Waterford IFA Send Open Letter to the Minister for Agriculture

The Waterford County Executive IFA have addressed the following open letter to the Minister for Agriculture and Food, Mr. Michael O'Kennedy:

Dear Minister,

At a full emergency meeting of the Waterford County Executive Officers of the IFA it was decided to write to you expressing our grave concern regarding the severe income crisis being experienced by farmers in our county.

A significant number of farmers in the county, already on very low incomes — many below the poverty

line — will be forced out of farming and made to rely solely on Social Welfare to sustain their families.

We take this opportunity to demand that you take all the steps necessary at the Council of Ministers meeting next week to achieve realistic measures to alleviate the current crisis.

Minister, take notice that the farmers of this county

are monitoring your performance.

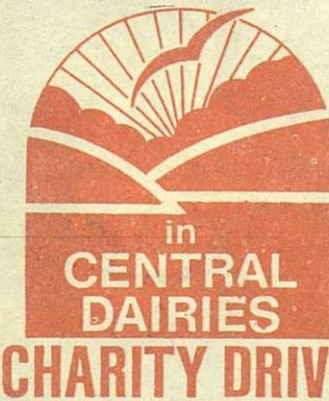

Going Underground In Dungarvan

In conjunction with the resurfacing of town centre streets in Dungarvan at present being carried out by Dungarvan Urban Council following the completion of the town centre sewerage scheme, arrangements have been made with the ESB and with the Casey Television Co., to place all overhead power lines and cable vision lines underground in the town centre area.

The areas concerned are the Square, Main Street (down to L&N Store), Mary Street (up to Bowmans), O'Connell Street (up to Fitzgerald's Man Shop), Bridge Street (down to Lawlor's Hotel) and Cross Bridge Street.

Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce Retail Committee have sent a request to all retailers in the areas mentioned to give as much assistance as possible to make the operation a speedy and successful one.

They point out that a similar operation completed recently in Ardmore with the assistance of Waterford Co. Council which undergrounded all ESB and Telecom Eireann overhead cables has resulted in a dramatic effect on the landscape there.

"There has never been so much focus on our Environment as there is today, and we are delighted to see Local Government and its agencies leading the way," the Chamber of Commerce letter states.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

IT DOES NOT MEAN HAVING THE BEST OF BOTH WORLDS!

Isaiah, in the first reading, was telling listeners about the formation of a new people of God, and he makes it clear that if they hope to be part of this community, they must renounce their evil ways. He endeavours to win their confidence by highlighting the gentleness of the God of love. And, he stresses that there's no place for fear. His door is always open, and never has it been known that he failed to hear a cry for help. He tells them to be mindful of His love, and the gentle way in which He dispenses His mercy. He is saying, it is impossible to provide a true and accurate picture of God's compassion, because it is infinite and defies all measurement. Isaiah tells his listeners not to doubt God's goodness. It is true we are always too ready to judge, whereas God is always ready to grant forgiveness.

The psalmist said "The Lord is gracious, and slow to anger . . . He is just in all His ways." If you consider the insults, the abuse, the neglect, etc, which the good Lord has to endure, you'd wonder how He has such patience. Even good people will question and blame God for the course of events, often caused by themselves, when they neither know or understand the mind of God. We must learn to trust our Father. Whatever the circumstances, if we have faith in God, we'll run to Him, and He'll enable us to draw strength even from troubled waters. Hence, no matter how deeply you may be bogged down with sin, remember God is near. You have only to cry, and He'll throw you a lifebelt.

St. Paul in the second reading explains how the Christian, through Baptism, is incorporated into the Body of Christ, and, as a result, he is able to manifest the greatness of God. He goes on to add that all members of Christ's Body will find that in the next life their bond with Christ will be secured, enriched and raised to a more perfect communion. Paul is conscious that death is the gateway to this glory, and whilst his heart yearns for this fulfilment, his mind makes him hesitate and consider his duty of opening the eyes of others to the greatness of this treasure. The lesson for us is, be grateful for the gift of faith. Nurture it, and guard it. And then, share your blessings with those who have lost their way. For example, parents have a grave duty to hand on the faith to their children. The First Commandment warns them of this grave duty. Indeed, few fail regarding their material responsibilities, but many do neglect to show them the road to Heaven! Imagine a father scraping into purgatory, and then having to sit, watch and wait as he sees his children walking through the minefields of life! The Gospel is easy to follow, but, the moment you try to analyse it, you meet difficulties. It would seem to flout social principles, and would certainly ruffle union leaders. Hence, it is important to bear in mind, not the details, but the point being made, which is, the last will be first. Yes, the parable as told by Jesus does refer to the point being made. He'd referred many times, as also had the prophets, to the infidelity of the chosen people. Jesus was intent on forming a new people of God, His Church. In times past He favoured His chosen people, but from now on He'd pour His blessings on the members of

His Church. The Israelites had been well rewarded for their services, but future places in God's heavenly kingdom would now be reserved for His children born in the waters of Baptism. So, the last to accept the faith received the primacy that once belonged to the children of Israel.

THE PRODIGAL SON

The scholars say to understand the parable better that it is worth recalling the story of the prodigal son. As you know, the elder son complains bitterly over the reception extended to his wayward brother. He'd always remained faithful, but never had his father shown him such favours. His anger arises because his brother, who'd squandered his inheritance, should be forgiven and honoured. He and the grumblers in the vineyard are well met! The workers were not protesting at having been unfairly treated, but because, those who'd worked from the eleventh hour, were so generously rewarded. Likewise, the faithful son had no grievance other than his brother, a sinner, should be given anything. There was no pity in his heart, and like the workers, he was filled with resentment and jealousy. I remember an old lady saying: "The third generation never prospers in Dungarvan." I feel, apart from farming areas, that that would be true of most towns due mostly to time and circumstances. However, it does bring home to us that envy and jealousy are prevalent in our community. Many hate to see their neighbour prosper, and, when as often happens, bad times fall upon a family, they rejoice. And, we are members of the new people of God! The people may fool themselves, but they won't fool God. Is it now much nicer and more wholesome to say, "God bless 'em, when prosperity comes their way, and God help em', when they fall on hard times". Our big problem is, we do not live our religion. The main message in the Gospel based on "the last will be first" is, the Jewish people when faithful were richly rewarded by God, but when their children turned to the worship of false gods, their places were given to the new children of God. When the writer speaks of reward, he is referring to eternal life, but he in no way enlarges on the measure of the reward. Yes, God is speaking to you in this Gospel. And, if in your foolishness you reject Him, your place will be given to another.

Young Woman Weeps When Sentenced At Dungarvan Court

A young woman wept hysterically after being sentenced to six months imprisonment at Dungarvan Court last week.

Mary Teresa Nolan (19), of 56 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, broke down after District Justice W. F. O'Connell had pronounced the sentence, but he later suspended signing the warrant pending a report from the Court Welfare Officer.

Nolan, who it was stated had no previous convictions, pleaded guilty to entering the Rich Rags

boutique at Friary Street, Dungarvan, on August 23 and stealing clothes, jewellery, cash and other property to the value of £1,162.

After sentencing the defendant, District Justice O'Connell commented that there are more and more crimes being committed in Dungarvan each year. "They are building up, but this court, in as much as it can, will put a stop to them," he said.

Supt. Ray McAndrew said Nolan was in the company of an older person when the raid took place. A stone was hurled through the boutique window at 4 a.m. and a large quantity of the stolen property was later recovered at

her home. He added that £816 worth of property had been recovered.

Mr. Niall King, Solr., said an accomplice was the main party behind the raid.

STRONG PLEA

Following Nolan's outburst after being sentenced, and after a very strong plea by Mr. King, Garda Murphy was recalled to the witness box by the Justice.

Garda Murphy confirmed that up to now the defendant had never come under garda notice.

District Justice O'Connell said he would postpone signing the warrant until November 14 when he also wanted a report on the defendant from the Court Welfare Officer.

"Superloo" Proposed For Dungarvan

On the proposal of Cllr. Paddy Power, Dungarvan Urban Council is to make inquiries into the costings and running of a "Superloo" in the town. Cllr. Power raised the matter at the Council's monthly meeting last week when he moved a motion requesting the Council to consider the upgrading of the present public toilet facilities in the town. He said that the existing public toilet at the Quay was in very bad condition and with the increase in the number of tourists and visitors to the town it was an absolute disgrace for Dungarvan.

Cllr. Power went on to say that he had recently been in Wexford where there was a "Superloo" in use and even though the installing cost at £35,000 was high he understood the Corporation there made it pay. He thought that they could do with one or even two of these for Dungarvan.

It was agreed to inquire into the costings and to discuss the matter further at the next Council meeting.

Court Sequel To Summer Crime Wave By Dungarvan Youths

A crime wave throughout the summer by a number of Dungarvan youths had a sequel when sittings of Dungarvan Court were resumed last week after the usual summer vacation period.

A longer than usual juvenile court session saw a number of these young law-breakers appearing on up to a grand total of 50 charges involving malicious damage to property, larceny and disorderly conduct in the town and district during the months of June, July and August with some of the charges relating to offences committed towards the end of last year and early this year.

The charges listed included malicious damage to a plate glass window to the amount of £300 at Hallahan's Chemist Shop on July 21; damage to a window to the amount of £30 at the Presentation Convent on July 1; breaking and entering the Shamrock Restaurant on July 2 and again between July 11 and 13 and stealing £47 in cash, damaging a cash register to the amount of £610 and breaking a plate glass window valued at £25; breaking and entering Power's Brewery and malicious damage to a door and roof to the amount of £50 on July 26; breaking and entering the Parochial House, Dungarvan on September 3 and stealing cash and spirits to the value of £65 and damaging two rear windows and an internal door to the amount of £30.

All the foregoing charges were brought against a 16 years old youth who pleaded guilty to some and not guilty to others. Having heard the evidence of the

investigating Gardai, District Justice O'Connell adjourned all the charges to the next court sitting on September 26 with a request for a report on the young offender from the Court Welfare Officer.

EIGHT MONTHS DETENTION

Another 16-year-old juvenile was charged with stealing £18 in cash at Strandside North, Abbeyside on July 19, the property of Maurice O'Donnell; malicious damage to 3 flower tubs at the Causeway value £150, property of Daniel Hurley, Co. Manager on July 18; disorderly conduct at Church St., on July 31; damage to two willow trees, flowers and shrubs to the value of £60 at the Causeway Park on the night of July 14/15; damage fascia boards at the Sports Complex at Quann's to the amount of £30 on July 29 and nine separate charges of damaging and stealing from a number of cars parked at various parts of the town on August 11 and 12.

Having heard the evidence of the investigating garda officers in these cases, District Justice O'Connell sentenced the youth to eight months detention at St. Patrick's Institution, Dublin.

SENT AWAY FOR TWO YEARS

As 14-years-old youth was next charged and the offences in his case included the damage to the parked cars on August 11

and 12 and in addition he was also charged with entering the house of Mrs. May Whelan, 13, Ringnasilloge Place on June 23 and stealing a handbag containing £20 and personal items and on the same date receiving £5 the property of Mrs. Whelan knowing it to have been stolen.

Further charges against this defendant included breaking and entering St. Mary's Primary School at Mitchel St., with intent to steal on July 30; between January 1 and 31 last at Strandside North, Abbeyside breaking into the Tennis Club and stealing a denim jacket; breaking and entering the Shamrock Restaurant between August 11 and 13 and stealing £5 in cash and breaking plate glass window valued £25; on August 28 breaking and entering the Town Library at Lower Main St. and stealing cash to the value of £117 and two rings valued at £567, the property of Dymna Foley.

The same defendant was also charged with the robbery of cash from Maurice O'Donnell and with damaging the flower tubs at the Causeway as previously mentioned. Other charges against him included breaking and entering Scoil Gharbhain, Emmet St., between October 27 and November 5 last year and stealing toys to the value of £50 and committing malicious damage amounting to £38 to a classroom; on February 5 at Strandside North, Abbeyside breaking and entering Minnie's Squash Club and stealing cash to the amount of £28 and a gent's gold watch valued £250 the property of Jim Byrne. There were also three charges of damaging parked cars on August 12.

In this case, having heard the garda evidence, District Justice O'Connell sentenced the young offender to 2 years detention in Trinity House. As he was being removed from the Court precincts, the youth was involved in a scuffle with a number of garda officers but he was placed in a garda patrol car and taken away.

Tony Wright calling for an additional bus stop at a suitable location on the Western side of the town, a letter was received from Mr. Frank King, District Manager, Bus Eireann, Waterford and considered by members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting last week.

Mr. King's letter stated: "We are favourably disposed to an additional stop at this point and I am ar-

ranging to have an examination carried out in the course of the next week or two with a view to selecting the most suitable point." The letter was noted with approval.

Abbeyside Planning Act Charge Adjourned

Dungarvan Urban Council brought a charge under the Planning and Development Acts against John Torrens, Knockyoolan, Clonea, Dungarvan at Dungarvan Court last week. The charge related to the alleged breach of regulations in regard to a premises at Sexton Street, Abbeyside.

Mr. M. McLoughlin Solr. (Lanigan & Curran) for the Council requested an adjournment to the court sitting on October 10 to enable a Book of Evidence to be prepared. The defendant has opted for a jury trial on the charge.

Rates Remission Sought For Ring Industry

Cllr. Jim Harty at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last week proposed that Criostal Na Rinne be granted a rates remission in accordance with the Act pertaining to Udaras na Gaeltachta industries.

Cllr. Harty said that this was a young, growing industry established by Mr. Eamonn O Turraoin in Ballynagoul which was deserving of every support.

The County Manager, Mr. Hurlley said that when the application for a remission was received it would be favourably considered.

Prospects For Sewage Treatment Plant For Dungarvan Harbour

Arising from a request by Cllr. Billy Kyne, Chairman, Waterford Co. Council for a report on any moves planned for the erection of a sewage treatment plant for Dungarvan Harbour, the matter was briefly discussed at the Council's monthly meeting last week. Cllr. Kyne pointed out that the Council would have to make their position clear within a year if they were to avail of an EC grant for such a plant and he asked if the Council had a positive policy for the erection of such a plant for the harbour.

The County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn said that they were looking into the possibilities of the situation with local industries and were seeking a suitable site. Some EC money for such a project was available and he was hoping to get the matter moving by the end of the year. He added that he would keep the Council informed of progress

in the matter.

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager said that the County Engineer was gathering information about such a project all the time and all the indications were that they were now moving towards the provision of a treatment plant in Dungarvan Harbour. "But," added Mr. Hurley, "there will be a lot of work to be done during the next eight months."

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

WE DO HAVE SOME OF THE TIDIEST TOWNS IN IRELAND

Several of the towns and villages in County Waterford can feel well pleased at the results of the 1990 Bord Failte Tidy Towns Competitions which were announced in Dublin last week.

Stradbally which are this year's regional and county award winners with a magnificent mark up of 186 points, missed winning the Overall title of Ireland's tidiest town by a mere two marks when the award went to Malahide, Co. Dublin with a score of 188.

Close behind Stradbally in Waterford, we had Ardmore with 185 points which shows how very keen the competition within the county is between these two beautiful and picturesque seaside resorts.

Then farther along the coast we had another of our seaside holiday spots, Passage East, scoring 182 marks.

The combined efforts of these three indeed puts Co. Waterford at the top of the Tidy Towns stakes and is something of which the residents of all three areas as well as the county at large can feel justly proud.

It is of interest to note that both Ardmore and Stradbally increased their marks in this year's competition by as many as 6 over the totals which each scored last year and this is a truly remarkable achievement as marks are extremely difficult to come by at such a high stage in the competition. Indeed, Ardmore especially has made great strides in enhancing the natural beauty of this lovely old world seaside resort, when it may be recalled that in the Tidy Town Competition of 1965, they scored 63 points!

While the other towns and villages around the county may not have scored as well as Stradbally, Ardmore and Passage in this year's competition, they were all pretty well up in the adjudicators' results sheets as the following marks would indicate for the other entrants: Aghish Village 152; Ballymacarbry 174; Clashmore 165; Villierstown 160; Crooke 148; Cappoquin 161; Dunmore East 178; Lismore 167; Portlaw 148; Tallow 135; Dungarvan 161 and Tramore 172.

In all these circumstances it is a pleasure for us to congratulate especially

Stradbally for which 1990 has now proved such a special year and also Ardmore and Passage and all the other towns and villages of the county which have been striving to make their localities better places to live in. Keep up the good work and so ensure in the years ahead that Waterford will continue to be the nicest and tidiest county in the country.

GOOD EXAM RESULTS

The results of the Intermediate and Group Cert exams reached anxious students all round the county last Friday morning and reports from all areas are that generally the results were very good and in some cases quite outstanding.

It was evident from the groups of excited, chattering boys and girls which were to be seen comparing notes around the streets of Dungarvan on Friday that the majority were more than happy.

And while the mood was one of exuberance, the celebrations that took place later in the night, here in Dungarvan at any rate, were well supervised and very orderly and for the most part were fuelled only by soft drinks!

ARE THESE SIGNS OF A HARSH WINTER?

While travelling around the county during the past week we could not but notice the very abundant crop of haws that was everywhere evident. Along every hedgerow, hawthorn trees were a blaze of red, ripe haws.

During our recent visit to Ardmore for the unveiling of the local Enterprise Co-op's Tourism Development Plan we met local Councillor Mr. Patsy Kenneally and while discussing the weather he referred to the abundant crops of crab apples which he had seen in the area. He remarked that he had heard old people say in years gone by that such an abundance of wild fruits in the Autumn usually presaged a harsh winter ahead. We can only wait to see!

THE EARLIEST NEWSPAPERS IN WATERFORD

Directly as a result of our recent reference to the old newspaper known as "The Dungarvan Gazette" published in 1872 and printed by J. Hansard at the General Printing Office in Dungarvan we received a visit at the "Leader" Office last week from a man now resident in Cork but who formerly came from Lismore. The caller, who did not divulge his name, informed us that he had handed over an old history of Waterford compiled by Hansard to the Library Headquarters in Lismore some years back and that we might make inquiries about it.

We followed this lead and thanks to the help of Lismore Librarian Richie Walsh and of County Librarian Donal Brady, the history, now newly bound was located and we were given permission to peruse it.

The title page of the 483 page book declares it to be: "The History, Topography and Antiquities (Natural and Ecclesiastical) with Biographical Sketches of the Nobility, Gentry and Ancient Families and Notices of Eminent Men &c of the County and City of Waterford, including The Towns, Parishes, Villages, Manors and Seats." It was compiled by Joseph Hansard, who was a "Member of the Royal Historical Association of Ireland" and was published by Joseph Hansard, Main Street, Dungarvan and dated 1870.

Curious to ascertain whether it contained any reference to "The Dungarvan Gazette" we turned to the section in the history dealing with Newspapers and found the following: "The earliest newspaper known to have been printed in Waterford was entitled "The Waterford Flying Post, containing the most material News, both Foreign and Domestick." It was printed on a sheet of common writing paper, the head ornamented with the Royal Arms and those of the city of Waterford. One number, dated Thursday, August 21st, 1729, is still in existence: it has neither number or price affixed to it, but the latter is supposed to have been one half-penny . . .

"In November, 1796 "The Waterford Journal" was established by Esthar Crawley and Son and sold at the Euclid's Head in Peter-street, at the moderate price of one half-penny. It

was published twice a week, contained three columns in each page, and was continued for about six years.

"Ramsay's "Waterford Chronicle" was in existence at this period. A second series of it was commenced in 1769: it contained three columns, and cost one shilling a quarter. In 1778 a larger edition was issued, containing four columns — the price of this was three half-pence a number. Ten years afterwards the price was two pence halfpenny; it was only two pence in 1791: in 1800 it was four-pence and down to 1840 it was five-pence

"The Rev. Mr. Ryland states there were one or two other papers published in Waterford, of which very little is known. One, "The Waterford Advertiser," of which one Mr. William Murphy was the proprietor. This was succeeded by "The Shamrock," established by a Dr. Hearn: The "Waterford Mirror" was commenced in 1801.

"At present (1869) there are six newspapers in Waterford — "The Mail," — "The Waterford News," — "The Citizen," — "The Standard," — "The Chronicle" and "Mirror . . ."

Very obviously all these newspapers were located in Waterford city but no reference is made in any shape or form to "The Dungarvan Gazette" despite the fact that the history was compiled in 1869-70 and the compiler, Joseph Hansard, must have been the proprietor of the printing works at Main Street, Dungarvan where it was published.

So much for that but we will return to this most interesting history again next week and to what it has to say about the Augustinians and their association with the Church and abbey at Abbeyside.

GETTING RID OF THOSE OVERHEAD CABLES

Work is at present proceeding in Dungarvan in getting rid of those unsightly overhead power lines and t.v. cables around the town centre. The work is being done in conjunction with the resurfacing of the town centre streets and it is good to see the Local Authority has received the co-operation of the E.S.B. Telecom Eireann and Casey t.v. for this most

welcome project.

While we unreservedly congratulate all concerned, we are somewhat disappointed that the authorities had to restrict the undergrounding of the overhead

wires and cables where O'Connell Street, Main Street and Mary Street are concerned and that it was not found feasible to entirely clear them from these areas.

LAY HIM AWAY O'ER THE HILLSIDE

The ballad we have chosen for our ballad corner this week, "Lay Him Away O'er The Hillside," was written following the famous mutiny of the Connaught Rangers in 1916. At the time, The Connaught Rangers, a regiment in the British Army, were serving in India. Composed mainly of Irish, the mutiny occurred when news of the 1916 Rising in Dublin reached them. BALLYMACARBRY NOTES

TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION PROGRESS REPORT

Ballymacarbry, in Category A of this year's Tidy Towns Competition, scored a total of 174 marks, one more than last year, the extra mark being for the presentation of national amenities.

The following is the report of the adjudicators for our 1990 effort, showing the marks allocated under the different headings with the maximum in brackets:

Effort: 37 (45) — Ballymacarbry looks attractive again this year. Some of the comments made in last year's report are applicable again this year and are included in our notes based on our observations which may help with the planning of next year's work.

Tidiness: 29 (40) — Where verges had been cut some litter could be seen amongst the cut grass but otherwise the standard is good. Weed growth was evident again this year at

locations such as the car park and St. Patrick's Hall. Verge cuttings should be swept up as soon as possible after cutting.

Presentation of Buildings: 30 (40) — The plastic signs at the Community Hall and the Oriel Bar should be removed as soon as possible and replaced with traditional ones more suited to Ballymacarbry's character. Melody's is very well presented. St. Patrick's Hall is nicely painted but the space in front and to the side needs attention. The school is well presented.

Presentation of Natural Amenities: 28 (50) — Work had not been completed at the riverside at the time of our visit. This picnic area will look very enticing when finished and we particularly liked the flowers planted along the wall. This whole development should encourage visitors to stop and look at the community and enjoy being at the riverside at Ballymacarbry. There are some nice, colourful flower displays

also in Ballymacarbry which create a good impression.

Presentation of Approach Roads: 33 (45) — Verges were well cut on approach roads — be sure to have the cuttings swept up quickly. Litter has been referred to above. The bridges leading to the Comeragh Drive needed to be cleared of ivy and weeds. Some poor wire fencing was seen near St. Martin's Housing Estate. It was good to see seating provided at the car park. The car park should be kept free of weeds and perhaps a few shrubs would enhance it. Have you considered the possibility of having the car park surfaced?

Presentation of Residential Areas: 17 (30) — There are many very well presented individual houses and gardens for which the owners are to be commended. Always ensure that all entrances, walls and gates are presented to a high standard as one of or two poorly presented ones can considerably diminish an overall impression especially in a small centre.

We look forward to visiting your centre again — continue the good work.

BALLYMACARBRY MISSING MAN'S BODY FOUND

The body of Mr. Tomas O'Mahony, Glenagad, New Inn who was missing since early July was found in a field about a half-mile from his home. Two men loading hay found the body in a ditch. Mr. O'Mahony was in his sixties and was single.

BODY EXHUMED AFTER 70 YEARS

The mortal remains of Tom Kiely, an ex-British soldier with World War One service, who was executed as a spy by the IRA in March 1921, were exhumed from where they lay in a shallow grave on Ring Mountain, which is located between Hollyford and Rossmore, Co. Tipperary on Thursday last in the presence of Dr. John Harbison, State Pathologist and Gardai from the area.

The remains were removed to Our Lady's Hospital, Cashel, where a post mortem was held. On the following day the remains were accorded a Christian burial in the ancient Church of Clogher in the Parish of Clonoulty.

To enable sheep owners to comply with the above order and the County Waterford Sheep Dipping Regulations, the County Council are currently making dipping tanks available at various locations for the dipping of sheep.

New flock owners are advised to contact this Council in order that arrangements can be made for dipping. Existing flock owners will be notified in the normal way.

Flock owners are reminded that it shall not be lawful for any person at any time outside the dipping period (15th September, 1990 to 31st October, 1990) to have in his possession or under his charge any sheep unless it has been dipped in accordance with the Sheep Dipping Order, 1965 (Amendment) Order 1977, and is accompanied by a certificate of dipping which shall be produced on demand to any authorised person as defined in Article 17 of the Sheep Dipping Order, 1965.

A fee of 75p per sheep will be charged for sheep dipped in Council tanks. A fee of 15p per sheep will be charged for sheep dipped in private tanks.

VARIETY IN MUSHROOMS

Braised mushrooms

Ingredients:

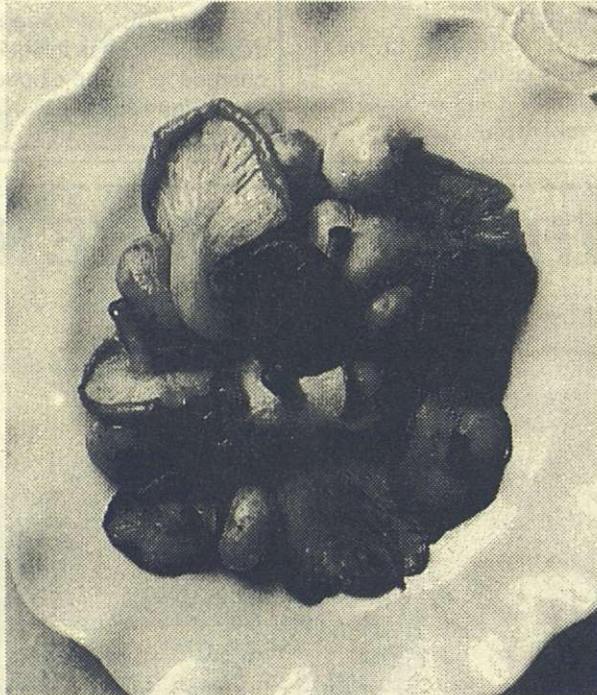
- 1 tablespoon oil
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 4oz button or closed cup mushrooms
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- 2 tablespoons light soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons oyster sauce
- 1 tablespoon dry sherry
- 4oz shii-take mushrooms
- 4oz oyster mushrooms
- 2 tablespoons chopped spring onions.

Method:

Heat oil in a wok or frying pan, add garlic and closed cup mushrooms. Fry for a few seconds, add sugar, soy sauce, oyster sauce and sherry.

Stir in shii-take and oyster mushrooms. Continue stirring for two minutes, add spring onions and serve.

Serves 4.



REAPING YOUR JUST REWARDS

KEEN vegetable growers will be savouring September as so many crops become ready for harvest.

At times the back may have badly bent and the hands calloused but everything now seems worth it.

Storing

Harvesting main crop potatoes continues into October as the top growth starts to yellow, signalling the end of any further development of the tubers below ground.

Lift the tubers on a dry day and allow to dry for a few hours before storing. Make sure you lift all of them, as left overs may encourage pests and diseases likely to cause problems with next year's crop.

Once lifted, store the potatoes somewhere cool and



free from frost, using trays covered with black plastic sheet or something else to keep light out. Alternatively, you can use jute sacks which will allow air to circulate.

When storing any vegetables under cover it is advisable to enclose them with a wire mesh screen to keep out vermin.

The bulk of the root crops will also be ready towards the end of the month. Clean

the carrots as you lift them and cut the tops just over a centimetre from the top of the crown.

They can then be stored in trays of dry peat or sand in dry cool and frost-free conditions.

A more traditional method of storing carrots and potatoes is an outdoor clamp — a shallow trench lined with six inches of straw where the vegetables are steeply plied before mounding over with more straw and a similar layer of soil.

A ventilation hole plugged with straw should be left at the apex of the clamp.

Remaining beetroot can also be lifted and soil rubbed or washed off, ready for storage as with

carrots, but many people prefer to leave them in the ground until needed like parsnips, but they should have straw heaped around them for protection against frost.

Popular

If you grow leeks and celery you should now be earthing them up in their trenches, while on the Brassica front, be alert in stronger winds and support Brussels sprouts and sprouting broccoli in exposed positions.

Any cool evening can wreck outdoor tomatoes about now, so harvest them all and put the green fruit in paper bags in a warm part of the house such as the airing cupboard. Contrary to popular opinion, lining them up on a window sill is useless — they don't need light to ripen.

Cllr. Criticises Planning Refusal Decision

A decision by the Planning Department of Waterford Co. Council to refuse planning permission for the erection of seven holiday homes outside Dungarvan was strongly criticised by Cllr. Tom Cunningham at the monthly meeting of the Council held in Dungarvan last week.

The application made by S. J. Kelly & Partners, Waterside, Galway on behalf of Dr. M. Casey sought

permission for the erection of the seven holiday homes and common facilities at Tallacoolbeg (Clonea).

The principal reasons given for the refusal were that the proposed site was located in an area zoned primarily agriculture in the County Development Plan and that the area was unserved and incapable of gravity connection to Ballinroad sewerage scheme.

Cllr. Cunningham said that the refusal had occurred without any negotiations with the application and as some £250,000 would have been involved in the development he felt it would be a big loss to the locality.

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager said that the main problem about the matter was the public health aspect as the proposed development would not be capable of being connected into the Ballinroad sewerage scheme.

When Cllr. Cunningham held that this was a matter that could be overcome, the County Engineer, Mr. John

O'Flynn agreed to look at the position again.

Dungarvan Man Fined, Bound Over For Unprovoked Assault

A 23-year-old unemployed labourer who was convicted of assault at Dungarvan Court last week was fined and bound to the peace.

Simon Storey, Childers Estate, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty to assaulting Jack Keating, Western Bay, Dungarvan, in a local hotel on July 13 last.

Supt. Ray McAndrew described the assault as an unprovoked one.

Storey, who had no previous convictions, was fined £20, ordered to pay £90 expenses, and was bound to the peace for 12 months.

TIDY TOWNS FULL DETAILS

In the results of the Tidy Towns Competition announced in Dublin on Tuesday week last, we, the Stradbally area, received 186 marks in 1990, a total of 6 marks up on last year. The awards received by the local committee are as follows:— Regional Award,

County Award, Bord na Mona Award and Trees Award. In 1989, we were only 3 marks behind the 1989 winners and in 1990 we were only 2 marks behind the winners.

The comments of the Adjudicators (following their initial visit) in the various categories are as follows:

Effort — Congratulations on such a fine presentation of your "garden village." Many people were working at the time of adjudication and it was a pleasure to visit Stradbally and adjudicate it. Well done! It is good that you now have four people on the S.E.S. scheme and this must extend four possibilities. Continued good luck! As you know, at this level of the competition, attention is very much concentrated on such details in which hard earned increased marks are determined. An excellent entry!

Tidiness — The village itself was litter free and there are several well located litter bins. On the approach road from Tramore which had recently been cut however, litter could be seen amongst the cut grass. A second spot where such amount of litter could be seen was at the end of the road along by the Library and Credit Union. The space down here is a bit untidy looking and is mentioned again elsewhere in the report. Make sure that as soon as construction work is finished at the new dwellings, the frontage is cleared and landscaped as soon as possible.

Presentation Of Buildings — The village buildings looked very well with good colour choices and attractive window boxes, etc. The Garda Station is very commendable as is the newly thatched house. A cottage and side entrance a little further out the Tramore road, opposite the Library, had a boundary wall that needed some attention. A small house near the Handball Alley needed "touching up". The Church of Ireland School was being painted at the time of adjudication and will look well as did the boy's National School. Churches looked well but a little weeding was needed outside the Catholic Church at the kerbstones. Plastic canopies over shopfronts especially the one at "Baired" — Shop Local, do not fit in well with the character and streetscape of the village and we suggest that they be removed. Plastic signs of any sort should be avoided. All in all a good presentation adorned with beautiful flowers.

Presentation Of Natural Amenities — Well done on such a "superb" presentation. The presentation is excellent. Many people were working at the time of adju-

dication and all the planting is beautiful. We would suggest that a little more could be done just outside the G.A.A. grounds. It's boundary wall is attractively painted. The Handball Alley looks very well with the surrounding floral and shrub beds. The Bridge Cove area was litter free. At the time of writing, before the Entente Florale judging, we wish you luck with your fine entry.

Appearance Of Approach Roads — The standard is very good. A couple of grass margins/banks in the Kilmacthomas Road needed trimming where the grass had got a bit long and some weeding was needed on part of the pavement at the Church car park and at the edge just outside it. As stated, litter was evident in the cut grass on the Tramore Road. There were a couple of poorly maintained entrances, side lanes, boundary walls for example, some farm sheds and buildings near the repaired stone wall on the road parallel to the Church lane. Fresh white washing was needed here. (These walls come into prominent view from the Tramore approach). A side lane by the Protestant School looked a bit scruffy. Repaired stonewalls looked well and the pump and seating are presented very well. Needless to say, all the shrub, tree and flower planting looks very well along the approach roads. Flowerbeds at the new name-signs would look well. Well done on the good standard.

Residential Areas — Individual houses and gardens look very well in the village at the estate and on approach roads. A couple of weak individual ones have been mentioned elsewhere. The space at the end of the lane by the Library should be developed or screened off with trees, good hedging or a stone wall as it diminishes the overall presentation of the scheme. Improvements there would help to contain and enclose the housing at the end of the road. The thatched house is very appealing and enhances the village.

Second Adjudication — Further improvements have been made during the summer leading up to the Entente Florale judging. No litter was to be seen. The area at the end of the roadway by the Library and Credit Union although better did not attain the high standard of other open spaces. Your attention is again drawn to the suggestions under Residential Areas. At least the construction sites unnecessarily poorly presented. Several yards too could have been tidied. The boundary wall near the Li-

brary has been painted. Weeds were under control at the Catholic Church but a heap of gravel detracted from the presentation. However, weeds were evident in the G.A.A. car park. The Kilmacthomas approach looked most impressive but here and there on the other roads, the

standard lapsed a little. If you sustain your present exceptional level of enthusiasm and commitment, you should capture the national award in the not too distant future.

The award ceremony for this whole county takes place at a private function in Stradbally on Monday,

October 8 next, which is being arranged by Bord Failte.

Four Tidy Towns Awards For Stradbally

While the Stradbally Tidy Towns Committee may have failed to land the major award in last month's European Entente Florale, they had the satisfaction of winning four top awards in the 1990 Bord Failte National Tidy Towns Competition, the results of which were announced in the College of Surgeons in Dublin last week.

The awards which the Stradbally effort won were the Regional Award South East Tourism with £5,000 for an approved project; County Award of £500; National Award of £100 for planting trees and the Special Bord na Mona Award in the category 200-500 population.

Stradbally with a total of 186 marks (out of a possible 250) was only 2 marks behind the overall national winner, Malahide and was the only entrant in Ireland to win four awards in the 1990 competition.

The members of the Stradbally Tidy Towns Committee and indeed all inhabitants of the picturesque seaside village are to be congratulated on this outstanding achievement.

Why the US went to war

YOU probably know from watching old films or television, or from listening to your grandparents talk that the United States and Britain were on the same side in the Second World War, just as they were in the First.

But you may not know that America did not enter the war until it had been going on for more than two years.

Of course it had been supporting Britain from the start, mostly by supplying guns and ammunition, as well as advice.

But it only began officially fighting after one particular incident in December 1941.

At about breakfast time on 7 December, the Japanese bombed the port of Pearl Harbour, in Hawaii, which is where the United States stationed its Pacific fleet of about 100 ships.

Although America and Japan had not been particularly friendly for some years, America was still taken by surprise at the attack.

Japan was not involved in the war either, but had been supporting the Germans and Italians, and once Pearl Harbour had been bombed the two countries officially entered the Second World War.

About 200 Japanese planes took part in the raid, which came in two spurts. At the end of it the Americans had lost more than 2,000 sailors, 200 soldiers and many of the ships in port at the time.

Three battleships were destroyed, one capsized, four were damaged, and further damage was caused to two cruisers and three destroyers. More than 40 aircraft were bombed and another 40 slightly damaged.

In return the Japanese lose 30 aircraft and five midget submarines.

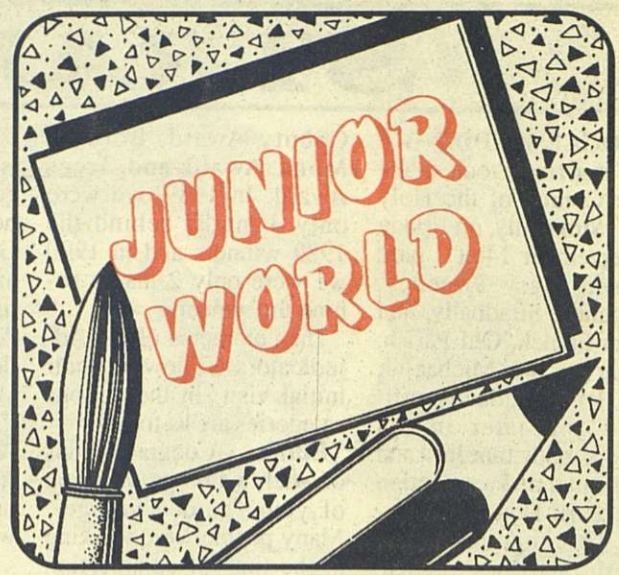
But although it was a sad and shocking day for the United States, America's entry into the war made a significant difference from Britain's point of view.

THANKS A BILLION

WEEK-END GAMES

Two Senior Hurling Semi-Finals At Fraher Field On Sunday

Ballyduff v. Passage And Tallow v. Roanmore

With the senior hurling championship now having reached the home stretch and the four survivors due to do battle for a place on the county final programme, there is enormous interest in Sunday's double-header at Fraher Field, which is expected to host its biggest attendance of the year, so far.

With two city and two far Western clubs involved we are certain to have support coming from all quarters, hopeful of seeing the best club hurling of the year. An Eastern double, Roanmore and Passage, will bring the county final to Walsh Park, but if either of them lose then the final will be here in the West. A Western double would have the county final at this side of the county and only Dungarvan would be big enough to hold a crowd attracted to a Tallow/Ballyduff confrontation.

BALLYDUFF v. PASSAGE

If I had not seen Ballyduff play against Portlaw two weeks ago, I would go all out for a victory for them here, but the kind of performance they gave on that occasion must have cast some doubts about their capacity to withstand a challenge from this up-and-coming Passage East side, who have already scored a win over the Western standardbearers.

These clubs were in the same group, which is acknowledged as being the easier of the two, and if we take the scoring averages of the two, we find very little difference.

Some students will find it significant that Passage were the only side whom Ballyduff failed to score a goal against this year. On

scoring averages Ballyduff with a league section total of 9-70 for five games are slightly in front of Passage with a total of 11-48. Passage have the better record in defence with an average of 0-10 against than Tallow with 1-10 against. Ballyduff could be described as the more experienced by far in this grade, but the lack of such experience does not seem to have been a handicap to Passage on their way to the top of their group. Playing in a lower grade until two years ago, they have moulded themselves into a strong senior side with the ability to challenge the best and whatever they may lack in the matter of skill and experience can be made up for in fitness and endurance. With players like Mossy O'Keeffe, Eamon and Sean Cullinane, Peter and Pat Connors, Ray Barry, Eddie, Anthony and Pat Fitzgerald, etc., they have some very fine players who are committed to the game and very determined to take over leadership in Waterford. They are the only group now in line for a hurling and football double and may be expecting to take a leaf out of Cork's book?

As I have written at the outset, Ballyduff will need to play far better than they did against Portlaw and on their ability to improve a lot on that display will depend their chances of surviving here. Past performances by players like Mossy Casey, Liam Power, Seamus and Seamie Daly, Maurice Geary, Seamie Hannon, John Quirke, whose battles with John Ryan could be one of the highlights of the game, Michael Walsh, Richie Walsh, Gerome Quirke, Clem Feeney, their mid-field star Paudie Prendergast, Michael Leamy, John Casey, Eoin Hickey and company, have proved Ballyduff to be well worthy of the fame that they have achieved over the past decade and hopefully they will rise to the occasion here. I would like to see Ballyduff win here as time may be running out for a few of their great players who gave us so much to admire over the years.

However, I feel that the odds slightly favour a win for Passage, but I keep on hoping that things will not turn out that way.

TALLOW v. ROANMORE

The Tallow/Roanmore semi-final is listed as the feature game because Roanmore are the defending champions and are entitled to top billing while they hold the title. How long further they will keep their first senior hurling title will depend on how well Tallow perform in this one which is expected to be a thriller.

No one yet knows if this will be as good as or better than the opening semi-final between Ballyduff and Passage, but for some reasons there appears to be a lot more 'buzz' about the meeting of the champions and a team who were relegated last year and only allowed back up to senior rank by virtue of a Board decision. This particular County Board decision was somewhat unique and aroused a little controversy at the time, but the people who were adamant that Tallow's rightful place was in the top grade, have already been well vindicated, as they finished at the top of their group in the league section.

Interestingly enough, their only defeat was by next Sunday's opponents, Roanmore, who beat the Western challengers by 1-14 to 2-4 some months ago. In fact this was the third time that Roanmore have beaten Tallow in the championship over the past three years, so for the Western team, the challenge is all the more exciting.

I did the arithmetic of their respective scoring records in the present championship and found that Tallow with a total of 17-63 from their six league section games had a bigger match average than Roanmore who scored a total of 10-60 (this gives an average of 2-13 as against 1-2) but the scores against gives Roanmore a slight advantage with 1-8 as against 1-10.

On this basis there would appear to be little between them, they having been

tested by the same opponents. Tallow's long wait may not be to their advantage, but they have played some good quality challenge games against very reputable Cork teams and this will have kept players like, Timmy and Trevor Sheehan, Dermot and Brian Henley, John O'Donoghue, Connie, Mickey and Stephen Curley, Pat Murphy, Paul Curley, Ml. Geary, John Geary, C. Cunningham, M. Murphy, and co., in good shape to take on the stars of the champions, in Kieran Delahunty, Noelle Crowley, Eddie Nolan, Tom Shanahan, Albert Burke, John Ryan, John Tebay, Ray Sheridan, Maurice Wadding, etc. Tallow will find this their biggest test for a long time and it will take an enormous effort on the part of every player if they are going to survive this one.

Roanmore's recent victories over Portlaw and Mount Sion must put them into this semi-final with a very good chance and while it is far from being my wish, it is my opinion that they will beat Tallow and qualify for another defence of their title.

AN EASTERN DOUBLE?

Or a Western double? I have gone for a defeat for the two teams at this side of the Mahon and I know that I am probably sticking my neck out too far in predicting a Passage/Roanmore county final at Walsh Park next month, but I would like readers to know that my assessment of the games here do not represent my wishes.

Shamrocks Defeat Abbeyside In Thriller

For a time in this exciting and well contested County intermediate hurling semi-final it seemed that the challengers, Abbeyside, who raced into a clear ten points lead in the 23rd minute, would upset the odds by qualifying for their first adult hurling final in more than 20 years. But an amazing and very spirited fightback by Shamrocks in the second half brought them well back into the game and enabled them to forge ahead for a very hard earned victory and a meeting with De La Salle in the County final.

It was very much a game of two contrasting halves as Abbeyside dominated all through the first and Shamrocks came back well on top in the second. The standard of the game was splendid and while Shamrocks were the more experienced and deserved to win in the end, Abbeyside who have not played so well for a very long time, will rue their failure to penetrate on a number of occasions in the last quarter. It was thanks to their impregnable defence that the winners were able to hold out, but on reflection, the same might be said of Abbeyside's solid defence in the first half.

The game was hardly a minute old when Michael Neville had the first of his ten scores when he pointed a free. Dave Sheehan, who was Abbeyside's scorer-in-chief, pointed a free to make it level in the 2nd. In the next four minutes the same players exchanged points from frees to make it evens again before Sean Harnedy had the game's first score from play to put Shamrocks in front again. It was at this point that Abbeyside hit their purple patch and had the next seven scores, which included goals by Dave Sheehan and Timmy Murphy in the 15th and 19th minutes and well taken minors by Fran McGovern and Jimmy Healy who was playing a real blinder at centre back.

Mick Neville and Pat Murphy replied with points for Shamrocks and at the break the scores stood at 2-8 to 0-7 in Abbeyside's favour.

STRETCHED LEAD

Dave Sheehan stretched their lead by an early second half point, but within a minute Michael Neville had the score which

seemed to change the trend of the game when he shot home a great goal that sparked off a Shamrocks resurgence. The next seven scores were to the credit of the eventual winners and Pat Murphy's 49th minute goal really put them in the driver's seat and gave them a lead which they never relinquished and despite Abbeyside's courageous fight back they were unable to get back on terms again. The losers were forced to field without team captain Pat Walsh, who had played so well all through the league section, but they can find consolation in the fact that they now have the nucleus of a good intermediate side who cannot long be denied a title in the grade.

Shamrocks success, which was well merited, will atone in some respects for their disappointing football defeat on the previous week.

They will meet Shamrocks in the final in Dungarvan next month.

ROANMORE WIN EASTERN SEMI-FINAL

This was also a surprise result as Mount Sion were firm favourites to win the minor hurling championship in the East this year. It was a close and exciting contest played at a very high standard. Mount Sion's inability to penetrate a very sound Roanmore defence was the deciding factor here. The winners will meet Lismore in the County final at Dungarvan next month.

MINOR HURLING 'A' WESTERN FINAL

As a contest this Western minor hurling final did not compare with the final of the 'B' championship which had been played as a curtain-raiser at Cappoquin, also on Saturday last. Lismore led Dungarvan by 1-9 to 0-1 at half time and looked on course for an easy win. On the turn-over they stretched their lead but Dungarvan came fighting back and looked as if they

might overtake the leaders at one stage, but having too much leeway to make up the challenge was beyond them and Lismore ran out worthy winners by four points in the end.

Referee John Kelly deputised for Jim Landers who had to pull out a couple of hours before the game.

BALLYDUFF TAKE 'B' TITLE

This was a splendidly contested minor 'B' hurling final which produced several delightful scores and aroused great excitement for a big crowd of supporters of both teams. It took two early goals by Ballyduff to keep them in contention in the first half as Naomh Brid led by 0-9 to 0-3 at one stage.

The sides were level at the break but when Ballyduff got their third major in the 41st minute it gave them the boost they needed to go on and win by a flattering eight points at the end of a thrilling final. Roger Casey was the referee.

AN RINN WIN JUNIOR FOOTBALL REPLAY

An Rinn who were the lucky survivors in the drawn game, played much better football in this exciting replay with Stradbally in the semi-final of the J/F championship at Fraher Field. Being able to overcome the handicap of playing without County player, Carthach Mac Craith and the loss of a dismissed

player as well, the Gaeltacht side played better football than in their drawn game, which Stradbally had seemed to have wrapped up entering the closing stages.

An Rinn have now qualified for both divisional finals and will see themselves as being in line for a unique double.

GARRY MOLONEY R.I.P.

The elation and jubilation after winning a great victory in the intermediate hurling semi-final at Cappoquin on Saturday, was brought to a very sudden halt within a minute of the final whistle when it was discovered that one of their greatest ever clubmen, Garry Moloney had passed away suddenly while crossing the field to join in the celebrations.

The awful shock of Garry's death stunned and numbed the big crowd who were gathering around to cheer the Shamrocks players and within minutes the place was hit by silence and sadness at the death of a man who

had genuinely enjoyed the respect of everyone who had the privilege of knowing him.

The Moloney family's contribution and service to the Shamrocks Club and their total dedication to the GAA in the county has been immense by any standards and their loss and grief in these tragic circumstances is immeasurable, to put it mildly.

I had the privilege of knowing Garry intimately during his years as an officer of the Shamrocks Club and among his many outstanding qualities were his friendliness, efficiency and his good humour at all times. His daughters, Ann and Dymphna R.I.P., also served as secretaries to the Shamrocks Club at other times.

To his wife Mary and the other members of the Moloney family we extend our very sincere sympathy on the very sad event. The Shamrocks Club paid their respects in a very meaningful and traditional GAA manner at the funeral and burial.

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Crystal Workers To Meet

The 2,300 Waterford Crystal workers in the Company's Waterford and Dungarvan plants are to meet tonight (Wednesday) to consider the implications of the company's decision to produce a number of glass lines in Germany, under the Waterford brand name.

The company told the ATGWU last week that they had commissioned FX Nachtmanns to produce giftware, which will be test-marketed in the US.

The workers, many of whom have not yet returned to full working since the 14 week strike

ended in June, are understood to be extremely worried about their jobs and the future of the three crystal plants in Waterford and Dungarvan.

The company has told the workers that production costs in Waterford must be reduced drastically.
