Two Vacancies On Co. Council Must Be Filled

Due to the regretted deaths of two sitting members of Waterford County Council in recent weeks there are now two vacancies on the 23-member Council to be filled by co-options.

The vacancies have arisen through the death a month ago of Cllr. James Aidan Walsh (F.G.) of Springfield, Cappoquin, which occurred after a long illness and of Cllr. Paddy Cahill (F.F.), Adamstown, Kilmeaden, which took place most unexpectedly last week.

We understand that the vacancies will be filled

without any contests in accordance with an agreement between the political parties concerned. Following Cllr. Walsh's death the Fianna Fail members on the council decided not to contest the co-option when it arose. Now, the Fine Gael members similarly say they will not oppose the Fianna Fail nominee to replace the late Cllr. Cahill.

The two Labour Party members on the Council, Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne and Deputy Brian O'Shea have both signified that they will support the respective nominees put forward by each of the parties.

In the event it looks most likely that the Fianna Fail nominee to succeed Cllr. Cahill in the Tramore Electoral Area will be Geoffrey Power, Dunmore East.

LISMORE ELECTORAL AREA

In the Lismore Electoral Area, the Fine Gael District Executive have, we understand, decided that the late Cllr. Walsh's vacancy should be filled by a nominee from the Cappoquin area. As matters stand, a number of likely persons interested in the nomination have been mentioned including Jim Wall and Nora Flynn but the general feeling is that a member of the Walsh or O'Connor families would be the most acceptable choice as the seat has been filled by a member of the Walsh family for over 40 years.

There are still some weeks to go to enable the party to come to a firm decision as to who the nominee will be as the vacancies will most likely be filled at the December monthly meeting of the County Council due to take place on Monday, December 10.

Dr. Cahal Daly To Succeed Late Cardinal O Fiaich

The appointment by Pope John Paul II of Dr. Cahal Brendan Daly as Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All-Ireland was formally announced in Dublin yesterday (Tuesday).

The appointment of the 73-years-old Bishop of Down and Connor has ended months of speculation as to who would be appointed by the Holy See to succeed the late Cardinal Tomas O Fiaich who died of a heart attack last May while on pilgrimage to Lourdes, as the spiritual leader of Ireland's 3.7 million Catholics.

A noted scholar, Dr. Daly becomes the 114th successor of St. Patrick in the Primatial See of Armagh.

At a press conference in Belfast on Tuesday afternoon, the Archbishop - Elect said he was "deeply honoured" at being chosen by the Pope, and also "humbled" by the enormous responsibilities he must now assume.

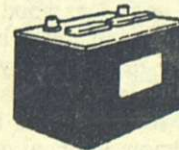

THE UNSUNG HEROES

Readings for 32nd Sunday in Old Testament: The first from Wisdom tells us that God is generous with His gifts; and that He'll give wisdom to those who seek it. Hence, it is up to ourselves.

The second portrays Paul consoling the bereaved, and telling them that, unlike others, they had the consolation of knowing their loved ones had gone to God.

The Gospel reminds us that we must always be ready and prepared to meet our God. We do not know the day or the hour when the Lord will call us. There's a warning here. God's offer of glory is open for all, but yet! whilst we do grumble about the inequalities of life, we do not seem to be too concerned about achieving heavenly greatness. I trust you'll bear with me if I do not expand further on these points as I wish to relate a story that is seasonal and is of interest to you all.

Around this time of year we celebrate all the unsung heroes in Heaven. When I look back and recall the people and the priests of yesterday, I feel small. In my book they were giants. Of course, they were just ordinary folk, but my! they worked hard, they loved their homes and they were faithful servants of the Lord. God was the centre of their lives. He was the one who mattered. You see, things were hard in those days. Work was hard, scarce and poorly paid. Yes, many were poor, badly off and hungry. Believe me, we do not know we are alive. Those good people are now long gone. No one talks about them. They are not even memories. Life is like that! But, I know and I believe in my heart that these good people live in Heaven. In my own experience I've seen many make their last journey. I know the Lord was with them as they took those last few steps into eternity. They went straight into the arms of God, and He is very near. It is good and well that we pray for our dead, but, somehow, we mostly forget to pray to them for help. You all know of cases where families were robbed of the bread-winner; and you know too how other gates seem to open for the bereft. We fail to consider the power of our loved ones in Heaven.

STRANGER THAN FICTION

My story concerns a Dungarvan family. There are no direct descendants. The Stewart family were evicted from lands not far from the town about 140 years ago. They suffered the same fate when they first moved into the town. And, after being helped by friends, they managed to get a house in Mitchell Street. They set up a tailoring business, and managed in those bleak days to keep

bread on the table. I need not tell you in that kind of business, it was a case of Winter and Summer, but Frank and Jimmey, helped by their sister Kate, worked hard. The three of them were never absent from the 7.30 a.m. daily Mass. After Mass the two brothers would walk down to the seafront, walk along by the Quay and home by which time Katie would have the tea on the table. It was then back to work. They had only to cross the road to the Chapel, and that's where they went to close their day. Lots of others followed a like routine. They were the salt of the earth.

Time passed. Frank died. Jimmey and Katie maintained the same regular way of life. People noticed Katie always spent her last 20 minutes or so kneeling at the remains of whoever might be resting in the Church. People do get curious. Soon others were joining her in saying the rosary. Well we know that age does not stand still. However, they both did their best to keep the old routine. Eventually, Katie took to the bed, but like the good and gentle soul she was, she never grumbled. The Doctor gave no hope. It was well into the night: Jimmey was saying the rosary with her when she slipped quietly into the arms of the Lord.

Jimmey placed the lighting candle on the table, and went to call one of the neighbours, who'd promised to get Katie ready. When he told her Katie was dead, she said "I'll be down in 5 minutes." He hurried back, and when he entered the hall, he heard the prayers for the dead being recited upstairs, and concluded, as he'd left the door ajar, that some neighbours had come in. When he opened the bed-room door, he saw the candle flicker, but there was no one there. As he knelt down his heart was breaking, and he cried like a child. She was his nearest and dearest. When the neighbour arrived her remarks were: "She is a picture of peace. She is a saint."

Jimmey has long since departed. I knew him well. He was a kind man, a good man and I could not imagine him seeking the limelight for himself or his sister. He did mention the matter to one person only, and I personally never doubted the truth of his story. Naturally, he was puzzled, which was why he mentioned the matter at all. It would seem as if all the good souls, whom she so greatly honoured, had come to take her home. Yes, truth is often stranger than fiction.

Folk Memories Of Bygone Times

In the school year 1937/38 the children in over 5,000 schools in Ireland were recruited as folklore collectors by the Irish Folklore Commission. Their work was to supplement that of the professional collectors who were, at the time, furiously gathering stories and local traditions from all parts of the land. The Commission was concerned to document as much as possible of the past through people's memories of it, but realised that many of the older people would have passed away before the collectors got around to them.

It is surprising how far memories can go back. Five generations of a family with average longevity would bring one back to early in the nineteenth century, that began with the Act of Union. My own grandmother often regaled us with stories heard from her grandparents about Catholic Emancipation, the Famine, and the Monster Repeal Meetings of Daniel O'Connell. The Repeal Meeting in Dungarvan in the 1830's was so massive that all over Ireland it became a saying about any loud and enthusiastic gathering that it was enough to "make Dungarvan shake."

The school children of West Waterford proved adept at the collecting job and accounts of historical figures, local traditions and superstitions, cures, games, ballads, etc., poured in. These were written up by the teachers in charge and are now part of the School Manuscript Collection in the Department of Folklore at University College, Dublin. Particularly enthusiastic and hardworking were the 5th and 6th classes of the National Schools in the combined parishes of Affane/Modeligo, working under the direction of their teacher, Brid Bean Uí Chonaill.

The following are a few of the more interesting stories unearthed and preserved by those children:

It is considered by historians that Sir. Walter Raleigh

was the first to introduce potatoes and tobacco to Europe and that he brought them into Youghal. In Affane, tradition has it that he introduced cherry trees to his estates and cultivated large scale apple orchards in his lands along the river. In the 1860's large flagstones were unearthed at many sites, placed, they were thought, to prevent the roots of the apple trees penetrating too deep into the soil.

Among those first Elizabethan planters was Valentine Greatrakes who lived in Norrisland Castle. He was famous as a hypnotic healer and was given credit for having cured James VI of the "Kings Evil" a malignant glandular disease. The Greatrakes must have become "more Irish than the Irish themselves" as we find that his grandson had his lands confiscated for his part in the rebellion of 1641. These estates were given to a Cromwellian soldier named John Nettle.

CIDER MAKING

The settlers, many of whom came from the West country of England, introduced the art of cider making to the district, a production soon taken up by the local people. In 1880 there were over 30 small cider manufacturing businesses in the Valley and Blackwater Cider was being exported as far away as India and China. At the time of the folklore survey only one cider works re-

mained.

Another famous (or infamous) resident of this part of the country was "Petticoat Loose", a young lady, no better than she should be. It was said that she came originally from Dungarvan and was overfond of dancing and drinking. Her wild lifestyle brought down on this latter day Madonna, the condemnation of the clergy and an untimely death from exposure, while under the influence of the demon rum (or cider).

But strongest in the folk memories of the local people were the eccentricities and cruel behaviour of the landlord of Dromana Castle. It was related that he caught two sons of a poor widow snoring rabbits in the forest. When their mother came to look for them, she found her boys hanged from a tree in front of the "Great House." It was said that blood marks appeared on the walls of this house and that no cleaning could wipe them out.

HERBAL CURES

On a more cheerful and happier note the local people had many traditions about curative properties of many of the local herbs and plants. The camomile or Mullen plant was considered effective against T.B., the dandelion was known for its beneficial effect on the blood and the 'cois dubh' was a local remedy for stomach disorders and headaches.

Medal And Coin Exhibition At Dungarvan Museum

The latest exhibition running at Dungarvan Museum is a fascinating collection of medals, emblems, coins and commemorative medallions. Several medals are of local interest and some have a brief account of their history.

Among the medals of local interest is — A beautiful collection of medals which once belonged to Sgt. M. Healy, who was a son of Mrs. Ann Healy of Ballinamuck. He was killed in 1917 in a brave attempt to save his colleagues from death.

Another well presented group of medals belonged to father and son Gunner John Donovan and Danny Donovan. These include Boer War medals, Transvaal Orange Free State, Cape Colony, Campaign Star, 1914 war medals etc.

There are three medals awarded to John F. Mansfield of Old Parish, among them is the unique Purple Heart. Also in the collection is a Boer War medal with 3 clasps awarded to

Thomas Burke, born in Dungarvan on June 17, 1872. Does anyone have details about this man?

There is an interesting group of German War medals, these include War Merit Cross Kukz, Cross of Honour awarded to German mothers, Iron Cross, Luftwaffe Battle Badge, etc.

Items of Maritime interest include a medal presented by King George V to Mr. John O'Brien of Ardmore for his part in the rescue of the ship Teaser, wrecked at Ardmore in 1911.

Other fascinating medals on display include a Distinguished Service Order Medal, Belgium Ambulance Medal 1914-1916, a magnificent "Order of the Bath" dated 1926, Farrier Medals, Cap Badges, etc.

Another section of the exhibition includes commemorative medallions, sporting medals, show medals, including Dungarvan Show 1927.

A collection of coins dating from 1566 to the present, indeed many more items too numerous to list here.

Major Quarrying Operation Will Provide 100 Jobs In Old Parish

A major quarrying operation to be initiated by the Irish Canadian exploration company, Cobh Resources plc will, as briefly announced in last week's "Leader," provide up to 100 jobs in the Old Parish area near Mine Head over the next three years.

In a statement announcing the project, Mr. Brian P. Connor, Cobh Managing Director stated that a nationwide investigation to locate suitable stone carried out by them resulted in the discovery of the Mine Head deposit which is suitable for the production of high grade, skid resistant road surface aggregate and which they plan to quarry for both the home market and for export to the UK and other European markets.

This deposit has large reserves, a coastal location and sufficient depth of water immediately offshore to allow for the construction of a jetty for bulk carriers so that the material can be cheaply transported around the Irish coast and to the overseas markets.

Mr. Connor's statement added that the jobs to be provided would be permanent and mainly for skilled and semi-skilled machine operatives of which there is a pool of such workers in

the area. The deal involved the acquisition of some 500 acres of land in the area and represents the biggest voluntary land purchasing deal ever carried out in the south east of the country. The land purchases were carried out by the Waterford City Auctioneering firm of Purcell Properties acting on behalf of Cobh.

The project will ultimately mean that £1 million in salaries and wages will be injected into the Old Parish area annually and will result in considerable spin-off for other business in the district.

Preliminary reserve estimates suggest that the quarry will have a lifespan reaching into the middle of the next century. Cobh Resources are now about to begin a detailed site investigation, both onshore and offshore, to allow for the design of the quarry and to make available the necessary details for the submission of a planning application to Waterford Co. Council. Pending the necessary planning application, Cobh would hope to begin construction of the plant by the end of 1992 and to be in production within the following 12 months.

DEVELOPMENT OF PROJECT

The initial phase of the operation will involve: 1) Construction of jetty; 2) development of initial quarry face and 3) construction of crushing and screening plants.

Overall the type of activi-

ty that will be carried out at Mine head will be straight forward quarrying operations to include removal and storage of overburden; excavation of rockface and transport of broken rock to crusher; mechanical crushing, screening and washing of broken rock to produce various size aggregates and stockpiling of aggregates and transport to customers,

the bulk of it by sea.

Mr. Connor then said: "This development will provide a much needed boost for local employment with up to 100 people being employed on a permanent basis once the quarry operation commences and Cobh intends to take on up to 30 people at various stages from now until the plant goes into production."

NEW HOME CARE

Last Thursday the Feast of All Saints saw the launching of a new Home Care Nursing Service for the terminally ill in South Tipperary with the appointment of two specialist nurses to look after the dying and their families in their own homes. The nurses are Kathleen Murray, Moyne, Co. Tipperary and Dymphna Mangan, Tooracurra, Ballymacarbry, Co. Waterford.

The service will provide free medical and nursing aid to control pain and symptoms for the terminally ill. In addition it will provide comfort and reassurance, not only to the family, but also to the patient, giving the patient the opportunity to live out his last days in the familiar surroundings of his own home among family and friends. It will allow the patient to die with dignity in peace and serenity.

The team consists of two highly qualified nurses. Nurse Murray completed her general nursing at St. Vincent's Hospital, Elm Park, Dublin, followed by Midwifery in Aberdeen, Scotland, and oncology at the Royal Marsden Hospital, London and she spent eight years at Our Lady's Hospice, Harold's Cross, Dublin and she has worked for the past two years with the Carlow/Kilkenny Hospice team.

Nurse Dymphna Mangan completed her general training at King Edward Memorial Hospital, Ealing, London, followed by Midwifery at Glasgow and Fulham, London. She did her Public Health Training in Cork and she completed her hospice training in Milford House, Limerick and Harold's Cross and recently with the Carlow/Kilkenny team.

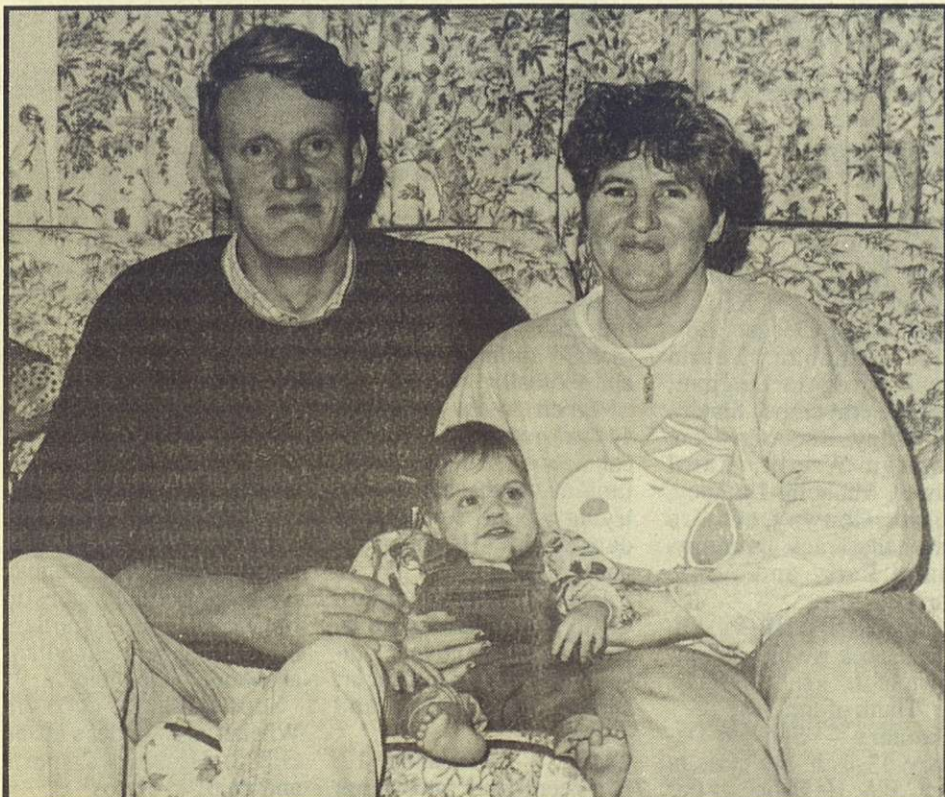

In the past couple of weeks we have had all sorts of accusations thrown at each of the three candidates standing for election and in the long run it all means that because of the system that prevails under the Constitution it is, unfortunately, the political parties that control the position.

Most of us have had it up to our gills as night after night and day after day we have had it on radio, television and in our daily papers.

The count will commence on Thursday and a final result is expected to be announced on Friday. Then it will be all over and the hypocrisy which has been such a rampant feature of the election will come to an end and thank goodness for that.

Our only comment on the situation is that all politicians must think that the plain people of Ireland are fools and morons who will swallow so much tripe! They have another think coming to them!!

We wish all the travellers a safe and pleasant journey and hope they will experience a happy and memorable weekend in London.

ISN'T THIS LIVING BEYOND OUR MEANS?

The recent visit to the World Summit of Children (organised by the United Nations) in New York by the Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey and seven other people who accompanied him cost £10,700, the Dail was told

last week. The information must set us all thinking and wondering how this small country of ours can afford such extravagance abroad when there is so much poverty and want at home.

But this is but small potatoes compared with the costs associated with the country's Presidency of the EC for the first six months of this year.

It has been revealed that a sum of nearly £12 million was spent directly on items associated with the Presidency, which at the time was criticised for its lavish hospitality to foreign dignitaries. Of the £12 million, security during visits by European leaders is said to have cost £3,786,000.

Other figures disclosed by the Department of Foreign Affairs show that £2.2 million was spent on wining, dining and accommodating Ministers and leaders from other countries during the Presidency and that a further £2.4 million was spent on what were loosely termed "travel expenses."

Opposition members in the Dail are set to raise a major row about this stunning £12 million bill for the six months EC Presidency. The Taoiseach has already been attacked for his "monarch" type extravagance in face of cuts in social spending and growing hospital waiting lists and certainly when one recalls the grandeur which surrounded many of the lavish receptions which took place during the period it begs the question as to whether we really went over the top in trying to impress our wealthy European neighbours.

The truth of the matter is that we are a small country with a poor economy and we cannot match the wealth of Germany, France and the other major European powers. The type of spending referred to above and such other things as the purchasing of a Government jet plane with a range to fly to the U.S. at a cost of £28 million, surely points to the fact that we are living beyond our means or else that money is being spent which could be put to far better use at home.

The sooner we get rid of these delusions of grandeur the better.

GOOD NEWS FOR OLD PARISH

The announcement in last week's "Leader" with more elaborate details in this issue, of the major quarry operation to be located in

the vicinity of Mine Head, which over the next three years will provide up to 100 jobs in the Old Parish area, must indeed be very good news for the entire district.

The company involved in the project, Cobh Resources plc was formed in 1988 as a Natural Resource Development Company. Its operational branch in Ireland is Cobh Exploration Ltd and in North America the operational company is Sundial Resources Ltd, which is registered in Vancouver, British Columbia. Since its formation Cobh has been active in three areas, (a) Base Metals and Gold Exploration in Ireland (b) Industrial Minerals in Ireland and (c) Base Metals and Gold Exploration in North America.

Cobh Exploration currently holds 31 exploration licences in Ireland for both gold and base metals.

With the European Development Fund investing considerable money in Western Europe to improve the road infra-structure, vast quantities of high grade skid resistant material are being used in the construction of the roads. Cobh's nationwide survey has resulted in the discovery of the major Mine Head deposit which has been estimated to have a lifespan reaching into the middle of the next century.

One of the first parts of the Mine Head development will be the construction of a deep water jetty to facilitate bulk carriers which will be used to transport the material by sea around the Irish coast and to the overseas markets.

Cobh state that the quarry plant will be located to minimise any visual or environmental impact. The location of the plant on the quarry floor will eliminate noise pollution and modern dust suppression systems will eliminate any potential dust problem.

The transport of the finished product by sea will eliminate the potential traffic problems on the local road system and the only material transported by road would be for local consumption.

SEEKS ANCESTRAL TIES

Donald Checkett of 4116 Flora Place, St. Louis, Mo 63110, U.S.A., is seeking information about the family of his great grandmother, Johanna Moloney who was born in either Lismore or Dungarvan in June 1861

and who emigrated to the United States in the company of several cousins in 1881.

In the course of a letter received by Mr. Colum Moloney, Tournore House, Dungarvan (no relation) he declares: "My father, who is now 83 years old, tells me that he used to write letters for her to her sister named Martha or Margaret at an address similar to: Kinnafora, Lismore. Johanna Moloney's father was named Timothy

Moloney and was apparently nicknamed "Big Tim" because he was very tall. He never came to America."

And roll you from the wall."

Prepare well if you start a new lawn

By Pete Moss

CHILLIER conditions in November will help you keep on the move as you get on with the necessary preparations and tidying up required this month.

The herbaceous border will be looking rather ragged so cut back the perennials. Even the frost-resistant asters and golden rods will now be failing so add them to the compost heap.

At the same time, take well-rotted compost from the heap to fork into the herbaceous border, covering with a mulch of pulverised bark or other material to keep weeds and pests out.

Diseased

Any woody waste material from the garden, such as rose cuttings and fruit canes, is best burnt or cut up for putting out with household rubbish since it will take ages to rot.

Dispose of any diseased or blighted material in the same way or risk infecting more of the garden next year.

There is still some work that can be done to keep the lawn in condition, especially after the battering it received in the summer drought.

Repair damaged edges by cutting out and turning the damaged section to face inwards where it is more likely to regenerate. In really bad cases, lift the patches completely and replace with sections of good turf from a less visually sensitive part of the garden.

You can also lay a lawn from turf at this time but the ground needs to be well prepared and drained. Turves are also expensive and more vulnerable to frost damage, so you may prefer the cheaper option of sowing



ing a lawn next spring.

As you go about your other gardening, you should also avoid walking on the lawn as much as possible, especially when wet and after frost when the stems break down easily and take a long time to recover in the wintry conditions.

Fallen leaves and other debris are also a nuisance which, if left, will 'burn' and disfigure the lawn for a long time afterwards.

It's a good idea to give established rose bushes a light pruning now if they are straggly, but leave most of the cutting back until spring.

And that is the time to next think about planting conifers and evergreens after the autumn spree, but November is still ideal for planting deciduous trees, shrubs and hedges.

With spring in mind you should also have completed most bulb planting, with the exception of the fussy tulips which should go in early this month.

Rub away the skins to check for mould and cut away any bad sections before dusting with a recommended fungicide. Really bad cases should be put in a dustbin — they are unlikely to thrive and almost certain to spread infection. Then plant the bulbs about four inches deep and at least the same distance apart.

Perfect partners for a festive buffet Cheese makes a change

CHEESE and wine parties are great at any time of year. And at Christmas, cheese dishes make a pleasant change from the traditional turkey and cold meat platters.

Try these recipes which are ideal for a buffet party.

Cheese, Pineapple & Sweetcorn quiche

Ingredients:
100g/4oz cheese shortcrust pastry
227g/8oz can pineapple
198g/7oz sweet corn niblets
100g/4oz Farmhouse Lancashire cheese (grated)
50g/2oz fresh spring onions
1 egg (size 1 or 2)
150ml/quarter pint milk
salt and pepper
parsley and spring onions to garnish

Method:

Make shortcrust pastry in the usual way adding 50g/2oz farmhouse cheddar cheese and a pinch of cayenne pepper.

Use the pastry to line a 20cm/8in greased flan ring on a baking tray, or a flan dish. Leave in a cool place.

Reserve 50ml (2fl oz) of the pineapple juice and drain off the remainder. Chop up the pineapple, if necessary; mix in the bowl with the sweetcorn, cheese and spring onions. Beat



together the egg, milk, reserved pineapple juice and seasoning to taste. Stir into the pineapple mixture.

Pour mixture into the prepared flan case. Bake in a moderately hot oven at 200C, 400F or gas mark 6 for 25-30 minutes, or until the pastry is golden brown and the filling has set.

Serve hot or cold, garnished with parsley and spring onions.

Serves 4-6.

Edam and pepper pizza

Ingredients:

Scone base:
3oz (75g) plain flour
3 teaspoons (3x5ml spoons) baking powder
3oz (75g) wholewheat flour
1½ oz (40g) Dutch unsalted butter
milk

Topping:

1 small onion cut into rings
1 x 15oz (425g) can tomatoes



(chopped and drained)
1 teaspoon (1 x 5ml spoon) oregano
1 red and 1 green pepper (deseeded, cored and cut into rings)
6oz (175g) coarsely grated Edam cheese
Garnish:
Whole black olives (optional)

Method:

Sieve plain flour and baking powder into a bowl, stir in wholewheat flour. Rub in butter until mixture resembles dried breadcrumbs. Mix to a soft dough by adding milk until the correct consistency is achieved.

Knead lightly and roll out to approximately an 8 inch (20cm) circle. Lift onto a greased baking sheet.

Mix together onion, tomatoes, oregano and seasoning. Cook over a gentle heat until well reduced. Cool and spread over the pizza base.

Place the pepper rings on top and sprinkle over with grated Edam cheese. Garnish with olives.

Cook at 450F, 250C or gas mark 8 for 20 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 400F, 200C or gas mark 6 for six to ten minutes.

Serve hot with salad.

Pep up your cooking with cranberries

CRANBERRIES are excellent with turkey, but there are lots of other ways in which they can be used.

To make baked apples look and taste delicious, try stirring a tablespoon of Cranberry Orange Sauce into your usual dried fruit filling mixture.

Gammon

To make a quick but tasty sauce to pour over ice cream, sorbets or pancakes, gently melt sufficient Cranberry Redcurrant Jelly in a small pan until smooth.

If desired, stir in some orange juice or liqueur to the warmed sauce.

When grilling gammon steaks, try brushing with Cranberry Redcurrant Jelly during cooking. This gives the meat a delicious sweet and sour flavour and can be used to replace pineapple rings.

Fill jacket potatoes with diced cooked turkey, ham and grated cheese. To add an attractive garnish and give the flour a real lift, spoon a little Cranberry Orange Sauce and mincemeat to give a lovely fruity flavour.

A tablespoon of Cranberry Redcurrant Jelly stirred into cream or chicken or turkey soup will complement the flavour beautifully.

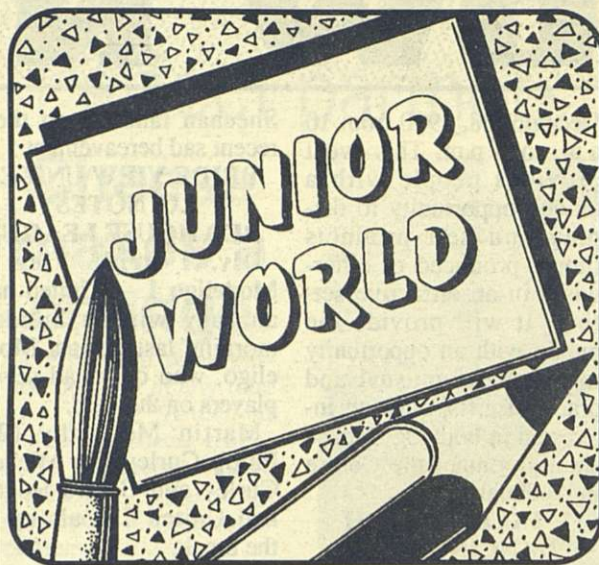

Why they built the Great Wall

One of mankind's greatest building achievements — more impressive even than the Pyramids of Egypt — was the Great Wall of China.

It is 20 to 30 feet high and 15 to 25 feet wide at the top, with towers 60 feet high every few hundred yards along it. Equipped with battlements and openings through which weapons could be fired, it was built well over 2,000 years ago to keep out the Tartars of Mongolia and probably took more than half a million men to do the work.

The wall crosses mountains and valleys as it runs from west to east right across China.

Built of brick and stone, the wall is still today in a marvellous state of preservation and attracts visitors from all over the world.

Most large cities in China were protected by similar walls to keep out invaders, yet they still failed to prevent the country being overrun by intruders who descended on the capital Peking and set up new dynasties.

Oldest republic

The oldest surviving republic in the world is San Marino, a tiny country which is situated on the Adriatic coast and is completely surrounded by Italy.

It was founded in the 4th century by Marinus, a stone cutter from Yugoslavia who had fled to this mountain retreat to escape persecution by the Roman Emperor Diocletian.

The country's capital — also called San Marino — is built on mountain tops which rise to 2,425 feet, in the centre of the country's 24 square miles.

Over the centuries the country has been invaded several times, but has

always managed to regain its independence.

The inhabitants are, not surprisingly, Italian in origin.

Their biggest problem is that, in a country so small, most of the families are related and it is therefore difficult to find someone impartial to take control of law and order. They therefore "import" their police force and judges from over the border in Italy to try to avoid any suggestion of favouritism.

San Marino would be a little larger than it is today if the residents had accepted an offer of some extra territory from Napoleon back in 1797, but they declined.

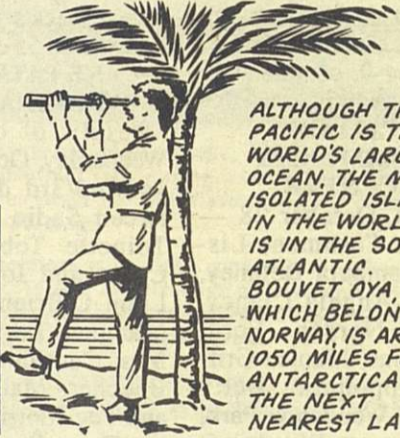

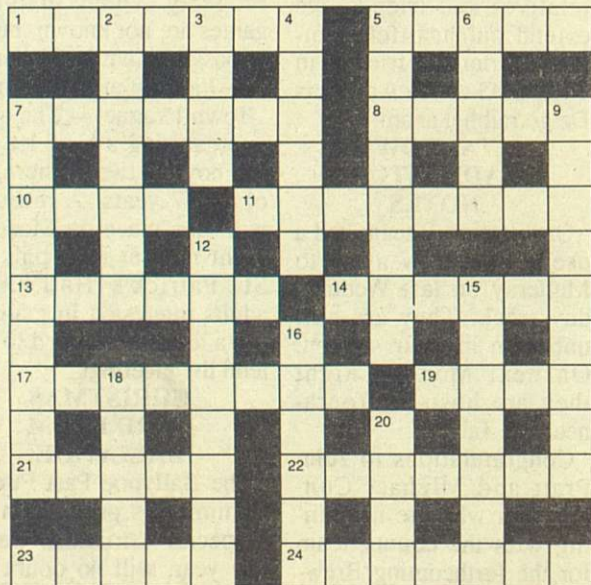

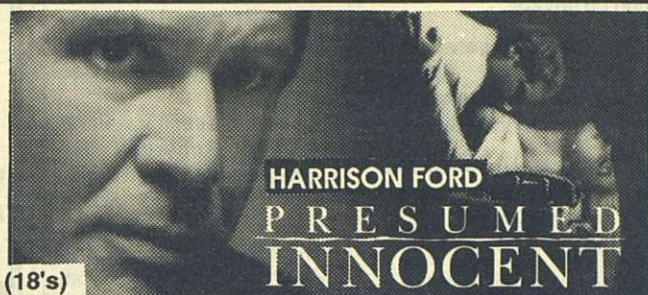

In this week's Abbeyside/Ballinacourty G.A.A. Notes, we reminisce on the club's first county football triumph. That was on Sunday, November 7, 1965, when Ballinacourty captured the County intermediate football title following their victory over Rathgormack by 3-9 to 1-0.

The "Dungarvan Leader" summed up the occasion and its significance quite well: "Congratulations to Ballinacourty who last Sunday took the intermediate football championship by scoring what can only be described as a crushing defeat on the Eastern champions, Rathgormack. The result was an achievement which took something like eighteen years to accomplish, but supporters who have followed the team through the years agree that this team was more than a shade above all the others that have represented the club and that its standard has never been equalled in the parish.

"Sunday's victory, which, incidentally, was the first Western win in the County championships this year and the first intermediate football title ever to come to the Division, was achieved by a team effort

and by the very shrewd planning of the men who had successfully guided them through the West.

"Following their victory, celebrations of extraordinary proportions have been taking place from Ballinroad to the Gold Coast and I saw 40 cars take part in a motorcade from Abbeyside on Monday night and follow a torchlight procession to Ballinroad and the point, at which places huge bonfires burned.

"These are the things which make one realise what winning a County title means to a Gaelic stronghold."

G.A.A. NOTES

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

Eamon Murphy, chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the County Board at Dungarvan.

APPEAL UPHELD

The main business of the meeting was the appeal lodged by Dungarvan against the decision of County Bord na nOg to disqualify them from the under-16 football county final last month.

The appeal stated that the club had been notified to play both the under-16 county and minor divisional football finals on the same day and as nine of their players would be involved in both, it was impossible for them to play both. They had opted for the minor because of the programme of matches due to be played during the coming weeks.

Bord na nOg, which was represented by the chairman, John Moore and Divisional Board Chairman, John Kiely, outlined the reasons why Dungarvan's decision left them no option but to disqualify them as the club were committed to playing the under-16 county final, the date of which had been notified to all clubs in the county on a masters fixtures plan which had been given to all underage units several months ago. They also had it confirmed that Walsh Park, which was the venue for their final against Tramore, had been booked since last May and this had been noted in the field diary at Walsh Park by the county secretary. Such a copy was produced by John Kiely in evidence at the meeting.

John Moore said that when the impasse arose with the Western Adult Board that he and the secretary of Bord na nOg had the county senior chairman to arbitrate on the matter. He further said that when the county chairman did not rule one way or the other, the matter remained unresolved. He said that Tramore had been removed from the championship last year by Bord na nOg for failing to field for their divisional final and now in removing Dungarvan, they were being consistent.

Dungarvan delegates at the meeting were not asked to comment and the chairman asked if Dungarvan had been met by Bord na nOg to have their case heard. John Moore said his Bord were not required to do this.

The chairman then ruled that the appeal be upheld and Dungarvan be given a refixture.

Several delegates, who made it clear that they were not disappointed that Dungarvan were allowed back

in, tried to raise other aspects relating to the reasons why there was a disruption of the County Bord na nOg finals on October 6, were told that the matter was closed. This resulted in uproar and when order was restored, the chairman declared the matter closed.

Phil Fanning proposed a motion of full confidence in Bord na nOg and all its officers and this was carried unanimously on a show of hands.

Other matters discussed will be reported next week.

SENIOR HURLING TRIAL

In their detailed report to County Board, the hurling committee gave details of their plans to search out all the best talent in the county over the coming weeks. "We, the county senior hurling management committee invite all clubs to submit the names of players in their units who might be considered good enough to challenge for a position on the county senior hurling team/panel.

"We are anxious to ensure that every player of potential is given his chance to stake his claim for inclusion on the panel and to this end we will be holding a series of trials on Sunday, November 25, 1990.

"It will be necessary to have the names by Saturday, November 10, when teams will be selected to participate in a competition for which there will be valuable prizes for the winners.

"All players involved will be guaranteed two games.

"The whole exercise is to continue the search for the best possible senior hurling team/panel for 1991."

The chairman urged all clubs to co-operate in this matter. The report was signed by the five-man management team.

SUSPENSIONS

Three players who were sent off in the county senior hurling final were suspended. Noel Crowley and Michael Walsh were each suspended for two weeks having been reported for rough play and Paudie Prendergast for one month, he having been reported for dangerous play.

JUVENILE COACHING

The chairman told the meeting that the interview committee responsible for the appointment of an under-age football coach similar to that in operation for hurling, had decided to defer such an appointment for two or three months.

Six applicants had been interviewed.

ADULT COACH

The appointment of a coach for the adult football teams was referred to by Nioclás Mac Craith and Tommy Hennessy. Coisde na Peil replied that this matter had not been overlooked and that discussions had taken place with the county football management committee with a view to having the matter finalised before the end of the year. Coisde na Peil were asked to have a report on the matter before the December meeting.

FUND RAISING/ DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The chairman announced that the official launching of the special fund-raising scheme which is being organised by the development committee will take place within the next few weeks. He said it was regrettable that this proposed launch, which had been planned for the previous week, had to be cancelled for reasons outside the control of the committee. He urged clubs to give the scheme their full support.

CO-OP DRAW

An application by the Lismore-Dungarvan-Kilrossanty-Dunhill-Roanmore group of clubs to run their annual co-op draw was referred to Coisde Gnotha who will consider it at their next meeting.

Sudden Death of Popular Waterford Co. Councillor

The death has occurred unexpectedly at the Waterford Regional Hospital of one of the most popular and respected public representatives in the county, Mr. Paddy Cahill, MCC, Adamstown, Kilmeaden.

Aged 67, Mr. Cahill was a Fianna Fail member of Waterford County Council for the past 30 years — representing the Tramore electoral area.

He attended the last meeting of the Council three weeks ago — but he suffered a stroke and was removed to Waterford Regional Hospital where he died on Wednesday of last week.

A former employee of the ESB until his retirement a few years ago, Cllr. Cahill was elected to Waterford County Council at the first time of trying in 1960.

He successfully contested four more local elections, being the runaway polltop-

per more than once.

He was one of the great characters of public life in Waterford, and his joviality and wit often enlivened a dull County Council meeting.

In a distinguished political career he also served on a number of the Council's subsidiary bodies, and at the time of his death was a member of the General Council of County Councils.

There are now two vacancies on the 23-member Waterford County Council following Cllr. Cahill's death. Last month Cllr. James Aidan Walsh (FG) of Cappoquin died following a protracted illness.
