Waterford Escapes Brunt Of Brutal Week-End Storms

While many parts of the country were counting the cost on last Monday of the worst storm for many years in which 14 people died and property damage was estimated at £15 million, Waterford county and city were counting themselves lucky to have been spared from the brunt of the brutal storm.

The west coast suffered the worst battering in living memory while in Portumna, Co. Galway, the local community was stunned by the death of a local youth and six Swiss tourists killed when a 100-year-old beech tree was blown down and crushed the minibus in which they were travelling.

Waterford, however, was not left untouched by tragedy due to the storm as 35-year-old farmer Richard Kennedy of Clondonnell, Rathgormack was electrocuted when he caught a telephone wire which had fallen across an ESB cable. Married with three children, the accident occurred while Mr. Kennedy was working on his brother's farm at Clondonnell.

As the fearsome storm lashed the coastline from Donegal to Kerry, Water-

ford luckily saw the worst of the elements safely by-pass the county.

On Monday evening last, Mr. Tom Linneen, County Senior Executive Engineer in an interview with the "Leader" said he was glad to be able to report that all the coastal protection works carried out by the County Council during the past few months had held up well and had come through the storm with flying colours. At the same time, Mr. Linneen pointed out that as the storm force winds on this occasion blew from a North-West and South-West direction, the Waterford coastline was out of the line of fire. "Out coast is vulnerable to the south and south-east gales and these were the ones that caused so much devastation in the storm that struck us this time last

year," he said.

Coast protection and remedial works following last year's storms costing a total of £819,000 have been in progress by the Co. Council from Ardmore to Tramore in recent months. A major job costing £263,000 is nearing completion at Bonmahon while other major projects involved include Clonea £34,000, the Cunnigar in Dungarvan £45,000 and Ardmore £42,000 which is due to commence shortly. Minor works are also listed for Ballyvoile, Whiting Bay, Ballymacart and other parts of the coast. The Department is providing a grant of 50% of the total cost with the Co. Council funding the balance.

Mr. Linneen added that apart from black ice on some roads and a number of trees blown down there was no serious damage caused by the week-end storm throughout the county. Council road-workers had been busy spreading grit and salt on the roads and pathways.

SNOWFALL

Falling temperatures saw a fairly heavy snowfall throughout the county on Monday and the Met Service weather report forecasts a continuation of the bad weather with spells of sleet, snow and rain with winds swinging around to the south-east up to the end of this week.

Glass Workers Go On Short Time

Waterford Glass workers have started short-time working with a £40-a-week cut in wages in a move to return the ailing crystal industry to profitability.

The short-time working has been introduced for three months to off-set over-capacity and a fall in orders at the three crystal plants in Waterford and Dungarvan.

Most of the 2,300 crystal workers did not re-start production until last Monday.

The company resorted to short-time working rather than costly redundancies and the loss of valuable skills.

Chief Executive, Dr. Paddy Galvin, said that short-time working would be constantly reviewed with a return to normal working if orders improved.

Short-time breaks will be introduced on St. Patrick's week, Easter, Summer holidays and September.

Tragic Death of Young Dungarvan Farmer

A 39-year-old farmer was crushed to death in a tragic accident on the family farm at Ballycullane, outside Dungarvan last Friday.

Michael Lenihan, Ballyguiry, was readjusting a buckrake at the rear of the tractor when it jammed on him.

He was pinned between the buckrake and the safety frame and was left with no method of escape. It is believed that he died shortly afterwards.

The grim discovery was made by his wife, Mrs. Brenda Lenihan and 11-year-old son Mark, an only child.

Mr. Lenihan's body was removed by ambulance to the Waterford Regional Hospital where a post mortem examination was carried out. An inquest will be held.

TALLOW ENTERPRISE GROUP

Activities during the year just passed included the very successful Sculptors Workshop, A Start Your Own Business Course — both of which ended with wonderful exhibitions, classes in German, Computer Literacy, Dramatic Ability, Children's Crafts, running a Tourist Information Office and Typewriting Bureau, a very successful Christmas Market etc. The group also hosted visitors from Pont St. Pierre in France with a view to exploring the possibility perhaps to twinning. Members of Tallow group have been invited the French town in 1991.

Members of the group have started 1991 with equal enthusiasm. At present the Enterprise Group have an SES course running. In just a few short weeks results are already showing with new flowerbeds appearing. During the present bad weather the workers on this scheme are doing some renovations to St. Patrick's Hall so the benefits of the scheme will be felt by all the community — true co-operation.

An intensive 30 week Evening Course for members of the group on Developing Enterprise in the Community started on January 3 last. This course is being run by Fas, who have provided a facilitator Mr.

Patrick Fleming. The group have invited all those who have approached them for support during the past few months to attend the first training session. There are a number of others who will be attending but who were unable to make it on January 3. If there are others in the community who might like to benefit from this programme the group will facilitate them if possible. The attendance on Thursday night was truly international, including English and Dutch people. Also visiting the 1st session was Mr. Martin O'Loughlin who has been sponsored by Chamber of Commerce in

South East to help and support groups who are showing initiative like Tallow Group.

WLR/Lions Club Radio Appeal Raises £46,500

Waterford's Independent Radio Station raised £46,500 for the local Lions Club. WLR FM raised the money during Christmas week for the Lions Club seasonal hamper appeal. The money was raised by an outside broadcast and on-air auctions and resulted in over 1,600 hampers going to the needy in Waterford city and county. The original target figure was £30,000 and surplus funds will be distributed to local charities.

WLR FM's Managing Director, Des Whelan, said he was delighted with the response from the station's listeners and with the positive reaction from businesses and industry in the South East. He added that the station looked forward to becoming involved in more fundraising and charity awareness drives.

GREAT EFFORT IN DUNGARVAN

the focus switched to Dungarvan where the WLR Mobile Broadcasting Unit was parked at the Square and well assisted by members of Dungarvan Lions Club a sum of nearly £7,000 was realised through auctions and collections from the general public. Included in this was a sum of £1,440 collected by the Fire Service members who carried out a marathon ladder climb at

the Square on the Saturday during which the fully uniformed firemen climbed a total of 18,000 feet. All told a most satisfying effort by Dungarvan.

Deputy Fahey Recovers After By-Pass Surgery

During the final Dail sitting before the Christmas recess, Deputy Jackie Fahey, the Dungarvan based Fianna Fail T.D., was taken ill and was taken to the Blackrock Clinic in Dublin where he underwent heart by-pass surgery on Thursday, December 20.

Deputy Fahey had undergone tests when first taken to the Clinic when he was informed that open-heart surgery would be necessary.

The operation has proved a complete success and although he was hospitalised over Christmas, Deputy Fahey is expected to return to his home in Dungarvan shortly and in plenty of time to celebrate his 63rd birthday on January 23.

We wish him a speedy recovery and a return to full health and hope to see him out and about on his constituency work again soon.

Bonmahon Lifeguard Service Pays Tribute To Drowned Schoolboy

The 14-year-old County Tipperary schoolboy who lost his life in a drowning tragedy at Bonmahon last July, is being remembered in a very fitting way by the local Lifeguard Service.

The Bonmahon Lifeguard Service has decided to name its new £15,000 in-shore lifeboat after Paul Hanrahan of Grangemockler who was drowned on July 25 last after his mother, three sisters and brother, had gone to the popular Bonmahon beach for the day.

"Everybody involved in the local lifeguard service

are very keen to remember young Paul, and we have decided that the new in-shore boat will be named the "Paul Hanrahan Lifeboat," said P. J. O'Shea, secretary of the Bonmahon Lifeguard Service.

Mr. O'Shea said the new boat will play a very important role in the rescue service along the south-east coast. Money is presently being raised to fund additional expenditure for the procurement of safety equipment and an engine, while three crews have already been trained to operate the new service.

Pause For Thought

WE ARE CALLED TO OPEN THE EYES OF THE BLIND

Fr. Paddy

The Advent season prepared and created within us a longing to meet and to befriend the God-child. It made us realise the privilege and the benefit of being His companion. We learned He came to direct, to help and to save. Now, that we understand the mystery of life, it is time we forgot about chasing moonbeams, and got down to serious work. We know that when Jesus came great numbers ignored Him, and paid no heed to His message. Our eyes have been opened to the truth. We accepted His word without question, and we rejoiced and felt honoured that we were offered a place in His kingdom. Of course, we understand that our faith must be alive. We must prove our worthiness. So, as we enter 1991, let us resolve to make it a year of faithful service.

This coming Sunday, the first reading is full of encouragement for those who enter the New Year with the intention of living it for God. Isaiah assures them that they'll not falter no matter how difficult their mission; and, they'll have the added bonus of helping to restore the damage caused by the fall as well as reaping glory for themselves. He goes on to tell them that just as the Lord chose the Jewish people to be His instrument, He has now chosen you to implement His teaching, and help to open the eyes of the blind, and free them from their

darkness. In short, you are to radiate God's light. If you live with Christ, you will act like Him. You will be His instrument. You will save souls.

The role of the Messiah, the Son of God, was first and foremost to do His Father's will, and bring salvation to the world. Having organised and established His Church, He directed His followers to watch over and continue the work of restoration. Yes, you have a part. The Lord wants you to help and to share in the promotion of His work.

St. John, in the second reading, urges us not to turn our backs on God's invitation, but to gladly accept the task, and feel honoured that we've been asked. As I indicated already, if you believe, you accept responsibilities, you accept commitments. People would not listen to the prophets. And, when the Son of God came, and accomplished works no other man had ever done, the vast majority would still not accept Him. God testified to the Divinity of His Son, but they still rejected Him. Generally,

people are ready and willing to accept the testimony of men about ever day affairs, so they should, had they responded to God's helps, have been equally ready to give ear to God's word. I referred to the duties, which our faith places upon us, so perhaps, therein lies the problem. Love of God is expressed through the Commandments. And, if these same people would only listen to John, he'd assure them that if they love God, they'll find "His Commandments are not heavy."

NO CHANGE IN GOD'S LAW

Take any town in the country. I'd doubt if you'd dare question the goodness of the vast majority of the people, but, if one is to judge from what is said and done, then, there would seem to be a growing increase among those, who ignore God's Commandments. The passage of centuries has not changed one jot or tittle of God's law, and so it will

continue to the end of time. No one can change it, and no one is exempt from it. It is accepted that Civil Laws, when based on solid principles and instituted for the welfare of the people and the State, are good and necessary. Indeed, we may grumble about their strictness, but in our hearts, we know it is a small price to pay for the protection of the community. You've only to consider the laws controlling road traffic! Likewise, the Commandments are framed to protect man's rights as well as those of God. Of course, they are restrictive, but, like the code for the road, these laws are necessary for our well-being here and our salvation hereafter. It is important to bear in mind, the Commandments are based on the will of God.

The Gospel gives us an account of the Lord's Baptism, which marked the beginning of His public mission. It was almost three years later, when His own mission was completed, He handed control over to His apostles, and told them "Go, therefore, make disciples of all the nations; and baptise them . . . and teach them to observe all the commands I gave you."

Do take careful note of the account of the Lord's Baptism, and you'll reach a deeper understanding of your new life in Christ. When you were emersed in the waters, it signified the death of your old way of life; and when you emerged, the heaven's opened, and the Holy Spirit descended into your soul. Your Heavenly Father shows His delight when He beholds His newly adopted son. From thereon, you have a duty to live as befits your new status.

How may I ask can we expect them to be any better as officers of the Western Board where experience and track record is important.

In this respect I will only refer to our own candidate, present Western Board chairman, and club secretary Jimmy O'Gorman. Jimmy as everyone knows is a "real" G.A.A. man and has been all his life as a player, referee, club official and Western Board chairman for the last twelve months. It could not be described as "bigheaded" to describe Lismore G.A.A. as being one of the most successful clubs and I've just learned that Lismore has been announced as "Club of the Year" 1990. I congratulate all concerned on this magnificent achievement and I know that this success was brought about by a large number of players and officials, led by an efficient underage committee and adult officers not the least of whom is Jimmy O'Gorman, who combines his onerous work as club secretary with his duties as Western Board chairman in a way that few could match.

So, Western Board convention delegates, be practical when it comes to choosing who you want to run your affairs for 1991, put in the experienced candidates and G.A.A. people and let the would be "takeovers" and "coups" glory hunters go back to trying to improve their own clubs and prove themselves capable of running for higher office at a later day.

WATERFORD G.A.A.'S OUTMODED METHODS

The year 1990 marked my thirtieth year as a Waterford hurling supporter. I had just turned eleven when I attended my first big championship match, and saw Waterford surrender their All-Ireland crown to Tipperary on a wet day in Limerick in June, 1960. The previous year I had been considered too young to partake in Waterford's march to glory.

Little did I suspect then how long I would have to wait for a repeat performance. Apart from the League and Munster Championship double in 1963, there has been little reward for the countless admission fees I have paid since then: an Under-21 Munster Championship title in 1974 and two Munster Under-16 Divisional titles in 1982 and 1988.

Over the last thirty years I have witnessed the emergence of Galway and Offaly as major hurling powers (the latter from an effective population base of hardly 25,000). In Munster, Limerick have won four Munster titles and one All-Ireland. Clare may not have been able to make a championship breakthrough, but at least they have had some consolation in the form of a couple of League titles in the 1970s.

In terms of facilities, the last three decades have seen the construction of fine stadia in all the Munster counties EXCEPT Waterford. In Dungarvan, until recently the only "developments" since the GAA took over the Gaelic Field were the closing off of the "terrace" side of the ground and the collapse into dereliction of the stand at the Show Grounds (where I watched many big camogie games and played many games myself as a child). Decent changing rooms were only installed after they had already become common place even among many junior clubs, and after many years of embarrassment from observing visiting county teams making their way to local hotels still fully togged out (and frequently covered in mud) to change after the match.

Meanwhile in Walsh Park, most spectators at big matches still have to make do with an open-air grassy (or muddy) bank. I was astonished to find on a recent visit to the ground that a proper scoreboard had finally been installed. How long more will we have to endure the ramshackle excuse for a scoreboard in Dungarvan? In both Dungarvan and Waterford the public toilets are a disgrace — and appallingly unhygienic as well.

In terms of the organisation of games within the county, the situation is almost as bleak. While other counties have responded to

the growth of alternative sports and other forms of recreation by developing comprehensive league structures and putting the emphasis on playing games rather than winning championships, Waterford continues to limp along with outmoded methods which allow top teams to wait up to two months at the height of the summer between competitive games.

Over the last thirty years, a relatively small number of prominent people have been at the helm of GAA affairs in Waterford. Most of these have been involved throughout the bulk of this period. Their record of achievement, both on and off the field of play, has clearly been less than satisfactory. I well remember, when the services of Joe McGrath as manager of the county team were being dispensed with in 1981, one of these prominent personalities issuing a statement to the national press to the effect that "We have our own ways of doing things in Waterford." We have indeed, but I for one would not wish to boast about them. I have often wondered to what extent can the recurrent collapse of Waterford teams in big matches in recent years be put down to the way we have been prepared to put up with low standards within the county?

From what I hear, GAA affairs in Waterford may be at something of a crossroads at the moment. We desperately need new people at the helm people with vision, ability and leadership qualities. Whether such people — are available — or are prepared to make themselves available — is a question I am not in a position to answer. What I do know is that, if things continue as they are, we are simply going to fall farther behind those counties which have got their act together. And, while I am undoubtedly prepared to continue travelling in hope rather than confidence, and stand on muddy banks in the pouring rain, it would be nice to look forward to watching champion Waterford teams in relative comfort in my advancing years.

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

LIVES SAVED — AND LOST DURING THE CHRISTMAS PERIOD

The official figures showing that as a result of the Christmas and New Year Garda crackdown on drink driving, the death toll on the roads was cut almost in half fully justifies the claim of new Garda Commissioner Patrick Culligan when he stated on Monday last, "it was a good Christmas campaign and although we cannot maintain the same level of activity over the twelve months, we intend to utilise our resources to keep the pressure on."

During the campaign, the Gardai manned a total of 17,245 checkpoints nationwide and the number of motorists breathalysed reached 4,468 of which about 1,000 now face court action. In the Waterford/Kilkenny Garda Division there were 654 checkpoints with 194 being breathalysed.

The number of road deaths over the period was 25 which compares more than favourably with the 45 deaths which occurred in road accidents during the same period in 1989.

But while these figures indicate a big saving of lives as a result of road accidents, one wonders whether the hand of fate intervenes to maintain the law of averages. While the road fatalities were reduced by 20, the death toll was increased by 14 lives lost in the storms of last weekend.

A TIMELY VISIT CAN SAVE A LIFE

Last February while on a routine afternoon patrol at Graigenagour, Bally-

macarbry, Sergeant Maurice Walsh of Ballymacarbry Garda Station, attracted by a pall of smoke drove up a laneway to a farmhouse which, he found, was then on fire. The 68-year-old owner of the house, retired farmer Thomas Barron, stood in a shocked condition outside the front door. He had been badly burned in the face and right hand but wanted to go back into the house, which was by then a blazing inferno, to retrieve a sum of money and a motorcycle.

Were it not for the timely visit of Sergt. Walsh, Mr. Barron could well have lost his life. The Sergt. arranged for his transference to hospital where he subsequently made a good recovery.

By a strange coincidence Sergt. Walsh became involved in an almost replica rescue just before this Christmas. On Saturday evening, December 22, by prior arrangement with Garda Pat Norris of Lismore and using the Lismore Garda Patrol car they drove around the remote outlying areas of Kilnacar-

riga and Middlequarter, Newcastle for the purpose of visiting and checking on the old people living in the areas of the Ballymacarbry sub-district.

Having called to a number of houses and shortly before 4 p.m., they visited the home of Richard Walsh, a 65-year-old single farmer who lived alone in a most isolated part of the district. They found the occupant standing in front of an open hearth fire. He had serious burns and told them that he had fallen asleep beside the open fire and fell in. The pain of the burns awoke him.

As the unfortunate man was in a serious condition, Sergt. Walsh and Garda Norris took him in the patrol car and rushed him to the hospital in Clonmel where he received medical attention and was later removed by ambulance to Our Lady's Hospital, Cashel where he has since made steady progress.

Again were it not for the timely visit of Sergt. Walsh and Garda Norris another life could well have been lost.

These two incidents re-inforce the value of calling on and keeping in touch with the elderly, especially those who live alone in isolated out-of-the-way areas.

In this regard, Garda Supt. Ray McAndrew, Dungarvan, stresses the role of the Community Alert Organisations in West Waterford and the co-operation of the local residents in each of the areas in which they operate. As of now there are five Community Alert areas in the Dungarvan Garda District as follows: Coolnasmear, Colligan, Kilbrien and Kilgobinet (organised under the auspices of Macra Na Tuaithe); Lismore and Ballysaggart (organised by Macra and St. Vincent de Paul); Touraneena (organised by the local community); Fourmilewater and Nire (local community) and Abbeyside and Garranbane (outside the village surroundings). In addition there are two Neighbourhood Watch Schemes in operation in the Dungarvan area, one in Abbeyside and the other in the Lios Mor Avenue - Comeragh Crescent - Hillview Drive district.

We fully endorse the view expressed by Supt. McAndrew in regard to the important role to be played by members of the community participating in the Community Alert organisations particularly in calling on and keeping in touch with the elderly especially those who live alone in isolated

places.

All this certainly proves that regular contact can be the means of saving lives which might otherwise be lost. There can be no better example of civic spirit than the care we display for the other members of the community amongst whom we live. A good neighbour is a wonderful asset to have in any area.

PRESERVING OUR HERITAGE

In presenting his report on the annual estimates to members of Dungarvan Urban Council last November, the County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley referred to the supermarket development at Davitt's Quay, "which has commenced in accordance with the planning permission granted during the year."

Mr. Hurley stated that this development would be magnificent both architecturally and commercially when completed and would be in conformity with planning conditions which envisaged the external area of the building to be in line with the exterior of the buildings on the Quay in Dungarvan over 150 years ago.

The site has now almost been cleared of the old buildings that had stood there but some people have expressed regret that in the clearing process, a fine example of the architecture that graced the quayside in the middle of the last century has been lost. It is indeed a pity that on occasions like this, so much of our heritage has to be sacrificed on the altar of progress.

BANK THOSE BOTTLES

Now that the Christmas and New Year celebrations have finally come to an end and the holly, the decorations and the Christmas trees have been taken down for another year, the question of how to dispose of the many empty glass bottles left around comes up.

We would appeal to all our readers not to discard these in a haphazard manner but to place them in the Bottle Bank located at the Davitt's Quay carpark in Dungarvan or if more convenient in the Bottle Bank at the carpark in Youghal.

By doing this you will be helping the funds of the Re-Hab Institute which operates the Bottle Banks at both locations and will be disposing of those empty bottles in the safest possible manner.

In Kerry Long Ago — The Valley Of Knockanure

One of the most stirring and poignant ballads which tells of an incident in Ireland's fight for independence in 1920-21 is "The Valley of Knockanure." It tells of an ambush which took place in Knockanure in North Kerry when three young Kerry men gave their lives in an engagement with a convoy of Black-and-Tans.

As Paddy Tunney, well-known singer of Irish ballads, records in the current issue of "Treoir," if Bryan McMahon had never written another line (besides "The Valley of Knockanure") he would be remembered forever wherever green is worn.

Without doubt, no other ballad inspired by the War of Independence evokes the pain and poignance, and the pride of a people rising to shake off the chains of suppression . . . "For the wildgeese fly where the heroes lie in the Valley of Knockanure" . . . men dying alone in the loneliness and desolation of a wild glen.

So if you want to sing a good song sing Bryan McMahon's "The Valley of Knockanure"—

You may sing and speak about Easter Week and the heroes of Ninetyeight,
Of the fearless men who roamed the glen for victory or defeat,
There were those who died on the green hillside, they were outlawed on the moor,
Not a word was said of the gallant dead in The Valley of Knockanure.

There was Dalton, Walshe and Lyons boys, they were young and in their pride,
In every house, in every crowd, they were always side by side,
The Republic bold they did uphold, though outlawed on the moor,
And side by side, they fought and died in The Valley of Knockanure.

It was on an autumn evening these three young men lay down,
To wait upon a brief dispatch to come from Tralee town,
It wasn't long till Lyons came on saying "Time isn't mine nor yours,
But alas! 'twas late, and they met their fate in The Valley of Knockanure."

Upon a neighbouring hillside we listened in calm dismay,
In every house for miles around a maiden knelt to pray,
They're closing in around them now, with rifle fire so sure,
And Dalton's dead and Walshe is down in The Valley on Knockanure.

For they brought them hence beyond a fence wherein the furze did bloom,
Like brothers so they faced the foe to meet their vengeful doom,
When Dinny spoke his voice it broke with a passion proud and pure,
"For our land we die as we face the sky in The Valley of Knockanure."

There they lay on the damp, cold clay, martyred for Ireland's cause,
Where the cowardly clan of the Black-And-Tan has shown them England's laws,
No more they'll feel the soft breeze steal o'er uplands fresh and pure,
For the wildgeese fly where the heroes lie in The Valley of Knockanure.

As the evening sun was sinking beyond the Feale and Lee,
The pale moon was rising 'way out beyond Tralee,
The glistening stars shone bright afar
And gleamed o'er Cullen's Moor,
And the banshee cried where the heroes died in The Valley of Knockanure.

I met with Dalton's mother and these words to me did say,
"May the Lord have mercy on my son who fell in the fight today,
Could I but kiss his cold, cold lips, my aching heart 'twould cure,
And I'd gladly lay him down to rest in The Valley of Knockanure."

Give a plant houserom this winter

HOUSEPLANTS come into their own during the months that the garden lacks life and colour.

For a tall and dramatic houseplant can make all the difference to a room during winter gloom — a fact appreciated by the Victorians who loved palms and sturdy aspidistras.

The latter is also traditionally known as the Cast Iron Plant due to tolerance of draughts, poor light and erratic watering, but would-be indoor gardeners should note that few other varieties



are as forgiving.

Draughts can be a particular killer in winter and while many can survive fluctuating temperatures, they hate stuffy heat created by central heating. Regular misting with a hand sprayer can help but it

is also possible to create localised humidity for houseplants.

Firstly, you can group plants together in groups to create their own moist atmosphere. The effect can be dramatically improved by standing the group on

gravel in a shallow tray or container. Then pour water in up to the bases of the pots and keep it topped up.

The evaporating water will create a mini tropical forest effect, ideal for palms with love wet soil and muggy surroundings or they suffer from browning leaves and can even die.

Another way of boosting humidity is to set the plant's pot inside a larger one filled with peat which is kept saturated to create moist air.

Memories Of Growing Up In West Waterford

— HUNTING AND DANCING ON ST. STEPHEN'S DAY

Have you ever thought of how you spent St. Stephen's Day when you were growing up. I must say I didn't until the last St. Stephen's Day. I was housebound owing to the inclement weather and so I put my memory to the test. I did not have much choice really as a youngster. Travel was difficult so I had to be content with what was on locally. I remember on one occasion accompanying my father to a coursing meeting held by the Tallow Coursing Club. At that time it was held at Moorehill — on the Sapperton side of Moorehill Cross.

I was bored and my sympathy was always with the hare. I was not interested in backing greyhounds and even if I was, the odds being offered by the few bookmakers present were not very enticing. The only other attraction on the field was a tent in which intoxicating liquor was sold. At least half of the men present seemed to be in that tent and only came out to relieve themselves — which they did near the fence at the back of the tent. I thought this was disgusting. I vowed then that I would not attend another coursing meeting and I never have.

It was much better sport to follow the West Waterford Foxhounds. They met each St. Stephen's Day at Kilwatermoy. It was a nice sight to see the men and women on horseback — all dressed in hunting costume. There would be about twenty or so. The Master of the Hounds was in charge of the pack and he kept control by blowing his horn. They moved off at about 11 o'clock and the first covert to be tried for a fox was Murray's of Dunmoon. Of course the fox being a wily animal would have moved off as soon as he sensed that the hounds were in the vicinity but when they got the scent they gave tongue and we were away. Those on horseback followed the hounds across the fields.

From Dunmoon reynard usually went in the direction of Killeagh where there was a well-known den. We followed on foot also across the fields and those with bicycles followed the road. If the fox decided to play one of his well-known tricks on the way there would be a delay

which gave us an opportunity to catch up. He could double back on his old scent and go off in a different direction.

This confused the dogs and so the Master had to make a decision which way to go. He had to call back those hounds that were either confused or gone on the wrong trail and set them right. He was able to do this by depending on one or two of the more experienced dogs in the pack that were able to pick up the freshest scent. If reynard made the den in good time he could just run through it and out the other side — more confusion. He usually got away but whether or not there was not much sympathy for him. He was a known predator and his visits to the fowl houses and to fields where freshly born lambs were easy prey were not welcome. The hunt over, we returned home very tired and hungry.

As we got older and travel was easier as we all had bicycles, the usual custom was to take it easy on St. Stephen's Day. If money was scarce we might have to catch a few rabbits to make sure we had the entrance fee to the dance that night. Our first port of call used to be the Courthouse in Lismore where the Lismore Ceili Band played some lively Irish music. The musicians in that band at that time were Pete Gillan and Paddy Flynn on violins, Tom Keating on the button accordion and Mrs. Darragh on piano. There was a drummer whose name I cannot remember.

We danced there until about midnight and then in a lather of sweat we headed for Tallow to get the last hour or so of the big annual dance there. That was in

the old Regal — long before the Arch was even thought of. Most of the committee running that dance were in the Tallow Hurling Club and so we were well-known. We got in at a reduced price and maybe if we were lucky there was no charge and for a bonus we might even get tea tickets. The dancing there was mostly modern and at a much slower pace than the ceilí.

BRIDESIDE SERENADERS

The Brideside Serenaders was one of the very best bands on circuit at that time and it was always a pleasure to listen to them. Some of the members of that band that I remember were Francie Pender, Davy Doyle and Tommy Shee-

han from Tallow and a chap named Mellerick from Conna. They were among the best.

St. Stephen's Night was a big attraction in Tallow and the night when the "once a year girls" came out. Some of them were very bad dancers. On one occasion I remember my friend remarking after dancing with one such, "I could reverse her from here to Melleray but damn the bit of me could turn her." We danced with them just the same as we felt duty bound to do so. They were all known to us and while their dancing ability left a lot to be desired they had other qualities which more than compensated their lack of practice on the dance floor! — M.M.

This honey fudge flan is the bees knees



THIS delicious butterscotch fudge flan is flavoured with honey and is guaranteed to become a family favourite this year. It makes a very rich pudding, and the quantities given here will easily feed six or eight.

Pastry:

- 6oz (125g) plain flour
- salt
- 3oz (75g) butter
- 1 egg yolk, beaten with 1 tablespoon cold water
- Filling:
- 4 tablespoons clear honey
- 3oz (75g) butter
- 1 heaped tablespoon cornflour
- 1 teaspoon cocoa powder
- ½ pint (300ml) milk
- 2oz (50g) icing sugar
- 1oz (25g) walnut pieces

First make the flan case. Put flour in bowl with a little salt. Add the butter and rub into flour with fingertips. Mix to a stiff paste with the egg yolk and water. Roll out to line an 8in flan case. Chill. Fill with foil or greaseproof paper and baking beans. Bake "blind" at 375F (190C) Gas, Mar 6 for



20 minutes. Remove beans and foil. Cook a further five minutes to brown. To make the filling: melt honey and butter together in saucepan. In bowl mix cornflour, cocoa powder and three

tablespoons of the cold milk together. Add the rest of the milk to the honey mixture. Bring to the boil then stir into the cornflour. Return to tables and cook stirring, until very thick. Pour into pastry

case and leave to cool. When cold, mix the icing sugar with a very little water and use to pipe zig-zag lines on the butterscotch mixture. Decorate with walnut pieces.



Scottish bagpipers in full swing ... but it was the English who played them first in Britain!

WE'VE just celebrated the entry of another New Year, and the Scottish, more than most people, like to do it in traditional style. They see in each New Year (their Hogmanay) with good food, drink and bagpipes.

Here are 12 things you probably new knew about bagpipes:

1. Bagpipes are no more Scottish than the River Thames. It's a fair bet that Nero piped rather than fiddled when Rome was burning - and that the Ancient Egyptians were playing an Arab version before that.

2. The Bulgarians claim to have invented them. So do the Greeks, the Irish and the Jordanians. Certainly, they were being played in England long before they went north across the border.

3. However, because of the Scotsman's habit of taking the pipes into battle, Scottish bagpipes and gallantry have become synonymous. During the First World War, Scottish pipers played in every phase of the

war. The Germans soon got to hear of the value of the pipes and tried to pick off the pipers.

4. Bagpipes are completely "custom made". The pipes, made of African blackwood, are hand-turned on a lathe. The reeds come from Spain and the bag from home-raised sheep.

5. It takes about a week to make a set of pipes and the cost ranges from £125 to more than £1,000 when they have joints made of ivory and silver.

6. More than half the 2,000 bagpipes produced each year by the dozen leading Scottish manufacturers now go abroad and such unlikely places as Japan, South America, Belgium, Germany and France.

7. Every State in America has at least one pipe band. New York alone has 45. In Scotland the number of pipe bands are more than 200.

8. No pipe tune was ever written down in ordinary musical notation until 1838.

Bagpipes don't belong to Scots



It used to be set down in sound symbols like: / hodroho, hodroho, hanan, hiechin; Hodroha, hodroha, hanin, hiechin.

9. Dogs love bagpipes. And so, according to the experts do most animals. The late Lord Inchape, himself a bonny piper, used to south fractious bulls with *The Route of Glen Fruin*.

10. Trouble with the pipes is where do you practise?

As long ago as 1746, the citizens of York hanged a James Reid for playing his pipes.

11. The bagpipe consists of an airtight sheepskin bag which is inflated when the player blows through a valved tube. The air passes through three wooden pipes containing reeds. They are the "drones" and provide the continuous bass "thrummying". The melody is provided by the "chanter", a fourth reeded pipe containing holes for the player to finger.

12. Says a pipe-major: "There is an old Scottish saying that to be a good piper one should study the pipes for seven years and be descended from seven generations of pipers."

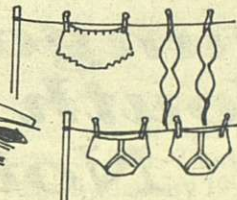

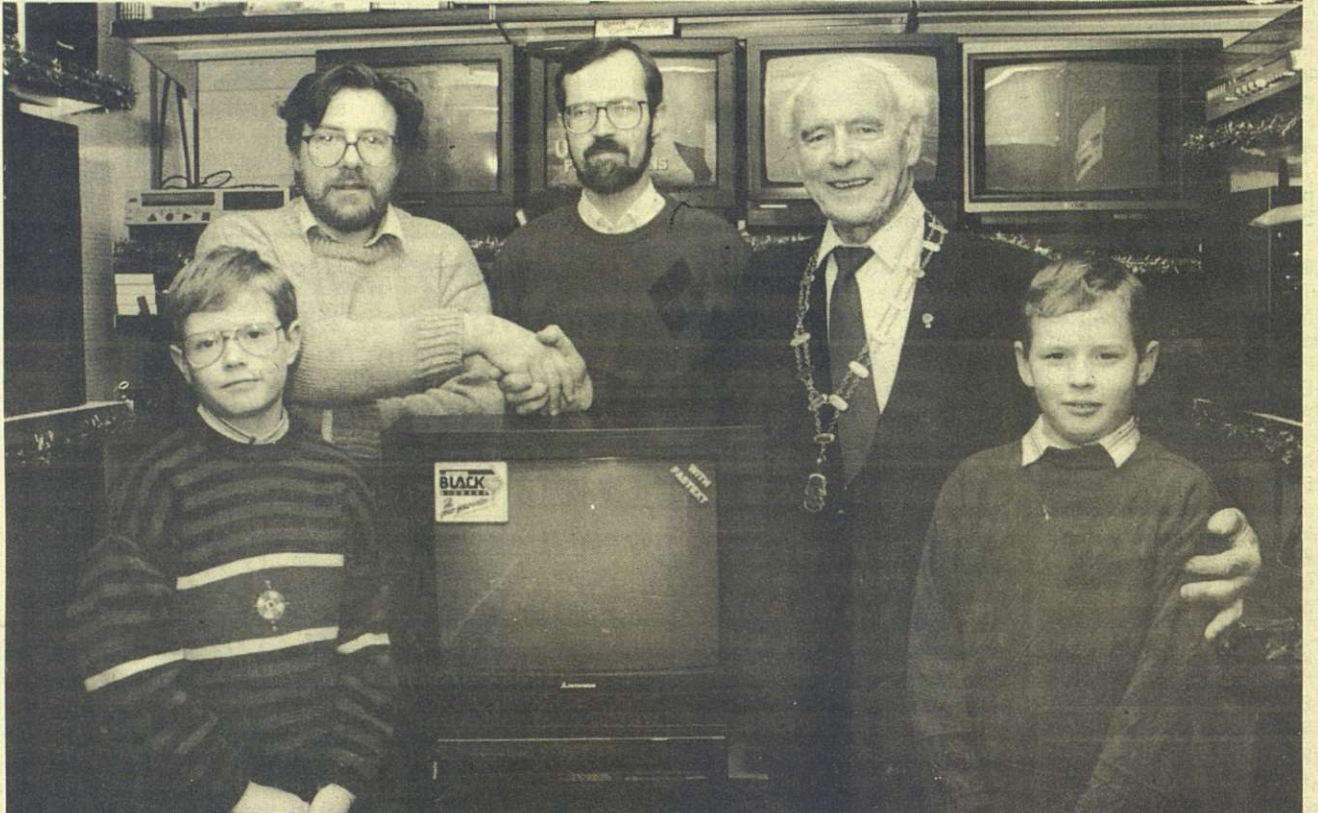

United Farmers Association Comes To Waterford

The United Farmers Association (UFA) was formed in Limerick in May, 1990, by a small number of ex-IFA members who felt that existing farmer organisations were doing little or nothing for the average farmer who is just about managing to survive.

Up to now the Common Agricultural Policy has been manipulated in such a way that 20% of farmers were in receipt of 80% of CAP monies while 80% (composed of small and medium farmers) had to make do with the crumbs of 20%. This unequal distribution of funds has allowed the rich to get richer at the expense of the poor and if allowed to continue will denude rural Ireland of farming families and completely break down the existing social structure which maintains the maximum number of people living with dignity in their

own place. It is one hundred years ago since Michael Davitt's Land League fought for and gained the three F's for tenant farmers. We are now back on the verge of a landlord-tenant situation and the UFA are determined to reverse this trend and thereby ensure the survival of the family farm.

In a recent statement UFA leader, Sean Scanlan said that "there is now a need for agricultural policies that put the greater good of ordinary people before greed, exploitation and laissez faire capitalism." He went on to say

that "from an economic and sociological point of view the desirable and only acceptable option is to maintain our rural population intact and gainfully employed in rural Ireland.

"An interim committee has been set up to organise the UFA in County Waterford and a membership canvass is getting a very good response. Paddy Phelan, Ballymacarbry, is acting Chairman, Vice-Chairman is Nicholas Dunphy, Dunhill and Secretary is Kathleen Dunphy. Committee members are Christy Skehan, Rathgormack, Sean Foley, Clash-

more and Tony Condon, Ballinamult. Paddy Phelan is National Vice-Chairman and represents Waterford on the National Executive.

POLICY LAUNCH

On Thursday, January 17, UFA will launch its Policy Document in Dublin. This document covers all aspects of agriculture and has been researched and drawn up in a highly professional manner by Brendan Kearney and Associates. The event will be covered by RTE and is guaranteed to stimulate a national debate on the subject of farming incomes.

Tanning Industry Employs 340 Nationwide

In a Dail Question, Deputy Austin Deasy asked the Minister for Industry and Commerce the number of jobs in the leather and tanning industry in this country at present; the estimated number of potential jobs in this area; and the plans he has to attain this potential.

Mr. D. O'Malley, Minister for Industry and Commerce in his reply stated: The level of employment in companies engaged in the processing of hides and skins and related activities in the State is about 340 persons at present. It is estimated, in the context of a recent study of the sector, that there is potential to create a further 100-150 jobs in the industry.

The Industrial Development Agencies are vigorously pursuing the implementation of a specific strategy aimed at bringing these jobs on stream in the short-term future. Indeed, grant negotiations with two potential promoters are at an advanced stage as of now. As these discussions are particularly sensitive at present, it would be inappropriate for me to comment in greater detail for the moment.

UNDER-16 (A)

The Under-16 (B) finalists Kill and Na Deise joined forces and took on Ballymacarbry in the A final at the Mill Field. The group side were well balanced and deserved to win the Mercy Cup, although it was close for a long time.

Rosemary Fitzgerald, Lorraine Mooney, Honor Lonergan and Martha Cahill were magnificent for the winners. Regina Byrne and Fiona Crotty were superb for Ballymac'.

UNDER-18

Ballymacarbry were far too strong in this grade, overwhelming Kill in the semi-final at Bushy Park and although Na Deise made a gallant effort in the final at Modeligo, they were eventually overcome 2-5 to 1-0.

JUNIOR

The junior championship is perhaps the most difficult to win, Sliabh gCua will vouch for that as 1990 saw them beaten in the final for the second year in a row. Waterford Foods sponsored a magnificent Perpetual Cup and the competition was very even with little between the teams.

Dunhill returned after a few years in the wilderness and surprised many people, Old Parish also showed that they are making progress.

Eventually it became a three-way affair with Ardmore playing Sliabh gCua in the semi-final at Bushy Park, the winners earning the right to take on Kill in

the final. This was a game that Ardmore could easily have won but a late goal saved Sliabh gCua.

The County junior final was played at Colligan on Sunday, October 13, with Jimmy McGrath on the whistle. Sliabh gCua began as if they would destroy Kill and led by six points after ten minutes, despite missing a great chance of a goal. Slowly but surely, Kill got back into the game and after missing numerous chances, they triumphed 3-4 to 2-1, displaying an obvious advantage in fitness, with Lorraine Mooney in defence and attack emerging as the player of the match.

This victory meant that Kill had won three county titles, under-14, under-16B and junior, as well as capturing the under-16A in a group side with Na Deise.

Although they have a very small pick, they have made tremendous progress in a short time, although it must be said that the greatest test lies ahead.

INTERMEDIATE

This was a new competition, introduced to give extra games to previous junior winners, Na Deise and Newtown. Junior teams were also allowed to compete without losing their junior status. despite playing against a very strong breeze they were eleven points ahead after just six minutes. They easily overcame Clare champions Fergus Rovers in the Munster final.

They were expecting a real test in the All-Ireland semi-final away to Leinster champions Rochfortbridge (Westmeath), but the serious challenge never materialised as the Waterford champions, giving their finest ever display, scored an emphatic 2-14 to 1-1 victory.

The All-Ireland Club final was played in Semple Stadium on Sunday, December 2. The opposition were Connacht champion St. Grellan's, Ballinasloe, who were making their first final appearance. Ballymac' appearing in their fifth final in six years, were far too experienced and ran out easy winners, 4-8 to 0-3, to capture their third title in five years. They remain the team to beat.

In 1990 they had all of the previous year's panel available and indications are that they will have the same in 1991. They won't be easily separated from their title.

As the season moves on week-night training will be organised in a way to ensure that dual players will not have problems.

On Saturday next at a venue in the city area, the minor football selectors will play the final of their special league and the minor hurlers will train at Ardmore on Sunday.

Special County Board Meeting

A special meeting of the Senior Board is called for tonight, Wednesday at 7.30 p.m. and at which the report from the special committee set up to investigate matters which were the subject of a complaint by the former chairman, Eamon Murphy before his departure from office.

While there is no information as to what may be contained in the report, it is generally felt that the whole exercise was a case of much ado about nothing.

The meeting will also discuss other important matters. It will be the final meeting of the present County Board.

5 Year Ticket

A new five year term ticket scheme was recently approved by Central Council and details will be announced within the next few weeks. All present ticket holders who have been approved by County Boards will be given the option of renewing their applications and any surplus will be made available to County Boards, but it is by no means sure that a surplus will be available.

Five thousand tickets in both hurling and football are being set aside for the scheme.

Game Off

Because of the very bad weather conditions on Saturday last, the first round game between Waterford and Tipperary in the South Eastern Under-21 football league at Portlaoise, was postponed.

Waterford will play Carlow away, on next Saturday and Wexford on the following Saturday. The postponed match will be played one week later.

Convention Commentary

Both divisional conventions are due to take place on Thursday night of next week and the County Convention will be held at Dungarvan on Saturday fortnight, January 26. The county convention will have a 6 p.m. start and with 22 motions to be discussed and 10 ballots to be held, one might wonder if the meeting might spill over to the following morning.

At the Eastern Convention, the outgoing Chairman, Frankie Cullinane, who is presently the County Chairman as well, will be returned unopposed and a similar vote of complete confidence is given in the Board Secretary, Denis Hanrahan.

There will be an election for Treasurer and for the three representatives to County Board. The latter seems to be the main interest in the convention at that end of the county.

The Western Convention will obviously be far more interesting as all nine outgoing officers are being opposed. In this connection, it is no secret that an intense campaign is underway to depose the entire Officer Board en bloc. It is no secret either that all the names on the shadow cabinet are members who are aligned with efforts to depose the County Board and because of this situation, the Western Convention may be taken as a guide to what might happen at County Convention. In this connection, however, the present situation in the East should not be overlooked as clubs there appear to strongly support the status quo in the county.

I know that the whole scenario has aroused interest outside the county as well as within and even people with no GAA affiliations are asking what has gone wrong in Waterford over the past few months.

Elections are good and expose the health of any democratic organisation and even though canvassing is against the rules and policy of the Association, no one can deny that a blind eye is turned when candidates move around seeking support at Convention time. This has become a fact of life in the G.A.A.

However this is the first time in our county where collective canvassing has been engaged in and on behalf of a group whose purpose seems to be to overthrow the present administration solely because they supported the removal of the former county chairman. No one can complain about the right of all the members who have been

nominated to stand for election but very many people will perceive the group effort as bringing the whole matter down to the level of party politics when it is done in this way. It has certainly created divisions within the division and

county and here in the West several clubs are divided on the whole affair.

It doesn't go without notice either that letters to county newspapers written by people outside this county have unfairly criticised the members of the administration here. Both these letters writers are well known to me and I can vouch for the fact that in the times while they were living here, neither did a whittle for the promotion of the GAA in the

county. One of these had got his facts all wrong and didn't have the courage to respond when challenged and the other who is stationed in one of our well-known holy places is a well-known 'knocker.' It is really a pity that these people with such high sounding appointments, should allow themselves to be used as mouth-pieces in the present crisis.

I will deal with Western and County Convention in detail next week.

Eoin O'Brien — For his several outstanding displays with his club, Stradbally and with the county in championship and national league. Eoin was selected on the panel of substitutes for the Australian Rules games, but did not get the expected call-up, a matter which angered the county. The Stradbally ace will travel to Australia within the next few days as part of the group which won the "Where In The World" competition run by R.T.E. last year. Eoin O'Brien is one of the county's best performers and is also well worthy of this honour.

UNDERAGE FOOTBALLER

Young Darrell Donnelly — Must have been an automatic choice. Outstanding against Limerick in the Munster minor football championship and playing a major role in Dungarvan's great championship victory at senior level in this historic year for his club, there could be no more worthy winner of this award.

UNDERAGE HURLER

Michael Hubbard — He had a great game against Cork in the Munster championship, he was the outstanding player with St. Mary's and throughout the junior hurling county

championship last year, his many performances with Ballydurn must have had a great influence on the committee who made Michael the choice here.

JACK FURLONG AWARD

The annual award is given for outstanding service to a person who works behind the scenes for the various Boards and to the list of very worthy winners since the inception of the award the county have now added the name of Sean O'Leary, Portlaoise. Sean's total involvement with the county and Eastern Boards

made him an automatic choice for this award.

LISMORE ARE CLUB OF THE YEAR

The unique achievement in winning all the underage hurling county championships was undoubtedly a major factor in winning them this title, also the fact that they represented us for the seventh time in Feile Na nGael. Lismore are a strong club in every respect and as well as being the club of the year, they will have reason for believing that they are to be the club of the future. Time, and a lot of other things will tell.

Board Trophies

At a number of Board meetings during the past year, reference was made to the lack of care and attention given to Board trophies (many of which were handed back in bad condition). Complaints were also made that a number of these trophies were not inscribed with the names of the winning clubs. To imagine why clubs should fail in this respect is very difficult to fathom. Some time before the late John Beecher, R.I.P., Tallow died, he wrote to me offering to undertake the task of doing a search for a number of the very important and valuable trophies which have, somehow gone missing over the years. He mentioned such cups as the Russell Cup, the very valuable Dollard Cup, the Sheehan Cup and Bolster Cup. I had never heard of the latter trophy, but John told me in his letter that this, also

was a very beautiful one, that he had not seen, but had been told about on a few occasions.

I refer to the matter now, because recently when doing some research on club records, I came across an account of a game which was the semi-final of the same Bolster Cup. This account stated "On Sunday last, March 6, 1927, a great senior hurling semi-final of the Bolster Cup tournament was played between Erin's Own 4-2 and Dungarvan 3-2, at Lismore venue."

Should any of our older readers have any information on the present whereabouts of this trophy, or indeed any information at all on it, it would be welcome and appreciated.

Information of a similar nature on any of the other missing cups will also be appreciated.

Centenary Items

Last year clubs like Shamrocks, Stradbally and others celebrated golden jubilee events and now in 1991 it will be the turn of others to commemorate the events that won recognition for them half a century ago.

The records are a bit vague, but nevertheless will show that Tourin won the junior hurling county final just fifty years ago and the Brickeys took the junior football county final, also in that year (1941). If the records are right, Tourin won a junior hurling county championship as far back as 1912 and the Brickeys were in the news back in 1927 when they defeated Fenor by 2-1 to 1-3 in a thriller at Dungarvan on Sunday, October 16.

Dungarvan, who have long ago celebrated their true centenary, will likely do something to mark the golden jubilee of their 1941 senior hurling championship win over Cnoc Sion at Lismore. They also

won the minor hurling championship (one of their five-in-a-row) (1940-1944) in that season.

Stradbally who won the championship in 1940, again won in 1941 (part of their five in a row), but they are unlikely to celebrate again.

For the record, St. Stephen's (De La Salle) were the club to win the minor football title in 1941.

FIFTY YEARS AGO

It was rather an unlucky year for Waterford in that we played in, but lost, two Munster finals.

In the senior hurling we went out in the first round to Tipperary (4-7 to 3-4) at Thurles and were also

pipped by Tipperary in senior football (1-5 to 0-6) at Dungarvan. Tipperary subsequently withdrew because of the foot-and-mouth disease.

Tipperary also put us out in the junior football when they beat us by 2-2 to 1-4 in the quarter-final at Walsh Park, but we reversed the result when the same counties met in junior hurling and we pipped Tipperary by 4-4 to 5-0.

Limerick beat us in the Munster final. Tipperary proved our bogey team again in minor hurling when after playing a thrilling draw (5-2 a-piece) they beat us by 3-2 to 3-1 in the replay. Hopefully we will see a change of fortunes in 1991.

LISMORE A.G.M.

Lismore, who are the 1990 club of the year in Portlairge, held their annual general meeting on Sunday last and as expected there was a very satisfactory attendance of sixty members.

In his address, the outgoing chairman Michael O'Leary, who was returned unanimously, spoke at length about the club's wonderful achievement in taking every underage hurling championship in the county this year and said it augured very well for the future of the club. Having thanked all concerned in bringing this about, he referred to the wonderful work being done at school level and said, 'long may it continue.' He expressed some disappointment that the expected breakthrough in the senior championships had not materialised and he reminded members that it was now gone 65 years since the club had taken a senior county title and that this was all the more disappointing when one looks at the excellent record of the club at underage level.

Having thanked the outgoing secretary, Jimmy O'Gorman for five great years as the club's chief administrator, he outlined the workload that he had undertaken for the club, without complaint. He said he was expressing the wishes of the club, in hoping that Jimmy would be returned as Western Board chairman in the upcoming election at divisional convention.

FINANCE

Club treasurer Declan Bransfield in his excellent financial report said that while the club was in a sound financial position, the momentum at fundraising must be maintained, if the club was going to continue to service the many financial demands associated with running a successful club in present times. In all it cost approximately £20,000 to run the club for the year and this included an outlay of £2,000 for hurleys and sliotars.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

In his sixteen page document, Jimmy O'Gorman touched on every single aspect of club activity over the year. He was loud in his praise of all the individuals, groups and committees who made it a pleasure to work with and he gave a few critical reminders, here and there where they were warranted.

His concluding paragraph was — "Before I conclude my final report as your secretary I regret very much that my ambition to have this club win a senior hurling title has not been fulfilled, looking back over the past five years, while there may have been genuine excuses for some of our defeats, it is my opinion that the commitment from a section of the players will never be good enough to win a senior title."

"While we may talk from time to time, blame trainers, selectors, and speak

about getting new personnel in charge of our teams, unless we get our house in order and give number one priority — that is — COMMITMENT, time and opportunities may pass us by. Another very disappointing aspect in the club is the failure of some of our established and younger players to make the sacrifices necessary involved in training to reach and stay at the top.

"Having won four county minor titles and two Under-21 titles in the past five years, there can be no doubt that we have the talent, the skills and the pool of players necessary to achieve our ambition, and I appeal personally to all concerned players, supporters and club members to make an all out unified effort to achieve our goal."

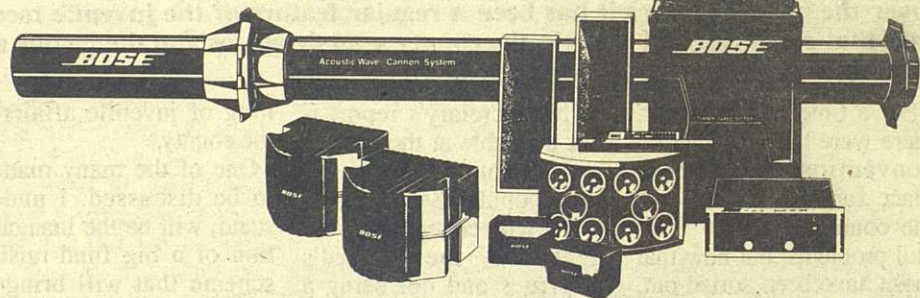

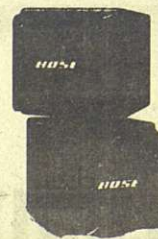
