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## Defamation Action Against Senator Settled

A settlement was announced in an action for defamation in which former Fianna Fail T.D. and Senator, Dr. Donal Ormonde, Grantstown, Waterford claimed £15,000 damages against Senator Tom Raftery (F. G.), Cork when it came to hearing at the Circuit Court Sittings in Dungarvan before Judge Deery on Tuesday.

When the case was called, Mr. T. Teahan B.L. for Senator Raftery said that a settlement had been reached between the parties under which the following apology on behalf of the defendant, Senator Raftery, was to be read in open court: "The defendant is more than happy to acknowledge that the plaintiff is of outstanding integrity and good standing and has always conducted himself

The action arose from comments allegedly made by Senator Raftery, then an outgoing member of the European Parliament, during the course of the European Parliament election campaign in 1989. The alleged comments related to the granting of the Independent Radio franchise to W.L.R. FM which represented a Waterford City consortium of business people that included Dr. Ormonde.

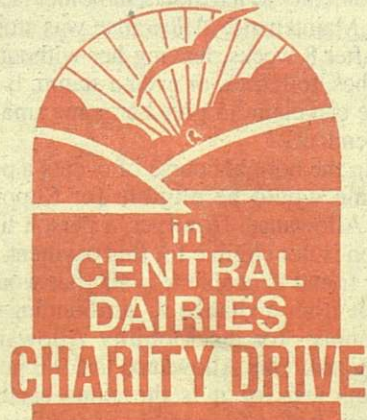
Mr. Ronayne told the court that he had carried out extensive renovations to the large premises in Ardmore which he now proposed to run as a hotel with a public bar.

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## IFA Welcome Restructuring Scheme Decision

IFA Dairy Committee Chairman Michael Slattery welcomed the decision taken at the Milk Quota Review Group meeting which has set a maximum price of £1.30 per gallon for milk sold through the restructuring scheme.

Mr. Slattery said that the maximum price had been reduced from £1.60 per gallon to reflect the percentage drop in milk price which has taken place over the last 12 months.

However, the IFA man said it was still uneconomical for many small produc-

ers to purchase milk at this price. He advised all producers to seek advice from Teagasc with regard to their own particular situation. He pointed out that it will cost producers approximately 30p per gallon over 7 years to repay the capital cost of £1.30 per

gallon.

The major problem, he said, is that to ensure that milk would be available for the restructuring scheme, a price had to be set which would make it attractive to those producers who wished to cease milk production.

## Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

### DO NOT UNDERESTIMATE GOD

The first reading next Sunday tells us that God gave the Law, as expressed through the Ten Commandments to Moses. They form a blueprint of our duties to God, and to one another. Recently, I told you that the Commandments were designed to enable us to bring our life into conformity with the order existing in the mind of God. And, I added at the time, that God's Law was for all peoples and for all time.

We learned as children that our life here should be devoted to serving God as He had directed, and thereby, prove ourselves worthy of Heaven. And, we know from our experience that among the spin-offs flowing from the Commandments are peace and harmony in society.

Sadly, our days have witnessed a turning away from God and almost a complete dismantling of his law. Hence it's no surprise that moral standards have taken a nose-dive. And, Civil Legislators are only too willing to give the people what they want. They add their seal of approval to what is evil in the sight of God. Joe Rogaly in "Politics Today" wrote on February 15 last about the British Parliament: "It is a nest of fornicators, adulterers and divorcees, who spent a recent afternoon debating family policy. Now, that they've killed the horse, they keep on flogging it! No wonder the teenage girl said on T.V. "it is not a sin anymore." And, the downhill slide has long since started in Ireland. No wonder the world is in a mess, and it is worse it will get unless people turn back to God. Unfortunately, many, many souls will be lost, because they would not listen.

The Commandments are most important, but ultimately, it is through faith in God that a man finds justification. In fact, man on his own would find it impossible to keep the Law, and anyhow, without faith, it would appear to be an unnecessary exercise. When we believe in God, the Law helps us to prove our love, and save our souls. After all, Christ came to fulfil the Law by making its purpose possible, which is, a loving relationship with God.

Paul talks in the second reading of the failure and the blindness of the people, despite their knowledge and learning, to see the hand and work of God in creation. And, he says as a consequence that God in His plan for man's redemption, does not resort to stupendous signs to win man's favour, but rather adopts a process that in human estimation would seem to be foolish and inadequate. Paul was not slow to condemn those who failed to see the wisdom of God in creation; and said: "they were not blameless." They had the knowledge as witnessed by their ability to appraise human affairs. Obviously, Paul is talking from knowledge and experience of his faith, when he indicates that he un-

derstands why the Lord chose the way of the cross.

### A PICTURE OF UTTER DESOLATION

The picture of the crucified Saviour is one of utter desolation. It bears all the trappings of a life ending in failure and folly. Yet! when it is viewed through the eyes of faith, one's heart goes out to God in gratitude and love. Once, I dreamt I saw Jesus die, and I cried as I watched His innocent and precious Blood trickle down the Cross, and seep into the ground. Then I felt transfixed as I watched it well up into a mighty river, carrying its cleansing and life-giving waters into the most distant lands. I noticed those, dwelling by its banks and using its waters, were strong and looked like sons of God, whereas, those who shunned the rivers, were languid and unhappy. Then, every so often, a number of the joyous ones got into their boats, and were borne away into what seemed a silvery mist from which they emerged dressed in white shining garments. I awakened to realise that the small seed sown by God on Calvary, died only to produce abundant life. The wise ones are those who use these fruits: they find eternal life. Remember, God does not require force or eloquence to gain conviction. He does not depend on human agencies. He knows His Cross will draw people to Him. His appeal may seem foolish to some, but it will prove a source of love to those of good will.

The scene in the Gospel is centred around the Temple area. The time was just prior to the Passover, so large numbers from abroad would have been present. The priests would not accept foreign coins in payment of Temple taxes. Hence, the presence of the unscrupulous money-lenders. And, when you consider the presence of other traders catering for various needs, it was a picture of a thriving market. Jesus is not pleased when He comes on the scene, and sees the way His Father's house is being abused and neglected. He shows His authority by driving them out. Immediately, the Jews asked "how do you justify your action." He replied: "destroy this temple, and in 3 days, I'll raise it up." Note the word raise, not build. His action eventually led to His death, which he conquered as He said. He leaves no room for doubt.

## No Repairs For Water Charge Defaulters

Cllr. T. Wright proposed at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last week that steps be taken to ensure that the window and door special replacement programme for the residents of Childers Estate be finalised this year and if possible before the beginning of winter.

The proposal was seconded by Cllr. M. O'Riordan. Mr. B. White, Town Clerk said that £20,000 had been included towards this work in the Council's estimates. To date 40 of the houses involved had been attended to and a further 20 would be done this year. A number of the houses in the estate had been purchased

which would leave a balance of 24 to be completed in 1992.

When Cllr. B. Kyne suggested that a loan might be raised to do all the outstanding repairs this year, the Town Clerk, Mr. B. White pointed out that when the matter was discussed at the Council's estimates meeting no provision was made for the raising of a loan as the Co. Manager had said that such

a loan was not on.

Mr. White went on to say that an aspect of the matter to also be taken into account was that any tenant who had refused to pay water charges would not have this work done for them.

When Mr. White said that he would prepare a report on the matter for next meeting, the resolution as proposed was deferred until then.

## ICS Building Society Ups Profits To £9.3m.

## Know Your Rights

Q. — A friend of mine is disabled and is now living permanently in a residential home. Her Disabled Person's Maintenance Allowance was stopped completely after 8 weeks, leaving her without money to buy clothes, toiletries, or even a stamp. Is there anything she can claim to give her some small measure of independence?

A. — In the normal course of events a person with no income would be eligible for Supplementary Welfare Allowance. However, a person living in an institution is not eligible for this payment.

If your friend is unable to walk, but would be able to benefit from a change in surroundings, then she should apply for the Mobility Allowance to the Health Board. This Allowance is £380 per year and the means test for it is the same as the DPMA means test. It is paid monthly and if it is granted it would give her an income of approximately £31 per month.

Apart from the means test there are strict medical criteria which the Director of Community Care and Medical Officer for Health decide upon.

The application forms should be available at health centres or from the Health Board.

## Urban Council Call For Appointment of Chiropodist

Cllr. R. A. Walsh proposed a motion at the February monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council calling on the South Eastern Health Board to appoint as a matter of urgency, a Chiropodist under the Health Acts, for Old Age Pensioners and other deprived people.

Cllr. Walsh proposing the motion said that he had been informed that this was the only area that was not providing this service and he would like to have that checked out. He added that because of the lack of this service it was the old and poor people of the area that were suffering.

Cllr. B. Kyne who is one of two Co. Council representatives on the Health Board said that the service had been dropped for budgetary reasons as there had

been a £1.8 million cut-back by the Department of Health on the Board's estimates for this year. "The sentiment expressed in the motion will certainly find support but whether the finance required can be provided is another matter. I will chase it up at the next Board meeting and see what can be done," he said.

Cllr. Austin Hallahan supporting the motion said that chiropody was an essential service for old people as it was essential that

they be kept moving.

Referring to the cutback in the Health Board budget, Cllr. Hallahan criticised the government for the £ millions overspent in providing luxury offices and in entertaining during the EC Presidency last year. "If all the money had been saved it would more than provide for the cutback made in this year's Health Board estimates," he said, adding, "we would certainly want to get our priorities right where this is concerned."

The motion was also supported by Cllr. P. Power while the Chairman, Cllr. M. Dixon instanced the case of a local pensioner on £53 a week who recently had to pay £8 for chiropody.

Cllr. M. O'Riordan said that it was the poor and deprived that usually suffered when cutbacks were made in the services.

The motion as proposed by Cllr. Walsh was then passed unanimously.

Commenting on the ERAD Programme for 1991-93, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, President of the ICMSA, said it will cause unnecessary and severe hardship for farmers and it will do nothing to make progress in animal disease eradication.

Mr. O'Dwyer described it as a bad, unsympathetic and unworkable programme and said it neglects basic and fundamental aspects of disease eradication and consequently he said he is rapidly losing faith in the ability of the Management of ERAD to deliver good results.

"The proposal not to allow Veterinary Practitioners test their normal clients herds is an enormous insult to both farmers and Vets," he said.

### ASPERSIONS CAST ON ALL FARMERS

The ICMSA President went on to say: "ERAD has repeatedly cast aspersions on all farmers and all Vets, rather than dealing effectively with the few who might be flouting the regulations."

"The proposal to lock up those animals which do not pass the Export Test will cause immense problems. This could result in two out of every three herds having animals which they cannot sell on the open market or at least a twelve month pe-

riod. "Such a proposal shows a terrible unawareness of what is practical at farm level.

"Farmers have been continuously subjected to increased disease eradication levies and reduced compensation, while at the same time no real progress has been made in reducing the levels of Bovine TB.

"We are still without a proper scheme of reactor compensation, and we do not have an income supplement scheme based on the amount of hardship suffered by farmers whose income is cut off because they are locked up and cannot trade normally."

Mr. O'Dwyer concluded by saying that the staff of ERAD needed new thinking to bring a proper programme to the Board which would include effective identification of the sources of disease, the elimination of these sources and a proper package of reactor compensation and income supplement.

# PENSMAN Takes You . . . . Behind The SPOTLIGHT

## NEW COLOURED POSTCARDS FOR DUNGARVAN

Last November members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting drew attention to the lack of suitable greeting postcards for Dungarvan and the Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White referred the matter to County Development Officer Maurice McHugh to see what could be done about it.

Mr. McHugh got on the job and successfully took the matter up with the Dublin firm of John Hinde & Co. Ltd., the well-known producers of these greeting cards. Within a short period they sent a photographer to Dungarvan and the end result was seen at the February monthly meeting of the Urban Council when samples of the two cards produced by the firm were circulated to the members.

One of the cards shows a fine shot of the Square in full colour while the other is a montage of five small photos also in full colour. Two of the latter are shots of the quayside which would undoubtedly look far better had the tide not been out. This, very correctly, prompted Cllr. Billy Kyne to jocosely remark that it would be better if the next time the photographer came to Dungarvan, the tide was in! But apart from that, the postcards are really good and according to Mr. McHugh's letter to the Council, they will be available through the normal retail outlets in the near future.

## PLAIN ENGLISH —NOT GOBBLEDEGOOK

According to the current issue of the Incorporated Law Society Gazette, "the revolt against gobbledegook, whether statutory, legal or commercial, is gaining ground in many common law jurisdictions" as a result of which lawyers and accountants are to learn to speak the "plain man's language" with the Law Reform Commission preparing a report on plain English and a special commission of inquiry looking at ways of making financial accounts easier to read.

The Gazette's "Viewpoint" suggests that where the removal of gobbledegook is concerned, insurance policies should be given urgent priority but legislation, banking documentation and now legal writing should also be prime targets.

In regard to the latter, the article points out that the Law Society of England and Wales has recently pub-

lished a series of letters which identify a lack of clarity and suggesting simpler alternatives. Admitting that legal writers might be reluctant to abandon all of their traditional style and that certain words so used are not mere jargon but have precise technical meanings, it asks whether this should extend to such phrases as "hereinbefore recited" and "by divers mesne assurances events and acts in the law."

According to the Gazette using well worn precedents is comforting for the legislation draftsmen as it avoids the need for the exercise of the true discipline of drafting. It goes on to say that there are those who would argue for the preservation of the mystique of the law on the grounds that if a client could understand the document perhaps he would be tempted to draft it himself. It also questions whether adherence to the old drafting styles hides a deficiency in the teaching of English in our schools and argues that aiming at simple English will require a greater not a lesser command of the language.

In short the article avers that using simpler words will not be enough. The style will also have to change. There are already moves in the public service towards the improvement of the layout of language of a number of forms to be used by the public under which income tax returns and social welfare forms have been simplified.

The sooner plain English is introduced and the gobbledegook banished where all the other documentation is concerned better for us all.

## CORNCRAKE CAMPAIGN

The phenomenal decline of the corncrake — one time one of the most characteristic summer migrants to this country — has become a focal point of a major new campaign.

In recent years the call of the corncrake has been confined to a few scattered locations but the decline of the shy, secretive bird is

not just a characteristically Irish fact. Numbers have been steadily plummeting all over Europe.

Last week a national appeal to protect corncrakes was launched in Dublin as fears increased that the bird may be in danger of extinction. The Irish Wildbird Conservancy for the second time in recent years is to act to protect this one time common summer visitor which is now in serious decline.

With changing agricultural methods, the bird's habitat has come under increasing threat with the widespread development in silage operations. As a first move in their appeal the I.W.C. have now urged farmers to cut hay rather than silage, to alter moving patterns to enhance the survival of corncrake adults and chicks and to maintain early and late long vegetation for their cover.

A survey which was carried out some years ago showed that 95 per cent off all corncrakes were on agricultural land and the most important habitat was the meadow with more birds being recorded in hay rather than in silage.

The Conservancy has designated 1991 the Year of the Corncrake and later on with the welcoming approach of summer we will be asking readers who may hear a corncrake to let us have details of the date, place and type of habitat involved.

## A GREAT WATERFORD MAN DIES

An outstandingly great Waterford man in the person of Patrick "Fad" Browne died after a long illness in St. Patrick's Hospital, Waterford last week.

A former Fianna Fail T.D. for the Constituency, he was first elected to the Dail in the Waterford by-election in 1966 and served two terms before being elected to the Seanad.

Five times Mayor of Waterford, he served on Waterford Corporation for 34 years until his retirement in 1979 and was a highly popular personality throughout the county who was noted for his generosity, kindness and readiness to help those in need.

A noted hurler in his day, Fad Browne played for Waterford and Munster with distinction. His death now, even at the advanced age of 84, has been the source of widespread regret. Solus na bhFlaitheas d'a anam.

## ARE STANDARDS SLIPPING?

While we could never be accused of being prudish we wonder were standards slipping when we read in a national daily paper last week a front page heading about the Lucky Streak winnings of an unmarried teenage mum. The story was accompanied with a picture of the 19-year-old girl, side by side with one of her holding the baby which was born to her two days previously.

The following day one of the Dublin Sunday papers had a front page story, "And baby makes two," in which it was stated that a T.V. personality had become a dad but had no intention of getting married as "he was no longer romantically attached to the mother of his child." The "dad" is quoted as saying as he braced himself for some negative reaction, "thank God that attitudes in this backward land of ours have changed, there will be a lot of people who will say that's disgraceful, but I couldn't care less."

For good measure on the front page of the same paper other headings proclaimed, "Brutal City Rape Starts Garda Hunt" and "Gaybo milks the marital arts."

We regret if this is the manner in which attitudes have changed in this backward land of ours and make no apologies for saying this.

## A SEA RESCUE AT DUNGARVAN — IN 1861

While searching through some old files last week-end we came across the account of an heroic sea rescue off Ballinacourty Point in 1861 — which was 34 years before the "Moresby" was wrecked in the same place.

At about 7 p.m. on Tuesday, February 19, 1861 word reached Dungarvan that a ship, the brig "Susan," had struck on Ballinacourty Point and was breaking up. The vessel had grounded at 1.45 a.m. so there was little hope that any of those on board had survived. Nonetheless a party led by Mr. E. N. Barron, Crown Solicitor, set out from Dungarvan and on arrival at Ballinacourty it was seen that some men were still on board clinging to the remnants of the vessel.

The "Susan" was owned

by Scotts of Cork and was bound from Cardiff to Cork with a cargo of coal. She had a crew of six including Captain Scogings and the mate B. Baker. The latter recounted later that on the previous night a severe gale blew up and the brig lost some of her rigging. The Captain decided to seek shelter in Dungarvan Bay but the vessel gradually became unmanageable and struck on Ballinacourty Point.

Robert L. Barron son of the Crown Solicitor volunteered to man a boat and the young man's courageous example was followed by Captain Dower of the Dungarvan Harbour Board and four other brave

men whose names were not recorded. It was then 11 a.m. They rowed out from Ballinacourty against the enormous sea that was running and succeeded in rescuing the Captain and the Mate. Unfortunately by that time, the four seamen, one of whom was coloured, were drowned but there was no indication of how they died, whether they were swept overboard or died trying to reach the shore.

Even at a distance of 130 years it is good to recall the great courage of the brave men who lived in Dungarvan in those days and who risked their lives so gallantly to save others in distress.

All the way from the good old U.S. of A. a request came to us last week for the words of the well-known and once very popular "Old Skibbereen" and so to fulfil this request from our reader in far away St. Louis, Missouri, we make it our choice for the ballad corner this week:

Oh, father dear I oft times hear you speak of Erin's Isle,  
Her lofty scenes, her valleys green, her mountains wild and high,  
They say it is a lovely land wherein a prince might dwell,  
Oh, why did you abandon it, the reason to me tell.

Oh, son I loved my native land with energy and pride  
Till a blight came o'er my crops — my sheep, my cattle died,  
My rent and taxes were too high, I could not them redeem,  
And that's the cruel reason that I left old Skibbereen.

Oh, well do I remember the bleak December day,  
The landlord and the sheriff came to drive us all away  
They set my roof on fire with their cursed English spleen  
And that's another reason that I left old Skibbereen.

Your mother, too, God rest her soul, fell on the snowy ground,  
She fainted in her anguish seeing the desolation all around,

And found a quiet grave my boy, in dear old Skibbereen.

And you were only two years old and feeble was your frame,  
I could not leave you with my friends, you bore your father's name,  
I wrapped you in my 'cota mor' at the dead of night unseen,  
I heaved a sigh and said good-bye to dear old Skibbereen.

Oh, father dear, the day may come when in answer to the call  
Each Irishman with feeling stern will rally one and all,  
I'll be the man to lead the van beneath the flag so green,  
When loud and high we'll raise the cry — Remember Skibbereen!"

**INGREDIENTS:**  
225g (8oz) digestive biscuits, crushed  
75g (3oz) unsalted butter  
450g (1lb) curd cheese  
150ml (5fl oz) plain yogurt  
4 tablespoons clear honey  
2 eggs  
25g (1oz) plain flour  
pinch mixed spice  
grated rind of one lemon  
2 apples, peeled cored and chopped



**These two will be the apple of your eye**

**For the topping**

2 apples  
lemon juice  
150ml (5fl oz) apple juice  
2 teaspoons clear honey  
3 teaspoons arrowroot

Line the sides of a 21cm (8½") loose bottomed cake tin. Melt the butter, then mix in the crushed biscuits, tip into cake tin and press into the base.

Heat the oven to 170C/325F/Gas Mark 3. Put cheese, yogurt, honey, eggs, flour, spice and lemon rind into a bowl and beat until

smooth. Fold in the chopped apple, then spoon into the tin. Level the surface, then bake for about 45 minutes until the cake feels firm. Cool, then remove from the tin.

Core and thinly slice the remaining apples and arrange over the top of cake, brush with lemon juice. Put the apple juice and honey into a pan, mix the arrowroot with a tablespoon of water, stir into pan and simmer until thickened. Pour over the apple slices,

leave to cool, then refrigerate to set.

Serves 8.

**APPLE CREAM TART**

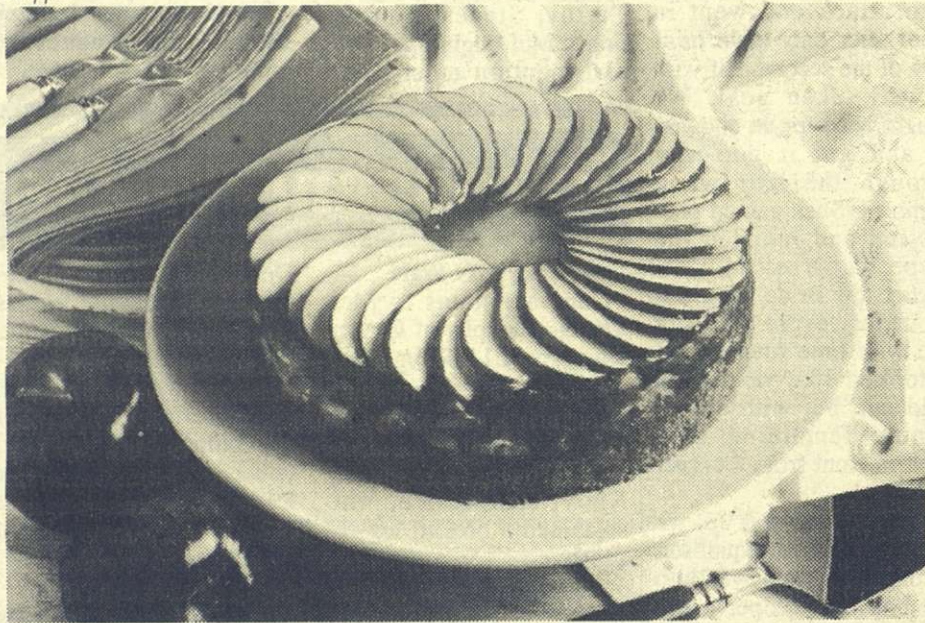
**INGREDIENTS:**  
75g (3oz) plain flour  
125g (4oz) porridge oats  
50g (2oz) caster sugar  
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon  
75g (3oz) butter or margarine  
**Filling:**  
3 apples  
210ml (7fl oz) double cream  
2 eggs plus 1 egg yolk  
50g (2oz) caster sugar

Heat the oven to 190C/375F/Gas Mark 5. Put the flour, porridge oats, sugar and cinnamon into a bowl, rub in the butter or margarine. Mix to a dough with cold water then knead on a lightly floured surface until smooth. Roll out and line a deep 20-23cm (8-9") flat tin.

Quarter the apples, core and roughly chop into chunks, put into the flan case. Beat together the cream, eggs and sugar, pour over the apples. Bake in the oven for about 30 minutes until the cream has set. Best served warm.

A wide range of topics have been discussed and debated: From the policies of George Bush to the attitude of Ireland's young people towards conservatism to the rights of the child.

The junior teams have been given an official hint that the motion in their category will pertain to minorities in Ireland, whereas the seniors know that they will have the thorny ques-

tions of censorship to discuss.

Good debating is about reasoned argument and convincing presentation. Very often a student can be 'landed' with the difficult task of trying to be convincing about a motion he/she has doubts about. The humorous debater may not be as convincing as may at first seem.

All the events are open to the public and anyone interested in participating will get a chance when the debate will be open for discussion to the audience.

**Was Fatally Crushed In Tractor Accident**

A verdict that death was due to crush injuries to the neck and chest with associated bleeding into both neck and chest was returned at an inquest held by the Coroner, Dr. D. F. Cantillon, Tallow into the circumstances surrounding the death of Michael Lenihan (39) which occurred following an accident on the family farm at Ballycullane, outside Dungarvan, on Friday, January 4.

The inquest was held in the Courthouse, Dungarvan, last Thursday before a jury of five men and one woman. Supt. R. McAndrew conducted the proceedings.

Dr. R. Tait, Consultant Pathologist, gave evidence of performing a post mortem examination on the body of the deceased at Waterford Regional Hospital on Friday, January 4 as a result of which he formed the opinion that death was due to crush injuries to the neck and chest with associated bleeding.

Mrs. Brenda Lenihan stated that on that day they were working at their farm in Ballycullane. Her husband was working on a tractor in the yard and when she returned after a short absence she realised he was in difficulties as he was pinned between the buckrake and the safety frame of the tractor. She got on the tractor and lowered the buckrake and he fell. She then raised the buckrake and with her son they pulled him clear. From

his colour she then realised that he was dead. She sent for Dr. Higgins.

Statements were also submitted to the inquest by Garda A. Deegan who went to the scene of the accident and by Sgt. D. F. McCarthy, PSV Inspector, Waterford who examined the tractor.

On the recommendation of the Coroner, the jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence.

Dr. Cantillon extended deepest sympathy to Mrs. Lenihan on the severe loss which she had sustained. The accident which had claimed her husband's life was a very tragic one and was an occurrence that appeared to be getting more common on farms in recent times, he said.

Mr. Morgan Hayes, foreman, on behalf of the members of the jury and Supt. McAndrew on behalf of the Garda Authorities associated themselves with the expression of sympathy.

**How to double your indoor plants**

MAKE March a profitable month by propagating indoor plants through cuttings from some varieties and by dividing others.

It is not only a satisfying thing to do but, in some cases, vital to ensure that healthy young stock is available for the flowering season.

It is also a cheap way to increase your plant stock, both by adding to your collection directly or by swapping new plants for those propagated by other houseplant growers.

An easy favourite is Busy Lizzie or Impatiens, which has soft succulent stems that root quickly in peat cutting compost. Cut tips about four inches long, add several to each pot and then

stand in warmth but out of direct sunshine.

You can even start cuttings by standing them in a glass of water. They soon sprout, providing particular entertainment for children. The young Impatiens can be shaped by pinching out growing tips to promote bushiness and lots of flowering stems.

Fuchsias are said to be one of the most popular plants amongst British gardeners and much is undoubtedly due to their ease of propagation and the many colours and types of bloom.

If you increase your stock by taking cuttings you are sure to find another Fuchsia fan only too happy to swap some varieties for yours.

Take four-inch stem tip cuttings and pick off the

lowest set of leaves before dipping the cut end in rooting hormone powder and planting in peat cutting compost.

They need warmth and moisture and can be helped by sealing the pot inside a clear plastic bag to create a small greenhouse, which is then stood out of the sun.

Within a month or so the cuttings should be strong enough for re-potting as indoor specimen plants or for later transfer to outdoor locations in May, such as hanging baskets.

Many gardeners are surprised to hear that Geraniums or Pelargoniums can also be raised from cuttings about now. Admittedly, there is more risk of rot at this time so watering must be carefully watched.

Again, the cuttings should

be about four inches long, but all but the highest leaves should be removed before each cutting is inserted into an individual pot and kept warm. They can be hardened off later for transplanting outside.

Many houseplants, such as Aspidistra, Maranta, St Paulia or African Violet, and Sansevieria or Mother-In-Law's Tongue, can be increased by division in spring when they are often due for re-potting.

If the plant is crowding its old pot or several distinct yet joined plants or flower rosettes have formed - as in the case of St Paulia - then gently cut the various sections and pot up individually.

**Fahey To Quit  
National Politics  
For Health Reasons**

Long serving Fianna Fail Deputy for Waterford Constituency, Jackie Fahey, announced last week-end that he had decided to quit national politics at the dissolution of the present Dail and that he would not be seeking re-election at the next general election. Earlier in the week he had informed the Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey, of his decision and while expressing regret, the Taoiseach appreciated the ample time which Deputy Fahey had afforded the Party organisation in the constituency to choose a suitable replacement candidate to contest the next election.

However, while he has decided to retire from the national scene, Mr. Fahey plans to continue in politics at local level and will again be a candidate in the forthcoming June Local Elections. But instead of contesting in the Dungarvan Electoral Area where he headed the pool in 1985 he has opted for the Kilmacthomas Area.

The selection convention for the Kilmacthomas area was held in Mothel last Thursday night at which his nomination was approved and was also the scene of a further surprise announcement when the

Deputy's son Sean stated that he had decided not to contest the local elections in June having won a Co. Council seat for the area at his first attempt in 1985.

Deputy Fahey's unexpected decision to retire from national politics has, in the main, been taken for health reasons. Last December he underwent heart by-pass surgery in the Blackrock Clinic in Dublin and while he has made an excellent recovery he has not as yet resumed active duties. First elected to the Dail for Tipperary South in 1965 where he remained for twelve years, he was elected a T.D. for Waterford in 1977 and has retained his seat here in every general election since. He served as Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries in the Fianna Fail Government between 1970-73 and was a Junior Minister at the Department of the Environment between 1979-81.

Deputy Fahey's career has been surrounded by a great deal of controversy and this was climaxed in July 1989 when he sensationally announced his resignation from the F.F. Parliamentary Party in protest against the "deal" made by Mr. Haughey to enter Coalition Government with the Progressive Democrats. He acted as an independent until he was re-admitted to the Parliamentary Party in February last year. He has been a member of Waterford Co. Council since 1950.

Deputy Fahey who now resides with his wife Maura at Springfield in Dungarvan plans to return to his native Lyreanearla, a few miles on the Waterford side of Clonmel, where he intends to build a new house on the family farm in the near future.

**Love me - love my Demodexfolliculorum**

THE unfriendly landscape is pitted with craters. There are pools of salty water filled with warm underground springs in which ugly stick-like creatures move with whiplash movements. In dense forest areas, wormy eight-legged animals climb horny, leafless tree trunks with their suction padded feet. Elsewhere, in dark, craggy caves, hordes of creatures huddle together for protection against enemies. It sounds like a ghoulish planet from the imagination of a science fiction writer. It is certainly enough to

make your skin creep. No wonder. That is just what it is - your skin. The skin, with all its nooks and crannies, is home to about two billion microbes and germs. The "human planet" has a constant temperature and the landscape is varied. The salt springs are our sweat glands, the tree trunks our hairs, the caves our nostrils and ears and the craters our pores. Microbiologist Mary Marples of Auckland, New Zealand, has made a lengthy study of skin. She says our guests congregate in "the desert of the forearm, the cool woods of the scalp and the tropical

forest of the armpit." Miss Marples has found that the armpit is the most densely inhabited part of the body. Bacteria there can be as numerous as 2,500,000 per square centimetres. The least populated areas are the barren wastes of the shoulder blades. The population there is hundreds per square centimetre. People associate germs, microbes and bacteria with dirt and disease. That is not fair. Many do more good than harm. Most are harmless. We have even arranged a truce with many of the potentially dangerous ones as long as they stay in their proper place. There is, for instance, a family of germs in the intestines which help deal with waste products. But if they migrate to other organs they set up violent inflammation. In the bladder they can cause cystitis. Disease-carrying germs try to go "underground", where they multiply prodigiously. Unless, that is, microbes which already inhabit the body and are their enemies can fight them. Many of these "goodies" are immigrants, introduced by inoculation. They are the soldier microbes whose job is to kill the "baddies". They usually succeed, but one notable exception is staphylococcus 80, which has an unknown weapon against them. Staph 80 - round-shaped and with ginger hair - defies

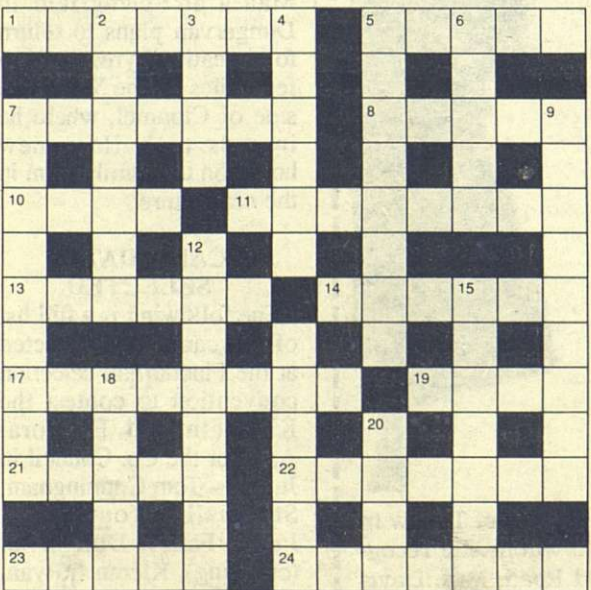


penicillin and thrives on other anti-biotics. Perhaps the oddest of our inhabitants is an animal called demodexfolliculorum. An animal? Experts say it can be correctly described as one. It has a long, thin body and eight legs with suction pads. It is the biggest creature on the "human planet" but harmless. It spends most of its time in herds in the forest regions - the eyelashes, the hair follicles of the outer nose and the chin. The mouth is the most heavily populated cave on the "human planet". Great battles between good germs and bad take place there. It is a place the disease-producing germs would love to occupy permanently - and often dominate for prolonged periods until ousted by the soldier germs. Teeth brushing, which removes much harmful food debris, does not get rid of the almost irremovable thin film which forms on the teeth after every meal. Beneath this film the bacteria which cause tooth decay live undisturbed, producing an acid which eats into the tooth enamel. Next time you think you are alone and unwanted, remember - there are millions of tiny creatures which can think of no-one they would rather be with.

# TALLOW NOTES

## McSHARRY SLAMMED AT TALLOW MEETING

In a hard hitting attack on E.C. Commissioner, Ray McSharry, Fine Gael spokesman on Agriculture, Austin Deasy told Tallow Fine Gael Branch members at their annual general meeting last weekend that if his proposals are implemented, it would be disastrous for the Irish farming community.

He said a leaked report that is in circulation shows the price of milk will drop by 10p a gallon this Summer and up to 15p a gallon in the Autumn, while a cut in the milk quota by 4.5% would take place. Mr. Deasy went on to say that Mr. McSharry is also going to cut the sheep farmers income by introducing a quota system taking the average number of sheep in flocks for 1987/88/89 and will curtail the ewe premium further.

Tallow members were told that beef prices would also be hit. While there is now 700 thousand tons of beef in intervention, cattle prices could drop by another £100 a head. On the grain issue, the price could go back to £70 a ton which was almost unthinkable for the grain growers of this country.

Mr. Deasy went on to say that these drastic measures should not be implemented as they would affect the whole fabric of Irish society. Already 42,000 jobs have been lost in the meat industry and thousands of other jobs with farming connections are now hanging in a silk thread.

Why is there not a rumpus about this report, he asked, will farmers leave the fight until it's too late. The I.F.A. members should be expressing their views, and should silence their former President, Paddy Lane, M.E.P., who now agrees with Mr. McSharry's proposals.

On the Disadvantaged Areas, Mr. Deasy says the present list of townlands already submitted will be passed next month and while there are 255 thousand cases in the appeal system, only 1.5% of these will be included. "I have asked that this be increased to 3%, especially in East-Cork, Waterford and Tipperary," said Mr. Deasy.

Mr. Deasy concluded telling the Tallow members that if Mr. McSharry implements these proposals, it would mean the end of life in rural Ireland.

Mr. O'Kennedy, Minister for Agriculture was now too weak to oppose the cuts and not capable of making any worthwhile decision on his own.

The election of officers were as follows:

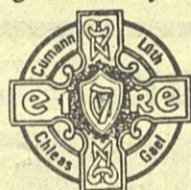

# No Change In Championship Format

Eamon Murphy, Chairman, presided at the first meeting of the County Board held on Monday night of this week.

**CHAMPIONSHIP DEBATE**

A debate on the format of the championships lasted for one hour before the meeting voted strongly against a return to the knockout system.

The Clashmore motion which proposed a proper league and a pure knockout in both hurling and football championships was moved by Timmy O'Keeffe, who made a very strong case. This was heavily defeated.

The Lismore motion to have the hurling championship played in four sections in a league and knockout formula was given some support, but was eventually defeated by 22 votes to 14. Michael O'Leary made the case for Lismore as he did at con-

vention. Phil Fanning, Cnoc Sion, made the case for continuing on a league basis with both championships, but to have two, instead of three, qualify at the closing stages. This was carried by 22-14 after a roll call vote.

Quite a number of delegates abstained in the voting, many of them expressing the opinion that this should have been left to the clubs involved.

Greg Fives spoke strongly in favour of the knockout championship and Liam Fardy spoke at length in favour of retaining the league system.

**FRAHER FIELD**

Nioclás Mac Craith addressed the meeting on the matter of development of the Fraher Field and said it

was in a bad state of repair and listed the things that have to be done immediately. He asked for permission from the Board to present a plan to the April meeting, giving an outline of the wall replacement, terracing, a small stand for 800 people, fencing, etc., etc. Permission was granted.

He also told the meeting that the caretaker, Paddy Fitzgerald, had recently retired and the committee were now seeking a replacement. At this stage, Jimmy O'Gorman paid tribute to the tremendous work carried out by Paddy over almost 20 years. He said that Paddy in his desire to keep the show going, had gone far beyond the call of duty, week after week over the years. The Chairman concurred.

**ST. PAUL'S ADMITTED**

A new club from the St. Paul's district of the city was allowed to affiliate. The application stated that the area catered for several thousand young people, but had no GAA club. The application was given unanimous approval.

**NO GROUP TEAMS**

An application by An Rinn/Seana Phobal/Ardmore to be allowed affiliate a group team in senior hurling and football was rejected by a big majority. This was a surprise application considering that only two weeks previously the Ring Club had voted against having the junior championship played in one section, because it would involve too many games.

**REPORTS**

Following the report from the Central Council delegate there was criticism of the enormous increase in the price of tickets for the All-Ireland finals. The Chairman said it was disgraceful that County Boards were not given an opportunity of discussing price increases before they were agreed.

**NEW LEAGUE FORMAT**

The meeting approved of the proposed new National League format and instructed their representative to support the recommendations at the next meeting of the Council.

The remainder of the meeting will appear next week.

The fact that the Waterford Selectors could not have selected their team over the week-end will again spell disappointment for supporters. I was informed on Monday that the team would not be named until Tuesday, so it is unlikely to be available for publication.

It may not show changes from the side which lost to Tipperary two weeks ago, but there have been unconfirmed rumours that Paudie Prendergast and Kieran Delahunty will be back for the game. Both would strengthen our chances of beating Kilkenny in this vital game on Sunday.

The result is vital as defeat could leave us in a precarious situation in a couple of week's time when the league section of the competition ends.

Cork are slowly but surely climbing up behind us on the table and should they beat Limerick in their final match and if we win no further points, then we will have to meet in a play-off situation to decide on fourth place in the division. A win or a draw against Kilkenny on Sunday or against Wexford in Gorey on March 24, would now see us through with Tipperary, Wexford and Kilkenny.

Waterford played very well against Tipperary and many of our supporters feel that some improvement on this would be enough to beat Kilkenny. I would see an improvement in teamwork needed if our challenge to the National League title holders, Kilkenny, is to succeed on Sunday.

It will be an advantage

that the game is in Walsh Park, as this is where our hurlers perform best.

The tremendous rivalry which exists between the counties will bring out the best in both and this will ensure that this meeting between the neighbours will be equally as exciting as many of the other great clashes which made the headlines over the years.

The Kilkenny team shows just one change in personnel from the team which beat Wexford by 1-21 to 2-12 on the day on which we lost to Tipperary. There are a couple of positional changes as well.

Liam O'Connor would need to be far more mobile if he is to be effective, but it is unlikely that he will be omitted from the lineout.

The panel were together on Saturday and Sunday last and will train on three or four occasions this week. So there can be no worries about their being tuned up for this tie.

As I see the outcome of the game, it will take an improvement on our performance against Tipperary, to leave us with a fifty-fifty chance of getting the points.

# Artane Boys Band

When the All-Ireland finals are played this year, every person entering the grounds will have subscribed 50p towards the special fund which was set up recently to save the famous band. This will also apply to the four provincial finals.

At the moment, the band are very heavily in debt, their uniforms and musical instruments are so outworn that they are unlikely to last for another season. Their bandroom is in an advanced state of repair and requires expensive renovation. There are hun-

dreds on the waiting list to join the band, but no instruments are available and accommodation is also a problem. About £450,000 is needed to set everything right and the G.A.A. hopes to donate about £250,000 of this figure.

### A BAND WITH A PROUD HERITAGE

The Artane Boys Band was founded by the Christian Brothers in 1872 and gave its first public performance, two years later. Membership of the Band was confined to pupils of an Industrial School in Artane for underprivileged boys and was run by the Brothers until the school closed after the big fire in 1969. After this, Rev. Bro. Joseph O'Connor, who was Band Administrator from 1953 until his death in 1986, was allowed to recruit members from other schools in Dublin.

In February '69 a fire destroyed the bandroom, instruments, uniforms, music sheets, etc. and the future of the Band was in jeopardy until subscriptions began to pour in from all over the world.

The Band in its day, has performed all over the world as well as at All-Ireland finals. The full-sized Band is 82, but because of uniform and instrument problems, only 63 play on All-Ireland Day at the moment.

### SOME FAMOUS OLD BOYS

The musical training provided the opportunity to many boys to pursue a professional career. Best known former members are:— Larry Mullins, who is now the drummer with U2; Leo Barnes, Saxophonist with Hot House Flowers; Andy Farrell, Saxophonist with Tequila Sunrise. Several former boys are now in the R.T.E. Symphony Orchestra, the Garda Band and the Army, etc.

## Helvick Oil Field Targeted

about. The Helvick Oil Field — so named because of its location on Block 49/9 off the Waterford coast, 25 miles from Helvick Head — flow tested high quality crude oil at a combined rate of 9,901 barrels per day in 1983.

Since then three further wells have been drilled, one of which flowed oil. This allowed Atlantic to delineate the extent of the field, and the partners feel there is between 10 million and 20 million barrels of oil in place. "We have a definite intention to get into production if the commercial realities are favourable." Mr. Emmet Brown, Atlantic Resources' Managing Director stated at the announcement in Dublin.

### FLOATING PRODUCTION SYSTEM

An innovative floating production system already used in the development of oilfields in the Timor Sea off Northern Australian would allow oil from the Helvick Oil Field to be pumped through an umbilical pipe to tug boats which would shuttle back and forth to the Whitegate Refinery some 40 miles away.

The Minister for Energy, Mr. Bobby Molloy, welcomed the announcement which he said would result in Irish oil being brought ashore for the first time in commercial quantities.

All going well it is expected that the project could be operational by April of next year.

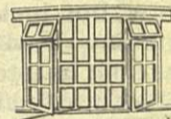
