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New Act Will Give Council Muscle To Glear Up Derelict Sites

The new Derelict Sites Act would give the Council muscle to do certain clear up jobs especially in Urban areas, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley told members of Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday.

Referring to the "Explanatory Notes" on the Act circulated to the members, the Co. Secretary Mr. B. J. McNally drew special attention to two sections which he said were of particular importance.

One dealt with the definition of a "derelict site" and stated: Under the 1961 Act, the concept of "derelict site" applied only to structures which were actually in ruinous, dilapidated or dangerous condition and also excluded structures which were dwellings. This section's definition of "derelict site" makes no exclusion for dwellings, and adds to the previous criteria for dereliction considerations such as the neglected, unsightly or objectional condition of struc-

Another section obliges local authorities within one year of the commencement of the Act on June 27, 1990 to establish and maintain a register of derelict sites in their functional area.

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager, welcomed the Act which he said would now give the Council muscle to do certain clear up jobs. Under it they had 12 months to put their house in order and he proposed to designate a special officer in the Co. Council to take charge of derelict sites in the county. "And", said Mr. Hurley, "we should be brave enough at the end of the day to use the powers which the Act has given us to make CPOs to acquire derelict areas and to clear the sites for the construction of infill houses."

The Co. Manager added, "the important thing is for us to let it be known that this Derelict Sites Act is now in being.

DERELICT QUIGLEY PLANT

Cllr. Jackie Fahey, T.D., also welcomed the new Act and suggested that one of the first things which the Council should do under it was to get rid of the unsightly derelict

Quigley Magnesite plant at Ballinacourty outside Dungarvan. "This plant has been unused for ten years and is now absolutely derelict," he said. In reply to Cllr. P. Cahill

who queried whether the Act would be enforced equally across the board, the Co. Manager replied, "we will vigorously enforce this piece of legislation and there will be no exceptions."

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

PUT YOUR TRUST IN THE POWER OF GOD

Isaiah, in the first reading, tells us that Shebna, the usurper, displeased God, and his office and authority was taken from him, and handed over to Eliakim. His role was to be a leader and a father to the people of Jerusalem and the House of Juda. He was to be God's steward in shepherding God's people. It is evident that the Lord chose this faithful servant to exercise His authority, and rule over the House of David. Isaiah goes on to foretell that Eliakim would prove to be strong and stable in the discharge of his office. Clearly, the Lord has chosen him for this work, but, there's nothing unusual in this, because all through Sacred Scripture you meet such cases of Divine election. And, I need scarcely add, that why one is chosen in preference to another, is beyond man's power of understanding, for, as you well know, the providence of God is a mystery. Indeed, it is not unheard of, to have someone appointed to an office, who, to put it bluntly, is more of a hindrance than a help. Such occurrences are often sent to try our patience and our humility, Or, it may be a case of people getting what they deserve! There's only the one safe approach or solution for all such happenings in life, and that is, to bow and accept God's holy will. Of course, it will not be easy. That is why humble acceptance is a wonderful prayer.

St. Paul tells us, in the second reading, why we should humbly bow and accept God's will to the best of our ability, because He has infinite wisdom and knowledge. There's always a good purpose in the way He ordains, and arranges the course of events. He does not make mistakes. It is almost superfluous to add that His infinite wisdom is so far above and beyond man's understanding that it defies all measurement. However, because God's love is also infinite, we can safely hold a firm and unwavering trust in whatever way He distributes His largess. Yes, even when in our foolishness we fall into serious sin, we are, through His help, able to rise to greater heights in His service. That's why, when we have done wrong, we can say to ourselves, put the past behind, and turn to God and make a

Truly, we have a great, a patient and a loving God. His love is so great that it is not possible for man to grasp its power or its depth. It brings home to us the vast abyss that stands between our limited knowledge and the infinite wisdom of God. So, it would amount to sheer foolishness to dare question, why God chooses one above another to administer a particular office. Paul feels it would be a profitable exercise to place out littleness side by side with God's greatness. For instance, could you hold the world in your hand? Could you light a candle from a star? God is able to light a candle from the most distant star, and He is able to hold the universe in His hand. Having thus reminded you of the power of the Supreme Being, Paul is saying, do not try to dictate to God.

The Lord has already generously poured out His riches on the world through His Son Jesus Christ. It is up to each of us to gather the share He has awarded to us, and then help others to find and gather theirs. We may feel confident and assured that the good Lord will distribute and apportion His helps to the best advantage of each and everyone. So, no one will be able to say on Judgement Day that he or she did not receive a fair day's pay. Whilst S. Paul is focussing our attention on the providence of God, you must have noticed that his reasoning brings you to a halt with the stark reality of sin be it small or serious. Give the matter a wee thought. Imagine, the affront offered to God considering who He is, and what you are! Go down on your knees, and thank Him for His patience and His mercy. S. Paul concludes the reading in a prayerful manner, and it is not the first time he has expressed himself in this way. He is saying, "In God, we live, move and have our being", which means that we are absolutely and totally dependent on God from the first moment of our existence, and thereafter for ever.

PETER, THE ROCK

In the Gospel Jesus raises a question about His identity, which results in Him promising to appoint Peter as Head of His Church. His successors in office were included in the promise, because of the very nature and purpose of the appointment. Peter, in answer to the question, "whom do the Apostles consider Him to be?" said: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Jesus commends him, and His words indicate that Peter received enlightenment from Heaven. This is what St. Paul meant when he said: "no one can do a good act without God's help."

The Lord in changing Simon's name to Peter, the rock, was not only informing His hearers that he was to be the firm foundation for His Church, but also, he was to be like the rock in the desert pouring forth life-giving waters, meaning that God's word would flow from this rock and provide nourishment and strength. The Lord added His guarantee that His Church would survive the upheavals of time, and remain a fountain of life for all time.

Jesus in giving Peter the keys was thereby endowing him with full powers to take over and rule the Church, and safe-guard her teachings. By appointing him as His steward, Jesus was ensuring that harmony would exist between the Church's decisions, and those of God. "Whatever you bind... will be considered bound in Heaven...

." In the world mostly everyone are looking for someone or something to hold on to. We by God's grace, submit like Peter and accept that Jesus is the Son of God, and the Lord will reward us by giving us the power to become children of God.

Dungarvan Juveniles On Car Damage And Robbery Charges

As exclusively reported in last week's "Leader" a number of cars were vandalised and articles stolen from them in Dungarvan during the week-end of August 11 and

the Gardai in Dungarvan carried out investigations into all the cases reported. As a result, two juveniles with addresses in Dungarvan, were arrested and taken to Clonmel where they appeared at a special sitting of the District Court before District Justice Kelly on Tuesday, August 14 each charged on 9 separate counts.

The offences, all committed on the week-end of August 11-12, included committing wilful and malicious damage to six motor cars by breaking side windows to a total amount of £370 while the cars were parked at Western Terrace, Davitt's Quay and Mitchel Street and stealing goods from them to the value of £80.

One of the youths who was aged 16 was remanded in custody to St. Patrick's Institution, Dublin to appear before Clonmel Court again on August 21 and the other, aged 14, was remanded on bail to the same court.

OTHER YOUTHS QUESTIONED

The Gardai in Dungarvan have also interviewed a number of other youths from Dungarvan and Cappoquin in connection with these and other offences committed in the Dungarvan area and it is expected that court proceedings will be instituted in the near future.

VANDALS IDENTIFIED

Persons involved in the recent vandalism to trees, shrubs and flower tubs in Dungarvan have also been identified following Gardai investigations into the damage and court proceedings in respect of these offences are also presently pending.

Know Your Rights

Q. — Are there any details available yet about the Scheme to allow unemployed people to attend third level courses and still be paid their unemployment payments?

A. — Yes, the details have just been announced about the Third Level Education Scheme for the Unemplayed

This scheme will commence in September and will operate on a pilot basis for the next two years.

It will be open to those who are:

* long term unemployed

* over age 23 and

* receiving unemployment assistance

There will be a limited number of places and first priority will be given to those who have taken part in the second level courses under the Vocational Training Opportunities Scheme or the other second level education schemes for unemployed people. Older people who have been unemployed for some time and who are mainly dependant on their unemployment payments will have second priority.

The courses covered will be those with a high skills content, but some academic courses will also be included. Participants may attend any of the recognised third level institutions such as universities, colleges of technology and the regional technical colleges.

Some of these courses may qualify for European Social Fund (ESF) funding. Which means that there are no fees and participants may be paid a grant of £525 per annum (1989) if living at home or £1318 (1989) per annum if they live a certain distance from the college and have to reside away from home. There is no means-test for these ESF grants, which are paid by the college or VEC. You don't have to apply for this grant as it is paid automatically if you succeed in getting a place on these particular ESF funded courses.

However, the amount of the grant may be assessed as means in the means-test for Unemployment Assistance. A grant of £525 would be assessed as weekly means of £10 approx. (£525 divided by 52). The Unemployment Assistance would be reduced by this amount.

Further details about this pilot scheme should be available at the Employment Exchanges.

Details about the ESF funded courses should be available at the Regional Technical Colleges, Colleges of Technology or Universities which offer these courses. Labour Court Rules Against Crystal Workers

Labour Court officials on Wednesday last ruled in favour of management at Waterford Crystal on four of the six outstanding issues from the bitter 14-week strike that cost the south-east economy an estimated £600,000 a week.

Unions and management agreed to binding Labour Court arbitration on the six differences remaining between them when court officials finally hammered out a peace plan in the dispute on July 11.

But then the court decision was communicated to both sides on Wednesday, August 15, only one of the issues had been partially conceded to the workers while the position favoured by company management was granted on four.

Decision on the sixth issue - compensation payments for loss of "regular overtime" — was post-poned to December 1991 to allow the court assess the change in workers' earnings over the next

The protracted industrial battle was triggered on April 5, by a row over a "traditional" bonus pay-ment for the St. Patrick's Bank Holiday Weekend to some of the 2,300 workers in the Waterford operation including the Crystal plant in Dungar-

The Labour Court on Wednesday approved the company's proposal to pay a lump sum of £1,000 to do away with all bonus payments for "short fortnights" and bank holidays. The Amalgamated Transport and General Workers' Union (ATGWU) had sought a lump sum equal to three years bonus payments to "buy out" the traditional

As regards the increase in the retirement age from 58 to 61 and the increase in the working week to 39 hours, the union wanted a review after three years but the Court decided on the five year plan, as proposed by the management.

The other issue which was decided in the company's favour was the level of compensation for loss of earnings from regular overtime and short fortnight

union was on the restoration of the personal needs breaks for the female section - pending the implementation of performance systems.

LOOKING TO THE **FUTURE**

Dr. P. Galvin, Chief Executive of Waterford Crystal welcomed the decision of the Labour Court.

Dr. Galvin said the situation with the six issues had been likened to a penalty shoot out and added that although he did not have to repeat the outcome, "it was convincing."

He acknowledged that they were pleased and added that he felt people would accept it - and that would close a chapter behind them. Everybody was now looking to the future with "great enthusiasm," Dr. Galvin said.

As regards a further three issues presently under conciliation talks, the Crystal Chief Executive said that they were progressing in the "normal way" and he was confident of getting a solution to them. "The problem in the Dungarvan factory with the tank furnace could mean that it would be November or December before work fully returns to normal," he said.

Meanwhile, The only item with which Cullen, District Officer the Court agreed with the ATGWU, said that they were disappointed with the out come and added that the Labour Court failed to take into consideration the concessions made by the workers during the negoti-

However, they were not surprised that the Court had decided as it did, in view of the current financial position of Waterford Crystal.

It was now up to the company, he stated, to see that the agreement was implemented, the concessions made by the workforce were utilised and the company returned to profit.



An air of gloom, was cast over the Old Boro' last weekend when the local community heard the sad news of the passing of the legendary and ever popular Willie Lyons, 26, Shandon Street, Dungarvan on Friday, August 10 at the District Hospital following a duration of illness.

To pen a tribute on Willie is indeed a most difficult assignment as words are totally inadequate to describe the influence and charisma that was Willie Lyons. Aged 84 years, Willie hailed from one of the oldest and most established Dungarvan families. Whenever locals gather to reflect on times past, the name Willie Lyons will be held in the highest esteem, for here was a colossus an institution who touched so many people, those people can count themselves fortunate that their pathways crossed Willie's at some stage.

Willie loved his town, its social fabric meant so much to him, indeed Willie himself was a cornerstone in many of its chartered waters. He loved the long tails, Ballymac' Open was his Altcar, the tales and happenings of those days will surely out live us all. At the social drink in the hostelry after the days activities, Willie came into his own. 'Freaney' as he was affectionately known poured forth, entertainer par excellence, his efforts were always warmly greeted and appreciated.

Politically he was a Labour man, a valued member of the Trade Union Movement. He championed the cause of the underdog, his love of humanity was so evident. when times were tough he spoke for those who were downtrodden or in distress. He was a Christian in word and action. To have known a man of Willie's calibre is much to be grateful for, we are all the richer for his presence but sadly poorer since his departure. 
LATE MR. EDMOND (NEDDY) MULCAHY



SMELLS IN DUNGARVAN HARBOUR — THE EXPLANATION

As highlighted in recent issues of the "Leader" smells emanating from the slob bank at Dungarvan Quay and from points around Dungarvan Harbour including Ballinacourty, Ballinclamper and parts of Clonea have been bothersome to the public who have been asking questions as to the reasons for the smells.

The huge mud bank with its heavily polluted content sited just off the quayside in Dungarvan has been featured by this paper on two occasions recently and we must thank the Environmental and Engineering Sections of the County Council for responding so promptly to our suggestions.

During the past week they have had a large crane operating a dredge moving the mud bank which is then taken up to quayside container vehicles by a huge grab for removal. The operation is proving quite successful and it is to be hoped that with the 'eyes' of the jetty at the top of the quay now also cleared, the result will prove long term rather than just as long as it will take to silt up the area again.

There is a school of thought where this problem is concerned that believes that the silting was not caused by the blocked jetty but by the siting of the new bridge on the by-pass road. Subscribers to this theory

believe that the new bridge has completely changed the inflow and outflow of tidal waters in the inner harbour and altered the currents, especially of the ebbing tides. We can only wait and see what the long term result of the work now being completed by the Council at the quay will be.

In regard to the smells around the outer harbour during the last week of July, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan called for a report on these and this was provided by the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, at last Monday's monthly meeting of the County Council held in Dungarvan.

Mr. O'Flynn explained that due to the prolonged spell of warm weather a large increase in seaborne algae occurred which was deposited along the coast with particular concentrations at the Cunnigar and Ballinclamper. As the algae decayed it gave off the smell which gave rise to the complaints.

The County Engineer's report added: "In addition

to the above, algae of the genus Gyrodinium Aureolum has been identified along the Waterford coast in the last week (the report was dated August 20). This algae while posing no danger to the public is toxic to the fish and shell fish. It commonly occurs out to sea where it is diluted but when occurring near shore it becomes more concentrated and therefore more toxic to marine life."

So now you know!

THE GULF CRISIS

Further to the front page lead story in last week's "Leader" concerning the Gulf Crisis and the plight of the medical and nursing personnel under contract to the PARC Organisation and working in Baghdad we understand at the time of writing this week that all are safe and well and that the PARC administration is trying to restore postal communications with the hospital — the Ibn Al Itar hospital — in Baghdad through their base in Amman in Jordan.

We also understand that PARC are anxious to stay in the Iraqi capital as the UN sanctions on the country, imposed when Kuwait was invaded, do not, they claim, extend to medical services and products.

The Ibn Al Itar hospital is strictly for the tertiary care of patients who have cancer, heart ailments and so on and it doesn't even have a casualty unit so in the event of any hostilities it is not anticipated that Irish personnel would be involved in treating any war wounded.

In any event the ban on non-nationals leaving Iraq still applies to the Irish just as it does to the other EC nationals and we can only hope that, no matter what happens, all will continue to remain safe and well.

MOST POPULAR SONGS

We learned with a certain amount of sadness last week of the death of retired Garda Sergeant Dick Farrelly who composed such well-known and widely popular songs as the "Isle of Innisfree" and "Cottage by the Lee."

Originally from Kells, Co. Meath, Dick Farrelly later settled down in Dublin and remained on there when he retired from the Garda force some years ago.

CAR OWNERS SHOULD BE WARNED

Elsewhere in this issue of the "Leader" we publish the result of the recent investigations by members of the Garda force in Dungarvan into a spate of vandalism involving the breaking of windows in a big number of cars parked at a number of areas around Dungarvan one night recently. In addition to the manner in which the cars were vandalised, their contents were stolen in a number of instances. Fortunately, we understand that most of the stolen goods were recovered.

Car owners should be warned that this type of mean offence is fairly common and they should make sure whenever they leave their cars parked, no matter where, not to leave any valuables visible which might be targetted by would-be thieves. This could ease the risk of the car being damaged and certainly ensure that at least nothing can be stolen.





Those 'pins and needles'

YOU probably know what is meant when we say we feel "pins and needles" in our arms or

It usually comes after some part of our body has "fallen asleep' - even when we have been wide awake.

All this comes when we have sat or stood in a position which has stopped the proper blood circulation through some part of the body. Perhaps you have been kneeling for too long, or have sat with one leg under you.

When you try to stand up you feel that your leg has "fallen asleep"; in other words it feels numb.

The tingling sensation of "pins and needles" follows soon afterwards and is caused by the blood beginning to circulate again.

As blind as a fox

Do you know what a flying fox is?

It is a kind of bat, those scary creatures which come out at night and live in old barns or the forest, where they hang upside down from the branches

It is called a flying fox because its head resembles the shape of a fox, whereas most bats look more like small mice with wings. Flying foxes can be as big as dogs with wing spans of up to six feet.

Blood is used to carry food and oxygen all over the body. A grown-up has about nine or ten pints of blood in the body, and every drop - pumped round by the heart - makes a complete circuit of the body once every minute or so.

Sometimes if we suffer a bad cut in an awkward place, a first-aider might have to tie something called a tourniquet (pronounced turn-ee-kay) round a limb to stop the bleeding. This is usually a very tight bandage or perhaps some rope or string might be used in an emergency.

However, it is usually wise to loosen the bandage every 30 minutes or so, because for any part of the body to be deprived of blood for too long is not a good thing.

Waterford Take On Kerry

(Waterford v. Kerry at Cappoquin on Saturday evening at 7 p.m.)

Waterford lady footballers bid to win their first ever Munster senior title at Cappoquin Sportsfield this Saturday evening. This is the fourth year in a row that the counties are clashing in the final and Kerry will be looking for their tenth Munster senior title in a row.

It's a formidable record that the Kingdom are endeavouring to defend. Their last defeat within the province was in 1980 at the hands of Tipperary. They won the provincial crown the following year but were defeated in the All-Ireland semi-final by Offaly and the Leinster champions went on to win the All-Ireland final defeating Cavan. Since the summer of 1981 Kerry have remained unbeaten, an incredible record. In eight All-Ireland finals they have defeated Wexford on three occasions, Laois twice, Westmeath, Offaly and Leitrim. They have also captured eight league titles over the last nine years and have qualified for this years final.

On paper they seem to have all the answers and their teamwork and combination play are very difficombat. Nevertheless a trip to Waterford is one they won't relish. They came very close to defeat in the 1988 final at Ballymacarbry, finally surviving on a 3-5 to 1-8 scoreline. But at one stage they were six points behind before a hotly disputed goal saw them through. In last year's encounter at Tralee, they had just two points to spare and trailed at the three quarter

They have already shown a little bit of anxiety by appealing to the Munster Council to have the match played at Cappoquin instead of Ballymacarbry, using the fact that the Ballymac pitch isn't enclosed, as the reason for their objection.

Although Waterford are very familiar with the Ballymac pitch, they train on it, playing on the Cappoquin surface shouldn't prove any problem. They recently played Wexford there in the National League and the extra space should prove beneficial to a young side.

Kerry are playing well at the moment, they defeated Laois 1-10 to 2-6 in the league semi-final last Sunday and Laois have beaten Waterford twice this year. Also Kerry defeated the "Blues" 4-11 to 1-5 at Abbeydorney last April. It is unlikely however, that those results are relevant to this year's Munster final. The game will be won by playing well on the day.

Waterford have every reason to be hopeful of victory. In 1988 and '89 there was just a kick of the ball between the teams with the vital break going to Kerry on each occasion. This years final has the makings

of another cliffhanger. Unfortunately Waterford are without two key players, June Whyte and Sinead Walsh and while June is making rapid progress she lacks match fitness having been out for seven weeks.

GOOD PREPARATION Apart from this Waterford's preparation has been very good, training sessions three times a week, have been well attended and the team is eagerly looking forward to the game, a welcome change from the past when the players spoke in "awe" of the Kingdom. It's absolutely vital that Waterford go out to win the game and not just to play well.

Midfield supremacy is likely to prove vital and if Catriona Casey and Mari O'Ryan strike top form then Waterford are in with a real chance. Patricia Butler will again guard the net. the defence will include team captain Ann Dunford, Martina O'Ryan, Noirin Walsh, Ann Fitzpatrick and Dolores Tyrrell. In attack Waterford will look to Bernie Ryan and Marie Crotty for leadership along with Aine Wall, Colette Whyte, Fiona Crotty and Geraldine O'Ryan.

In summing up it has to be said that good performances from half a dozen players won't win the Munster final for Waterford. Each player has got to make her own contribution and first to the ball tactics is an absolute must. If Waterford deny Kerry the space and time to which they have become accustomed, then we could be celebrating a famous win on Saturday night, but only a top class performance will suffice.

The game which is well worth a visit will be referced by Cork's John O'Brien.

Western Board Meeting

The report by the secretary Anthony Walsh that over the season a total of thirteen teams had withdrawn, at some stage, from the various championships, was the main topic for discussion at last week's meeting of the divisional board and at which Jimmy O'Gorman, chairman, presided.

In the main, the withdrawals were by second string teams and by clubs who went out of contention in the championships and had no further prospects of qualifying for the final stages of the competition. Nine of the thirteen, had given adequate notice to the secretary, but in the case of the other four, no prior notice had been given. It was agreed that all thirteen will be summoned to the next meeting to explain their reasons for not fulfilling their fixtures. It was also decided that the application for affiliation to the various championships, by these clubs in 1991, will be carefully examined before acceptance.

This matter gave rise to a discussion on the problems facing clubs because of the present structuring of the championships and on the suggestion of the chairman, it was agreed that time will be devoted to a full discussion on the subject well in advance of the next convention.

TROPHIES The secretary informed the delegates that none of the championship trophies had yet been returned to him for presentation to the new champions.

In accordance with county bye-laws all the holders of cups, etc., are required to return same to the board secretary by August of the championship season in order that they can be cleaned/repaired for presentation.

The chairman stated that this was a very serious matter as each year cups are handed back late and many are returned in a tarnished and damaged state. The meeting agreed that the board secretary would name the defaulters in this respect, to the next meeting of the board.

GRADING

Jim Maher, Kilrossanty complained about the grading in the minor hurling championship. He said that this year the gap in standards had been exposed more than ever and if it continued in this way, there could be no future for weak minor hurling teams like Kilrossanty who had

suffered several embarrassing defeats when they came up against far stronger opponents. He was told that with an 'A' and 'B' championship, there was very little that could be done, however the chairman said that Kilrossanty's problems were understandable and the matter could be aired again.

SUSPENSIONS

Five members from Glenrovers junior hurling club were suspended for two months for being abusive to referee John Kelly during a recent game against

Modeligo. Their delegate, Tom Duggan stated that the press reports of the game were greatly exaggerated and it was because of their dissatisfaction with the referee's handling of the match, that they became frustrated. The chairman said that the referee had a difficult job at all times and the board also had a duty to the referee. It was also stated that it was because of the suspensions, that the club were unable to field for the their subsequent championship game with

Fixtures

The County Fixtures Committee were in possession of the National League fixtures when they sat down to review the club championship situation on Monday night. It seems certain that some of the published club championship dates will have to change in order to avoid a clash with the league fixtures.

It is now known that the National Hurling League will begin on Sunday, October 14 and the football on the 21st, and to compound our problems we

must play the Senior 'B' football on the first Sunday in October. It is all going to mean a very tight squeeze for us at the end of the year.

Dazzling Display By Dungarvan

Dungarvan 1-14, Dunhill 0-5

A tremendous first half display of fast and skilful football and to which a bewildered Dunhill had no answer, enabled Dungarvan to qualify for the knock-out stages of the football championships for their first time since graduating to senior status, some years ago.
