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The Changing Face Of Business Life In Dungarvan

The initial moves in the proposed development planned for the quayside in Dungarvan took place last week with the closing of Phelan's coalyard and the clearing of the building there.

It is claimed that in the course of the next few years the entire facade at the Quay as we now know it will undergo a vast change. Recently Mr. Niall Hyde of Niall Hyde and Associates Architects, Dublin, outlined the plans which they had formulated for the development of the area when he addressed meetings of members and officials of the Urban Council and later of the business interests of the locality.

Already in the pipeline is the major development proposed by the L & N which will incorporate a shopping arcade leading on to the public car park and of which the Phelan stores at the Quay will become part. Then as a move to grapple with the ever-increasing problem of car parking, the placing of a second storey on the car-park is being considered while there is also a proposal to locate a major medical centre for the town in this development. This latter proposal is, we understand, the subject of negotiations with the medical people at present.

In the long term other proposals in the overall development refer to the clearing of the tannery buildings at the end of the quay and using the site for the erection of a hotel. We understand, however, that all the proposals in the plan are merely guide-lines to

indicate to the Urban Council the direction they should take in any move to develop the area in the years ahead.

MAJOR CHANGES

The closing of John Phelan's Coal, Corn and Fertilizer stores on the Quay last week marks another major change in the business life of Dungarvan. Since he took over the business from K. Williams & Co. which originally included a retail outlet at Main Street (now Connollys, Chemist), John Phelan won the esteem and respect of a wide spectrum of the farming community throughout mid and west Waterford.

The changing face of business life in the town also now sees the closing down of Darrell's Electrical Shop in O'Connell Street. The trading record of this business goes back to 1952 when it opened as Colum's Shop on a site originally occupied by a licensed premises (Walls) and a chemist shop (Cogans). Down through the years it has been run by the Moloney family and was noted as one of the major outlets in the town for the sale of electrical goods and furniture.

Also part of the change is the proposed shopping development to be based on the old drapery business of Mulcahy's at Main Street but although this has been in the pipeline for some considerable time it does not appear to be making any headway up to the present.

And so with these big comings and goings in Dungarvan it really is a case of the old order changing giving way to the new!

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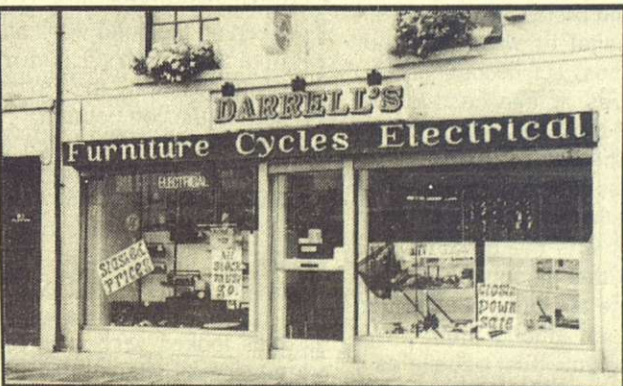

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

Words Are Not Enough, Actions Must Follow

People have said to me "I'm too old to change my ways" and "There's no hope for people like me." Ezekiel, in the first reading, is saying to such people "God does not take pleasure in the death of a sinner, but rather desires that he should be converted and live." He is simply saying to his listeners, God has made man's salvation a reward for service, which is assessed and adjudged at the termination of one's earthly life. And, he makes it clear that a sinner is not debarred, if he has amended his ways prior to audit day. Ezekiel too reminds the faithful ones that they must not wander lest the Lord called them, and found them wanting. In short, we must all prepare and be ready, because we do not know when the Lord might call us, and ask for an account of our stewardship. So, even if you are weighed down with sin, get yourself to Confession, and even if you are blessed with God's grace, do not waver, but strive and pray that you'll persevere in God's love. We neither know the day or the hour when we might be snatched out of life. Considering all that is at stake, the wise person will always be ready.

Paul, in the second reading, is back on one of his old hobby-horses: he never gives up! He is telling the people that it is not enough to believe, but they must also act like Christ. He must have felt disappointed at times to find when he turned his back that his followers would revert to their old habits of quarrelling and fighting. So, conscious of their weaknesses, he stresses the absolute need to fill themselves with the spirit of Christ, and bring the over-flow in the form of respect and care to their neighbours. He depicts a picture of Jesus humbling Himself by becoming man, and says, there is your model. He has shown you how to serve and help your neighbour. The message is clear and simple, and yet! it is easy to miss it. For true goodness lies not so much in thinking of oneself, but rather in considering the good of others. It means putting the other person first. He repeats, it is not possible to be one with Christ, unless we are a living part of the Body of Christ. And, to maintain that unity, we behave and act like Jesus.

Nowadays, the spirit of the age is, "I'm all right, so why should I be bothered about anyone else." Enter the business field, and it's dog eat dog. Jesus showed us how to lose oneself to find oneself. All we have, we have received. God's law is that we share our blessings with our neighbours. Jesus asked the rich young man for more than ordinary service. Here too, Paul is urging Christians to rise above the ordinary requirements of the law, and put the interests of others before their own. Whilst community or religious life is the ideal place for such service, there are times when the individual is able to practice such service. I remember a young married man, who strove to increase his love of God. He was a weekly communicant, but decided he must do more. He began with daily Mass and Communion in October and I assure you, it took some effort. He was walking along the shore on the last Sunday of the month, when a huge wave swept a young boy and girl off the pier, and he immediately ran to help. He dived into a raging sea, and lost his life. His body was recovered within minutes, and he was anointed. That man through his great and brave act of love went straight to heaven. He would not have sinned had he not risked his life, but he gave his life to help his neighbours. He died in the performance of a great act of love.

Things are upside down in society today. People seem to be losing their

sense of sin. Nothing seems to be sacred. Children are allowed to do almost as they please. Many forget that they have a duty to worship God. Talk about respect for people or property, it is at a new low. No wonder many are asking, where is it all going to end? I'd say, unless they jump off in time, they are on the train for down under, and I do mean Hell. If you speak of moral standards, they ask with a smile, what's that? I'm afraid we have all to shoulder the blame. You know there are "good" people, who'd shudder at the very notion of cheating or of committing a crime, yet! their tongues are so lethal that they destroy people's characters without batting an eye. When people engage in this endless and harmful chatter, they not only cause harm, but frequently give grave scandal. You see, people have become so caught up and accustomed to this vicious practice that it is looked on as a pastime, but that does not eliminate the guilt. These same people parade as pillars of the Church, and do untold harm. We have all got to cry halt, and ask ourselves, what we seek in life. If it is fulfilment you want, you'll never find it, if God is left out.

MUST REFLECT YOUR FAITH

The Gospel at first sight would seem to be dealing with obedience, but, when you'd consider what led Jesus into this conversation, you'd see it fits in with the theme of the first reading. The Lord is condemning the self-righteous attitude of the Pharisees and their class. He wanted them to realise the foolishness of their ways. The two sons represent two classes among the Jews. Those who profess to be zealous about God's law, but they never obey it, because in their pride, they consider that they do not need it. And, those, who at first refuse to accept God's law, but afterwards repent. The Lord said that these were better than those who never go beyond profession. In short, it means that belief or words are not enough: you must act accordingly. As we say ourselves: lip service is for the birds! Your life must be based on and reflect your faith.

St. Luke tells us that on one occasion when the Apostles were arguing about which of them was the greatest, the Lord told them that among the pagans the king was the authority, but that that must not happen among them. "The greatest among you must behave as if he were the least. I have provided you with the example." It should make us all think about what are the real values in life.

TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION

Lismore Makes Great Progress

The Adjudicators for the 1990 Bord Failte Tidy Towns Competition had very high praise for the very fine effort made this year by Lismore and encouragingly advised the local committee and the residents of the town to "keep up the good work" and in a few years they could well be among the top entries in the competition.

Scoring a total of 167 marks out of a maximum of 250, this was 7 marks more than the total achieved last year which indicates the great effort which was put in and for which all concerned must be congratulated.

REPORT OF ADJUDICATORS

The following is the report of the adjudicators with the marks which they allocated under the various headings:

Effort — max 45, 1989 31, 1990 33; Tidiness — max 40, 1989 27, 1990 28; Presentation of Buildings — max 40, 1989 29, 1990 30; Presentation of Natural Amenities — max 50, 1989 25, 1990 27; Appearance of Approach Roads — max 45, 1989 32, 1990 33; Presentation of Residential Areas — max 30, 1989 16, 1990 16.

Effort — Well done on making some very good progress in the competition again this year — there is obviously a very dedicated committee and some good involvement from the community. Community and visitors to Lismore alike will enjoy the benefits. Keep up the good work and in a few years Lismore could be among the top entries in the competition.

Tidiness — Evidence of litter this year was negligible and this is a good achievement. A few of the plastic bins looked a bit scruffy and needed cleaning or repair. The other bins looked very well. Fly posting, of which there was a little, should be discouraged as it does not look well. There were one or two untidy yards/side areas to which there is visual ac-

cess from the street and which create a poor impression. The Hotel car park being in need of weeding at the time of our visit diminished the overall presentation at the location.

Presentation of Buildings — Congratulations on this year's presentation of the Town Hall — it looks extremely well and we look forward to seeing it another time in the dark when it is floodlit. The Folly looks well with the flowers. The good Bank building and most of their neighbouring buildings look very well. St. Carthage's is a pleasing visit and the Catholic Church looked well, though the grass was a bit long in the latter. The convent is very attractively presented. Many of your shops, several of which were mentioned last year, look very well. However, unfortunately, you also have a few problem buildings such as the Ramble Inn, one at Fernville and along the South Mall, which create a poor impression. We look forward to seeing the new community centre when it is completed.

Presentation of Natural Amenities — The tennis courts look well. The new colourful flower beds and the tree planting are attractive additions and the tree planting will provide a good screen for the Hotel car park. Specially liked was the one at the Hotel

car park, flower displays around Lismore were all very good. The green in front of St. Carthage's is attractive but the grass needed cutting. The green at the housing estate on Parks Road would look well if it were developed. A lot of good work has taken place since last year.

Appearance of Approach Roads — Moss needed to be cleared away from the wall immediately around the fountain ("The Spout?") although the area here now looks well. As mentioned, the Hotel car park was a bit weedy but new developments here look very well. The standard was generally good. You have a lot of stone walls to maintain and keep clear of moss and weeds.

Presentation of Residential Areas — There are many good individual presentations in and around Lismore and these individuals are to be commended. Windows boxes and hanging baskets and tubs seen are very attractive and the practice should be always encouraged. The two attractive flower tubs at the entrance to the housing estate on Parks Road are good but it is a pity that the green has not been developed (a future project perhaps?) The new houses look well.

Well done Lismore — keep this rate of progress up and you will be among the top competitors in the competition in a few years.

Some More Memories Of Growing Up In West Waterford

In the years preceding the Second World War the gathering of the harvest was much later in the year than it now is. In those days, even the horse drawn reaper and binder was a rarity. Most of the harvesting was done by mowing machine. To prepare a field of corn for a mowing machine at least one swarth had to be cut all round the headland. This was done with a scythe and the cut corn was taken out behind the mower, put into sheaves and bound. These were real back breakers of jobs as one was stooped most of the time. The sheaves were positioned well out of the way so as not to obstruct the horses pulling the machine.

Two men usually operated the machine — one drove the horses from a high seat and the other, from a lower seat, made the sheaves. This he did with a special wooden rake. He released each sheaf by means of a foot operated lever. The prepared sheaves were bound by a number of binders — some of them women. The number depended on the size of the field. The important part of this operation was to have the swarth cleared in time to allow the machine to proceed on the next round.

There was a special knack in making a binder from the straw. It involved two twists. If the straw was green the sheaves had to be loosely made to prevent heating — otherwise the tighter the better. It was important too that this work be done cleanly as any corn left lying on the ground would be wasted. This work would proceed for many hours.

As the swarth grew smaller some of the binders were diverted to making stooks. These were erected by

standing six or eight sheaves against each other, the purpose being to allow the grain to ripen. After a period, stacks were made; hand stacks if the intention was to bring the corn into the haggard quickly — otherwise knee stacks were made. The latter were much bigger and regarded as safer if the weather became inclement. High wind could easily blow the tops of the stacks — so that an eye had to be kept on them daily. Drawing the corn into the haggard was a major task. Usually neighbours helped with this operation. The first thing done was the placing of a good foundation where it was proposed to build the rick. Any dry material such as furze, briars, brushwood was used for this purpose. Two men usually built the rick — one handed the sheaves to the other who was on his knees placing them in position and packing them in. The secret was to keep the rick high in the middle so that the end of the sheaves were tilted downwards to prevent any water from getting in to the centre.

Out in the field one man was employed to pitch the sheaves to each load builder. This had to be well done. The size of the load very much depended on how far it had to travel. The important thing was to keep the rick builders busy. An effort was always made to finish off each rick before nightfall. A rick left open over night was very vulnerable in the event of rain. Any dampness at that stage could be disastrous.

THE THRESHING MILL

The coming of the threshing mill into the district was always a time of excitement for us youngsters. The first mills usually came from East Cork, where the harvest was much earlier. Getting a big steam engine and a mill into a small haggard, often through narrow gates, was a hazardous operation. Many a gate pier was dislodged in the process. Most of the men in charge of those outfits were pretty expert and usually had a previous knowledge of particular haggards. On occasions the mill had to be pushed in by the engine as it would not be possible to manoeuvre them into position otherwise. Having got the outfit safely in, the mill had to be properly levelled and the engine put in line with it so that the flywheel was directly behind the drive shaft of the mill. This done, all was ready for an early start the following morning. The engine crew usually stayed overnight wherever their work was on the following day. Threshing day was very special. I will write about that in the near future. — M.M.

In his young days he played both hurling and

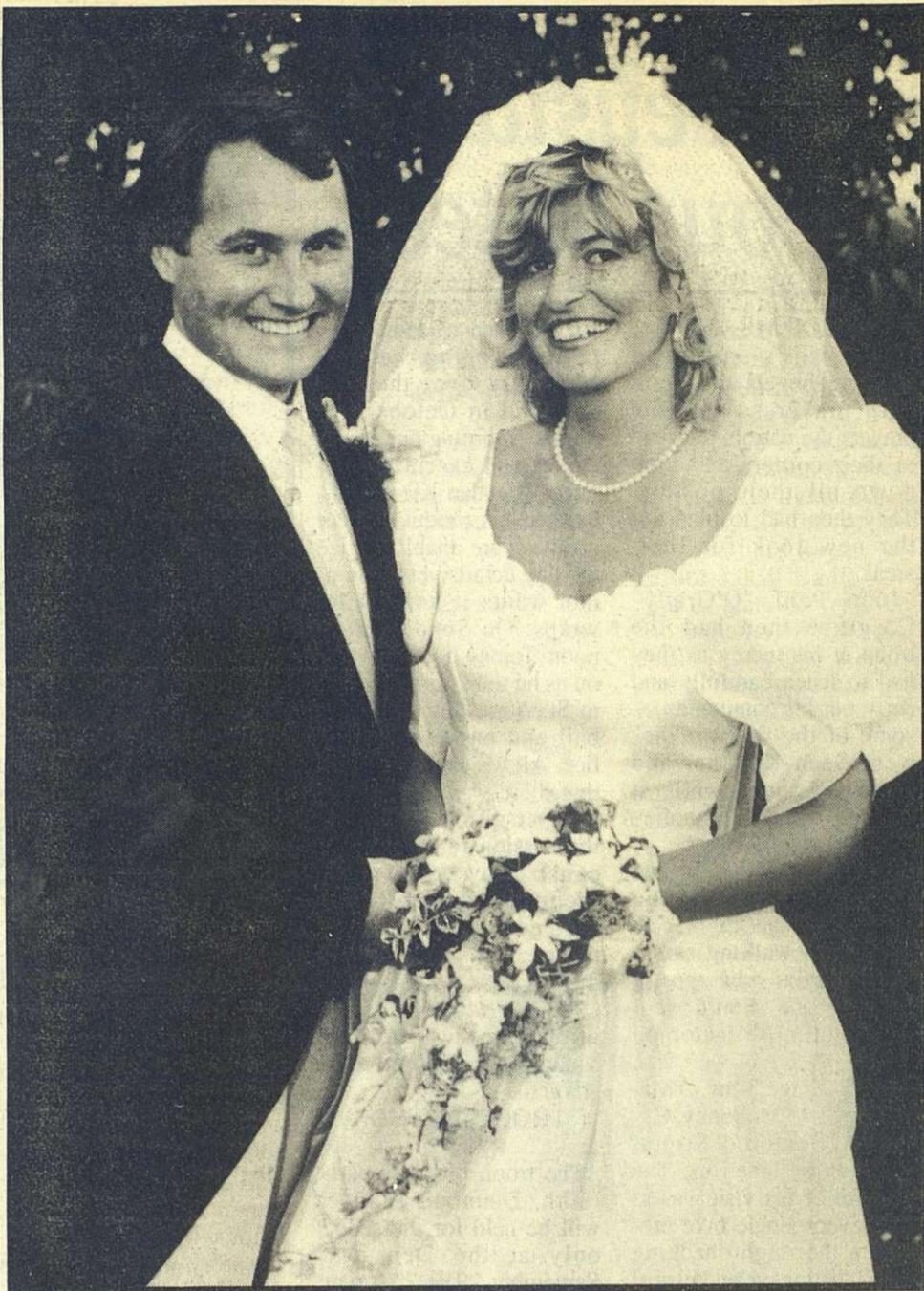

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

IS THE COST INVOLVED WORTH IT?

At present the various political parties are gearing themselves up in preparation for the election of our next non-political President or Uachtaran, that is, if you are naive enough to accept what they are already trying to tell us.

According to the Government Information Services, the cost to the State of running the Presidential election will be at least £4 million while the annual cost of running Arus an Uachtarian is £0.5 million. The actual cost as set out in the Government Estimates for 1990 was, in fact, £696,000, but some of this was to pay the pensions of former Presidents' widows.

We have three aspiring candidates in the field seeking the position and while each one separately claims that he/she will bring a more open and broader outlook to the role of the Presidency, the reality of the situation is that it is a non-executive post with powers that ultimately count for very little.

However, we suppose that the fact that we are about to have an electoral contest for the job on this occasion will give some credence to the claim being bell-ragged by all three that whoever wins the race will be "a President for all the people." It is the first election for President since 1973 and only the fifth since the inception of the office in 1938.

The fact that on five occasions out of a total of nine there has been an agreed non-elected candidate has done much to create the general and widespread apathy that exists among the public in regard to the post and has led to the opinion widely held that it is an office which should be abolished.

In the weeks ahead leading up to the election day which is fixed for Wednesday, November 7 we will hear repeated claims being put forward about being 'a people's President' and being a 'President for all the nation' and others of a like nature but the simple fact remains that as laid down in the Constitution of 1937 the President will merely be a figure-head whose principal role will be to signify the sovereignty of the State.

Up to this the various holders have been referred to as "the prisoners in the Park" because of the little they have to do.

The real question is, can the taxpayers of the country afford to pay in excess of £4 million for the election

and over half a million per annum for the privilege of maintaining such a position?

NOT MEANT FOR PERMANENT PARKING

The lay-bys which are placed on our roads in certain areas were never intended to be used as permanent parking places for vehicles or trailers. In fact the main idea behind the lay-bys was to enable visitors and tourists to pull up in safety to view the local scenery as they are mostly located in areas of high scenic beauty.

However, following a complaint received during the past week, we found ourselves driving up the Clonmel road from Dungarvan to the lay-by located overlooking the scenic beauty of Colligan Wood with the expanse of Dungarvan Bay in the distance. There, as complained of, stood two huge trailers, one for hauling timber and the other for bulk transport, parked close together. Apart from their ugly, dilapidated appearance, they virtually rendered the lay-by useless in fulfilling its primary purpose.

We have been informed that these trailers have been parked at this spot on a regular basis over the past seven or eight weeks and although a complaint has been lodged with the County Council, nothing appears to have been done. Of course we are not sure whether the Council is the proper authority to deal with such a matter; perhaps it is a matter for the Garda authorities to deal with, as the contraptions certainly are creating an obstruction to other road users who might wish to pull up there, either to take a brief rest from driving or to look at the scenery. Additionally in their unlighted condition they could prove a highly dangerous death-trap for anyone who might pull in there after dark.

Incidentally on our way back from Colligan we could not help but notice that two similar cumbersome timber trailers were parked at the lay-by close to the Master McGrath

Monument.

Perhaps the relevant authority, whether the County Council or the Gardai, might check the matter out and see whether the obstructions at the Colligan lay-by at any rate can be moved.

IN LIGHTER VEIN

In recent weeks we have had quite a few visitors home on holidays calling to the "Leader" and one of these who is now domiciled in Carlisle on the England/Scotland border told us of a large sign which he saw displayed outside a church there. This simply read: "Come and work for God. The pay is not good but the retirement benefits are out of this world!"

THE AUGUSTINIANS IN ABBEYSIDE

As promised last week we return to Joseph Hansard's "History of Waterford" published in 1870 and to what it has to say about the Abbey in Abbeyside and its association with the Augustinian Friars. What Hansard had to say when he compiled his history in 1870 is of particular interest now in view of the recent "Augustinian 700" celebrations in Abbeyside marking the advent of the Friars in 1290.

The following is the relevant extract: "At Abbeyside are the ruins of a castle and abbey. Nothing can be discovered relative to the castle further than its having been once the property of the McGraths: what remains of it now shows it was a lofty square building, and it was probably intended to protect the abbey.

"The abbey has been more fortunate in its annals. In the thirteenth century there was established here, a monastery of the order of Eremites of St. Augustin, commonly called Austin Friars, under the protection of the Earl of Desmond. It is said that the McGraths, one of whom is buried here, were the founders of this house, and that the property attached to the abbey was given by them and by the O'Briens of Cumeragh.

"There is still much to admire in the ruins of this ancient abbey: the wall and tower, with the entrances and windows, are still perfect, and give a clear idea of the beauty of the building, in its former condition. The original structure comprised a number of apartments or cells for the members of the order, and a

place of worship, a narrow edifice, from the centre of which arises a light Gothic tower, sixty feet in height and still in good preservation. The arch which supports the tower springs from the side walls, and is constructed with great elegance and lightness.

"The entrance at the western extremity is through the ancient Gothic doorway, which now acts as the entrance into the Roman Catholic chapel, which was built on the foundation of the ancient cells about the year 1820, and is now considered part of the abbey . . . the chapel bell is erected on the summit of the tower.

"Immediately beneath a low window adjoining the eastern extremity of the church, there is a very ancient tombstone, around which may be traced the following inscription in large letters:

DONALD
M'GRATH, 1400.

"Within the ruins is also situate the vault of Sir Nugent Humble's family of Cloncoskoran, on the tomb is the following inscription:—

Here lies the body of EDWARD NUGENT SHANAHAN, ESQ., who departed this life 3rd March 1762, aged 35 years; also BARBARA, his wife, who departed this life; also HARIET NUGENT SHANAHAN, their daughter, aged 6 years, and EDWARD, their son; and ELIZABETH HUMBLE, their grand-daughter aged 4 years.

This tomb was erected to their Memory, by their dear daughter, ELIZABETH HUMBLE, A.D. 1783; also the body of ELIZABETH NUGENT SHANAHAN HUMBLE, daughter of the above EDW. Nugent Shanahan, Esq., and heiress, who departed this life 4th September, 1795, and in the 44th year of her age. She lived beloved of all her friends and neighbours, and died lamented — very charitable to the poor.

Here also lieth the remains of the late lamented SIR JOHN NUGENT HUMBLE, Bart. of Cloncoskoran House, who departed this life 13th of January, 1834, aged 53 years.

Hansard then notes that "Over the entrance of the modern building is a rude stone on which is cut a Griffin, and three scallop shells: this formerly stood above the door of the abbey."

The inscription on the Nugent Humble vault is of particular interest for while

the vault is still within the ancient part of the abbey or the 'Clogchas' as it is known locally, the inscription has been almost totally obliterated due to weathering.

At another part of the history there is reference to a much debated matter concerning the old abbey. It comes in a description of the circuit of the old town wall which roughly ran from the top of Church Street (one time called Castle Street) along the north side of "the dead walk" (Convent Road) to "Friary-lane or Augustine Street, formerly called Clubber's-lane", down

Main Street and hence by Carberry's-lane to the then military barracks (which subsequently became the old Garda barracks) at the quay. The history then states "near this place was St. Mary's abbey, an auxiliary to St. Augustine's abbey at Abbeyside, from which, it is said, there was a subterraneous passage, from one side to the other, under the river."

This shows that even in those times (1870) there was a belief that such an underground tunnel ran under the estuary from the old abbey to the vicinity of the castle (of King John) on the Dungarvan side.

MICK MCGILLIGAN'S DAUGHTER, MARY ANNE

Our choice for the ballad corner this week is a comical, rollicking and frolicsome ballad called "Mick McGilligan's Daughter, Mary Anne" which was composed many years ago by one Louis A. Tierney. It was a very popular choice for the old street singers because of its lively air while it was a regular in the repertoire of the great Irish comedian of by-gone years, Jimmy O'Dea.

I'm a gallant Irishman, I've a daughter Mary Anne,
She's the sweetest, neatest cailin in this Isle,
Though she can't now purchase satin, she's a wonder at bog latin,
In a fluent, fascinatin' sort of style.
When she's selling fruit or fish, sure, it is her fondest wish
For to capture with her charm some handsome man;
Ah! no matter where she goes, sure, and everybody knows
That she's Mick McGilligan's daughter, Mary Anne.

Chorus:
She's a darlin', she's a daisy and she's set the city crazy,
Though in build and talk and manner, like a man;
When me precious love draws near, you can hear the people
cheer
For Mick McGilligan's daughter, Mary Anne.

She's so frolicsome and hearty she's the life of every party,
She's invited to the "hoolies", one and all,
For her big explosive laugh would cheer up a sick giraffe,
Och! a noble heart is b'aten' 'neath her shawl.
Sure, 'tis aisy to be seen that she is no beauty queen
And her double chin is steam-rolled every day;

Community Involvement Needed In Villierstown's Tidy Towns Effort

Villierstown in category A scored 160 marks in this year's Tidy Towns Competition, the same total as last year, receiving exactly the same marks under various headings. In their report the adjudicators said that an active, enthusiastic committee together with community involvement was needed to improve the marks for next year.

The following is the report showing the marks allocated under each heading with the maximum in brackets:

EFFORT 32 (45)

Most of what was said in last year's report applies again this year. Villierstown is a unique village and with its layout and spaciousness has tremendous potential for development and for success in the Tidy Towns competition. An active, enthusiastic committee and an interested community is primarily what is needed. Get the community involved.

Try to draw up a plan setting out work to be achieved over the next few years. Perhaps you could get some ideas by looking at some of the top ranking centres in the competition not far from your village.

TIDINESS 30 (40)

Litter control is not a serious problem in Villierstown — there was only negligible evidence of litter at the time of adjudication and this is a good achievement. However, odd untidy entrances, gardens, side areas — e.g. an untidy cottage on the road leading to the school and storage of materials on the green create a poor impression.

PRESENTATION OF BUILDINGS 29 (40)

Your problem with dereliction is appreciated and we wish you luck in your efforts to manage this problem. Painted boarding up of premises can help to soften the impact. Some towns have done imaginative murals on boardings at derelict houses. The monument and cross in the village are good focal points, but, while the monument is quite well presented, it could be improved, as could the cross, therefore drawing more attention to them. The school was well presented but the space in front of it needs attention. The presentation of the pub "An Cruiscan Lan" could be upgraded. A gable wall near the Post Office needed seeing to also. Try to encourage the displaying of window boxes, tubs and hanging baskets among the business people and residents of the village.

PRESENTATION OF NATURAL AMENITIES 26 (50)

You have a potentially beautiful square and the gates at the top of the village are a great asset and

could be enhanced by further tree planting, flower/shrub beds. It should not be permitted for vehicles to park on the green or for it to be used for storage of goods. The trees on the green are attractive but it was a pity that the grass was only partially cut. It is suggested that you consider the possibility of landscaping this green and highlighting the monument. It could be so much more attractive than it is already.

APPEARANCE OF APPROACH ROADS 28 (45)

Some signs were in need of cleaning or replacement, e.g. the one for Ferry Quay and the Children Crossing sign. There are quite a few poorly presented entrances, walls, gates and railings along the approach roads. One house with a green wall had a particularly bad rusty gate and railings. Several margins and hedges were overgrown. A very attractively presented house was seen on the Aglish Road.

PRESENTATION OF RESIDENTIAL AREAS 15 (30)

Some houses along the green looked very well but there were some neglected looking ones here also. There were some very nice individual presentations around the village. You have several derelict houses which have been discussed above.

Get a work plan underway and Villierstown will no doubt improve its marks in the competition. Your village has a lot of potential.

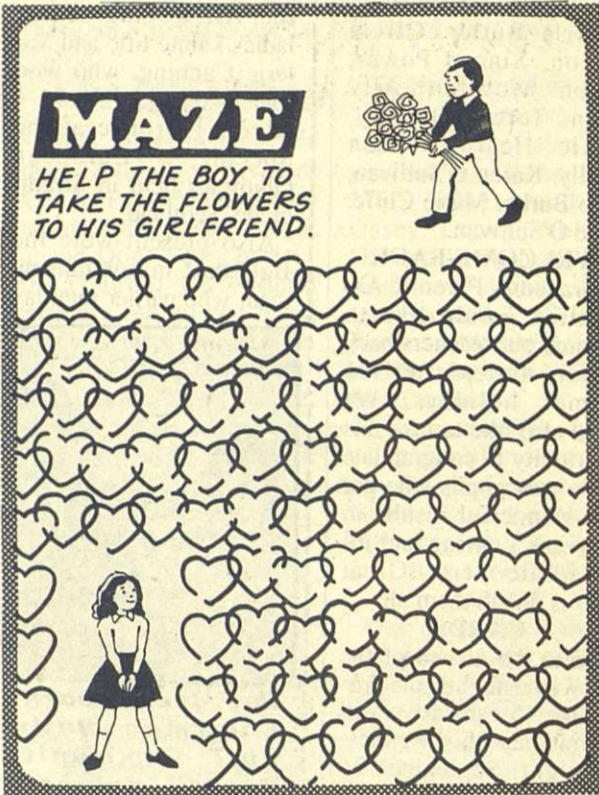

And libraries often organise special story, painting and play sessions during school holidays. So if you don't belong to a library, you could be missing out!

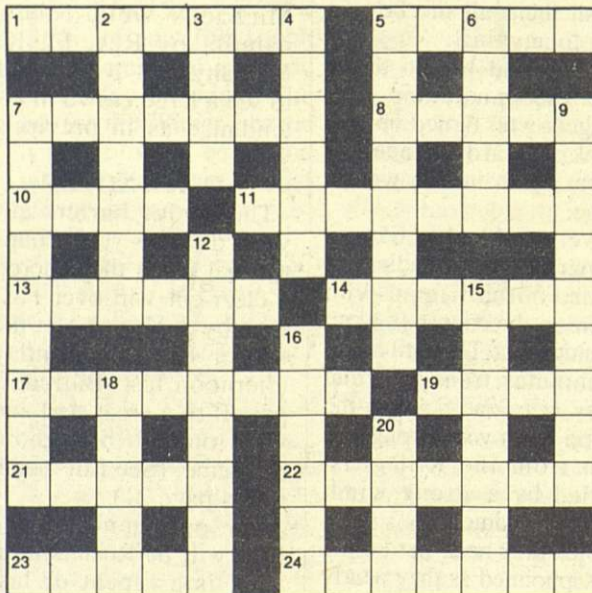


Most towns have a lending library where you can go and spend time browsing around the shelves for the kind of books you like. With most adult libraries, there's usually a special children's section or library.

QUARTER-FINALS DUNGARVAN v. GAULTIER

Some months ago I got an enquiry from a club who were seeking information about a championship that they claimed to have won shortly after the turn of the century and in my research I found an interesting bit of information which fits well into my preview of Sunday's meeting of Dungarvan and Gaultier at Walsh Park.

It relates to the football championship of the year 1910 and it records that on Sunday, May 29 at Leamybrien, Dungarvan defeated Clonea in a game refereed by R. Rockett and on the very same day, Gaultier beat Tramore/Shamrocks in a game refereed by E. Tobin at Ballymacaw. Rathgormack who were the reigning champions, retained their title that year. I was surprised to learn that Gaultier were around at the time and I didn't find any proof that they were around long after. Dungarvan had won eight senior titles by then and went on to win a further thirteen. Next year Dungarvan will celebrate the golden jubilee of their last win in senior hurling (1941) and how nice it would be for them to have the football title under wraps as well???

I put three question marks after that sentence because they have three hurdles to cross before it could become a reality. The first is on Sunday next when they travel to Walsh Park to play Gaultier in what will be a crunch game for both clubs as a win will put one of them into the county semi-final on October 15 — if the game is not a draw. It probably won't end in a draw, but such is the form and standards of the sides, that it will be close enough

to ending all square if both play to their best form.

Ned Flynn, county selector and the man who did most in bringing Gaultier up from the bottom, told me on Sunday night that having seven of their players involved in hurling over the past three weeks, will not help their cause and their absence from football training will militate against their chances.

I still think that they will be a big stumbling block for Dungarvan, as men like Darragh Taylor, Edmund, Paul and Anthony Fitzgerald, Andy Doherty, Ml. Flynn, Sean and Eamon Cullinane, Michael "Speedy" Flynn, etc., are all very talented players and Walsh Park will be to their advantage.

Victories over teams like the Nire, Kilmacthomas, Dunhill, etc, have won Dungarvan a high rating in the championship and these performances as well as their tremendous match with Stradbally, must put them in here with a splendid chance of reaching the semi-final.

As far as I am aware, all their players, Dermot Callaghan, Derek Lyons, Martin Sheehan, Morrie, Pepe and J. J. Ferncombe, Eddie Burke, Darrell Donnelly, Ger Beresford, Denis McGrath, Martin Houlihan, Tony Hamilton, David Dee, D. O'Connor, B. Morrissey, etc., etc., are fit and rearing to go and if these players strike top form, they should beat Gaultier and qualify for their first semi-final in this championship, in a very long time.

KILROSSANTY v. NIRE

Because of the game against Tyrone at Walsh Park on Sunday, this attractive senior football quarter final match is brought forward to Saturday and will be played at Dungarvan in the afternoon.

Ordinarily this would be treated as the match of the championship so far, as the same clubs figured in last year's controversial county final which Kilrossanty won by a single point and which the Nire claim, should have been their title, but because of the time fac-

tor and the championship running a bit late the game has to be fitted in on a Saturday and this will be seen by many as downgrading the game.

Nevertheless it should prove to be an exciting clash of a high standard and a fight to the finish as was their final meeting last year. The doubt about the availability of Jim Maher is a big worry for the county champions as if the midfielder is out, it will prove a serious blow to their chances.

The Nire would seem to be in sparkling form now that they are back in contention after having beaten Dunhill in the play-off two weeks ago and if the good form shown by Tom Walsh, Pat Walsh, Ger Walsh and Kevin Mulcahy in the game against Carlow on Sunday, is a sample of what they can produce, they will be difficult to beat — not that they are every easy to overcome — but it would be foolhardy to write the reigning champions out of the race when they have done all that was needed to take them to this quarter final stage.

The champions will find it very difficult, but they should just about survive.

ALL-IRELAND "B" QUARTER- FINAL WATERFORD v. TYRONE

Waterford footballers play Tyrone in the quarter final of the senior 'B' All-Ireland at Walsh Park on Sunday next, they having qualified by beating Carlow in round 1 at Dungarvan last Sunday.

Unfortunately for us, we will be forced to field an understrength side for this all important clash, as many of the players will not be available due to club commitments over the week-end.

Liam Dalton of Shamrocks will be on duty at Fraher Field in the intermediate hurling final and Dermot Callaghan will be playing with his club against Gaultier in football. Also the county selectors will have to adopt a 'wait and see' policy in regard to the players from the Nire and Kilrossanty who are due to meet in the senior

football quarter final at Dungarvan on Saturday.

Seven of last Sunday's team are involved here and Peter Queally, Newtown is also due to play football with his club over the week-end. Jim Maher, who was taken off injured last Sunday, must be considered a doubtful starter in any case. It is likely that the selectors will have no

option but to play the men who will have already played on Saturday and early Sunday.

A meeting with a team with such a high profile as Tyrone is something of a special occasion and something from which much could be learned and now to find ourselves in such a dilemma, is surely a great pity.

Garry Moloney R.I.P.

The following splendid oration was delivered at the graveside of the late Garry Moloney, Shamrocks Club, by his friend and colleague, former County Chairman, James Tobin:

"Our hearts are heavy to-day and our senses are still numbed by the shock of Saturday evening so that speaking at all is difficult. It would be unforgivable however to disperse today without paying tribute to Garry, snatched from our midst so tragically three days ago, leaving the whole area shocked and groping for an explanation and his beloved wife and family devastated.

"It is impossible to be calm and detached when recalling Garry and his place in our lives and in our hearts. He was involved in all aspects of Community life so that there is scarcely a person in these parishes of Knockanore, Kilwatermoy and Glendine whose life he hasn't touched and consequently we are all diminished by his death. He was a faithful, loving and supportive husband and father, a dependable helpful neighbour and a friend of absolute loyalty.

"Garry and the Shamrocks were synonymous and it was a cruel irony that he would take his leave of us at the moment of one of the Shamrocks greatest triumphs. Garry was always a hurling and football man and there was never a time without hurling or football in his life. He was a valued playing member of the title winning St. Patrick's hurling team of 1947 and Youghal in 1955. The G.A.A. dominated his life right to his last breath. Player, official, selector, mentor, adviser, he gave his life to the hurlers and footballers of this area. His family — wife, sons, daughters — were imbued with the same sense of dedication to Shamrocks G.A.A., filling a variety of administrative positions down through the years.

"On a personal note, I'll miss Garry and it will be impossible to forget him. He never passed the house without calling. His kind interest, lively mind, kindly nature, generous attitude and willingness to forgive and be reconciled, marked him as a true Christian gentleman. Only the cold merciless hand of death could extinguish the warm smile we always associated with Garry.

"Garry, a chara-dhilis, taimid croi-bhriste. Beidh scith agat anois, scith ata tuille go maith agat. Ni dheanhamid, do chairde dearmad ort go deo, mar ni bheidh do leitheid ann aris."

ATTRACTIVE INTERMEDIATE HURLING COUNTY FINAL

De La Salle To Beat Shamrocks

Having seen Shamrocks brilliant second half display when they recovered from what seemed an impossible situation to beat Abbeyside in the semi-final two weeks ago, I realise how risky it is to now regard them as outsiders against the Eastern champions, De La Salle, in the county final next Sunday. Writing up the final in this way might also sound a contradiction of what I wrote after Shamrocks had beaten the same De La Salle by 3-8 to 1-5 in the league section of the present championship at Dungarvan many weeks ago. Where, then is the logic in making such a prediction?

In the semi-finals here in the West, Abbeyside played great hurling in the first half and in the second half (by comparison) they played poorly. Shamrocks played very poorly in the first half and played exceptionally well in the second half, while on the same evening, De La Salle played to a very high standard all through their semi-final against the favourites, Erin's Own, whom they beat by 4-13 to 1-2. This might support the logic of my prediction, but nevertheless it does not mean that Shamrocks, as outsiders, cannot win. In fact the role of outsiders may well prove advantageous to the Knockanore based club in facing this challenge, which could restore their senior status and earn them the right to replace Cappo-

quin or Fourmilewater in the top championship next year. In the league section of this championship, Shamrocks, with a total of 10-32, had a match average of 2-9, as against an average of 1-9 for De La Salle, but as the championship progressed the city team continued to show marked improvement and in beating Colligan and Erin's Own they played like champions. They have a younger team than Shamrocks and many people will describe De La Salle as a more complete outfit with the majority of their present side having come up through championship winning under-age teams. Shamrocks, on the other hand, have been around a bit longer, are more matured and experienced, but

have more limitations standardwise. In Davy Duggan, Joey Carton, Donal Casey (goal), Eoin Dunphy, Ger Lowry, Johnnie Brennar, Padraigh Fanning, Noel Dalton, John Griffith, etc., De La Salle have players of a very good standard and if performing as well as they did in the semi-final at Walsh Park, then Shamrocks Michael Neville, Pat Murphy, Sean Harnedy, Frank Roche, Kevin, Liam and Ollie Ahearne, Liam Dalton and Dan Casey (whose midfield duels with Johnnie Brennar and Pat Fanning could prove the deciding factor in the game here), Joe Ahearne, Liam

Murphy (goal), Michael Murphy, Tom Roche, Michael Motherway, Michael Leahy and co., will need an awful lot of determination to beat them. Both sides play very well at the Fraher Field so the game seems certain to produce a splendid final. Shamrocks were unluckily pipped by Fourmilewater who were the eventual champions in the semi-final last year and in the previous two seasons they went very close also. It would be regarded as some compensation for their club if they won this, having lost three intermediate football finals on the trot. The best of luck to them.

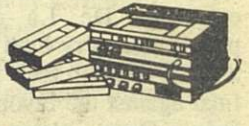
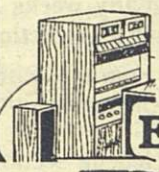
