WATERFORD CO. COUNCIL

Cllr. Kyne (Lab.) To Serve Second Term As Chairman

The "ifs" and "butts" surrounding the outcome of the annual meeting of Waterford Co. Council at which the Chairman for the ensuing year is elected were all removed when the Council came together in Dungarvan last Monday and at a meeting that lasted not much longer than 15 minutes came up with a clear-cut decision.

At the outset, the outgoing Chairman, Cllr. Michael Queally (F.G.) thanked all the members of the Council as well as the Co. Manager and the Officials for all the co-operation he had received during his term of office in a year which was, as far as he was concerned, remarkable mainly "as the year of the big wind." It was otherwise a disappointing year due

principally to the fact that so much of the Council powers had now been whittled away. He was critical of the performance of those in the higher up positions and said that it appeared to him that any of them did not appear to be too worried about the performances at Council level. Referring to the huge turn-out in Dublin to welcome home the Ireland

soccer squad, Cllr. Queally said that you would hardly see 50 people out to welcome any of their politi-

cians and that was a consequence of the childish performance that went on at the top.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

ARE YOU GETTING READY?

The first reading is from the Prophecy of Zechariah. He was one of the minor prophets. He is not the Zechariah of whom mention was made on the feast of John the Baptist, but, being from the priestly family of Aaron, they'd both, as would the other two Zechariahs mentioned in the Old Testament, have been descendants from the great priestly family to whom King David had entrusted the priestly ministrations at the Temple. Zechariah in his prophecy joins in the song, the Messiah is coming, and he urges his listeners to make the way ready for His arrival. He told them that the Messiah would not signal His arrival with the blowing of trumpets, but would then proclaim His kingdom with a hitherto unknown gentleness. He goes on to add that His role will have no limits, and His subjects will enjoy an unheard of peace.

The message for his hearers was and for us is, there must be no thoughts of rebellion in your hearts, because you are nothing and can do nothing without God's help. Hence, there can be no room for pride in the life of His followers. Zechariah is also saying, whilst the teachings of God ought to be held and proclaimed firmly, they should be measured out with a fragrance of gentleness. Christ's aim is to help, and not to hurt. He'd always leave the gate open! A point, and a most important one, that emerges from what I have written is, we are totally dependent on God for help in all we say or do, but that in no way means that salvation is available to us without any effort on our part. Remember, God will force no one into Heaven. He has endowed man with free will, and that He will respect. So, it is up to each individual to use God's help or to reject it. If one deliberately refuses to co-operate with God that one will be left to his own devices. Of course, if such a one showed any sign of sorrow, God would be there to encourage, to help and to welcome that one back.

The Gospel from John, which was read on the feast of the Sacred Heart, actually explains what St. Paul is urging in the second reading. John tells us that because God loves us, we should love one another, and, as long as we do, we can feel assured that we are living in Him, and He in us. Paul does imply that no amount of worldly wisdom would give us a right to share in the life of the Spirit. It is a gift from God, which we receive at Baptism. This new situation or new life, in which we find ourselves, imposes certain duties upon us. Having been liberated and freed from the clutches of sin, the way to grow in the new life is now wide open to us. So, it is perhaps easy to understand how St. Paul envisages us as sharing in Christ's passion and death, and then reaping the fruits of Christ's victory over sin and death. In short, Paul, like Zechariah, is urging us to be faithful to the demands of our new life, and thereby get ourselves ready to meet our God.

In the Gospel, Jesus, whilst praying to His Father, recalls the loving relationship existing between them, and the total knowledge each has of the other. This relationship is so far above and beyond the scope and the reach of man that he could never on his own

hope to participate in it. As Jesus said, "No one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son, and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal Him." We might ask, what kind of people are chosen to enjoy this great privilege? The Gospel provides the answer by telling us the sort of people to whom the Lord will reveal Himself. They'll be people who sat at the feet of Christ and learned to dispense His love with gentleness and consideration. They'll be so filled with love for God that they'll never forget to honour the source of their strength.

THE MASTER'S SCHOOL

It is almost like going back to the Master's school to learn how to behave and to act like Him. There they'll sit at the Lord's table and be nourished with the Body of Christ. The soul, filled and enlivened with the new life in Christ, will respond like Christ in all circumstances. This is what the Baptist meant when he said: "He must increase, and I must decrease." As Paul said: "I live now not I, but Christ liveth in me." That is what the Eucharist does to us. Hence, we must heed the Lord's warning: "Unless you eat my flesh, and drink my blood, you will not have life in you." Jesus is saying, unless we endeavour to live His life, and use the means He has provided, we'll be unable to sustain the new life.

You will have noticed from the various readings since Christmas that the Lord, through His prophets, was tireless in reminding His people of their duties to God. And, I'm sure you must be wondering at the almost total disregard of His message. The fact is, the people wanted their heaven on earth! However, in our days, because of the added light and help available, there's little or no excuse to ignore the Lord's message. Sadly, it is again the old story of the Israelites in the desert. People have grown tired of eating manna. They get weary of waiting for the promised land, and seek comfort in building a "golden calf."

I am not saying life is easy, but I am saying that anyone, who tries to live without God, is erecting an eternal prison for oneself. Oh! he may indeed achieve his heart's delight here, but, do not be fooled, because the heaven he gained will die with him. Whereas, the person, who like Jesus bears his cross, will find riches awaiting him in Heaven.

Carry Out That Threat And You'll Rue The Day

— Justice Tells Dungarvan Youth

A 19-years-old Dungarvan youth was involved in a series of dramatic incidents at Dungarvan Court last week and was lucky in the long run not to have been sent to jail. He was William Whelan, Childers Estate and at the outset he pleaded guilty to charges of forging and uttering a cheque at a take away food shop at Grattan Square on June 24; obtaining chips and cash to a total value of £48.90 by means of uttering a forged cheque and stealing seven cheques valued £1.75 at Dungarvan C.B.S.

Garda Inspector Eamonn Keating who prosecuted stated that Whelan went to the school looking for food and returned later and then stole the cheques. "He literally bit the hand that fed him," said the Inspector who added that when arrested, Whelan had the six other cheques all filled out and ready to cash.

District Justice O'Connell convicted Whelan on all the charges and adjourned the matter for two weeks pending a report on him to be submitted by the Court Welfare Officer.

As Whelan left the Court-

house he was involved in a disturbance outside as a result of which he was brought back before the District Justice who warned him that because of his attitude he could be sent to prison for seven days for contempt of court.

THREATENED TO KILL GARDA

Having then left the Court, Whelan was involved in a further incident which landed him back before the bench again and District Justice O'Connell was informed that on this occasion Whelan had threatened to kill one garda

and to damage another garda's car.

When placed in the witness box, Whelan agreed that he had threatened to damage a garda's car and confirmed, "I will do so, too."

The District Justice then bound Whelan over to keep the peace for a period of 12 months or in default to serve three months detention. Whelan signed the necessary bond but as he left the precincts of the Court he was heard to repeat his threat to damage the garda's car.

At this, District Justice O'Connell declared that Whelan would rue the day he carried out any such threat.

Publican Must Pay £2000 Phone Bill

In an undefended civil bill at Dungarvan Court last week Telecom Eireann sought a sum totalling £1925-32p due for telephone calls from Brian Barton, Seaview Bar, The Pike, Killineen, Dungarvan.

Witnesses from Dublin and Waterford gave evidence on behalf of Telecom Eireann of the amount due and stated that while the accounts had been furnished in due course there had been no communication in the matter from the defendant.

District Justice O'Connell granted a decree for £1925-32p together with £90 witnesses' expenses and costs.

Mr. J. Lavan Solr. was for the applicants.

Record of Irish Presidency Was Impressive

Mr. Pat Cox (Liberal, Munster), speaking in a debate in the European Parliament on the work of the Irish Presidency, said the European Council in Dublin in April marked a decisive turning point in the Community's history.

Fears about dilution of the EC in the face of change and anxiety over German unity had been emphatically dispelled by the unanimous welcome to German unification and its firm establishment within the broader context of wider and deeper European integration.

Mr. Cox said the record of the Irish Presidency had been impressive. The upgrading of diplomatic relations between the Community and the US was a welcome development. The mandate for EC-EFTA negotiations on the European economic space was close to completion, and progress had been made on economic and monetary union and, sig-

nificantly also, in some of the complex areas in completing the internal market in public procurement, telecommunications and energy. However, Mr. Cox expressed disappointment at the lack of progress in the tax harmonisation area.

Concluding, Mr. Cox said he and his group looked forward to the establishment of a second inter-government conference to deal with the political union. He hoped that the Irish Presidency would ensure that that IGC would put democratic legitimisation as a cornerstone of the construction of the new Europe and that it would also extend Community competence into the fields of security and foreign policy.



£10 St. V. de P. Donation For Obstructing Traffic Warden

In an action brought by Dungarvan Urban Council at Dungarvan Court last week, Frank Tobin, Mary Street, was charged with obstructing the Council Traffic Warden, James Donovan, at Mary Street on Tuesday, May 1.

Mr. Michael McLoughlin Solr. (Lanigan & Curran) for the Council stated that on the date in question the defendant parked a van in a prohibited place in Mary Street. He was asked to move it by the Traffic Warden but didn't do so and went into his shop. As he came out again the Warden was about to put a parking ticket on the vehicle. The defendant rushed at him and caught the warden by the throat and held him for

about 10 seconds before letting him go.

Mr. Niall King, Solicitor (J. F. Williams & Co.) said that the defendant was a shopkeeper in Mary Street and the entire incident happened in a very short space of time. Mr. Tobin was putting parcels of groceries into the van outside the shop when the warden came along and asked him to move it. He went back in for more parcels and as he emerged from the shop the

warden was about to put a ticket on the van. "He didn't catch him by the throat but only by the shirt and it was all done in the heat of the moment," said Mr. King.

District Justice W. F. O'Connell said that while the incident appeared to be innocuous, it was a serious matter to interfere with a traffic warden in this manner. He said that he realised how frustrating traffic and parking regulations could be at times and while traffic wardens were, as a result, much maligned persons, he could not excuse any interference with them.

"However," said the District Justice, "as it was not a very serious assault I will strike out the charge if the defendant will pay £10 to the local St. Vincent de Paul." He allowed a sum of £8 for medical expenses but refused to allow the costs of the prosecution to the Council.

Mr. King on behalf of the defendant then undertook to pay the £10 donation to St. Vincent de Paul.

Accusations At AGM Of Waterford Foods

Waterford Foods was accused of forcing farmers to tie up their milk supply as well as shares and business through a preference share issue at last Thursday's annual meeting in Dungarvan.

However, the meeting voted overwhelmingly in favour of raising £17m. in new capital.

Chief executive Stephen O'Connor said the share issue was not a loyalty bonus, but was designed to share part of the success of the plc with co-op shareholders and suppliers.

Michael Maddock, group treasurer, said a farmer who subscribed £912 could expect an estimated return of £4,562 at the end of five years, plus interest income of 7 pc a year.

The meeting agreed to the acquisition of Galloway West, the Wisconsin-based dairy food business for \$48m. from Waterford Co-

op, which bought the company last October.

Waterford Food chairman John Barry said both the recent acquisitions, Galloway-West and Heald Dairies in Manchester, were performing above expectations and fitting in with Waterford Foods profile.

JUDICIAL REVIEW

Shareholder John Cashman said he would be forced to request a judicial review when his objection to the re-election of Cyril Power as a director was over-ruled. He claimed that there would be a contest for the post and that it should remain vacant.

Fined And Disqualified At Dungarvan

Maurice O'Donovan, Toor North, Aglish, Cappoquin pleaded guilty at Dungarvan Court last week to a charge of driving with excess alcohol and was fined £50 and disqualified from driving for the mandatory period of 12 months. District Justice O'Connell also directed that the conviction be endorsed.

For the defence it was stated that the defendant who is aged 22 and a farmer was only marginally over the limit on the occasion.

SENSELESS VANDALISM

We cannot condemn too strongly the senseless vandalism in Dungarvan which saw a number of the trees planted by the Urban Council horticulture department at the traffic island at the Bridge uprooted and dumped over the quay last week-end.

These trees, shrubs and flowering plants have been placed in special containers at vantage points around the urban area for the spe-

We believe that the vandalism described above occurs in the early hours at week-ends as some midnight cowboys cannot see their way to go to their homes after their disco outings without "having a go" at these sitting targets. Their behaviour is absolutely scandalous and should not be countenanced by any law-abiding members of the community.

Up in Tallow, Ned Power has retired from the principalship at Tallow N.S. where he taught for the past 40 years. Dungarvan born Ned will be remembered as the star goalie in the halcyon days of Waterford's All-Ireland hurling era.

Here in Abbeyside, Tom McHugh has retired as principal of Garranbane N.S. where he has taught for the past 34 years. A native son of the village, Tom was an outstanding footballer who wore the Dungarvan Club and the County colours as well as the Munster Railway Cup colours with great distinction in his day.

We would like to wish both many years of health and happiness in their retirement.

Incidentally we learn that Tom will be replaced as principal at Garranbane by Don Sheil who has been a member of the teaching staff at Abbeyside N.S. for the past 16 years and we also would like to congratulate him on his appointment.

THE MICHAEL COLLINS STAMP

An Post issued three new postage stamps on Thursday, June 21, one of which marks the centenary of the birth of Michael Collins. The stamp has a line drawing of the great Irish leader and statesman by Robert Ballagh based on Leo Whelan's original portrait.

In the circumstances it is only right that we should recall a little about the life and times of Michael Collins this week. He was born at Woodfield, Clonakilty on October 16, 1890, the son of a small farmer. Educated at the local national school, at the age of sixteen he emigrated to London where he worked as a clerk in the Post Office and later with a firm of stockbrokers.

When in England, Collins joined the Irish Republican Brotherhood (IRB) and he subsequently returned to Dublin to fight in the G.P.O. in the Easter Rising of 1916 following which he was interned with many of his contemporaries. On being released he became actively prominent in Sinn Fein and the Volunteer movement. He also became a member of the Supreme Council of the IRB, a position of considerable power and influence.

After the great Sinn Fein victory in the 1918 general election and the establishment of Dail Eireann, Michael Collins became Minister for Home Affairs and later Minister for Finance. It was in this latter capacity that he masterminded the success of the Dail loans at home and abroad but especially in the U.S. where they were heavily over-subscribed.

At the same time, Collins held responsibility as director of organisation and intelligence for the Volunteers and arranged to supply them with arms and ammunition and set up a system of intelligence which enabled him to keep abreast of British plans.

He was a member of the Irish delegation which ne-

gotiated the Anglo-Irish Treaty which was signed on December 6, 1921 and on his return to Ireland he became Chairman of the Provisional Government charged with implementing the terms of the Treaty which led to the outbreak of the Civil War in June, 1922.

Collins then took over as Commander-in-Chief of the Government forces and it was in this capacity while on an inspection tour his travelling party was ambushed in this native Co. Cork at Beal na Blath on August 22, 1922. Collins was shot in the

head and was fatally wounded. He died almost immediately and was subsequently buried with full State and Military honours in Glasnevin Cemetery, Dublin.

To this day controversy surrounds the shooting of Michael Collins and who was responsible for firing the fatal shot. There has also been conjecture as to what the future of the country would have been had he lived. Without doubt Collins's death at the age of 32 was a terrible tragedy not only for those close to him but for the entire country as well.

The Old Bog Road

Our choice for the ballad corner this week is "The Old Bog Road," an old-time favourite which has remained evergreen down through the years. With emigration as rife now as it was in the early part of the century, the sentiments of the ballad are as relevant to-day as then.

My feet are here on Broadway this blessed harvest morn,
But oh! the ache that's in my heart for the spot where I was born.
My weary hands are blistered through work in cold and heat
And oh! to swing a scythe once more through a field of Irish wheat
Had I the chance to wander back or own a King's abode
I'd sooner see the hawthorn tree by the Old Bog Road.

When I was young and restless, my mind was ill at ease,
Through dreaming of America and the gold beyond the seas.
Oh! sorrow take their money, 'tis hard to find the same,
And what's the world to any man if no one speaks his name.
I've had my day and here I am a-building bricks per load.
A long three thousand miles away from the Old Bog Road.

My mother died last Spring time when Ireland's fields were green,
The neighbours said her waking was the finest ever seen.
There were snowdrops and primroses piled high above her head,
And Fern's Church was crowded when her funeral Mass was said.
And here was I on Broadway, a-building bricks per load,
When they carried out her coffin down the Old Bog Road.

There was a decent girl at home who used to walk with me,
Her eyes were soft and sorrowful, like moonlight o'er the sea.
Her name was Mary O'Dwyer but that was long ago.
The ways of God are wiser than the things that man might know.
She died the day I left her, a-building bricks per load
I'd best forget the days I spent on the Old Bog Road.

Ah! life's a weary puzzle, past-finding out by man,
I'll take the day for what it's worth and do the best I can,
Since no one cares a rush for me, what need is there to moan,
I'll go my way and draw my pay and smoke my pipe alone,
Each human heart must bear its grief though bitter be the load,
So God be with you, Ireland and the Old Bog Road.

Road Accident Facts 1988

There were 463 persons killed on Irish roads in 433 fatal accidents during 1988. While the number killed is higher than the figures of 462 in 1987, 387 in 1986 and 410 in 1985, it is lower than any other year since 1969, when the number of vehicles under current licence was about half what it is at present.

The total number of pedal cyclists killed increased from 37 to 57 which sharply reverses a slow decline in recent years. It is the highest figure since 1973. The increases occurred mainly in the under twenty and the over sixty-four age groups in urban areas. In fact, the number of cyclists killed in urban areas more than doubled between 1987 and 1988. The number of pedestrians and car users killed hardly changed from 1987.

A pedestrian involved in an accident at night was twice likely to be killed as a pedestrian involved in a daytime accident. Likewise, a pedestrian involved and reported to be under the influence of alcohol was about twice as likely to be killed as a sober pedestrian. A similar statement applies to a pedestrian not carrying a light compared with one carrying a light.

The number of motorcyclists killed fell from the very high figure of 70 in 1987 to 53, which is around the average figure for the past decade. However, motorcyclists remain at much higher risk than other road users.

There were 8,437 persons

reported injured in 1988, a small increase on the 1987 figure of 8,409.

July was a particularly bad month for fatalities with 61 people killed, the highest for a summer month since 1979 and the highest for any July since 1971.

ALCOHOL RELATED DEATHS

The number of persons killed and injured between 9.00 p.m. and 3.00 a.m. provides a rough indicator of alcohol-related deaths. Up to 1986 this figure was declining more rapidly than the total number of fatalities, which suggested an improvement in the observance of the drink-driving legislation. There was some indication of a levelling off of this decline in 1987 which has been reinforced by the 1988 data. The earlier decline was also apparent in the data for total casualties though the recent levelling off is less clear.

A further negative feature of the 1988 data is the number of persons killed during the later hours of darkness, 3.00 a.m. - 6.00 a.m., which is well up on comparable figures for recent years. There is a trend upwards throughout the eighties in the figure for fa-

talities though with strong fluctuations. The figure for 1988 is of the order of 100 per cent higher than a typical figure for the early eighties. The upward trend for all casualties is somewhat clearer and the increase when compared with the early eighties is almost as large. This may indicate changing lifestyles.

Preparing the ground ready for a new lawn

IF YOU plan to sow a new area of lawn then now is the time to prepare the soil.

For next month, August, is the best month to sow and you need about six weeks lead time on site preparation to allow the soil to settle.

You can also lay turf, arguably better in most cases and certainly so in areas of poor soil or in the garden of a newly-built house, which is probably missing a topsoil.

But there is more investment in turf and opinion tends to favour laying it slightly later, in September and early autumn.

And if you are set on seed you have the chance to create the type of lawn more likely to suit your purposes.

Tailored

Grass seed is not just grass seed and you may be surprised to find a selection of mixtures at the local nursery or garden centre, where it is still sometimes sold loose as well as in pre-packaged form.

It means that you then have to ask yourself whether you want an immaculately tailored green sward that could host a bowls match or, realistically, something that will stand up to the kids' cricket match or the Great Dane chasing its tail.

Lawns likely to take a battering from paws and feet should be sown with ryegrass or a ryegrass mixture to create a tolerant, tough and fast-regenerating surface.

But this can look coarse and unattractive so you

may be better off compromising with a ryegrass-free blend.

However, if the lawn is mostly decorative and intended to complement a showcase garden then buy a mixture — and expect it to be dearer — which is made up from fescues and bents only.

Don't worry if all this seems over-simplified, because the boxed brands of seed usually explain fully what they are best suited for.

Having set the seed selection process in train, get on with the preparation of the site, which is probably the most important task in the long run.

Rotted

Avoid a using mechanical digger unless you have a lot of ground to cover — they tend to distribute weeds too freely.

Anyway, unless the soil is really compacted you only need turn it over to one space depth and work in some well rotted compost to condition it nicely. Then rake it level into a fine crumbly state.

Pick out weeds or coarse grass that springs up before you sow, having chosen a calm day when the soil is slightly moist — the usual density is about 1.5 ounces per square yard.

Gently rake the seed, cover with netting and use foil as a bird scarer, even if you have bought a mixture treated with bird repellent.

The grass can be lightly rolled in the dry when about 1.5 inches high but don't mow before it reaches three inches and then only when the blades set high.

Salmon Nicoise

Ingredients:

- 1 small iceberg lettuce
- 150g/6oz trimmed and cooked French beans
- 3 tomatoes, sliced
- 1 small red pepper, de-seeded and chopped
- 1 small red salad onion, sliced or
- 1 bunch spring onions, chopped
- 430g/15oz can salmon, drained
- 12 black olives, halved and pitted
- 50g/2oz tin anchovies, drained and rinsed
- 3 tablespoons white wine vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 clove garlic crushed

Method:

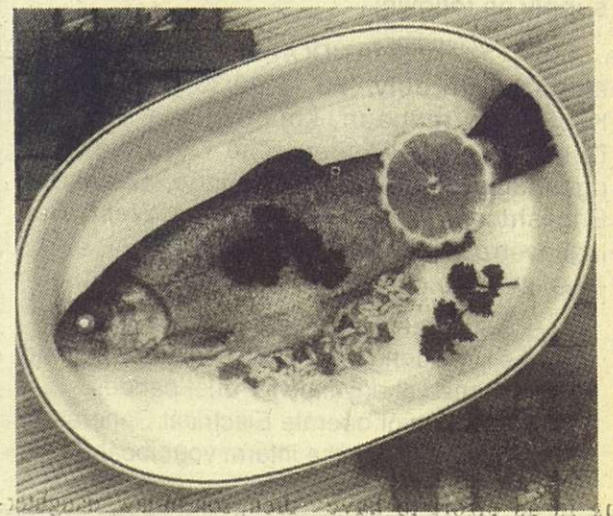
Shred the lettuce and arrange it on a large serving platter. In a large bowl, mix together the beans, tomatoes, pepper and onion. Arrange this mixture over the lettuce on the platter.

Flake the salmon into a bowl, removing as much skin and bone as possible. Arrange this over the bean mixture.

Decorate the top with the anchovy fillets and black olives. Chill in the 'fridge until required.

Whisk together the remaining ingredients and spoon this dressing evenly over the salad just before serving.

• Cook's tip: The dressing for this salad is delicious with other salad meals so make double the quantities in a screw top jar and keep in the 'fridge for up to one week.

SCULPTURE WORKSHOP IN TALLOW

Formed five years ago to encourage the economic, social and cultural development of the area, the Tallow Enterprise Group have this year initiated a Sculpture Workshop.

Apart from the benefit to both the Artists taking part and the area generally, the Group wished to commemorate and pay tribute to one of the most dominant Sculptors of the 19th century, Tallow-born John Hogan.

John Hogan was born in 1800 and when his part-time hobby of sculpting in marble attracted the attention of various patrons, a public subscription was raised to send him to the famed St. Luke's in Rome. He remained in Rome until 1884 when he returned to Ireland with his Italian wife.

The workshop has been organised in conjunction with the Irish Sculpture Society, represented by internationally known Sculptors Bernard Mortell and Jack Verbrugge. Workshop participants are from as far apart as Hertfordshire, England, Belfast, Dublin, Mayo, Donegal, Limerick, Cork and Waterford.

The materials being used are diverse as local timber, stone, slates, bed-springs, rushes and a red clay peculiar to the East Cork/West Waterford area. One of the artistic themes is titled The Hill of Iron (Tulach an Iarainn) which is Tallow.

On Sunday next the participating Sculptors will be at the Enterprise Centre between 3 p.m. - 6 p.m.

The selectors have been with them since their Under-16 days and will know everything about the character and qualities of the players who have been their charges over such a long period. Of course all this will have been for naught if we fail to deliver on the night. I don't mean that if we lose that it will have been a waste of energy and money, etc., but it will be, if we do not give a top class performance.

After such a thorough preparation and with a team which includes the cream of Waterford's minor players, I feel certain that the lads will give a great account of themselves against a county whose track record in all grades of hurling is well-known and rather awesome. I believe too that in spite of Cork's wonderful record, that there is an air of optimism in the camp with both selectors and players and with this kind of approach they might produce a shock result.

At Walsh Park we are sure of tremendous support and this will be very important in giving the team and selectors the encouragement they need and deserve.

KILMACTHOMAS v. STRADBALLY

This is a senior football refixture that I previewed a couple of weeks ago before it was cancelled because of a tragedy. It is one of the clashes that many of the other clubs in the championship have been waiting for as it is expected to produce one of the better contests in the competition. The result is very important for both clubs as with five teams still strongly in contention for one of the three places at the top of this group, neither can still feel sure of being involved in the K/O stages.

For Stradbally's sake it would have been better if the game had been played sooner since they will be without three of their best players when they face Kilmac' at Lemybrien on Saturday evening. Fintan O'Brien and Eoin Phelan are both off because of leg injuries and Conor O'Brien, their outstanding full-back, was sidelined at Fraher Field on Sunday evening against Shamrocks. To cope with a situation like this will take a mighty effort and I believe that this and more will be demanded if they are to beat Kilmacthomas who handled themselves very well against the Nire at Dungarvan two weeks ago. They have some splendid club footballers and won't be easily beaten by any of the high profile teams in this championship. I give them the vote to win here.

ROANMORE v. LISMORE

The remainder of the week-end programme is confined to hurling and with twelve of the thirteen clubs in action we will see lots of exciting stuff. Much of this excitement will be packed into the clash between Lismore and county champions, Roanmore in the feature game at Fraher Field on Sunday afternoon. Lismore never needed a win more badly if they are to survive in the battle for a place in the final shake-up of the championship and if they lose this one, then

their prospects of being involved later are gone.

The loss of Seamus Prendergast through injury during the Tallow game on Sunday will leave them struggling and if they cannot show considerable improvement their chances of mounting this big challenge are not great.

Roanmore who were in sparkling form when inflicting a seven points defeat of Tallow lately are certain to qualify, but they will want to finish at the top of their group and to achieve this they will need to win this one.

With players like John Ryan, Ray Sheridan, Noel Crowley, Kieran Delahunty, Albert Burke, Eddie Nolan, Maurice Wadding, Tom Shanahan and company they appear to have all the aces and must be given the vote to bring their total of league points to eight. It would be foolish, though to completely discount the chances of Lismore as many times in the past when the chips were down, they unexpectedly came up trumps. I'd like to see Lismore win this one — and who knows?

PORTLAW v. CAPPOQUIN

This will be the opening game at Fraher Field and present form points very clearly to a win for Portlaw, who have won the two games played by them so far.

On their last visit up to this side, Portlaw scored a decisive four points win over Lismore in a splendid contest and a repeat of this form should be enough to account for Cappoquin who are still pointless after four matches. Cappoquin who are now at the bottom of their group are pretty sure to be involved in a relegation battle at the end of the championship and maybe a move down to the intermediate grade will do the club and their players no harm at the moment. There will always be room for them to come back up to the senior scene when things improve in their camp. But at the moment they are not likely to achieve anything in the top grade and the sensible thing for them to do would seem to be a move downwards where they can achieve success. It would

be a shock if they won here on Sunday.

BALLYDUFF v. FOURMILEWATER

The result of this game may shoot Ballyduff to the top of the table, depending, of course, on the outcome of the Mount Sion/Passage match at Walsh Park. Whether or not they go to the top, their chances of ending up with eight points from five games looked pretty sure as Fourmile' are not likely to be able to mount a big enough challenge to stop them. On the basis of what we have seen to-date in the senior hurling championship, the Ballymac' club appear to be heading for a relegation fight-out with Cappoquin, come September next.

Ballyduff's only lapse so far has been against Passage but their displays against Mount Sion, Ballygunner and Dungarvan are good enough for us to make them hot favourites to win this one.

BALLYGUNNER v. DUNGARVAN

Ballygunner, after two games, are still without a point, while Dungarvan, having beaten Fourmilewater, have two points. Ballygunner's defeats have been against Ballyduff and Mount Sion and now they probably feel that the easy ones are still to come. It is a long haul from the bottom, where they are now placed to a place in the top three. If they manage to beat Dungarvan, it should be a fight-out between themselves and Mount Sion for the third spot. Defeating Dungarvan will not be easy as they may suppose as the Old Boro club have an amount of skilful players, who, when they 'put it together,' can be a big threat to the best.

This is a match that will decide the destiny, in the present championship, for both.

Ballygunner will be the slight favourites and with the venue advantage, they may just about win.

MOUNT SION v. PASSAGE

Passage are looked upon as one of the 'up-and-coming' clubs and having beaten Mount Sion before they will feel confident enough that they can do the same again. Beating a team of Mount Sion's record, is always a bonus and with a club like Passage it means something extra. Passage beat Ballyduff and share the top spot on the table at

the moment with the Western Club and Mount Sion are in a situation where they must win to make sure of even remaining in contention for the knock-out stages, so what a battle this will be.

Caught in such a situation and with an almighty effort required to see them through, Mount Sion may play well enough to shade the verdict.

CLONEA v. DUNHILL

Tallow beat both of those by just two points so there is very little between them. Dunhill played very fluent hurling against Cappoquin on Sunday and they seem well able to take their scores. They are tremendously fit as well and this may be a factor, but it is a very open game and either side can win.

INTERMEDIATE GAMES

The four games listed are all very important and the results will show us the shape of the final shake-up.

Shamrocks, if they beat De La Salle at Dungarvan on Friday will have enough points to see them through and on form this is likely to happen.

Abbeyside will need to beat St. Mollerans and with their improving form

they can. They played well against Shamrocks and an improvement on that form could mean a couple of points for them.

Erin's Own won't find it as easy against St. Marys as they would have, had they met earlier, as now the Touraneena team, having lost heavily to Saviours, seem to have organised themselves better and played very well last Sunday.

COLLIGAN v. TRAMORE

Tramore beat Saviours, but were disappointed with their result against St. Marys last Sunday. Colligan, on the basis of their defeat by Saviours on Friday, appear to be slipping. They will have to win this one and just might if they play to their best form.

OTHER GAMES

The pick of the other games will be the clash between Ballysaggart and Ardmore in junior hurling and while a win for Ballysaggart is predicted it won't be a shock if Ardmore beat them.

An Rinn and Clashmore will be a closely fought match and this is another which could go either way, but the Gaeltacht side are slight favourites and might get there in a tight finish.

Results

There were a few surprises, but nothing extraordinary in the results produced from the rather light programme of matches played over the week-end when most of the action was overshadowed by Ireland's wonderful and exciting progress in the World Cup. The story of how the Irish Team did the nation proud is told elsewhere in this issue, but let us add our sincere congratulations to the team and everyone concerned on their wonderful achievement.

Tallow beat Lismore decisively in a game that was virtually decided at the halfway stage when the winners were 4-12 to 1-1 in front. In fact it was only in the final minute of this half that Barney Prendergast scored Lismore's goal. Mount Sion beat Fourmilewater without looking very impressive. The Western team kept battling away and took some nice scores against the hot

favourites.

In the intermediate hurling championships, St. Saviours had it relatively easy against Colligan and St. Mary's played well enough to surprise Tramore. Shamrocks and Stradbally was played on Sunday evening and this ended in a win for the far Western team, who are now unbeaten. The loss of Conor O'Brien was a blow to Stradbally, but on the night, the winners were the better team and deserved their win.

Games Not Played

For a variety of reasons a number of championship games which had been scheduled for the week-end were not played.

The Portlaw/Roanmore game which was a crucial senior hurling tie, went off on Friday evening because of torrential rain in the afternoon causing some flooding in Walsh Park.

The Kilgobinet/Clashmore junior hurling tie fixed for Sunday went off as a mark of respect to the late John Drohan, Ballyconnery and the minor hurling tie involving Dungarvan and Cappoquin did not take place because Cappoquin were unable to field fifteen players.

For some reason unknown at the time of writing, Ballinameela did not field for their game against Ardmore in junior hurling.

To Referee In London

John Moore, who is to referee the Munster senior hurling final at Thurles on Sunday week, will travel to Ruislip on next week-end to referee the All-Ireland 'B' hurling final between Kildare and London. Another big honour for John.

His brother Pat is also kept very busy these days and is handling games all over the place. On Sunday last, for instance, Pat was the man in the middle for no less than four matches. On Sunday morning he refereed two juvenile games and on Sunday afternoon he handled both championship games at the Fraher Field. Some service!

WATERFORD V. TIPPERARY

Problems For Selectors

It would be misleading to report that the preparation of the under-21 team to play All-Ireland champions Tipperary in the Munster semi-final at Thurles on tomorrow, Thursday evening, has gone smack-smooth, because the opposite has been the case. Seldom have a committee come up with so many problems in getting a team ready for a game.

Because the majority of our championships are run on a league system, players are finding themselves over involved with club activity and this increases the problems for selectors when they try to get players released for county team training. Since we beat Kerry three weeks ago the situation has improved somewhat and the news at the week-end was that the management were reasonably happy that they can field a reasonably strong team that will test the champions to the limit on Thursday evening.

The problem referred to above is given as the reason why the selectors waited for Monday night before naming the team. If it becomes available it will be published in this issue. I know that it will show

some changes because the personnel of the panel has changed. Eddie Burke, Dungarvan, who played very well against Kerry will be an absentee as he is in the USA at the moment. Paudie Coffey, Portlaw, who was sidelined before the Kerry match is certain is to command a place and his inclusion in the attack should improve things in this sector, which was our problem area in the first round.

Tickets

I feel it is only like a couple of months since I wrote on the subject and now that time of the year is again approaching. For the past two weeks there has been very big demand for Munster football final tickets and once again the supply did not meet the demand.

Tickets for the hurling final have now been issued, but our allocation will depend on whether or not we are involved in the programme and that will depend on how well we fare tonight against Cork at Walsh Park.

Only those clubs who have applied will be accommodated.

County Selectors

Two groups are now in the process of choosing county selectors for the senior panels and at the July meeting, which is due to be held on the 16th, it is expected that both groups will be able to recommend the members to manage the teams for the coming two years.

Coisde na Peil have invited clubs to recommend names of suitable and interested people and they will meet on next Tuesday to name their committee of three or five.

The new hurling selection committee is being dealt

with by Coisde Gnotha and they met on this Monday, but no announcement has been made about their discussions on the matter.

It is encouraging to find that there is countrywide interest in the selection of both committees.

nations for the Chair. First into the field was Cllr. Sean Whelan, who now sits on the Council as independent Fianna Fail who pointed out that as this was the last year in the term of the present Council "it would be a nice gesture by all the political parties to unite and unanimously elect the only independent member on the council" — himself "I therefore propose myself for the Chair," said Cllr. Whelan.

There was no seconder for the proposal. Cllr. Brian O'Shea, T.D. (Lab.) then rose and said that it was an honour for him to propose Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) for the post. He recalled that Cllr. Kyne was first elected to Dungarvan Urban Council in 1979 and was co-opted a member of the Co. Council in 1981 following the death of his father Tom Kyne who had been the major political figure in the county for many years. He said that in 1985 Cllr. Kyne had been very solidly re-elected to the Council and had proved a very fine, very articulate and very fair-minded Chairman when he was elected to that honoured position previously for the year 1988-89.

The proposal was formally seconded by Cllr. Pat Coffey (F.G.)

Cllr. Paddy Cahill (F.F.) then proposed the Fianna Fail nominee Cllr. Paddy Kenneally (F.F.) and this was seconded by Cllr. Seamus Dunphy (F.F.)

A recorded vote was then taken and resulted as follows:

For Kyne: Kyne, O'Shea (both Lab.), Harty, O'Halloran, O'Riordan, P. Coffey, O. Coffey, McDonnell, Walsh, Carey, Casey, Queally (all F.G.) — 12.

For Kenneally — J. Fahey, Kenneally, S. Fahey, O Riain, Quirke, Cunningham, Wilkinson, Cahill,

Dunphy, Swift (all F.F.) — 10.

Abstained — Whelan.

Cllr. Kyne was then declared elected by 12 votes to 10 with Cllr. Whelan maintaining his independent stance by not voting and having been invested with the chain of office by the outgoing chairman, Cllr. Kyne then took over the chair.

Returning thanks for his election Cllr. Kyne complimented the outgoing Chairman, Cllr. Queally for the very diligent manner in which he had carried out his duties during the past year. Looking ahead, he said that he felt sure they would all work together as a united team for the good of the county.

Cllr. Kenneally also thanked those who had supported him.

VICE-CHAIRMAN

Cllr. Brian Swift then proposed the Fianna Fail nominee for the Vice-Chair, Cllr. Paddy Cahill and this proposal was seconded by Cllr. Dunphy.

Cllr. John Carey proposed Cllr. Con Casey as the Fine Gael nominee and Cllr. Gary O'Halloran seconded.

In a voting pattern similar to that in the election of chairman, Cllr. Con Casey was declared elected by 12 votes to 10 with Cllr. Whelan again abstaining.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley congratulated Cllr. Kyne and wished him every success in the coming year, a year in which he said, they could well look forward to momentous happenings where local government was concerned. He also congratulated Cllr. Casey and thanked the outgoing Chairman, Cllr. Queally for all his help and co-operation during the past year.

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
