Co. Council To Make Submission On Local Government Reforms

A special meeting of Waterford Co. Council was held on Monday last to consider the making of a submission to the Minister for the Environment on Local Government Reform.

A notice from the Special Advisory Committee set up by the Minister to deal with the matter invited submissions in writing not later than July 31. Matters to be considered to include structures and functions of local authorities; rationalisation of present regional structures; criteria on which the contribution from central funds to local authorities should be made on a statutory basis; general powers of local authorities; review of reserved and managerial functions and the operation of "section 4" resolutions and the planning system.

Gardai are investigating damage estimated at £20,000 which has been caused to Monatrea House. It is understood that the wanton destruction to the unoccupied Georgian country home overlooking Youghal Bay, resulted from an attack by vandals carried out sometime on Wednesday of last week.

The damage was discovered when a check was made at the house on Wednesday night. Monatrea House and adjoining lands were recently bought by a Continental purchaser at a price stated to be in the region of £300,000.

Gardai from Dungarvan who are investigating what has been described as "an orgy of destruction" at Monatrea House, under the supervision of Inspector Eamonn Keating travelled to Youghal last Friday where a number of local youths were questioned at length.

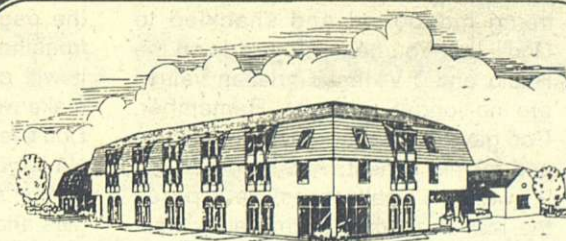
A file in the matter is being prepared for submission to the Director of Public Prosecutions and it is expected that some people will be charged with the

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Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

HOSPITALITY

The story related in the first reading has a familiar ring about it. It is not unlike stories many of you will have heard or even experienced. The key point in the story is hospitality, and that it is not limited. Whilst light is focused on the respect due to God's servant, the moral is: God's law of charity has no bounds. Remember, the writer was presenting us with a picture of society in his day. It was mostly tribal with people living in closely knit communities. If a stranger or a traveller came among them, it was traditional and customary to welcome him. The very nature of the countryside with large tracts of deserts made this tradition a boon to tired and weary travellers. You could say, hospitality was the spirit of that age. We know from our own experiences that we never miss what we give to those in need; and we know too that such good deeds invariably bring God's blessing. The people in those early days were fully aware that the Lord favours those who are generous givers. The reading actually tells us that an act of kindness shown to one of God's servants brought the reward of a long desired child.

What a change has come over the world! Apart from monasteries and such like hospices, present day circumstances make it almost impossible to practice the ideal spirit of charity for which the Gospel calls. No one has to tell you that if you did open your door to every stranger, even if you did wake up the following morning, you'd most likely, like Mrs. Hubbard, find that more than the cupboard was bare! Oh! there were times when people could be trusted, but these days have since long vanished. However, it is most important to keep in mind that despite the unhappy lowering of moral standards, it does not follow that the Christian ideal can be brushed aside. In fact, if anything, it calls for greater application of the law when the opportunity presents itself.

I realise, in a society where might is right, licence has replaced freedom and wrong is considered right, one could feel tempted and even resent being hidebound and shackled to God's law. You hear it regularly on the Radio and T.V. that Christian values are no longer relevant. Remember, God gave the earth to man for his use and for his benefit. And, because He knew man's weaknesses, He imposed the law of sharing so that all without exception could enjoy the fruits of the earth. Hence, it is God's holy will, and, therefore, all should be ready and willing to share their bread with the less fortunate. What has any one of us that we have not received? It follows, if one is blessed with plenty that one should not only thank God, but should be happy to help the needy. Indeed, our tax system does relieve us of many of our duties, but it never frees us from helping where it is necessary.

I was a wee bit puzzled about the second reading till I realised Paul was talking about the driving force that moved the good lady to action in the first reading. He compares man's baptismal experience to the Easter Mystery. He visualises us as morally dead, and sees our emersion in the waters of Baptism as akin to Christ's burial. Then, like Christ and with His help, he watches us rise from our watery grave to the new life in Christ. He is saying, we now share in Christ's life, so we must live as befits a child of God. Our

brother Jesus never turned anyone away from His door. He was always going about helping people and doing good. If we are to be like Him and fulfil our role, our values must be His values, our outlook must be His outlook, and our judgements must be in accord with the new life to which we have been called.

PRACTICAL CHRISTIANITY

Vatican II did focus attention on practical Christianity. And, of course, we ought to practice what we preach. I am not saying our good works are not prayers, but I am saying, if we hope to sustain our good works and make them more effective, we must keep the flame of love alive through our prayers. It is easy to get so caught up in works, and neglect our prayer line. Man's body and soul are one: prayers and good works are one. Jesus in reference to lip service said: "why! even the pagans do as much." So, apart from the necessity and value of prayer, it will give a soul, add flavour and make works more effective.

Don't tell me you are unable to pray. Have you ever watched the joy on a mother's face when her wee babe gurgles and smiles? Or, have you seen a father's face light up when his child utters his first "da-da"? When there's trouble a young child will run to his father for protection! If you are rusty about talking to God your Father, take a leaf from the young child's book, and go confidently to God for help. If a human father, who only reflects God's goodness, is able to show such love, no son of God should hesitate about running to his Heavenly Father.

The Gospel spells out for us the consequences of being a disciple of the Lord. He is expected not only to give faithful service, but he is also obliged to share his blessing with others. The emphasis is again on hospitality, and as I have already drawn your attention to the Lord's wishes in this matter, it only remains for me to say; God has chosen you to serve Him. He expects you to help and encourage others to share and to promote God's cause. Hence, let your life as well as your words and your works proclaim Christ's presence.

Major Activities Planned Ahead For Autumn And Winter

The Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce and Industry Ltd., under the active presidency of Mr. Paddy Gordon, is planning its Winter programme. Meanwhile, sub-committee groups are progressing the day-to-day activities of this, the newest Chamber in Ireland.

A seminar by C.T.T. on the European Business Information Centre (EBIC) will be run in Dungarvan which will introduce small businesses to a computer system which will put Dungarvan in touch with a network of services and industries in Europe.

1991 will see an entry in the SE Business Directory by the Dungarvan Chamber.

The topical subject of Tax Self-Assessment will be of interest to a large section of the business community when it is organised in October.

Meanwhile Dungarvan will host the Regional meeting of the South Eastern Chambers of Commerce sometime in September. This will be an important evening in the Calendar of the local Chamber. A large attendance is expected at this historical event.

Window boxes in Dungarvan town centre mark the first visible signs of the efforts of the Tourism/Town Development sub-committee to make Dungarvan a more attractive location for the tourist. A range of other projects are currently being

progressed by this, the largest sub-committee.

CASTLE RESTORATION

The Castle Restoration Committee have initiated the project to assist with returning the ruin of the historic monument to a central tourist feature in the town. The Committee will work carefully with all relevant bodies to achieve this objective. This project has special significance to the Chamber whose logo graphically represents this important local feature.

The Marine Development Group are currently reviewing a range of projects both major and minor which aim to restore the port of Dungarvan to a vibrant waterway.

The Chamber group of directors have also recently made a very wise investment in the South-East gateway to the U.K., the Waterford Regional Airport.

Many other events and projects are planned by this fast moving Chamber. Official details are to be released this Autumn.

Dail Question About Secretarial Staff For Secondary Schools

In a question raised by him in the Dail, Deputy Brian O'Shea asked the Minister for Education the plans she had to ensure the smooth running of secondary schools following the convention decision of the Association of Secondary Teachers in Ireland (ASTI) to direct their members not to carry out the duties which would be performed by secretarial and ancillary staff where such staff is not provided.

In reply, the Minister, Mrs. O'Rourke stated: Secondary schools are privately owned and managed. The provision of secretarial and other services are matters to be arranged by the authorities of individual schools. Per Capita grants are paid to secondary schools in the free post-primary education scheme towards the general running

costs of the schools. I am pleased to say that I was able to increase the rate of per capita grants by £10 with effect from 1st January 1990. In addition, a number of secondary schools employ secretaries under a scheme operated by my Department for the provision of secretarial assistance in primary and secondary schools.

PITCH AND PUTT COMMITTEE

Allegations Of Political Bias In Selection Denied

Cllr. Tony Wright (W.P.) referring to the selection of a committee to run the new Pitch and Putt Course at the June monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council said that from what he had learned the people selected had been political appointees. "I was very disappointed in the manner in which the committee was set up," said Cllr. Wright, "as I understood from the Co. Manager at our last meeting that we would have a major input into the selection. It was only when I saw it reported in the local paper that I learned that the committee had been appointed."

Cllr. Nuala Ryan said that it was only when she attended the official opening of the course that she learned that the Committee to run it had been appointed. "I think," she said "that as members of the Council we should at least have been informed of this beforehand."

Cllr. Paddy Power, Chairman, said that it was he who had picked the members of the committee. He said he had been asked to select ten people from various areas of the town and Abbeyside and he had done this. "I do not know what the politics of any of those selected are," he said, adding that there would probably be no objection if the number was to be increased.

"All I can say is that the project has proved a great success and since the course was opened we can't supply enough clubs to meet the demand and the committee is working well," said Cllr. Power.

Cllr. Wright then asked why the members of the Council were not consulted by the Chairman in the selection of the committee. "I think we were entitled to a say in that," said Cllr. Wright.

Cllr. M. O'Riordan said that he had no fault to find with the procedure and he complimented the Chairman, on picking a first-class committee."

Cllr. A. Hallahan said that apart from the refer-

ence to politics, the fact was that he did not know that a committee had been picked until he heard about it at the official opening. "I feel we should have been informed about this beforehand," said

Cllr. Hallahan.

Cllr. Power accepting blame for not informing members beforehand apologised for the slip up and said that it all was done very quickly in the end and that was the only reason.

He again denied that there were any political motives in the choices he had made. "They are all people who have previously been involved in the game or in community affairs," he said.

Elizabethan Madrigal Singers To Perform In Lismore

The Elizabethan Madrigal Singers from the University of Wales will perform at a Concert in St. Carthage's Cathedral, Lismore, on this Thursday, June 28, commencing at 8 p.m.

The Elizabethan Madrigal Singers is a small chamber choir of students from the University College of Wales, Aberystwyth.

It was formed over 35 years ago with the aim of promoting the performance of sacred and secular music from the Renaissance. In recent years, the repertoire has grown to encompass works from the medieval and baroque periods, as well as from the present day.

The choir has toured Europe, America, Russia and Canada, and, in addition to fulfilling numerous concerts in Wales, has had frequent broadcasts on radio and television. Their last visit to Lismore was in 1985 where they were warmly received.

This year's concert will include a mixture of music such as Josquin's Missa Pange Lingua, also works by Gabrieli, Byrd and

Palestrina and Madrigals by a number of English composers including Weelkes, Morley and Wilbye.

WATERFORD REGIONAL AIRPORT

Resounding Success Of Share Issue

Speaking at a Press Conference on Tuesday of last week at which Mr. Tom Sheridan, Chairman announced that a grand total of £1.15 million had been subscribed for the development of Waterford Regional Airport under the public share subscription launched just six weeks previously Deputy Brian O'Shea, Chairman, South Eastern Airport Co. Ltd., congratulated the Directors of Waterford Regional Airport plc. and the various Fund-Raising Committees on the resounding success of the Share Subscription Offer.

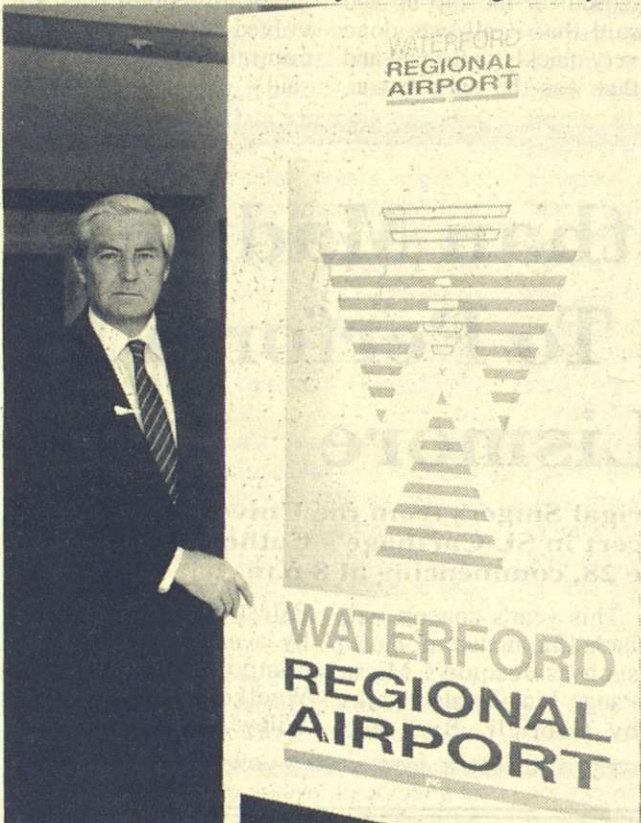
It further provides the unanswerable case to Government for the provision of the funding for the new access road to the airport. The £1.5m subscribed, together with a county and city united will win the day.

DEASY REFUTES FAHEY'S "POLITICAL DEAL" CLAIM

Coming up to twelve months ago, following the June General Election and the deal made by Mr. Haughey and Fianna Fail with the P.D. Party of Mr. O'Malley in order to remain in power, Waterford Deputy Jackie Fahey kicked over the traces and resigned from the Fianna Fail Parliamentary Party in protest.

In the months that followed there was much "to-ing and fro-ing" as moves were made to woo Deputy Fahey back to the fold and eventually it happened. The public announcement that Mr. Fahey had agreed to again accept the Party Whip was accompanied by claims, repeated on several occasions since, that he had won concessions from the Minister for Health in regard to an increase in the staffing numbers at Dungarvan hospital and in progressing the development of the proposed new geriatric hospital in Dungarvan and the new Regional Hospital at Ardkeen. But while Deputy Fahey claimed that these concessions had been gained by him, Health Minister Dr. O'Hanlon never said so in so many words.

Now Mr. Fahey's claims of 1989 have come under attack from his Dail colleague and near neighbour in Dungarvan, Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy. During the past week Deputy Deasy issued a statement, backed up by official correspondence, in which he refutes the claims of Deputy Fahey.

"Recently," states Mr. Deasy, "it was claimed in a national newspaper that a political stroke was pulled by a certain Waterford Dail Deputy which resulted in a considerable increase in nursing staff in the Dungarvan Hospitals. Correspondence from the Ceann Comhairle (of Dail Eireann) and the CEO of the South Eastern Health Board, Mr. Peter McQuillan, would clearly indicate that the so-called political strokes have not materialised."

A letter from the Ceann Comhairle, Mr. Sean Treacy, under date June 5, 1990 expressed regrets to Deputy Deasy for disallowing a question addressed to the Minister for Health asking if he misled Dail Eireann earlier this year when he stated that no deal had been done with Deputy Fahey in relation to hospitals in Waterford in return for his support in Dail Eireann. Mr.

Treacy gave as the reason for disallowing the question that it "contains argument."

On June 14 last, the Health Board CEO, Mr. McQuillan in the course of a letter informed Deputy Deasy that the nursing complement in St. Joseph's (Co. Home) Hospital, Dungarvan in 1980 was 1 Matron and 19 staff nurses while the complement in 1990 is 1 Matron, 1 Assistant Matron and 25 staff nurses. The number of staff nurses was increased by 6 between 1982 and 1985 by substituting nursing posts for domestic staff posts. The Assistant Matron post was filled in 1983 by substituting this post for a non-nursing post.

The letter then states: "No permanent nursing posts were filled in this hospital in the last year. At present there are 2 vacancies which are being filled by temporary staff."

In regard to St. Vincent's (District) Hospital, Mr. McQuillan's letter gave the staff complement in 1980 as 1 Matron and 11 staff nurses while the comparable figure for 1990 was 1 Matron and 6 staff nurses and it gave the explanation "the Maternity Unit at this hospital closed in 1983 with a loss of 4 nursing posts; 1 nurse took early retirement in 1987 and was not replaced."

Finally, on June 21 last, the Health Board CEO wrote to Deputy Deasy in reply to a query to state that the Health Board "have had no information from the Department of Health regarding proposals for a new Geriatric Hospital at Dungarvan."

This correspondence would certainly see to indicate that the "deals" claimed to have taken place at the time to win back Deputy Fahey's support in the Dail for the Government had no realism in fact and were just pipe-dreams.

TO SMOKE OR NOT TO SMOKE

It looks as if the law brought in at the beginning of last month banning

smoking in certain prescribed areas and public places is yet another law which will be noted more for being breached than being observed. The kernel of the problem, of course, centres on who is responsible for enforcing this law.

Already it has created controversy in the chambers of the County and Urban Councils in Dungarvan. A number of "smoking is prohibited" signs have been clearly displayed on the walls at Dungarvan Courthouse where County Council meetings are held and the message they conveyed was adhered to at the Council's first meeting in May after the coming into force of the 'No Smoking Act.' Not one of the most inveterate 'puffers' produced a cigarette in the Council Chamber from beginning to end although several made a bolt for the exit at the end for a few badly wanted pulls!

However at the June monthly meeting of the Council a couple of weeks ago, one Councillor, who incidentally is a member of the legal profession, lit up and soon had rings of smoke curling around his head. No one called him to order and no action was taken.

At the May monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council in the Town Hall, where no smoking notices were also displayed, a member questioned whether the Council Chamber there could be designated as a public place where smoking was prohibited. A smoker, he was challenging the decision declaring the Council Chamber a no smoking area. His challenge was referred to the Council's Law Adviser who has now informed the Council that the question hinged on whether the public had free access to the Council Chamber. However, this still leaves the matter very much up in the air.

We believe that it is senseless to enact such laws as the No Smoking Law when there is no recognised and freely available enforcement agency to see that it is adhered to and it merely brings the law in general into disrepute.

A DISAPPOINTING POUND

General reaction to the new £1 coin introduced for the first time last week is one of disappointment and dissatisfaction. The coin is a rather poor one and has automatically devalued the £1 that it represents.

The Shooting Of Dan McGrew

FRESH FISH — A GOOD CATCH FOR FAMILY MEALS

FROZEN, boil-in-the-bag fish portions are fine, if you're in a hurry, but there's nothing quite like the flavour of fresh fish. And what could be more convenient — all you have to do is cook it!

Fishmongers or the wet fish counter in supermarkets usually do all the preparation for you — no messy gutting and filleting for you to contend with.

But there are certain things you should be looking for ...

Fresh whole fish has shiny, moist skin, pink gills and bright eyes. To touch, it will feel soft but not springy and it will have a clean, pleasant smell — not fishy or overpowering.

Fish fillets or steaks should be neat and trim with milky, translucent flesh and no signs of dryness.

Smoked fish will have a fresh, smokey aroma and a glossy appearance.

Fish is very perishable and is best eaten on the day of purchase. However, it can be kept for up to 24 hours in the 'fridge, loosely wrapped in foil.

Try these delicious fish recipes:

Cheesy Cod

Ingredients:
4 cod steaks
75g (3oz) Cheddar cheese, grated
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 tablespoon milk
salt and pepper
parsley sprigs to garnish

Method:

Place the cod steaks on a greased grill pan and grill on one side for 4-5 minutes. Mix the remaining ingredients together with the salt and pepper to taste.

Turn the fish over and spread the uncooked side with the cheese mixture. Reduce the heat slightly and grill for about five minutes or until the fish is cooked



and topping golden and bubbling.

Garnish with parsley.
•Cook's tip: For a richer, cheesier flavour, try mature farmhouse Cheddar, or slimmers could use reduced fat hard cheese.

Serves 4.

Apricot Stuffed Trout

Ingredients:
125g (4oz) dried apricots, soaked overnight
125g (4oz) cooked long grain rice
1 green pepper, finely chopped
40oz (1 1/2oz) butter, melted
salt and pepper
pinch of thyme
pinch of ground nutmeg

Method:

First, prepare the stuffing. Drain the apricots, reserving the liquid. Chop the apricots and mix with the rice. Add the green pepper, butter, salt and pepper and pinches of thyme and nutmeg. Moisten with a little liquid reserved from the apricots.

Fill the fish with this stuffing. Butter and ovenproof dish and place the fish in it, season well with salt and pepper and pour over the wine.

Dot with butter, cover and poach in a pre-heated, moderate oven at 180C, 450F or Gas Mark 4 for 25-30 minutes.

Transfer to a heated serving dish and garnish with parsley sprigs.
Serves 6.

Plants that help control the weeds

BY THIS time of year you've probably had enough of weeds and the spray gun beckons despite the new green approach to gardening.

Obviously, you have to keep on top of the weeds or they quickly undo your good work but, rather than use chemicals, you can sometimes get by without.

A sharp hoe is invaluable, making light work by cutting through the weeds after they poke through.

You can also make the weeds keep their heads down in the first place by using a mulch of organic material such as garden compost, broken bark fibre or peat — although over-exploitation of peat is now becoming a worry.

Warmer

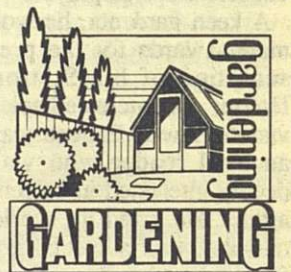
Mulch offers the further bonus of keeping moisture in the soil during the warmer and drier weather, but there is another and very-green method of weed control that can work well in certain areas of the garden — planting ground cover plants.

Many of these will cover so densely that they starve weeds of light and will often cover an eyesore as well as provide a good display.

Prepare the ground first and weed thoroughly so that they can't get established before the ground huggers.

A good all-rounder for shady areas is Hypericum or Rose of Sharon, which comes in bushy and ground-covering forms and will quickly colonise an open space to provide lots of attractive yellow flowers.

Another tough customer is Ivy, which can also cloak a crumbly wall or other eye-



sore.

It may be a surprise to learn that a variety of Honeysuckle, Lonicera Pileata, is also an effective ground coverer in shady spots.

On soils other than chalk, the evergreen Pachysandra is a durable option and the variegated type is particularly attractive.

If it's a sunny spot then lavenders and heathers are a fragrant and attractive option, Santolina (Lavender Cotton) a colourful eye-catcher, and Genista Hispanica (Spanish Gorse) a tough and impenetrable ground coverer.

Flourish

But one reason why a site might need cover is that it is too damp to grow anything but weeds, which leaves a tough job finding something that will flourish as well as keep the weeds away.

A possible answer is Prostrate Willow or a healthy clump of ferns, which will soon spread.

If the site is shady and dry then this too can create problems but you could try an Ornamental Bramble, Ivy or the ever-popular Mahonia with its fragrant yellow flowers. But even these need watering if you do choose such a site for them.

All these varieties are best planted during winter but now is the time you would appreciate them so make a note now for later on.

Incidentally there were special celebrations in the Brideside town of Tallow as it was there that Charlie McCarthy, father of the Ireland captain, Mick McCarthy, was born and lived in the old home in Chapel Street before he emigrated to Barnsley in Yorkshire in 1946. He married and settled down there and Mick was born there, one of a family of four, 3 boys and a girl.

Living still in Tallow in West Street is Mick's uncle, Tommy McCarthy, with his wife Mary and son Desmond and they were swamped with the congratulations of well-wishing neighbours in the jubiliations that followed our great victory on Monday night. The celebrations went on everywhere into

the early hours!

And before we leave the subject, we must add our small voice to the great accord which has marked out the thousands of Irish supporters wherever they have gone as the greatest in the world. The Ireland Soccer Squad led by Mick Mc-

Carthy and coached by Big Jack Charlton are undoubtedly the greatest ambassadors the country has had but they are closely followed by our super loyal travelling supporters.

Congratulations to all — you have done Ireland proud.

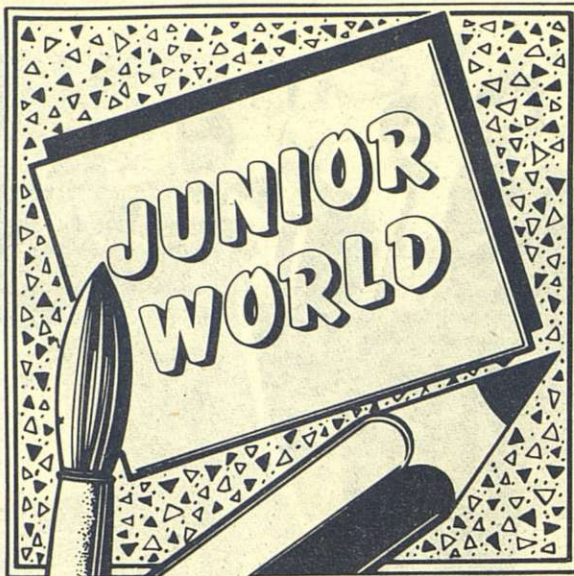

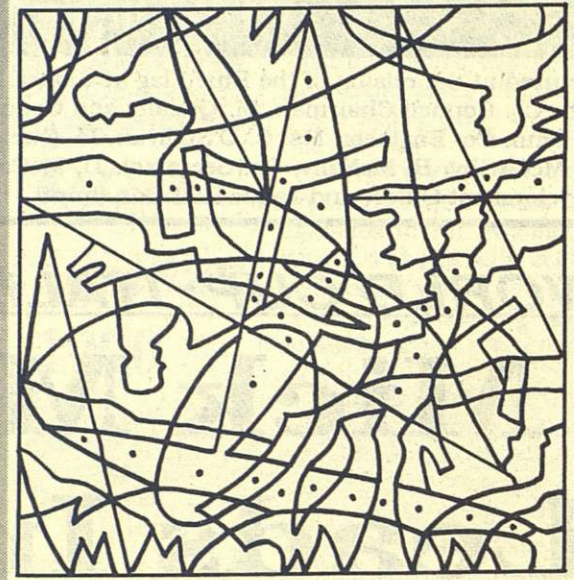

Why the Penny Black is not the rarest stamp

ANY young stamp collectors among you will probably know that the world's first postage stamp was called the Penny Black.

But people are often surprised to find that the Penny Black is far from being one of the world's rarest stamps.

Letters had been sent by post since the days of the Egyptians, and pigeon-post was popular among the Greeks and Romans. (To make sure their message arrived safely they usually sent a second pigeon with a separate copy of the same letter).

The Penny Black was introduced in England in 1840. Before then it was common for people to pay in advance for the delivery of letters, with a mark made on the letter as a kind of receipt. But the Penny Black marked the first time a regular pre-paid price was accepted.

Medallion

The idea of a sticky stamp was suggested by Charles Knight and the design — the head of Queen Victoria — was taken from a medallion. These first stamps were printed in sheets of 240 and, unlike today, they were not perforated. This meant that, instead of being able

to tear the individual stamps apart, the Post Office clerks had to cut them out.

And as there was no gum on the back each stamp had to be stuck down with glue.

Although the Penny Black was in use for only 11 months, 68 million were printed and 6 million have survived, so they are not as rare as might be expected.

Discovered

The rarest stamp in the world was issued, in fact, 16 years later. This was the British Guiana one cent stamp, which was discovered in 1873 by a schoolboy who sold it for the equivalent of 30p. It sold for more than £7,000 in 1922 and must be worth a small fortune now.

There are so many stamps in circulation and available today that collectors often specialise in certain areas. Some for example, collect the stamps of just one country; others collect stamps featuring a particular topic, perhaps birds or animals.

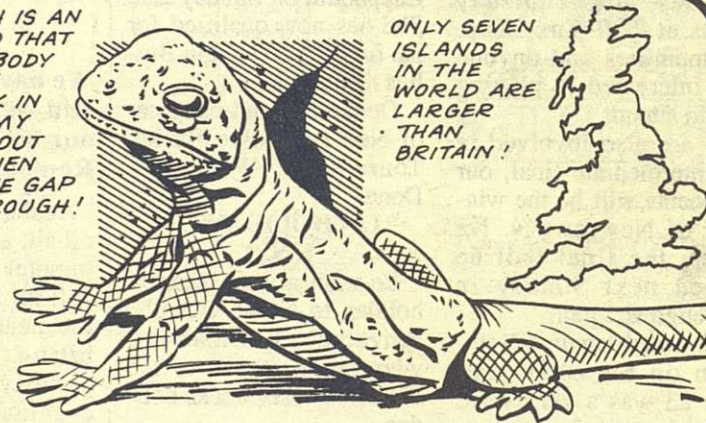
But many make a point of looking for stamps that have been misprinted, perhaps upside down or with the perforation missing — just like the original Penny Blacks.

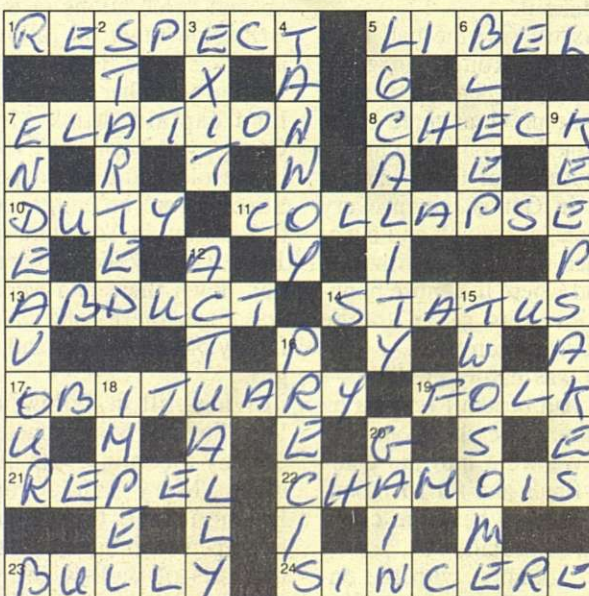

The death took place on Thursday of last week of Padraig O Fiannusa, Shanbally, Cappoquin. A native Irish speaker he taught Irish and English at Cappoquin Vocational School for many years. His love of the language extended far beyond his chosen profession. An active member of Conradh Na Gaeilge he spent countless evenings teaching not alone the language but Irish music and dance as well.

He was largely responsible for the organisation of Cappoquin's Drama Festival into which was usually incorporated Feis Na Deise. His great love of Irish poetry and poets, especially those from the Deise such as, Padraig O Miledha, Donnacha Ruadh Mac Na Mara and local poet Padraig Denn, in whose memory a plaque was erected in Cappoquin Churchyard, a work carried out through the dedication and persistence of Padraig. He will probably be best remembered for his historical work "Tuath Chois Moire - Cois Bride" which was published in 1980. This book sets out mainly to give the meanings of the place names in the far West of County Waterford as well as many other historical facts.

Those of us who had the honour of knowing him are enriched by the experience. To his widow, sons and daughters sincere sympathy is extended.

This Week Teagasc Co. Waterford Says

KEEP MILK PRODUCTION COSTS DOWN

In a quota situation, dairy farmers of all sizes should be aiming to reduce costs of production per gallon of milk in order to maintain or increase farm profits. Examination of data from dairy farmers shows that there is considerable scope for savings in meal costs on most farms. With an improvement in grassland management at little or no extra cost, meal feed could be reduced to as low as three to four cwt. per cow on many dairy farms. On farms with 40 to 50 cows, income could be improved by £1,000 to £2,000 by this means.

Feeding meals to cows at grass may be necessary in early Spring after turnout due to poor grass growth, in a mid-summer drought or from September onwards due to lower grass growth rates. However, research carried out by Teagasc at Moorepark shows that milk production responses to

concentrates at pasture have generally been poor and uneconomical.

In all the experiments, the main reason for the poor response was the availability of good quality, leafy pasture throughout the grazing season. Where grass is scarce or where digestibility is low the response to meal feeding is much greater. The aim should then be to keep grass leafy throughout the grazing season through proper nitrogen application and grazing and topping to about 2.5 to 3 inches. The best way to provide for emergency grass scarcity is to close up some paddocks which can be used for silage or strip grazed using the electric fence. Where practical, it is better to take later cuts of silage from some grazing paddocks.

ONCE CALVED HEIFER SCHEME

Last year saw the once-calved heifer system of beef production successfully established under the Teagasc/Anglo Irish Beef Processors Programme. Under this Programme, A.I.B.P. guarantees in writing to pay the same price for heifers that have had a calf as for maiden heifers of comparable quality. The Once Calved Heifer is no longer downgraded to cow price. This has increased the value of such heifers by about £80 per head. In addition to that there is the value of the calf and such heifers may also be eligible for the suckler cow subsidy worth about £52 this year.

There are of course additional costs, but at the end of the day a Once Calved Heifer System leaves a margin of at least £100 more per heifer than maiden heifer beef systems.

Basically it involves putting the heifer in calf

and suckling the calf on the heifer for about 4 or 5 days after birth, or even longer if circumstances require it. The heifer is then fattened.

The price guarantee will operate again next year i.e. for the six months of the year. Heifers that calve from the Autumn up to about Mid April should be ready to catch the guaranteed price.

This system is suitable to a wide range of dairy and drystock farmers in the county. Your Teagasc adviser will discuss the system with you.

QUALITY MILK FOR PROCESSING

Milk-fat damage which manifests itself as frothing and buttering in the milk, as well as rancid flavour, is a serious problem, not only for the farmer but also for the processor. While many factors, including the cow, the milking procedure, milking machine and bulk tank are all important, the milking machine is usually the single most important

cause of the problem. It is most important that your milking machine conforms with the Teagasc guidelines for milking machines.

Good milking machine layout, installation and maintenance are not only important for milking efficiency, mastitis control and ease of cleaning, to meet the ever increasing quality standards, they are also the keys to the elimination of milk frothing, buttering and rancidity.

CEREALS

Most crops of Winter Oats are now past the stage where an economic response could be got from fungicide application. However, if Crown Rust is a problem, then immediate action is essential to get effective control.

Crops of Spring Barley should be thoroughly examined and if disease is present or anticipated, a final fungicide should now be applied.

This was the first time in Ireland that this course was run outside the Dental Hospitals in Cork and Dublin. This was mainly due to local dentist Donal Tully who is an examiner for the Liverpool based course. He enlisted the co-operation of the Regional College and a panel of other dentists to launch this successful venture.

At the short presentation ceremony the graduates were addressed by Dr. Barry Harrington from the Dental Hospital in Dublin. The subject was Cross Infection with emphasis on the treatment of Aids patients. Dr. Harrington has wide experience in this area and his sharing this with all present was a very emotional and moving experience.

WEEK-END CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES

Complete Programme Devoted To Hurling

With the Munster championship in Under-21 and minor due to be played on the following week, the fixtures makers were set some problems in having to avoid making arrangements for matches where intercounty players were engaged because of the bye-law allowing six days free before such games. This explains why, for the first time ever, a total of three senior hurling championship matches are fixed for a Friday evening.

Of course there is a full programme of games for the other days as well and some of the more attractive ones will be

played on Saturday and Sunday.

On Friday, the tie between Portlawn and champions Roanmore will be the one that will arouse most interest as it will determine which of these goes into the K/O stages of the championship as both are still unbeaten.

PORTLAW v. ROANMORE

Portlawn's two decisive wins over Clonea and Lismore had done wonders for the spirit of this club and they are confident now that they are good enough to reverse the result of their last meeting with Roanmore, who scored a very narrow one point win against them (1-13 to 2-9) when they last met and this was in the 1988 championship. Roanmore had it easy against Cappoquin before having to fight hard against Dunhill (2-7 to 3-3) and then beat Tallow convincingly by 1-14 to 2-4.

For both clubs it will be their stiffest task to date and I see it as a match that could go either way. In their match with Tallow here two weeks ago, the champions looked to be back at their best and if repeating this form, they could just about scrape through.

TALLOW v. LISMORE

This should be a real Western cracker and very few will want to miss the sparkling stuff that it is sure to produce at Cappoquin on Sunday. I know that at the moment, a deferment of the game is being sought as on both sides, minor players are involved and such a decision will help Lismore to a greater extent as Seamus Prendergast, who returned for their last game on Friday night last against Clonea, is again injured and they also had a player sent off in that game.

Tallow at the moment have six points from four games, they having suffered only one defeat while Lismore have four points from their three games, they too, having been beaten once. A win for Tallow would almost guarantee them a place in the K.O. stages, while a Lismore win

would advance their prospects, but perhaps without the same guarantee.

With Roanmore and Portlawn in the same group and only three to qualify, this is a vital match for both as each team has a tough assignment in their later games with Lismore having to play Roanmore and Tallow meeting Portlawn. If the game goes ahead, Tallow may just about take the points against their under-strength rivals.

BALLYDUFF v. DUNGARVAN

With serious involvement in the senior football championship, Dungarvan's preparation for the hurling championship has been badly interrupted, but they will nevertheless make things very difficult for Ballyduff when they clash at Cappoquin on Friday evening.

When the teams met in the second round last year a 6-8 to 1-7 scoreline in favour of Ballyduff told the story of the winners dominance in that game, but here the losers were under-strength so the gap was, to some extent, deceptive.

On this occasion Dungarvan will be without Eddie Burke who is in the U.S.A., but as we saw on Saturday night, they are tremendously fit and with their hurling skill, they could be a surprise packet.

Ballyduff are the favourites and following their splendid 3-11 to 1-11 win over Ballygunner, they are certainly entitled to support. I don't believe that they will be beaten here, but as I have written, it is not going to be easy.

MOUNT SION v. FOURMILEWATER

Lemybrien venue will have one of its rare senior hurling championship games on Friday next when Mount Sion and Fourmilewater clash here.

If the result does not move Mount Sion up on the league/championship table it will come as the shock of the year.

Fourmilewater were very worthy intermediate champions last year, but they, as well as all others, will agree that there is a stan-

dard gap between them and teams of the calibre of Mount Sion. The famed Monastery club have seen better times and better days, but here they certainly look a 'cut above' their opponents.

CAPPOQUIN v. DUNHILL

No one will give either of these two clubs the remotest chance of being involved in the closing stages, but it is a game that could be of great importance to both since it could be the game which will decide who will represent their group in the relegation game at the finish.

On the basis of two good contests, against Roanmore and Tallow, Dunhill will be favourites and should win.

Cappoquin may see this as their last chance of winning a game in the current championship and make a mighty effort to upset our prediction, but it will take a great improvement on current form if this is to happen.

OTHER GAMES

It will surprise few people if the excitement of some of the lower grade games in hurling over the week-end, surpass a number of the senior games.

COLLIGAN v.

ST. SAVIOURS

This attractive intermediate hurling tie is scheduled for Fraher Field on Friday. Colligan lost their first game to Erin's own and Saviours were surprisingly beaten by Tramore. This makes the two points valuable for the winners here and this should be Colligan.

SHAMROCKS

v.

STRADBALLY

Stradbally had a single point win over Mollerans in the game before Shamrocks and Mollerans played an exciting draw at Fraher Field. Shamrocks have since beaten Abbeyside and may have slightly the better chance of getting the two points in this one.

ST. MARY'S v. TRAMORE

The Eastern team will be hot favourites to get a further two points in this one and having beaten Saviours it will be a surprise if the Touraneena team can 'up' their form sufficiently to upset their hopes.

JUNIOR GAMES

Clashmore v. Kilgobinet will be played at Cappoquin on Sunday evening and the general feeling is that Clashmore will win.

Ardmore and Ballinameela will be a close game and in this, Ardmore who won the 'B' county championship last year, will be set their biggest test to-date. Ballinameela have lost a couple of players since the game against An Rinn and this will pose a problem, but they should still get by here.

An Rinn v. Geraldines is another junior hurling tie that will attract its full quota of support, even though An Rinn will be very strongly fancied to win.

In the junior 'B' stakes, Kilrossanty are tipped to beat Faha and Tourin should get the points against Eire Og.

worried side, but at the halfway stage they were confident enough.

The Stradbally/Dungarvan tie was the best contest of the week-end. It was a tough game to win and a disappointing one to lose. Everyone except Stradbally would have been pleased with a draw.

Saviours were better able to take their chances and got a couple of goals that were killer-blows in the first half, but a great fight back by Ballinacourty was no use and now their prospects of qualifying are very poor.

Both matches at Walsh Park were unexciting, even though Tramore startled the favourites Gaultier when they fought back to within four points, they having trailed by eight points during the early part of the second half.

Dunhill joined Stradbally at the top of the table when they accounted for point-less Butlerstown.

Activity on the intermediate football front saw Af-fane and Shamrocks qualify for the divisional semi-final and Ardmore with a win against Ballyduff will also qualify.

County Board Meeting

Eamon Murphy, Chairman presided at last week's meeting of the County Board at Dungarvan. The meeting dealt with committee reports, appointment of county selectors and a county football coach as well as an amount of routine business.

SELECTORS

When the appointment of county hurling selectors was being discussed the chairman informed the meeting that Coisde Gnotha were recommending that the appointments be made in the same way in which the county football selectors were appointed. This meant that the appointment be left over to the Coisde Gnotha. Some delegates did not see 'eye-to-eye' with this method as they felt that all members of the County Board should have a say in these appointments. The chairman said he saw nothing wrong with delegates or clubs advising members of an Coisde Gnotha about their preferences. It was finally agreed that the executive committee would do the job and present their recommendations to the July meeting of the County Board for ratification. The Coisde Gnotha will meet on Monday next to deal with this matter.

Team Manager, Tony Mansfield and Ollie Wilkinson have both retired, while Phil Fanning is understood to have left his name go forward again.

A letter to the Board from Ollie Wilkinson expressed his thanks to the Board, the players, co-selectors and particularly to the thousands of Waterford supporters for their support and help during his four years on the committee. He said it had been a great honour for him to have served the county in this way.

A County football selection committee is also to be appointed and the names of those selected will be recommended to the July meeting also. At the previous meeting it had been decided to defer the selection of this committee because of the pending All-Ireland 'B' Championship, but because this will not now be played until September/October, it was decided to appoint a Committee. Coisde

na Peil were given responsibility for this and the chairman of that body, P. J. Coleman, told the meeting that Coisde Gnotha had given approval for an exercise that would provide all clubs in the county with an opportunity of having their input into the selection process.

COUNTY COACH

Nioclas Mac Craith, on behalf of An Rinn Club moved the motion to have a County Coach appointed for all the grades. Having listed his reasons why his club considered such an appointment to be necessary, he said it was not intended that the present structure of the selection committee would be interfered with.

After a short discussion the motion was agreed unanimously. Coisde na Peil were asked to discuss the matter at their next meeting.

REPORTS

All the selection committees submitted reports. The

senior hurling committee submitted their final one in which they gave a summary of county activity during their term and they thanked everyone who had helped and supported them throughout the four years. A lengthy report from the junior hurling selection committee gave an outline of the problems that had to be surmounted in getting their charges ready for the match against Cork. They expressed disappointment that quite a number of eligible players did not make themselves available.

Having listened to the report, it was the clear feeling of the meeting that this grade should be discontinued.

The minor hurling report stated that good progress was being made with the team who are due to play Cork in a couple of weeks. Information about their win against Kerry was given in the under 21 hurling report. This was a verbal report by James Tobin who told about the hardships that had to be endured in taking a team on such a long wearisome journey to play a game on a Saturday. He said that the team had played much better than the final scoreline suggested and they were now preparing to play Tipperary in Thurles on July 5.

Tom Cunningham said if they wished to discontinue our home and away arrangement with Kerry we were free to do so now.

The senior football report stated that the panel had played a match against Kilrossanty and were due to play another in an effort to keep the players in tune for the special 'B' Championship.

The chairman informed the meeting that the minor football selection committee had submitted a very comprehensive seven page report, but since this was to hand only a short time before the meeting, it would not be discussed until the July meeting.

LETTER FROM CLARE

Noel Walsh, Clare Senior Football Committee, wrote thanking the Board for the reception and welcome they received on their visit here for the senior and junior championships. He complimented the footballers on the tremendous commitment shown in the game and expressed the opinion that Waterford, if they maintained this commitment and eagerness for the game, would do well in the years ahead.

**Co. Council To Make
Submission On Local
Government Reforms**

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

Chairman, Cllr. M. Queally and Vice-Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, Cllr. Willie McDonnell was moved to the Chair and at the outset stated that as this was a very important day for Ireland (he was obviously anticipating the great result from Genoa) he proposed that the proceedings terminate at 3.15 p.m. to allow everyone concerned to watch the match. This was unanimously agreed.

Opening the discussion the Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said that at present they were working under legislation that was almost 100 years old and totally inappropriate for local authorities in modern times. But, he said that they could not talk about local government reform without talking about money to fund it properly. The rule books they had to adhere to where financial matters were concerned were written 46 years ago and were now completely out of date, he added.

In his view local government reform should be concerned with raising the efficiency of organisation, and strengthening local democracy. "I see local government as government at sub-national level and we must have devolution of authority and power from the centre because we are now tied down with out-of-date red tape," said the Manager.

MEMBER'S VIEWS

Cllr. P. Kenneally said that this reform move by the Government was aimed to further reduce the status of Co. Council's, especially by the Minister of the Environment (Mr. P. Flynn) who had no time for public local representatives.

Cllr. J. Fahey T.D., said that the problem was a big one and someone had to deal with it. He was convinced that Councils should have a certain amount of finance of their own to deal with local projects so as not to be totally dependent on central funds.

Cllr. G. O'Halloran said that as things stood they had neither power nor money. "We should have full power to decide what way money is to be spent at local level," he said.

Cllr. C. O Riain said that down through the years with the abolition of so many local bodies, Co. Council's had now become mere rubber stamps. "It's better that the Councils should be abolished altogether than to have to act as we have to do at present," he said.

Finally at the suggestion of the Chairman it was unanimously agreed that the Council's official would prepare a draft submission based on the points raised and that this be submitted for approval to a further meeting of the Council before July 31.
