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Abbeyside Celebrates 'Augustinian 700'

Seven hundred years ago in 1290, a group of Friars or Hermits of St. Augustine set out from their motherhouse at Clare Priory, Suffolk in England en route for Ireland. They eventually reached Dungarvan harbour and landed in Abbeyside where they set up their new home on the site now occupied by Abbeyside Parish Church. The Augustinians are still in Abbeyside after all those years, located in the Augustinian College at Duckspool.

On Tuesday evening of this week, August 28th, a very fine crowd gathered in the precincts of Abbeyside Church to join in the ceremonies which were planned to mark 'Augustinian 700', the 700th Anniversary of the advent of the Friars to the Village. Tuesday the 28th was chosen as the day on which to hold the celebration as it is the Feast Day of St. Augustine who is Patron Saint of Abbeyside. Thankfully the occasion was favoured by a fine evening. The commemoration ceremonies

commenced with the enactment of a simple pageant depicting the first landing of the Friars on the strand at Abbeyside. Punctually at 7 p.m. a small white craft was seen as it came across the harbour from the direction of Ballinacourty and was beached under the shadow of Abbeyside Church.

Retracing the footsteps of their brother Friars of 700 years ago, five members of the Augustinian Order led by 80 year old Fr. Declan Treacy, bearing a sacred candle,

stepped ashore and were welcomed by the waiting crowd. The other Augustinians in the boat were Fr. Pat Moran, Fr. Gerry Hickey, Fr. Jackie Power, and Brother Michael Collender. Skipper and owner of the boat was Michael Daly with crewmen Greg O'Brien and Austin Flynn.

BISHOP PRESIDES AT MASS

Rev. Fr. Peter Ahearne C.C. in the unavoidable absence of the Parish Priest, Very Rev. Canon Farrell who is presently indisposed, then welcomed the Friars and expressed the hope that they would continue their wonderful work in the parish for the next 700 years. A thanksgiving decade of the Rosary was then recited and the clergy processed to the Church where his Lordship, Most Rev. Dr. Ml. Russell, Bishop of the Diocese presided at a special concelebrated Mass. The Principal celebrant was Rev. Fr. P. Moran, Duckspool who was joined by a big number of concelebrating Augustini-

ans.

The crowded church listened with rapt attention to the homily which was preached by Very Rev. Fr. John Byrne, Provincial of the Augustinian Order and during the Offertory, one of the gifts presented was a beautiful crystal chalice which will be kept by the Augustinians in Duckspool as a memento of the occasion.

After Mass a special commemorative plaque, erected on the ancient portion of the Church, known as the Cloigeas, was unveiled.

The surrounds of the Church never looked better as the flags and bunting fluttered in the evening breeze and the crowd enjoyed the playing of the Dungarvan Pipe Band which added greatly to the celebrations which came to an end just as daylight began to fade.

CONCELEBRATED MASS AT FRIARY

On Tuesday morning, the Feast of St. Augustine was observed in the Friary Church, Dungarvan with the celebration of a concelebrated Mass. The principal celebrant Rev. Fr. G.

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Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

THE CROSS IS LIFE

In the first reading, Jeremias, one of the great prophets, is having a struggle within himself. He'd accepted the Lord's command to go and bring the Jewish people back to God. He reminded them of their ingratitude, but they only ridiculed, mocked and threatened him. The task looked hopeless, and seemed to be beyond him. He was downcast, and could not help feeling that he should relinquish and abandon his mission. However, his great love for God helped him to overcome his own personal inclinations, and gave him the courage to continue and to persist in proclaiming God's message. He was no longer afraid to condemn their infidelity and their wickedness. Literally, he choked his own ego, and allowed the Lord to control his life and his actions. And, in the pursuit of his work, he laid down his life to testify to its truth.

Jeremias's approach, and the way he handled God's call, is a picture of self-denial. He put God first. He buried his own feelings in order to fulfil God's will. His reaction to disappointment is an example for us all. Often, when we try our best to love and to serve God, nothing goes right. The disappointing part is, we stop trying. We seem to lack patience and trust. If we tried to understand the privilege it is to serve God, we would not behave like the false shepherd, who flees when danger threatens. We give up when the going gets tough. We run when He asks us to help Him carry His cross. Surely, we ought to know that when God is on our side, there's nothing to fear. And, you should know that He'd never ask for sacrifice, and not be there to help. Jeremias is saying, even if you are subject to sorrow, suffering, poverty, persecution, death, etc., that they cannot separate you from love of God, if you use them in His service. In God's book you have no other choice.

St. Paul takes up the same theme in the second reading, and urges us to open our hearts and our minds to the will of God. He exhorts us to offer our whole life to God's service, and says, you have Christ as your model. Hence, the true follower of Christ will set aside, like Jeremias, his own way of thinking and acting, and substitute the Master's way. From the morning offering, which we learned as children, we are familiar with this form of service and prayer, which sacrifices our whole day. St. Paul implies that there can be no genuine service without self-denial. He'd like us to be motivated by the same spirit that inspired and led Jesus into offering Himself on Calvary. Jeremias made a like and generous sacrifice by his self-surrender and obedience to God's will. It is now our turn, God's adopted children, to renounce our own inclinations, and clothe ourselves with the spirit of Jesus. God must be given first place in our lives. We must make His interests, our interests. Let us fill ourselves with the spirit of God, and dedicate each day with its ups and downs to His service. And truly, with St. Paul we'll be able to cry out "I live now not I, but Christ liveth in me." The Gospel too underlines that suffering and trials are part of life. It goes on to relate what happened following Peter's confession that Jesus was "the Son of God, the Messiah." The Lord admonished and rebuked Peter when he failed to accept the consequences of his faith. Jesus had proceeded to foretell His passion and death. He made it clear that such things must happen. For, He was the Son, who was to offer His life in sacrifice in obedience to His Father's will, and save mankind. And, He was insistent that His followers must be prepared to take up their cross and

follow Him. It implied a complete change in values. So, we must see Jesus as He is, and not as we would like Him to be. Our outlook regarding Mother Church should follow that pattern. To understand her, we must deny ourselves and we must stop seeing the Church in any guise other than in her role in God's plan of salvation.

It is not merely a case of accepting our lot, but rather in undertaking it in God's name, and making it a source of glory. It is the will of God that we should all share in carrying the burdens of His Church, the Body of Christ. Remember his words: "Unless you do penance, you shall all likewise perish." His law regarding self-denial is absolute, but indefinite. You'll recall how the Church's law re. fasting were designed to help us in some measure to fulfil God's law. Since Vat. 11 the Church, due to the changing nature of man's work etc., has directed us on how to comply, but has left the choice of self-denial or practical Christianity to ourselves. Hence, don't forget, God expects you to endure suffering, and put Him before everyone and everything. It is a pity that more married couples would not take that spirit into their homes. You'll not go wrong, if you make God's cause your own. I know things are often very very hard, but it is always worth while taking a leaf out of Jeremias's book. It is the same as taking Simon's place to help Christ's Body, His Church, in the saving of souls.

ENCOUNTERS WITH NIGGLING AFFAIRS

St. Paul has told us that everyone is invited to share in the work of salvation. Whilst life is mostly made up of encounters with niggling affairs, it is important to keep in mind that even these, when borne for God, attain new value. God does invite some to come and lift the cross from off his wounded shoulder, and the true disciple will respond without hesitation. Imagine life to be like this! God gives a wooden cross to each person, and says: "go and carry it through life." Already, God has made you like Himself. At the end of your days He'll take and examine how the figure on your cross has grown and developed. If it is the image of His Son, He'll raise you up in glory.

Like Jesus, you will not find the way easy. And, like Jeremias, you'll cry and feel life is crumbling under your burdens. You may even feel that God is asking you to do too much. Then, in your saner moments, you'll realise that if you have not God, you have nothing, and you'll turn to Him and say "I should not have faltered with you by my side." So, help me My God to persevere and share in the glory of your Son's death and resurrection. Be prepared. You'll find the cross around every corner.

Sewage Overflow In Old Parish

Proposing that the Council take immediate steps to solve the sewage overflow at Mounfoun housing estate, Old Parish, Cllr. Paddy Kenneally stated at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held last week in Dungarvan that the Council were the culprits where this health problem was concerned. "It is affecting all the people living there and it is time that the problem was dealt with once and for all," he said.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer said that this problem was caused because the soakage in the soil there was not suitable for a septic tank. The only solution of the prob-

lem was the construction of some kind of treatment plant but this would be costly and the Council had no money to do it, he said.

When Mr. O'Flynn said that he would include it in the list for next year in the hope that they would get some money to do the job, Cllr. Kenneally said that he hoped that this would happen.

Five Councillors For Dublin Housing Congress

Referring to the International Federation for Housing and Planning Congress to take place in Dublin from September 24 to 28, a letter from the Dept. of the Environment read at the August monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan pointed out that the Minister considered the theme of the Congress to be of particular relevance to planning and housing authorities and urged local authorities "to ensure appropriate attendance at the Congress, at both member and official level."

The Dept.'s letter added that in the circumstances the Minister would not object to an attendance exceeding the normal limit of 3 members.

On the recommendation of the Co. Manager it was agreed to send five members.

Know Your Rights

Q. — For the past five years I have been on Invalidity Pension and have enjoyed the perks of Free Travel and Free Electricity Allowance that go with the pension. I will be 65 at the end of this month and could transfer onto Retirement Pension, which would mean an extra £10.80 per week for myself and my wife. However, I don't want to lose the perks of Free Travel and Free Electricity Allowance. I thought there was something about this in the last Budget. Can you clarify the position?

A. — It was announced in the Budget that Invalidity Pensioners already receiving the perks of Free Travel & Free Electricity Allowance wouldn't lose them if they transferred onto Retirement Pension. However, this change will not come into effect until October. The precise date in October has still to be announced. If you want to retain the perks you should defer applying for your Retirement Pension until after the implementation of this change.

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Ballymacarbry Notes

UNVEILING OF MEMORIAL

At Burgess, Ballylooby, on Sunday last a memorial to the late Geoffrey Keating, renowned Irish historian, poet and author, was unveiled. Prior to the unveiling at Burgess, a special Mass was Concelebrated at Geoffrey Keating's burial place in Tubrid Church Yard. The Mass was presided over by Arch-Bishop Thomas Morris, D.D. (Retired) and was Concelebrated by Dr. Michael Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore. The visiting clergy included Monsignor Michael Olden, P.P., Kilsheeha and Kilsheehan and Rev. Professor O Fiannachta of Maynooth delivered a homily to mark the occasion. He said Fr. Geoffrey Keating, who wrote the first history of Ireland in four volumes "Foras Feasa Ar Eireann" was born at Burgess in the parish of Ballylooby around the year 1570. A farm house today owned by a family named Cahill is supposed to be built on the site of Fr. Keating's homestead. He was educated for the Priesthood at Bordeaux and was ordained around 1610. His first Treatise on the Holy Mass was written around the year 1615. He wrote "Tri Bhior Gnoithe An Bhais" around 1625 and his history of Ireland "Foras Feasa Ar Eireann" was completed by the year 1640. According to Dalton's History of Ireland, Fr. Keating became Parish Priest of Tybrid (Tubrid) in the early years of the 17th century.

For condemning too vehemently the evils of adultery he incurred the wrath of a Catholic lady who had been co-habiting with the President of Munster. Thus he had to flee to the glens and mountains. We are told he spent many years in hiding in the Glen of Aherlow and used to celebrate Mass at an improvised rock. These rocks in those days were called Mass Rocks. It was during those days that he wrote a moral treatise called "The Three Shafts of Death," some poems and a history of Ireland from the earliest times to the Anglo-Norman Invasion.

As stated, Fr. Keating was educated at Bordeaux as was the custom in those days, priests being unable to receive education here in the Penal days when a price was on their heads under the Non-Catholic or Protestant Government of those days.

In 1634 he was appointed Priest in Charge of Knockgraffan Parish. At that time he was famous for his sermons and it was around that time that he incurred the wrath of the President of Munster. Fr. Keating was back in his native Tubrid in 1644. A story states that it was Cromwell's soldiers

who murdered Fr. Keating in St. Nicholas Church, Old Bridge, Clonmel. He was then around 80 years of age. The church and burial stone of Fr. Geoffrey Keating are still to be seen in Tubrid churchyard. Go ndeanaidh Dia trocaire ar ainm an scolaire clumhail seo.

Inside the little church which Fr. Keating built, we read, the translation of which would appear to be as follows: This stone is in memory of Geoffrey Keating. He was the most learned person among contemporary Irishmen during his lifetime in Irish and Latin. He was a deeply religious priest, a wonderful preacher and evangelist, a philosopher and a foundation and guiding star of knowledge to the whole Irish Race.

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

WHALES IN CRISIS OFF WATERFORD COASTLINE

Last week a number of whales found themselves in difficulties in shallow waters off a number of points along the Waterford coastline.

It was on Thursday evening that local fishermen spotted one whale struggling in shallow waters near a beach on the Tramore side of Annewstown while another was sighted near Boatstrand.

But it was in Ballinagoul, Ring, the same night that the most excitement occurred when another leviathan of enormous proportions made its appearance just off the pier in the Ring Gaeltacht Village. This whale put on a big show, spouting cascades of water as it swam along the inner harbour and was eagerly watched by a large crowd of spectators.

It disappeared for a period but then re-appeared with the next tide when it got caught in rocks. However, a rescue operation succeeded in getting the huge mammal free and it was then towed out to sea by a local fishing trawler and set free.

On the same evening, a school of dolphins was observed cavorting in the sea about three miles off Helvick Head while strollers along the beach at Clonea had the unusual experience of seeing shoals of sprats surging along at the edge of the evening tide trying to escape from schools of mackerel some yards further out which were, in turn, being "dive-bombed" by a big number of sea-gulls.

All this aquatic activity in the sea was quite unusual and it is hard to know what the reason for it was beyond the fact that it all happened during the height of the very warm, humid weather which we experienced during the past month.

BLACKPOOL AND THE BUTTERY

Arising from our paragraph of a couple of weeks back about "The Dungarvan Gazette" of 1872 and the advertisement that appeared in the issue of September 7th of that year from the Drapery Shop of T. McCarthy, the address of which was given as Blackpool, Dungarvan, we have been informed by a most reliable source that in those days of almost 120 years

ago, the entire of O'Connell Street as we now know it was called Blackpool and that almost certainly the McCarthy shop was located in the premises now occupied by Tom Fitzgerald's Man's Shop.

It is interesting to note that in Canon Power's "Place Names of Decies", Blackpool is referred to as 'Bothar Iochtarach' or Lower Road while the same learned author holds that the 'Buttery' which the eastern end of Mitchel Street was then called was formerly known as 'Bothar a Mhargadh' — Market Road. However Canon Power holds that more probably, Buttery was the Anglicisation of 'Bothar Uachtarach' or Upper Road which was the name for the entire of Mitchel Street when he compiled his "Place Names of Decies" in 1907.

NEW ENVOY TO IRAN HAS DUNGARVAN CONNECTIONS

A mid-week announcement made last week informed us that the Government is to send Ireland's first resident ambassador to Iran. The decision, which was made rather rapidly is seen as a crucial move in Ireland's effort to rescue the £120 million beef deal with Tehran. It can also be seen now, with hindsight, as having been helpful in securing the release of Belfast man, Brian Keenan, who had been held as a hostage in Beirut for four-and-a-half years until he was set free on Saturday last.

The new Ambassador is Mr. Frank Cogan, an experienced diplomat who has spent the last three years in Brussels in charge of institutional affairs. The decision to appoint the ambassador was made by the Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey, following meetings between the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Michael O'Kennedy and the Iranian Ambassador, Mr. Bahrán Ghassemi, which failed to resolve the impasse on the beef deal.

Ambassador Cogan is no stranger to Dungarvan and has strong family connec-

tions here as his wife is the former Pauline Kiely, daughter of Mrs. Mary Kiely and the late Michael Kiely, Knockateemore, Abbeyside. Ambassador and Mrs. Cogan who have a teenage son and daughter, Roger and Elizabeth, presently reside in Mount Merrion, Dublin and are regular visitors to the Kiely family home at Knockateemore. It is therefore an added pleasure for us on behalf of their many friends hereabouts to congratulate the new envoy on what, in present circumstances, is bound to be a most important and exacting posting.

It would seem that one of the first tasks to be undertaken by Ambassador Cogan is to arrange for the visit to Iran by our Agriculture Minister, which was announced on Monday last. As a result of strong pressure from farming organisations and meat exporting firms, Mr. O'Kennedy is going to Tehran to commence talks in a further effort to resolve the problem surrounding the beef deal.

In regard to this it is as well to note that the Taoiseach has pointed out that discussions concerning Ireland's problem had been held with our E. C. partners and as a result, agreement had been reached to permit the Minister's visit to discuss the technical aspects of the problem with the Iranian authorities. Because of the Salman Rushdie affair, the E. C. had ruled against any of the Community's Ministers visiting Iran. It is to be hoped that the visit will not turn out to be a mission impossible and that a positive outcome will result and so save the multi-million pound beef export deal.

We understand that the Minister also plans to visit Egypt and Libya during his Mid-east visit, seeking other markets.

SHELBURNE CO-OP REMEMBERS TRAGIC BOMBING OF 50 YEARS AGO

Last Sunday, August 26 a commemorative Mass marked the 50th anniversary of the bombing of Shelburne Co-op Creamery at Campile near New Ross, Co. Wexford in which three young local girls were killed.

Catherine Kent, her sister Mary Ellen and Kathleen Hurley all worked in the Co-op and were in the

creamery restaurant at lunchtime on Monday, August 26th 1940, when the village of Campile was attacked by a German bomber during the second World War. In all four bombs were dropped. The main target was apparently the creamery, which was completely destroyed.

In memory of the three young women a Mass was celebrated in Shelburne Co-op, which is now owned by Waterford Foods plc, following which a plaque dedicated by Waterford Foods to the three girls was unveiled.

On August 27, 1940, the Irish Charge d'Affaires in Berlin made a formal protest to the German Government and demanded full reparation for the loss of lives suffered and the damage done by the German bomber. It was stated that the bombs were dropped in error by the German airman who is said to have lost his way and thought he was over Wales when he released the bombs before returning to his base.

It was fairly regular for those of us now old enough to remember those days of World War II to hear the drone of the squadrons of German bombers whenever they passed over the south coast on their way to bomb such targets as Belfast. In addition to the bombing of Campile, the North Strand suburb of Dublin also suffered in a bombing raid when an entire block of houses was demolished and many lives lost.

It is no harm for us to recall these incidents in these days when there is again so much talk about war in the air.

Mr. Brendan Breen



Cuis bron dom na linte seo do scriobh ar bas Brendan Breen a tharla ar an 19u de Mi Lunasa. The passing of Brendan Breen, "Fionnbarra," Clonea Road, Dungarvan, on Sunday, August 19, greatly saddened not alone his wife, family and relatives, but indeed his vast legions of friends and acquaintances. Brendan was an institution who touched so many lives, enriched them by his outstanding virtues, traits and characteristics. He possessed a charisma that was a joy to behold. Is cinnte ni bheidh a leithead ann aris.

A native of Waterford City, Brendan received his early education at the North Monastery, Cork and later at Rochestown College. He continued his studies at UCC where he won the admiration of all for his dedication to his scholastic assignments. It was while a student at third level that Brendan was appointed choir master of St. Augustine's, Cork, an association with the Augustinian Fathers that was to be part and parcel of his 72 years among us.

Brendan was a man of exemplary character, first rate ability and a born teacher. His work was always directed towards the welfare of his students, his organisational skill, meticulous attention to detail and infectious enthusiasm won for him the respect of all.

For 28 years he was a valued member of the staff of Mount Melleray College and later in September '73 he took up a position at St. Augustine's College. Talking to some of his past pupils during the week, the warm affection and respect they had for Brendan Breen was very evident. All appreciated the debt they personally owed to this doyen among the teaching fraternity.

For many years he conducted the Boys' Choir in the Friary Church and on most Sunday's he read the Liturgy of the Word. Many Old Boro inhabitants will associate Brendan with the Friary Hall and will remember his love of the theatre, stage and music. In truth, Brendan was a most cultured gentleman who was ahead of his time. He

masterminded many fine works with the Dungarvan Dramatic Club and took some of the character parts himself in many of their productions.

A leading light in the Dungarvan Musical and Choral Society, wherever there was good music in our town Brendan Breen was one of the foundation stones for its success. In 1954 he produced a Passion Play that won wide acclaim and in following years succeeded in bringing some of the greats in the music world to the Friary Hall. He loved Irish culture, particularly the language, he nurtured in his pupils a genuine love of our tongue by his hard work, approach and methodology.

Brendan has taken leave of us momentarily but he has left the memory of a Christian man, an ordinary man with extraordinary gifts, a man who shared his talents so generously with his fellow man. We have much to be grateful for, to have known a man like Brendan Breen is so much to be thankful for.

Start thinking of colour for next spring

JUST as summer blooms start to fade, September focuses our minds on colour for next spring.

For this is the month when the packs of bulbs are most prominent in the shops and early bloomers such as snowdrops and crocuses should certainly be planted.

The foliage of these two varieties is fine and soon disappears after the blooms so many people plant them in rougher lawns, knowing that they will create a nice effect yet can be safely mowed over when the grass does get vigorous.

Chores

Some do the same with later bulb varieties such as the closely related daffodils and narcissi, but the foliage does tend to linger and get scruffy before it can be mowed away without harming the recovery of the bulb after blooming.

'Daffs' and narcissi, the more temperamental tulip and the fine-scented hyacinth can also be planted now but also left until October or November if other chores are more pressing.

But September is definitely the month if you have bought some of the specially prepared bulbs in the shops for 'forcing' to bloom at Christmas.

They usually cost more than normal bulbs but you can only force them once - treat them as normal bulbs for the next growing season.

It is best to use the kind of shallow bowl usually sold alongside the bulbs in the shops, but opinions vary on whether bulb fibre or a good compost is the best growing medium.

There is undoubtedly more goodness in the latter, which is important if you



intend to save the bulbs for planting out next autumn.

Place a layer of moist compost or fibre in the base of the container but don't crowd or screw the bulbs down into it or you will stunt growth and damage roots.

Firm more compost around them and leave the tips protruding just above the surface before 'plunging' the bowl into a garden bed. You can either cover the bowl with about four inches of peat, or simply wrap it in plastic sheet and bury it.

Warmth

The ideal cool and dark conditions also result from covering the bowl with black plastic or several layers of newspaper and storing it somewhere cool indoors or in the garage, but slight warmth will ruin everything and you have to check regularly that the compost/fibre is moist.

If the bulbs are intended for Christmas then bring them indoors into a cool room by the end of November or once the shoots are an inch high, whichever comes first.

Move the container near a window after five days to strengthen the leaves. Once flowers start to form then move the bowl to the display spot, away from direct sun, heat and draughts and in an ideal temperature of 60-70F.

Unscrupulous Employers Exploiting Young People

On the proposal of the Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne, members of Waterford Co. Council at their monthly meeting held in Dungarvan unanimously passed a motion calling on the Minister for Labour to immediately introduce minimum pay legislation in order to bring standards of pay in Ireland up to European Community levels, thereby tackling the chronic problem of low pay which affects 25 per cent of Irish workers.

Cllr. Kyne said he proposed this motion because unscrupulous employers, especially in service indus-

tries such as tourism, were exploiting young people who had to work long hours for very low wages.

Seconding the motion, Cllr. Sean Fahey said that Cllr. Kyne had pin-pointed a problem which was

growing all over the country. Unscrupulous employers were taking advantage of many young people who would prefer to work for low wages rather than not to work at all.

improvement at the year end," said Mr. Hurley.

Humble potato's versatility

On average we each eat about 257 lb of potatoes every year, so it's just as well that they are a wholesome, nourishing food, containing Vitamin C, B6, iron, calcium and fibre.

Fortunately they are also low in calories - just 23 calories per ounce for boiled potatoes.

So with the present interest in healthy eating, it is hardly surprising that 98 per cent of British housewives include potatoes in their daily menu planning.

As a bonus of course, potatoes are one of the most versatile of vegetables, lending themselves readily to inclusion in most types of dish and to preparation in a wide range of forms, from basic to classic.

Here are some recipes which illustrate its versatility:

Potato and Sausage Turnover

Ingredients:
225g Shortcrust or flaky pastry
225g Potatoes, well scrubbed and thinly sliced
225g Sausagemeat
125g Onion, finely chopped
50g Red Leicester cheese, grated
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
Milk to glaze
1x5ml spoon Sesame seeds
Garnish: watercress
Oven temp. 200°C, 400°F, Gas Mark 6.

Method:
Roll out the pastry into approximately a 30.5cm (12") square and place on a lightly greased baking sheet.

Place the potatoes in a saucepan of boiling water and parboil for five minutes. Drain and cool.

In a small bowl, season the sausagemeat well and beat with a fork until thoroughly mixed.

Cover half the pastry with the potato slices leaving a 1cm (1/2") border around the edges. Season well.

With two spoons place the sausagemeat on top of the potatoes. Mix the onion and cheese together and pile on top of the sausagemeat.

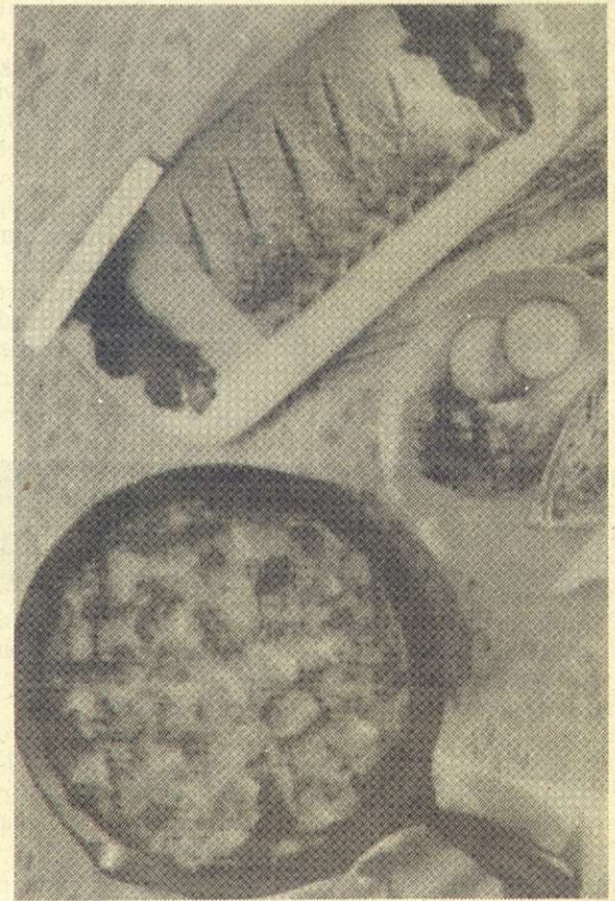
Brush the edges of the pastry with a little water. Bring the rest of the pastry over the filling and seal the edges by pinching together. Alternatively a fork may be used.

Cut the top diagonally with a sharp knife. Brush with milk, sprinkle over sesame seeds and bake for 35 minutes or until golden brown.

Garnish and serve hot with a crisp green salad or vegetable of your choice. Delicious eaten cold in packed lunches or picnics.

Potato Pan Bake

Ingredients:
1-2x15ml spoons Vegetable oil
1 onion, finely chopped
125g bacon, chopped
5 eggs, size 3, beaten
225g Potatoes, well scrubbed, diced and cooked
1 medium tomato, roughly chopped
75g Mature Cheddar cheese, grated
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
1x5ml spoons mixed herbs
1x2.5ml spoons Paprika



Potato and sausage turnover and potato pan bake.

Method:

Heat 1-2 x 15ml spoons (1-2 tablespoons) of oil in a deep non-stick frying pan and lightly fry the onion and bacon for five minutes.

Remove with a slotted spoon and stir into the beaten egg together with the potatoes, tomato and cheese. Season well.

Pour the egg mixture back into the pan and level out by

shaking gently. Sprinkle over the mixed herbs and paprika.

Cook gently for 10 minutes or until the underside is brown is just set.

Place the pan bake under the grill for 2-4 minutes or until light golden in colour.

Cut into quarters and serve hot with a mixed salad.

Serves 4.

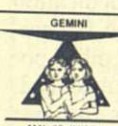

Why camels need humps

MOST people know that a camel can go for days without needing water, because it stores a huge amount of water in its hump. But this is only partly true.

In fact the hump stores a kind of fat, which contains all the food the camel needs, and the animal is able to change some of this fat into water. In this way it is perfectly true that it can survive for more than two weeks without stopping for a drink.

You have probably noticed that camels have either one or two humps. This is not just a matter of luck. The Bactrian camel from western Asia has two humps which means it can travel further and for longer.

The Arabian camel, which is found (as its name suggests) around the Arab countries of the Middle East, has only one hump.

Another way the camel survives in a hot dry climate is by eating food which no other animal wants or needs — food such as twigs and thorny plants. This is a very handy talent and in an area where food is scarce.

When the camel is travelling in the desert and does start to use up its fat and water supply from its hump in order to survive, it can lose up to a quarter of its weight.

When it eventually reaches an oasis — those are the fertile areas found in odd spots across the desert — it can drink up to 25 gallons of water and put back all its weight in just 10 minutes.

Holes in the loaf

Have you ever wondered why bread has holes in it?

They are made by bubbles of gas produced by the yeast that is added to the flour and dough mixture to make it "rise" and expand.

Yeast is a type of fungus which grows quickly when it is put in a warm, damp place. It also gives bread its particular taste and smell.

While the yeast is growing inside the dough it produces the gas which makes the holes in the bread.

Cakes also have holes in them, also caused by gas, but this time the "magic" ingredient is not yeast, but baking powder, which is used just to make the cakes rise, without altering the taste at all.

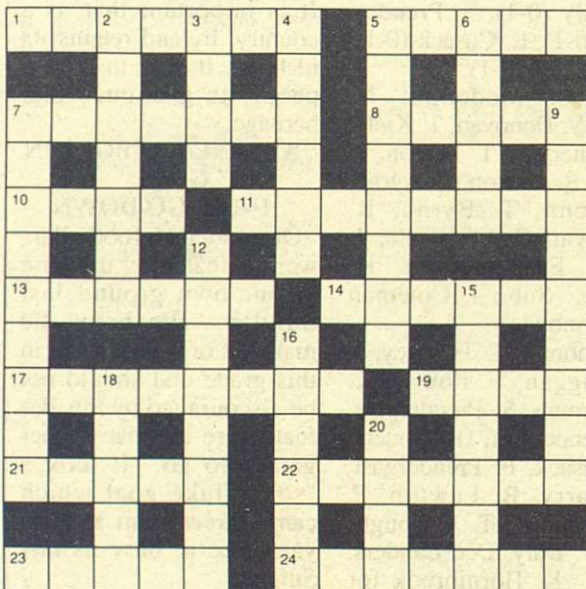

O'Malley's Decision On Export Guarantees "Was Grievous Error"

— Says Lane

Mr. Paddy Lane, MEP Fianna Fail speaking at a public meeting in Listowel last Monday said that the crisis facing Irish farmers at the present time must be tackled vigorously in the weeks ahead. The most immediate problem concerned the beef trade. Livestock farmers, under severe pressure until recently, must now cope with the many problems created by the Gulf conflict and it was essential that all Irish beef offered to factories in the next 3 months was paid for at the EC Guide price, established at last March's price fixing.

"Part of that agreement," said Mr. Lane, "includes export refunds to be paid for exports to third countries such as Iran and Egypt. As these sales are part and parcel of the Common Agricultural Policy, it is also essential that all sales are covered by Export Guarantees supported by the EC. Last year's decision by the Minister for Industry and Commerce, Des O'Malley to suspend the Export Guarantees was a grievous error of judgment, since if they were still in place, Ireland would now have a watertight case to make to the Commission to fund losses incurred by firms dealing with Iraq. This could alleviate some of the problems in the Goodman crisis."

NATIONAL LEAGUES

Last week I promised that the programme of upcoming National League games would be published in this week's issue, but this is not possible as G.A.C. have not so far released them due to pressure resulting from the failure of the expected changes in the league format.

DATES

In the 'B' football All-Ireland, Waterford will play Carlow in the first round at a Waterford venue on Sunday, September 23 and if we win, will play Tyrone,

also at a Waterford venue, on Sunday, September 30. If we survive this we will play a semi-final on the first Sunday in November, at a neutral venue. The final is fixed for November 14.

The National Hurling League begins on Sunday, November 14 and the football league commences on the following Sunday, October 21. After that the league will continue to be played on alternative weeks up to December 4. As I wrote last week, this schedule is sure to create problems for our own fixture committees.

All-Ireland Hurling Final

Croke Park will see another full house on Sunday when about 65,000 people will travel to see Cork and Galway do battle for the McCarthy Cup in the 102nd hurling final. The game has, understandably, aroused tremendous interest all over and as a result the clamour for tickets is just as big as ever. Our meagre allocation was far less than what was required to satisfy the huge demand by clubs and individuals and many of our patrons will travel either with a terrace ticket or on speck.

In an effort to reduce the number which find their way onto the black market on the streets of Dublin on final day, Central Council are insisting that all tickets on issue by County and Divisional Boards must be stamped with the official county stamp. This should prove a deterrent, as the source of black market tickets will now be readily identifiable and a penalty can be imposed on the defaulting county.

The match should be a great final and one that will satisfy everyone if both Cork and Galway play to their potential. As Munster people, we will have a big interest in how Cork play and I feel sure that the majority of people from Waterford will hope to see our Munster semi-final conquerors come out victorious here.

As has now become the practice, no matches will be played throughout the county on All-Ireland day, so all those not travelling will be free to watch the programme on T.V.

HANDBALL NEWS

In a very hard match against a top-class opponent who had recently won the Connaght title, our reigning champion Declan Mulcahy, Kilgobinet club, survived by beating him, two games to one, at Roscommon on Saturday last and thereby qualified for yet another All-Ireland. This was the Golden Masters Singles semi-final and having to play an opponent in his own ally was quite a challenge, but such is the quality of Mulcahy's handball, that such assignments hold no fears for him. Decky has one this title for the past three years and also won the doubles last year. He is now in line for another great double and what a wonderful achievement it would be to win these elusive titles in successive seasons.

Championship Situation

On hearing that Dungarvan had beaten Kilmac' on Sunday night one of the local wags after being told also that this will mean another three-way play-off involving the Nire, Dunhill and Kilmacthomas said the football championship was like something out of the film "From Here To Eternity" — will it ever end!?

It will end, but not before an amount of sorting out is done, on and off the field.

All-Ireland Referees

The appointment of John Moore as referee for the Cork/Galway All-Ireland hurling final next Sunday has, understandably aroused countywide interest and in some quarters it has given rise to discussion about the role played by Waterford referees since day one of the series.

Not everyone will accept the fact that only three Waterford men previously handled All-Ireland finals. A few have insisted that there were more. Well there have been only three and John will be number four next Sunday, P.G. I was so convinced that four had previously done the job, that I spent quite a lot of time rooting out the records before I got it straight. Three was the right number, if we are talking about senior finals only — and in the present case, I'm sure that we are.

DAN FRAHER, DUNGARVAN

The big Dan was very much a father figure in Waterford Gaeldom and needs no introduction here. He refereed two All-Irelands and both were in 1892. In the football final Dublin beat Kerry for their first ever meeting, by 1-4 to 0-3. In the hurling final on the same day the score was Cork 2-4, Dublin 1-1, but the game was abandoned by Dan after Dublin walked off the field after 50 minutes.

WILLIE WALSH, GRACEDIEU

One of the few referees to handle a total of eight All-Ireland finals and like his colleague Dan Fraher, he was one of the very few to handle both football and hurling finals in the same year.

Here is Willie's record: 1915 hurling final; Laois 6-2, Cork 4-1. 1916 hurling final; Tipperary 5-4, Kilkenny 3-2. 1917 hurling final; Dublin 5-4, Tipperary 4-2. 1918 hurling final; Limerick 9-5, Wex-

ford 1-3. 1919 hurling final; Cork 6-4, Dublin 2-4. 1920 football final; Tipperary 1-6, Dublin 1-2. 1921 football final; Dublin 1-9, Mayo 0-2. 1921 hurling final; Limerick 8-5, Dublin 3-2.

After ten years in retirement Willie Walsh was brought back to handle the second replay of the famous Cork/Kilkenny All-Ireland saga in 1931, which was won by Cork 5-8 to 3-4.

VIN BASTON, PASSAGE

All the above referees have passed to their eternal reward, but are still remembered. Dan and Willie have been honoured by having our two major fields called after them.

JOHN MOORE, DUNGARVAN

As I wrote last week, John has already handled an under 21 and minor All-Ireland as well as a senior semi-final and a couple of Munster finals in hurling and a number of other high profile matches as well as county finals in all grades in this county.

Of course as well as being a very busy referee, John Moore plays, what might properly be described as a leading role on the administrative side of county affairs in the county. He holds the post of county hurling officer, he is chairman of County Bord na n-Og (and was secretary for many years), he is assistant secretary of the Western Board and has been on other committees, from time to time.

We wish John and his team of umpires well on Sunday and we look forward with confidence to their successful and satisfactory handling and management of this, their biggest assignment to date.

The Augustinians In Abbeyside 1290 - 1990

As a prelude to the ceremonies which took place on Tuesday evening, August 28th (Feast of St. Augustine, Patron of the Parish), marking the advent of the Augustinians to Abbeyside 700 years ago, the members of the organising committee, under the chairmanship of Mr. Michael Fives, held a special meeting in Lawlor's Hotel on Friday night last to launch a booklet compiled by William Fraher. The booklet, "The Augustinians In Abbeyside 1290 - 1990", traces the history of the order in the Parish during that time.

Mr. Fives said that the entire idea was the brainchild of Mr. Seamus O'Brien who raised it first in the Parish Newsletter. It was then taken up by the Abbeyside Pattern Committee and a sub-committee to organise the special ceremonies to mark the occasion was then set up.

These ceremonies include the erection of a plaque in the ancient ruined portion adjoining Abbeyside Parish Church, a stained glass panel over the main door of the church depicting the history of the Augustinians in Dungarvan which has been made locally by Michael Power, Abbeyside and the presentation of a specially designed crystal chalice made by Criostal na Rinne to the Augustinians in Duckspool, Abbeyside.

Very Rev. Fr. O Domhnaill O.S.A., Prior, St. Augustine's, Duckspool, who was accompanied by Rev. Fr. P. Moran, O.S.A., Headmaster, St. Augustine's College, thanked the committee for all they were doing to commemorate the advent of the Friars to Abbeyside. He said that the booklet was a mini-history of the members of the Order who were men of great courage and who had passed on the faith down to

the present generation. He also praised the laity of the parish who had helped and encouraged the Order and enabled them to continue this good work down through the years.

Mr. Noel Fleming, Secretary of the Organising Committee pointed out that the fact that the chalice to be presented had been made by Ring Crystal was not meant "as a swipe" at the local Crystal factory and explained that at the time the decision was taken, the plant had been closed because of the strike.

MANY AND VARIED AUGUSTINIANS

In the course of the preface to "The Augustinians In Abbeyside", Very Rev. Fr. Henry MacNamara, O.S.A., Prior, St. Augustine's, Dungarvan writes as follows: "What statistics and historical ruins do not tell us is that the Friars have enjoyed the affection and esteem of the people of the locality for 700 years and like all groups from the beginning of time have been praised and criticised.

"Over the centuries a great variety of Augustinians have been associated with this area. Some were liked for saying 'nice quiet Masses', while others sent sighs through their congre-

gation for being pitifully slow. Some were kindly, easy going men, not too concerned about time or appearance and ever ready to offer a reassuring word; while others were fussy little men who saw it as their duty to guide people along the right track and to rebuke old women for talking in the back of the church.

"Some were educators, serious men who saw it as their responsibility to impart knowledge and wis-

dom; while others rarely opened a book, preferring human company, laughing heartily and admiring the countryside as they trekked around the area on what was known as the 'Quest'. 700 years is a celebration of those many and varied Augustinians who were so much part of the life of the locality, and of the people who accepted and supported them and sometimes tolerated their eccentricities".

That surely puts it all in a nutshell.

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
