CO. COUNCIL REFUSE COLLECTIONS

Union Threatens Strike On Privatisation Move

A very large deputation of members of the ATGWU and AEU representing workers engaged in the county refuse collection service and a number of fitters employed at the Co. Council Machinery Yard crowded into the Courthouse in Dungarvan last Monday for the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council to stress their total opposition to any moves to privatise the Council's refuse collection. Outside a number of large refuse collection trucks were parked along the street.

Mr. Tony Mansfield, ATGWU District Officer, who acted as spokesman for the deputation outlined the history of the introduction and development of the service since 1985. However he said that no meetings had been held with the Council since May 1989 and the Union was dismayed to learn now that the Council was proceeding with plans to privatise the service.

"We are totally opposed to any such moves," said Mr. Mansfield, "and we will resist them by every means at our disposal. Our Shop Stewards Committee have decided to recommend to the membership

that whatever type of industrial action is required be taken, up to and including an all-out dispute."

Mr. Mansfield who added that the loss of twelve jobs was at stake if the privatisation went ahead, then told the Council members, "if the Council persists with its policy to privatise, then this recommendation will be put to our county-wide membership for decision by secret ballot."

The Union Secretary ended by pointing out that excellent relations existed between the Union and the Co. Manager and Council Officials but they were now stating their case so that there would be no am-

biguity in the matter.

When Mr. Mansfield had replied to a number of questions raised by Council members, the deputation withdrew.

CO. MANAGER'S STATEMENT

The Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne then asked the Co. Manager if he would state his position in the matter.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley declared that he had no position to declare in the matter as he was only carrying out a policy decision of the

Co. Manager's Report On Quigley Magnesite Land

He was satisfied that the plant site portion of the lands owned by Quigley Magnesite at Ballinacourty came within the definition of a Derelict Site, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley reported to the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday. And, he added, as a first step, the Company have been given notice under Section 8 of the Act of the Council's intention to include the plant site in the Register required to be maintained under the section subject to any representation they may wish to make by December 21.

Mr. Hurley further stated that he was aware that an interest has been shown by an industrialist with whom he has had discussions and he had confirmed that they had a six months option with the owners.

When Cllr. Jackie Fahey, T.D. said that he was glad to see that the site was at last to be declared derelict, the County Manager stressed that this only referred to the plant section of the site. He had written to the Quigley Magnesite Organisation pointing out that it was time for them to put their house in order and they now had until the middle of next year to do that.

Lismore Couple Charged With Drunk And Disorderly Behaviour

Robert A. Stuart, East Main Street, Lismore, was convicted at Lismore Court last week of refusing to quit a licensed premises on the night of August 4 last, and with being drunk and disorderly.

Stuart, who was also bound to the peace, was, however, acquitted on charges of assaulting three hotel bouncers on the occasion.

On the charge of refusing to quit the premises Stuart, who had four previous convictions for assault, was fined £25 and ordered to pay £195 expenses. He was fined £10 on the drunk and disorderly conviction.

His wife, Mrs. Sheila Stuart, was also fined £25 for refusing to quit the licensed premises, and a

drunk and disorderly charge was marked "taken into consideration." A charge of assaulting one bouncer was dismissed against her, and an application to bind her to the peace was refused.

During a lengthy hearing the court was told that garda assistance had to be called for when Robert Stuart tried to force his way past a number of bouncers into the local hotel. The trouble had arisen after the Stuart's son and a number of other

youths had earlier been asked to leave.

Robert Stuart denied lifting his hand to anyone that night and also denied pushing his way into the hotel past the bouncers.

However, District Justice W. F. O'Connell, said the Stuarts were drunk, violent and disorderly, and he said Robert Stuart was a man of "violent disposition" whose temper would lead him into serious trouble if he was not careful.

Supt. Ray McAndrew prosecuted.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

"The Footsteps Of Those Who Bring Good News Are A Welcome Sound"

Isaiah is almost bubbling over with joy in the first reading, because the Lord has revealed news of the promised Messiah to him. He sounds as if he must hurry to bring the glad tidings to the people. You must remember he lived 500 years before Christ, yet! he foretold in a clear manner the coming of the Messiah as well as giving the details and purpose of His ministry. Here, however, he is telling the people that there's a good reason to rejoice and to celebrate the Lord's coming. He asks them to put aside and forget about the past, and concentrate on looking forward and preparing for this great event. Rejoice, he said, for He will bring salvation to His people. It is worth noting that Isaiah's own name in Hebrew, signifies, salvation of the Lord.

St. Paul, in the second reading, tells us how we ought to prepare to meet the Lord. He mentions three essentials which he considers necessary for this purpose, namely, being happy to follow the Lord, being regular with prayer, and being constant in expressing thanks to God. He further adds, we must never allow ourselves to be satisfied with our state, because the new life requires continual attention and nourishment to maintain its strength and growth. You know, as well as I, if you sit and rest on your oars, the current will take control! I do not have to tell you that human nature is frail, and that life is full of dangerous currents and rapids. It takes watchfulness, effort and help to keep control. The moment one relaxes, one finds trouble. When I mentioned help, I did mean God's assistance without which it is impossible to do good. Paul does say, those who are wise in calling for God's help are guaranteed not to fail. Spiritual writers teach, the more one strives to love God, the more the Lord helps. That is why those, who place their trust in God, will tell you, they'd rather die than betray or offend their God.

The trouble with many is, they are so caught up in daily affairs that they scarce give a thought to the Lord, and then when they do meet Him at prayer, they feel like meeting a stranger. Why not ask God to be your companion, and take Him with you to your work place. He'll be happy to go with you. You'll find, it will change your outlook, and bring a new joy into your life. It will even change your attitude to your work. You'll feel more fulfilled. And, like Isaiah, you'll be bringing and radiating God's gentle influence wherever you go. It is the experience of those who build up a loving relationship with God that they'd endure and suffer any sacrifice to maintain it.

A SIGN OF CONVERSION

The Gospel relates an encounter between John the Baptist and the Pharisees. It is clear from the ensuing conversation that John's reputation as a teacher had reached such heights that people were wondering and asking if he were the Christ. When he denied he was the one, they asked, why then do you baptise? Baptism was a sign of conversion from one religion to another. He acknowledged that he had so acted, but explained it was done to prepare people for the Messiah's arrival. And, he went on to focus their attention on the joyful news that the Lamb of God was already in their midst. Had the reading extended to a few more verses, you would have been told that the Messiah did call people to His banner, and initiated them into His service through Baptism with the Spirit. Paul has already explained to us in the second reading that when we are born into this new life, we must develop it by following the example of the Master.

Recent experiences have made me realise that there's a growing criticism about the God we know and love, as well as a downright apathy about His Commandments. They do not want to know about His Commandments. They resent God intruding into their lives. They want to be free, but what they really mean is license. Well, I cannot see God bending down to accommodate evil. He has already given His directions, and they are for all time. It is we who must change. We must raise ourselves to His standards if we hope to gain salvation. So cherish your Faith, and you will live forever.

Connemara Visit By Old Parish Group

Seven members of the Old Parish Development Committee in the Waterford Gaeltacht paid a three-day fact finding visit to Connemara last week. The trip was arranged under Udaras Na Gaeltachta's "Cairdeas" Scheme established earlier this year. "Cairdeas" allows voluntary groups in the Gaeltacht an opportunity to meet with their counterparts in other Gaeltacht areas, in other parts of Ireland and, indeed, in similar peripheral parts of the European Community. This kind of communication and exchange of ideas encourages confidence and creates a link between communities in remote areas.

During their time in Connemara the Old Parish group visited the Udaras na Gaeltachta Headoffice in Furbo, the Telegael Television Production Studio in Spiddal and the Muinntearas-Gaeltacht Education Project in Lettermore. They also called to the Craft Centre in Spiddal and they had meetings with the Camus, Corr na Mona and Carna Development Associations as well as the West Connemara Community Project people.

The Old Parish Committee was formed two years ago to activate local efforts. In the meantime they have organised a Special Employment Scheme, in association with FAS and Udaras na Gaeltachta and Irish language classes were

arranged. There is an active ICA Branch in Old Parish as well as a Naionra (Preschool) and the children of the Community take a special interest in Irish dancing and musical instruments.

In the Old Parish group were Peig Bn. Ui Chadhla,

Maire Ui Riain, Sean O Murchu, Eamonn Breathnach, Peig de Paor, Mairtin O Cuirrin and Maire Ui Neylin. They were accompanied by Aine Marie Ui Chonchuir, Udaras na Gaeltachta's Community Development Officer in the South.

Abbeyside Pattern Notes

It is a great measure of gratification when we learn that through our efforts we can bring some satisfaction to people. One such case is a man called John Baker of Ilkestone in England, whose great grand-uncle called Allen was a member of the crew of the Moresby who lost his life when the ship was wrecked off Dungarvan on Christmas Eve, 1895.

John who is involved with a Museum and Arts Community Centre and Theatre in Ilkestone had heard from various sources about his great grand-uncle and the shipwreck, but for many years had not been able to learn of the whereabouts of his last resting place.

Eventually he heard about the mass grave in the old churchyard in Dungarvan and was determined to pay a visit.

The story, as related by John in a letter continues:

"Then in 1982, with the photograph and the reports from the paper of 1896 we planned to make the trip to Dungarvan when possible.

"In December last year a number of brochures arrived from our local travel agents, one immediately caught my attention "Six days in Southern Ireland," the first two nights to be based in Dungarvan." This was an opportunity not to be missed and booked the holiday straight away. Sadly, a double booking at the hotel in Dungarvan prevented our two night stay here, but the hotel in Tramore we so thoroughly enjoyed. I spoke to the driver of the bus and explained about our reason for visiting the area and he parked the bus long enough for my wife and I to visit the old churchyard. We just had forty-five minutes.

"The peacefulness of the place, the view of the bay, and armed with the old photograph of 1896, I clicked away with the camera, thinking that somewhere between the church and me was the resting place of great-uncle Allen. I was happy that I was near where my great-grandfa-

ther Emanuel had been for the burial. Suddenly I was aware that June, my wife, was tugging at my sleeve, turning, I just could not believe my eyes, that after almost a hundred years someone cared. There was the mass grave.

"All I could say was that I must talk to someone, but we were alone, then it seemed quite suddenly out of the blue, this kindly gentleman appeared, a hasty explanation that we had only minutes left, and pushing my newspaper cuttings into his hand with my hastily written address, we rushed off to the bus.

"Although such a short holiday in your beautiful country, it is one that we shall never ever forget. The weather was so good,

and the utter peacefulness of it all. The kindness wherever we stopped all made us more determined than ever to return again.

"I shall never ever forget the coast road ride from Tramore to Dungarvan, the morning sun on the peaceful waters of the bay, passing churches with congregations going to Mass.

"Coming into Dungarvan, full of anticipation, but not forgetting as we passed over the bridge, that our Duke of Devonshire had funded its building."

In closing John says — "once again my deepest and sincere appreciation on behalf of my family for all that you have done for the members of the Moresby, who lost their lives."

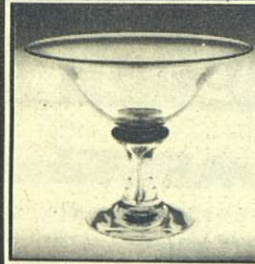

"How some clubs can justify going out of the county to participate in similar events and ignore their own is nothing short of a disgrace," she said, and she wondered "are we our own worst enemies."

REFEREES

Referring to their referees the chairperson said: "The position regarding referees is still chronic. We simply do not have enough people to go around and this puts extreme pressure on the handful of people who volunteer their services each year. Do not forget that we are also called upon to provide referees at inter-coun-

ty level and once again the old familiar faces come forward. I feel so strongly about this that I find it very hard to tolerate objections from clubs to certain referees when they do nothing about providing personnel themselves."

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

THINK BEFORE YOU DRINK IF YOU'RE DRIVING

An ever-reliable garda source has passed word to us to warn everybody about drinking and then driving on the roads of Waterford during Christmas.

The gardai will be more active than usual and drivers over the limit need not expect any seasonal goodwill from them. Too often in the past there has been slaughter on the roads around Christmas and drink has been the cause of many accidents. To counteract such an occurrence this year we have been informed that the full force of the law will be used.

The message is "think before you drink" and it should also be remembered that a heavy night's drinking can leave a person in an unfit state to drive even the morning after. It takes the human body an hour to burn one unit of alcohol so, if you consume ten pints the night before, you may still not be fit to sit behind the wheel the morning after.

House drinking around Christmas is notoriously dangerous. During the season of goodwill and giving, people are inclined to be heavy handed when pouring drinks with the result that, often without realising it, a person can be intoxicated in a short time.

The advice from the gardai is that if you are entertaining at home don't force alcohol on anyone who has to drive and the bottom line this Christmas is, be very, very careful and let somebody who is cold sober do the driving or — call a taxi.

THE CLASKIN SINGERS "SEASONAL SONGS"

The Clashmore-Kinsalebeg Parish Choir under the title of The Claskin Singers launched their tape of a beautiful selection of "Seasonal Songs" last Thursday night in Dungarvan.

A full account appears elsewhere in this issue and all we wish to do here is to recommend it as a most appropriate seasonal gift to all our readers. The "friends" who contribute to the tape are all well-known international artists who were born either in Waterford City or County, that is all except one — Pat Power. He is a fine tenor with an international reputation who was born in New Zealand but whose association with the county rests in the fact that his grandparents came from Clashmore. He contributes two very beautiful Christmas hymns, 'O Holy Night' and 'Silent Night,' to the tape.

SELECTION AND CARE OF YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE

Coillte, the State company now in charge of forestry is the largest producer of Christmas trees in Ireland and this year they

have produced 130,000 trees for the Irish market. Every year, in the run up to Christmas, Coillte receives many inquiries about these trees ranging from how one should select trees and how to care them and in response have issued the following advice.

You should select your tree bearing in mind where you want to put it. Choose a tree with a straight stem and even, dense branches with good overall shape. Ensure that it has a fresh colour. When you bring the tree home, cut an inch or two off the bottom of the stem and stand it outside in a bucket of water. Shake off any loose needles before you bring it inside and stand it in a bucket of wet sand to which you should add a pint of water daily — you should never let the tree dry out as the base will reseal itself and stop taking water.

Place the tree in the coolest part of the room away from fires and radiators and then, most important of all, remember — safety first. Make sure your tree is properly secured and positioned clear of doorways, stairs, heaters and open fires. Christmas tree lights can be dangerous if not properly wired so make thoroughly sure they have been tested. This will ensure you will then have a safe as well as a happy Christmas.

ITINERANT HALTING SITE PROBLEM

The controversy surrounding the siting by Dublin County Council of an itinerant halting site in

Mulhuddart, Co. Dublin which has been the source of nationwide publicity in recent times and which was climaxed with the jailing of a number of local residents who had continued their protest against the site in defiance of a High Court injunction, focuses the spotlight on the problem surrounding halting sites in general.

As the result of the initiative of Dungarvan Urban Council and County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley one of the first ever itinerant halting sites in the country was developed at Shandon, Dungarvan a few years ago in compliance with the suggestions of the Minister for the Environment. A great deal of money was expended on this site in providing all the required facilities and sanitary conveniences set out by the Environment Department.

Since this itinerant halt was established it has been occupied on a continual basis. But how has it been treated by the travellers for whom it was provided?

Mr. Hurley in his report to the annual estimates meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last month leaves us in no doubt when he states: "I must record my disappointment in the manner in which the facility has been treated by the occupants and the reluctance of the Department of the Environment to make money available for the continuous repairs necessary for the wanton damage and vandalism."

The Manager's report adds: "We had very little difficulty with the site or its occupants for the first twelve months or so of occupation, then the site was vandalised to the extent of £10,000 by some occupants. Appeals to the Department of the Environment for financial assistance to rectify the damage were not successful. Three units were put into a habitable condition and sad to say the situation has again deteriorated over the past six months. I cannot find local funds to remedy the situation . . ."

Mr. Hurley added that he was again in communication with the Department to see if they would make some financial allocation "to bring the situation under reasonable control."

During the ensuing discussion on the problem, Cllr. Billy Kyne remarked that in carrying out further repairs to the site, "it was only throwing good money after bad," while the Co. Manager said that when the Department of the Environment recommended to Local Authorities to take the provision of these halting sites on board, they should also take on board

the cost of maintaining and caretaking them.

There is a great deal of sympathy expressed for these itinerants up and down the country but it does not say much for them when they continually vandalise the magnificent facility provided for them in Dungarvan as they have been doing.

WATERFORD SUPPORT FOR TAOISEACH

Waterford Fianna Fail Dail Ceanntair at a meeting in Dungarvan last Friday night passed a vote of confidence in the leadership of the Taoiseach, Charles Haughey and in so doing reversed the decision taken by them last year.

The meeting expressed satisfaction with the Government and with Mr. Haughey's leadership despite the Presidential election defeat. Director of Elections, Pat Leahy, said that the organisation in Waterford had increased the Fianna Fail vote by ten per cent over the last General Election and delegates at the meeting agreed that Mr. Lenihan's defeat could not be blamed on the leader.

GORTNAMONA

While listening to Cork local radio while travelling through part of that county last week we were rather surprised to hear a pop group who have lately been winning international fame in such places as Yugoslavia and Moscow state that one of the songs which they had included in their most recent album was "Gortnamona." This is a song which was composed by the great Percy French and up to this has always been rendered as a concert rather than as a pop item.

But sure with so many of the great classics already adapted to pop tempo, such beautiful songs as "Gortnamona" were bound, sooner or later, to be targeted for the pop scene and now it has happened!

However for old time sake we will make it the choice for the ballad corner this week and pop fans will then also know the words when next they hear it in its modern upbeat style.

Mr. John Ryan, Retail Director, speaking on behalf of the Chamber outlined the campaign mounted by the Chamber this Christmas to encourage shoppers to do their shopping in Dungarvan and said that although it had just begun it was already proving very successful. 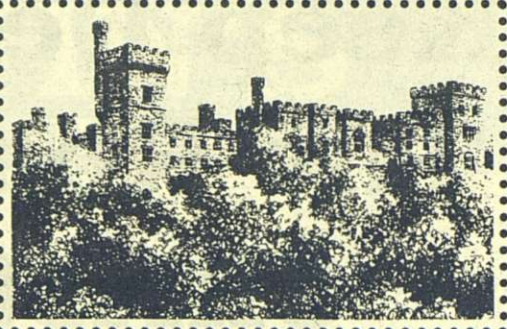

Keep Death Off The Roads For Christmas

In the last 10 years, 4,851 died on our roads. This is the equivalent of the population of a town the size of Fermoy. 1978 was the worst year ever on our roads: 628 people were killed. Since then there has been considerable improvement in the figures for death and injury. But for the last 3 years the number killed remains virtually unchanged: 1987: 462; 1988: 463; 1989: 460.

It seems we have arrived at a point where further substantial improvement requires a change of approach. One of the difficulties in promoting road safety is that the message is not new. Too high a percentage of road users accept road safety messages as "just the usual reminder."

THE ALCOHOL CONNECTION

December and August — the two holiday months — are the worst months for road deaths. Last year 44 people died in each of these months.

Saturdays and Sundays are the two most likely nights for people to go out for a drink. They are also

the two nights of the week when most road deaths occur.

Between the hours of 9 pm. and 3 a.m. the number of people killed is disproportionate to the numbers travelling on the roads.

The connection between these facts is alcohol. Over one-third of all road accidents are drink related. 5,753 people were convicted of Drink-Driving offences in 1989. 229 (4%) were female, 5524 (96%) were male.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

Law itself is not sufficient, it must have, and be perceived to have, rigorous enforcement.

The stepped-up Garda enforcement will again this year be a major part of the Christmas Drink/Drive Campaign and the Gardai say there will be "strict and rigorous enforcement of the law."

The safe way to deal with alcohol is simply not to mix it with driving or, as the National Safety Council says: "Keep Drink Out Of The Driving Seat."

Brighten up the indoors with carnations

RISING festive stars such as Christmas Cactus and Poinsettia, not to mention bulbs forced for the season, have tended to overshadow the seasonal attractions of carnations.

But the family also known as Dianthus are highly rewarding if sometimes temperamental plants for the winter months.

Generally, they don't make good pot plants because they are leggy and need support but some are suited to either indoor growth or raising in a cool greenhouse to provide cut blooms for display.

Fragrant

Even some garden varieties such as Chabaud will happily take to potting up and flowering in winter, but there are also perpetual flowering varieties available from the nurseries.

The advantage with these is that they give large showy blooms and are strongly fragrant, making them ideal to brighten up the indoors in winter or as gifts.

They are usually available as rooted cuttings in winter or spring but are also sold, at a price, as full grown plants in the run-up to Christmas.

Cuttings need care if you are to get the best from them so snip the tops when they have about 10 good pairs of leaves, later stopping any side shoots when they have grown five lots of leaves so that you promote bushiness and heavy blooms.

Try to stagger the stopping so that you cause the blooms to come on at different times and maintain a good display on the plant, but always quickly cut away all buds except one on each shoot to ensure that there is one large flower rather than several weedy

ones.

As the plant thrives you will need to pot on but keep to five or six inch pots to maintain a compact and free-flowering plant.

Support the plants with canes or purpose-made carnation supports of wire or plastic trellis. Failure to do this will result in the stems buckling suddenly under the weight of the blooms.

Carnations are also fussy about conditions so give them plenty of air and light but don't worry too much about coolness, so long as the location is free from frost.

Problem

About now they will be happy at about 45°F at night and up to 60°F during the day with careful watering to keep the soil moist. Too much water and you risk causing rot at the base of the stem though this problem can be reduced by fine limestone chippings sprinkled on the surface of the soil.

If the above care seems too much like hard work then look out for the spray varieties of carnation which are ideal for pots and do not require bud removal.

The drawback is the small if abundant blooms, but they could give you the confidence to try the "real thing" and nothing impresses visitors more than a colourful indoor display of carnations.

skin. Push the cheese stuffing inside along the breast and over the legs. It can be smoothed evenly by gently pressing the skin. Insert a few celery leaves inside the cavity, and place the chicken in an ovenproof casserole.

Heat the oven to 180°C, 350°F, Gas Mark 4. Drain the chestnuts and put about 12 whole ones around the chicken with the celery.

Pour over the wine and stock, cover the casserole and cook for one hour. Lift the chicken out of the casserole, put into a roasting dish. Increase the temperature of the oven to 200°C, 400°F, Gas Mark 6 and return the chicken, uncovered, to cook a further 30

minutes until golden and tender.

Meanwhile, strain the juices from the casserole into a jug, leaving the celery and whole chestnuts to keep warm. When the fat comes to the surface, skim off as much as possible, but put one tablespoon into a saucepan. Add the onion to the pan and cook gently until soft. Add the juices and the rest of the chestnuts and simmer for 10 minutes.

Puree the sauce in a blender or food processor then return to the pan to re-heat.

Serve the chicken garnished with the celery and chestnuts and serve the sauce separately.

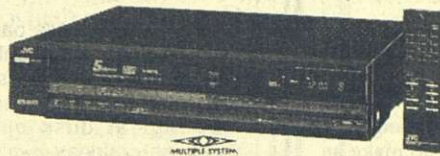

THE incredible world of animals never fails to amaze us. Here are some things you probably never knew about the kangaroo ...

WHEN, in 1770, Captain Cook's mariners questioned the natives in the unknown Australian bush about an animal that resembled nothing ever before seen on land or sea, they were told "Kangaroo!" Freely translated that means: "It would be hopeless to try to tell you!"

KANGAROOS live in bands of 20 to 50. They are entirely vegetarian and do most of their browsing in the early morning, at dusk or by moonlight; midday is given to rest and play.

THEIR favourite sport is boxing. A kangaroo's hands are very much like a man's

and he "puts up his dukes" in exactly the same way, holding them close to his chest, feinting at first then getting in some hefty clouts.

A kangaroo's hind foot has four toes, three so trivial they hardly count, but the fourth is tremendously long and strong with a razor-sharp tip. One kick can easily kill a powerful dog or a man.

KANGAROO'S teeth don't grow like other animals'. They have four pairs of

teeth on either side of their jaws. Only the front ones engage. When they're worn down, the ones behind move forward to take their place. And so on until there are no more teeth, at which stage the luckless animal dies of starvation, if it hasn't been killed by hunters.

THERE are 40 different species of kangaroo, the smaller ones of which are usually called wallabies. The largest is the red kangaroo, which stands taller than a man and is the biggest of all marsupials (animals who carry their young in pouches).

A newborn baby is less than one inch long and is only the weight of about six pins. Using its forelimbs this tiny creature drags itself through the fur of its mum's belly to the safety of the pouch.

ONCE inside, the baby has to search for the teat, which can take up to 20 minutes. It attaches itself to the nipple which swells in its mouth so that it is firmly anchored.

THE baby — called a joey — doesn't have to suck for milk, it is automatically pumped to it.



ABOUT five months after it arrives in the pouch, the young kangaroo sticks its head out for this first time. A few days later it climbs out completely, returning to feed. While it's away, mum cleans her pouch out with her tongue.

WHEN danger threatens, a baby leaps headfirst into the pouch and turns round as mum speeds away to safety.

KANGAROOS can live up to 45 years.

KANGAROOS are good swimmers. To escape the dogs of hunters, they often jump into water up to their waist and wait. As the dogs come thrashing out to them, they grab them and hold their heads under water. A strong old kangaroo has been known to drown half a dozen attacking dogs one by one.

A kangaroo in a hurry makes nothing of a broad jump of 30ft and he can lope along for miles in continuous gliding bounds of 15 to 20ft. He's been known to hit close to 50 mph on the straight.

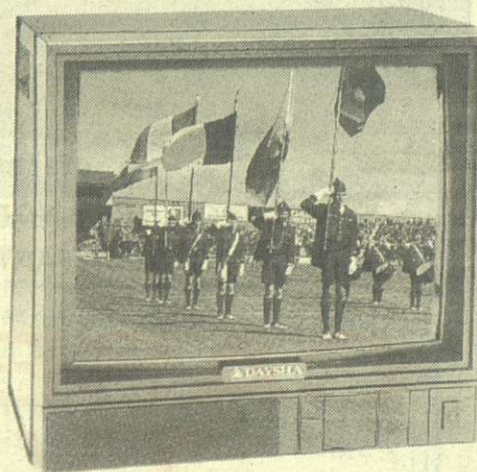



Due to the advances in medicine and health care technology, our children can now look forward to a brighter future.

"Zig and Zag" the RTE group which has become so popular with children through their daily tv programme have now released their first ever audio tape and they are donating all the royalties from sales to the Research Centre. The proceeds from this project will go directly to help pay for the first CAT Scan in a Children's Hospital in Ireland, which equipment will enable rapid access to serious head injuries and to the primary diagnosis of leukaemia, cancer and spinal diseases among others.

Ducting Decision Was Made By Urban And Not Co. Council

Stating that everyone was very pleased with the beautiful manner in which the streets of Dungarvan had now been carpeted, Cllr. B. Kyne, Chairman pointed out at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday that the underground ducting of the ESB cables had been initiated by a decision of the Urban Council taken in the late 70's and by nobody else.

Cllr. Kyne was obviously hitting at a claim by Deputy Fahey in a letter published in last week's "Leader" that notice of motion proposed by him at a Co.

Council meeting had been responsible.

County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, then stated that for the benefit of all he would like to point out in regard to the ducting of

the electricity cables that it was a mistake for anyone to think that it was the ESB who were responsible for this. "They did the work alright but we paid for it and dearly I

can tell you," said Mr. Hurley who added that in case anyone asked why the job was not extended further along some of the streets it was all a question of money.

Chinese Chef Must Pay £200 Compensation

A Chinese chef who inflicted an injury on a local man with a cleaver which necessitated seven stitches, was directed at Youghal Court last Friday to pay £200 compensation or face a prison sentence.

Gang Kuen Chan, 54 South Main Street, Youghal, was convicted of assaulting Alan O'Mahony, 57 Sarsfield's Terrace, Youghal, on November 10.

O'Mahony, an unemployed labourer, was convicted of assaulting Chan on November 3, and also of assaulting another chef, Bo Chang Chan, 57 South Main Street, on Nov. 12.

Bo Chang Chan, was ac-

quitted of assaulting O'Mahony on November 3 and 10.

O'Mahony was fined £10 on the first assault charge, £25 on the second, and he was bound to the peace for 12 months and ordered by the court not to frequent the Mandarin City Restaurant at 57 South Main Street during that time.

In a lengthy hearing, during which an interpreter was used in respect of the two defendants and a third Chinese witness, the court heard that in a fracas outside the Mandarin City Restaurant on November 10 O'Mahony was struck on the arm with a cleaver which Gang Kuen Chan had in his possession.

O'Mahony claimed that Gang Kuen Chan came at him swinging the meat cleaver which had a blade of about four inches. He was badly cut by it and was taken to a doctor to have the wound stitched. Kuen Chan, however, insisted that he had been using the cleaver in his work in the restaurant and that it was totally accidental that O'Mahony was cut in the fracas.

Garda John Walsh told the court that after an inci-

dent involving O'Mahony at the restaurant on November 3 he told witness that he would deal with the Chinese "in his own way."

District Justice W. F. O'Connell however said that while O'Mahony was probably spoiling for a fight on

the night he was injured by the cleaver nothing could excuse Kuen Chan for having it in his possession.

Convicting Kuen Chan of the assault, the Justice ordered him to pay £200 compensation to O'Mahony by January 4. He indicated that if on that date the compensation has not been paid he will impose a prison sentence on the defendant.

Stradbally Vet Returned For Trial

John Phelan, a 33-year-old veterinary surgeon of Cove Lodge, Stradbally, has been returned for trial on a murder charge to the present sitting of the Central Criminal Court in Dublin.

The accused appeared before District Justice Patrick Keenan Johnson at Waterford Court last Thursday on a charge that on September 20 at Carrowleigh, Rathgormack, he did murder one William Horan of Owing, Piltown, Co. Kilkenny, contrary to common law.

Unlucky Day For Clashmore Teenager

It wasn't a teenager's lucky day when he drove with excess alcohol last August, Youghal Court was told last Friday.

Gerard Ryan (18), Ballyheeny, Clashmore, pleaded guilty to driving with excess alcohol at Coolbagh, Clashmore, on August 6.

District Justice W. F. O'Connell was told that apart from being apprehended for the offence of driving with excess alcohol, Ryan's car, which he had purchased for £500, was written off after it had crashed into a pier. He also had to compensate the owner of the pier.

"It certainly wasn't his lucky day," commented the District Justice, who imposed what he termed a "nominal" fine of £25. In addition, the conviction was endorsed and Ryan was banned from driving for 12 months.

The Grand Finale As Faha And Newtown Battle For I.F. Honours

BALLYDUFF AND ST. SAVIOURS PLAY FOR THE U-21 'B' HURLING TITLE

If nothing unforeseen happens to the two games listed for next week-end, the curtain will fall on the 28 county championships in all grades, come next Sunday evening when the very attractive replay of the Newtown/Faha intermediate football replay is decided at Walsh Park.

On Sunday afternoon at Fraher Field either St. Saviours or Western champions, Ballyduff, will have been crowned as title holders of the Under-21 "B" hurling championship, which also is expected to produce quite an exciting contest.

It should be a week-end in which all our fixtures committees will breathe a sigh of relief at having completed a record programme of matches, the county finals of which, at one stage threatened to spill over into next year.

BALLYDUFF v. ST. SAVIOURS

This Under-21 "B" county final will be the last official match to be played here in the West for this year and after which Fraher Field will close for maintenance work.

This final hurling championship match of the year which is timed for 2 p.m. on Sunday will be seen as a chance for Ballyduff to gain some little compensation for having lost the senior final, but by all accounts, their chances are not wonderful because of the strength of this very highly rated St. Saviours team who took the Eastern division by storm and encountered very little difficulty in taking the title. They beat Erin's Own in their divisional final and after this and other games in which they played, the opinion was openly expressed that they would

have rated very well in the "A" championship.

The role of outsiders will no doubt help the Western champions and if players like Tom Feeney, Owen Corcoran, Fergal Hickey, Gordon O'Keefe, Gerome Quirke, Donal Hickey, James Scanlon, Michael Barry, etc., etc., play to their best form, I cannot perceive a great difference, unless St. Saviours are an exceptional team.

Kilrossanty are the only club to have taken an adult hurling title to this division this year, but here Ballyduff have a chance to make it a grand-slam of the underage hurling titles for the West.

St. Saviours must be given to vote to win, but it would be nice to see Ballyduff prove this prediction all wrong.

FAHA v. NEWTOWN

I don't believe that the football people throughout the county could wish for a more attractive game, with which to end the playing season. Very few of the big crowd who saw the drawn match will want to miss this clash.

Newtown footballers are trying to emulate the achievement of their hurlers (Ballydurn), and make a big bit of history by taking the double for their first time. It would really put the icing on the cake for a club with such a limited panel.

Faha too, are in line for

an historical achievement if they take the intermediate title in the year following their great win in the junior county final last year. This battle for promotion will result in one or other of the clubs going up to senior status next year and while this might be seen as an unsuitable grade for either, this will be the least of their worries when they meet on next Sunday.

It is difficult to know, at this stage, if the involvement in two county final replays, will help or hinder them on Sunday. It is reported that the level of training which they underwent under Kilkenny coach, Christy Heffernan, was very severe and thorough and I suppose this was obvious when they were able to stick the pace with only 13 players, for a time against the tremendous last quarter onslaught by An Rinn.

Faha who have just one code to look after, have been training very seriously as well and one of their clubmen told me a week ago that they were gearing themselves to be at their peak on the day of the replay.

The clubs had not named their lineouts at the time of writing, but the expectations are that each will field the teams that played in the drawn final. In fact well informed sources in both clubs will be surprised if there are changes.

This will see Faha with Tony Jeynes in goal, Ben Butler, Liam Connors and Michael Kiely in the full line of defence and Matthew Scurry, Paudie Casey and Edmond Lannon as their half back line. Gerry Casey and Pat Halloran will again form their midfield partnership and in their half-line of attack Raymond Kirwan, Brian Sweeney and Alan Sheehan will almost certainly be given the vote of confidence. John Troy, Kieran Power and Gerry Power will be in the full-forward line where their great experience will continue to worry Newtown right up to the final whistle.

Newtown could possibly be forced into making one change, but this may not be decided until later in the

week. Billy Walsh will again be their net-minder and in front of him will be Patsy Dunphy, Jim Harney and Bill Cummins. John Hally, John Harney and Thomas Kirwan will man their half-line of defence again. They will rely on county player, Peter Qucaly and his partner David Dunphy to command midfield again and in attack a vote of confidence is likely to be given to Padraigh Foran, Michael Hubbard and Alan O'Brien. Nicholas Halley, Jason Boland and Billy McCormack formed their full line of attack in the drawn match and it will surprise many of their supporters if there is a change here.

The game will bring all the flair and excitement of the last day and I expect their banner-waving groups of loyal supporters will all be there again to help make it a great occasion.

Who will win? Both sides are absolutely confident and there is no gamesmanship being attempted by either side in the speculations about the replay. It cannot again end in a draw as extra-time will be necessary if they are level again at the end of the sixty minutes, so one way or another there has to be a decision here.

Like everyone else, I don't know and cannot therefore give a confident vote to either team. I was tremendously impressed by the high level of fitness of the Newtown players in the junior hurling final and if fitness is to be the deciding factor on Sunday, then the result, just might favour the Eastern champions.

Under-21 Trial Off

Because of the prevailing weather condition, the Under-21 football trial which had been fixed for St. Augustine's College grounds on Sunday afternoon, was called off.

Supporters Clubs

The establishment of Supporters Clubs was discussed at length and in a big way by Central Council on Saturday last and within the next six weeks or so, a constitution for these groups will be published. In affording these clubs some official recognition, they are effectively bringing them under the control of the Association.

The Supporters Clubs will be precluded from interfering in County Board matters, or in any appointments in relation to any county team, county management or in relation to team expenses, etc.

Such clubs will have to submit annual accounts to county convention and should they at any time become in serious breach of G.A.A. rules, they can be disbanded by County Board.

It is no secret to say that such legislation became necessary because in a number of cases, things were getting out of hand as far as supporters groups were concerned. Some almost tried to abrogate the authority of their own County Boards.

The publication of this constitution, will pose very few problems for the Waterford Hurling Supporters Group who have been working in co-operation with the County Board since being set up about two years ago.

RULE DEFINED

The Central Council decided that it will not be considered a foul to bounce or toe-tap the ball before taking a free from the hand in future. In other words, players are given the same freedom with the football as they have been getting when playing sideline balls. The referee will now have to judge if the player who is taking the free overdoes the bouncing or toe-tapping, does not do so for the purpose of delaying the play to the advantage of his side.

This is not a rule change, it is instead a change of definition. When Congress passed the motion allowing a kick from the hand, earlier this year, they left it to Central Council to decide on how the change would be implemented.

The meeting on Saturday also decided on Rule Book changes and gave permission to have the rule book published in two sections, both in Irish and English. One book will deal with general rules and administration, etc., and the second will be in two sections, one for football and the other for hurling. In addition small booklets dealing with hurling and football rules will be published at the same time.

Western Board Meeting

The Divisional Board will meet at Dungarvan on Tuesday night for what is a winding-up meeting for the year. There are a few referees reports to be dealt with and the many clubs who gave walk-overs in the championships this season are summoned to attend.

The Secretary, Anthony Walsh will be in a position to tell the Board that the record number of matches involved this year have now been played and all our championships are completed.

Coaching Programme

With the coaching season coming to an end, no programme is published this week, but we will resume publication when the coaching scheme gets underway in the new year.

In reviewing the year's work, the county officers have expressed their complete satisfaction with the excellent manner in which Peter Power has carried out his duties and they are very happy with the results of expert coaching at schools and clubs.

Peter has expressed himself very pleased with the way the programme has gone and was loud in his praises of the many teachers throughout the county, both in Primary and Secondary schools, for their willing co-operation and help throughout the year. He said that without their help and goodwill, the scheme could not have enjoyed such success.

He has also thanked the many club officers who helped out with the juvenile club training.

G.A.A. NOTES

CONVENTION COMMENTARY

At the end of next week when all the nominations and motions are in the hands of the divisional and county secretaries, we will all have some idea of the names of the members who intend standing for the various positions on all the Boards for the coming year. At the moment the county is rife with rumour and if all the people whose names have been mentioned are to stand, we will certainly have, at least, a number of interesting contests.

The vacancy for the position of County Chairman continues to be a big topic for discussion and names like James Tobin, Ollie Wilkinson, the acting county chairman Frankie Cullinane and Tony Mansfield are all being bandied about, and I won't be surprised if there are others also. It is being rumoured, too, that the deposed chairman, Eamon O Murchu, may be nominated, but whether or

not he would allow his name to stand is something for which we must wait and see.

There are rumours as well that other positions on the Board will be contested. In these cases the names being mentioned are less plentiful, at least for the moment.

The recent marathon County Board meeting, which was the most acrimonious and bitter in our

history, seems to have done a lot of harm and for the past couple of weeks we have been making the headlines for all the wrong reasons. The thinking in some quarters here at the moment is that there may be a carry-over of the dispute to the Convention, but hopefully, wiser council will prevail and clubs will realise that the County Board took the right decision and the only decision possible in the circumstances.

Motions for the County Convention will close on December 19 and all convention documentation for the Divisional Convention must be in the hands of the Board Secretary two days later on December 21. Rumours have been circulating in the West that two of the officers intend to retire, but this has now been scotched by declarations by Anthony Walsh, Board Secretary and Paddy Fitzgerald, Treasurer, who have been mentioned as two officers who are standing down, that they will again stand for their respective positions on the Board.

Jim Landers is being spoken about as a candidate for the post of Board Secretary in the West, but until nominations are in, no one can say for certain what the convention line-up will be like.

MOTIONS

Submitting motions for either divisional or county conventions seems to have become something of a worthless exercise in recent times as for the most part the subject of the matter contained in motions are for Board and not convention decision. In our situation, motions are submitted for the purpose of testing the feelings of clubs before final decisions are taken at the appropriate meetings of the Divisional and County Boards.

There is the feeling in this county that county convention and not County Board should have the right to decide on such matters as the format of the various championships for the coming year, but in order to have this matter changed to our liking, it would need to have Congress approval.

I know that a motion has now been submitted to county convention to have the relevant general rule changed. Presuming that this will have the support of all clubs, it will go to

Congress where the final decision will be made.

REPRESENTATION AT CONVENTION

Because of the change in the format of our affiliations, as agreed by County Board, at its December meeting last year, club representation at all our conventions this year will be much smaller than usual.

Minor clubs will not be represented at any of the conventions and the adult representation will also be reduced. Example: in previous years, clubs (like Dungarvan as a case in point) who had two votes for each of their adult clubs, will now have only a total of two votes because they are now designated as one club instead of two. This will apply to units all across the county. Their regular County Board representative will have a vote in his own right. To be more precise, very many of our clubs who had eight delegates before will have only three. What result this will have on voting patterns remains to be seen.

Awards 1990

The committee who normally deal with the selection of the players to be honoured, are expected to meet over the next week to name their choices for adult and underage hurler and footballer of the year.

A different committee will examine the activities of clubs in the county before naming the 'club of the year' for 1990.

Selecting the players will not be easy as there are several on both categories who could be named for the honour.

The number of clubs to be short-listed for the club of the year honour, can I suppose, be listed on one hand. It is expected that the list of winners will be published before Christmas.

Scor Finals

The County Scor (Juvenile) finals will take place at Tallow on Saturday next at 7.30 p.m.

HURLING TRIAL

Despite the bitterly cold wind which prevailed at the Ardmore venue on Sunday afternoon, the county senior hurling trial went ahead as planned and the two very committed teams — the Blues and the Whites — gave of their best and entertained the small crowd who braved the icy conditions.

It was a high scoring match which produced a total of 13 goals over the hour. Five of the goals for the winning Blues team and three of their points were scored by Billy O'Sullivan. The halftime score was Blues 5-1 and Whites 2-4. In the second half, the winners, captained by Ray Sheridan, drew away to win very comfortably by 10-7 to 3-6 for the Whites who were captained by Liam O'Connor.

Council taken at the Estimates meeting to investigate all aspects of the refuse collection. He was in the process of doing this and if any proposals emerged from this investigation he would then arrange a meeting with the Union. "That is if I have anything to discuss, as I may not" said Mr. Hurley who then added "in the cir-

cumstances I think this whole thing is premature and the matter is one that should be put on ice for 5 to 6 months."

The Chairman Cllr. Kyne brought the discussion to a close when he declared that the Union had now made their position crystal clear and he moved on to the next business before the meeting.

Formal Investigations Into Ballycotton Tragedy

The Tanaiste and Minister for the Marine, Mr. John P. Wilson, T.D., issued the following statement last Friday:

"The process of setting up the Formal Investigation which I announced into the loss of life off Ballycotton on July 7 last is a complex and intricate legal matter. All available resources have been devoted to ensuring that all the legal requirements are met so that justice is not only done, but seen to be done. Counsel have been appointed to advise on the setting up and preparation for the Formal Investigation. At Middleton District Court on Decem-

ber 17 next at 11 a.m. a formal application will be made to Justice M. C. Reilly, a Justice of the District Court, by or on behalf of Capt. W. A. Kirwan to hold a Formal Investigation into the Ballycotton marine casualty under Section 466(1) of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894. It will be a matter for the court to decide on the date for the commencement of the Formal Investigation."
