Bord Pleanala Allows Appeal On Abbeyside Take-Away Outlet

An Bord Pleanala under date October 19 has informed Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solicitor acting for Mr. John Torrens that the appeal lodged by him for change of use from shop to take-away outlet at 10, Sexton Street, Abbeyside, Dungarvan has been allowed.

The Bord Pleanala order dealing with the appeal made under the Local Government (Planning and Development) Acts, 1963 to 1990 states as follows:

APPEAL by John Torrens care of Damien Dillon and Company of 18 Mitchell Street, Dungarvan, County Waterford against the decision made on the 5th day of January, 1990, by the Council of the Urban District of Dungarvan to refuse a permission for development comprising change of use from shop to take away outlet at 10 Sexton Street, Dungarvan in accordance with plans and particulars lodged with the said Council.

DECISION: Pursuant to the Local Government (Planning and Development) Acts, 1963 to 1990, it is hereby decided, for the reason set out in the First Schedule hereto, to grant permission for the said development in accordance with the said plans and particulars, subject to the condition specified in the Second Schedule hereto, the reasons for the imposition of the said condition being as set out in the said Second Schedule and the said permission is hereby granted subject to the said condition.

FIRST SCHEDULE
Having regard to the land use zoning of the area, as provided for in the Dungarvan Development Plan, 1989, to the extent of established commercial land use in the vicinity of the site and to the traffic capacity of the public road, it is considered that the proposed development, subject to compliance with the condition set out in the Second Schedule hereto, would not be prejudicial to the amenities of the area, to public health or to traffic safety and convenience and would otherwise accord

with the proper planning and development of the area.

SECOND SCHEDULE
The layout shall be in accordance with the revised plans submitted to An Bord Pleanala on the 15th day of March, 1990.

Reason — In the interests of public health and safety.

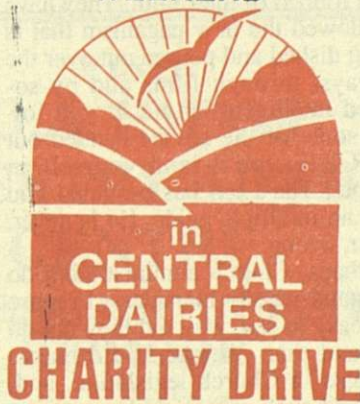

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

EVIL BRINGS DEATH TO THE WICKED

Great changes have swept through the world over the past fifty years, and, whilst one could marvel at the tremendous advances, one could hardly welcome the amazing decline in moral standards. Undoubtedly, man has risen to new heights, and his achievements have created almost unheard of riches. These years too have not only witnessed great prosperity, but they have also seen the "multitude" liberating themselves from centuries of oppression, and winning a share of the purse. It is inevitable, with opportunities abounding that the minds of people will be gripped and centred on securing as much of the spoils as possible. The old story is, when man has plenty, he is inclined to forget the giver. After all, he is human, and, when he's happy with his lot, the purpose of his existence is apt to take a back seat. Add to man's foolishness, the effects of two world wars, the power of the devil to capitalise on the situation, and, you'll arrive at some conclusion, why the world is so engulfed in her present ills.

Yes, the dread disease has reached our shores, and many of our people have been fascinated and mesmerised by the so-called liberation. It's no surprise to hear people say, where will it all end? And, what's to be done? Certainly, the way civil laws are framed, it is most difficult to control crime. It is no consolation to be told things are worse elsewhere. In England the Government are promising to do something, but you can bet the last thing they'll do is to bring God back into the state schools. However, let's keep to our own scene. I mentioned recently that people home on holidays were shocked by the pace of change. Of course, I know we have thousands and thousands in West Waterford, who are the salt of the earth. They love their God. Nevertheless, the fact is, many of our people have been robbed of their faith. They have swallowed the new paganism that is being dished and poured out over the airways, through films and by so-called intelligentsia, etc. If you follow some of the advice handed out by R.T.E. you'll land yourself in trouble. The Lord has provided you with an infallible guide. He is never, never, wrong.

Perhaps, Church administrators do not stand wholly blameless. I realise it is easy to say, why did they not do this and that. Vatican II did make changes in Church legislation, and, as in all such cases, implementation took time. Meanwhile, the old catechism was out of favour, and teachers felt at sea. Then, you had leading theologians adding to the confusion by voicing views at variance with those of Peter. The fact, that most of these dissenters left the priesthood, has not undone the harm. Too, since Vatican II many preachers have concentrated on social justice leaving the other Commandments to gather dust. Added to that, you had those

who went "soft" on sin, and this was the group who got publicity.

The Sunday readings tell us how God wants us to behave. The first presents Moses explaining the Commandments to his people. He draws attention to the obligation of helping the weak, the widows and the orphans. It follows, if God blesses us with plenty, He does expect us to help and to share. The striking part of the dialogue is the way he introduces God into the picture. He says, God will not allow wrongs to go unnoticed.

THE GOAL OF ALL CHRISTIANS

The Gospel reminds us that the Ten Commandments not only impose obligations, but that their observance is accepted by God as a proof of our love. Hence, love of God ought to be the goal of all Christians. It is clear that it would be inconceivable to claim one loves God unless one bore that same love for one's neighbour. In fact, the two Commandments are so closely linked that it would be possible to observe one without the other.

Nowadays, there's no respect for law, people or property. Crime is almost out of hand, and there's a growing alarm. We must bring Christ back into the scene. He has outlined what is best for society, and it is up to each of us individually to unfold His solution. And, unless God is given His rightful place in the world, we'll never have peace. It would be well for those, who resist God, to remember, the Lord will punish those who fail to keep His law.

Paul in the second reading tells us about the wisdom and good sense of the Philippians, who received the word, lived by it, and confidently looked forward to receiving their reward. Your faith is very precious. Guard it with your life.

FURY OVER PIGGERY

A five-hundred sow piggery unit and slurry distribution system proposed for Garran temple across the river Suir from Kilmanahan would dramatically damage the environment according to the objectors to the venture. LATE VERY REV. CANON JOHN POWER, P.P., V.G.

The news of the death of Very Rev. Canon John Power, P.P., V.G., Retired Parish Priest of Lismore/Ballysaggart, which took place on Thurs-

day, October 11, at the Cottage Nursing Home, Clonmel, was received with sadness not only by his brother Anthony, his nephews and nieces, but also by his parishioners and by his legion of friends in the Nire and Ballymacarbry districts.

Canon John was a member of one of Nire Valley's most highly respected families. Son of the late James Power, P.C. and the late Mrs. Johanna Power, Knockaun, Brandaun, Ballymacarbry, he was educated at the local school in the Nire and Mount Melleray Seminary, and he completed his theological studies at St. John's College, Waterford and was ordained in the Cathedral, Waterford in June 1930 by Most Rev. Dr. Hackett, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore.

After spending some time in the English Mission he returned home to become Curate at Kilgobinet, Colligan and Kilbrien. He also served in Fourmilewater and Newcastle, Kilea and Croke, Newtown and Kill, Cappoquin and Lismore and Ballysaggart, where he was transferred from Cappoquin on May 5, 1979, to Lismore where he retired in August 1989 as Parish Priest.

As a person he had few equals; as a priest he was kind, considerate and understanding and was always available to help anyone who found the burdens of life too heavy to handle. He was beloved of the parishioners in all the parishes throughout the diocese where he had served during the sixty odd years in which he had laboured in the Lord's Vineyard. He was brother of the late Rev. Fr. William Power, P.P., Rathgormack, Clonea Power, who predeceased him by some twelve years. He was also brother

of the late Sergeant James Power, Mullingar and of the late Sister Teresa, Presentation Convent, Clonmel and of the late Mrs. Moira Nugent, Ballyvaheen.

On Friday evening his remains were removed from the Cottage Mortuary, Clonmel to the Church of St. Carthage, Lismore. On Saturday afternoon concelibrated Requiem Mass was offered for the repose of his gentle soul, after which he was laid to rest in the church grounds.

During his time as curate in Fourmilewater he was Chairman of Fourmilewater Hurling Club, a job he carried out with dignity and respect. To his brother Anthony (Sonny), his nephews and nieces we extend our sympathy. Ar dheis De go raibh a anam.

THIS IS A LAME AND NEGATIVE EXCUSE

Since the so-called Gulf crisis started last August, oil prices have gone almost through the roof. This despite the fact that there has been no actual shortage in the supplies available world-wide. The excuse for the spiralling increases is that the fear of war has created a move to stock-pile supplies.

The long and the short of it is that the oil companies must be making a packet on the increases, the Government coffers are also benefitting from the increased VAT take while the poor motorists are being ripped off.

Of course the Government denies that it is all ill-wind that doesn't blow somebody good and the latest apologia for this comes from the Press Office of The Revenue Commissioners which stated last week that "price increases for petrol or for any other product generally lead to reduced demand for that product because consumers adjust their spending . . . this drop in petrol consumption affects not just the yield from the VAT but much more significantly the yield from excise duty."

And that's the way the Government excuses its decision to retain the VAT rate on the increased petrol prices to balance off the falling consumption. It's a lame and negative excuse. However we can take heart in the knowledge that oil prices are now taking a plunge and on Monday last had dropped to \$28.5 a barrel, the lowest rate for more than six weeks. We may expect to see the benefit at the pumps by the end of the month, but then like all these transactions, when prices are to rise they go up very fast — when they are to come down they take their time!

BONMAHON LIFEGUARDS ARE ANNOYED

Elsewhere in this issue of the "Leader" a letter from the Secretary of the Bonmahon Lifeguard Club is published which expresses annoyance at a report in our previous issue concerning the need for lifeguards in Bonmahon. This report emanated from a meeting of Waterford County Council and arose from a motion proposed by a member of the Council which called on the Council to investigate the need for the Council to provide for the appointment of lifeguards at Bonmahon. Our report was a factual record of the

Co. Council item dealing with the subject.

We point this out to make it clear that if the Bonmahon Lifeguard Club is annoyed it can only be with the Council and not with us here for merely reporting the facts.

But having said this we must admit that we are at a loss to understand why the Council came to consider the lifeguard motion in the first instance in view of the existence of the Bonmahon Lifeguard Club and its very impressive record in the sphere of water safety.

In addition to the information contained in the Bonmahon letter we have been made aware of the club's very active programme during the past year from a brochure published by the club under the title "1990 Facts". This records that members of the club effected 11 rescues, took 64 preventive actions and rendered first aid in 24 cases. In addition the club runs a water safety school, lifesaving classes, first aid courses, swimming classes, resuscitation and beach awareness courses.

This is indeed a very full and comprehensive programme and how so much activity went on at the beach in Bonmahon during the past summer without the County Council or the local member who raised the issue at the last Council meeting being aware of it is difficult to understand.

Incidentally the Bonmahon Club has started a fundraising campaign to provide a 24-hour, year round inshore boat service to fill the existing gap in the Co. Waterford sea rescue service and it is hoped that this service will be operational early in 1991. So much voluntary effort certainly merits the widest support.

THE TAOISEACH'S VISIT

The visit of the Taoiseach, Mr. C. J. Haughey to Dungarvan last Friday night to attend the Deputy Fahey 25th Celebration function once more high-lighted the bitter divisions which continue to split the Fianna Fail organisation in the constituency.

While over one thousand Fahey supporters thronged one of the town hotels, the opposition group in the party (or is it the other way around) were meeting the Party Leader in another hotel.

When the Taoiseach's motorcade arrived in town on Friday night it got "lost" in Abbeyside for a while and a local resident who was asked for directions got an unexpected handshake from the Boss himself as he put the group back on the right road.

The absence of the Tanaiste and Presidential candidate, Mr. Brian Lenihan and that of the originally selected M.C. for the night, Senator Pascal Mooney has been claimed to result from the split within the Fianna Fail camp and the fear that their presence would damage the Presidential election prospects on the one hand and the next Senate election on the other. However while the absence of both was excused away it did not affect the exuberance and the success of the main function of the night where Tralee Dail Deputy Tom McEllistrim proved an able stand-in for the absent Pascal.

And when the Taoiseach had fulfilled his obligation to attend the 25th celebration, said to have been part of the "deal" made last year to induce Deputy Fahey back into the Fianna Fail Parliamentary Party from which he had resigned in protest over the PD connection, he quietly withdrew and was driven down to Stradbally where he spent the night at the Woodhouse residence of Dublin Fianna Fail Deputy, Dr. John O'Connell.

And despite all the to-ing and fro-ing that went on, the occasion proved another success for Deputy Fahey and showed that his popularity among the rank and file supporters is in no way diminished.

IT WAS A FAMILY REUNION

The photo in our "Remembering Other Days" series last week aroused a great deal of interest among Muintir na Rinne who can still recall the old days and we have since learned that it was taken on the occasion of a family reunion when "the Yanks were home" in 1932 outside Nick Walsh's house in Ceann A' Bhatalaigh in Upper Helvick. The photo was taken by none other

than Peig Ni Reagain, bairrion Na Rinne! Incidentally four of the group and not three as was stated, still survive and the buachaill og in the photo has been identified to us as Seanie Manahan.

We are delighted that so many of these old photos are the source of reviving lots of happy memories for many of our readers.

THE DESSIE ELLIS CASE

The fact that the parents of jailed hunger-striker Dessie Ellis had a brief meeting with the Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey during his visit to Dungarvan last Friday night and that a group of Anti-Extradition supporters mounted a protest outside the Park Hotel high-lights the efforts being made to prevent Ellis' extradition to Britain to be tried on conspiracy charges.

Desmond Ellis from Finglas in Dublin commenced a hunger-strike in Portlaoise Prison on Wednesday, October 10 and in a statement which he then issued from the prison he said, "I am going on hunger-strike to the death, if necessary to prevent my extradition to Britain."

If extradited he will face trial on explosives charges alleged to have occurred between January 1st 1981 and October 27th 1983. However it is claimed that it was impossible of Dessie Ellis to have been in Britain during that period as proof exists that he was elsewhere during that time and he wants to face any charges pending against him under the Criminal Law Amendment Act and to be tried here in Ireland. A final decision will be made in the matter when the case comes before the Supreme Court next month.

PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE VISITS WATERFORD

Fine Gael Presidential candidate Austin Currie carried out a whistle top tour of the constituency last Monday as his campaign bus toured the county. Accompanied by Deputy Austin Deasy and a number of Fine Gael Councillors, Mr. Currie started off in the city and hit Dungarvan at lunch time. There he made a visit to the local Mart where the usual Monday sales were in progress

and met a big number of farmers.

He then made a lighting tour through the main streets of the town centre before again boarding the bus which then continued its journey to Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow.

Shots of the visit were included in the R.T.E. television news service on Monday night.

LIFEGUARDS ON BONMAHON BEACH

Dear Sir,

It was with annoyance that we read a report in your paper with regard to lifeguards at Bonmahon. Since June of 1987 Bonmahon beach has had a lifeguard service of R.L.S.S. Voluntary Lifeguards. We have provided an excellent high profile service to date.

We are the only beach in the county with a team of 12 lifeguards plus 37 lifeguard juniors plus a big back-up team. We are the only lifeguards to wear the lifeguard uniform (chequered hats). We are the only club of its kind in the country.

From June of 1991 we will extend our service to seven days. We will also put in place an inshore rescue boat service to cover the coastal area from Killfarrissy to Mine Head. This inshore service will operate on a 7-day 24-hour on-call 12-month rota. We have the trained personnel. We have the insurance and we have the commitment.

The R.L.S.S. as a training organisation we provide swimming and lifesaving classes at Waterford Crystal Pool on Tuesdays from 7 to 10 p.m. and on Wednesdays from 10 to 11 p.m. The students studying Recreational Management at Waterford Regional College have to come to our classes to train for their lifesaving qualifications as we are the only organisation who can provide international qualifications.

As we are affiliated to both R.L.S.S. and S.L.S.A., we have a vast international contact network. With S.L.S.A. we start children at 12 years and this means we will always have young lifeguards coming on stream.

As a club we have competed overseas with distinction. The edge we have on other beaches is that we have a lifeguard team who have been working together on the one beach for

four years. We also have an intimate knowledge of our beach in all conditions as we showed in the search for the body of Paul Hanrahan this summer.

Following representations from the fishing and boating communities, we decided to set up the Inshore Rescue Service. What is most annoying is that we have just started to fund raise in the Dungarvan area and we then find a report in your paper which, to the uninformed, would seem to contradict our circulars.

I do hope you can help us with our campaign for funds to set up the Inshore Rescue Service which is badly needed in the centre of the county.

Canon Power, a native of Knockaun, the Nire, was ordained to the priesthood in 1930 for the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore. In 1979 Canon Power came to Lismore from Cappoquin, where he had served as Parish Priest for seven years. He had been named a Canon in 1978. After ten years in Lismore, Canon Power retired in 1989.

His remains which arrived at St. Carthage's Church, Lismore on Friday afternoon were received by Bishop Russell assisted by local and visiting clergy. Following concelebrated Requiem Mass on Saturday, at which Bishop Russell was the Principal Celebrant, the burial took place in the church grounds. Canon Power was laid to rest next to his immediate predecessor, Fr. Thomas Murphy.

Canon Power is survived by his brother Sonny, nephews, nieces, grandnephews, grandnieces and many other relatives.

SR. MAUREEN GLENDON, PRESENTATION CONVENT, LISMORE

Diocese Joins In Celebrating Bishop's Silver Jubilee

The Cathedral of the Holy Trinity in Waterford was packed by an overflowing congregation last Sunday afternoon as the entire diocese of Waterford and Lismore joined in the celebrations to mark the silver jubilee of the episcopal ordination of Most Rev. Dr. Michael Russell.

The Mass of Thanksgiving, concelebrated by Dr. Russell, Monsignor John Shine and Very Rev. Richard Coady, was attended by a number of bishops from neighbouring dioceses including Most Rev. Dr. Dermot Clifford, Archbishop of Cashel, Dr. Laurence Forristal, Bishop of Ossory, and the retired Archbishop of Cashel, Dr. Thomas Morris. The congregation which thronged the spacious edifice included priests, religious and people from every parish in the diocese who had come to pay tribute to the man who when he was first consecrated in 1965 adopted as his motto: Humilitate et Lenitate (Humility and Meekness) and who was then the youngest bishop in the country.

A native of Co. Tipperary, Dr. Russell was born in Loughmore in 1920, the second eldest of a farming family of ten and he grew

up in Holy Cross in the shadow of the Abbey. Following his ordination to the priesthood he was appointed a Professor to St. Patrick's Seminary in Thurles where he remained for 17 years and during which he was appointed Secretary to the Bishop.

Following his nomination as Bishop of Waterford & Lismore in November, 1965, Dr. Russell went to Rome where he attended the concluding session of the Second Vatican Council and now with Archbishop Derek Warlock of Liverpool, he is the only surviving bishop who attended the historic Council.

Throughout his 25 years as Bishop of the Diocese, Dr. Russell has endeared himself to the people of the City and County of Waterford who all now join in wishing him continued good health to enable him to continue his outstanding work into the future.

Deciding on a new hedge

OCTOBER is the "break for the border" - time to sort out the hedges that form a pleasant screen to your property or divide up parts of the garden.

Existing hedges need to be carefully tidied at their base, with the raking out and brushing up of any debris that could harbour garden pests through the winter.

If the hedge is deciduous you can also put these margins of the garden to good use by planting snowdrop bulbs or primroses at the base for spring colour.

But if you have a new hedge in mind then you should be planting now or at least planning and preparing the ground for later on in the colder months.

Evergreens are best planted now and it is always worth spending time preparing a hedge site,



because the individual plants making up this feature will be there for many years and need to be healthy and well-established to give a uniform look.

You also want the hedge to establish as quickly as possible, so dig the soil well and work in plenty of garden compost or natural manure free from weeds.

Ask yourself a few simple questions before choosing a variety:

*How fast do you want it to grow?

*What height do you want the hedge to grow to?

*How much care and attention can you give it?

*Do you want it to deter intruders as well as look nice?

If speed is what you want then the hybrid Leyland Cypress is ideal, but it needs trimming once established so that it doesn't become leggy. It is also in danger of becoming too common - the fate suffered by privet.

Privet became so unfashionable that it is now worth considering for a greater rarity, backed by attributes that once made it a favourite: fast-growth, easy care, cheapness and potential density. Several variegated types also make it potentially more attractive.

Holly is a slow grower but is an all too obvious deter-

rent to intruders. It also makes an attractive and, at Christmas-time, festive contribution to the garden as well as being able to resist the attacks of any grazing animals you may have next door.

Hawthorn is another excellent deterrent but can become straggly and you may prefer to plant a hedge variety of rose such as Rosa Rugosa, which offers a visual bonus with its single flowers and hips.

Yew has made a comeback, especially thanks to some attractive variegated types, and will slowly grow into a dense hedge.

But there really are too many varieties to mention here so check the garden centres for others and carefully read the information charts which usually accompany the displays of each variety. There should be something to suit your garden.

Sausage Salad

Ingredients:

1 eating apple
1/2 cucumber, diced
Dressing:
2 x 15ml (2 tablespoons) low fat natural yogurt
2 x 15ml (2 tablespoons) apple juice
Method:
Mix all the ingredients together in a large bowl. Mix together the dressing ingredients and pour over the salad. Toss gently. Serve.
Serves: 4.

Honeyed Lamb Cutlets

Cooking time: About 15 minutes.
Ingredients:
8 best end of neck cutlets British lamb



Tasty treats for a late summer picnic or an extra special lunchbox.

4 x 15ml (4 tablespoons) clear honey
1 x 15ml (1 tablespoon) sunflower or sesame oil
1-2 cloves garlic, crushed
1x15ml spoon (1 tablespoon) fresh herbs, chopped
3 x 15ml (3 tablespoons) medium sherry
Salt and black pepper

Method:
Lay the cutlets in a shallow dish. Mix the remaining ingredients together in a bowl and pour over the cutlets. Cover and leave in a cool place for about six hours turning occasionally.
Grill the cutlets or barbecue, using a medium heat, for about seven minutes on each side.
Serves: 4.

Garlic Beef Rolls

Cooking time: Approximately 8-10 minutes.
Ingredients:
12 thin slices topside British

beef
2 cloves garlic, crushed
Salt and black pepper
12 spring onions, trimmed

Method:
Lay the slices of beef out flat. Spread out some of the crushed garlic on each slice and season. Place one spring onion in the centre of each and roll the beef up around it. Secure with a cocktail stick. Grill or barbecue for approximately 9-10 minutes, turning occasionally. Remove cocktail stick prior to serving.
Serve with soured cream and chive dip.
Serves: 6-8.

Crispy Baked Potato Skins with Bacon

Cooking time: Approximately 1-2 hours.
Temperature: Gas Mark 5, 190C, 375F.

Ingredients:

12 rashers British streaky bacon, grilled until crispy
4 large baking potatoes
Oil for brushing
100g (4oz) Cheddar cheese, grated

Method:

Brush the potatoes with oil and bake in a pre-heated oven for one hour or until cooked. Cut the potatoes in half and scoop out the flesh leaving a layer next to the skin. Cut each potato into two lengthways to make "boats". Sprinkle the potato skins with the cheese and the crumbled bacon pieces. Bake for 20 minutes until crispy. Serve with a dip of soured cream and herbs.

Note: the potato skins can be grilled instead of baked.
Serves: 4.

Ham and Stilton Quiche

Cooking time: 45 minutes.
Temperature: Gas Mark 6, 200C, 400F.

Ingredients:

150g (5oz) cooked British ham
225g (8oz) shortcrust pastry
50g (2oz) blue Stilton cheese, crumbled
1/2 small green pepper, finely chopped
2 size 3 eggs
150ml (1/2 pint) milk
Salt and black pepper

Method:

Line six Yorkshire pudding tins with pastry. Prick the base with a fork, line each case with greaseproof paper and cover the base with baking beans. Bake for 15 minutes.

Mix together the ham, Stilton and green pepper. Divide equally between the pastry cases. Mix the eggs, milk and seasoning together and pour into the pastry cases. Reduce the heat and bake at Gas Mark 4, 180C, 350F for 30 minutes until firm and golden brown.

Serve hot or cold with French bread and green salad.

Note: This recipe can be made as one large quiche by using an 18cm (7 inch) flan ring.

Encouraging Tidy Towns Report For Dungarvan

Dungarvan scored 161 marks out of a maximum of 250 in this year's Tidy Towns Competition. This was 5 more than the total scored in last year's competition and when the Report of the Adjudicators was considered by members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their October monthly meeting, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley stated that the encouragement which should be taken from the report was that "we are raising our standards annually." Mr. Hurley added that the marked improvement in this year's effort resulted in the town scoring 161 marks.

Cllr. D. Goode said that the town now really looks very good and much of the credit for that had to go to Mr. Hurley who had taken a deep personal interest in this.

Principal points in the report stated:

★ Dungarvan (including Abbeyside) has been presented to a high standard again this year and features that are particularly commendable are, the colourful hanging baskets seen from their own separate stands and the trees new and not so new.

★ The standard of tidiness is good generally and the town was almost flyposter clear.

★ The Fire Station is nicely painted now; Arus Brugha looks well as does the Old Market Hall, most churches and schools, ACC (just painted), the Garda Station and the very well finished off and presented infill houses at Rice Street. Industrial premises, e.g. Waterford Foods and others

are very well presented with neat premises and plenty of fresh paint and shrubs. It is good to see many traditional shop fronts and good buildings around the main Square.

★ Your new work is a very good enhancement to Dungarvan Church. It is always good to see additional flowerbeds, shrub and tree planting and new developments in Dungarvan are commendable.

★ The standard of approach roads is very high and the trees along the Cork/Waterford road in particular are beginning to look really well.

★ In the presentation of residential areas the standard is good. It is thought that some town houses although well presented, look a bit gloomy and need a little "brightening up" colourwise. The odd gate or boundary wall needed a facelift but the standard is good in Dungarvan.

The report in general was noted with satisfaction.

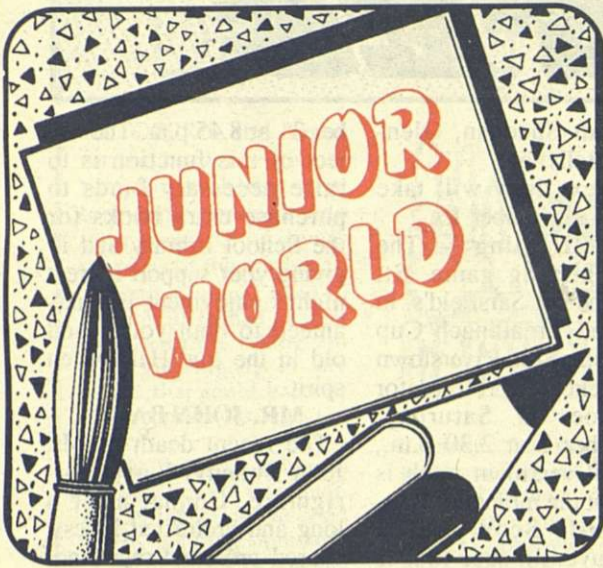

The full story of the Mutiny on the Bounty

THE famous Mutiny on the Bounty was a real event which took place a little over 200 years ago. Captain William Bligh was the man in charge of the Bounty, a ship with a crew of 44 which set sail for the island of Tahiti in the Pacific Ocean.

Their mission was to collect cuttings of bread-fruit trees from the island, which had only recently been discovered by Captain Cook, and take them to the West Indies. The idea was that these cuttings might take root and help provide food for the slaves on the sugar plantations.

However, life aboard the Bounty was far from easy.

It was a small ship, which meant cramped conditions for the crew, and Bligh was a strict and bad-tempered captain.

The ship reached Tahiti without mishap, and the crew enjoyed their stay there which lasted several months.

Not long after they had set sail again for the West

Indies, however, the crew showed their discontent. On 28 April 1789, the captain's second in command, Fletcher Christian, led the mutiny as the crew took control of the ship by force.

Captain Bligh and a few loyal men were put to sea in an open boat without a chart (the naval term for a map) or food.

Even so Bligh, and 18 men sailed more than 3,000 miles to another island, so proving the high standard of seamanship in the British navy. Once back in England he reported the mutiny.

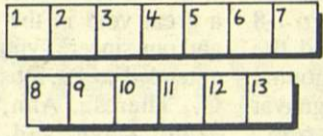
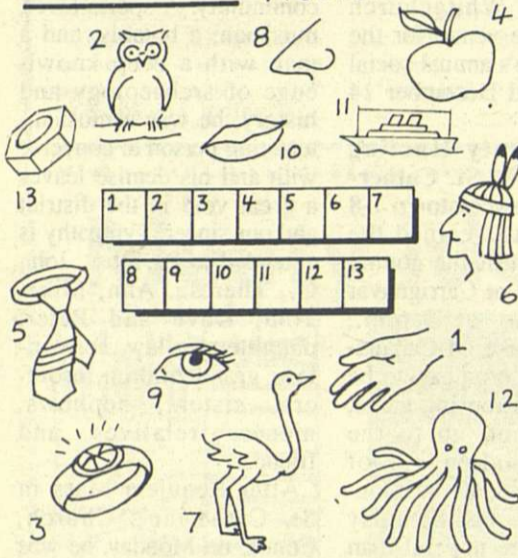
Meanwhile, Christian and his men had returned to Tahiti where some settled while others, including the chief mutineer, sailed on to the Pitcairn islands. Some of their descendants still live there today.

However, those who remained on Tahiti were later captured and returned to England for trial, with three of them being hanged.

Captain Bligh stayed in the navy and rose to the rank of vice admiral.

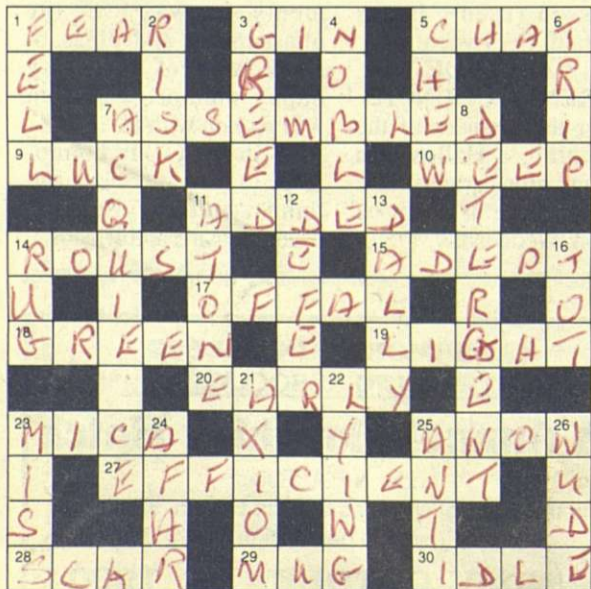

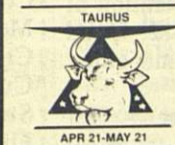

Over 1,000 Supporters Join In Deputy Fahey's 25th Celebrations

Over 1,000 supporters from all over Waterford with a surprisingly large influx from East Cork and South Tipperary converged on the Park Hotel, Dungarvan last Friday night to join in the celebrations to mark Deputy Jackie Fahey's 25 years as a member of Dail Eireann.

However Guest of Honour at the Silver Jubilee celebrations, An Taoiseach, Mr. C. J. Haughey, had first to go to Lawlor's Hotel where he met a big number of the top ranking members of the Fianna Fail organisation in the constituency who had declared their intention to boycott the Fahey function.

After a one-hour meeting with deputies, senators, councillors and Fianna Fail Party officers, Mr. Haughey said that he was aware of the strife in the party organisation in the constituency. While he would have liked if there had not been a boycott of the function by senior party members, the Taoiseach likened the situation to a family disagreement which can happen from time to time in a very large family such as Fianna Fail was.

In Lawlor's Hotel also, Mr. Haughey had a brief meeting with James and Patricia Ellis, the parents of Dessie Ellis, the man from Finglas, Co. Dublin who is at present on hunger strike in Portlaoise Prison protesting against his extradition to Britain to face trial on explosive charges. They urged the Taoiseach to do everything possible to prevent the transfer of their son to Britain. Later Mr. Ellis stated that during the meeting Mr. Haughey had asked him to try and talk his son out of continuing his hunger strike which was then in its 10th day.

"Unless he is released or tried here under the Criminal Law Jurisdiction Act he will continue his hunger strike," declared Mr. Ellis while Mrs. Ellis said, "I wish that he had not gone on hunger strike but it is his wish and I respect it." Both Mr. and Mrs. Ellis then said that they were very happy that the Taoiseach had agreed to meet them.

CHEERING CROWD

Meanwhile a group of Anti-extradition supporters carrying protest placards demanding that Dessie Ellis be not extradited picketed the entrance to the Park Hotel for more than an hour before Mr. Haughey arrived there to be vociferously greeted by the huge gathering. On the platform in the packed function room, the Taoiseach to the echo of the cheering supporters congratulated Deputy Fahey and said that any deputy who served 25 years in the Dail was entitled to the presence of the Taoiseach at his jubilee celebrations. Mr. Haughey added that while he did not personally try to pressure

anybody to go to the celebration function, the national headquarters of the party was concerned to have a happy family in the Waterford constituency.

Minister for Finance Albert Reynolds and Minister for the Marine John Wilson and Party Chief Whip Vincent Brady also added their congratulations and tributes to the celebrating deputy.

When the formalities concluded the Taoiseach's party left for nearby Stradbally where Mr. Haughey spent the night at the residence of his friend, Fianna Fail T.D., Dr. John O'Connell, Woodhouse.

Meanwhile the celebrations at the Park continued with unabated vigour and zest until the early hours brought what for those who were present a memorable occasion to a close.

**I.F.A. CHAIRMAN
MEETS TAOISEACH
IN DUNGARVAN**

Waterford I.F.A. Co. Chairman Mr. Gerry Murphy also met the Taoiseach Mr. Haughey in Dungarvan last Friday night and outlined the county's policy on Disadvantaged Areas. In a written submission he out-

lined the following:

Hundreds of County Waterford farm families in areas of poor land and very low incomes have been excluded from the Government's submission to Brussels on the revised Disadvantaged Areas Scheme. Waterford I.F.A. demands the establishment of an appeals mechanism to ensure that the excluded areas get fair consideration for reclassification or extension as already promised under the Joint Programme for Government.

The American attack on the Common Agricultural Policy is threatening to drive 70,000 Irish farmers off the land over the next few years. This must be resisted and farm family incomes protected. Extension of the Disadvantaged Areas Scheme to the entire country is one way of channelling income aid to farmers to ensure the continuance of Agriculture as we know it.

Young farmers and their families are being forced into a lifetime of debt and in some cases have to sell land to pay Inheritance

Tax/Gift Tax and Stamp duties. The existing threshold will have to be increased to take full account of land prices and inflation since 1974 and index linked to ensure that future movements in land prices or inflation do not erode the allowances.

The Waterford Chairman also presented Mr. Haughey with photographs of land excluded for the Disadvantaged Areas Scheme and a copy of I.F.A.'s Policy Document on the Farm Income Crisis.

A packed Lansdowne Road had a carnival atmosphere last week as records were broken and bogeys laid in the perfect start for Ireland that really sets up our November clash with England. Those who are still critical of the Irish Manager argue that the changes forced on his team selection were the main contributions to the victory. But if you believe this totally does it mean Ronnie Whelan and Paul McGrath should stay out of the side?

My reaction to Ireland's display was, it proved two things. Firstly, that any team must have strength in depth and this was proved by the displays of Denis Irwin and particularly John Sheridan, with Chriss Hughton's solid steady game proving what a good professional the Spurs man is.

The second is that when you turn chances into goals as Ireland and John Aldridge did, there may be a tendency to miss some of the worrying aspects of Ireland's performance.

That particular final was played before a very big crowd at the Shandon field and by all accounts it was a big disappointment as the standard never reached the expected heights. In the report of the game there were complaints about the poor sideline control which made it impossible for some spectators to see the match in comfort, the very poor quality ball with which the game and the unsporting behaviour which marred the game at times, particularly near the finish.

A 30 yards free kick which was converted by Percy Kirwan for Stradbally was the only score recorded by the reigning five-in-a-row champions, who trailed by 1-2 to 0-1 at half-time. Four minutes from the start of the game Willie Hosey set up a Dungarvan attack from which Paul Lannon goaled to give the Old Boro team a lead

which they never relinquished. A foul on Christy Moylan won a free for Dungarvan and Hosey converted midway through the second half and this was the only score of the second period.

WEEK-END PROGRAMME

Exciting Senior Football Co. Final Between Stradbally And Dungarvan In Prospect

Waterford Take On All-Ireland Champions Cork In The N.H.L.

The visit of All-Ireland hurling champions, Cork, to play us in round 2 of the league is almost completely overshadowed by our senior football county final between the Blues and the Reds and it is a fair measure of public interest in this very intriguing county final to find that such a high profile hurling league match, is relegated to second place on our week-end programme.

To write that this final has captured the imagination of the football people throughout the county, is understating the extraordinary interest which the fixture seems to have generated. Although it is all of 45 years since the clubs clashed in a senior football final, their recent meetings in the league rounds over the past couple of seasons have given a foretaste of the kind of football that the clubs can produce in a final and if this latest clash does not produce one of the best exhibitions to have been seen for many a year, then a near-record crowd at Walsh Park on Sunday, will come back very disappointed.

Stradbally came through the league section undefeated while Dungarvan's only defeat in the same section was against Sunday's opponents, Stradbally and in that hectic clash at Leamybrien, one could justifiably claim that there was a distinct element of luck on the side of the winners.

A similar claim was made last year when Dungarvan

came off second best on a 1-9 to 1-8 scoreline in a very good contest at Fraher Field. What part luck will play in next Sunday's final is a matter of conjecture and I have seldom found genuine football people so divided in their views about the outcome.

Dungarvan are convinced that they are good enough to take this title as having shown positive improvement in every game and now having reached their peak, they have every good reason for feeling so confident.

Stradbally's greater county final experience, allied to the fact that they have twice beaten Dungarvan in their last two meetings, are their reason for feeling confident of being good enough to take their tenth senior football title. It is certainly one of the most intriguing situations that has faced forecasters for a long while. All the Crystal Balls seem to have gone on the blink on this one and with most people on the outside, the result seems to have become a guessing game.

I believe that if one is to disregard tradition, past record of the clubs and other eventualities which are deemed to be factors in this matter and base one's judgement of the relative merits of the participants in this final, we will have to agree that either team can win this final on Sunday next.

Some are making the case that here and there on their lineout Stradbally have players who are capable of giving match-winning performances and that the likes of Eoin O'Brien, who kicked over eight points against Kilrossanty in the semi-final, Fintan O'Brien, their captain, Tom Gough, who is one of their most improved players on their present side, goalkeeper

Kieran Heffernan, Paul Mullaney, whose outstanding display against Kilrossanty in the semi-final won him new admirers, full-back Conor O'Brien, experienced defender David Kirwan, all of whom have found favour with the county selectors and others on their team, must give them a favourites chance.

Others have submitted that Dungarvan are a more developed side in the true sense of the word — more developed as a functioning unit — in that they have come through all the way together from the bottom through underage grades — they have won so many finals together. A look at their lineout for the final, which is published below will help readers to recall games in which all of them have played an outstanding part in some game or another. Dermot Callaghan who is their only one currently playing with the

county team, and who played a leading role all through was their only forward not to score in their hectic semi-final against Saviours and it speaks volumes for the quality of the team that the other five did. It is also a factor, (maybe), that while Dungarvan have great defenders in Darrell Donnelly, Eddie Burke, Martin Houlihan, etc., two very capable midfield partners in Derek Lyons and Tony Hamilton, they also have a forward section with every one of them capable of taking their scores, and it is an odds on chance that most of these, including Morrie, Pepe and John Ferncombe, Denis McGrath, Ger Beresford as well as Dermot Callaghan, will have their names on the list of scorers in the final.

On semi-final Sunday, both played very well and those who saw both certainly won't find it easy to make a choice as on the occasion, both Stradbally (who kicked 20 wides and still won against Kilrossanty) played very well and Dungarvan showed their

true character in overcoming their early adversity in their very fast moving game against St. Saviours.

If Stradbally can counter the fast moving and precision passing of this younger and very eager Dungarvan team, they may just about get their tenth title, but somehow, I have my doubts!!

REFEREE

Tomas O Meachair, An Rinn, is the referee for the final and I'm sure both clubs will have considered it important enough to study his style of refereeing. It can be an important factor. Tom is not inclined to let fouls go unpunished and perhaps underplays the so called advantage rule. Very often when the advantage rule is overplayed, players become careless (having sized up the referee) and get away with committing fouls, that perhaps should be punished. The clubs might do well to note that in the Stradbally/Kilrossanty semi-final he awarded a total of 49 frees.

Dungarvan Once Again On The March

Dungarvan is one of the traditional homes of football in the Deise County with a history dating back to the infancy of the G.A.A. One of the oldest units in the county, when at the turn of this century football was so popular in the locality and good footballers so plentiful that two teams Erin's Hopes and Shandon Rovers had to be formed. It would be a long story indeed to relate the victories and deeds of the men and women who down the years have kept up this tradition. The story would tell of 20 county senior football titles, six in hurling and a considerable amount in the other grades.

Relating back to the dawn of this century when the legendary Dan Fraher and Paddy Sheehan were doing trojan work to establish Dungarvan as a stronghold in gaelic pastimes, it was during this era that the great games between the Hopes and Rovers took place, football was now on a firm basis in the county. It was the famed Erin's Hopes that represented the county in its one and only All-Ireland football final appearance. Although defeat

was their lot on Sunday, April 8, 1990 in Tipperary Town on the scoreline 2-8 to 0-4, this setback did not dampen the enthusiasm of the Dungarvan football men, the club continued to grow and many championship winning sides became the norm in the Old Boro.

It is a matter of regret that our last football title was captured in 1954, Sunday we intend to put things right.

After 1954 there followed a lean period when emigra-

tion took a toll of the club's resources. The once famous Blues took a back seat in Waterford football affairs, many observers posed the dreaded question, would ever a championship winning side ever again grace the Old Boro. Like the phoenix, Dungarvan rose from the ashes, a period of reorganisation was heralded, victory in the Avonmore League of '59 brought on stream a determined bunch of youngsters whose enthusiasm and hunger for success gained two minor titles

in both codes in 1961. The '70's saw further success but really the 80's saw Dungarvan in it's golden era. At underage all titles were won in decisive fashion by many of today's footballers, it was during these years that the Dungarvan team of 1990 was born. Behind the litany of titles lies a tale of dedication and commitment, of nights of hard slog and training and games of valuable time and effort gratefully given, of many precious gallons of petrol willingly sacrificed, of frustration and anxiety endured but always at the end the price that made the effort worthwhile. Theirs is a story of merited success and like the image of spring following winter with such a pool of emerging talent, Dungarvan's rise gained further momentum.

Today our men take their rightful place on centre stage, the day of Waterford's Blue Riband of football.

Our great battles with Stradbally in the past live fresh in our memory, lady luck played no small part in our defeats in recent past, victories were turned into heart-breaking defeats as the dying embers of battle settled. Sunday we mount another onslaught, there is steely determination to set the records straight, just like Arkle he needed the challenge of Mill House, Tunney needed Dempsey, we need the razor keen rivalry of Sraidbaile to bring the best out of us, we are ready, the Old Boro is on the march, another glorious chapter to the epic tale of Dungarban in Deise Gael-dom is about to be written.

Men, let the feats of artistry of Goode, Mountain, Greaney, Barron, Cunningham, Kiely and the great Christy Moylan drive and motivate us to reach our Everest this coming Sunday evening.

STRADBALLY'S RECORD

Although Stradbally are on record for having played in the Waterford football championship as early as 1887, it was not until 1918 that they became properly organised as a club. It wasn't until 1932 that the first county title came to their village as when having beaten Ardmore in a replay of the junior final they went on to beat Rathgormack in the county final.

In 1939 they reached the senior county final and played a draw with Kilrossanty and lost the replay. With young players like Kevin Phelan, Tom Veale, John Curran, Dick McKeon, Danny Morrissey, Paddy Skehan and others who had been prominent minors with

the club in the previous three years, the panel trained under the late Very Rev. Fr. Cummins, who tuned them up for an assault on Kilrossanty's title.

1940 when Hitler's armies marched through Europe, Stradbally began their march into history by beat-

ing Kilrossanty in the county final. That was their first big success and it was followed in 1941 with a win over Dungarvan in that county final. Having reached the county final of 1942 they scored over Kilrossanty and repeated this against the same club in

1943. Dungarvan failed to put a stop to them in 1944 and Stradbally gained their fifth title in a row and an honoured place in history.

As I have written elsewhere, Dungarvan gained sweet revenge when they overpowered Stradbally in the 1945 county final at Dungarvan.

After ten lean years, Stradbally reached yet another county final, but were beaten by Mount Sion. A further ten or twelve season went by before they were given mention as serious contenders, but the breakthrough came in '72 when they beat Kill in the final to take their sixth title.

Defeat by a single point by Ardmore in the '77 final, was a big disappointment. The senior title was regained in 1980 when they defeated Dunhill by 2-10 to 3-4 in that final. This was one their greatest seasons ever in football as having beaten the Tipperary Galtee Rovers, and Kerry's Gneevenaguilla in the Munster Club Championship, they were beaten in the provincial final by the eventual All-Ireland champions, St. Finbarr's.

They defeated Clashmore in the 1982 final at Walsh Park and they took their ninth title when accounting for the Nire in the 1987 final at Dungarvan.
