Co. Council Public Services Plans For 1991 RUSIDE CO

In the course of the Annual Estimates meeting of Waterford County Council held last month it was disclosed that as the estimate for public lighting at £125,000 for the coming year showed an increase of £19,000 on the current year, it allowed for the costs arising from the upgrading of lighting in Cappoquin, Lismore, Tallow, Ballyduff and Ardmore (Main Street only). It was also disclosed that no provision for any new lights or for upgrading the lighting systems in other towns and villages throughout the county during 1991 was included in the Estimates.

With regard to the Government's recently published Environment Action Programme, the Council has prepared a preliminary report setting out its proposals in this regard while the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, hopes to have a preliminary report regarding effluent discharges to Dungarvan Harbour pre-

pared and submitted to the Department during 1991. "All of the industrial dischargers to Dungarvan Harbour, have now been, or will shortly be, licensed under the 1977 Water Pollution Act and I would like to record my gratitude to the general commitment of these companies to co-operating with the Council in bringing about a phased improvement in water quality in Dungarvan Harbour over the next decade," Mr. Hurley stated.

The Council will also consider the areas of Kilmacthomas, Clonea and Ardmore for effluent treatment in the spirit of the Government plan. However it was disclosed

that in order to balance the estimates it was found necessary to eliminate the Co. Engineer's proposals for the provision of effluent treatment improvements at Sunlawn (Affane) and Mounfoun (Old Parish) which it was admitted were both urgently required on public health grounds.

Also eliminated for the same reason were the following "desirable improvements" estimated to cost £96,000 — mains replacement at Seaview and Lefanta; augmentation of Helvick and Loskeran supplies; provision of new **CONTINUED ON PAGE 4**

DO IT MY WAY!

You could not miss that the Advent readings are urging us to prepare for the great feast of Christmas. And, it's obvious too that it is all devised to get us ready for our final show-down with God. You see, the Gospel has one main purpose, and that is man's salvation. Last year, when the Church tried to get us to realise the seriousness of the matter, how did you react? Let's ask those, who were among us last year and have since departed, how did they respond? It is true that from today till tomorrow, we are in God's care, and if we're wise, we'll reach out for God, and hold fast to Him. There is no life without Him! So, if it means an upheaval has to be made in your life, then get going, and turn back to God. If you have remained faithful, then get busy in drawing closer to Him. Sharing in God's life is a living and active participation, and it must be cared and nurtured to sustain its growth. And, as Isaiah said, you'll be preparing the way for the Lord, and you'll be opening up the way for others to find him.

St. Peter in the second reading is not only urging us to embrace God's way of life and prepare for His coming, but he also wants us to convert others by our good example. He speaks of the great and final renewal of all things on the last day, and warns us that that day will be thrust upon us in the twinkling of an eye. He means, if we're wise, we'll ensure we'll be ready and waiting. It's true, we are all inclined to dally. Peter is saying, grow up, be your age, because there's too much at stake, and there's no room for error. Once we cross the great divide, our destiny is fixed for all eternity. Peter is only repeating the Lord's teaching. The rest is up to yourself.

I'd like to remind parents about their responsibility. They have a grave duty to instruct their children, and not the one, but that his work was to prepare the way for His coming. He sought no glory for himself; and he would not allow anything to deflect him from his mission. Soon after he'd pointed out that Jesus was the Lamb of God, he was executed, because he told the king it was sinful to live with his brother's wife.

THERE'S ONLY THE ONE WAY

You'll have noticed that those who came to hear John were aware of Isaiah's prophesy re. the Messiah. Those, who refused to accept John's teaching, lost an opportunity to draw closer to God. I'm not expanding on Christ's own claim to be the Promised One, but I'm stating that those who rejected His claim were not wholly blameless. And, on top of that, when God's word is not accepted, it amounts to choosing one's own way. There's danger here for there is only the one way. Whoever they were, and wherever they are, they missed a call to greatness. Even today you'll find people trying to tell God how things should be done, and then adding, what matters, God is love. How little they know God, who wants us to do things His way. John's voice still re-echoes down the corridors of time. The message is heralding the coming of God, and urges us to prepare ourselves for that important meeting. Let us therefore take a good look at ourselves, and start putting our house in order. It will be a help to take a run through the Commandments, and seek pardon at the Lord's tribunal of Penance. And then, take regular nourishment at the Eucharistic table. Your salvation will be assured, and you'll receive added glory, because you made it possible for others to find the way.

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
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MR. MICHAEL COTTER, TALLOW R.I.P.

Under the heading "pub-lic conveniences," it was stated that the £35,000 provided in the estimates (up by £10,700 on the current figure) would be barely sufficient to provide a basic level of maintenance in 1991. It was pointed out that vandalism has, in the past, been a major cost factor where public toilets are concerned. The provision of new or improved public conveniences at Lismore, Ardmore, Cappoquin, Tramore and Ballyduff Upper as requested by members during the past year was not possible.





New Service for Members of Tallow Credit Union Announced at A.G.M.

Development of a new service for members and an increase in interest payable were the highlights of Chairman, Kathleen Barry's report to members of Tallow Area Credit Union on Thursday night last.

In the seven schools in which Sammy Stamp is being sold over £12,500 worth was sold in the past year. Highlight of the year was co-ordinating local support for Daffodil Day in which almost £1,000 was collected for Conquer Cancer Campaign. This, Mr. Geary stated, is true Credit Union philosophy of Caring is Sharing.

Strict supervision was enforced by Supervisory Committee, Mr. Sean Twomey reported. 



CHRISTMAS places so many demands on our time that it's fortunate that most gardens do not need much care in December.

Most plants are dormant and the gardener can easily stay on top of the clearing and tidying jobs required.

It is worth raking up leaves, not just because they will be far more useful and tidier on the compost heap. On the lawn they will cause yellowing and if you leave them too long on the bulb beds you risk damaging the sprouting heads when you rake the leaves up later.

Stretch

Those plants that haven't battened down for the winter and are vulnerable to cold and frost should be protected with bracken and straw laid carefully around them

Watch out for hungry birds as well. Stretch nets over the brassicas such as cabbage so that the birds don't feed their crops with yours!

A much better idea is to put up a bird table and feed them with scraps. It's great

trees which need lopping or pruning then now is a good time to wield the saw, cutting flush at the junction with the joining branch, thereby allowing the bark to quickly close the cut.

He also taught music to those who could afford to pay for lessons. His name was Paddy Carr. Paddy did not always appear but when he did he usually took over and played for hours. The hat was always passed around for Paddy.

of local origin. Many of these hooleys went on into the small hours of the morning and if they were held on a Saturday night it was not unusual for them to drag on until first Mass on Sunday. Indeed on occasions if the weather was bad some of the card players would return from Mass and play until tea time

Then of course there was another kind of "kitchen hooley" which involved a "45 drive" for some prizes, the value of which was never important. There was dancing, singing and a sit-down tea. The fee to take part in the card games was 1/- and a further 6d for any subsequent entries. The fee usually defrayed the cost of the refreshments. These hooleys were open house and one went along whether invited or not. There was no objection to anybody and it was not unusual for people to come long distances.

To our parish they sometimes came from Inch, Mount Uniacke in East Cork and from across the Blackwater even. The youth from our parish also travelled. to far away places to this type of entertainment. The card games were played on the "knock-out" system - the winning pair from each table of six going. forward to the next round. One or two men had to look after this, collect the fee and ensure that only winners went forward. It was not unusual for two close neighbours to hold a joint hooley - the cards and the dancing being held in one house and the refreshments being served in the other. This gave the younger folk an opportunity to engage in some romance while travelling from one house to the other.

The usual dances were the old Irish sets, the Barn Dance, the Four Steps, the Old Time Waltz, the Valeta and where space allowed the Siege of Ennis and the

Many old Irish ballads were sung at these hooleys. Some of the songs were well known and popular but there were on Sunday. That would be a private game.



As we came down Killenagh and up the Bay Road he could be heard honking around the three parishes. Neither of us wanted the gander so we put him up as a prize for a hooley to be held at Donovans. Before the winter was out he was played for many times and went the rounds of the parish until finally Tade Hennessey won him. Mrs. Hennessey killed him and had him for dinner on St. Patrick's Day. Tade said he was so tough that he must have been as old as Tim Daly himself! — M.M.

How those stripes get into toothpaste

HAVE you ever wondered how that hard-boiled egg ever got into the middle of that veal and ham pie? Or those stripes in a tube of toothpaste? Or, for that matter, the lead in the pencil you are now chewing furiously?

These are just a few of the tricks of the trade we all take for granted without knowing how they are done.

Getting the eggs into a veal and ham pie is quite a complicated business. First the yolks are separat-

ed from the whites and partially cooked in a long cylinder. The resulting 'rod' of egg yolk is placed in a wider cylinder and surrounded by the raw whites.

After a brief cooking, out comes the longest egg in the world. Veal and ham filling is then packed into a pastry-lined mould, the egg placed in the middle and more filling packed on top.

A few manufacturers still prefer to use ordinary hardboiled eggs placed side by side in the middle of the meat

To the uninitiated, getting those stripes into certain brands of toothpaste seems an impossibility

Yet the secret of striped toothpaste is amazingly simple

Inside the nozzle of the tube is a grooved plastic plug. The grooves are packed with the coloured
