Prison Sentence Adjourned For A Year

A self-confessed alcoholic was given a chance when he appealed against the severity of concurrent four-month prison sentences at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week.

The appellant, John O'Donnell, with an address at 40, Childers Estate, Dungarvan, had been sentenced for assaulting a garda officer and stealing goods from local shop premises last March.

The court was told that on March 10, the Gardai were called to a local restaurant because of a disturbance when the defendant refused

to leave the premises. He became violent and hit one of the Gardai as he was being put into the patrol car. On the following day there was a series of larcenies from local shops and the defendant was found in possession of the stolen property, all of which had been recovered.

Mr. S. Lanigan-O'Keefe, B.L. (instr. by Lanigan &

Curran) for the appellant said that O'Donnell is now receiving treatment for his alcoholic problem and has not consumed alcohol since these incidents.

Increasing both sentences from four to six months, Judge D. P. Sheridan adjourned signing the warrants for one year to enable O'Donnell to continue his medical treatment.

"I am giving you your chance, I sincerely hope you will take it as you won't get anymore," Judge Sheridan told the appellant.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

YOU WOULD DIE IF YOU HAD NO FOOD

Isaiah in the first reading for Sunday, August 5, speaks of the Lord inviting His people to come to Him with the assurance that He'll lovingly provide for all their needs. The prophet tells them that they are at liberty to look elsewhere for their sustenance, but, if they do, they'll not only have to pay for it, but it will be an ongoing thing, because of its limitations. Follow the reading closely, and you'll note, the details, in which he describes this special food, would fittingly apply to the Eucharist. He was, as God's servant, able to see into the future, and watch people responding to God's call, gathering round His table and being refreshed with His heavenly bread. This idea of the Lord providing bread for His people is prefigured many times in the Old Testament. "I will feed you with the finest wheat . . ." Ps 63.5. And, if you read the account of Eliseus multiplying the loaves in 11 Kings 4, 42-44, you will find that it is almost like a blue-print for the miracle of the loaves and fishes as recorded in the Gospel.

Last Sunday, Paul mentioned we'd been called, and in the second reading he is saying, once you have accepted, nothing can separate you from the Lord. It means, God's grace will enable you to reject and to overcome all temptations and difficulties. He adds, there is no greater power than love of God. Hence, because God is on your side, you are assured of victory unless you betray Him through your own weakness. It is the same as saying, God's grace is so powerful that the devil will never be in a position to overcome you, unless you yourself open the door. St. Augustine puts his finger on successful co-operation with God when he said: "The devil is like a chained dog. He'll never be able to bite you unless you move into his range." So, if you love God, you will not let Him down. In times of trouble or of temptations, you know God is near: you have only to

call for help, and He'll see you safely through your ordeal. You'll find that each victory will strengthen you, but, always celebrate your success by giving thanks to God, and asking Him for His continued guidance and help.

Sometimes, we are apt to be unduly upset when we are assailed by temptations of an unmentionable nature. It is important and helpful to bear in mind that as long as your heart has not turned from God, you should rather rejoice in having been called to undergo such trials for Him. Sin is not in the temptation. It is in the will. The question is, did I want it? So long as one's heart rejects it, there is no sin. I know it is often easy to be upset and muddled about temptations, but it is better to leave them rest. Do not go sieving among the ashes! When you next go to Confession, tell the priest: you were a bit worried about some temptations, and you confess them in so far as you may be guilty of any fault. You need not worry. The priest will understand.

St. Matthew in the Gospel records how Jesus worked a wonderful miracle to provide food for the multitude. The Apostles would have sent the people away to fend for themselves, but Jesus, in His compassion, saw that the people were tired and hungry, and said, there is no need to send the people away. Like the prefigurements in the Old Testament, Matthew when describing this miracle, presents the actions of Jesus in much the same terms, which he employed to record the Lord's actions at the Last Supper. It follows, he was in no doubt but that the multiplication of the loaves foreshadowed the multiplication of Christ's nourishing presence in the Eucharistic Bread. In the wilderness, the loaves and fishes were Christ's gift, in the Mass, the Lamb of God is His gift. The Mass tells us who Christ is, and what He did to provide food for His people. In the Mass He fulfils His promise to be with us. He erected His Church

around the Eucharistic Sacrifice, so that it will withstand the storms and tempests of time. And, because the Mass is a power for good, people will gather around the Table of God, and draw life and strength from its living waters. The Mass is other things too, but as the theme of the readings deals with the Lord's nourishment, we will stay with that aspect.

GOD'S HEAVENLY BREAD

Come then as Isiah invited, and sit down at the Lord's table, where you'll be replenished and nourished with God's heavenly bread. And, there in God's sunshine, you will grow strong, and become more like your Father in Heaven. The Bread of Life will fill you with the spirit of Christ, so that you'll only want to please your Heavenly Father. Yes, you will indeed be subject to trials and temptations, but, because you now not only look like Christ, but you also behave like Him, you'll deal with them as opportunities to prove your love of God. You will find the more you love God, the more you will do for Him.

It is a pity the way we deal with God's teachings and especially the Eucharist. Oh! we believe all right. And, God does matter to us, but somehow we seem to be a bit lifeless and to lack conviction. Otherwise, we'd be different people, and we'd be determined to change the world. I feel we start off on the wrong foot! We keep our religion in a small compartment of our lives, whereas, our aim ought to be to put our life into our religion. It is called, doing everything for God. I did mention that the Mass is the soul of the Church, and that is her guarantee to last for all time. A wise person would build his life around the Mass. He'd bask in its limpid waters, and feed on its rich fruits, and as Isaiah said, he will live forever. "If you eat my flesh and drink my blood, I will raise you up on the last day."

TALLOW PUBLICAN TELLS JUDGE —

“My Son Skipped And Left Me Holding The Baby”

When a father and son had a falling out, the son cleared off to England and the father told Judge D.P. Sheridan at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week that “he left me holding the baby.”

That statement was made during the hearing of a civil action brought by M. J. Keane & Co. Ltd., Mineral Water Manufacturers and Wholesale Distributors, Dungarvan in which they claimed that a sum of £3653.86 was due to them by Patrick Barry, owner and licensee of the Bracken Bar, West Street, Tallow for goods supplied and delivered in 1985.

The defence was a denial that the sum was owing and that any debt incurred had been incurred by the defendant's son, Neil, who was at that time in full control of the running of the licensed premises.

Mr. J. O'Kelly B.L. (instr. by Neil Twomey & Co.) was for the plaintiffs and Mr. R. Walsh B.L. (instr. by Healy, Crowley & Co.) was for the defendant.

Mrs. Nora Barron stated in evidence that she was a

director of the plaintiff company and was in charge of taking orders and collecting money for the firm. When Mr. Barry bought the Bracken Bar in Tallow in 1982 she commenced taking orders and collecting money from him. The money was collected every month and he was afforded a two-months credit facility.

Mrs. Barron said that from 1983 to 1985, the defendant's son, Neil, was in the bar and while the transactions were then done by him she always understood that they were trading with Patrick Barry as the owner of the premises and he was still in the premises throughout that time.

In reply to a question by Judge Sheridan, witness said that usually the invoices for the goods delivered were made out to Mr. P. Barry.

In her direct evidence, Mrs. Barron went on to say that the debt now due arose in January 1985 from a cheque that was dishonoured. It was on foot of the December/January account for approximately £2,649 but by the time they found the cheque had bounced, a further month's credit was due bringing the total to nearly £4,000. She then stopped the credit facility but trade continued on a cash basis.

In cross-examination, Mrs. Barron said she did not remember ever having

been told by Paddy Barry that he was handing the business over to Neil or that he was opening a new bank account for him in February 1983.

Mary Dunford gave evidence of dealing with the account at M/s M. J. Keane & Co. and produced ledger folios of the defendant's account. She said that they had never received any formal notice that Mr. Neil Barry had taken over from Mr. P. Barry. She also produced a number of delivery dockets since 1985 which were signed by P. Barry.

Tom McGrath gave evidence of making deliveries for the plaintiff firm since January 1982 to the present time. He remembered commencing with Mr. P. Barry and sometime in 1983 the son, Neil came into the business. Mr. Barry said that his son would be running the pub for him but he never stated that he was handing the premises over to him. “I took it that Mr. P. Barry was still the boss,” said witness.

FELL-OUT

The defendant, Patrick Barry, said that he bought the Bracken Bar on January 18, 1982. In February, 1983 he gave it over to his son, Neil to run. He claimed he then informed all the suppliers of the change-over and the accounts were sent to his son who paid them. He had organised a new Bank ac-

count for him to set him up in the business. He said that he had also told Mrs. Barron of this.

To a question by the Judge, the defendant said that he was always the owner and the licensee of the premises.

Judge — And how are the plaintiffs going to get the money due to them?

Witness — Well Neil skipped off to England and he has left me holding the baby!

When Mr. O'Kelly put it to the witness in cross-examination: “This trouble arose when you fell out with Neil in 1985 and you told him to go,” witness replied “yes.”

Judge Sheridan giving his verdict said that he had been very impressed with the evidence given on behalf of M. J. Keane & Co. and was not impressed by the evidence of Mr. Barry who had admitted that he had been left holding the baby. While he had considerable sympathy for the defendant he said that it wouldn't have been any trouble for him to get his accountant to write to all the suppliers notifying them that Neil Barry was taking over and that he would not be liable for any future transactions. He was not satisfied from the evidence that M. J. Keane & Co. had been so notified and he held that Mr. P. Barry was liable to pay the bill and he accordingly gave a decree for the amount claimed with interest on it from the date of the issue of the civil bill.

Ban Children From The Farm

“The peaceful rural picture of the farm no longer exists. It is now a hive of industrial-like activity and a serious hazard to the careless and especially children,” said Mr. Donal Hynes, Chairman of the ICMSA Farm Services Committee.

The death rate as a result of farm accidents now stands at almost one per week and the number of serious injuries sustained even higher.

The ICMSA is encouraging members to be more careful with machinery and poisons and in particular is calling on farmers to ban children from farmyards.

“The time when farmers' children grew up playing on bales of hay is over. The farm, like any industrial work place, should be out of bounds to children.

This is difficult in view of the fact that the farm and farm home are normally located in the same area. However, despite inconvenience, safety must come first,” said Mr. Hynes.

“Farmers are ultimately responsible to ensure the safety of their farms. The fact that farmers must have adequate public liability insurance cover provides financial relief but nothing can compensate for the loss of life or limb through carelessness,” concluded Mr. Hynes.

Was Looking For Calf At Night With Spear And Lamp

When a 64-year-old unemployed labourer was found on the bank of a well known salmon fishing river late at night, equipped with a lamp and a spear, he claimed he was out looking for a white calf, Dungarvan Circuit Court heard last week.

Matthew Kiely, Ballingown, Leamybrien, Dungarvan, appealed against the severity of fines totalling £200 imposed on him in the District Court on three charges related to illegal salmon fishing on the river Tay on January 27 last.

The court was told the incident took place during the closed salmon season.

When told that Kiely's general circumstances are not great, Judge D. P. Sheridan reduced the fines from £200 to £30 but directed that he still pay £70 expenses to the Southern Regional Fisheries Board.

Water Safety Courses Next Week

Instruction courses in water safety, swimming and lifesaving organised by the National Safety Council will take place next week from August 6 to 11 at Dungarvan (Clonea Strand) and Youghal.

Classes are open to the public and enquiries as to times can be ascertained locally.

Stud Farm Worker's Award Upheld

Coolmore Stud/Castlehyde And Associated Stud Farms, Fethard, Co. Tipperary, at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week appealed a decision of the Employment Appeals Tribunal which had awarded £1,000 to Eugene Lawrence, Kilkennybeg, Killenaule, Thurles, following his dismissal from his employment at the Coolmore Stud on February 1, 1988.

After a lengthy hearing Judge D. P. Sheridan upheld the £1,000 award granted by the Tribunal to Lawrence for unfair dismissal. He also awarded costs of £400 to Lawrence together with his travelling expenses from England for the hearing of the appeal.

Judge Sheridan said he believed that Lawrence was spoken strongly to about his not turning up for work regularly on Saturday mornings, but he was not satisfied that the Coolmore management had "done the necessary" as far as that was concerned before actually dismissing him.

The personnel manager at Coolmore, Jerome Casey, said that Lawrence was employed by the stud in 1983 on the basis of a 40-hour working week. However, he was also told he would be expected to work from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturdays at an overtime rate.

Mr. Casey said that in January 1986 Lawrence,

who was employed on the farm, refused to help out with the bloodstock. He then left voluntarily but three weeks later on the intervention of his father Lawrence was taken back.

Witness went on to say that in 1987 some employees asked if they could have some Saturday mornings off and management agreed provided advance notice was given. However, subsequently Lawrence did not turn in on Saturday mornings and was given a number of verbal warnings before his eventual dismissal.

Eugene Lawrence said he worked every Saturday morning which he had been asked to work. He never refused a request to work Saturdays and was never once warned, verbally or in writing, that his job was on the line if he didn't work Saturday mornings.

Judge Sheridan said he believed that Lawrence must have known that Saturday work was mandatory during the busy time of the year at least. However, while Lawrence was undoubtedly given out to when he failed to come to work on Saturdays he did not believe that, in the end, the management had gone as far as is necessary for them to go when dismiss-

ing him.

Judge Sheridan upheld the £1,000 Employment Appeals Tribunal award to

Lawrence. It was "modest" he said, but given all the circumstances he would not vary it upwards.

Childers Estate Play Scheme '90

Some parents in Childers Estate got together and decided to form a play scheme for the children of the estate. The scheme is being run for two weeks. The first week runs from 16 to 20 July. The second week runs from 6 to 10 August. As so many children wanted to take part in the scheme, we formed two age groups.

From 10.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m., we cater for children from 3-6 years. These children take part in different activities: storyreading, drawing, painting, making things, playing games, short walks and visits to areas of importance to the community-like the Garda Station and fire station.

Know Your Rights

Q. — In a recent Rights Column it said that a person may be allowed do spare-time work and still be paid their full Unemployment Benefit. I have been on Unemployment Benefit for six months and was recently offered part-time evening work as a cleaner. The Exchange wouldn't accept that this was spare-time work and said I must sign off for any day on which I did this evening work. Were they right and what can I do about it?

A. — In their very informative new booklet on Unemployment Benefit SW65, available at Employment Exchanges, the Dept. of Social Welfare have this to say about spare-time working.

'Spare-time' work must be work that could ordinarily have been done by you in addition to your usual job and outside the ordinary working hours of the job. Generally you do not qualify for Unemployment Benefit for any day during which you are employed or self-employed. However, subject to certain conditions it may be possible to do some spare-time work and still get Unemployment Benefit for the day in question.

You didn't state what your normal day time job was. People who normally work shift hours, i.e. nurses, hotel staff, barpersons, wouldn't generally come under this spare-time rule.

If you had been doing this spare-time evening work in addition to your regular job before you became unemployed, you might have stood a better chance.

If this evening work is different to your normal day-time work, then, it might be a question of convincing the Exchange that you are still available for and actively seeking work.

If you have less than 78 weeks PRSI in the previous three years, then, your earnings from the spare-time job may not be more than £4 per day.

You can appeal against the decision. If you decide to do this you should ask for the precise grounds on which you were refused. If you need help with your appeal contact your nearest Community Information Centre.

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

EMIGRATION DROPS, UNEMPLOYMENT INCREASES

We have, several times in the past, pointed to the fact that the twin evils of emigration and unemployment in this country are closely intertwined. It was because of the high rate of emigration that the jobless numbers were kept from going right through the roof. However this was never admitted by the Government or by the government agencies who provide the statistics on a monthly basis, which are supposed to inform us as to the numbers on the live register, or in other words unemployed, and which we have been expected to accept as gospel.

Initial figures for the month of July indicate a dramatic increase in the country's jobless as compared with the number out of work in June. This latest increase comes on top of the exceptional rise of 6,200 which brought the overall number of unemployed in the country to 221,800 last month, which represents 17% of the workforce and gives us the second worst unemployment rate in the E.C.

When the preliminary figures for July surfaced, they came as a shock to government officials who immediately ordered an inquiry to check the reasons for the substantial rise. We understand that one of the main reasons appears to be a slowdown in emigration, particularly to the U.S. Recent changes in the U.S. including the crackdown on 'illegals' and the drive to prosecute employers who take on people without proper visas, are cited as significant factors in fewer people seeking jobs there. An examination of emigration totals to the U.S. for May-June last year compared with this year revealed a decrease of around 3,000.

Other factors which are

stated to be responsible for the dramatic rise have been cited as the large numbers of Irish people who have been returning from Britain, fewer students getting employment abroad and a big increase in the black economy.

The official figures for July will be released later this week but they will effectively show how closely inter-connected emigration and unemployment have always been and how every Government in the past has allowed emigration as a means of keeping the jobless totals at a respectable level.

BANDON CHOIR HAS DUNGARVAN CONNECTION

On a visit to Dungarvan last Sunday were the members of St. Patrick's Church Choir from Bandon, Co. Cork, who sang at last Mass in St. Mary's Parish Church. Director of the four-part choir was Brendan Power and his wife Anne was organist. Brendan is a native of the Old Boro' and is now living in Bandon.

The beautiful singing of the visiting choir was much appreciated by the congregation and added greatly to the solemnity of the occasion.

RUSSIAN VISITORS

A group of young boys from the Chernobyl area in Russia are this week completing a four-week holiday which they have spent in Co. Waterford under the auspices of the Catholic Boy Scouts Organisation.

The first part of the holiday was spent at the Scout Centre at Mount Melleray and for the past week they have been house guests of a number of families in Abbeyside.

The group is accompanied by Tanya Usova who comes from Minsk and who acts as interpreter. She has an excellent command of the English language and she, with one of her companions paid a visit to the 'Leader' office on Monday last. Tanya told us that they were all enjoying their holiday and were absolutely delighted with the friendliness of the people and the great hospitality with which they were everywhere received. The group is due to leave on their return home on Saturday next.

The sad feature of the matter is that the boys were caught up in the terrible nuclear disaster which took place in Chernobyl a couple of years ago with disastrous consequences for everyone concerned.

We join in wishing them well on their return to their homeland.

NI H-E LA NA GAOITHE....

We were reminded of the old Irish proverb which warns that "ni h-e la na gaoithe, la na sgoib" as we passed along Strandside

South, Abbeyside last Tuesday morning and spotted the unusual sight of a Thatcher at work on the roof of the snug homestead of the Tierney family.

For the benefit of those who may not know Irish, the proverb simply means that the windy day is not a day for roof repairs. Thatched houses are rather a rarity in these times and the Tierney home must be one of the last of its kind remaining in the locality. However it has withstood the test of time and the Tierney family have maintained it in perfect trim and condition through all the years. Indeed it must be getting more and more difficult for them to do so as thatchers must now be almost scarcer than thatched dwellings.

Of course the appearance of a Thatcher at work also indicated that the year is passing and that winter is looming ahead. This thought also came to mind on Tuesday morning for, although it was still only the last day of July and the sun was shining high and bright in the sky, the sight of a Thatcher on the job showed the wisdom of the old saying that "la na gaoithe" is not ever "la na sgoib", the sgoib, of course, being an essential part of the material with straw used by the Thatcher in plying his trade.

THE PARAPHERNALIA OF OUR HIGHER COURTS

We have referred before to the fact that it is now beyond time for the legal eagles of our higher courts to drop the paraphernalia and trappings

which they use during these court appearances. Wigs and gowns are relics of the old ascendancy days and whatever about the gowns, wigs certainly should be dispensed with in these modern times.

The idea was again resurrected last week during the Circuit Court sittings in Dungarvan when, due to the very warm and humid weather conditions, the presiding Judge gave the signal to discard the wigs. The result was that the court took on a more human image and one that

would, most certainly, be more acceptable to the ordinary layman.

Of course the judiciary, the benchers and the barristers — senior and junior — will strenuously object to any moves which might see them stripped of these trappings of office. The gowns and wigs, they know, endow them with an aura of power and superiority and will not lightly be given up. But it is, as we have said, beyond time to drop this fancy dress and to modernise the image of our superior courts.



Cuttings give a good start for next year

GARDENERS putting their back into the heavy winter digging tend to mutter about looking forward to sitting out in the summer, enjoying the fruits of their labour.

The truth is that they are often gardening even in August, arguably when the garden is at its best and there seems little to do.

It's probably a mixture of the gardener's love of "pottering" and the fact that there are always a few chores to be done.

One of the nicer jobs is taking cuttings of plants like geraniums, saving pounds by starting healthy young stock for next year's pots, boxes and baskets.

Rooting

Make a clean cut across a sturdy shoot just below a leaf joint and strip off the lower leaves before neatly firming into a tray or pot of cutting compost.

There is no need for rooting compound but beware of overwatering and moist conditions or mould and rot will soon set in. Keep them in a sunny and airy spot and they will quickly take.

Ensure that your displays of roses, dahlias and chrysanthemums carry on blooming, by cutting away spent flower heads to make way for new buds.

On the cutting front, you could also give your hedges a neat final clipping before autumn so that they have time to recover from the close-cropped look.

You should also think carefully about what you may be planting in autumn and start preparing the sites. Shrubs and trees, for instance, are best planted then unless they are container-grown.

You will also be planting bulbs for next spring so prepare the ground for them at the same time as lifting



amaryllis (hippeastrum) and lily bulbs and begonia tubers, once they are finished for the season.

August is also a good time to consider sowing a lawn or preparing and re-seeding any bald patches in an existing lawn. New areas need to be broken up and raked into a fine and level composition, pepped up with peat or fine and well-rotted material from the compost heap.

Sow the grass seeds in the density recommended on the packet and lightly rake the soil over them. Most seed is treated with a repellent but foil strips or plastic netting will help keep the birds away.

Lifting

Cats also have an irritating tendency to churn up and foul newly broken soil but can be deterred by strewing a few canes and twigs across the area. They are usually too lazy to pick a way through these.

More sowing can be done in the vegetable patch where planting brassicas — brussels sprouts, broccoli and cabbage — should now be completed. As they go in, onions should be nearly ready for gently lifting and, once thoroughly brushed, clear of soil and dried, look great if plaited and hung in the kitchen until needed.

If you grow your own herbs you can also be gathering these on clear days for bunching and drying, either by laying out on newspaper or hanging in the airing cupboard, ready for use in the winter dishes.



Successful Appeal Against Jail Sentence

Martin Duggan (23) of Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan successfully appealed against the severity of a jail sentence imposed on him when he appeared before Judge D. P. Sheridan at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week.

Mr. A. V. Maher, State Solicitor told the Court that on April 6, 1989 the defendant was seen assaulting a person by Garda T. Murphy who then went after him and as the Garda was about to arrest him, the defendant became aggressive and violent. On January 5 last as Gardai were investigating the breaking of a window in O'Connell Street, a group of people gathered of which the defendant was one and he used threatening language to the Gardai on the occasion.

The defendant was charged and convicted and received a prison sentence

against which he was now appealing.

Garda Tony Deegan told Judge Sheridan that the defendant's problem was that when he took drink he became violent. "He has now cut down on his drinking and has not come under attention since," said Garda Deegan.

Judge Sheridan said that mainly because of what Garda Deegan had said he was prepared to suspend the jail sentence and to place the defendant on probation for a year. "You are now getting your chance and I hope you will avail of it," the Judge told Duggan. He then adjourned the charge and remanded the defendant on probation on continuing bail until next year when he would then get a report from the Probation Officer on the matter.

World Cup Review

DUTCH THREAT



Four days after Ireland's draw with Egypt we were on the road again for the make or break match against the European champions, Holland. Were the Dutch coming into form? Would our greatest adventure end in ruins? This was the big one.

The journey was as before but by arriving in Palermo at about 2 p.m. we had more time to see the city before kick off at 9 p.m. After a light snack from our own supplies we explored the area near the stadium and while the business and shopping areas had the usual attractive shop fronts and wide streets, the overall impression was of high-rise apartments, some modern and in good repair but many in drab, even dilapidated condition.

At one stage we entered an electrical shop which sold tv's, stereos, etc., attracted by a wrist watch that we mistakenly thought was £25, instead of £75! The store was unattended but as we browsed around within two minutes we were joined by 2 policemen who stayed with us as we casually studied the prices, and then remained until we left. Coincidence? Obviously the Italians were taking no chances, irrespective of the good behaviour of the Irish supporters. The alcohol ban was still operating and when we discovered some later in a supermarket we thought our luck was in. But the owner was adamant, we had to settle for cans of coke at the reasonable price of 75p each.



Driving in Palermo seems to be the law of the jungle with traffic snarling up frequently amid drivers sounding their car horns in a

crescendo of noise and Italian frustration. When they do get going they swing right or left at will and the whole thing is complicated by the parking of cars that suggests total abandonment rather than organised parking. Coupled to all that are the scooters which swerve through this organised chaos like players in some computer game who, to our amazement, did not receive the "game over" sign.

The Italians were by now won over to the Irish cause and many of them wished us well against the Dutch. Some of the younger fans were chanting "Tony Cascarino" in reference to the Irish striker's Italian ancestry.

The Dutch, as noisy and boisterous as ever, joined with the Irish singing and chanting at the steps of a local memorial of some kind. Meeting with Irish supporters just over from Dublin we were brought up to date on the Eamonn Dunphy controversy, but we had more important things on our mind as we joined the queues and searches before we took our category 4 seats.



Looking back from the stairway going into the stand, you could see vast crowds of Irish supporters with their flags, banners and bodhrans

— one group led by a piper playing "We're All Part of Jackie's Army" on his bagpipes.

The Irish outnumbered the Dutch by at least 5 to 1 and our hopes and the tension were high as the national anthem rang round the stadium. Holland immediately settled into their game and the Gullit score after 6 minutes was Dutch football at its best. Ireland responded, but despite penalty claims and an offside decision against the luckless Aldridge, half time arrived with what seemed indecent haste. No report from the England-Egypt game at half time but the second half saw the Irish play their best football of the tournament, but would we score? As the minutes ticked by we wondered what next, then Charlton's last throw of the dice — Whelan and Quinn in at the deep end.



The goal has been seen many times since, but when the "Mighty" Quinn turned Van Breukelen's fumble high into the net I was prob-

ably the last Irish supporter to celebrate. Mindful of Ireland's bad luck with offside decisions in the past it wasn't until the referee gave the all clear that I joined in the celebrations. The scenes that followed this goal I had never witnessed at a game before. Thousands of Irish supporters singing and dancing in unison, so much so that the stand was bouncing beneath our feet in time to the singing. Rumours of Mafia World Cup fraud came to mind, did they skimp on the construction of this stand? Would it collapse beneath these thousands of singing and dancing supporters?

Back on the pitch both sides were content to play out the remaining minutes — the final whistle and we were through to another chapter of Irish soccer history — the knockout stages beckoned.



Back on the road by 12.30 a.m., our convoy stops in a small town near our ferry port of Pozzello where at 5.30 a.m. we spent the next 3 hours killing time before our ferry departure at 9 a.m.

Joining in the mood of celebration we are given a complimentary can of Guinness on board the catamaran and we watched the video of the game during our crossing to Malta. At the grand harbour of Valetta we were met by a welcoming party from our apartments and were driven back in a jeep with our flags and scarves flying.

A welcome breakfast accompanied by champagne meant the 800 kilometres, 31 hour round trip ended in suitable celebration of a famous achievement.

SEAN KELLY SHOWS HIS SPRINTING POWER

Ireland's Sean Kelly gave sun-splashed Brighton a glimpse of his sprinting ability last Sunday when he rocketed out of a nine man group to snatch second place in the Wincanton Classic.

Sadly, for the Irishman, lone Italian Gianni Bugno had crossed the line in first place some 13 seconds earlier to register his 10th win of the season and take the overall lead in the Perrier World Cup Series.

Bugno (Chateau D'Ax) had gone clear of the leading group of 16 riders on the steep climb of Wilson Avenue, just under three miles from the end of this 148 mile marathon, winning in a time of six hours 9.51 minutes.

WORLD CUP LEADER

The Italian, who was lying second in the World Cup, takes over the lead from non-starter Moreno Argentin, while Rudi Dhaenens, who finished third behind Kelly, moves up one place to second

overall.

Like Argentin, who now lies third overall, triple Tour de France winner Greg LeMond was also a non-starter, suffering from saddle soreness. Stephen Roche was 46th, two minutes and twenty-three seconds down.

Kelly declared himself fairly happy with the result. "My form isn't really good yet but I hope it will improve for the San Sebastian Classic, the Zurich Grand Prix and the World Championships".

Kelly's name was prominent among those painted on the road and he later acknowledged the encouragement he received from the thousands of fans clinging to the steep bank.

The contractor, local firm Willie Fennell & Sons, are doing a superb job, and the whole thing is taking excellent shape.


MEETING

G.A.A. NOTES

County Board Meeting

The chairman, Eamonn Murphy told last week's meeting of the Senior Board that the Roanmore/Portlaw senior hurling championship game fixed for Walsh Park on July 1 was postponed because of the continuous heavy rain all day. He said in answer to a complaint by Portlaw that the County Secretary and Treasurer took the decision in consultation with the two clubs involved.

He said at that stage it was unlikely that the weather was going to improve so dramatically and it was unfortunate that patrons who were not aware of the decision had turned up for the match.

CISDE PEIL REPORT

The appointment of selectors at senior and under 21 level was reported in last week's issue and the report from the above committee also dealt with the acquisition of a football coach.

In a verbal report from Coisde na Peil, it was stated that the committee favoured getting the services of a high profile coach for the seniors only and recommended that he be given three weeks with the players during the preparation stage for the league and that he remain on for a further six, for their three first matches. It was felt that in this period, the usefulness of the coach could be judged and if they were pleased and satisfied, the services of the man could be retained.

Several delegates, including Nioclás Mac Craith, who had moved the motion to have a coach, on behalf of the club, were critical of the recommendation as they felt that the period given him was too short. They felt that he should be given at least a year and many didn't seem very concerned when it was pointed out that the cost of the services of a top-class coach for that length of time would be very high.

After a long discussion, the matter was referred back again to Coisde na Peil.

After the Board had unanimously agreed to field a junior football team in next year's Munster championships, Coisde na Peil were asked to recommend names for appointment to that committee.

JUNIOR HURLING

The idea of entering a junior hurling team in the provincial championships was discussed and reference was made to the dismal performances of the county teams in that grade over the past two seasons. The problems related to the preparation of the junior hurling team this year, were outlined by one of the selectors, P. J. Ryan and others agreed that some of the problems were insurmountable. When a vote was taken, delegates voted overwhelmingly in favour of affiliating again.

After a short discussion it

was agreed that the Board would support the idea of having all the intercounty competitions, including championship and league completed within the calendar year and the Council representative was instructed to vote in favour when the matter is being decided at the Central Council meeting on August 11. This will mean that the national hurling and football leagues will commence in February and be played through to a finish before the start of the Munster championships in late May.

There would be three double rounds, i.e. hurling and football, both on the same day and both leagues will take fourteen rather than twenty-one weeks to run.

SUSPENSIONS

Arising out of referees' reports the following were imposed: C. O'Brien, Stradbally, 2 weeks; M. Jacob, St. Saviours, 2 months; L. O'Connor, Erin's Own, 2 weeks; N. Weldon, Stradbally, 2 months; G. Kirwan, Clonea, 2 months.

UNDER-21 HURLING REPORT

The chairman said that this made pleasant reading, even though we lost the game. Running the All-Ireland champions so close with a hastily prepared team was most encouraging. It was unfortunate that three of our most prominent players were not available on the night. Others praised the efforts of the team and selectors.

There had been the feeling around that the five under 21 selectors would have been given a vote of confidence and returned as a group for another term. This did not happen after the chairman asked if the matter would be left to Coisde Gnotha to come up with recommendations to the next meeting. It was obviously the wish of the meeting that the same men would be returned.

MINOR FOOTBALL

This report was embodied in a very comprehensive document which dealt with many aspects of minor football training and preparation and gave full account of the activities of the minor group for the year. The chairman thanked the committee for submitting such a thought provoking report and from which he read some paragraphs to the meeting.

FINANCE

The overall cost of the preparation of the various

teams in the championships is to be given to the next meeting of the Board and it is expected that the figure will be in excess of £50,000.

NEXT MEETING

It was agreed that no meeting will take place during the month of August and the next meeting will be held on Monday, September 3.

MUNSTER FINAL TICKETS

For the recent Munster hurling final at Thurles, this County Board was given an allocation of stand tickets as were the other neutral counties. Because of the demand by patrons here we appealed for more tickets and we

were accommodated as far as possible. In the end almost everyone was satisfied.

However, I refer to the matter now because on the Saturday morning before the final several hundred stand tickets became suddenly available in Cork city and were sold to patrons throughout the day.

What is very annoying about all this is that purchasers were informed that these tickets had become available because Waterford had returned a large number that they were not able to dispose of. A friend of mine told me that the announcement came from an official source in Cork. Whoever made the statement was telling a lie about Waterford. Seamus Grant confirmed to me that we did not have enough tickets for ourselves for the Munster final.

Faha will be fancied to win their game at Colligan but the other is more difficult to forecast. Perhaps Modeligo, who have been in action quite a lot in football in recent weeks, will keep up their winning streak and survive this test.

Dungarvan Youth Must Pay Compensation Says Judge

A 16-year-old Dungarvan youth, who was involved in the larceny of rings valued £2,700 last year, appealed against the severity of a 12 months term of detention before Judge D. P. Sheridan at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week.

The court heard that the youth entered a private dwellinghouse at Ballyneety, Dungarvan, on July 30 last year and stole a total of eleven rings, five of which had been recovered.

The youth in evidence, however, told Judge Sheridan that two older people were with him during the robbery, while his counsel said he had retracted their

involvement in a statement which he subsequently made about the robbery because of the fear of physical violence from them.

The youth insisted that he had only stolen seven rings which he sold for a total of just £55.

Judge Sheridan adjourned the detention order for one year to see how the appellant behaves during that time. But he said that he had a duty to protect the people of Dungarvan and he directed that if the youth was working that he put aside a sum of £300 as "some recompense" to the owner of the stolen rings.
