
# Seminar On **Nursing In** Britain

# **Pause For Thought With** Fr. Paddy

### **IT IS NOW YOUR TURN!**

Isaiah, in the first reading, depicts in a brief and telling story, the Lord's relationship with the Jewish people. He uses a vineyard for the setting, and as this was a frequent adaptation of preachers, it would have been readily understood by his listeners. He goes on to relate how a landowner carefully prepared and planted his vineyard with strong and healthy plants, and had every hope of reaping a rich harvest. Clearly, the owner had done everything he could to ensure a good crop, but the venture ended in failure. Why? What went wrong? It is evident from the reaction of the owner that the workers were negligent. The place became so cluttered up with weeds that the vines were stulted; and when harvest time came, the crop was small and of poor quality. Naturally, the master was disappointed. He drove these unfaithful servants from his land. Isaiah is saying, God loved these people. He offered them every help, but they would not listen to His prophets. Hence, He takes the vineyard from them, and invites other workers to come and do the work.

We know from S. Scripture that Isaiah's words were fulfilled by Christ, when He founded His Church, the new people of God. Like Isaiah, it is now the mission of the Church to encourage her children to be faithful in tending to the needs of God's vineyard. Hence, it is her duty to remind us of our obligation to be fruitful. She must tell us that failure will involve condemnation. The Lord has prepared the way. The rest is up to ourselves. And Paul, in the second reading tells us how to produce a harvest of love. He says, you must pray, thank God, and practice the Christian virtues. He adds, there is no other way to obtain and enjoy the peace of Christ, which is so contrary to the bitter grapes of suffering, which Isaiah says was the lot of those who looked for it elsewhere. Paul fully understands, it will still be a struggle, but if you do not turn to God, who is always near, where can you go? It should make one think. Today, there's a mad rush for pleasure and enjoyment. The first rule of this club is: You must keep God out. It is the same as seeking for the crock of gold buried at the foot the rainbow! These foolish people run the risk of being excluded from Heaven. The sooner they realise, there is no peace here or hereafter without God, the better.

You'd conclude rightly from what I have said that the situation which faced Isaiah has again raised it's ugly head. People, who once worked in God's vineyard, are handing in their cards, and going to work elsewhere for what they say, are better terms. They claim the new job is less demanding and conditions and pay are better! It is the old cry, we will not have this man to reign over us. We want Barabbas. God's laws are outmoded in this enlightened age. Those who preach "do as you please" are doing untold harm to souls. For, as I said to you recently, how can these false teachers help you to find the key to life, when they are unable to find it themselves! People, who returned to Ireland this year, told me that they noticed a steep decline in moral standards. They expressed sadness, because they'd seen the havoc caused in their adopted lands, and had always felt refreshed and uplifted when they came back home. What surprised them too was not only the change, but the rapid change in the moral tone. Indeed, it is easy to be influenced and mislead by what is happening in our midst, so be on your

guard. You will only find peace here and hereafter by serving God faithfully. It will not be easy, and it will take courage, but when the referee blows his whistle, you'd rejoice that you were a member of God's team. Again I say, be on your guard. God always keeps His promises, and He has promised you eternal life. Remember, the world is full of false prophets. They'll offer you the sky, but ask them, what is left when the bubble bursts?

### A WEE TWIST

In the Gospel there's a wee twist in the vineyard story. This time the workers forget that all they have, they have received. They behave outrageously when they are asked to acknowledge God's goodness. The Lord sent His servants to them to remind them of their duties but they simply beat them up, and ignored the Master's message. When He finally sent His own son, they killed Him. The meaning is, Israel was privileged, but failed to produce the expected fruits. She refused to listen to the warnings of the prophets, and worse still, she rejected God's son. Hence, she failed, despite being especially blessed, to fulfil her chosen role, because she fell to the lure of the world.

The Lord then went into the highways seeking other workers. Those who responded are now the new people of God. You are now numbered among that privileged group; and the Lord expects all the members of His Church to strive to be good and faithful servants. We've only to turn back to the second reading to learn how we are to fulfil our function. It is evidently clear that the Lord did punish His unfaithful workers, but Matthew is saying that worse is to come, namely, exclusion from the Kingdom of Heaven, for the new workers, if they willfully fail in their duties. You see. God has not asked for the impossible. Indeed, He has asked for a lot, but if He has, He has also assured us of all the helps necessary to succeed. He understands mistakes will be made, but He is always available and ready to help and to forgive. If He mentions the great reward at the end of the road, it is for our encouragement. Truly, we have a great and good God. He is worth living for, and He is worth dying for. So, watch and pray, and do not allow yourself to be blinded by the allurements of life.



### **1990 CATTLE HEADAGE &** EC PREMIUM SCHEMES

Because of industrial action by the inspection staff, the Department is introducing the following arrangements for the current year.

### **Cattle Headage and Beef Cow Schemes in Disadvantaged Areas:**

Herds not already inspected will not now be inspected. Applications will be cross-checked against existing records and processed for payment if found in order. An applicant may be asked to forward to the Department's local office the relevant cattle identity cards and Marts/Meat Factories sales dockets if this is considered necessary in specific cases.

### Suckler Cow Scheme:

Applicants whose herds have not been inspected will have their applications cross-checked under this scheme also and processed for payment if found in order. Cattle identity cards will be requested if these cross-checks reveal any apparent discrepancies. Because of the six months retention period under this scheme and because applications under the special Suckler Cow scheme for small-scale dairy producers have not yet issued there will be a small number of special checks carried out on suckler cows later this year.

#### Special Beef Premium Scheme:

Male cattle not already inspected will not now be inspected. All uninspected applicants will be asked in due course to forward to the Department's local office the relevant cattle identity cards and any LH/SBPI forms completed by Department staff at Marts so that claims can be processed for payment. Cards should not be forwarded until requested. Applicants wishing to sell cattle in the meantime should bring the identity cards of all male cattle still in their possession and listed on the application form together with any completed LH/SBPI forms to their local office for checking, punching and stamping.

The comment under the Dungarvan, we were afheading "Kristallnacht for workers at Waterford Glass" states that the decision of the Waterford Glass board to source machine cut crystal from the Bavarian glassmaker FX Nachtmann illustrates that no industrial job whatever is safe.

It goes on to say that while the workers at Waterford Crystal are quite rightly proud of their enormous skills and tradition, there is no doubt that the German glass will also be of excellent quality. It then points out that to the untrained American eye there may be no obvious difference in quality between crystal blown and cut by the craftsmen of Waterford and the machined glass from Nachtmann.

It was "The Sunday Business Post" which first revealed the tie-up between Waterford Crystal and the German glass firm and since then it is unofficially being suggested that perhaps five per cent of all glass could be sourced abroad, with minimal implications for employment at the Waterford Crystal plants at Kilbarry in Waterford City and at Dungarvan. However the Business Post makes the point that once a precedent is established and crystal is being made successfully outside Ireland, the way will be open for the management to bring about further sharp cost reductions at Waterford itself.

It is anticipated that a hard decision concerning the way forward will most likely have to be taken this side of Christmas so let us hope that the Union, the Management and the Board of Waterford Crystal will be able to arrive at an acceptable work plan that will ensure that the great tradition of Waterford Glass will be sustained into the next century.

Fr. Twomey's Road runs from the Youghal Road on the outskirts of Dungarvan to the Spring or Springmount and is now bounded by a modern housing estate. The Road very obviously takes its name from the old Friar's Well which Fr. Twomey cleaned up in 1860.



If a pupil wishes to talk with a friend of the opposite sex, he or she must fill out an application form.



# NEXT SUNDAY **County Senior and Minor** Hurling Finals at Dungarvan

### **COUNTY FOOTBALLERS FACE CLARE IN OPENING ROUND OF NATIONAL LEAGUE**

As far as supporters here are concerned, all roads will lead to Fraher Field on Sunday next in hopeful anticipation of enjoying the very best club hurling of the year when the 88th senior hurling final is played between last year's finalists Roanmore and Ballyduff, as well as the attractive curtain-raiser between Lismore and Roanmore in the 69th playing of the minor hurling county final.

Given a fine day, a near record crowd will turn up to see both finals, but the senior game will be particularly attractive to the huge crowd who saw the same clubs, Roanmore and Ballyduff, contest last year's county final at Walsh Park, the result of which saw Roanmore win their first senior title. In defeating Ballyduff by 3-8 to 2-7, they might not have produced sparkling hurling, but the game nevertheless kept an almost record crowd on their toes for the full sixty minutes.

For Roanmore it was the realisation of a dream and a title they richly deserved, they having reached the semi-final stage in every year since 1982 except 1984. They had disappointingly lost to Ballyduff by 4-7 to 2-11 in a thrilling replay of the county final in 1987 and taking the title at the expense of the same opponents last October was particularly gratifying. This will be the third meeting of the sides in a county final in the past four years and with one title each from the two already played, it will be interesting to see which club takes the third.

As will be seen from our scoring chart, both Roanmore and Ballyduff have each played a record number of matches to reach this final. Never before have teams had to play nine championship games before qualifying for a final and with the unique formula in operation here and where a total of 42 matches had to be played to sort out the pairings for the final, it the teams have not clashed

was really turned on they both came up trumps, and in their respective semi-finals both clubs showed us what they were able to do when the result mattered most. I believe that both will produce great stuff in this final and that it will be a game to remember.

Roanmore are the reigning champions and must be listed as favourites. The manner in which they disposed of Tallow in the semi-final was, in the view of some hurling judges, more impressive than Ballyduff's defeat of Passage on the same day in the other semi-final, but to base a prediction on this game alone can be very misleading and this point might well be proved on Sunday.

The expressed notion that many of the Ballyduff players have "gone over the top" was well and truly scotched on a few occasions this year and here I have in mind their two victories over Mount Sion, their win over a hotly fancied Portlaw and their overpowering display against Passage two weeks ago. Just how well they will fare against this brilliant champions side may be considered questionable, but if one can regard the scoring chart with any seriousness, we find them equal, if not slightly better than Roanmore in the arithmetic of the thing. In their nine games the Western team have scored a total of 18.113 as against 17.105 for Roanmore and this is balanced to some extent by the scores recorded against is interesting to find that them. This shows an average of 1-9 against Roanmore and 1-10 against Ballyduff. These figures are probably more interesting than being regarded as a guide to their respective standards, but nevertheless it must convince everyone that there is no gap between the finalists here on Sunday.
