# Dungarvan Nurse Amon Irish Trapped Pretty Wedding In Baghdad

Within four days of arriving in Baghdad where she was to commence a twelve months contract as a member of the nursing staff at the PARC hospital there, a young Dungarvan nurse found herself caught up in the turmoil which has been sparked by the invasion of Kuwait by the Iraqi forces of Saddam Hussein of Iraq.

Nurse Lucy Kiely (23) flew out from Dublin en route to the Iraqi capital on July 29 and had hardly settled into her job when the invasion of Kuwait took place on Thursday, August 2

The youngest in a family of six of Mr. Maurice Kiely and Mrs. Jenny Kiely, "Sweet Briar", Newline, Abbeyside, Nurse Kiely has three brothers and two sisters. Having trained initially at the County & City Infirmary Waterford, she transferred to Ardkeen Regional Hospital following the closure of the Infirmary

and qualified there in November, 1989.

She served for a period on the Nursing Staff of the Mater Private Hospital in Dublin but then having decided she needed a change she enrolled with the Aer Lingus subsidiary PARC which administers the hospital in Baghdad and left Dublin on July 29 to take up her new job. Now as one of the 248 Irish personnel at the hospital she is a virtual prisoner since Iraq closed its borders.

### PHONE CALL HOME

When we called to Nurse Kiely's home in Abbeyside on Monday, we spoke to her mother, Mrs. Jenny Kiely who is prominently associated with the ICA at Guild and Federation levels in the county. She was glad to be able to inform us that she had a phone call from Lucy in Baghdad last Saturday night which brought her the good news that she was well.

She said that Lucy told her that while everybody at the hospital was very depressed by the turn of events and by the fact that they were trapped in the Iraqi capital, they were working as usual in the hospital and putting on the best face possible in the difficult situation in which they now found themselves. As long as they remained within the confines of the hospital they felt safe, she said.

Mrs. Kiely said that while she and her husband were very worried and anxious about Lucy's position they were quite relieved to have received her 'phone call and were hoping that the Irish Government and the Executive Officials of the PARC organisation who were now in Iraq, would succeed in obtaining permission to evacuate their personnel from the danger area with the least possible delay.

We understand that an Aer Lingus plane in on standby to fly to Baghdad to bring the personnel at the hospital home as soon as the necessary agreement has been reached.


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# International Judging Panel To Visit Stradbally

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# Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

**UNLIMITED MERCY** 

Whatever they may say about the old catechism, it was a most effective instrument in getting results. Certainly, since it vanished from the schoolroom, a void, yes a big void has been left. Those who were blooded and weaned in the old school will remember without difficulty the answer to the question: why did God make you? He made me to know him, to love him, to serve him in this world and to be happy with him for ever in the next. And, as they progressed in knowledge, they learned that God gives sufficient help to each and everyone to enable them to fulfil the purpose of their existence. It is clearly the will of God that all should be saved. However, we must not overlook the fact that God has left the decision to each individual to use or not to use God's help. Hence, ultimately, our salvation rests with ourselves. God will force no one into Heaven. And, because the reward is so great, and there's so much at stake, it would be sheer lunacy for one to throw away one's birthright.

Isaiah, in the first reading, insists that God wills the salvation of all, and he makes it clear that non-Jews were not excluded. He points out that salvation is available to all whose works are acceptable to God. Obviously, he was correcting a false view that was current among the people when he stated that salvation depended solely and foremost on their attitude to God, and not on membership of any people or nation. He believed that foreigners could and did become servants of God through their faith and their good works. Whereas, as I indicated, the current view among the Jews was, salvation was the prerogative of their people. Isaiah was not deterred from saying: "My house will be called a house of prayer for all the peoples." He was not the only one to state this truth for Amos among others declared that foreigners can be saved if they subject themselves to the Lord. Isaiah is reminding all of us that God is the source of our strength. And, he is saying, be wise. Put your trust in God. Ask Him to continue with His protective care, and let your life be a perpetual act of thanksgiving.

St. Paul was the most forceful of all the Apostles in preaching salvation for the gentiles. In the second reading he laments that his own people, whom he dearly loved, had rejected the Good News. He goes on to say that the Lord, having reconciled the world, did not limit or restrict the consequent blessings to the chosen people. His intention was to rouse and to wake them up to their foolish folly by telling them that the pagans were opening their hearts to God's message. When he thinks of this great mercy, he prays with a lively hope that that same mercy will remove the stubbornness from his own beloved people, and open their eyes to the light. He argues from the fact that the pagans were once in deep error, but God did not abandon them. Surely, the Lord will show that same mercy to a people, who once served Him faithfully, even if they were now in darkness. If there is a note of happiness in Paul's words, it is because He knows his people will bow to God's mercy. He believes that what God did for the pagans, He will do for the Jews.

Paul explains the situation like this. Man is imprisoned by his human conditions, and limited by his weak, im-

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perfect and sinful nature, which embodies the story of man after the fall. Hence, all stand in need of being recreated through God's grace. When people try to do without God, He allows them to suffer the folly of their ways, so when eventually they look for help, they'll appreciate all the more His mercy.

In a nutshell, man's disobedience has provided the Lord with the opportunity, as in the case of the pagans, to prove His great love and mercy. And, because God is good, He will not withhold His mercy from His chosen people. I cannot help wondering if the return of the Jewish people to their homeland is a presage for the future! Have you ever said a prayer for the conversion of this great people.

### **GOD'S PLAN**

Having said all that, we must hold fast to God's plan of salvation as has been handed down to us by the Apostles, namely, to live and to serve God within the bounds of His Church. I believe as I have stated that others who serve God in unorthodox ways, but in accordance with their lights, will receive God's mercy, but that is not a ticket for anyone, who has received the word, to pick and choose for themselves. They know the way, the truth and the light, and to choose otherwise is to ignore God. The theme that salvation is available to all without exception is also stressed in the Gospel. Matthew emphasises that the Good News is intended also for pagans, and, that salvation is theirs, if they respond. Truly, the persistence of the woman begging Jesus for help is an example for all of us, and, so to speak, reading between the lines, it demonstrates that the way into the heart of God lies in the following route mapped out by Jesus. And, if you have any doubts, then listen and be guided by His Church, whom the Lord appointed for this work. Indeed, the world abounds with false teachers and prophets, all claiming to know the way, but, as I wrote to you recently, how can these self-styled experts guide you, when they are unable to find the way for themselves. Have you ever experienced the frustration of receiving wrong directions, and being sent miles out of your way? Be warned. The Lord has carefully marked the road to Heaven, and there is no alternative route.

# £1 Billion Turnover **For Waterford Foods** By 1993

Waterford Foods will again double turnover, to £1 billion, by the end of 1993, according to Stephen O'Connor, Managing Director. He was speaking at an Open Day on the farm of Jim Kirwan, Rathgormack, a Waterford Foods supplier and winner of the National Upjohn Quality Milk Award.

He said: "We are at the commodities to consumer point of launching a new strategic development plan for the next three years. It will be designed to ensure that the Group keeps pace with trends in the dairy industry, with special empha-

goods.

"At the beginning of our last development phase, 1986, almost 50 per cent of our products were in CAP assisted or commodity categories. At the end of this sis on switching from new phase, that figure will have been reduced to less than 20 per cent.

# More Memories Of Growing Up In

# **West Waterford**

A scare headline in one of the daily papers last week — "Kitchens alert as food poison soars in heat" made me think, 'what did people do fifty years ago in rural Ireland when there were no fridges nor freezers'? My memory goes back to when the only means we had of keeping food fresh was a small cupboard, which was kept outside the house, usually hung on a North facing wall. This had two side panels of perforated zinc so that the air could circulate and at the same time prevented flies or mice from entering. In this was kept all kinds of perishable food.

In those days people ate different food from what they eat today. Salted fish, known as "Lander Fish" was a great standby. This came from either Norway or Portugal and would last indefinitely if hung from the ceiling. It became very hard and had to be steeped overnight to render it more palatable. On one occasion when a local farmer was having the threshing on a Friday his wife was preparing the mid-day meal. As meat was not allowed on Fridays she decided to have the salted fish. A neighbour there to help on the night before advised her to put the fish in a running stream overnight to remove the salt. She foolishly agreed but when she went to the stream on the following morning the fish was gone. Her advisor had stolen it on his way home.

Bacon and cabbage was very popular fare in those days. Most people who fattened some pigs - maybe five or six at any one time — when they were ready for sale kept back the smallest one and fed it on for about two weeks on a mixture of Indian meal and crushed oats. The latter had the effect of making the back streaky. When this animal was ready for slaughter the local expert was called in. In our area that man was John Green. He organised the entire opera-

A big kitchen table was taken outside and placed near a ladder which was placed against a high wall or tree branch. The pig was killed on the table and immediately hauled up the ladder until its head was about two feet above the ground. The blood which flowed freely at that stage was collected in a basin. This done the carcase was then washed thoroughly with boiling water. The entrails were then removed and the heart, liver and kidneys were taken out for use on the following day.

Some of the large intestine was taken to the nearby stream and there cut into one foot lengths. These were washed meticulously. To do this they had to be turned inside out and this was cleverly done with a piece of stick about eighteen inches long. This stick had a burr at one end like a fishing hook. The stick was pushed through each length and pulled towards the operator. The burr had the effect of turning the piece inside out. When washed thoroughly they were placed in a bucket of salt and water and left

On the next day filling was made up of the blood. some cooked meat, patenmeal and spices. This mixture was then poured into each piece of gut which was tied in the shape of a ring. These rings were then cooked and left to set. The result was the highest quality black pudding.

### SALTING AND PICKLING

In the meantime the carcase was hung up in a cool house for about three to five days. Salting the pig was something to look forward to. The neighbours gathered again. The carcase was cut into usable pieces. Each piece had to be salted separately. This was done by rubbing the piece on a bed of coarse salt on a table. Some cuts were made in the pieces to ensure that the salt got into the centre. Everybody helped with this operation.

When the salting was completed the pieces were placed in a barrel of brine, which was then covered with hay and some big stones to ensure that all the pieces were submerged. The barrel was emptied after some weeks and the pieces were allowed to drain before they were hung up on the ceiling. The bacon could then be used as required and as time went on it became hard and black. So like the salted fish it had to be steeped before cooking. Those who helped on salting night were all given a piece of pork

Of course most people then had free range fowl so there was always a plentiful supply of fresh eggs. The eggs too used to be preserved in the Autumn for Winter use. This was done by placing them in a mixture of water glass and spring water. They would last in this for months. People were always busy in those days making provision for leaner times. # DDNSMAN Dakes You BannellineSkonnehm

### WAS THIS DUNGARVAN'S **OLDEST NEWSPAPER?**

During the past week we have been examining part of a page of a newspaper called "The Dungarvan Gazette" carrying the issue date of Saturday, September 7, 1872. That makes it all of 118 years old and it has posed the question for us, was this Dungarvan's oldest newspaper?

A composite advertisement running the length of the broadsheet page declared that the proprietor of the Gazette was one, Joseph Hansard, and that it was printed in his General Printing Office and was "the only paper printed within twenty-eight miles of the town." The location of the office was simply given as Dungarvan but it also incorporated a "Book, Stationery and Fancy Goods Warehouse" where school books, stationery, musical boxes, framed and unframed pictures, concertinas and much other such items could be purchased.

Where exactly the Gazette Office and warehouse was located in the town we have been unable to ascertain or who J. Hansard was. We are reminded that the official reports of the debates in the British House of Commons are, to this day, referred to as Hansards and whether there was any tieup between the Dungarvan Gazette Hansard and the House of Commons we are unable to say.

One of the public notices published on the page informed readers that the Annual Races were to come off "Near Dungarvan" on Monday and Tuesday, the 4th and 5th of November, 1872 and among the stewards listed were: The Most Noble Marquis of Waterford, Curraghmore; Lord Viscount Hastings, D.L. Whitechurch; Sir Nugent Humble, Bart., D.L., Cloncoskoran; Edward G. H. Odell, Esq., Carriglea, Dungarvan; Henry Matthews, Esq., M.P.; John A. O'Keeffe, Esq., J.P., Ballylemon Lodge; John R. Dower, Esq., J.P., Brewery Lodge; Richard U. Roberts, Esq., J.P., Coolnagour and John G. Hely, Esq., J.P., Glenshillane.

Another large advertisement pronounced the "Annual Clearance Sale of Summer Goods at Mc-Carthys, Blackpool, Dungarvan." This premises was obviously involved in the drapery trade and offered "a lot of stuffs, shawls, prints, etc., at half price." Where this premises was located in Blackpool (an old name for Upper O'Connell Street) we do not know either.

past and to see what and who were in Dungarvan all those years ago.

This uncalled for vandalism cannot to too strongly condemned. The Gardai in Dungarvan are investigating the rampage and it is to be hoped that the culprits will be identified and brought before the Court.

### **ABBEYSIDE TO** COMMEMORATE **COMING OF AUGUSTINIANS**

Plans are at an advanced stage to mark the 700th Anniversary of the coming of the Augustinian Fathers to Abbeyside and a special energetic organising committee are leaving nothing undone to ensure that the ceremonies for the historic occasion will run smoothly on Tuesday, August 28, the feast of St. Augustine and the traditional Pattern Day in Abbeyside.

Abbeyside Parish Church and its ancient ruined annexe known locally to the older generation in the Village as "The Cloghas" will be the scene of a pageant to depict the arrival by boat of the Friars or Hermits of St. Augustine from their mother house, Clare Priory in Suffolk, England.

An old story about the coming of the Friars relates that when they arrived in Dungarvan Bay, they were unsure of where they should land. Having prayed for guidance, they launched a stone effigy of St. Augustine on a small raft and where this came ashore they decided to build their Abbey. The ruins of this building, erected in or about the year 1290 is now what is known to the peostrand.

Up to fifteen or twenty years ago or more, the last remnants of the ruins of what was known as Mc-Grath's Castle stood nearby but all traces of this have long disappeared. The castle was owned by the Mc-Graths of Sleady, one of the most powerful families in the area who became benefactors of the Abbey and at least one of whom is reputed to have been buried in the Cloghas. The Nugent family of Cloncoskraine were also noted benefactors of the Abbey and the community which it housed.

A special Anniversary Mass on Tuesday, August 28 during which a Crystal Chalice will be presented to the Augustinians to mark the occasion will be the centre-piece of the celebrations which will also include the siting of a stained glass window depicting the arrival of the Friars 700 years ago, the publication of a booklet tracing the history of the establishment of the Order in Abbeyside and the floodlighting of the church building and the old

We can do with no better than to reiterate what appears in the current issue of the Abbeyside Parish News concerning the celebrations which says, "As this is a once-off event of great historical significance and will not happen again in the lifetime of the people of the parish, it is expected that the ceremonies will be given the full support and respect befitting such an occasion."







At Dunhill's request it has been transferred from Saturday to Friday and it will be played at Fraher Field instead of Stradbally.

The week-end programme also includes the Fourmilewater/Ballygunner senior hurling clash, but his has to do with relegation and will have no bearing on the championship proper. The only other match to be played will be the Faha/Modeligo play-off junior hurling game which is scheduled for Fraher Field as the opener to the senior match on Sunday after-

The three County Bord na n-Og Under-16 hurling finals will be played at Fraher Field on Saturday.

### **DUNGARVAN V.** DUNHILL

The switch of venue is going to be a slight advan-

tage to Dungarvan in their under-21 level in recent bid to qualify for a place in the quarter final, but I'm sure they will not be so foolish as to believe that the advantage will be of major importance because Dunhill invariably play very well in the Fraher Field and the records show that they have won more than they have lost here.

Judging by their most recent displays, Dungarvan will be looked upon as the form team in this clash. A Changed

System?

A ready-made solution, if acceptable, is there since convention last year and is embodied in the Lismore motion which proposed (for hurling), that it be run on a league-knockout system and confined to twelve teams. The championship run in four divisions of three teams, each of whom will play each other and the top two in each division going through to the K/O stages (quarter finals). The four bottom teams would play a relegation semi-final and final to determine the team to be demoted.

This motion will ensure three games at least for every hurling club and so structured, all matches would be real championship stuff.

With thirteen teams in the

present championship, two would have to go down in order to reduce the number to eleven and allow space for the new intermediate champions. I feel that pointless Cappoquin and Fourmilewater would have no objection to opting for intermediate until their standards improve, so no big difficulties would stand in the way of adopting the idea.

There would be nothing wrong with reducing the football championship to twelve - in fact it might improve standards a bit if it could be reduced to about eight — and a similar system could be adopted. This championship too, has disorganised itself as we saw on the league table last

# **National** Leagues Unchanged

At last Saturday's long drawn out meeting of Central Council the recommendations of the special committee set up eighteen months ago to examine the entire national league structures and having conducted a detailed analysis of the competitions, to report back and propose changes and restructuring where necessary, were temporarily shelved because of the great divergence of views by practically all the delegates at the meeting.

The report had been discussed by every County Board and for some weeks before this meeting it was felt that the proposed changes would be carried by a fair majority, but some county committees obviously changed their minds and opposed the changes which were being proposed. Just before the meeting it was predicted that the motion for change would be beaten by 22 votes to 18 votes and this is exactly what transpired.

After a long debate the matter was sent back to the Management Committee who will meet within two weeks to consider the points made by all counties and to consider other competitions, including county championships, etc. This means that the proposals have been rejected and the leagues will continue to be

see them changing from their present dates - October to April. The new system would have them begin in February and finish in May, with hurlers and footballers playing on the same Sunday (three occasions). It would lessen the pressure on Boards, etc., who would have the entire autumn to play club championships and it would avoid all the hassle about clubs releasing players for the league, etc. Waterford voted for the

change and having anticipated that it would come about, the Fixtures Committee fixed late October dates for the semi-finals and finals. 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

# Deliberate Slurry Dumping Causes Major Fish Kill In Tallow River

A major, and apparently deliberate pollution incident involving agricultural slurry occurred in the Glenaboy River near Tallow on Tuesday, August 9. Practically all fish life over a 4-mile stretch of the river was wiped out by this incident.

The Glenaboy River, which rises in Co. Cork and discharges to the River Bride directly North of Tallow, has been the subject of previous pollution incidents resulting in fish kills in recent years and was only just beginning to recover from a serious fish kill during the summer of 1988 when the latest incident occurred. Indeed, this pollution incident may well

be a final death-knell for and particularly deplores, what was once a thriving fishing river as many infant fish were destroyed

over the 4-mile stretch. A joint investigation into the incident by Waterford and Cork Co. Councils has concluded that the fish kill was caused by the deliberate and premeditated dumping of farm slurry into the river by vacuum tankers. The identity of the perpetrator of this outrageously shameful and callous act has not yet been ascertained as the dumping was carried out by stealth over a bridge on a narrow and little used roadway about three quarters of a mile on the Cork side of the county boundary. However, most of the resulting damage to the river occurred on the Waterford side of the boundary.

### HEAVY PENALTIES FOR OFFENDERS

The recently enacted Local Government (Water Pollution) (Amendment) Act 1990 allows for penalties up to £25,000 and five years imprisonment for water pollution offences and Waterford Co. Council have assured us they will not hesitate to prosecute for such offences. The Council will not tolerate,


the deliberate and premeditated dumping of polluting matter into any river which results in fish kills.

Enormous damage can be caused to rivers by polluting matter at this time of year when river flows are low and water temperatures and relatively high and the Council requests that extreme care be exercised by all persons in control of any polluting matter to ensure that water pollution incidents do not occur. Furthermore, any person responsible for an accidental spillage of polluting matter to any waters is obliged to notify the Co. Council as soon as possible afterwards.

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
