Strong Criticism Of New Traffic

The recent rash of yellow traffic lining around Dungarvan and Abbeyside came under strong criticism from several members of the local Urban Council at their monthly meeting last Monday night.

The matter was raised by Cllr. R. Walsh who referred to the unwanted yellow lines which had been placed along the Causeway to Abbeyside. He was also critical of the length of the double yellow lines at the O'Connell Street junction with Patrick Street and said that several good parking spaces had been lost here as a result.

In connection with the lining along the Causeway, a letter was received from Mr. Don Mulcahy, Spar Foodstore at the Causeway which pointed out that these lines were now affecting his business and he asked that the Council have a re-think on the situation as he was about to embark on a major internal revamp of his shop.

Mr. Mulcahy's letter in-

formed the Council, "local shoppers, failing to park at the same side as my premises are travelling further to do their shopping." He also referred to the amenity attractions and views for tourists at the Causeway and stated, "with these yellow lines on this approach road, I know the strangers will simply pass by without viewing these amenities."

Cllr. Mary Dixon, Chairman, agreed that the yellow lines should not have been placed outside Mr. Mulcahy's shop and Cllr. N. Ryan said that while locals might pull up there as they knew there was no one to enforce the parking laws, strangers coming in would simply not pull up. Mr. B. White, Town

Clerk, said that all the yel-

low lines had been laid in accordance with the schedule in the Traffic Bye-Laws as drawn up by the Assistant Garda Commissioner. He pointed out that they were awaiting the traffic Consultant's Report for the

Cllr. M. O'Riordan said that the lines placed outside Mr. Mulcahy's shop could mean a loss of business for him at a time when he was planning to upgrade his shop.

Mr. White said that the Council would have an opportunity to fully discuss the matter when the draft of the Consultant's Report came before them for approval.

Cllr. T. Wright said that they had been waiting for a long time now for this re-

Cllr. B. Kyne then suggested as an interim measure that a request be sent to the Assistant Garda Commissioner to alter the bye-law schedule as far as the lining at the Causeway was concerned. This would be a six months job but they could ask Supt. R. McAndrew to use his good offices to speed up the decision.

This was unanimously agreed.

All members agreed that Mr. and Mrs. Casey had certainly done Dungarvan proud on the occasion.


Doctor's Cover For Kereen Dispensary Area

At the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last week, Cllr. Patsy Kenneally proposed a motion that the South Eastern Health Board be requested to provide doctor's cover for Kereen Dispensary area.

In support of his motion, there was a considerable Cllr. Kenneally said that recently he had received a number of complaints about the delay in doctors coming to deal with emergencies in the area. This was not a criticism of the doctors but when a doctor had to come from Lismore

Physiotherapy Services Curtailed In Dungarvan

Deputy Brian O'Shea who made representations regarding physiotherapy services in Dungarvan has been informed as follows by Mr. J. A. Cooney, Programme Manager, General Hospitals, South Eastern Health Board:

"The position is that the permanent physiotherapist based in Dungarvan is on maternity leave and is due to resume duty in the middle of March.

"A locum physiotherapist was recruited for most of this period of leave but she left to take up a position in London two weeks ago and we were unable to get a replacement. A permanent vacancy exists in Waterford Regional Hospital and this appointment is at present in the process of being filled. It is expected this person will take up duty in Waterford in approximately three weeks

time when the services in Dungarvan will be re-

"Locums are difficult to recruit but the Board will still continue to make efforts to recruit replacement staff.

"It is regretted that in the interim period services to Dungarvan have been curtailed."

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

BUBBLING OVER WITH CONFIDENCE

Have been talking to you over the past two weeks about the trials and upheavals of life; and the first reading from this coming Sunday draws our attention to the matter again. It tells us that whatever our difficulties, we should trust God. And, it reminds us of the readiness shown by Abraham in accepting and abiding by God's will. His attitude was, if the Lord wished to take back what He'd given to him, then who was he to question the wisdom of God. He knew God loved him, and would never ask him for more than he was able for, so he obeyed and he trusted.

Abraham is a reminder to us that the good Lord is always asking us to prove our love. Hence, he assured, if the Lord calls you and asks you to carry a cross it will be an opportunity for you to prove your love, but also, it will add strength to it. "If you love me, you'll do what I ask."

In ordinary life we do trust many people, such as, doctors, air pilots, judges, etc., and we do so because we believe they know their job. Of course, there are times when we place our faith in human authority, and meet with betrayal and disappointment. You see, the surgeon may be under stress, the pilot may be careless or have one of his lapses, the judge may be biased. Experience shows and time will prove that not one, who'd recourse to God, was ever disappointed. In fact, the more people trust God, the closer they draw to Him. The irony of it all is, you'll meet some, who'll trust anyone but God. It is the old story that a fool never learns. I'm sure you'll have noticed that when Jesus worked a miracle, he always commended the faith of the recipient. When our faith is alive and active, the Lord will always listen to our prayer, and He'll never leave us empty handed. I feel we are all guilty of not having enough confidence in God. Otherwise, we'd know that faith would move mountains!

You already know that Abraham, in obedience to God, had left his own country and his father's house, and went into a foreign land to found a new nation. He loved and trusted His God. God has spoken to us, and He has made it clear that He wishes to behave in accordance with His laws in all circumstances. We ought to ask ourselves daily, have we respected His Commandments? It keeps us on our toes, when we remind ourselves that God will judge us on our tally sheet. It is the lot of man to face this examination at death, and it will be his last and final one. Everyone has to face it. There's no running away.

Many, I believe, have found the following suggestion most helpful. Go regularly to Confession, and, be it weekly or monthly, resolve, asking God's blessing, to keep a clean sheet from one confession to the next. You live, so to speak, from Confession to Confession. Your resolution will demand effort and it will demand prayer, but once established, it will really become a labour of love. If you try and fail, do not allow that to stop you from starting again. You could call the exercise, step by step. You have only to concentrate on a set period, and then you begin again. Apart from our ordinary prayers, I do feel it is wise to enlist the help of one's Guardian Angel. If you implement this practice, it will bring peace and happiness into your life.

OUR GUARANTOR

Paul, in the second reading, tells us we are privileged and have good reason to feel confident about our salvation, because our Heavenly Father has asked His son the Beloved to be our guarantor. Hence, we are able to cry out "God is for us, so no one can condemn us, if we remain in His care." We know, because the Lord told us, that through Baptism we're born into the family of God, where love is the uniting factor and bond. Surely, you can understand that if Michael or Mary needs help that their brother Jesus, who shed His blood to save the family, will be quick to let Father know. When talking of earthly bonds, we say "blood is thicker than water." Strive therefore to be a credit to the family, and you'll share in your Father's greatness.

In the Gospel the three Apostles are given a foretaste of the glory of Heaven. You could say, they got a glimpse of the glory that was one day to be theirs. The experience would boost their faith, which the Heavenly Father confirmed for them, when He declared that "Jesus was His beloved Son."

The Gospel, set as it is with the other readings, is a reminder to us, as it was to the Apostles, that we've been called. It's like a package deal. You respond, accepting all it may involve. It is almost like saying, give your hand to God, close your eyes and let Him lead you. Indeed, it is true that it is never easy to lift the cross and place it on your shoulders. Yet! when you count up the price, you'll find it was small compared to the glories of Heaven.

Birthday Party Cause Of Pub Breach

When a member of the Garda Traffic Corps made a midnight visit to a licensed premises it was stated at Dungarvan Court last week that he was offered a slice of a birthday cake.

Charged with a breach of the Licensing Laws on December 10 was Brian Barton, The Pike, Killineen and also charged were a number of persons found on the premises on the occasion.

Garda T. Brady, Traffic Corps, in reply to questions by Supt. R. McAndrew who prosecuted said that when he visited the premises at 12 o'clock (midnight) on December 10, there was a big crowd there, many of whom were drinking. He had seen many vehicles parked outside before he entered. He took a number of names.

In reply to questions by Mr. J. P. Gordon Solr. who appeared for the defendant, Gda Brady agreed that he had been told that there was a 21st birthday party

being held and that some of the crowd were waiting for a minibus to take them home.

Mr. Gordon — Weren't you offered a slice of the birthday cake when you went in?

Gda Brady replied that all that remained at that time was some crumbs (laughter).

Mr. Gordon then submitted that it was a hardy, frosty night and many of the crowd were waiting for the minibus to take them home and the publican did not want to turn them out in the cold.

When Supt. McAndrew stated that there were two previous convictions against the defendants, one in 1988 and another in 1989, District Justice O'-Connell said that he would impose a fine of £100 but would not order an endorsement.

The "found-ons" were each fined £25.

Dungarvan Man Died From Severe

A Dungarvan bachelor was warned to stop smoking in bed on the night before he was found dead in his smoke filled bedroom, an inquest was told at Waterford Regional Hospital, Waterford last Wednesday.

A verdict that Thomas O'Dwyer (66), 11 Caseyville, Dungarvan, died of severe second and third degree burns was returned by a jury.

Fined For Breach Of Planning Acts

Kaj Thomsen, Strandside North, Abbeyside was summoned at Dungarvan Court by Dungarvan Urban Council for failing to comply on September 12, 1990 with a warning notice served on him by the Council under the Planning Acts in relation to an extension at his premises at Strandside North, Abbeyside.

Mr. J. Curran, Solr. for the Council told the Court that on March 8, 1990 an extension being built to the garage at the dwellinghouse at Strandside North was found to be not in conformity with the planning permission granted. Defendant continued with the extension and when it was inspected on September 12, the garage was found to be 1.9 metres wider than permitted.

Mr. A. V. Maher, Solr. for the defendant said that the original permission was granted in 1985 but at that time Mr. Thomsen only went ahead with part of it. The work was completed last year and was then found to be slightly wider than it should have been. He submitted that the breach was only a minor, technical one.

In reply to a query by District Justice O'Connell, Mr. Curran agreed that the breach was not considered to be a very serious one.

Imposing a fine of £10, the district Justice remarked that the offence did not seem to be extraordinarily serious. In addition he allowed £75 costs to the Council.

Fined £100 And **Endorsed At** Dungarvan Court

Desmond Norris, Hillside Crescent, Kilmacthomas was fined £100 and had his licence endorsed when he was convicted at Dungarvan Court on a charge of being drunk in charge of a van at Shandon, Dungarvan on December 8.

Supt. R. McAndrew who prosecuted said that at 12.50 a.m. on December 8, Garda M. Murphy came on a white van with the engine running stopped on the roadway at Shandon. The defendant was sitting in it and Garda Murphy arrested him and took him to the Garda Station where a urine sample was taken. On subsequent analysis this showed a concentration of 266 mgrms.

Further Remand In Dungarvan Firearms Charge

When 22-years-old David O'Riordan of 40, Congress Villas, Dungarvan appeared before District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Dungarvan Court last week on a charge of being in possession of a firearm and ammunition at St. Patrick's Crescent, Dungarvan on February 10, in such circumstances as to reasonably infer that he had not got them for a lawful purpose, he was further remanded on continuing bail to Dungarvan Court sitting on April 10 next.

O'Riordan had been originally charged at a special Court sitting in Tipperary Town on the previous Sunday night where District Justice O'Connell remanded him with consent to bail in his own bond of £200 and one independent surety of £1,000 or two of £500

When the case was mentioned at last week's Court in Dungarvan, Supt. Ray McAndrew, who prosecuted, stated that his application to the Court was for a further remand until the first Court in April at

Q. — Who decides whether I am entitled to a Medical Card and on what basis are they given?

A. — Medical Cards are given to people who, in the opinion of the Chief Executive Officer (C.E.O.) of the Health Board are unable, without undue hardship, to afford medical services for themselves and their dependents.

The Health Boards in consultation with the Department of Health have laid down guidelines to assist the C.E.O. in making his decision. These guidelines are not legally binding — they are for guidance only. In some cases Medical Cards can by given to people whose income is above the guidelines. This happens if the C.E.O. is satisfied that the person has exceptionally high medical expenses.

The following are the guidelines in operation since January 1, 1991:

FURTHER ALLOWANCES

Outgoings on houses in excess of £13.00 per week, e.g. if you pay £30 per week rent, you will be allowed to deduct £17.00 per week in deciding whether you are eligible for a Medical Card.

Reasonable expenses in excess of £11.50 per week incurred in travelling to work may be taken into account. In general, no allowances are made for income tax or other expenses, other than those described here.

All that had been received by Ballyduff was £5,000.

A further motion that the Ballyduff Drama Committee be given the £200 grant that was available for the Arts Committees was also proposed by Cllr. McDon-

AN APPRECIATION

On January 25, the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore lost one of its most popular priests when our beloved parish priest, Fr. Michael Russell slipped quietly and peacefully from this life.

A native of Ballyporeen, Fr. Russell was ordained in 1943. He served in Wrexham on the English Mission until 1950. On his return he served as Curate in Ballylaneen, Dunmore East, Clashmore, Ballyduff Upper and Grangemockler. He was appointed in 1974 as the first Parish Priest of the newly established parish of the Sacred Heart in Waterford City. Fr. Russell was a friend to all. The old and sick in the parish always held a special place in his heart. Many will remember with fondness his many visits to the homes of the sick and to the hospitals. He was always on the move - "about his Father's business."

Numerous stories recall the many instances in his life when those who felt burdened or outcasts in society seemed to be drawn to Fr. Russell who always treated everyone with the dignity he knew they deserved as children of God.

His regular visits to the local school were always welcomed. One had only to see him working and praying with children to realise his obvious love for them. Indeed he truly lived out one of his favourite gospel stories of Jesus and the children - "Let the children come."

He went about his priestly duties with infectious good humour. Fr. Russell enjoyed nothing better than a good laugh or a good song in whatever company he was to be found. He was at ease with everyone and he always made everyone feel at ease with him. The many visitors to his house will remember him as a most generous host, with a more than heavy hand when it came to sharing a deoch.

During his last few months with us it was obvious to many that his illness was becoming a severe physical drain on him. However, with his utmost faith and trust in God rather than slow down he seemed to go into overdrive, helped no doubt, by an immense inner strength.

What a welcome, Mary must have prepared for one of her most loyal followers. Fr. Russell had tremendous devotion to Our Lady as was exemplified by his regular visits to Knock and his untiring work for the Grotto in

CALL FOR GOVERNMENT ACTION TO STOP COAST EROSION

For the past two winters we have been hearing a great deal about the problem of coast erosion which has been accentuated by the ferocious storms which caused so much damage to the coastline not only of County Waterford but to the length of it all along the South from Kerry to Wexford.

The cost of repairing our coastline defences has been estimated in hundreds of millions and the funding of the work required has been proving a headache not only for the Local Authorities but to the Central Government as well.

A new aspect of the encroaching danger of the sea was referred to by Waterford County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn when he addressed a recent special seminar of the Institute of Engineers of Ireland on Coastal Protection. Mr. O'Flynn suggested that a major campaign of action by the Government will be necessary to save our coasts. But because of the huge sums of money involved, not every area could be protected so parts of the coastline may have to be abandoned to the sea and families living in lowlying areas paid compensation to move away.

Mr. O'Flynn, who detailed the damage done to the Waterford coastline in the storms of the last couple of winters said there was an urgent need to survey the entire coast of the country and to carry out an inventory of our existing coastal protection systems.

He told the seminar that at present no one was systematically measuring waves, sea levels etc all around the coast or monitoring the maintenance and condition of sea defences on an ongo-

ing basis.

Mr. O'Flynn maintained that because the coastline was a national asset, and its conservation and protection essential to amenity development and tourism, it was unfair that individual coastal county councils should have to shoulder so high a financial burden.

SECTION 4 CLAUSE NEVER USED IN WATERFORD

One of the major recommendations of the expert committee appointed by the Government to advise on local government organisation and reform was the abolition of the powers of local authority Councillors to use the Section 4 clause of the City and County Management (Amendment) Act, 1955, to bypass the normal planning process.

An Taisce, the National Trust of Ireland strongly endorses this recommendation and an updating made by it last year of Section 4 usage by local authorities over the period 1982-1990 has reinforced the urgent need to close this planning loophole immediately.

Section 4 of the Act allows for a local authority to instruct the County Manager to carry out any particular legal action and has been used primarily to reverse refusal of planning

permission.

According to the nation-wide survey carried out by An Taisce last June the most frequent users of the Section 4 clause were Galway County Council which passed 344 "Section Fours" between 1983 and 1990. Here in Munster, the highest use of the Section 4 clause was made by Kerry County Council which passed 71 such motions between 1983 and 1990.

A total of 14 local authorities had no Section 4 proposed or passed since 1982 and these included Waterford Corporation, Clonmel Corporation and Tipperary (SR) Co. Council and according to the survey Waterford Co. Council had one proposed but not passed in the same period.

A spokesman for An Taisce hit out at the use of Section Four motions for overturning planning decisions saying it made a mockery of the entire planning process.

Moves are at present being made at national level to abolish Section 4 of the Act and while this is in accord with the policy of the P.D.'s, it is believed that the Minister for the Environment, Padraig Flynn, is opposed to such a change.

WHITE LINING NEEDED

While the new rash of yellow lines around Dungarvan occupied most Councillors at the monthly meeting of the local Urban Council last Monday night, Cllr. Billy Kyne drew attention to the need for white lining the stretch of road along Friars Walk from Skehacrine to Abbeyside Church and from there to "The Pond" as a traffic safety measure.

Cllr. Kyne said that the roadway along there re-

quired to be lined. It was a very busy road over which a great deal of traffic passed and such lining would make it much safer as cars would know on which side they were to remain. There were a few hazardous bends and particularly in the vicinity of the Church, where white lining would make the roadway much safer.

It was agreed to refer the matter to the County Council which is the Road Authority for the Urban Area.

On the proposal of Cllr. Kyne, the Council also agreed to white line the junction from Sea Park with the Clonea Road in Abbeyside in the interest of road safety and further it was agreed that the Sea Park housing estate would now be taken over by the Council.

AU PAIRING IN AMERICA

The Experiment in International Living is a cultural exchange organisation with the aim of creating equal understanding among the people of the world.

The Ballad of William Crotty

A request came to us during the past week for the words of the ballad about the famous highwayman, William Crotty who rode through the Comeraghs in the last century leading a Robin Hood type of life by robbing the rich to give to the poor. To many, in subsequent years, he was known under the less complimentary nom-de-guerre of "Crotty, the Robber." And a cruel and cunning wife.
They'd planned a way to capture him
And little did he know
His life was sold just for the gold
Within his Cave below.

Red Kettle's Production Of "Translations" For Dungarvan



Ever heard of sausage schnitzels with a Normandy sauce?



IF you thought that all you could do with sausages is serve them with mash, stick them on a stick at parties or make a toad in the hole, you'd be so wrong.

It's obvious you have never heard of Sausage Schnitzels with Normandy

The following quantities are enough to serve 6: Ingredients:

12 pork sausages, skinned seasoned flour beaten egg breadcrumbs

1 onion, finely chopped 1 oz (25g) butter 10z (25g) flour 1/2 pint (300ml) dry cider 1/4 pint (150ml) cream salt and pepper pinch ground nutmeg green grapes for garnish

twists of lemon Flatten skinned sausages in pairs, using seasoned flour to prevent sticking, and shape into neat escalopes.

Dip into beaten egg and coat evenly in breadcrumbs. Fry gently on both sides in oil until golden and tender.

Keep warm in the oven.

To make the sauce: fry the onion gently in butter for a few minutes. Stir in the flour and cook 1 minute. Add the cider gradually and bring to the boil. Add the cream, seasoning and nutmeg and heat through

Arrange sausage escalopes on a serving dish and spoon over the sauce. Garnish with small clusters of green grapes and twists of lemon.

Do you really want to

KEEN vegetable growers will be anxious to start sowing soon but check that soil is warm and not too soggy

By mid-February the surface should feel less clammy - about 50°F if you can measure it.

Don't be tempted to rush things or you will either waste seed or produce sluggish and weedy growth. The most popular crops to plant now are broad beans, parsnips and lettuces.

Early broad beans should be sown about two inches deep and at least six inches

You will need to go much deeper for parsnips which also like good well-drained soil, so use a dibber to drive holes at least a foot deep and about eight inches

Then fill these with good crumbly loam, before placing two seeds about half an inch into the soil. When the seedlings appear, you then discard the weaker one.



Light loamy soils are also favoured by lettuces and these early sowings really do need a warm and sheltered spot in the garden.

Little Gem is a variety particularly suited to sowing now and the seeds should be sown in rows a foot apart and covered with about a quarter of an inch of soil. Thin them later to about eight inches apart.

An unusual crop to consider in these days of more enlightened and international cookery, is garlic, but it needs the early sunshine of more southerly parts of the country.

You will need a warm spot with well-drained soil,

already conditioned with garden compost or a manure. Then plant the cloves upright about a foot apart and covered by a half inch of soil.

Apart from planting, clear up leaves from plants such as cabbages and other brassicas, to avoid encouraging

If slugs are already a pest then put down flower pot trays filled with beer or milk to trap and drown

You can also prepare for planting other crops:

Potatoes - buy seed tubers and stand them in wooden

trays or egg trays with the eyes facing upwards. Then put the trays in a cool and airy place such as an unheated greenhouse and they will sprout ready for planting in March.

Onions - sow seeds under glass so that they can be planted in May.

Peas and Runner Beans fill trenches with well-rotted compost or manure and top with soil. This should settle nicely so that seeds can be sown in April/May, although it is possible to sow early varieties of pea this month in the South.

THE British take some licking when it comes to eating ice cream. Last year we spent close on £400 million on the stuff. That puts us sixth in the world ice cream league.

On average we eat 80 portions per person a year.

But we still have a long way to go before we catch up with the Americans, who top the league. They sink four times as much.

In spite of the growing number of American-style ice-cream parlous with their "flavour mania", most Britons still cling to vanilla as their favourite taste.

But that doesn't prevent some manufacturers from dreaming up the craziest flavours.

Not long ago, a London company came up with a liver sausage ice-cream for a TV quiz show. Most of the contestants were convinced it was nutty chocolate.

And four years ago, a San Francisco firm introduced what they said was a good way to get children to eat dinner - a vegetable icecream made from celery, until the youngsters found out what it contained.

Most ice-cream isn't what is seems. A Lot of Britain's comes from vegetable fats like soya.

A recent ice-cream conference in Rome (most delegates were dieticians, chemists and micro-biologists) revealed that basic "ice-cream" is made from blended dried milk, "densifiers", vegetable fats, synthetic flavourings and colours. The rest is injected

As one delegate put it: "They just blow up icecream like a toy balloon."



Therefore we want every sector to know what lies ahead and what options are open to us," said Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, President ICMSA

"From the engineer to the dairy scientist, from the office worker to the farmer - every sector of our society will be affected by the outcome of the GATT negotiations and the proposals to reform the CAP," said Mr. O'Dwyer.
