Concern Over **Domestic Water** Supplies

Despite the fact that the first rain for weeks came this week, fears were expressed at the adjourned monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night that there could still be a water shortage later in the year.

The matter was raised by Cllr. Nuala Ryan who referred to the recent notice published jointly by the Urban and County Councils in the local papers calling on the public to conserve water supplies as much as possible. She asked if they were now facing the threat of a serious shortage.

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White said that there could well be a shortage later if they did not get rain now. "If we get no rain at this time of year," he said, "the levels at the urban water source will drop in July and that could cause supply problems then."

Cllr. Ryan said that following the publication of

water supplies it made her mad when she still saw people washing their cars and watering their lawns. It was quite beyond her to understand why people ignored such notices and she mind.

the notice to conserve suggested that a similar notice should be published at regular intervals so as to impress the seriousness of the matter on the public. The Town Clerk said that he would bear this in



JESUS PRAYS FOR UNITY IN **HIS CHURCH**

Some of the main themes over the last few Sundays including the Ascension were: the unity, the holiness, the universality and the apostolicity of the Church founded by Christ. Jesus entrusted His authority and His teachings to His chosen Apostles, and He commissioned them to go and teach all the nations. He assured them that He'd remain on in Jerusalem, and await the coming of the Holy Spirit. Then, they could go and embark on spreading the Good News.

The first reading tells us that the disciples dutifully followed the directions of Jesus, and gathered with some women including Mary in the Upper Room. We are told that they gave much time to prayer as they awaited the coming of the Holy Spirit. You will have noticed the emphasis placed on preparation. And, the lesson for us is, we ought to be regular with our prayers to ensure our habitations are fitting dwelling places for so important a Guest. Indeed, there's always the danger that our lives become so cluttered with daily affairs that we are wont to forget our deference to the Divine Spirit. True, He'll never abandon us unless we drive Him out by mortal sin. And, prayer is the environment in which He lives and operates. Say what you will, human nature is much of a muchness, and so I feel there's only the one way to avoid neglect. One must strive to have a subconscious awareness of His presence as well as keeping to regular times for daily prayers. Any old time never works.

The theme of the second reading is one we hear frequently, namely, we live in a valley of tears, and, whatever our circumstances, we ought to utilize our trials and our sufferings in God's service. It is the one and only way to combat and muzzle suffering. St. Peter tells us, we should feel privileged to bear suffering for Christ. So, instead of allowing our burdens to crush us, we now have the ways and means of making them a source of rejoicing. Oh! pain and suffering is not easy. They are part of life. Often, they put pressures on our love for God. However, we must not allow them to destroy us. Shoulder them, and let God know you are doing it for Him. In that way, the crosses that looked like breaking you, you have made them the instruments of salvation. Simon helped Jesus to carry His cross. He was very close to Jesus. And, the Lord has offered the same privilege to those who carry a cross. The Gospel passage is one of the most moving in Sacred Scripture. It is an appeal from the heart made by the Son of His Father on our behalf, and it is made in simple language, and yet! the words are full of meaning. He talks of His hour, which He'll have to render as the price of our salvation. Too, He speaks as if He's already paid the full price; and, He then proceeds to ask that the fruits of His sacrifice might be blessed with unity and perseverance. He tells the Father that He has been glorified on earth through His work. However, it is obvious the label

Lord has in mind the future glories of the Church. Whilst His prayer for His faithful followers is final salvation, He speaks as if they were already in pos-

session of that glory. The Lord is very conscious of the dangers His followers will have to face. He knows the world will reject His law. He knows that the force of sin will almost make it look right. So, He prayed also that His followers would "be consecrated in truth," and here the obvious meaning would be that they'd be blessed in their faith and be able to reject the temptations of the world. We know that if we respond to God's blessing, the Holy Spirit will be our guide and our support for St. Paul says: "He is the gift of those who love and obey God."

YOU HAVE A MISSION

The Lord makes a special plea for the Apostles, and do note that He prayed too that all of us would be faithful in promoting the word of God. Never, never forget you are a son of God. You have a mission. You may be the only life-line that God will give to a soul in danger. Your good example may be just what was necessary to open his heart to the grace of Divine Mercy. Your reward will be very great.

If we follow the gist of this great prayer, we cannot but notice that Unity must be a characteristic of Christ's Church. The Lord compares that unity in the Body of Christ, His Church, to the unity existing between Himself and His Father. And, He prays that that relationship would continue to operate and to grow in His Body. As if to give us an insight into Himself, He mentions the equality ex-

Major Cash Shortfall For Dungarvan Street Restoration Plan

The total cost of street restoration following the recent major town centre sewerage scheme in Dungarvan was £279,400, the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, told members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their May monthly meeting. He added that all that was available towards the work was £76,000 which left a shortfall of £203,400.

Mr. O'Flynn went on to point out that as there was no possibility of the Council funding the shortfall from its own resources a case should be made to the Department of the Environment for a special grant. "Other towns have, I believe been aided in surfacing programmes following sewerage schemes," he said, "and it is vitally important to the appearance of the town that the work be done properly and it is also important to note that proper surfacing will minimise future maintenance costs on the streets concerned."

The work proposed includes asphalt surfacing at Bridge Street, C.B.S. -Parish Church, Square - St. Patrick Street Junction. Mary Street and Davitt's Quay, with macadam surfacing at Upper Mitchel

St., Emmet St., Friary St., Lower Main St., Church St., Lower Quay, Western Tce., Sides of Square, Post Office - Quay, Quay -Square (via car park), Creamery Corner and Shandon.

On the point made by the Co. Engineer of requesting the Department for a special grant for the work, the Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White said that representations in the matter were already being made to the Dept. on this.

When some members suggested that a deputation might seek to see the Minister on the matter, the Town Clerk said that they were at present making a case to the Dept and it might be better to see what

the outcome of this would be before taking any further steps.

The Council agreed to follow this suggestion.

ANNUAL ROADWORKS SCHEME

The County Engineer also submitted particulars of the usual annual Urban Roadworks Scheme planned for 1990 at a total cost of £87,000 towards which grants totalling £62,000 had been allocated.

Apart from routine maintenance work the scheme included plans for footpath replacements at Childers Estate, Cathal Brugha and Mitchel St., and surface dressing at Park Lanc, Western Bay and Springfield.

Dungarvan **Technical College "Must Get Its Act Together**"

The future of Dungaryan's Technical College was discussed at the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last week. In the course of the discussion, fears were expressed by some members that the school could lose out unless a definite educational policy was planned and implemented.

Cllr. B. Kyne referred to the planned amalgamation and rationalisation of second level schools in Dungarvan, shortly to come into operation. He said that the two local convents, Mercy and Presentation. had already agreed their amalgamation plans while St. Augustine's College was to become co-educational. In the circumstances, Cllr. Kyne said, unless they had a definite policy for the Technical School it could lose out disastrously for the future. Cllr. B. O'Shea T.D. sup-

ported this view and added that a community college should be their ul-timate aim. "There is no time to be lost and we must get our act together where this is concerned without any further delay," he said.

Champion Young **Horse** At Bandon Show

Well known Dungarvan horse breeder, Thomas Power, Knock, took the top award for the champion young horse at Bandon, (Co. Cork) Show last Thursday with his threeyear-old gelding "Golden View".

Mr. A. Flynn, member of the teaching staff at Dungarvan said that if they were to retain their school in the town they would have to both extend and upgrade it. He expected that the enrolment figures would be up by 35 for the coming school year but as matters stood they were unable to adequately accommodate the number of pupils at present in the school.

Mr. Flynn went on to point out that other second level schools in Dungarvan were now providing instruction in technical subjects and there was no way that the vocational school could compete with them in the future unless it was upgraded.

Mr. D. O Ceilleachair CEO then informed the meeting that he had arranged for a deputation to meet officials of the Dept. of Education in Dublin during which all the points raised by the members would be discussed.

Further discussion was deferred pending the outcome of the deputation's visit to Dublin.







IS IT THE END FOR **RURAL P.O.'s?**

It would seem that the writing is now clearly on the wall for many small rural post offices which are to be closed by An Post in their move towards more centralisation as a cost-cutting exercise.

Since the foundation of the State, the village post office has been a focal point for rural communities and has provided a superb service. And, in the days of the old manually-operated telephone system, postmasters and their families acted as 24-hour operators.

The closure plan was spotlighted at the last meeting of Waterford County Council when a proposal was unanimously passed calling on An Post not to shut down any more of the country's sub-post offices.

We agree with the views expressed by the Council members that as matters stand, rural areas all over the country are suffering. It is the elderly and the poor who will suffer most from these closures. They will soon have to travel to the nearest town for their old age pensions and in many cases public transport will not be available which will add to the inconvenience and hardship they will have to endure.

While An Post recently disclosed losses of £3.5 million for last year it is to be hoped that their costcutting measures involving the closure of the country post office is not just taking the easy option and that the apparent inefficiencies in the overall system will also come under scrutiny.

Years ago, many rural national schools were shut down but a fight was made for some and they survived. The same could be done for many of those post offices which otherwise will now come under the hammer.

And what about our rail system? This was decimated over twenty years ago in another cost-cutting exercise, but look what it would mean to-day if the rail link between Waterford and Cork cities had been maintained. Most of the heavy freight could be handled by rail instead of not only cutting up our road surfaces but causing enormous traffic problems as well for the towns through which the juggernauts now pass.

When one considers the scandalously neglected conditions of our roads and the colossal cost of maintaining them, it is not too difficult to see these costcutting exercises as penny wise, pound foolish procedures!

Summer Display Of Priceless Dolls In Dungarvan

What is believed to be the finest doll collection of its kind in Ireland and the U.K. is going on public display in a Dungarvan Hotel for the months of June, July and August as an added local tourist attraction.

The "Collender Collection" has been painstakingly put together by Mrs. Nell Collender of Ballinavough, Lemybrien, and she has now agreed at the request of Bord Failte to stage an exhibition of the dolls — all fifty-five of them dressed in their period clothing — at the Lismore suite in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan, from Friday next June 1st right through to August 31st.

The magnificence of the collection, and its undoubted tourist attraction, has obviously not been lost on Bord Failte. A senior Bord Failte executive will perform the official opening on Friday evening in the presence of an attendance that will also include the chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council, Cllr. Paddy Power.

Mrs. Collender has been collecting her French, German and English dolls for the best part of forty years. She has, in her own words, "been to every nook and cranny in the country" collecting them.

The dolls date from the 1870s to the 1920s, while the prams in which many of them are comfortably accommodated were made in South Africa in 1860 before their importation into this country.

PRICELESS AND IRREPLACEABLE

Mrs. Collender correctly describes her collection as

"priceless and irreplaceable," and insists that the dolls of today cannot stand comparison with those that make up the "Collender Collection."

The moulds used to make her dolls were all destroyed during the two World Wars, and that is why she believes the present day dolls cannot be compared with hers.

Mrs. Collender has been told by Bord Failte that there isn't another doll collection in Ireland to compare with hers. In fact the Tourist Board is of the belief that it is one of the finest such collections in Europe.

"That is something I am proud of," she will tell you with obvious satisfaction. And so she should, considering the time, effort, and meticulous attention to detail she has put in over many years in compiling the collection.

She is both delighted and honoured at having been asked by Bord Failte to put the dolls on public display. And she particularly hopes that school children will come along to see what is undoubtedly a beautiful and quite fascinating collection.

The exhibition will run from 9.30 to 11. 30 a.m. and from 6.30 to 9 p.m. seven days a week. Friday's official opening will be preceded by a cheese and wine reception.



Red spider mite on the underside of leaves are a more persistent pest, especially in dry conditions. They cause yellowing leaves which then fall and disfigure the tree as well as weakening it while moisture is in short supply. When treating trees afflicted by these stubborn pests you need to regularly spray leaves on both sides. Fortunately, your persistence will have other spinoffs, especially in checking

the worst rose pest of all,

the aphid or greenfly.

The adults and their many offspring infest the stems and undersides of the leaves, covering everything with a sticky honeydew, generally disfiguring and weakening the tree.

Broken

Fortunately, this year has seen a surge in the population of ladybirds, the natural enemy of aphids, so a natural ally could well be helping out more than usual.

You can help the root system by applying a mulch such as peat or broken bark to slow down evaporation of moisture from the soil

er into the circle soil above the roots. A fertiliser applied to the leaves will also help.

To get the best blooms from your hybrid tree bushes you should also practice disbudding, but don't do this with any other rose

type. To disbud, use your thumb and forefinger to rub out side buds before they become too large. This allows the main bud at the end of the stem to develop into a large showy bloom.

If you want to cut the bloom for display then, as with any rose bloom, cut cleanly just above the stem bud that will provide an outward facing shoot and a fresh crop of uncluttered blooms.



The history of cricket

CRICKET matches are a common sight at this time of year, especially on school playing fields in the afternoons and on village greens at the weekends

Although it is now played throughout the world it was started in England and is one of the country's oldest games.

The first written evidence dates from about 1300 when King Edward I mentions

money being spent by the young Prince Edward on a game called "creag." There are certainly drawings from a few years earlier which show a simple game with a bat and ball which looks remarkably like cricket.

The sport was being played by some boys at a school in Guildford, Surrey, in 1550 and a kind of cricket club at St Albans, Hertfordshire, was mentioned in 1666. The first recognised cricket club was formed at

the Hampshire village of Hambledon in 1750.

Although the rules of cricket are still changed from time to time, the basic format has remained the same since the start of the 18th century.


Popularity

The forerunner of our county matches was probably the match between the 'Londoners" and the "Kentish men" in 1719.


The sport was predominantly a southern game for many years, but its popularity gradually spread and there are now county sides from all over the country, plus Glamorgan in Wales. Scotland also has a team and has produced many good players who have moved to England to pursue their careers.

In addition cricket was spread through the former British Commonwealth and there are now seven countries taking part in test matches - India, Pakistan, Australia, New Zealand, Sri Lanka and the West Indies.

Each year the England team hosts a visit from one of the other countries, and every winter the England team visits one of the other test countries.





A TALE OF TWO MANAGERS

While the English and Irish parties departed for their final World Cup build up the contrast in the stress on the two managers could not be more obvious. Bobby Robson haunted by the tabloid press in his country is forced to announce that he is to take up a position with P.S.V. Eindhoven because he won't be retained by the English F.A. after the finals, irrespective of the results. Robson, in my view, hamfistedly allowed the press to force him into announcing that Peter Shilton would start in the game against Ireland.

Contrast that to his counterpart Charlton, while all the media attention was on the payment demands by the Irish panel and the injuries to Whelan and Houghton, Charlton was where he likes best, fishing in the West of Ireland.

This difference in style or, if you like, ability to deal with pressure, was highlighted for me as both teams lined out for their European championship game two years ago.

Robson resplendent in blazer and tie in the blazing sun marched out behind his team. Charlton in his open necked shirt, chatted to his players while he kicked a football a few times.

Managers in the modern game are often over emphasised but they are important, a lot depends on how they handle the pressures of a World Cup. I feel Ireland are ahead in that department already.

Egypt, members of FIFA since 1923, draw their players in the main from arch rivals Al-Ahly and Zamalek clubs. They have prepared well so get ready for names like play-maker Hassam Hassan, defender Rabia Yassin and manager Mohammed El Gohary. Ireland will have to be careful - we don't want a smiling Sphinx after they meet us on June 17. -B.K.-

With a complete shut-down ordered for Sunday next in the county, thousands of Waterford supporters will travel to Semple Stadium, Thurles, to see the meeting of old rivals, Waterford and Cork in a game that will determine the opponents of Tipperary/Limerick in the Munster senior final on Sunday, July 5. Our junior game against Cork which will be played as a curtain-raiser, is also a semi-final and the final of this championship is fixed for two weeks later, June 20.

Following our two matches with Cork at the same venue last year and our eventual defeat of Cork in the replay, there is certain to be added interest in this meeting and it would create its own bit of history if we went through three Munster championship matches with Cork without defeat.

Public expectations of our prospects are high and I can understand the concern of the selectors and players about the widespread notion that Cork are 'there for the taking.' 


