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14 Weeks Crystal Strike Ends

A dramatic statement issued this Wednesday morning announced the good news that the 14 weeks old strike at Waterford Crystal plants in Waterford City and Dungarvan has ended.

The announcement came at 6 a.m. following a final twelve hour session of negotiations at a Waterford city hotel. The settlement terms provide for the reso-

lution of 8 of the 14 outstanding issues between the parties with the remaining 6 being referred to the Labour Court for adjudication.

It was stated that work at the company's plants in Waterford and Dungarvan would resume on a phased basis as from today with the aim of returning to full production as soon as possible.

TRAFFIC ROUT LIGHTING AT ABBEYSIDE

Cllr. Jackie Fahey, T.D., at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council, held in Dungarvan last Monday, proposed a motion asking that proposals be placed before the Minister for the Environment

for the provision of traffic route lighting at the Burgery, Abbeyside, Dungarvan.

Speaking to the motion, Deputy Fahey said that there was a need for this lighting as the roadway at the Burgery was very wide and was completely unlit. The area was also thickly populated.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, stated that about two years ago, proposals were submitted to the Department for route lighting along the entire length of the new by-pass road and at the Burgery. The Department had deleted certain sections along the by-pass and were not interested in funding work at the Burgery at the time.

Since then, Mr. O'Flynn said that he had again discussed the matter with the Dept. Inspectors, and as a result, he had now asked the ESB to submit three tenders for an extension of the lighting at the Burgery; 1, as far as Duckspool junction; 2, as far as Abbeyside GAA Ground and 3, as far as Tarr's Bridge.

He added that he was at present awaiting these quotations and as soon as he got them, he would forward them to the Department for their observations.

LISMORE DENTAL CLINIC STILL NOT OPEN

The controversial and much discussed matter of the opening of a dental clinic in Lismore was again raised by Cllr. O. Wilkinson at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday when he proposed that the Council call on the Health Board to open the clinic immediately.

Cllr. Wilkinson, in proposing his motion said that several promises had been made about the clinic in the past but up to today it still had not been re-opened. "I do not propose to say any more about it, but to ask that the Council ask the Health Board to re-open the clinic immediately", he said.

Cllr. J. Quirke said that he had been in contact with the Health Board on this matter and had been informed that the money for the repairs to be carried out at the clinic had been allocated and a contractor for the job had been appointed. However, he understood that the contractor was at present engaged in work at Ardkeen Hospital and it didn't look as if he would be available to take on the job at Lismore for some time. "We should ask the Health Board to give the job to some local contractor in Lismore and then it could be done in the next few weeks, that's our only hope", he said.

The motion as proposed was passed.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

LISTEN

Isaiah in the first reading is telling his listeners that God's word is like the rain from heaven, which, as you know, is so essential to making things grow. To understand the passage, we must realise that the prophet was speaking to people recovering from the aftermath of their exile. They were so disconsolate with their unhappy lot that they felt God had abandoned them. So, Isaiah is saying, despite your grief and loss, do remember that God would never desert His people. You have His word. Perhaps, we should here borrow from the Gospel reading to get a better understanding of Isaiah. It says, continue to have blind faith in God, and let your lives be an example of resolute and undying trust.

These people had lost their faith in God on account of adversity, and it is much the same in life today. When things go wrong, many turn away from God, and no longer walk with Him. It definitely appears that the power and effectiveness of God's word does depend to some extent on the quality of one's faith. Leave the bag of seed on the shelf, and you will never reap a harvest!

Just for one moment, consider the power of the ordinary word. What you say or others say to you can be helpful and encouraging, but it could also be deadly and destructive. You know how comforting it is to be told: "I have never seen you look so well." And, you know equally well how crushing the bitter word can be. Too, they can be empty, false and misleading. They are after all the recognised means or channels to communicate something, and, when they do not reflect the truth, they are lies. All the Sunday readings are united in inviting us to meditate on the word of God. And, what a contrast one finds, when one considers the way words are uttered and used in everyday life. The practice in business is to say anything that is conducive to a good deal. It is truly, do not say what you think, but think what you say. Whereas, God's word is true. There's no room for wavering. It is clear, direct and comforting. It is good medicine for the ills of man. And, it is a light and a guide for all. No wonder Peter said to Jesus: "you have the words of eternal life." So, the word not only nourishes, but it brings life. It will bring pardon and forgiveness to the sinner and raise him up

SECOND READING

St. Paul in the second reading speaks of the imbalance in creation, and he urges his Roman audience not to be despondent over the disorders and the sufferings that will invariably be part of their life. He reminds them that even if their lot is bound up with difficulties, they must hold fast to the truth and not allow themselves to be diverted or thwarted by temporary trials. He tells them that their faithful perseverance is a small price to pay for the glory that God has in store for them.

Apart from our being able to utilise our tribulations in God's service, and thereby elevating them to their original role, Paul is indicating that the whole universe, which was to be a help and a joy for man, suffered in man's downfall, and, even though now in travail and often a hindrance to man, the new man by his judicious use is there-

by helping the world to fulfil the purpose for which God made it. Paul obviously is encouraging all of us to employ our trials in God's service, and allow them to share in their own liberation. To steady his listeners and to ensure that they would not lose hope, Paul asks them to keep in mind their heavenly reward. And, as if to fill them with greater confidence, he adds, you can trust God. God has promised. And, that He will fulfil. Therefore he says, open your hearts to His word, and you'll be inspired to reach out for the promised glory.

GOSPEL THEME

The main theme of the Gospel is the same as mentioned by Isaiah, namely, heed the word of God, and the inevitable blessing is bound to follow. Jesus paints a beautiful picture of a farmer sewing his seed; and everything in that scene is correct down to the last detail. He compares the fruitfulness of the seed to the effects produced by the word of God on the varying degrees by which the listeners accept it. It is clear when the seed fell on good ground it was fruitful. Likewise, the one who receives the word and understands it, that one will reap a rich harvest. It follows, if the word of God is to produce its effects, it must be heeded.

Each time we go to Holy Mass we hear the word of God, and when the reader proclaims "This is the word of God" we respond "Thanks be to God." The question is, did the reading have any message for us? Or, is our "thanks" an empty expression? The Gospel tells us, the one who hears and understands the word, is the one who bears fruit. And, you may rest assured that that one will reflect what is within him.

Because ecologists are taking a keener interest in promoting preservation of the earth, I feel I should add to my explanation of "creation still re tains the hope of being freed." We speak of the four last things, namely, death, judgment, heaven and hell. The scholars say that that does not mean other things may not continue to exist. So, those who struggle to keep the earth healthy would seem to have a case. However, I feel it is only something about which we can do no more than make a conjecture. Indeed, certain signs will precede the last day, and destruction will fall upon the earth, after which, it will in some way be cleansed and restored. To show our respect for God's creation, our motto ought to be Neither Waste Or Devastate.

Memories Of The Old

Forge At Knockanore

The old forge is derelict now. It was in this place that Jack and Dick Foley carried on the business of general blacksmiths and farriers. These men were among the best in the business. It is on record that in a competition for farriers held at Cork Agricultural Show they took first and second places, for which their reward was gold and silver medals.

I spent many happy hours in this place. I am sure at times I was more of a nuisance than a help but these kindly men never seemed to mind. The forge was a kind of Mecca where many met and chatted while they waited for their various jobs to be done. The main business was shoeing horses. There was other complicated work done - wrought iron gates were made to order, farm implements were repaired and many other tasks that involved heating and welding iron.

There was no electric power in the rural districts at that time so it is not difficult to understand that work took a lot of time and energy. Some of the work, too, was pretty dangerous. For instance the shoeing of young horses was particularly hazardous. There was extreme danger that a horse might withdraw his leg from the smith's grasp before the nail could be cut. This could inflict serious injury.

July and August was always a busy time when young horses were being prepared for Tallow Horse Fair. The breeding of half-bred horses was a very good source of income for many small farmers in the tough years before the war when cattle prices were at an all time low.

The work that I liked best at the forge was the banding of farm cart wheels. This demanded a high degree of expertise. First the wheel

was measured by means of a small wheel which was rolled around the circumference of the cart wheel. The small wheel had a single notch in it and the smith counted the number of rotations as he went round and then marked any extra with chalk.

He then, having shaped the band iron into a circle, measured it but he always cut the iron so that the band would be slightly smaller than the wheel. The wheelwright would have left a little bit between the fellows so that when the hot iron band was contracting as it cooled it would pull the wheel into shape. When the band was welded it was heated in a circular fire until it was red all over. It was then taken from the fire by means of two tools called "dogs" and carried out to the banding bay on the roadside where it was dropped on to the cart wheel.

The cooling process started immediately by throwing water on the full circle. When the wheel was partly cooled it was taken from the bay and rolled into the nearby stream where it was allowed to get cold. There was only one chance to get the band on correctly as when it cooled no amount of hammering would move it without damaging the

DRESSING A

Dressing a cart axle was another job that demanded a lot of skill. This was done by two working in unison one with a hammer and one with a sledge. The man with the sledge was the one who moulded the red hot iron into shape but he had to work on the directions of the man with the hammer who indicated where he wanted the iron to be struck. The strokes of both the sledge and the hammer were in perfect time and that was nice to

The dark winter evenings were lit up in the forge by an oil lamp — gravity-fed from a container from which a two foot pipe extended to a cradle which when heated vapourised the oil and thus produced a bright flame. Having spent a few hours in the forge I was black from head to toe and my mother was never pleased about that.

There is no sound from the anvil now and Jack and Dick are gone to a place where there is nothing but joy. May they rest in peace.

Death Threats For Fishery Officers - Patrol Boats Slashed ing "salmon war" agains the illegal use of monofile

Gardai are investigating damage estimated at £30,000 to two of the newest patrol boats used for fishery inspections by Fishery Officers of the Southern Region Fishery Board which occurred in Carrick-On-Suir last Wednesday night.

The five months old patrol boats valued at £84,000 were housed in a store into which one or more persons broke on Wednesday night and slashed the inflatable hulls of the boats.

At an emergency meeting of the Fishery Board in Carrick-On-Suir on Thursday, the Chairman, Mr. Luke Boyle, said that the manner in which the attack was carried out showed that it was done by a person or persons who knew how to disable the boats.

It was also revealed at the meeting that repeated death threats had been made against Fishery Inspectors Ned Hally and Edward Casey and against members of their families as well.

The fishery officers have been involved in an ongo-

ing "salmon war" against the illegal use of monofilament nets along the south coast for the past two years.

Officials of the Fishery Board are to seek a meeting with Minister for the Marine, Mr. John Wilson, to discuss these latest developments.

"Wilson Appalled At Damage To Fishery Protection Vessels"

The Minister for the Marine, Mr. John P. Wilson, T.D., in a statement issued on Friday last said that he was appalled at the malicious damage caused to two fishery protection vessels, the property of the Southern Fisheries Board.

These vessels which have been very severely damaged had been purchased only last year at a cost of £80,000 which had been partly financed by EC grants. These boats were used by fishery protection staff to enforce fishery laws in the interests of

conserving fish stocks and ensuring a proper balance between the interests of all fishermen.

The Minister described the damaging of these boats as an act of "anarchic thuggery" which would not be tolerated. The Minister has requested his Department and the Central and Regional Fisheries Boards to give every assistance to the Southern Fishery Board to ensure that an effective level of protection service is maintained in the Southern Fisheries Board Region.

HERITAGE SITE VANDALISED

The Ballymacarbry Correspondent of the "Leader" has drawn our attention to a recent article in the Clonmel "Nationalist" which deals with the widespread vandalism by State and Semi-State bodies of heritage sites up and down the country, with particular reference to such a site at Toureen, Ballymacarbry.

Main culprits, according to the article, were the Department of Forestry, whose functions have now been taken over by Coillte. They have been charged with ploughing up or otherwise destroying hillforts, old field systems, megalithic tombs and ancient places, or sites which were part of our national heritage.

Referring to the site at Toureen, Ballymacarbry, the article states that in this site overlooking the Nire Valley, "there was an ancient collection of stones, a stone circle, an alignment of other stones and, in the vicinity, some ring forts. Part of the stone circle has now been destroyed through forestry reclamation and plantation and only a few stones remain in the site. Trees have been planted within the site and this can be disruptive of the remainder of the area because the roots undermine what has been left undisturbed of the archaeological remains. There has also been expensive and deep ploughing of the

The article then goes on to explain the significance of the site as follows: " The Toureen site was wellknown in the locality and it was always regarded locally as an ancient burial place. Its origins and history are lost in antiquity. It is certainly many thousands of years old. It had been preserved by countless generations of people with a certain amount of reverence and respect for the past and, indeed, let it be said, with a certain amount of healthy superstition. People believed that if you interfered with such ancient places that certain

ill-luck would follow..."

Pointing out that the site was clearly marked on the Ordnance Survey Map and that it was also listed in the County Plan adopted by Waterford County Council, the article asks if, when the Department of Forestry, now Coillte, acquired land for tree-planting, does any

consultation take place with the Planning Authorities which would ensure not only the preservation of areas such as Toureen, but also the preservation or enhancement of views.

It's a good question to which, perhaps, our County Planning Authority might provide the answer.

The Lovely Back **Roads Of Dromore**

During the past week we read that emigration from Ireland is now running at an annual all-time high total of 46,000. Most of these are young, highly-educated people with university degrees and third-level qualifications who leave the country to take up jobs in faraway places. On leaving they promise to return in a few years but most of them never do. In latter times many people in the middle age bracket have begun to join the younger emigrants in the terrible exodus which, unless it is stopped, will leave us with an Ireland of elderly people and few young children. It's a daunting prospect which appears to be getting little consideration from the Government, probably because it's an easy way out for them in solving our massive unemployment problems.

Our choice of ballad for this week is in keeping with our increasing emigration problem and while "The Lovely Back Roads Of Dromore" is an old ballad, it is as relevant today as it was in the long years gone by when it was first composed. Although they are far o'er the ocean, there's a place that they love and adore,


Where the fields are all blooming with daisies, by the lovely back roads of Dromore.

Don't forget to look after houseplants

.

GET out and enjoy the garden as much as possible now that everything is blooming but don't forget the plants indoors that cheered you through winter.

For now is the best time to increase your stock of houseplants, saving pounds on buying new and allowing you to pass on or swap the surplus with friends and relatives

Some varieties, such as Chlorophytum or Spider Plant, make it easy by producing baby plants on stems, simply needing to be pegged down in a pot of compost and cut free when

Pegging can also be used on runners from climbing or trailing varieties, such as Ivy. The connection with the mother plant can be cut once they are established through this process, known as layering.

Attached

Other plants such as cacti and succulents produce offsets - small shoots or bulbs attached to the parent but easily cut away for potting

Some cacti or succulents can be propagated in another way, by carefully severing a leaf or pad and allowing it to dry for a few days before planting.

Yet another method can be used on plants growing in clumps, such as African Violets, by carefully splitting the plant in a procedure known as division

Cuttings are highly productive and varieties such as Busy Lizzie and Wandering Jew (Tradescantia) will root by simply standing in water, much to the fascination of children.

When taking cuttings,



pick a stout non-flowering shoot and cut straight across 3-6 inches from the tip, using a sharp edge such as a Stanley knife.

Carefully strip the lower half of the shoot and if the plant is woody, as in the case of Fuchsias, then dip the cut end in hormone rooting powder.

Making more of ageing specimen plants such as Swiss Cheese Plants (Monstera), Philodendron, Dracaena and Rubber Trees (Ficus) is often the reason for using another method of propagation.

Circular

Such plants tend to grow lanky and shed lower leaves, but they can be transformed by air layering. Make a circular cut around the stem a couple of feet from the plant tip and then another, half an inch lower.

Strip the bark from between the two and paint this with rooting powder before enclosing the wound with polythene, loosely filled with spaghnum moss below the cut.

The bag should bulge around the cut but be caught tight above and below it. After a month or so you will see roots entwining the moss, allowing the plant to be severed below the bag.

The well foliaged head can be planted up while the stump will shoot again two new plants from one old one!

CAPPOQUIN'S SCINTILLATING PERFORMANCE AT HENLEY REGATTA

Cappoquin brothers Pat and Michael Murray, together with Pat Peilow, Finbarr Heas and Cox, Brendan Rose from Cork, set the Mecca of the rowing world, Henley Royal Regatta, alight with some scintillating rowing last week, when they took on and beat the best rowing crews in England, in the Britannia Cup for coxed fours. This marvellous crew joined the elite of world rowing in participating in the greatest event in the world of rowing, the final day of Henley, an achievement enjoyed by very few Irish crews in the one hundred and fifty year history of this famed Regatta. The irony on this occasion was that they had to do battle with another great Irish crew, University College Galway, who also had accounted for may fancied crews on their way to the final.

An estimated sixty crews entered for the Britannia cup and after the preliminary rounds thirty - two crews were left in the competition proper and Cappoquin drew No.1 seeds Robrom Rowing Club which includes Cambridge Blues. Eyebrows were raised when the dark blue of Cappoquin crossed the finishing line two and a half lengths clear, completely upsetting the form book.

When Cappoquin accounted for a strong City of Cambridge crew in the next round by two and two thirds lengths, this unknown club from Ireland had made its mark. So far so good for the Irish lads, but they were really up against it, facing seeded University of London in the Quarter-finals on Friday. Again Cappoquin showed scant regard for the form book and beat the London students who had earlier this year, beaten the boat race crews, Oxford and Cambridge, as part of ight.

Cappoquin were now in the semi-finals against Nottingham and Union, with all international oarsmen on board. This race turned out to be a battle royal from start to finish, with Cappoquin putting on a final surge coming into the enclosure to win by two thirds of a length.

THE FINAL

Unbelievably, Cappoquin were in the final on the same day as final day in Wimbledon and the World Cup in Rome. The crew's thoughts were far from soccer or tennis as they lined up beside their fellow Irishmen, U.C.G., who were equally impressive on their march to the final. Both crews had met twice this year, in Limerick and Metropolitan Regattas, with the verdict going to the students on both occasions by two feet and one foot respectively, so the scene was set for an engrossing encounter.





It's all over now - and while many may say thank God, the 1990 World Cup confirmed Ireland's arrival on the World football stage and created an unprecedented following for our team in what many people feel was Ireland's greatest sporting adventure.

Other consequences were how the supporters and journalists reacted to this adventure which in the case of Eamon Dunphy almost became a national incident. There were problems with Travel and especially tickets, thanks to the host country's attitude to market forces. Thankfully, the F.A.I. and a timely and important intervention by the Minister for Sport, Mr Frank Fahy, T.D. saved the day.

On the field, the referees' new "get tough" charter saw a record number of red and yellow cards, while the cynical dive inside the penalty box remains, highlighted by Voller in the final.

The early promise of Brazil and Holland wasn't fulfilled but the Cameroons were a breath of fresh air for their ability on the ball. Their ability and approach off the ball was their downfall.

Bobby Robson's nightmare ended when, like in Mexico '86, changes were forced upon his team selection. Scotland's nightmare continued - beaten by Costa Rica, they temporarily redeemed themselves against Sweden, only for Jim Leighton's worst nightmare to return against Brazil - for the Scots and Leighton, 1990 was not a great year. The host nation, talented, made favourites by many, couldn't live with the pressure, especially against the cynical empire of Argentina, who turned the penalty shoot-out into Italy's heart-break. Still the name Schillaci will live

with us for evermore - possibly with the words "if only" before it.

Ireland's place in Italia '90 had been well chronicled from many angles, but without doubt the shoot-out against Romania was a special day. Never before was the nation caught up in a sporting event - Bonner's save, David O'Leary often unwanted by Charlton, "cometh the hour - cometh the man", hysteria, Ireland are through. Then Schillaci the Sicilian with the looks to match made an offer even we couldn't refuse. Ireland are out - beaten, but unbowed.

I was fortunate to see the three preliminary games, names like Stadio Sant'Elia and Stadio Della Favorita come easily to mind, yet the Romanian game (Stadio L Ferraris) watched at home on T.V. was unforgettable, and it wasn't just because it was the first Irish game where Guinness was available while you watched.

So just when you felt it was safe to open the "Leader" and see nothing of the World Cup - I hope to in the weeks ahead give you my feelings of Italia '90, both home and away.

LISMORE V DUNHILL

This game is a decisive one as the winners are reasonably sure of being involved in the play-offs, if not in the knock-out stages. It was brought forward to Friday by agreement in order to facilitate Dunhill's John Power who goes for the long-puck at Thurles, but apparently Lismore have had a change of heart on the matter and insist on the game being played on Sunday which was the original date set for the match. 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
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Frequent Flooding In Lismore/ Cappoquin Roads

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Inquiry Into **Drowing Of** Fishery

Following the drowning of four fishery protection officers when their fibre glass patrol vessel capsized shortly after 9 a.m. last Saturday morning as they were attempting to haul in a monofilament net 1.5 miles off Ballycotton on the East Cork coast, the Minister for the Marine.

Mr. John Wilson has ordered a full investigation into the circumstances of the tragedy that has rocked the entire south coast.

The officers who lost their lives were named as Benno Haussmann (in his late 50's), Barra O'Longaigh (28), Dominic Meehan (42) all of Cork city and Barry O'Driscoll (43), Bandon. Sole survivor of the tragedy was Michael Fanning, jnr., Fermoy, who endured nearly four hours in the water before being rescued by a trawler which came on the scene.

The Southern and South-Western Region Fishery Boards have also begun internal investigations into the tragedy.

APPOINTMENT OF INSPECTOR.

The Minister for the Marine, Mr. Wilson, has expressed his condolences to the families of Mr. Benno Haussmann, Mr. Barra O'-Longaigh, Mr. Barry O'-Driscoll and Mr. Dominic Meehan, the officers who lost their lives in the disaster to the regional fishery board protection vessel at Ballycotton, on Saturday last.

He has also appointed Captain William A. Kirwan, Marine Surveyor in his Department as Inspector to report to him upon the loss. He has asked Captain Kirwan to report as soon as possible on what steps are needed to prevent a recurrence.
