare Payment, then this other income may be taken into account in the means test. So, some carers will receive a reduced rate and others will not be eligible for any payment.

To qualify for the allowance the carer must be living with and giving full-time care and attention to a Social Welfare pensioner, who must be in need of full-time care and attention. The pensioner must be getting an Invalidity or Blind Pension or be aged 66 and getting a Social Welfare payment.

The carer doesn't have to be a relative and can be male or female. The fact that others are residing with the carer and the pensioner will not be a bar on getting the allowance. This means that married women will be eligible. However, half the spouses means will be assessed against her in the means test and this could result in her getting a reduced amount or nothing. If her husband is getting a Social Welfare payment he will lose the increase he receives for her and also half the increase for the children. She will be paid the £45 and half the child's dependant allowance (£5.50 per child), so there will be some gain.

Those presently receiving the Prescribed Relatives Allowance can remain on this payment if it would be to their advantage.



WILL THE VISITORS CLEAN US OUT?

A circular recently published by the National Association of the Regional Game Council says that organised Shooting Tourism" is moving fast towards the stage where the numbers of certain game birds are being put at risk. The Continental hunters are being attracted to this country to shoot birds such as snipe and woodcock, which cannot be restocked.

A recent advertisement tle. went so far as to say that the visitor, provided he was a good shot, could shoot up to 80 birds a day. Bord Failte indicates that there is no limit to killing migratory birds and are planning to increase the level of commercialised hunting.

The Game Association claims there is an inequality as between the resident and the visiting sportsman. Unlike the visitors, the resident is subject to the scrutiny of the Gardai before he can obtain a firearms certificate; his licence expires on the last day of July while a visitor's licence is in force until its anniversary date. Also the visitor is permitted to have up to five times the quantity of ammunition allowed to the resident sportsman.

Many areas throughout the county especially in rural districts have already initiated a "Neighbourhood Watch" scheme as sponsored by the Community Relations Section of the Garda Siochana. The latest area where plans are proceeding to initiate the scheme is Abbeyside and at present members of an ad hoc committee are engaged in carrying out a survey of the residents of the area as to their attitude towards the scheme.

but that burglary and vandalism are the principal crimes committed in most areas every year. To combat these and other such crimes, community involvement is essential as there cannot be a Garda at every corner throughout every hour of the day and night. By co-operating with each other and with the gardai people can help to fight crime in their communities in the most effective way — before it begins!

This is where the Neighbourhood Watch scheme can prove a major factor as it provides a means of reducing the opportunity for crime through the active participation of people in crime prevention. In addition it provides a sense of security for individuals or families who leave their houses vacant for any length of time while on holidays or for other reasons while it also provides a way of utilising the talents and energies of those interested to reduce criminal activity.

For this reason we cannot too strongly commend this scheme to the a residents of Abbeyside where steps to initiate it are at present being taken nor indeed to any other areas where the introduction of the scheme might be considered.

The scheme involves a programme of mutual assistance among neighbours and encourages them to get to know each other, to work together alert to potential crime and entails a willingness to look out for one another's interests. It also stresses the need for residents to make their homes less inviting as targets for thieves by participating in property marking, thus making personal property less likely to be stolen.

In due course special security signs are publicly displayed in those areas where the scheme is in operation and these serve as a further warning to would be criminals. former priest David Rice who was being interviewed about his book, "Shattered Vows." We can only describe this person's efforts to explain why he threw his celibate vows over the wall as the whining of a weakling.

Had the man been forced to follow the celibate way of life we could see some point in his complaining while we could still have some sympathy for his "predicament" were he mistaken initially in choosing a celibate role rather than marriage and were that mistake his own. But some married folk however, far from sympathising, must envy David Rice his good fortune in obtaining a dispensation from his vow of celibacy after changing his mind. These would be those who, having made a mistake in their choice of spouse find they must live with an incompatible part-

former priest David Rice ner "till death do them who was being inter-part."

To our way of thinking these people are more deserving of sympathy than a drop out priest who freely made a vow, knew what he was doing and what the vow entailed, grew tired of keeping it and then succeeds in having the vow dispensed.

Certainly all those who have to endure unhappy marriages cannot be blamed if they think that such priests are not so badly done by or if, in the circumstances, they come to the belief that there is one law for priests and another, and harsher one, for lay people.

It is indeed disconcerting when a priest goes back on his word and flouts the law to get what he wants while those with marriage problems, equally as great, must toe the line.

HEARD A CUCKOO?

A few years ago, ornithologists were discussing the phenomenal decline of the comcrake one of the most characteristic summer migrants to this country up to that time. The almost total disappearance of the bird was attributed to a change in farming work practices and particularly to the introduction of silage making.

A Decorative Yet Easy Way To Cover Walls And **Fences**

By Pete Moss

WIDESPREAD availability of container-grown climbing plants and others suited to wall decoration allow planting virtually all year round.

But the warmth of May makes it worth considering as the time to establish these rewarding and decorative varieties, providing you keep the young plants well-watered early on

The versatility of these plants allows them to be trained on walls, fences, trellises and pergolas.

Some types, like ivy, Virginia Creeper and many vines, need little help in clinging to walls and other features while others may need supports and tying, especially early on.

Variety

But the shops and garden centres can supply the special fixing nails, trellis or green netting needed to give them a start.

When choosing the variety to suit the location for planting, you should bear in mind that the less hardy will prefer a south-facing wall or aspect while the hardier will bear a northfacing location.

When digging the soil for the new plant it is best to double dig - to the depth of two spades - so that the subsoil is well broken up and the topsoil aerated.

You are not likely to be moving a climbing plant around the garden so you need this well-dug soil to allow the roots to establish for the many years the plant is likely to be there.

And if you are paying pounds for a dearer variety it is best to prepare well so that your money isn't wast-

So what is best for your chosen location? You will find plenty on offer at garden centres, with details on where to place them and

keep them healthy, but here are a few well-known types worth considering:

Clematis - a favourite climber with tendrils which love wood or wire trellises. The family has varieties with many sizes of bloom and will suit most soil types but the roots have to be well shaded and kept moist while the top growth loves

Ivy - perhaps the toughest and easiest climber to grow, able to cling by itself and able to wisthstand a northern location and dense shade. It also grows quickly and there are variegated types which look especially attractive, but bear in mind it will need ruthless pruning in May and June once established

Hydrangea Petiolaris another able to take hold firmly, even on a north wall. It needs pruning in spring and produces attractive bright green leaves as well as delicate white flowers.

Climbing

Russian Vine - this plant needs a "handle with care" label. Not for nothing is it also nicknamed "Mile-a-Minute" because it will add some 15 feet of growth annually to cover a garden eyesore with dense foliage and creamy flowers, but can get out of hand unless checked by ruthless spring pruning.

Roses - there are far too many climbing varieties to mention here but any will make a colourful wall or pergola decoration. However, don't forget they are just as prone to blackfly and other pests as their standard brethren.

Wisteria - a mauveflowering climber ideal for sunny and fertile locations and needing little pruning.

Virginia Creeper - a strong climber with attractive green leaves in summer turning to rich red in

Application To Re-open Quarry Refused

On the recommendation of the Planning Department of Waterford Co. Council, the Co. Manager has made an order refusing the appli-cation of Mr. D. Loftus, Ballyvoile, Stradbally for permission to re-open the quarry at Ballyvoile.

Reasons stated for the refusal were that the proposed development in a high amenity coastal zone and on the side of a steep valley would be seriously detrimental to the visual amenity of the area; that because of the narrowness and poor alignment of the road serving the site the increased traffic generated by the development would lead to an increase in traffic hazard and further that the proposed development would be environmentally damaging due to noise, dust, blasting and could lead to pollution of the nearby Dalligan river.







John Sheridan now has the stage to show his skills, if he gets the chance will he make the most of it? Ronnie Whelan's injury causes concern, so on the final day for selection, May 29, we will know for sure if the Liverpool player is in.



Ireland play Turkey on May 27, their final warm-up, and then it's a brief stay in Malta and then on to Sardinia. Another curious decision by Charlton is to use only two keepers, Bonner and Peyton. Most people feel two keepers is a bit of a gamble.

In selecting my last player profile I'm conscious with 16 days to go to kick-off that I haven't covered all the Irish panel. I don't mean this as any disrespect to those I have omitted but in the final editions I will use the space to try and keep you up to date with Ireland's chances, the final panel, and who we may meet if Ireland qualify from the opening three games.

In my final selection of Mick McCarthy I have picked a player I greatly admire, whose selection usually invokes a debate, comparing McCarthy's and David O'Leary's qualities.

For me Mick McCarthy epitomises all the values needed for any job - he gives his all, leads by example and is quite fearless, His skill, or lack of it as his critics would say, is often written about by our more cynical journalists, but he has served Ireland well and

Jack Charlton rates him highly. Mick McCarthy was born in Barnsley on the 7/2/59 and at 16 years was accepted as an apprentice electrician at a coal mine, but he opted for an offer from Barnsley Football Club to become an apprentice footballer. This decision was an example of McCarthy's commitment, maybe even stubborness, for he took a

reduction in wages from £35 to £14 to opt for the unglamorous life of football with his home town

Nowadays you could mention the many highlights of McCarthy's career - medals with Celtic, games against Lineker, but the hard tackling defender also played against the legendary defender Skinner Normanton. Michael Parkinson made Normanton famous when he wrote of Barnsley and Yorkshire and his many references to Skinner Normanton meant some people felt he was a fictitious player. He also was a defender noted for his sliding tackle. Mick McCarthy did play against him in a charity game and has many of the features of the footballer made famous by Parkinson.

After making his debut with Barnsley in August 1977, his club were promoted from the fourth division to the second division and he joined Manchester City in 1983. While with City Eoin Hand called him up for Ireland and he wore the green of Ireland for the first time against Poland in May 1984. McCarthy came into his own with Man. City and he made his best career move when he joined Glasgow Celtic for £500,000 in May 1987. League and cup medals followed and his international career was about to take off.



Jack Charlton's appointment was good for Mc-Carthy, Charlton valued McCarthy despite the Dublin media especially, lobbying for David O'Leary. McCarthy repaid his manager with sterling displays culminating in Ireland's European Championship. A move to Olympique Lyonnais in France had its troubles and in a bid for first team football Mick McCarthy returned to the English League with Millwall, who were then relegated to the second division.

This season has been a tough one for McCarthy with injury and the move to Millwall. He had his critics again in his latest games with Ireland, but he will fight on and I'm confident that his fellow Yorkshire man, Charlton, will continue to pick him.

Mick McCarthy will have the eyes of all the Irish supporters on him in Italy, but not many of them know of his Waterford connection. Mick's father, Charlie, emigrated from Tallow, Chapel Street to be exact, and his uncle Tom who resides in West Street, Tallow, will, like all of Tallow and West Waterford be conscious and proud of Mick McCarthy's Waterford connection.

As I said he is a player I admire greatly. His manager might say that his teak tough defender has all the qualities of a Yorkshire man, like the legendary Skinner Normanton. I'm sure for a player born in the year Waterford won an All-Ireland hurling championship he must have inherited some of the great sporting traditions of the Brideside team.



Whether it's Yorkshire or Waterford or a combination of both, Mick Mc-Carthy has served Ireland well - he faces his greatest test on June 11 against England — he will give his all as usual. —B.K.—
