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Crowds Mob Tallow For Annual Horse Fair

The Brideside town of Tallow was mobbed by what has been estimated as a record crowd for the Annual Horse Fair on Monday last. Even on Sunday evening many of the stall holders had arrived to mark out vantage sites and by Monday morning every available space was occupied. Then the crowds poured in and very soon the Square and adjoining streets were pedestrians only areas.

Horses at the fair were in plentiful supply and were stated to be of excellent quality. Prices generally were said to be good with business also satisfactory. An indication of the trend was given in one of the first transactions of the day when a four-year-old event horse was purchased by an English buyer for £4,000.

The judges for the two major awards at the fair were Mr. Moss O'Mahoney, Park, Youghal and Mr. Bill Ronayne, Templevalley, Tallow. They adjudged a four-year-old gelding by Golden Coin and owned by Mr. Val Hyde, Ballymacoda as best ridden horse while a three-year-old gelding owned by Mr. John Moloney,

Crough, Colligan, Dungarvan took the award as the best led horse.

CARNIVAL ATMOSPHERE

Apart from the main business of buying and selling, the big crowd had plenty otherwise to entertain them with all the fun of the fair and everybody appeared to have a smashing time in a truly carnival atmosphere.

Tragic Passing Of Popular Augustinian Brother

The tragic news of the sudden death of Rev. Brother Thomas Eugene Wade, O.S.A., Ballyboden, Dublin which occurred on Sunday last was learned with shock and sadness by everyone in his native Dungarvan.

Brother Eugene was a

member of the Wade family who lived in Friary Street. Based in Ballyboden for the past year, he was in his early 60's and was a noted fund-raiser for the Augustinian Missions. He organised the annual sale of work in the Mission House, Dublin which

raised close to £10,000 each year and was also a trojan worker at the annual Friary sale of work in Dungarvan.

He was a most dedicated Brother said the Augustinian Prior, Fr. Ryan, while Fr. Gerry Hickey O.S.A., Dungarvan said that Brother Eugene would be an incalculable loss to their missionary work in Nigeria and Equador.

Brother Eugene who was in Dungarvan on the previous Tuesday for the "Augustinian 700" celebrations in Abbeyside, was attending the Cork-Galway hurling final last Sunday with Fr. John Gough, O.S.A., also from Dungarvan and had driven in from Ballyboden. Just after passing through the turnstiles into Croke Park he collapsed. He was a dedicated follower of Gaelic football and hurling and was a regular visitor to Croke Park.

The removal of Bro. Eugene's remains took place to John's Lane Church, Thomas Street, Dublin on Tuesday evening and the funeral took place after Requiem Mass on Wednesday morning to Glasnevin Cemetery where the interment took place.

We extend our deepest sympathy to Bro. Eugene's aunts, uncles, cousins, relatives and to his Augustinian Confreres and Mission Workers on the immense loss they have so tragically suffered.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

"THE CHILD THAT IS LEFT TO HIS OWN, WILL BRING SHAME TO THE MOTHER"

Ezekiel, in the first reading, is sent by God to bring Israel back. She'd drifted into infidelity. The reading focuses attention on the need to warn them that unless they forsake their ways, the Lord will punish them. Even if he fails in his mission, the Lord will not hold him responsible. We, like the prophet, have been called, and, as you know, your mission field will be centered in the home. To sit and do nothing when a chance to help comes our way, is tantamount to sharing in the guilt. Were you silent when the unborn babies were under attack? Were you silent when God's law re marriage was attacked?

St. Paul in the second reading reminds us, when the occasion arises, we have a duty to correct our brother, but he warns us that such action must be based on love. He adds, if you do not love him, do not dare to be his keeper. Few tasks are as sensitive. It calls for tact, gentleness, self-restraint and discretion. Any other approach would fail. If you desire to close the door permanently, then forget about brotherly love, and rush in like a bull. Love must be the motivation force. It is very difficult to correct.

The Gospel tells us, the Church must exercise her power and her authority with the gentleness of Jesus. It also makes clear that her office of dispensing God's authority does include the power to forgive sin and adds that all such administrations must bear the hall-marks of love. The guide-lines suggested by St. Matthew were suited to the community structure of his time, but, due to the vast changes in society, the Church has had to adopt new procedures to implement the force of her laws.

Have just been reading a book about "priests in the mist" and found it to be a

lity of allegedly unfair treatment meted out to these men. It certainly was not aimed to foster an atmosphere of love. You could boil all the complaints in the "Pot of discontent." My own personal experience re the exercise of authority in the Church is, it was always administered with patience and kindness. I never saw anyone treated unjustly. I recall my bishop saying to me when I said, "would it be wise to appoint him to that post." His answer was: "The Lord forgave St. Peter." The Church is responsible to God to safeguard and keep clear the stream of her teaching. If a priest espouses views contrary to Christ's message, and then refuses to amend, correct, withdraw or bow to the authoritative voice of the Church, you would expect him to be banned from speaking for the Church. And, you may rest assured that such a step would only be taken after every effort has been made to let him see the error of his ways.

Something would be seriously wrong if the Church were to evade or neglect her responsibilities. Her job is to watch, to guide and to rule. Let no one say, the Church would discharge

her duties without care, consideration and respect. Her mission is to save and to help. Part of that work is to maintain order, and, if to do that, disciplinary action has to be taken, then she has no choice. The Church is attuned to the mind of God. She must always reflect His will. Think of the infinite power of God, and then consider His great mercy, it would make you ashamed to be unkind to anyone. Hence, let "Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who offend us" be our motto for life.

We'll have to harp back to the family precincts where opportunities for caring and helping abound. You know what is meant by "charity begins at home." So, look at what is happening on your own door-step before you start dispensing charity elsewhere. We have all been called like Ezekiel to preach salvation. Now, I believe that the majority of our young people are good and well behaved, but, it is hard not to notice that a sizeable number have little or no respect for God or man. The youth problem in many, many countries is serious. However, the conclusion that's hard to avoid is, many parents in Ireland are failing in their duties. They have a duty to give example, to help and to correct, and, if they do, the Lord will never hold them responsible if things go wrong. Indeed, the young may have problems, but so has everyone else. You are not going to solve matters by throwing the baby out with the bath-water!

SOMETHING IN WHAT PROVERBS SAY

When Hitler first came to power, Germany was in the throes of a youth problem. Hitler instituted certain laws

to meet the problem, and said those "guilty of breaking these laws will be beheaded." Duly, the first found guilty was beheaded, and there ended the lesson! We all know the Isle of Man introduced flogging to curb a like problem. I was told that groups of youths were causing havoc on the mail-boat between England and the Isle, but the moment the Captain announced "we are now entering Isle of Man waters" you'd hear a pin drop. So, there is really something in what Proverbs say: "Spare the rod, and spoil the child." And, "the child that is left to his own, will bring shame to the mother." With the back-up of our faith, you'd expect Irish youth to show respect, but many of them either do not know or care.

Young people have much more than we had as children, so the question needs to be asked: are they spoiled? They have money for everything, and yet! many of them are not satisfied. I'm told that many of them consider the grown ups have and are making a mess of the world, and true as that may be, it is also true that wise heads are not found on young shoulders. Of course, they could claim, our parents are to blame. You see, discipline is a nasty word. It is easy to blame parents, but society is far from being guiltless. Parents have duties to care, to lead, to teach and to control, but sadly, they are so caught up in work and activities that home duties are pushed aside. Drink, I'm afraid, will have a lot to answer for. It is like a black hand crushing the home. Parents, if you bring children into the world, you have an obligation to put them on the safe road to Heaven.

More Memories of Growing Up in West Waterford

We could be heard for miles around — "Pass it," "Cross it," "Down the wing" we shouted as the hurling was played with great verve and gusto. The excitement was always feverish in The Blacks at Dunmoon Cross. It was there that we, as youngsters, spent many a Summer's evening. We used gather at about 7.30 p.m. (Summer Time or New time as it was known, was not observed at that time). Teams were picked by lot. All the hurleys were placed on the ground and some adult picked them out and as each one was picked it was placed to the left or the right and claimed by its owner. If there was any apparent imbalance some swapping over was made.

There were usually about twelve or sixteen of us — girls as well as boys. All the families living at The Cross were represented — Aherns, Donovans, Murrys, as well as Tom Geary, Brendan Ryan and members of the McGrath family and any others who might come on the scene. Dinny Cody acted as referee or more accurately as mediator as there were frequent disputes. The rules were not too stringent and the ball only went out of play over the end lines when it went into the ditch at one side or became unplayable in the bracken at the other side. There was always a number of spectators — the parents of the players as well as any passers-by who might stop and look for a while. Breaks in the play sometimes came when

the ball went into Thady Donovan's garden, where it was often difficult to find. My first hurley, if one could call it that, was made for me by my grandfather, from a piece of laurel with a natural turn. He shaped it with a billhook — the only tool at his disposal. It was more like a shinty stick than a hurley. Though it was not designed to pick the ball off the ground it had great "togaint" for ground hurling. I often think that there were no opportunities for the girls to play camogie in those days. We had some very good players and one in particular — Kitty Ahern — could hold her own with any of the boys. I am full sure she would be able to hold her own with the great present day Kilkenny player — Angela

Downey. There was no time limit on the game so that play went on until it became difficult to follow the flight of the ball in the fading light. Despite the fact that the hurling was, as a rule, tough and hard, there were never any serious injuries — a few knuckles or bruised shins perhaps. It was from this place that we graduated to play at higher level. Some of the older boys later formed the nucleus of the Kilwatermoy junior team, which was able to hold its own with the best in the county.

GOT PROPER HURLEYS

As we advanced of course we had proper hurleys. Most of these were made locally by men such as Connie Donovan, Will Russell and Mike Hickey of Knockanore. Ash trees with a natural turn were in great demand and it was not unusual for the local landowners to find ash trees cut down — the top left, and the trunk missing. The Guards were sometimes called in to investigate but of course the missing trunks were never found. These were hidden well and left to season for a time before they were cut

into planks. They in turn were left to season for a time before any attempt was made to finally shape them. Very good hurling balls were made for us by John Barry, a saddler, who carried on business in Pender's yard at West Street, Tallow. John made a very good ball from a cork core wrapped in jute twine and covered in horse hide. The finished article was pure white with a grey figure of eight seam. For this John charged four shillings (twenty pence in today's money). Of course he could buy eight bottles of stout for that money, a beverage he was most partial to. For restitching a broken ball he charged one shilling. Some of us who were too young to join the junior team were recruited to play with the Tallow minor team. The recruiting officer was Tom Burke, a vanman for Bride Valley Stores. On his rounds he was forever on the lookout for youngsters with potential. I was one of those recruited. At a future time I will place on record the happy days I spent with the Tallow team, which culminated with a County Championship win in 1938. — M.M.

Know Your Rights

Q. — My husband has been working in England for the past few months. As we weren't sure how things would work out I have continued to draw my Child Benefit here. At least I am sure of this money each month. Can I continue to do this or must we claim the English Child Benefit? What is the procedure in claiming it from the UK and can it be paid to me?

A. — As your husband is now working in the UK and you are not employed or self-employed here, then the responsibility for paying your Child Benefit rests with the DHSS in the UK. The rate of benefit is £7.25 per week for each qualified child. So, there would be an advantage in transferring onto it.

However, you have no choice in the matter and strictly speaking, you should have notified the Child Benefit Section here that your husband was working in the UK. You will see instructions about this inside the back cover of your allowance book. The procedure now would be for your husband to apply to the DHSS in the UK for Child Benefit. He can nominate you to receive the payment which would normally be paid every four weeks in arrears by payable order or by direct transfer into your bank account here every 13 weeks in arrears.

The Child Benefit Section here would be advised that you had been awarded UK Benefit and your book would be recalled.

Should you become employed or self-employed here, then the position would change and you would again be eligible for Irish Child Benefit and would also be paid a top up amount by the DHSS to bring your payment up to the English rate.

Deasy Lauds Goodman During Dail Debate

During the emergency Dail debate on the Larry Goodman affair last week, Deputy Austin Deasy (FG) former Minister for Agriculture had this to say:

"Larry Goodman's reign might be over but we all hope that the Goodman empire will be maintained and that the Examiner (to examine the Goodman situation) will sell it off as a series of going concerns and that the overall enterprise will continue. It is important that the industry as we know it is retained.

"This whole episode reminds me of a dancehall brawl where a big fellow is knocked down and every 'gurrier' in the place wants to put the boot in.

"Larry Goodman has done more for the beef industry in this country and for agriculture than any other individual since the foundation

of the State and let anybody try to contradict me on that. Next to the Taoiseach and Deputy Liam Lawlor I probably know the man better than anybody else in this assembly. He is a tough, hard-headed businessman. He has brought agriculture and the beef industry here out of the 19th century and into the 20th. He has created an empire which employs 2,500 people, which processes 40 per cent of the beef here and which has raised farm incomes enormously.

"In the mid-70's when we joined the EC, the catchcry was that we should keep the jobs at home and

stop exporting cattle on the hoof. That is exactly what Larry Goodman has done. When we joined the EC, 70 per cent of Irish beef was exported as live cattle. To-day the amount that is exported is as low as two or three per cent of the

total. Let us not overlook the good this man has done. If there are criminal charges to be answered, let them be answered but let us judge people on what they have attained and according to the law of the land."

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

A LETHAL HABIT CREEPING INTO DUNGARVAN

During the past week it has come to our notice that a new lethal habit is becoming prevalent in Dungarvan amongst the younger generation in recent times. Known as gas sniffing it has been brought back from England by a local youth and is now replacing the equally dangerous game of glue sniffing amongst those seeking what are commonly known as "kicks" or "highs".

Gas sniffing involves cigarette lighter fuel and cylinders of butane gas and having consulted with the Garda authorities in the town we feel it is our duty to warn all youngsters and indeed parents of the lethal consequences of the practice.

Last week a Dublin inquest heard how a 23-year-old man died after inhaling cigarette lighter gas. Evidence at the inquest revealed that the victim was found in his bedroom and appeared to be having some sort of fit and was gasping for breath. A cylinder of butane gas was found on the bed. The Coroner returned a verdict that the man died from massive cardiac arrest (heart failure) as a result of inhaling butane gas. He said that the inhalation was deliberate but that the man had not intended to die!

We also recall that earlier this year there was another gas sniffing victim nearer home when a young man was found dead in Fitzgerald Park, Waterford, and the inquest verdict in his case was also death from the inhalation of butane gas.

So serious are the owners of some of the sales outlets where this lighter fuel and butane gas can be purchased in Dungarvan in their efforts to curb this habit that they have initiated a campaign to check on their sales in an effort to ensure that the lighter fuel and gas does not fall into the wrong hands. In other words they are anxious to see that none of these items are sold to young people who may be suspected of using them in this highly dangerous sniffing game.

Parents, too, should be warned that this lethal habit is prevalent in the town and they can help to curb it by warning their young people of the dangers involved.

Let us hope that we all can succeed in doing this before a fatality such as those referred to above occurs.

THE MEANING OF THE WORD 'CLOGHCAS'

Throughout the celebration of the "Augustinian

700" in Abbeyside last week, the word "Cloghcas" kept cropping up. It refers as far as the old inhabitants of the Village are concerned to the ruined area adjoining Abbeyside Parish Church. There, following the concelebrated Mass on Tuesday evening, a commemorative plaque was unveiled by Chairman of the organising committee, Michael Fives and Most Rev Dr. Russell, Bishop of the Diocese, speaking at the unveiling, complimented the Augustinians on their 700 years of service to the church here and he also thanked the members of the organising committee and everyone who was associated with the wonderful and spectacular event.

But to get back to the word "Cloghcas" and its meaning. Very obviously it is an Irish word and having failed to locate it in the Irish dictionary in our possession, we contacted the well-known Ring teacher, Nioclás MacCraith who is a recognised authority on Gaedhealg sean-aimsearach agus nua-aimsearach, and he informed us that "Cloghcas" is the Irish word for a belfry or shrine. So now you know!

Incidentally before finally leaving the subject we think that it is worth noting one of the lighter moments during the "Augustinian 700" celebration. This came when the Augustinians who had taken part in the boat landing pageant came ashore and had been greeted by the very large gathering present. They were then welcomed by the Parish Curate, Rev. Fr. Peter Ahearne, who was deputising for the Parish Priest, Very Rev. Canon Farrell, unavoidably absent due to illness. Announcing that the Augustinians had landed safely, he remarked that they had found the natives friendly which brought a ripple of laughter from all present.

BACK TO SCHOOL

The long summer holiday came to an end this week as schools in all areas reopened for the new school year. For the toddlers it brought a new phase to their young lives as they set off for the first time on the road to ultimate scholastic achievement. For many it was a tearful start and in several instances this also included mothers who were suffering the heartache of a first parting from their baby boys and girls.

It all marks the passage of time and it's amazing how quickly all will adjust to the new rhythms of life. We say good luck to all as the years ahead unfold for them.

DO SPEED LIMIT SIGNS MEAN ANYTHING?

At the last meeting of the County Council, local Councillor Oliver Coffey proposed a motion calling on the Council to introduce a 30 m.p.h. speed limit zone in Kilrossanty Village. It was agreed that the proposal should be referred to the Garda Authorities which are the competent authority to deal with such proposals to include it in the list for the next revision of speed limit zones for the county.

This decision prompts us to again ask whether such speed limit signs and zones really mean anything. We ask the question, as we have done a couple of times in the past, especially in relation to the ring road or by-pass in Dungarvan. This stretch of new road is covered by a 40 m.p.h. speed restriction from Abbeyside to Youghal Road but any time we have driven over it at the permitted limit, everything coming from behind passes us as if we were stationary.

The road has a number of repeater signs warning drivers that it is a 40 m.p.h. limit zone along its entire length but not only cars but also the articulated juggernauts using the road, completely ignore the signs as they have turned it into a virtual speed track, rushing over it at speeds up to 60 and 70 m.p.h.

We acknowledge that the road lends itself to speeding and that the law governing speed limits is more commonly breached than observed but that is not good enough reason for the dirt track speeding that so regularly takes place along its entire length despite the intervention of a set of traffic lights and a roundabout.

The roadway has also become popular with pedestrians as it forms part of a number of convenient circuits for those wishing to go for evening walks. Now, however, the evenings are fast closing in and soon (alas!) darkness will take over with a consequent increase in the danger to pedestrians from speeding vehicles.

As we say, we again draw attention to this danger

merely in the context of the motion proposed by Cllr. Oliver Coffey at the last County Council meeting and ask what signifi-

cance if any, do these speed limit signs, or indeed most other traffic signs (i.e. yield, stop, etc.) have for the majority of motorists.

Fifty Thousand Pilgrims Visit Melleray Grotto In August!

Down the decades pilgrimages to Lourdes have taken place from every diocese in the country. But now as the message of the reported apparitions at a grotto nestling beneath the shadows of the Cistercian Monastery at Mount Melleray in Co. Waterford spreads across Europe the indications are that many French pilgrims are undertaking the "reverse pilgrim route" to Ireland.

As the fifth anniversary celebrations of the August 1985 apparition at Melleray grotto draw to a close, the local Grotto Committee estimate that in excess of 50,000 people have visited the grotto during the month of August.

Thousands have come from the four corners of Ireland, but — significantly — many thousands too have come from foreign parts. Among them a coachload of French pilgrims who journeyed specially from their home place of Marseille which is just 300 kilometres from Lourdes.

That pilgrim party was led by Sr. Andre and Sr.

Nancy and Jean Marie Salvan, whose interest in the story of the Melleray apparitions emanated from the publication last year of a French version of local man Bill Deevy's book on the grotto.

Entitled "Notre-Dame Apparait en Irlande" it has been circulated extensively throughout France and has sparked off a quite intense interest in the Melleray story among the French population.

A German version of the book, "Die Gottesmutter Erscheint in Irland" has also gone on sale and the indications too are that it is generating considerable interest throughout West Germany.

The Marseille pilgrims spoke of "the peace and contentment" which the visit to the Melleray grotto gave them, while Jean Marie Salvan described the grotto as "a little peace of heaven."

Jean Marie said that now that his party had found Melleray, and know all about its history, he is confident pilgrims from France will be visiting the grotto in increasing numbers in the years to come.

Since the reported apparitions at the grotto between August 16 and 24, 1985, when three local children claimed to have seen and spoken to Our Lady, it has become a place of non-stop pilgrimage.

Each anniversary of the apparitions has been suitably celebrated, and the grotto committee say that crowds are increasing all

the time.

"This year's attendance surpassed all previous years, and we estimate that about 500,000 have now been to the grotto in the last decade," a committee spokesman said.

"PEACE BUS"

A "peace bus" from Drogheda has become almost a way of life at the grotto. It is there on an increasingly regular basis exclusively conveying the youth from Co. Louth to Melleray.

Social worker Elnor Branigan, who is the organiser of the "peace bus" said one of the results of their visits to the grotto is that it has meant a return to Mass and religious practice for many of those who had strayed away from the Church.

"It is something very special coming to the grotto in Melleray," said Elnor.

Meanwhile the weekly Saturday night vigils at the grotto continue to draw the crowds. Buses from as far away as Belfast are commonplace, and on one recent such vigil there were no fewer than seventeen coaches, seven from the North, which had brought the pilgrims to the grotto from all over the country.

In the face of whatever scepticisms may still prevail about the Melleray apparitions, the grotto as a place of peace and prayer is gathering momentum all the time.

Not just in Ireland alone, but now across the countries of Europe from where many future pilgrimages will be coming.

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This Week Teagasc Co. Waterford Says . . .

BE CAREFUL WITH ANTIBIOTICS

All dairy farmers should now be well aware of the high standards and stiff penalties that apply to antibiotic contaminated milk.

While prevention of mastitis should be the aim of every dairy farmer, the disease will occur and must be treated with antibiotics to effect a cure.

There are two main areas

in which treatment is necessary: (a) During lactation, (b) During the dry period.

TREATMENT OF LACTATING COWS

The first point to be made is that only approved products should be used and an accurate record of the date and time of treatment should be kept. Read the instructions carefully and abide by them, ensuring that the milk is withheld for the required time. Remember that it is not just intramammary infusions that can result in residue in the milk but also injections.

DRY COW THERAPY

Dry cow therapy is a useful weapon in mastitis prevention. However, many positive antibiotic results arise from improper management of cows after calving. Dry cow preparations differ greatly in the length of time the active ingredient remains in the udder. This can be as short as four weeks and as long as ten weeks. Before deciding which preparation to use, consult your veterinary surgeon to ensure that you use the correct one.

SLURRY GAS CAN BE FATAL

Slurry gas has accounted for a number of deaths in recent years. Fatalities are due to hydrogen sulphide, a lethal gas which is released during slurry agitation. The real danger is when slurry is being agitated on a calm day. As soon as the slurry crust is broken, large amounts of gas are released. Teagasc farm safety specialist, John McNamara, has produced a series of safety guidelines for slurry handling operations. They are:

- ★ Agitate slurry only on a windy day.
- ★ Open all doors to allow thorough ventilation.
- ★ Stay out of buildings during agitation, especially at the early stages.
- ★ Never enter a slurry tank without full breathing apparatus.
- ★ Avoid smoking or naked flames during agitation.
- ★ Never allow children near buildings during agitation.

STUBBLE CULTIVATION PAYS

With harvesting complet-

ed early this year stubble cultivation should facilitate the germination of many weed seed present in the soil. Seed germination between crops reduces the problem of weed control the following year. This is especially true for weeds such as wild oats.

Soil must be broken into a fine tilth and a second pass should be given as soon as the ground starts to green up so as to encourage more seeds to germinate. The germinated seeds can then be ploughed in.

New Forestry Grants Welcomed With Caution by I.C.M.S.A

"The new forestry grant schemes announced by the Minister for Energy, Bobby Molloy, T.D., will provide much needed income for farmers, both inside and outside the Disadvantaged Areas", said Mr. Dan McCarthy, Chairman of the I.C.M.S.A. Family Farm Committee.

Mr. McCarthy said that the operational programme for forestry is a lifeline which will help to maintain farming communities over the next twenty years.

"The forestry premium scheme means that farmers can plant marginal land and receive a realistic premium rate, which in addition to another enterprise will provide a continuity of income for the next two decades. This and the resulting jobs which will be created in the transport and forest processing sectors is good news for family farmers", said Mr. McCarthy.

However, he cautioned that the extension of the forestry scheme may have social repercussions if care is not taken by Coillte Teo to ensure that strict criteria is applied to planting so that rural dwellers are not planted out of existence.

Get rid of the thatch and other debris

SEPTEMBER can be a real pleasure for the gardener even though there are quite a few jobs to be done.

The enjoyment comes from the traditional dryness and lower humidity than in the peak summer months, so 'pottering' about is much less of a chore.

The lawn should need less mowing and you can start raising the mower blade height so that the grass can toughen up for winter.

You can also improve lawn condition before the colder weather by using a spring rake or a specialist electric mower/rake to remove the thatch.

Disease

It's hard work with a large lawn, so the rotating tines of the electric rake can be a godsend in collecting thatch, a spongy build-up of dead grass, moss and other debris, which can stop water and fertiliser reaching the grass roots as well as harbouring moss, weeds and disease.

You can also sow seed for a new lawn or repairs until the end of the month, but new turf may be laid from now until next April except during severe cold.

You should also start planting spring bulbs this month and remember the rule of thumb that the earlier they are to flower, the earlier they must be planted, so snowdrops and crocuses get priority.

Meanwhile, hyacinths, tulips, daffodils and narcissi can wait until October or even into November, but there is nothing lost by planting now if you have time.

You can also sow hardy annuals for next year, such as cornflower, larkspur,



pansies and love-in-the-mist.

On the vegetable patch you should be lifting beet-root, carrots and, when the tops yellow, potatoes. Store them somewhere dark, cool and dry and protect from vermin. Parsnips can stay in the soil until needed.

It is also best to harvest outdoor tomatoes now that nights are getting cooler. Green fruit can be ripened inside paper bags left somewhere warm such as an airing cupboard.

If you aim to raise strawberries next year then clear beds of weeds and their roots, before fertilising with organic material such as garden compost, manure or peat compost.

Clearing

Water the plants well before planting and keep them damp until they strengthen and establish.

One of the big chores before the onset of winter is to trim and tidy hedges, clearing out beneath them to prevent pests overwintering in the debris.

You can also start new hedges cheaply or add thickness to existing ones by 'heeling' sturdy shoots on such varieties as privet.

Cut away shoots about eight inches long to leave a small heel of wood and bark where the shoot joined the main stem. This shoot is then planted half into moist sand and should soon provide a young plant.

Chilli Salad

Ingredients:

- 1 green pepper, diced
- 1 red pepper, diced
- 1lb Potatoes, peeled, diced and cooked
- 4 spring onions, sliced
- 2oz mushrooms, washed and sliced
- 7/2oz can kidney beans, washed
- few drops Tabasco sauce

5 tablespoons Mayonnaise

Method:

In a large bowl, combine all the prepared vegetables and add the washed kidney beans.

Mix together in a separate bowl, the tabasco sauce and mayonnaise, pour over the prepared salad, combine thoroughly and serve.

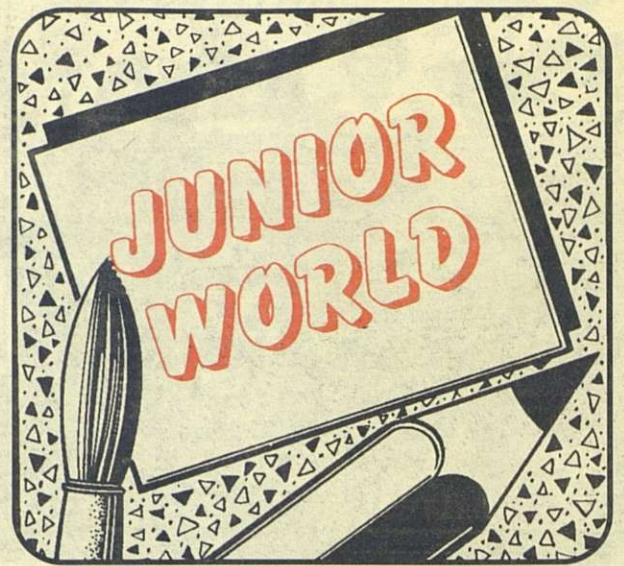

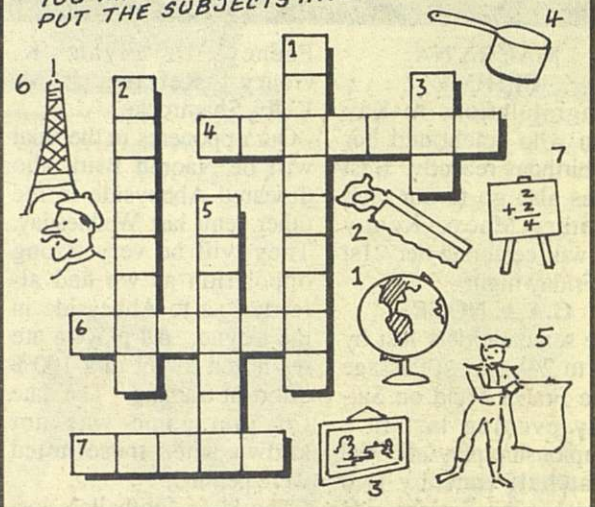

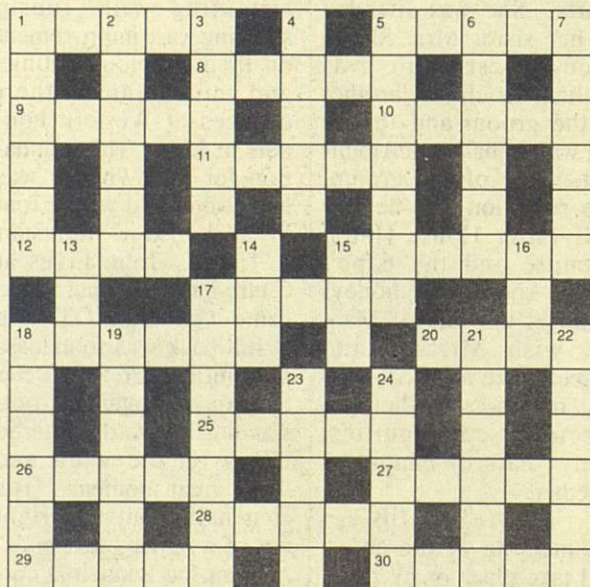

Exciting Weekend Programme

The knockout stages are always the exciting point of the championships, but unfortunately when the time arrives for these we invariably have a number of annoying clashes of top-class matches. That is the case for the coming weekend when we have such interesting and attractive matches as the two senior hurling quarter-finals — one at Dungarvan and the other at Walsh Park. The two junior hurling finals at Cappoquin and the Western intermediate football final between Faha and Shamrocks at the strange time of 6.30 p.m. in Cappoquin. The last of the play-off matches in football will take place at Leamybrien on Saturday and this will involve the Nire versus Dunhill/Kilmacthomas.

FAHA V. SHAMROCKS

This intermediate football final clash at Cappoquin is by far the Western Board's glamour game in the big ball championship and it is unfortunate that it has to be forced into an unsuitable time. Again, I suppose, it goes to highlight the fixture problems that have to be overcome and always some clubs must suffer an inconvenience. This one is a pity as I feel sure that it will be a splendid game of exciting football with the winners going to the county final.

Both sides have experience of finals. Shamrocks will be playing in their third Western final in succession and the ironic thing about their losing to Sliabh gCua last year was chiefly because of the presence of the former Mitchels player, Kieran Power. Now in meeting Faha in the current final they have the same Kieran Power to contend with again, as during the year he transferred to Faha and has played a leading role in their advance so far.

When asked if they would make history by beating Shamrocks to qualify for the intermediate County final in the season following their junior county final victory, I got the reply that they were afraid of players like Casey, Dalton and Neville, who were great county players, but they

thought overall they might just about win.

Shamrocks have many more good players as well, otherwise the club would not be in their third final on the trot and because of their record I would like to make them favourites here, but I hesitate only because I saw Faha play so well against Ardmore. On the basis of that display, I could see the Matty Scurry, Ger and Paudie Casey, Ger Power, Liam Connors, Eddie Lannon, Michael Kiely and company led Faha coming out on top here. Faha have an unusual record of being involved in drawn games and it won't surprise if history repeats itself here.

BALLYDUFF V. PORTLAW

The result of this very attractive clash at the Fraher Field on Sunday will herald the end of the road for one or other of the contestants in the present championship and with this worrying thought uppermost in the minds of both Ballyduff and Portlaw, the match will produce an all-out battle from start to finish.

Having become accustomed to playing in a competition and with a system where the results were in no way terminal, players must now suddenly wake up to the fact that there are no more escape hatches in the championship and if you lose at this stage, then everything will suddenly stop until next season.

For Ballyduff's group of players who have brought honour and glory to the club in the 80's, it can be sadly written that a few who are reaching the veteran stage, do not have too many playing seasons left. Let me hasten to write that the same applies to Portlaw and what a pity that many of the really great men from both teams who thrilled us over the years will soon be spending their time on the sideline.

Anyway, to leave the obituary and get back to the preview, let me say that this match should produce one of the better games of the championship — if both

play to their potential. Should Ballyduff lose, it will reduce to one the number of Western teams remaining in the race for the title and will leave Tallow, who were relegated less than a year ago, as the sole representatives of the division.

Portlaw, now being trained by Kieran Purcell, are a far better team than when they played Ballyduff here in the '89 championship. I remember writing after that one that Ballyduff were not flattered by their eleven points winning margin (2-13 to 0-8) and that Portlaw were struggling for most of the hour. As seen by their three displays against Roanmore, this is a far different Portlaw team and it will take a mammoth effort by Ballyduff to withstand this challenge and unless they show improvement from last Saturday evening when losing to Passage, I believe that they will go out of the race for the title. Ballyduff, at their very best, might just about come through.

MOUNT SION V. ROANMORE

This most attractive clash, which is very much a local derby, will certainly pack the crowds into Walsh Park on Sunday and down in the city it is being perceived as the match of the championship.

Roanmore who defeated Ballyduff in last year's epic decider have not played as impressively this season and on a couple of occasions didn't play like county champions. The kind of rivalry which exists here will surely bring out the best in players like Noel Crowley, Kieran Delahunty, John Ryan, Ray Sheridan, Tom Shanahan, Albert Burke, Eddie Nolan, Maurice Wadding and company and this Mount Sion, twice beaten by Ballyduff, will need to up their display here if they are to advance. Pat Ryan, who missed the match with Ballyduff, will be back for Sunday's game, and if in top form his presence will make a difference to Mount Sion's chances.

With players of the cali-

bre of Ger Fitzpatrick, Kevin Ryan, Peter Walsh, Michael Flanagan, John Meaney, Paraigh Fanning, Brian Green, Shane Ahearne and company all performing at their best, Mount Sion, now in the role of challengers, might just about squeeze through.

JUNIOR HURLING SEMI-FINALS

As I wrote elsewhere, what a pity it is that our two attractive junior hurling semi-finals are clashing with another nearby attractive fixture. Both those games are expected to produce the best in the grade and by all accounts we are going to have two very close contests.

TALLOW V. CLASHMORE

Tallow will be fielding their second team, but second string teams from Tallow invariably mean something extra. A fairly well founded rumour tells that Pat Daly, who starred many times at senior level for the club, will be back to play and his presence, even after a very long lay-off could be a factor in deciding this game, for which Clashmore are very worthy qualifiers.

Clashmore, I was told, would have preferred to meet any of the other two in their semi-final, but at the same time they are not at all worried and feel that they can beat Tallow.

AN RINN V. BALLYDUFF

This is the other one and it is billed as the feature game on the programme and very likely this higher profile was acquired by reason of their record of clashes over the past couple of seasons. There is very little on form between Ballyduff and the Gaeltacht side who had to meet three times last year before Ballyduff eventually came through. I would not like to make a forecast on this one as it can go either way.

The new senior hurling selectors are Danny Murphy, Roanmore, Senan Cooke, Dunhill and Seamie Hannon, Ballyduff West. They are appointed for a term of two years. The outgoing under 21 hurling selectors were returned for another year; James Tobin, Shamrocks, Paddy Walsh, Colligan, Pat Flynn, Ballygunner, John Galvin, Portlaw and Noel Costello, Stradbally.

SEMI-FINAL DRAWS

The following are the draws for the S.H. semi-finals: Tallow v. Mount Sion or Roanmore; Passage v. Ballyduff or Portlaw.

PRESENTATION

At the end of the meeting, the chairman on behalf of

the Board, presented John Moore with a beautifully inscribed Silver Salver to mark his refereeing of the All-Ireland final on the previous day. He was congratulated on his splendid handling of the match — one of the best finals in recent times, and congratulations were also extended to his umpires. John suitably replied. A report of the other matters dealt with will be reported next week.

UNWANTED DRAW

On Monday night, Kilmacthomas and Dunhill played an unwanted draw (2-5 to 0-11) in their S.F. play off game at Leamybrien.

OPEN DRAW

Following a long discussion, the meeting decided on a vote to support the motion to have the Munster hurling and football championships played on an open draw.

Ballyduff Go Down In Exciting Encounter

A half-time lead of 2 points wasn't enough to stave off defeat for the favourites, Ballyduff in this exciting game which saw the teams level on no fewer than nine times.

Ballyduff were not as sharp as when beating Mount Sion two weeks ago and Passage were on top of their form all through the hour.

How They Finished

All matches in the group sections have now been played and with the unraveling process finally completed there will be no further confusion about what will happen next. This applies to the hurling championship and we must wait until next Saturday to find the sixth team before completing the football line-up.

The position now is that Roanmore will play Mount Sion in one quarter final and Ballyduff will meet Portlaw in the other.

After this, a draw will take place and both semi-finals will be played on September 23rd.

Cork Win Exciting All-Ireland

The sixty-five and a half thousand people who sat or stood in Croke Park on Sunday and the millions who watched on television are agreed that this was undoubtedly one of the best All-Ireland hurling finals played for a long number of years. It was delightfully skillful, tremendously fast and it produced a total of 43 scores, many of them being 'copy book' examples of how it should be done.

The game was hectic and exciting and was played in a wonderful atmosphere by two very sporting counties whose entire concentration was on winning. Like the Munster final six weeks ago, this was a triumph for hurling and it must do a lot to promote the game all over.

JOHN MOORE

John can now feel very satisfied with himself that he was the man in the middle of these two wonderful exhibitions of hurling in the first year of the final decade of the century and his handling of Sunday's final played a major role in making it one of the best finals of the present generation. His style of refereeing was totally suited to the kind of game that it was and his policy of allowing the game to flow and at the same time, keeping strict control added enormously to both the quality of the game and the enjoyment of the spectators. After the final, I heard John being complimented personally by the

President of the Association and other top officials at Croke Park on his performance and his contribution to this really great final. It is something that he and Waterford people can be justifiably proud of. Congratulations too, to his fine team of umpires, Michael Lyons, Pat Moore, Noel Sheehan, and Kevin Moore for their fine contribution to the overall management of the final.

MINOR FINAL

This tremendous final ended in a draw, following Cork's amazing come-back from being ten points down at one stage. As a spectacle, the second half of this exciting encounter can have had few equals in recent times. This, by the way, was the seventeenth match in the All-Ireland series and as could be observed from the programme, Waterford were the only county to score a total of 4-11 and still lose. Both Kilkenny and Cork had an equal score (3-14 each) on Sunday, but neither lost — so far anyway.

New League Format

As was announced already, the National Leagues are to continue to be played at the same time as heretofore, but from next year on a new structure will reduce the number of Sundays on which league matches will be played and counties are likely to be required to play hurling and football on the same day, at least on a couple of occasions.

The top division in the hurling league will be confined to the top twelve hurling counties and will be played in two sections of six teams with an inter-provincial mix. The twelve will consist of the eight who will qualify from the present league and the top four from division 2.

Waterford will play in division 2 of the football which will consist of fourteen teams (if, of course we fail to qualify for division 1 which will be confined to the top eighteen counties at the end of the present

league). This will be played in two sections of seven teams and there is a promotion and relegation arrangement built in as well.

The county football selectors here have selected a 25 man panel of players who will shortly go into training for the league and the 'B' All-Ireland and the names of the players will be announced by the committee on this Friday evening. Because of the late running of the championships very many of the selected players will still be tied up with their clubs.

Whatever happens from here on, Abbeyside will remember this exciting quarter-final match against St. Saviours, as the one that nearly got away. Over the hour they were the better team, but their failure to translate their superiority into scores when chances went abegging made their performance an agonising experience for their supporters, but it must be said as well that it was the team's best display for a number of years. It was, in fact, the third game in a row in which they hung on by a single score to win while on this occasion a single point was enough to take them into the county semi-final and a date with Shamrocks on next Saturday week.

A point by Timmy Murphy and another by Pat Walsh in the 19th gave the Villagers a 1-4 lead before Saviours opened with a fine point by Tony Corcoran. In fairly rapid succession, Foskin and Barry had goals for the visitors to leave it 1-4 to 2-1 at the break.

Twomey and Corcoran opened with points to give Saviours the lead which was pegged back when Mark Reynolds shot home a goal. Pat Walsh had a point to stretch Abbeyside's lead and this was again extended when Timmy Murphy's goal put them five up in the 38th minute. In the 42nd minute, Walsh pointed for Abbeyside who were now looking certain to take

the game, but Saviours at this stage threw everything they knew into the game and in an all-out effort, took over and had the next six scores to put them two points up in the 55th minute. Changes Coming?

In the recently published report of the Games Development Committee, several radical changes are proposed in the running of our championships and other competitions and while all of these might not find favour with County Boards, it is confidently expected that some of them will.

Among the proposed changes are — the abolition of both the inter-county junior championships in hurling and football; the phasing out of the under 21 club and inter-county competitions, also in hurling and football; the raising of the minor age from 18 to 19; they also recommend that the under 14 grades be no

longer given the status of a championship. The report also recommended properly structured club leagues and a knockout championship in all counties.

The full report is much broader than outlined here and may be discussed by the County Board sometime before the end of the season.

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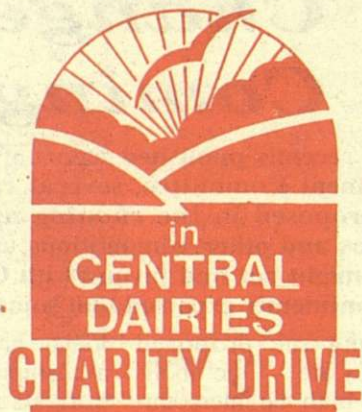


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TOURANEENA NOTES
