Cars Stolen In Dungarvan

Gardai in Dungarvan are investigating a number of incidents which occurred in the town on last Sunday night/Monday morning.

Two cars were stolen from outside houses at St. Garvan's Terrace. Mr. Noel Doherty of 1, Garvan's Terrace was the owner of one of the cars which was subsequently located by Gardai in a burned out condition in Limerick City while the other the property of his next door neighbour Mr. Sean O'Brien, 2, Garvan's Terrace, was later found intact in Abbeyside.

For the second time in a few months the display window at the jewellery premises of O. Baumann & Sons at Mary Street had to withstand an attack. It took place at 3.25 a.m. on Monday morning but as on the previous occasion on December 2, the re-inforced "bandit" glass fronting the display again withstood the attack. Gardai suspect the attempted robbery was mounted by out-of-town individuals who used a sledge hammer in an effort to break the window.

Fianna Fail's 58th Ard Fheis This Week-End

The 58th Ard Fheis of the Fianna Fail Party will take place at the R.D.S., Dublin this coming week-end, March 8, 9 and 10. With a total of 168 motions down for discussion, nothing of a very controversial nature is expected to arise as most deal with routine and organisational matters and no acrimonious motions have found their way on to the agenda.

As usual the highlight of the Ard Fheis will be the Presidential Address to be delivered by the Taoiseach, Mr. Charles J. Haughey, which is timed for 8 p.m. on Saturday night.

On the agenda there are a total of 13 motions or related motions sent in by Cumainn or Comhairle Ceanntair in Waterford. Among these are calls to investigate fully the high charges of telephone calls and rental in this country (Cathal Brugha Cumann, Waterford); recommending that the free fuel voucher scheme be used for the purpose for which it was intended (Dungarvan Comhairle Ceanntair); that the IDA be encouraged to locate industry in rural towns and villages (Ballyduff/Kilmeaden Cumann); calling for the herring quota system to be changed to a quota per boat per week for the herring season (Dunmore East Cumann); praising the efforts of the Minister for Agriculture to obtain the largest ever extension under the Disadvantaged Areas Scheme and urging that he introduce at an early date an appeals system for areas not

included (Dungarvan, Tramore and Liam MacCoitir Cumainn); that before any future coalition arrangements are entered into by Fianna Fail that the views of the "grassroots" be taken into account (Dan Breen Cumann, Waterford); recommending that new methods of fundraising be devised to replace church gate and door-to-door collections (Lismore); calling for the introduction of a policy of Local Government Reform with particular reference to Local Authority funding before the next Local Elections (Waterford City); calling on the Fianna Fail party in Government to honour its commitment to review local service charges and to examine the notion of having them uniform throughout the country and tax deductible (Waterford City).

The total number of Cumainn in Waterford registered for 1990 was 76, an increase of 13 on the previous year.

For the benefit of delegates special catering and bar arrangements will, as usual, be provided while on the social side, Cairde Fail are organising a "Meet The

Ministers" dance with music by Joanna Tequila Sunrise in the Annexe on Friday night

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

BUILD WITH CHRIST

The story in the first reading on Sunday next is once more an example of infidelity and rejection. When the Lord sent His messengers and His prophets, they just laughed and mocked them. Having exhausted every reasonable means to restore their faith, the Lord allowed them to be overrun by the enemy. Those who survived the onslaught were taken into captivity. And, it was then in the midst of their troubles that they turned back to God, and He listened. For after seventy years, Cyrus, king of Persis, allowed them to return to their homeland. These very happenings have been repeated many times, and even being re-enacted in life today. God's cause is not popular. Many think they know better. They reject His laws, and belittle His Church. Literally, they exile themselves from the people of God. Fortunately, we have a patient God. He is not watching and waiting to catch us in our nakedness. His patience is infinite. He wants us to return to our homeland. No wonder He is called the Good Shepherd.

So, He'll wait for the opportune time to pour a longing and a craving into those souls. He might enlist you to help, but if called, would you be ready? However, do remember, whatever you say or do, let it be done with the goodness and the gentleness of Christ. If you're willing to help in the promotion of this great work, Lent is an ideal time to ready yourself for this mission. Lent too is harvest time, so helpers are urgently needed. The reading related what happened to those who would not listen: they were punished, and they died whilst they lived in darkness. I fear souls are being misled by the so-called openness in which the media discuss and promote views that are evil in the sight of God. And, as if to confuse the issue, they give the impression that what may be wrong for a Catholic, may be all right for a Christian, which is downright rubbish. Let us fight this evil by arming ourselves with the spirit of Christ. Do not lose confidence. God wins all His battles.

Paul in the second reading asks us to stop and think. He makes it clear that without God's help there is no hope. Hence, we must use the help, which He has made so readily available. Paul explains God's great generosity by pointing out the lengths He went to in order to help; and this He did, when we were still in our sins. So, it would be wrong to doubt His love and His mercy. The graces that flow from Calvary are capable of making spotless a soul hardened and encrusted with a life-time of sin. It's easy to imagine how a lost soul will be tantalised by the fact, he'd only to ask for pardon. I met many who did not practice their religion. Some came back, and some said: "they'd think about it." I'm not denying that they may have cried for pardon, but they delayed too long and died without manifesting their return to the fold!

Paul alludes to Christ's glorious ascen-

sion, and points out that we, having risen with Him in Baptism, have already started our ascension into glory. You could say, we are on our way, and we must not allow anything to divert us. It follows, because we are frail and human, we must pray and use the Sacraments as the Master directed. It means doing periodic overhauls, a renewal of our resolutions and Lent is an ideal time for such practices. Your every effort will win further helps from God.

MAN'S REBIRTH

The basic theme in the three readings is man's rebirth, which was made possible by Christ's victory on Calvary. God's love, the Gospel tells us, is the starting point of the work of salvation, and this is worth remembering, because we're inclined to focus all our concentration on our love of God. It is clear, if we hope to reap the fruits of Calvary, we must accept and believe the Word. It's obvious, those who refuse God's light and chose to live in darkness, will be condemned. There's one thing God will not do, and that's to force us into submission, so don't blame Him for failures. He died for us. He wants to help us to build afresh, and make a new life with Him.

Recently, I suggested the use of the Cross as a source of inspiration. The Calvary scene may appear to be a picture of sorrow and defeat, but it is also one of dedication and love. Nothing fills us with such confidence as the fact that God loves us, as proved by the Sacrifice He offered for us. It is difficult to believe. Yet! the fact is, He does. You see, He is our Father. We are His children. And, He died to save us. The question is, how do we secure our inheritance? In His last will He left us the means and the instructions, so the matter is in our own hands. We follow in His footsteps. And, one day we'll rejoice to find we are the image of God, our Father.

Decree For £3,780 In Ladder Fall Action

Michael Joyce, 74, Childers Estate, Dungarvan was awarded a decree for £3,780 and costs by Judge M. F. Deery at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week in his claim for personal injuries and loss of wages against George Horsom, Dro-mana, Villierstown, Cappoquin and George Horsom (Electrical) Ltd.

Mr. J. O'Kelly BL (instructed by E. A. Ryan & Co.) for the applicant said that while he was employed by the defendant at the defendant's premises at Quay Street, Dungarvan on September 15, 1988 he fell from a ladder and sustained serious injuries to his wrist and elbow.

Joyce in evidence said that the defendant's premises were undergoing renovations at the time and on the day in question he was going down from the first floor to the ground. As there was no stairs, part of an extension ladder was being used and as he was getting on the ladder it slipped and he fell to the ground. He had not previously been warned not to use the ladder. In the fall he injured his wrist and elbow and was taken to hospital. He was out of work as a result for just over a year and as a result suffered a net loss of £1140 in wages.

The defendant, George Horsom, told the court that he first employed Joyce in late June, 1988 and for the first few weeks he was very punctual but then began to drop off and witness had to go to his house several times to get him to come to work. At the time he was having the premises of one of the shopping units at Quay Street renovated and was operating only on the ground floor. About 4 days after the accident he made an offer of light work to Joyce but Joyce said he was unable to come back. For several weeks after when he put the same question, he got the same answer.

Witness said he went up and down the ladder himself and always found it stable. On the day of the accident he said the plaintiff came down with his back to the ladder and when it slipped he fell down into the stairwell.

Colman O'Flynn, Building Contractor, Tallow in evidence said that in 1988 he was engaged by the defendant to carry out renovation work to his premises. He saw the plaintiff go up and down the ladder and on numerous occasions he "got on to him" for coming down backwards but the plaintiff said that was the way it was done by the Civil Defence. It was absolutely dangerous to go down a ladder in that fashion.

Judge Deery in summing up said he had no doubt that the ladder did slip and that it was an unsafe system to use. He was satisfied on the balance of evidence that there was negligence on the part of

the defendant in not securing the ladder properly but he also felt that the plaintiff should have been aware of this. He was also satisfied that the plaintiff had not made very strenuous efforts to go back to work. In all the circumstances he apportioned negligence as to 60% on the part of the defendant

and 40% on the part of the plaintiff.

In regard to loss of wages Judge Deery allowed plaintiff a sum of £300 and for the injuries he allowed £6,000 and on the basis of the apportionment of negligence he then granted a decree to the plaintiff for 60 p.c. of the total or £3,780 together with costs.

United Farmers Association News

The UFA meeting on TB and Brucellosis Compensation at Lawlor's Hotel on Wednesday, February 20, got off to a late start owing to a mechanical breakdown which delayed the visiting speakers. However, Con Howard of North Tipperary and Michael McEligot of Limerick were well worth waiting for and those present learned a lot in a short time about the kind of losses and hardship that some farmers suffered as a result of the TB and Brucellosis schemes being operated in a non-statutory way.

Con Howard spoke on his long battle for justice, and his difficulties arising from having his herd locked up for thirteen years. He pointed out that at present it will cost a herdowner fourteen thousand pounds per annum if movement restrictions are placed on an average herd.

In his summing up he advised farmers to insist on having reactors taken out under Section 58 of the Diseases of Animals Act 1966. This will ensure that proper compensation is paid to the farmer. Section 58 includes a provision for the fixing of compensation

by agreement between the farmer and the Minister or in default of agreement by a valuer appointed with the consent of both parties or failing such consent by a valuer appointed by the Minister.

The UFA recently had a very satisfactory meeting with the Northern Ireland Agricultural Producers' Association, NIAPA. Both organisations have the common aim of keeping the maximum number of family farms intact. Further meetings and co-operation are planned as well as a link-up with farmer organisations of like mind across Europe.

Know Your Rights

Q. — I am aged 79, live alone and am not in good health. If my widowed daughter comes to live with me will she be eligible for the Carers Allowance and will I be able to retain the Free Electricity Allowance and the Free Telephone Rental?

A. — Presumably, your daughter has a Widow's Pension or some other source of income. If her income comes to more than £45 per week she will not be eligible for the Carer's Allowance.

If you need full-time care and attention and your daughter will be providing this, then, you will retain the Free Electricity Allowance.

You will lose the Free Telephone Rental unless your daughter is also eligible for it in her own right. In this case your doctor would have to certify that you would be unable to summon help quickly in an emergency. The telephone account would have to be transferred into your daughter's name and then she could apply for the Allowance.

Note that if any non-dependent children of our daughter also come to live in the household, this would disqualify you from the Free Electricity Allowance. The presence in the household of children aged over 15 years would disqualify you from the Free Telephone Rental.

Dungarvan Courier Awarded £10,000 In Defamation Action

Holding that some of the allegations made by the defendants went beyond the privilege permissible in such circumstances, Judge M. F. Deery at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week awarded a decree for £10,000 and costs to Patrick (Pat) Power, trading as Power Couriers, Cushcam, Dungarvan in his action for defamation against Michael Dunford and Stafford Miller (Ireland) Ltd., Youghal Road, Dungarvan.

Mr. S. Lanigan O'Keeffe BL (instr. by J. F. Williams & Co.) was for Mr. Power and Mr. T. Slattery BL and Mr. J. Quirke BL (instr. by Arthur Cox & Co.) were for the respective defendants.

Opening the case, Counsel for the plaintiff stated that Mr. Power had worked hard over the last eight years to build up his parcel delivery service which was based at Cushcam outside Dungarvan. On March 12 last year following the delivery of parcels to Stafford Miller by one of Mr. Power's drivers, Mr. Dunford, who was later stated to be warehouse supervisor at Stafford Miller, phoned Mr. Buckley of GB Insulations Ltd., Cork and made what Counsel described as "a number of extraordinary and vicious allegations" against Mr. Power. Firstly that Mr. Power's driver had thrown the boxes from the van and had kicked them while they were being delivered, secondly that Power Couriers were barred from making deliveries to Stafford Miller and thirdly that the plaintiff on a previous occasion had forged the name of Mr. Dunford on a delivery docket and he then suggested that in future Mr. Buckley should use a different courier.

Mr. Lanigan-O'Keeffe went on to say that Mr. Buckley's reaction to this phone call was one of extreme annoyance with Mr. Power on whom he then called for an explanation. In response, Mr. Power told Mr. Buckley that these allegations were all completely without foundation. Plaintiff then contacted Stafford

Miller and Mr. Dunford denied making the allegations.

The defence pleaded a denial that the allegations were made and that the complaint as made was justified and covered by qualified privilege.

First witness was Michael Buckley, Mayfield, Cork, Sales Representative of GB Insulations, Doughcloyne Industrial Estate, Cork, who stated that on Wednesday, March 7, 1990 he employed Power Couriers to deliver some parcels to Stafford Miller. On the afternoon of March 12 he got a phone call from Michael Dunford from Stafford Miller who told him that he was totally unhappy with the delivery service of Power Couriers, that the driver had kicked the boxes off the truck, threw the delivery docket at him and had then driven off like a madman.

Witness said that Mr. Dunford then said that they had trouble with Power Couriers before, that his name had been forged to a delivery docket and that Power was barred from making deliveries to Stafford Miller.

Mr. Buckley went on to say that on hearing this he was very angry with Power Couriers for taking the goods when they were barred from delivering. He contacted Mr. Power at once by phone and asked him for an explanation. Mr. Power was totally surprised when witness told him of what Mr. Dunford had said and denied it. Witness added that since then he has continued to use Power Couriers and has always found them satisfactory.

Patrick Power in evidence said he was plaintiff in the action. He started his courier business 8 years ago and worked by himself, sometimes for up to 17 hours a day, to build it up. After a few years when the business prospered he employed a driver and never had any serious complaints. He never had complaints or difficulties with Stafford Miller. He was never barred and never had forged a delivery docket.

Plaintiff then said that when Mr. Buckley phoned him about the allegations made by Mr. Dunford he was very angry and annoyed. He was very upset about the forgery allegation as it was unbelievable. When he contacted Mr. Dunford, the latter denied that he had said any of the things alleged to Mr. Buckley. Witness then phoned Mr. Leo, General Manager at Stafford Miller who said he would refer the matter to a Mr. Morrissey. As he heard nothing further after two weeks he consulted his solicitor as he was very concerned about the matter which could finish his business if what was said got around.

Terry O'Hara said he was the Power Courier driver who made the delivery to Stafford Miller on March 7. He denied ever having any rows or having been barred there and said that on the day in question he placed the goods for delivery on the ground in the delivery bay and did not kick them. He then walked over to Mr. Dunford with the delivery docket and after a few seconds he left but did not drive away like a madman.

DENIED ALLEGATIONS

Michael Dunford stated in evidence that he was employed as warehouse supervisor at Stafford Miller. On the day in question he saw a van come in and the driver took out some parcels and threw them into the loading bay area. As the driver was handing over the delivery docket he gave the parcels on the ground a kick. He then ran out and got into the van and drove off in seconds.

Witness went on to say that some time later he phoned Mr. Buckley to express dissatisfaction at the way the delivery was made but he denied that he had said Mr. Power had previously forged a delivery docket or that Power Couriers were barred from delivering to Stafford Miller. He added that he had no wish to harm Mr. Power and that there had been no enmity between them in the past. When Mr. Power phoned witness about the allegations he became very abusive and accused witness of trying to ruin his business.

Michael Leo, General Manager, Stafford Miller, gave evidence of having a lengthy conversation on the phone with Mr. Buckley about the matter during which he refuted that Power Couriers were barred from delivering to Stafford Miller. He said that there had been a misunderstanding about the forgery allegation but that had also been cleared up.

Judge Deery in his summing up said that in regard to qualified privilege it was necessary that complaints made must be on a reasonable basis to succeed. To say that parcels had been kicked or that a driver left in a hurry was not outside the bounds of qualified privilege. But the allegation of forgery which was persisted with turned out to have no substance whatsoever. The question of whether the plaintiff was barred was also a very serious allegation to make about any courier and he had no doubt that this was said to Mr. Buckley although, again, there was no substance to the assertion. Those matters, Judge Deery then said, went beyond any privilege permissible, they were serious and defamatory of the plaintiff and in the circumstances he would award him a decree for £10,000 damages and costs.

More Memories of Growing Up in West Waterford

MARKET DAY IN TALLOW

Casting my mind back to the early nineteen thirties I can well recall how the country came to life in the springtime. After the dormant season during which there was little or no income for the rural folk nature began to play its part — cows calved, milk became plentiful and so one of the main sources of income derived from butter was revived. Long before creameries came into being every farmer made his own butter.

This was a weekly operation, usually carried out in our parish on a Thursday as the following day was market day in Tallow. To make the butter on the farm, milk had to be separated twice a day while it was still hot from the cow. The separator was operated manually by winding a big handle which in turn rotated a spindle at very high speed. The milk flowed, slowly from a large container on top, on to the fast moving spindle and so the liquids of different densities were separated by centrifugal force. The cream being heavier moved to the outside of the spindle and was caught and extracted through a spout at the side of the machine. The remainder, which was about twenty times more plentiful, came out to the front of the machine.

The cream was then accumulated for a week or so and allowed to go sour. When it was deemed ready it was put into a churn, again operated manually, and converted into butter. This was a weekly operation and sometimes took hours depending on the weather. The churn which was like a barrel had beaters and so turned into butter. When it had gathered into a semi-solid state it was removed and washed in clean water in a vessel called a keeler.

Butter was handled by means of small wooden bats which had corrugated faces. It was possible to make very nice designs on the butter by means of the bats and indeed some women were expert at doing this. The butter was usually brought to market in a white cloth which in turn was placed in a rigid box or pan.

Market day in Tallow was always the scene of much activity. The country folk arrived in their various modes of conveyance and converged on the Bride Valley Stores yard where the buyers usually did their business. The principal buyers in those days were Paxmans of Lismore, Whitekers of Cork and Tim Daly from Ballyduff also bought for a Cork Merchant. The butter sold and the cash received, the country folk set out to do

their shopping.

In those days shopping was a slow process. Various shops had to be visited to get the different commodities. Not like today when most of the shopping can be done under one roof. The men folk went to the hardware and the animal feed stores while the women bought the groceries, meat and drapery. In the grocers at that time most goods were weighed on demand and wrapped neatly in brown paper parcels and tied with twine. All this took time.

In the hardware shops one could be hours as it seemed that all the men folk visited there for bits and pieces of various kinds. The last port of call would be the public-house where a man and his wife would have a few drinks. The women usually took their drinks in the snug. This was a small compartment at the end of the counter which afforded them privacy. At that time it was very rare to see a female drinking in the open bar.

EXCEPTIONAL CASES

In exceptional cases only women went to market. Some men preferred to stay at home and carry on with the work rather than waste

a day in town. On the other hand there were instances of where the women stayed at home while the men went out for the day. This sometimes proved somewhat embarrassing for the men when they were asked to make purchases of personal items for the women.

One case in point comes to my memory. Paddy was preparing for his trip to town when his wife, a big buxom woman, asked him to buy her a brassiere. Paddy did not know what she was talking about. As far as he was concerned it could be a beer garden or a container for burning coal. If she had called it, as the Germans more accurately do, a bustenhalter, he just might have understood. "You better write that out," he said.

So the woman wrote a little note and she told him "Go in to Kellehers and give that to Peg Hogan she will know what to give you," Paddy did as instructed but unfortunately Peg had a day off so he was approached by a little shop assistant who did not know Paddy's wife. She looked at the note and said to Paddy "What bust." He said "Yerra girleen nothing at all, it just wore out."

Many people served their country and others have cherished memories of "The Emergency" when Ireland, a small island state stood alone when Europe was at war, to preserve its neutrality and Commandant Young's lecture will prove immensely interesting not only for them but for younger generations as a period of national pride and service to fatherland.

Youghal Fisherman Must Pay £800 For Disco Assault

A quality surveyor who was viciously assaulted in a Youghal disco last July had his nose broken, his knuckle dislocated and his teeth damaged, it was stated at Youghal Court last Friday.

His assailant, 28-year-old fisherman Tony Hennessy, Water Street, Youghal, only avoided going to prison for six months when he undertook to pay his victim, Kevin Mansfield, £500 compensation and also to pay witnesses expenses totalling £379.

Hennessy had pleaded not guilty to assaulting Mansfield at a Youghal hotel disco in the early hours of July 1 last year.

Kevin Mansfield told the court that he had attended the disco in the company of two friends. He told how Hennessy had first stared threateningly at him before head butting him on the nose and striking him with his fist in the face.

Mansfield said he received a broken nose, his knuckle was dislocated and his teeth were damaged.

The defendant, however, said he was passing Mansfield with a drink in each hand when some one brushed off him. Mansfield then hauled and pulled him and they began fighting.

"My nose was split, my shirt was torn, and I was covered in blood," the defendant added.

Justice Uinsinn MacGrath, however, said he had no hesitation in convicting Hennessy of assault. When told that the defendant, who had previous convictions, was actually bound to the peace at the time, the Justice sentenced him to six months imprisonment.

However, following strong representations by defence solicitor Mr. J. P.

Gordon, and on his undertaking that Hennessy will pay £500 compensation to the injured party, together with £397 expenses within

five months, the Justice suspended the prison sentence.

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

TOO MANY LIVING OFF THE IRISH ECONOMY

The opening address at the annual conference of the Confederation of Irish Industry held in Dublin Castle last Friday was delivered by Mr. Peter Sutherland, Chairman of the A.I.B. Group. In it he accused too many people of living off the Irish economy rather than creating it. This was one of the key reasons for the failure of the Irish economy to perform relative to countries of similar size.

In the past, too many went into the Civil Service and the professions while the risk takers were derided for their enterprise, he said, and in an obvious sideswipe at the fault finders, he went on to say that "the armchair critics, the begrudgers and the largely cynical commentators revelled when the risk-taker failed and scarcely applauded when he succeeded."

Mr. Sutherland said that it was, perhaps, a time best described as a "Valley of the Squinting Windows" and that a lack of self-esteem may have been at the root of our problem. But, he said, we cannot forever blame past injustice or any other myriad of excuses for failure to develop a prosperous economy.

Absence of a more positive attitude towards business probably explains the clear lack of an entrepreneurial culture, he said. Where businesses developed they have been characterised by a "them and us" confrontational approach to negotiating and developing strategy.

Mr. Sutherland doubted if we had fully shaken off our old ways, but was optimistic that we are mending our ways. However, if we are to progress and close the performance, it was imperative for us to have a realistic consensus on the economy. The recent adoption of the Programme for Economic and Social Progress indicated that this was happening, he said.

Let us hope that this is so.

MORE SOUND THAN FURY

We have all been hearing and reading in recent weeks of the widespread furore that followed the announcement of An Post's Viability

Plan in accordance with which it was proposed that 500 rural post offices throughout Ireland would be closed. Public representatives at all levels have voiced strong criticisms of the proposals and have called on the Government to intervene in the matter. The Minister for Communications has, as a result of the widespread furore, taken a hand in the matter and as a consequence, An Post have now put the controversial Viability Plan "on hold."

With local elections just around the corner it would have been political suicide for the Government and for the Fianna Fail candidates if the plan had been implemented. However, what the "on hold" situation implies is not very clear as it has not been stated whether the "on hold" is for a long, short or indefinite period. It could well be a ploy to merely defer the decision until after the June elections.

Speaking to the Press in Waterford last Friday, Mr. John Hynes, Chief Executive of An Post expressed the view that the political fall out to the Viability Plan was "more sound than fury." Mr. Hynes was in Waterford to meet the local postal staff and subsequently spoke to members of the Press.

He pointed out that out of the 2,050 rural post offices, only 950 were commercially viable. If the business was being done on a purely commercial basis, An Post could close over 1,000 of these but as social factors were taken into account in their calculations it was decided to retain a further 500 offices although they were not by any means commercial.

On this basis it would appear that the closure of a

big number of the sub post offices up and down the country could still be on the cards, sooner or later. Time alone will tell.

The matter will be given a further airing when delegates meet in Dublin next weekend, March 8, 9 and 10 for the 58th Ard Fheis of Fianna Fail when a motion from Ballycullane (Wexford) Cumann calling on the Government "to take immediate action to ensure that An Post's Viability Plan has minimal effect on the social fabric of rural Ireland," will be discussed.

MAKING HER MARK IN CORK

Our attention was drawn to an article in last Saturday's Week-end Examiner by Dermot Russell which was about "Alys a special guest." It started in rhetorical fashion by asking, "What was one attractive looking young lady doing in the middle of several hundred formally dressed men at the formal celebration dinner which Cork Constitution staged the other night to mark their historic victory in this season's All Ireland Rugby League?"

The celebration dinner was taking place in Cork's Imperial Hotel and the young lady's name was Alys Morrissey. The reason for her presence was that she played a key role in the Constitution Club's All Ireland League triumph as the Club's professional physiotherapist.

Alys is a daughter of Mrs. Chriss Morrissey and the late Liam Morrissey, well-known Grocers and Victuallers of 88 O'Connell Street, Dungarvan. She was educated in the Ursuline Convent, Cork before going on to graduate at University College, Dublin. She developed a great enthusiasm for rugby from an early age, thanks to her brothers John and Michael who were then students in Rockwell College and prominent rugby players. After graduating she went off to New Zealand for a year where she attended every match she could.

Then she returned to Cork where she established her own physiotherapy clinic and soon had a growing number of rugby players on her treatment books. Then in addition to this highly successful clinic which is based in Shanakiel in Cork, Alys accepted an invitation three years ago to be the official "physio" for the Cork Constitution Club and was immediately made an honorary member of the

Club.

In the interim, Alys has become part of the Club and enjoys as much popularity as the most popular of the players and her professionalism is greatly admired and respected by the entire membership.

No wonder then that she was an honoured guest at the victory dinner and no wonder that the Club formally presented her with one of the magnificent bronze statuettes which were cast for the players only. She received a standing ovation as she emotionally accepted this unique tribute to her outstanding work for the club.

And as Dermot Russell said in concluding his article: "She is now a permanent fixture at Constitution. Quite an extraordinary woman I thought you would like to know about."

Yes indeed!

"BACHELORS IN TROUBLE"

Murphy and Kirwan Enterprises based in Mahonbridge, principals of the Lyre Productions Company, launched their recently completed film, "Bachelors In Trouble" at a special reception attended by close to 700 people in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan on Thursday night, February 28.

Just over a year ago local farmer Billy Kirwan and neighbours Sean Murphy and Tony Coffey with other local friends set up the Lyre Productions Company and immediately got to work on the production of their first video. This consists of a 3-part mini series under the title of "Bachelors In Trouble" which it is hoped to sell to Irish communities around the world.

The Ballad Of Peter O'Neill Crowley

Peter O'Neill Crowley was a Co. Cork farmer who was among the many brave souls who went out in the inclement first week of March 1867 to take part in the Fenian Rising. He was born in AUGHAVINE, BALLYMACODA on May 23, 1842 and was in the prime of life when the Fenian Movement claimed his allegiance. Crowley was called after his uncle, the Rev. Peter O'Neill, a saintly, patriotic priest, who was tied to a cart-tail under the clock tower of Youghal, stripped naked and lashed through the streets of the town before being transported to Van Dieman's Land.

On Friday, March 3, 1867, Captain McClure, one of the Fenian leaders who had come from the US, arrived at Crowley's house and announced that all the local men in the movement under Crowley should be ready to stand to arms on the following Monday evening at sunset. And thus the Fenian Rising started in East Cork. The barracks in Castlemartyr was captured after a very considerable struggle and all seemed to be going well when Crowley, McClure and their men learned that the Rising throughout the country had been a failure. They disbanded their men and advised them to make for their homes as safely and as quickly as they could.

Crowley then set out to help McClure to escape and with a few resolute men they marched to Ballymacourty, a few miles from KILCLOONEY WOOD where they remained safely for two weeks. But the spies were busy and soon a large force of military and mounted police from Mitchelstown were on their trail. They were surrounded in the Wood and in the engagement that followed, O'Neill Crowley was shot and later died. McClure was captured and sentenced to be hanged, drawn and quartered but following a protest by the Government of America the sentence was changed to penal servitude for life.

O'Neill Crowley's funeral from Mitchelstown, where he had been taken after his death, to Ballymacoda was one of the most remarkable ever seen in Co. Cork. A handsome monument with the following inscription was erected over his grave: "Erected by the Irish people to the memory of the Patriot, Peter O'Neill Crowley, who was shot down by British Soldiers while bravely fighting for his country's independence at KILCLOONEY WOOD, March 31, 1867, in the 25th year of his age. R.I.P."

And here is one of the ballads recalling the death of Peter O'Neill Crowley:

As I roamed out one evening in the holy month of June,
I strayed into an old churchyard to view a new built tomb,
I overheard an old man say, as tears rolled from his eyes,
It's underneath that cold green sod, brave Peter Crowley lies.

Then tell me Peter Crowley, come tell me, tell me true,
Who stepped into KILCLOONEY WOOD that day along with you;
Who stood behind that broad oak tree, and fired that signal gun,
Who fought and died for Ireland, 'twas you my darling son.

The man who fired the signal went to his lone abode,
For many a mile he shouldered it a dark and dreary road,
Stiff and cold it's there you lay a stoirin geal mo chroi
Because you were a Fenian bold and fought for liberty.

And now to conclude and finish as I have no more to say,
May the Almighty and Eternal God soon raise you from your clay;
With a thousand men at your command and they both loyal and true,
To conquer English, Dutch and Dane, as Irishmen could do.

Court Sequel To Collision On Clonmel Road

A two-car collision on the Dungarvan-Clonmel road near Ballymacarbry on the morning of December 21, 1989 had a sequel at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week before Judge M. F. Deery when the drivers of the cars sued each other for damages sustained on the occasion.

Mrs. Ursula Power, Whitechurch, Cappagh was plaintiff in the action and Catherine and James Hayes were defendants and at the outset the Court was told that the damages had been agreed among the parties as to £4,000 in the case of the plaintiff and £930 in the counter-claim of the defendants. The only question for the court to decide was that of liability.

Mrs. Power in evidence stated that on the morning in question she was driving her husband's car on their way to Clonmel to do Christmas shopping. Near

Ballymacarbry there was a number of bends on the road and as she went around one of the bends she was confronted by a donkey and car going slowly in the same direction. She braked and slowed down behind the cart and then as she was about to pull out she was struck from behind without any warning by the car driven by Mrs. Hayes.

Corroborative evidence was given by Michael Power who stated he was a passenger in the car driven by his wife on the occasion.

Mrs. Hayes in her evidence said that she was also driving to Clonmel on the day in question and as she came round a bend on the road near Ballymacarbry she saw a car in front of her behind a donkey and cart. Both were travelling very slowly and she decid-

ed to pass out and indicated that she was going to do so. Just as she was about to pass the car in front, it suddenly came out and a collision occurred. Witness said that Mrs. Power's car did not indicate that it was going to pull out.

Judge Deery giving his decision said that while he had great sympathy for both ladies involved in this case, it appeared to him that Mrs. Power's version of what happened was more consistent with the facts and he found in her favour and granted her a decree for the agreed amount of £4,000 with costs. He dismissed the counter-claim.

How To Ginger Up A Chicken

BORED with cooking the same old dishes? Finding the weather dismal-making? Give yourself and your family or friends a boost by making this cheering chicken recipe. The British Food Information Service says the meal is prepared on top of the stove and is suitable for those with limited kitchen facilities.

GINGERED CHICKEN IN YOGURT

INGREDIENTS:

4 chicken joints, skinned
Salt and pepper
15g (½ oz) home produced butter
2 tablespoons oil
1 onion, chopped



300ml (½ pint) chicken stock
Generous pinch nutmeg
50g (2oz) stem ginger, thinly sliced
100g (4oz) button mushrooms, wiped
2 level tablespoons cornflour
4 tablespoons cold water
150ml (½ pint) natural yogurt
Garnish:
50g (2oz) halved almonds, browned

Method:

Season the chicken joints with salt and pepper. Melt butter and oil in a large, thick-based pan and fry the chicken for about five minutes on each side until golden brown. Remove chicken and put onion into pan. Fry over gentle heat for about three minutes without browning. Stir in stock, nutmeg and ginger. Stirring, bring to boil then return chicken joints to the pan. Bring back to boil, cover and simmer for 45 minutes. Add mushrooms, simmer for 20 minutes more until chicken is cooked through. During cooking stir from time to time to ensure no risk of

burning and, if necessary, add a little more stock or water. When chicken is ready, take out of pan and put on a warmed serving plate and keep hot.

Make the sauce: Blend cornflour to a smooth paste with the water, stir into stock in the pan. Bring to boil, stirring, until sauce thickens and then boil, stirring for one minute. Remove from heat. Mix in yogurt, reheat but take care the sauce does not boil. Adjust seasoning if necessary, pour over chicken joints.

Garnish with a scattering of almonds and serve piping hot.
Serves 4.

It is potty time again

SPRING bulbs popping up their heads are a reminder that the gardener can also 'go potty' indoors with summer bulbs and tubers.

Many varieties can be put in composts and, with indoor warmth, make good progress for planting out in boxes, hanging baskets or flower beds.

Typical contenders are tuberous BEGONIAS. They produce stunning blooms if properly cared for and are ideal centrepieces for baskets, though the lesser female or seeded blooms must be pinched out to ensure the showy males can give their best.

Start the tubers this month or next by pressing them into trays of peat. Make sure the hollow side of the tubers face upwards and keep them moist, warm and out of direct sun.

When a plant has sprouted at least four leaves, then pot on in a five-inch pot. It can then either be left as a spectacular houseplant or planted out in the chosen location, but only after all



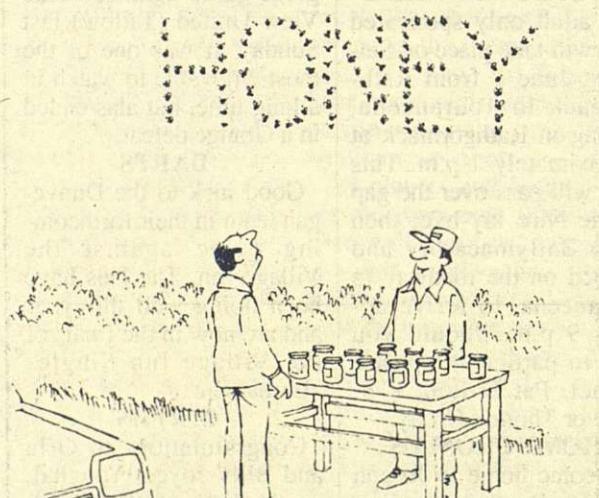
chances of frost are gone.

Don't discard tubers at the end of the season. Bring the begonias indoors before the first frost, so that the tubers can be dried for planting next spring.

GLOXINIA tubers can also be potted, one to a five-inch pot, before the end of the month so that they can flower from July to September. They too like warmth and moisture and hate strong sunshine.

Regular misting and feeding will ensure good growth and blooming. Once flowering is finished, stop watering and allow foliage to die so that tubers can be stored for next year.

Another spectacular specimen plant is AMARYLLIS or Hippeastrum, which can be planted indoors from late

December through to early spring, to produce a cluster of trumpet-shaped blooms on a towering stalk.

Many are sold in kits with compost and pot, to be given as presents. Providing the instructions are followed they are fairly reliable.

At least a third of the bulb must be left exposed above the compost and kept warm and watered. This should then ensure blooms after about six weeks.

Once these fade, keep watering and feeding the plant so that it can restore its strength. When the leaves yellow, lay the pot on its

side in a cool place until the leaves die and then store the bulb for re-starting next season.

ARUM LILIES can also be planted individually in six-inch pots of well-drained compost, with about a third of the rhizomes exposed above the compost.

They need moisture, regular feeding once started, and modest warmth of about 55F throughout growth indoors before placing outside after flowering to allow the rhizome to grow again before the leaves fade and it can be stored.

The ancestral home of the Spencers and where Princess Diana lived from the age of 14. Traditionally, the ghost of a groom enters any room where a light is still burning late at night. It wishes to make sure the occupant has not fallen asleep with a lighted candle.

BISHAM ABBEY near Maidenhead, Berkshire

Elizabeth, wife of Sir Thomas Hoby, a 16th century occupant, murdered one of her children. Her ghost is said to come out of a room, washing its hands in a floating basin.

BICKLING HALL near Aylsham, Norfolk

Anne Boleyn spent part of her childhood there. On the anniversary of her execution, she reputedly appears, sitting with her head on her knees, in a coach, drawn by four headless horses and driven by a headless horseman.

CORTACHY CASTLE near Kirriemuir, Tayside

Seat of the Ogilvy family, Earls of Airlie. A young drummer, discovered with the countess, was sealed in

his drum and thrown to his death from the highest turret. A drumming is apparently heard outside the walls, usually before a death in the Ogilvy family.

FOUNTAINS ABBEY near Ripon, North Yorks

A ghostly choir of monks chant, so they say, in the Chapel of the Nine Altars.

GLAMIS CASTLE Glamis, Tayside

An apartment has a grim secret known only to the earl and his heir. The earl, who died in 1905, is reputed to have said: "If you could guess the nature of this secret, you would go down on your knees and thank God it were not yours." Theories vary: that the room contains a half-human monster of fabulous age or the spirit of Lady Glamis who was burned as a witch.

HAMPTON COURT PALACE Greater London

It has at least two alleged ghosts: Katherine Howard, the wife of Henry VIII, is seen occasionally wearing white, with loose-flowing hair, in the Haunted Gallery. Her screams are similar to those she made before she was led away to execution at the Tower. Jane Seymour, another of his wives, comes from the Queen's Rooms. Dressed in white, she passes through the Silver Stick Gallery and the stairs.

KENSINGTON PALACE London

George II's ghost is said to look out of the windows

towards the weather vane over the main entrance. He used to watch for a change of the wind that was delaying the ships carrying despatches from his family home in Germany.

NEWSTEAD ABBEY near Mansfield, Nottinghamshire

Legend has it that a black Friar appears before a death or other misfortune in the Byron family. Lord Byron saw it just before his unhappy marriage to Miss Millbank, whom he left after a year.

WINDSOR CASTLE Berkshire

Queen Elizabeth I has been seen in the library and



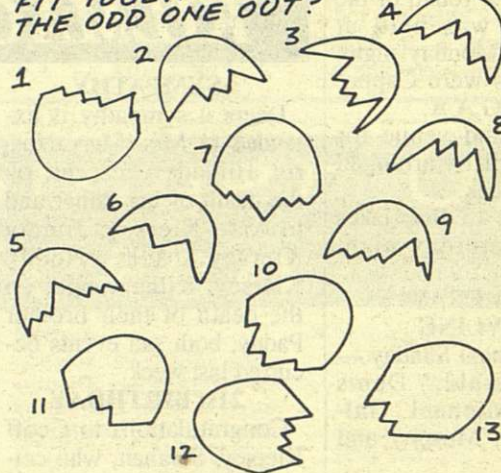
on the castle walls. George III is supposed to haunt the rooms where he was confined during the last years of his madness.

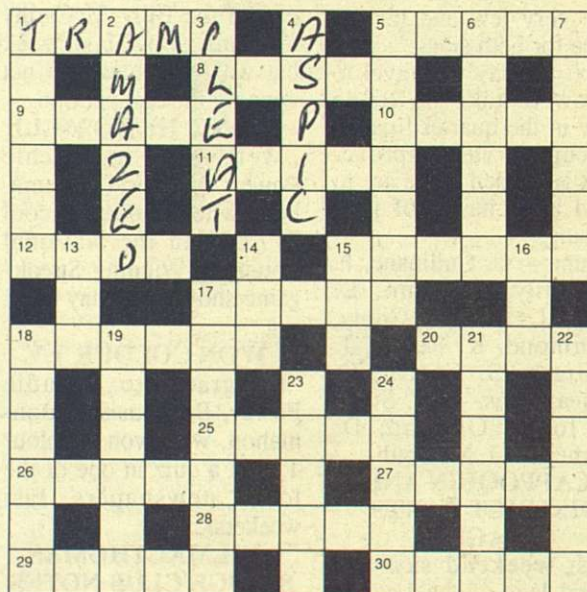

EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIP GAME VERSUS ENGLAND

Ticket Shortage Hits Travel Plans

With less than four weeks to go before Ireland's game against England at Wembley, tickets, or the lack of them, are the main topic of discussion for would be travellers.



The FAI have been criticised by Irish travel agents and fans alike but it is important to put the ticket difficulty into its proper perspective.

Last season England played Poland in the European Championship, a Wembley sellout for an England victory. That for me was the bench mark for Ireland's game and with a huge demand direct to the FAI in Ireland and supporters and emigrants in England it was obvious problems lay ahead.

The FAI received 8,000 tickets for fans travelling from England with a further 7,000 being reserved for Irish fans living in England.

The FAI decided to allocate their quota through their various district league systems which resulted in five tickets approximately coming to the Dungarvan area through their various junior clubs. Many would be travellers in Ireland contacted friends in England to obtain some of the English allocation. Six applicants, to my knowledge, did not receive one ticket despite money being forwarded with all applications.

The travel agents group criticised the FAI because in the past travel agents handled travel packages plus tickets for Irish games abroad. Only 3 travel agents received tickets: the FAI official travel agents and two others. Some Irish travel agents have secured English supporters tickets and are offering them to Irish fans in often inflated travel packages. This is in direct opposition to a directive from the Dept. of Transport and Tourism who advise agents against such tickets on security grounds.

Who are to blame? If indeed blame is the right word or option, bearing in mind that over 40,000 applications were received by the FAI for tickets, with the Wembley allocation being over

subscribed by 4 to 5 times.

Whatever way you look at it, the demand has outstripped supply — so our 10 hopeful travellers now have one ticket, allocated to a committee member of Dungarvan United, one of our group.

The next two weeks will tell a lot as to how many of the 10 will indeed make the trip to London. As a supporter who has travelled in the past, I did suggest to the FAI that with modern office technology, a list of past applicants could form a priority list even on a lottery basis.

Another aspect of this game is the security implications of Irish fans in English sections of the stadium. The FAI and the Minister for Sport have had discussions with their counterparts in England, remembering how English fans were allowed wander around Dublin last November. I hope lessons were learned.

On the field of play Ireland have received a severe set back with Ronnie Whelan's injury. Just back after injury, the Liverpool midfielder is unlikely to have regained his club place before March 27. Ray Houghton's return to first team football is to be welcomed as he needs games to play himself into a role in midfield for Ireland. In last Sunday's 1-0 defeat by Arsenal, Houghton was as busy as ever with not quite the sharpness of old — first team games are vital for him and Ireland in the weeks ahead.

Starring for Arsenal was David O'Leary who has regained his place under George Graham who bluntly refused O'Leary's wish to leave some months ago. But O'Leary has rarely been an automatic choice for Charlton in the past. So there are many questions to be answered yet — who plays, who is fit, who will he pick?

But the big question now is who will get a ticket to see Ireland's and Charlton's latest and biggest challenge against the "old enemy" in Wembley.

Waterford Take On League Leaders Wicklow At Walsh Park

This will be the final match for the footballers before they go into training for the Munster semi-final next June.

Wicklow are so far undefeated in Division 3 South and they will come here fully determined to keep their unbeaten record with a win over Waterford.

A win here for Waterford is unlikely, though not impossible. Should we surprise the visitors, we will be certain of being involved in a play-off for the runners-up position. Disappointingly, the selectors have decided not to name their team until Tuesday night, and in which case it will be too late for publication.

It will evoke some surprise if it is not along the same lines as the side which lost to Tipperary two weeks ago. This will see Tom Brennan in goal behind Pat Power, Pat Walsh and Jim McGrath. The half line is likely to read Pat Walsh, Michael McGrath and Peter Queally. Martin Power and Jim Maher will be given another 'go' at midfield and in attack the team will include Pat Hynes, Dermot Callaghan, Eoin O'Brien, Pepe Ferncombe, etc.

Walsh Cup Tournament

This senior hurling tournament, formerly known as the Keaneland Cup, will get underway on Monday, March 18. Proceeds from this will go forward towards paying for recent renovations at Lismore CBS Primary School.

For the past sixteen years the tournament has been played in aid of CBS Secondary School funds and was under the auspices of the Past Pupils Union. During these years it was regarded as the Western senior hurling championship and on occasions the games played here were better than some of the fare which we subsequently saw in the championship.

The draw was made on Thursday night at "Eamon's Place" and resulted as follows: Ballyduff versus Talow and Lismore versus Cashel King Cormacks (the Bonners Club). The first semi-final will be played at 2.30 p.m. and the second at 4 p.m. Jim Joe Landers will referee both.

After such a long time without a club hurling game, patrons will look to this competition to whet their appetites for the upcoming championships.

Under-21 Football

The County Board have been notified that the Munster championship Under-21 football first round tie between Waterford and Limerick, has been brought forward from March 18 to Saturday, March 16. The venue will be Kilmallock.

The Waterford panel have been in training for some time, but because of the fact that a number of the panel are also involved with the senior team and playing in the national league, organising weekend training was not always satisfactory.

The panel did have quite an amount of good preparation by way of the South Eastern League and in which we played four matches before being knocked out by Carlow, two weeks ago.

The team were not at full strength on Saturday last when being beaten by Wexford in a challenge.

Fraher Field Closed

The venue will not be available for club championships until the end of April or the beginning of May, due to renovation work and drainage being carried out there at the moment. It will take the goal area some time to settle after recent resodding.

WATERFORD 1-12 KILKENNY 1-10

This was a tremendous result for Waterford and not only gives us a place in the quarter final, but leaves us still with a chance of making it to the semi-finals. Also it showed improvement on the form displayed against Tipperary at Thurles two weeks previously. More than any other feature, it showed the spirit and character of Waterford who fought back very courageously when the flow of the game went against us in the closing eight minutes.

It was in the 55th minute after goalkeeper Pat Curran dived in the most spectacular fashion to save from a John Power rasper, that Waterford regained the initiative and exerted pressure on the league champions, who were then a single point in front. Ahearne's goal came from a melee around the Kilkenny goal after a Noel Crowley sideline shot landed around the square.

All in all it was a well deserved win and it would have been a tragedy to lose this one after being given so many fine scoring chances that were lost. This is the one big feature of the game, that must give rise for concern in the selectorial camp — that we missed so many scoreable frees. Had Waterford been on target our winning margin would have been at least another six or seven points.

THE PLAY

Waterford played with the strong breeze and attacked from the throw-in. Brenner shot inches wide of the goal and Ray Heffernan sent wide for Kilkenny at the other end before Kieran Delahunty pointed a free to give us a 5th minute lead. Eamon Morrissey and John Brenner exchanged wides, before John Power got the equalising point for Kilkenny in the 9th minute.

Brenner and Sullivan had Waterford wides within a minute before Ray Heffernan gave Kilkenny a short lived lead with a pointed free. The same player made it three points for the visitors when he had a long range point in the 12th minute. This was Kilkenny's final score of this half and when Kieran Delahunty pointed in the 13th and 14th minutes, Waterford took a grip on the game and this lasted throughout the second quarter of the game. Delahunty restored Waterford's lead with a pointed free in the 15th minute and two splendid points from play by Billy O'Sullivan and Noel Crowley followed in the 16th and 17th minutes.

In the 19th minute it was 7 points to 3 in our favour when Johnnie Brenner sent over a Noel Crowley pass. Shane Ahearne's point made it eight for us before Eamon Morrissey sent a low ball just inches wide of the Waterford post in the 21st minute. Kilkenny swept up field and continued to pressurise the Waterford defence, but with Brian Greene, Beresford and Byrne, in particular, in sparkling form, it was all to no avail.

Points by Delahunty in the 23rd and 29th minutes ended the scoring for this half and even though it left us a clear seven points to the good, there was a feeling among the home crowd that we might yet have to pay for the ten wides up to this point.

KILKENNY FIGHT BACK

Within seconds of the restart, a Kilkenny point was waved wide before the referee intervened and awarded the score. A minute later a Lester Ryan sideline cut ended in the Waterford square to be tapped in by Eamon Morrissey. Shane Ahearne was fouled and from a 30 yards free Crowley sent wide. Kilkenny were now making full use of the breeze and fighting back and points by Ray Heffernan (2) and Eamon Morrissey, made it level pegging at 0-10 to 1-7 in the 41st minute. Our lead was restored again when Delahunty pointed a free. Mossy O'Keeffe replaced Pat Ryan. Kilkenny had a brace of wides and Delahunty sent wide from a scoreable free in the 47th minute. What was probably the best score of the game, came in the 49th minute when Billy O'Sullivan pointed from an acute angle. Another great score followed when Ray Heffernan pointed a sideline cut from a distance. Christy Heffernan was fouled and Ray pointed to leave it level in the 51st minute.

Then came Pat Curran's brilliant save and Heffernan pointed the resultant

'65 to put his side one point up before Ahearne's goal in the 58th minute, left the score 1-12 to 1-10. Damien Byrne sent the Kilkenny puck-out back up and Waterford pressed again and two sideline balls were crossed by Crowley, the second being the vital one which got to Shane Ahearne's boot and the net to give us this very welcome win and put us into the quarter finals of the league for our eighth time in the past fifteen years.

Two years ago we got to the semi-final and were beaten by Tipperary at Croke Park.

March Co. Board Meeting

This meeting is scheduled to take place at Dungarvan on Monday night next. It will be interesting in that the groupings for the senior hurling and football and intermediate hurling championships, will be announced. Following their acceptance, the county fixtures committee will meet to put dates and venues on the schedule of games that will take us right through to October.

All committees are due for re-appointment and the members will be named to the meeting. In addition to the committees in being at the moment, it is likely that a bye-laws committee will be appointed to bring our bye-laws up to date. This is long overdue.

An announcement will also be made concerning the election of a new county P.R.O. A date must be set for the acceptance of

nominations and the election can then take place, under the P.R. system and by ballot vote at the April meeting.

More than half a dozen names have so far been mentioned for this position, so it is certain to be a very keen contest.

The draws for the Sargent and Phelan Cups will also take place and the junior hurling county selectors will be chosen.

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

At the February meeting of the County Board, the County Chairman, Eamon Murphy, who presided, complained that wrong information had been given to Croke Park about his involvement in getting Joe McGrath as County Senior hurling coach. The report submitted by the officers of Coisde Gnotha stated that Eamon Murphy was the instigator in acquiring the services of Mr. McGrath. Eamon Murphy asked the meeting to confirm that this was not so.

County Secretary, Seamus Grant then produced the minutes of the relevant meeting which contained minutes of a statement made by the Chairman of the Finance and Development Committee, to the effect that the F/D Committee had been requested by Eamon Murphy to interview Joe McGrath for the post of coach. There was no further discussion on the matter.

LATE START

Because of the unusually large attendance, the room in which the meeting was about to begin was considered too small and the meeting had to move to the ballroom. This resulted in a very late start to the meeting.

REFEREES REPORTS

A three months suspension was imposed on Noel Harney, Ballydurn, who was sent off in the junior hurling county final replay in December. The player wrote outlining the cause of his being sent off and apologised.

REPORTS

The report from the senior

football selection committee stated that 25 training sessions had been held during the past month and the attendance at all sessions was almost one hundred per cent. Since their previous report they had beaten Kilkenny and lost to Tipperary by a point. They were preparing for their final game, which will be against Wicklow and after this the panel will go into training for the Munster semi-finals; Stage 2 of Mick O'Dwyer's training schedule was now being put into practice.

The report from the hurling selectors told of the plans for the two remaining league matches. Training on four occasions each week and attendances were satisfactory. They were hoping to qualify for the quarter finals of the league and with a little luck this can happen, the reports stated.

The minor hurling and football reports as well as the under 21 football report all told of favourable progress and encouraging interest by the members of the various panels.

TEAM SELECTION

The failure of selection committees to choose their teams in good time for proper presentation on the county papers, was the subject of complaint and it was pointed out that committees were required by County Board decision and instruction, to name their teams not later than one week before the game.

The last three National League games, two hurling and one football, teams were not published until the Wednesday of the week of the match, while the opposing teams were published on the previous Sunday.

The County Chairman undertook to speak to the selectors and to have this matter put right.

ASH PROJECT

John Lyons raised the matter of the finances involved in developing the Ash Project. He said he was concerned that the project is now costing more than was originally stated. Pat Nugent of the Finance and Development Committee told the meeting that the total cost, exclusive of the grants, would be in the region of £25,000.

PLAYER AWARDS

Tom Shanahan, Roanmore and Eoin O'Brien, Stradbally were each presented with their "Player of the Year" awards for 1990. Both players were away when the awards were being presented at the County Convention.

ALL-IRELAND ELEVENS

This competition is known as the Carlow Hurling Club All-Ireland Elevens and will be staged in Carlow on Saturday, May 4.

The following seven Waterford Club teams have been invited to participate: Ballyduff, Ballygunner, De

La Salle, Dunhill, Cnoc Sion, Passage and Roanmore.

County Board permission has been granted and if clubs confirm that they will play in the competition, the county fixtures committee will do their best to facilitate them.

Erins Own were given permission to run a seven-a-side hurling tournament for the Paddy O'Connor Commemoration Trophy.

Safety Seminar

Safety and crowd control at our venues will be important matters discussed at a seminar at Croke Park on next Saturday. The two officers of the County Board who will attend, will be the divisional secretaries, Anthony Walsh and Denis Hanrahan.

Also on Saturday, Central Council will debate the proposals for the new leagues and if accepted, the football league will commence on the second Sunday in October and the hurling league will be put back until February 23, 1992.
