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DUNGARVAN GOLF CLUB CONTROVERSY

Co. Council To Seek Meeting With Quigley Magnesite Principals



The much debated motions concerning the position of Dungarvan Golf Club vis-a-vis the neighbouring Quigley Magnesite Plant in Ballinacourty came up for discussion again at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday.

Cllr. Jim Harty asked that the Council give every support to the Golf Club in their effort to purchase the site to enable it to extend the course to 18 holes while Cllr. Jackie Fahey, T.D., wants the Council to take immediate steps to remove the Q/M Plant under the 1990 Derelict Sites Act because it is "a blot on the landscape."

Deputy Fahey said that there was a feeling abroad

among the public that the Council was slow to move in the matter because an international corporation was involved. Holding that several red herrings had been introduced into the case he said that a very bad image of the Council would be projected if something was not done about the situation soon.

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager agreed that red herrings might have been

drawn in but he vehemently denied that they had been drawn in by him. He said that he was aware that discussions had taken place between the Golf Club and the Pfizer people and the Club had been given the price wanted for the site. He thought it might be better to allow the matter stand until the Golf club came back with a decision

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

MAKE THE LORD'S DAY OUR DAY

When I read Isaiah's portrait of the ideal wife, my first reaction was, I now understand somewhat better why so many marriages are in trouble. Far too many have lost sight of the things that really matter. Isaiah focuses the light on a faithful wife, who cares and gives attention to all the family. She's not only concerned with the family, but always finds time to help her neighbour. There's peace, trust and contentment in her home, because whatever she engages in, God is by her side. Then, I thought, how careful one should be in seeking a partner for life. And, I could not help concluding that very many must be rushing into marriage without preparation and due consideration. You see, there's more to marriage than ordinary human considerations. Do they give any thought to the part God is to play in their lives? As Paul said: "You must treat your wife like your own body." It is wonderful when a man and wife are prepared to do things God's way. They usually find that problems dissolve.

Isaiah's main purpose in praising the qualities and skills of the ideal wife is, she must not bury her talents, but must use them for the good of all. He is also urging us to make all our gifts fruitful and useful. He does mean we have all duties to others. The wife he pictured is one who helped the needy; and her works will tell us what a great person she is. I remember a farmer saying, "he married a beauty, and she drank two farms on him." Of course, men sin more often in this matter. So, what the prophet said should be listened to, and followed.

Paul in the second reading reminds the Thessalonians that now that they have been baptised, they have a duty to live as children of God. He tells them, as is very true of our days, that the world is unmindful that the day of the Lord may be round the next corner. Even the best of us are so engrossed in securing the spoils of life that we forget about our duties to God. Paul is serious about this matter. He says, "The Lord will come like a thief in the night." The Christian will always be ready if he follows the directions of the Lord. He'll be waiting even if he is called without a warning. We know that the longest life is short! Paul is suggesting that our life should be a preparation for the great day. You know, as well as I, that when the call comes, you take nothing with you other than your love for God or the sign of its absence.

A NEW PAGANISM

A new paganism is sweeping the world. The whole emphasis is on worldly success. Whilst it is good to strive to do things well, it becomes a dangerous obsession, when God has to step aside, to allow us to fill our barns

with wheat! It is with shock that I recall good Catholics saying during the Divorce Referendum that a person ought to be given a second chance. God thinks differently. If a person deliberately breaks God's law, and dies unrepentant, it would go hard with such a one on the Lord's day. Circumstances do not alter matters. We have all to abide by God's law.

The Gospel tells us, we must make our blessings productive in conjunction with our love for God, because we never know when the Lord might call for an account. Yet! using the first reading as the key to what the Church wishes us to understand, the message is, be faithful to your Christian duty and work. The Lord does expect to be served. He expects us to reap a harvest. So, if one has nothing to show but the bare gifts he received, he'll be deemed to have failed his trust.

It is sad to watch people imprison themselves with the attractions of the world. They use all their powers and skills to this end. It is like this. A man has two jobs to do. One is important. The other is unimportant. And, he spends all his energies and all his time on the unimportant job. You pass judgement! Yes, I am confident if the man who received the one talent had been working for you, you would have sacked him. That's why we must all strive to give a spiritual dimension to all we think, say and do. We must be open-handed and open-hearted. We do not have to worry about the work entrusted to us. The Gospel makes it clear that it is what we do with what we got that matters. Let us thank God for what we have received. Let us ask for help to use our gifts well. And, thereby we'll be making God's day our day.

Final Tributes To Popular Tallow G.A.A. Stalwart

The unexpected death took place at his residence on Monday, November 5 of one of the stalwart figures of the G.A.A. in Waterford over many decades in the person of David (Dave) Doyle, Barrack Street, Tallow.

Aged 77, he gave a lifetime of sterling service to the G.A.A. in his native town and county both as a player, selector, and administrator.

He was a member of the Tallow team which won the county senior hurling championship in 1936, and was trainer of the team that won intermediate hurling championship honours in 1974.

At different times he served as club chairman, secretary and selector.

Aside from the G.A.A. he took a keen and active interest in politics and was a lifelong member of the Fine Gael party.

The late Dave Doyle also had a great interest in music and as a young musician he was a leading member of the Brideside Serenaders which in those days were in popular demand not only throughout the county but in many parts of Munster as a leading dance combination.

Following Concelebrated Mass in the Church of the Immaculate Conception, Tallow, on Wednesday of last week, Dave was laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery. There was a guard of honour by members of Tallow G.A.A. Club as the coffin, draped in the blue and gold colours of the club, was carried on its short, final, journey.

An oration was delivered at the graveside by Mr. Pat Daly, a native of Tallow, who is one of the G.A.A.'s Development Officers at Croke Park.

The deceased is survived by his son Tom, three daughters Marianne, Kitty and Louise; his sister, and a wide circle of other relatives.

Know Your Rights

Q. — I have been on Disability Benefit for five years. In July I was widowed and have been awarded the Contributory Widows Pension and my Disability Benefit has been reduced to half-rate. It seems that it will only be paid for 390 days and that I will have to work again for 13 weeks to requalify for another 390 days. It's highly unlikely that I will be able to work again.

A. — Prior to January 1988 the women entitled to claim half-rate Disability Benefit could be paid it indefinitely up to age 66, provided they had 260 weeks PRSI paid.

Since January 1988 women receiving any of the lone parent payments were no longer entitled to any Disability Benefit when they were sick. Claims already in payment were not affected.

From April 6, 1990 half-rate Disability Benefit was re-introduced for these women in return for their paying PRSI. However, it was conditional on their having 260 weeks PRSI paid and it would only be paid for 390 days. To requalify they must work again for 13 weeks.

Interestingly, the women who had continued sending in medical certificates for credits had their payment restored automatically on April 6 this year and in their particular cases their payment will last for as long as their claim remains unbroken. It is not restricted to 390 unless they break their claim.

Q. — I have been separated for two years and my only income is my maintenance of £100 per week. Not only have I to pay tax on this but I also have to pay Class S PRSI as well. Furthermore I have to pay it all in one lump sum each year and I don't get the £800 PAYE or PRSI Allowance. What I can't understand is why I have to pay Class S PRSI as I thought this only applied to the self-employed. Can you clarify the position.

A. — As your income comes to more than £2,500 per year I am afraid you are liable for Class S PRSI. It was hardly the intention that people such as yourself would have to pay this. However, unless and until the legislation is changed you are liable.

Last year the Class S rate was 4% and this year it is 5%. The minimum payment in your particular case is £208 per year.

It may be possible for you to come to an arrangement with the tax office to pay it in instalments. You should contact them immediately about this.

Passing of Tom Clancy of Clancy Brothers Fame

The death of Tom Clancy, second eldest of the legendary Clancy Brothers, has robbed the folk music world of one of the catalysts of its sixties revival.

The Carrick-on-Suir born singer and actor died in Cork's Mercy Hospital on Wednesday, November 7, after a long illness, diagnosed after he returned from the group's last concert tour of the US in March.

His elder brother Paddy, aged 68, described Tom as 'a man full of life and energy, who allowed nothing to stop him from achieving his aim.'

His determination to succeed began at an early age when he joined various touring companies in his bid to become an actor. It was a love affair he maintained to his death.

Although he was most famous at home as one of the *Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem*, he was equally well known on Broadway and in Hollywood as a stage and screen actor.

Born in Carrick-on-Suir 66 years ago, he emigrated to Canada and crossed into the US at Buffalo in 1948 with his brother Paddy. Seven years later, younger brother Liam, now aged 55, and his friend Tommy Makem emigrated to the US and the group was formed.

They went on to lead the folk revival that was to spawn the careers of such international luminaries as Bob Dylan, Pete Seeger, Joan Baez, Tom Paxton, Woody Guthrie and Judy Collins — even Barbara Streisand got her first break after she came to audition for a slot on their headline show at the Blue Angel in New York.

The Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem did not actually play in Ireland until 1962 and they were even better known on the other side of the Atlantic than at home. Their biggest hit, *The Holy Ground*, remains a classic of its era.

The group recorded their first album in 1956 in New York, and Tom's acting career had to give way to a singing career that spiralled in double quick time. To date the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem have recorded close to 40 albums.

HOLLYWOOD CAREER

However Tom never lost the acting bug and at the end of a tour which took them to California, he stayed on in Hollywood.

He starred in the long running Broadway production of Eugene O'Neill's *A Moon for the Misbegotten* which also starred Jason Robards.

His Hollywood career encompassed a number of films, including *Reds*, Sam Peckinpah's *Killer Elite* and the *Swashbuckler* with Robert Shaw. He also had guest roles in TV series like *Charlie's Angels* and *The Little House on the Prairie*.

With his wife Joan (nee Walsh), he came home to live in Ring six years ago, and the Clancy Brothers — now with their nephew Robbie O'Connell — continued to do occasional tours in the US.

Tom first complained of illness in March and died in the Mercy Hospital on Wednesday of last week. He is survived by his family, including wife Joan, and children Cait, Blawnin, Rayleen and three-year-old Rosemary.

"He always wanted to come back to settle in Ireland, but he could never fully give up with music. We will continue on now, but it will not be the same. We will deeply miss his vitality," said Paddy.

In achieving her unprecedented victory Mrs. Robinson has broken the traditional voting patterns of the past and already the main political parties are conceding that they will have to change their attitudes for the future.

We congratulate Mrs. Robinson on her election and wish her with her very supportive family, husband Nick, daughter Tessa and sons William and Aubrey a happy and most successful term of office in Arus An Uachtarain.

And in this week which saw a woman electorally achieve the highest honour in the land, it is also nice to see that there is a lady member back on the benches at Waterford Co. Council. We also, then, congratulate Mrs. Monica Walsh who, on Monday last, was unanimously chosen to succeed her late husband, James Aidan as a Fine Gael member of the Council and wish her well in her new role as a public representative.

EARLY PLANNING FOR MAJOR DUNGARVAN CONFERENCE

The 78th Annual Conference of the Association of Municipal Authorities of Ireland will take place next year in Dungarvan. It is timed for the third week in September and is expected to attract in excess of 300 delegates to the town. In addition there will also be wives and friends who will accompany the delegates to be catered for so this major conference should prove a big tourism bonanza not only for Dungarvan but for the entire area of West Waterford.

When the matter was referred to at last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, the massive planning that would be required to ensure the success and smooth running of the conference was discussed.

Town Clerk Bertie White who with Cllrs. Billy Kyne and Richie Walsh, the Council's delegates to the AMAI, were responsible for having Dungarvan chosen as the venue for the 1991 Conference, pointed out that as hosts for the

conference, the Council would be involved in a lot of hard work. It was normal practice it was pointed out that a special committee should be formed to plan the running of such a conference as a lot of events would have to be organised and a great deal of money generated from sponsorship by local business and industry.

Mr. White said that as the conference would take on a new format next September far more work would be involved than in the past. He said that the planning process for the conference would commence in January and go on from there.

When Cllr. Austin Hallahan pointed out that next year would also be a Local Elections year and asked whether this would affect the holding of the conference in any way, the Town Clerk replied that it would only mean that they might have to shoulder the double burden if the elections took place.

Expressing delight that Dungarvan was to get such a major conference, Cllr. Dec Goode said that although a great deal of organisation and planning would be involved, he felt sure that the Council would be able to measure up to its responsibilities.

Stating that it would be a great challenge for the Council to make the conference a success — and it was absolutely essential that they ensure this — Cllr. Kyne said that all interests in the town would have to become involved and with the assistance of the County Development

Officer and the local tourism and other committees as well as the Council staff, he felt they could handle it. In ensuring a successful conference he said that there would be a tremendous spin-off for the tourist potential of the town and indeed of the entire area.

The matter will again come up for discussion at the Council's January meeting when preliminary steps to establish the Committee to be charged with planning and organising the conference will be taken.

Ireland Elects First Woman President

Mrs. Mary Robinson, S.C. was declared the seventh President of Ireland last Friday evening, November 9, after a stunning electoral victory and so initiated a new phase in Irish history as she swept into power as the country's first woman president.

As the Returning Officer, Mr. Tim Sexton made the dramatic announcement in Irish at the conclusion of the count in the RDS in Dublin it was greeted euphorically by her supporters. Mrs. Robinson's final tally of 817,830 votes put her a whopping 86,557 votes ahead of the Fianna Fail candidate, Mr. Brian Lenihan who ended up with a total of 731,273.

Mr. Lenihan headed the first count nationally with 694,484 votes with Mrs. Robinson in second place with 612,265 and the fine Gael candidate, Mr. Austin Currie, trailing with 267,902 votes. Following Mr. Currie's elimination, Mrs. Robinson gained 205,565 of the transfers compared with 36,789 for Mr. Lenihan.

HOW WATERFORD VOTED

Here in County Waterford there was a valid poll of 38,755, representing a 63.39% turn-out which was in line with the general turn-out throughout the country. On first preferences, Mr. Lenihan received 17,236 (44.47%); Mrs. Robinson 15,359 (39.63%) and Mr. Currie 6,160 (15.89%). Of Mr. Currie's transfers, 4,521 went to Mrs. Robinson bringing her to 19,880 (52.50%) while Mr. Lenihan received 934 bringing his total vote in the county to 18,170 (47.75%). There

were 705 non-transferable votes.

Following her declaration as President-Elect, Mrs. Robinson admitted that it was "an enormous honour and humbling experience" to hear herself being elected as President of Ireland. Her acceptance speech was joyful and enthusiastic but she pointed out that the day was one of victory and valediction for as she saluted her supporters as Mary Robinson she bade them farewell as President-Elect. "They are not just partisans but patriots too. They know that as President of Ireland I must be President for all the people. But more than that I want to be a president for all the people," she said.

Mrs. Robinson had a special word of thanks for the women of Ireland — mna na hEireann — who had supported her so strongly. Normally cool and unruffled, her voice trembled in excitement as she declared: "this is a great day for the women of Ireland, for us, for our children and for our grandchildren."

DECEMBER 3 INAUGURATION

The 46-year-old President-Elect will be inaugurated as Ireland's seventh President in a State ceremony on Monday, December 3 in St. Patrick's Hall of Dublin Castle. In the presence of leaders of State, Church and Judiciary and the Diplomatic

Corps she will be sworn in by the Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Thomas Finlay.

Mrs. Robinson's salary will be £79,592 per year and, in addition £97,000 a year will be paid by the Office of Public Works for domestic and security staff. She will also have a household budget of £263,000, which will pay for her secretariat and an entertainment budget of £15,000. She will also become Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces.

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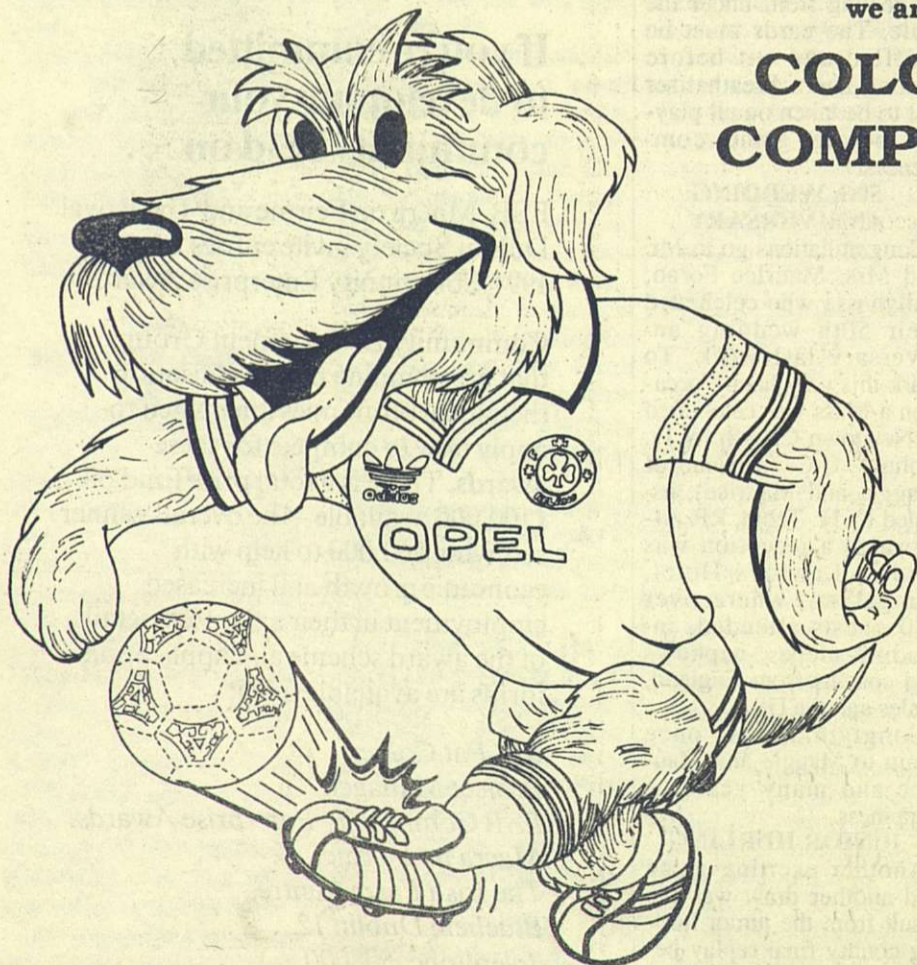

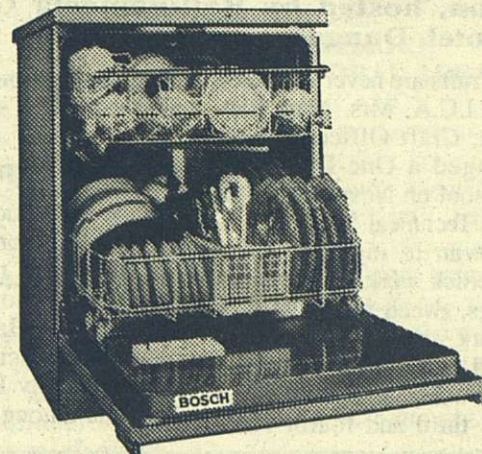

It's a key time for pruning and planting

NOVEMBER is perhaps a surprising month to be thinking about fruit but it is a key month for pruning and planting.

Cut away canker and any dead wood likely to harbour disease, before applying fungicide or tree paint to protect exposed sap wood and promote bark growth over the wound.

You should be particularly ruthless with apples and pears and aim for a well-spaced spread of branches. Be toughest on main shoots, where up to half the latest season's growth can be cut back, and prune away any inward or criss-crossing branches and twigs - they allow poor fruiting.

Happily

Follow up before the end of the year with a tar oil spray to kill off pests and diseases trying to overwinter on your trees, but protect your bare skin and use goggles.

You can also plant happily until the end of the year and even up to March but early is best for fruit planting, especially when the stock can be expensive.

Garden centres usually have a good range of varieties suitable for the garden, such as the straight 'Ballerina' apple trees now on the market - ideal for tight spaces.

If you have a convenient wall you may also be looking for a compact variety which can be trained into fan-like 'espalier' form.

Remember, that few fruit trees are completely self-fertile so plant cross-pollinating varieties. Morello cherry, Victoria plum and Conference pear are an exception though they still seem to thrive best in groups.

Don't be afraid to experiment with other fruit varieties apart from apples and pears. After all, they are common enough in the shops.

For a real change, how about growing medlar or quince, the traditional favourites for jams and jellies? The latter is also good for extra flavour in apple pies and tarts or wines.

Stone fruits are also worth growing. Bushy peach types grow in sunny spots, such as against a wall, but need well-drained soil with some lime and hate areas prone to harsh winters. Figs also like a warm south-facing wall.

But if you are tight for space, check out smaller fruit producers such as raspberry, blackcurrant, redcurrant, blackberry or, for a plant which needs very little looking after, blueberry and cranberry.

Once you've decided on the variety, plant carefully. Stake trees for extra support until the roots get a firm grip.

Once planted, water thoroughly if the ground is dry and then attach any wires and ties needed for those that you plan to train against a wall or other support.

FESTIVE ROAST WITH A DIFFERENCE

TURKEY is still the nation's number one choice for the Christmas table. But if you're looking for something more adventurous this year, duck could be the answer.

Duck has a strong, rich flavour which goes well with fruity stuffings and sauces. The meat is succulent and the skin roasts to a crisp golden brown.

Try this simple recipe for roast duckling with red wine and kumquat sauce.

The sauce can be prepared up to two days in advance and kept in the refrigerator; it will also freeze well.

If kumquats are not available, use the thinly pared rind of one orange. The unusual rice stuffing echoes the tangy flavour of the sauce.

FESTIVE ROAST DUCKLING WITH RED WINE AND KUMQUAT SAUCE

Ingredients:

- 1 duckling
- Stuffing:**
- 50g/2oz flaked almonds
- 150g/6oz brown rice
- 1 small finely diced onion
- 1 finely diced stick celery rind and juice of one small orange and lemon
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- 1 heaped teaspoon dried sage
- 1 egg
- salt and pepper

Method:

To prepare stuffing, toast almonds brown in a hot oven; allow to cool. Cook rice in salted water until just soft; drain and cool. Mix together all the ingredients except the egg. Season well and add beaten egg to bind.

Press stuffing well down into the body cavity of the duck and seal end with skewers. Prick the skin of the duck with a fork, rub lightly with salt and roast on a trivet in a roasting pan at 305F/180C/Gas mark 4, allowing 30 minutes per pound. Increase temperature for last 20 minutes to 400F/200C/Gas mark 6 for a golden crisp finish.

For the sauce you will need:

- 50g/2oz seedless raisins
- 300ml/1 1/2 pints strong sweet tea
- 25g/1oz butter
- 1/2 small onion diced
- 1 carrot diced
- 1 stick celery diced
- 2 kumquats diced
- 1 dessertspoon tomato purée
- 1/2 pint red wine
- salt and pepper

Method:

Soak raisins in tea while gently frying onion, carrot, celery and kumquats in butter until soft but not coloured. Add tomato purée, wine and tea, reserving raisins. Cook gently until vegetables and kumquats are very soft.

Take off the heat, cool and liquidise. Season to taste and add raisins before re-

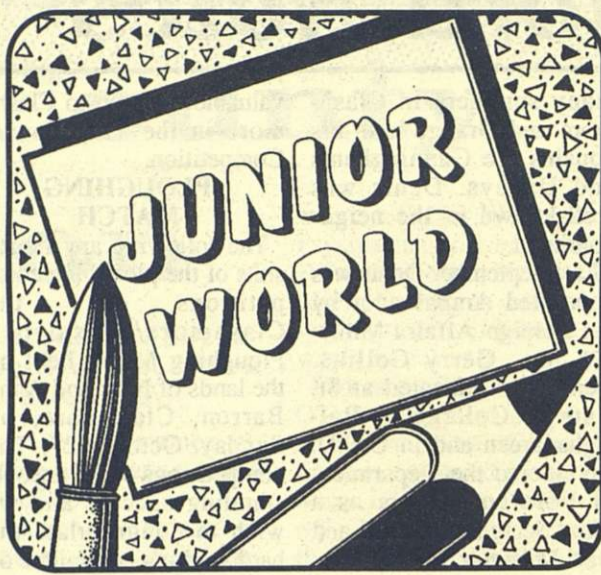



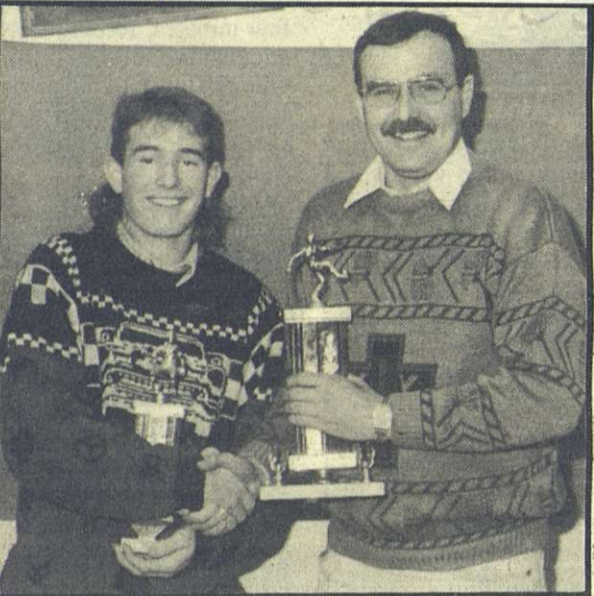

Great Win For Dungarvan

DUNGARVAN 1-9 ST. KIERAN'S 1-7

A superb display by Dungarvan, reduced to 14 men ten minutes from time, ensured that their initial venture into the Munster club football championship at Fraher Field, Dungarvan on Sunday last was very successful when they took on and beat Limerick champions St. Kieran's by 1-9 to 1-7.

Given the terrible conditions it could be said that Dungarvan's display was better than was expected and their win all the more meritorious. Conceding height and weight throughout the field they counteracted the disadvantage by playing a superb passing game which had the Limerick champions run ragged at times.

Dungarvan's fitness was phenomenal and they made light of the terrible underfoot conditions and ably led by a great display from Pepe Ferncombe and a magnificent performance from full back Brendan Morrissey the Old Boro side came through their Munster baptism with flying colours.

Dungarvan had a great tonic early on when after

going a point down they retaliated by scoring what has been described as one of the best goals ever seen at the venue. It came in the 7th minute and followed a movement from deep in defence involving several players before Eddie Burke released Denis McGrath on the wing and the corner forward's pass split the Limerick defence leaving Morrie Ferncombe clear.

Morrie made no mistake and his perfectly placed shot ended up in the back of the net. It was a great confidence booster for Dungarvan who deservedly led 1-4 to 0-5 at the break.

If anything was in question at this stage it was Dungarvan's ability to last the pace in the second half in the very heavy going. They quickly answered this

query as they got back into their stride and Richard Woulfe's 5th minute point for Kieran's was negated by Morrie Ferncombe's minor in the 9th minute.

Dungarvan's best spell followed as Pepe Ferncombe sent over points in the 11th, 15th and 16th minutes. Richard Woulfe pointed for Kieran's in the 21st minute but Peter Power answered with a great point for Dungarvan with five minutes to go.

It was natural that Dungarvan should show signs of weakening in the closing stages as their efforts in the mud began to take their toll.

Four players were sent to the line in the final ten minutes of this highly charged county junior hurling final replay played in atrocious conditions at the Fraher Field, Dungarvan on Sunday last.

To add to the drama superb sub Tony Boland snatched a draw for Ballydurn three minutes into time added on when he goaled with a last ditch effort.

By rule extra time should have been played. But after consultation and because of the Munster club football game scheduled for 3 p.m. senior Board officials decided on a replay on Sunday, December 2.

As stated the game was played in terrible conditions with continuous rain turning the pitch into a virtual quagmire.

Good hurling was completely ruled out but the commitment given by both sides was 100% with many players, particularly in defence performing well above the call of duty.

Challenges in the slippery conditions were, at times, rather frighteningly dangerous. As the game progressed tempers became frayed and referee John Michael Kelly of Shamrocks was forced to give four players marching orders in an effort to maintain discipline.

The first to go in the 20th minute was Michael Hubbard, Ballydurn's star forward. Five minutes later Finbarr Walsh, Ring and Kieran Dunphy, Ballydurn were dismissed and with a minute of normal time left Michael Hayes, Ring, was sent to the line.

In contrast to the first game when Ring had to come from behind, on this occasion the Gaeltacht side looked to be on their way to the title as they led by three points with normal time up.

BETTER OF EXCHANGES

Ring had the better of the exchanges marginally in the first half. Despite going two points down early on they fought back and goals from Patrick Crotty (13th minute) and Nioclás Mac Craith (27th minute) helped them to a 2-3 to 0-5 interval lead.

The second half produced a dour but exciting tussle. It was a half in which defences, heroically in some instances, played superbly. Consequently scores were very hard to come by. Coupled to this both sides fell foul of the elements on a number of occasions when chances were squandered through erratic shooting.

Michael Hubbard pointed

in the 32nd minute to cut the deficit to three points. Eugene Curran restored Ring's four point lead when he pointed in the 38th minute but Peter Queally again cut the deficit when he pointed for Ballydurn in the 53rd minute.

As the leader of the Brideside Sereaders Dance Band back in the good old days, the late Davy became known to thousands of dancers all over the West and from personal contact with him, I can say with sincerity that his personality never changed. Davy remained a gentleman up to the moment of his regretted death.

County Board Meeting

The number of people gaining admission to the sideline at some of our venues was referred to at the recent meeting of the County Board. The chairman said that steps would have to be taken to considerably cut down on these numbers and the disciplinary committee would consider what action should be taken against clubs whose members did not obey stewards in charge.

In relation to the switching of the Waterford v. Carlow National League game to Abbeyside, the chairman said that Fraher Field was declared unplayable because the pitch had suffered from the recent heavy rains and as the county hurling panel trained on it and two divisional finals were played there on the Saturday, it was thought better to move the Sunday game to Abbeyside. He said that after this, the pitch was closed in order to have it playable for the Waterford/Cork league match on the following Monday week.

He thanked Paddy Fitzgerald for having gotten the field back into shape for the league match and Ned Fowler for his work in the Walsh Park field.

Anthony Walsh, Secretary of the Western Board thanked the Abbeyside club for the liberal use of their venue over several months.

The appointment of county minor hurling selectors was deferred to the December meeting. Bord na nOg had nominated five members and other nominations had been received by the Board. These are to be considered by the Coisde Gnotha and five nominations will come before the next meeting.

John Lyons asked about the appointment of junior hurling selectors and was told that the Board were still unsure that a junior inter-county championship will be played. It was stated that a decision on this matter may not be taken until Congress. It was, however, decided that selectors will be chosen at the next meeting, just in case.

Declan Cullen, Tramore, complained about the fixing of the two senior football semi-finals for the different venues on the same afternoon. The chairman said that Dungarvan was the obvious venue for the Stradbally/Kilrossanty game and that as Dungarvan were involved in the other, their opponents, St. Saviours could not be made play there. The admission price to both was also complained about.

LANGUAGE

The use of bad and inappropriate language on the field of play and sometimes among supporters is a matter which has been referred to many times when

referee's reports were being dealt with at meetings. It is a fact that offenders in this regard are very seldom punished by referees or Boards.

Some time ago, the Western Bord na nOg chairman, John Kiely, when dealing with a report which named a player who had used bad language, hit out very strongly in condemning the practice and appealed to referees to exercise their authority in this regard.

This ugly practice is creeping in, in all sports and does little to enhance the character of the ones who utter such profanities in public.

The rule in the official G.A.A. guide is very specific in relation to the use of bad language and although it is not enforced, it is a sending-off offence.

Rule 193 which deals with unsporting behaviour states: "The following offences shall be penalised by the offender being cautioned, which shall consist of taking the players name, and if the player repeats the offence, or commits any of the other cautionable offences, the referee shall order him off."

"Dissenting with or challenging the authority of the match officials"; "The use of foul or improper language."

Where a player's name is taken for any of the above offences and is not sent off, the indiscretion must be noted in the referee's report to the Board.

I didn't refer last week, to Waterford's defeat in the semi-final of the 'B' All-Ireland football semi-final, which we were very unlucky to lose after having enjoyed most of the play. Lots of chances which came our way didn't work out and we lost a match that we should have won.

It was unfortunate that five members of the panel had played in county hurling finals just 24 hours earlier and two, Peter Queally and Pat Power were injured in those. Two of the players, Jim Maher and Pierrie Whyte, both of whom played leading roles in Kilrossanty's win over Fenor on Saturday, did field and gave it all they had, but was it not asking too much to expect them to perform at their best in such an important game just 24 hours after?

We were the county who initiated this All-Ireland 'B' competition and having

reached the semi-final, the team should have their players free from tough competitive matches for the minimum of a week before being expected to give of their very best in an important game, such as this was.

It would certainly have given a tremendous boost to football here in the county, had we reached the final. We don't get these chances very often.

The message for everyone is that something has got to be done to avoid this sort of thing happening again and the only way in which it can be avoided is

to play our finals at an earlier time. This year, as in other years, it was not possible to play our finals any earlier and in fact it was a great achievement to reach the final stages because of all the matches that must be played to get this far. But we still have got to do something — even something drastic if needs be — in order to avoid having our finals run late. Apart from the intercounty aspect of things, it would be more satisfying to everyone if we reached and played our county finals at an earlier time of the year and to do this, we should not go be-

yond September or early October.

In the days before our county senior football final this year, the weather was a big worry and weather-wise, our worries are not over yet.

I believe that a new format for our championships is the only answer and with changes very likely to come about in the restructuring of the National Leagues within the next twelve months or so, we are going to have to change, so why not get moving now before the whole matter becomes more complicated.

in this matter.

Mr. Hurley said that other areas were also being investigated about the site and he confirmed that an official approach had been made concerning an industry there. He also said that the site was currently under investigation under the Dereliction Act and a report would be made in due course. "In all this I deal only with facts and not with red herrings or fiction" said the Manager who added that he hoped to be able to make a positive statement on the issue by December. "There are a lot of interests involved in this matter and I'm in the middle attempting to keep the peace" said Mr. Hurley.

Cllr. Harty said he understood that the price asked for the site by Pfizer was prohibitive as far as the Golf Club was concerned. He hoped that the Company would see its way to reduce this.

Cllr. O'Riordan said that what he had said about the interest of a Japanese firm was no red herring. "If it comes to a crunch between the Golf Club and an industry I will go down the road of the industry," he said.

Finally the discussions ended when a suggestion by the Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne was accepted

which sought the setting up of an information meeting to be attended by senior members of the Pfizer Co., representatives of the Golf Club with Cllr. Jim Harty and Cllr. Kyne representing the Co. Council. "I believe," said the Chairman, "that such a meeting would do no harm."
