Union Officer Questions I.D.A. Role In Big Co-op Merger

Mr. Tony Mansfield, A.T.G.W.U. District Officer, Dungarvan, in a statement issued on Tuesday has questioned the reported Industrial Development Authority (I.D.A.) involvement in the expected and possible merger between Waterford Foods and Avonmore Foods.

"The Sunday Business Post" in an article by James Morrissey on Sunday last, April 7, stated: "The I.D.A. has been promoting the merger for many months on the basis that an Avonmore-Waterford marriage would create a £1 billion-plus food company which would achieve the economies of scale needed to develop the agri-food sector."

"At least 300 jobs — and possibly as many as 500 — could be lost if the expected merger takes place Sources close to the companies have said that annual savings could amount to £20 million if what one source described as "a sensible post-merger rationalisation" is carried out," according to the "Business Post."

In his statement Mr. Mansfield says: "In my view the I.D.A. role is to generate employment and as a trade unionist I find such descriptions as "a sensible post-merger rationalisation" involving the

possible loss of 500 jobs as the Union must question appalling." seriously the reported role

"Indeed," Mr. Mansfield's statement goes on, "one has to question seriously the wisdom of such major mergers as the idea that a bigger operation is necessarily a more successful one is a very debatable point, looking at it even from a purely business point of view."

NOT CONSULTED

Mr. Mansfield then criticised both companies for their failure to consult their employees and the trade unions involved where these matters were concerned which was in sharp contrast with the legal position of workers as it operates in the E.C. States on mainland Europe.

"The A.T.G.W.U.," said Mr. Mansfield, "and indeed all unions operating in Waterford Foods plc have negotiated agreed changes over the past decade in order to insure that the company became the major player that it is in the Agri-Food sector and

Go. Councillors Mount Scathing Attack On Pfizer Corporation

Several members of Waterford County Council joined in mounting a scathing attack on the Pfizer Corporation for the stand off attitude adopted by principals of the Company in regard to their future plans for the old Quigley Magnesite plant at Ballinacourty and the lack of respect shown to the Council in their efforts to open discussions on the situation when the Council met for their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday.

The controversial subject which has been the source of a number of discussions at recent Council meetings came up on a notice of motion in the name of Deputy Jackie Fahey which requested that a full report be given to members of the Council on the present position of Quigley Magnesite, Ballinacourty and what progress, if any, has been made to have it declared a derelict site.

Cllr. Fahey said that this matter had now dragged on for some time without anything appearing to be done about it. The plant presented a very ugly and horrible looking blot on the landscape and people living in the area have had to put up with this monstrosity for far too long.

"The situation was drawn forcibly to my attention on St. Patrick's Day," continued Cllr. Fahey, "when the new Prior at the Friary referred to the place when he spoke at Mass and said that it was a controversial mat-

ter 16 years ago when he left Dungarvan and he was disappointed to see when he came back to Dungarvan recently that it was still there and that now it was a derelict site. When I listened to the Prior, it made me feel ashamed to be a member of the County Council."

Cllr. Fahey went on to say that the people put up with the situation when the plant

A RECIPE FOR DISASTER

Peter had just healed a lame man, and the first reading tells us that a crowd gathered. He makes use of the occasion to proclaim that Jesus had risen from the dead. Yes, he said, the same Jesus whom you caused to be killed. However, do not be dismayed. It was to be, just as our forefathers had foretold. You were unaware of the wrong when you clamoured for His death. Now, you know the truth. "Repent and turn to God, so that your sins might be wiped out." Of course, Peter is talking to all of us. The truth has been explained to you by the successors of the Apostles, which is the same as if you heard it from the lips of Jesus. So, you have no excuse. Repent. Jesus died to free us from sin. Hence, unless we listen and do as He said, then, when the last and final Easter Morn dawns upon mankind and the dead arise from their graves, you will not rise to glory.

The second reading reminds us that sistent and are not adverse to the use of the resurrection did indeed create wonder, and arouse and stimulate man's faith. Ardkeen Hospital May Lose Mobile Heart Unit

A Mobile Coronary Care Unit which has been lying unused in Waterford Regional Hospital, Ardkeen, for six months is likely to be transferred to another hospital because of a dispute between the South Eastern Health Board and the ATGWU.

Due to the rift over funding, equipment and staffing of the MCCU, it now seems inevitable that the unit, which is designed to cut the number of deaths due to heart attacks by half, will be transferred to St. Joseph's Hospital in Clonmel, never having been used once.

Amid claims and counter claims over who is to blame, Mr. Paddy Murphy, Director of the Irish Heart Foundation, who provided the £20,000 vehicle free, said he was bitterly disappointed.

It was originally planned that the mobile unit would

be equipped by Waterford Regional Hospital and staffed by a doctor and a nurse. However, although some equipment has been installed, due to the tremendous work-load at the hospital, staff have not been available to run it.

ALLEGATIONS REFUTED

Allegations that the union had refused to release £8,000 raised to purchase special coronary care equipment have been refuted by the District Secretary of the ATGWU, Mr. Sean Kelly. He claims that the SEHB is refusing to install the equipment.

The Chief Executive of the Health Board, Mr. Peter McQuillan, has denied this and said they had not turned down any such request. His understanding from a staff representative was that the money collected was only for a cardiac ambulance and the staff were not willing to have it installed in an alternative vehicle.

Claims were also made that the ambulance drivers would refuse to drive the unit when necessary but Mr. Kelly said that they would take things "one step at a time" and they would need to equip it first.

LAWS MUST BE OBEYED **UNTIL REPEALED OR** CHANGED

Laws enacted by the Oireachtas are there to be obeyed and complied with by all citizens of the land and those who deliberately flout any of them must suffer the consequences and accept the prescribed penalties imposed by the Courts. It is as simple as that.

This week there has been a great brouhaha about the imprisonment of a Cork City teacher who was dramatically described in a front page banner splash of the "Cork Examiner" on Tuesday morning as "the first householder in Ireland to be jailed for non-payment of the controversial service charges." He owes Cork Corporation £259.13 and when the matter was brought before the local Court an order was made that on foot of the continued non-payment of the sum due that he serve five days in jail. The warrant for the arrest and imprisonment was issued on Monday and its implementation has set off all sorts of protests.

The fact of the matter is that these service charges have the force of law behind them and while they are so covered by the law they must be paid. Anyone who refuses to pay the charges must therefore accept the consequences of the penalties which the Act covering the matter imposes including the ultimate of serving a prison sentence.

A similar situation exists in regard to the use by drift net fishermen of monofilament nets for salmon fishing. Under the Fisheries Act the nets have been declared illegal but their continued use has led to what has become known as the salmon war along our coast where Fisheries Officers have been in constant conflict with the salmon fishermen from Youghal to Dunmore East during the salmon fishing season for the past several years.

Long lists of prosecutions have been dealt with at most of the local courts and massive fines and fishing disqualifications have been imposed and in recent months many of the fishermen who have been unable to pay these fines have found themselves behind bars.

This situation was referred to at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council when Cllr. Gary O'Halloran from Clashmore complained that week in and week out local men in Youghal, Ardmore and other areas were being carted off to jail," because of the non-payment

of the fines imposed by the Courts. Pointing out that everyone had a constitutional right to earn a living, Cllr. O'Halloran proposed that President Robinson, as "minder of the Constitution" be called on to intervene to stop further imprisonments.

However when it was correctly pointed out that it was the regulations which made the use of monofilament nets illegal for taking salmon, the Council decided that the Minister for the Marine be contacted with a DEMAND that he receive a deputation from the Council to discuss the matter.

Breaking the law serves no purpose beyond, of course, drawing attention to an injustice, if is was felt that such an injustice existed. The fact of the matter is that once the Houses of the Oireachtas pass an Act and it has been signed by the President it becomes part of the Law of the Land and is there to be obeyed and complied with by all citizens until it has either been altered or repealed.

P.S. — Since writing the foregoing we learn that the Cork teacher was released on Tuesday when the money due to the Corporation was paid over by a local business man.

NAVY SHOULD BE GIVEN POWER TO PURSUE "PIRATE" **TRAWLERS**

Helvick fishing trawler "Ainnir Ordha," eighty miles off the south-west coast of Cork by two "hostile" Spanish trawlers early on Easter Sunday morning pinpoints the failure of the Irish Government to ratify an international convention on the law of the sea.

This point was stressed by Munster M.E.P. John Cushnahan in a statement issued on Wednesday, April 3 in which he said that the criticism of the Irish Navy's fishery patrol record made on the occasion (by the I.F.O.) was misplaced. "Our navy," M.E.P. Cushnahan's statement said, "performs a miraculous task given its

inadequate resources and we are indebted to them for their courage and skill. The real problem is that the Irish Government's failure to ratify an international convention on the law of the sea has rendered the Irish Navy powerless to take action against foreign vessels which ram Irish boats off the Irish coast."

It appears that as a result of this failure by our Government the Irish Navy is powerless to take action against any foreign vessel that deliberately rams an Irish fishing boat off the Irish coast. The Navy have no powers to detain them or to hold them liable and the consequence is that the Irish skipper, in this case Helvick man Tomas O Ceallaigh, has to face a heavy bill for repairs, loses income while his boat is being repaired and the guilty offender bolts home scotfree.

It is a fact that following the serious ramming incident on Easter Sunday an Irish naval corvette did appear on the scene and statements were taken from the skipper of the Spanish trawler "Nuevo Ebenezer" and Skipper O Ceallaigh but the Spaniard was then allowed to go and high tailed it over the horizon while the Helvick trawler "Ainnir Ordha" had to limp back to port at Castletownbere from where she was operating at the time. A subsequent examination of the vessel showed she had sustained damage estimated at £50,000.

It is a scandalous state of affairs which allows such a thing to happen and what makes it more infuriating is that the Irish Government has it within its power to resolve the problem yet instead it chooses to do nothing about it. If the Government was to ratify the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea, under Articles 101 and 105 the Irish Navy would The ramming of the be able to go in hot pursuit of these foreign vessels up to within 12 miles of their own coastline and arrest

GUILTY OF PIRACY

It is clear according to these articles of the U.N. Convention that one fishing vessel acting aggressively so as to damage another is guilty of piracy and appropriate action can then be taken.

For the record, Article 101 sets out the definition of Piracy as any illegal acts of violence committed for private ends by the crew of

a private ship and directed on the high seas against another ship or against persons or property on board such ship. Article 105 deals with the seizure of a pirate vessel and states, inter alia: "On the high seas, or in any other place outside the jurisdiction of any State, every State may seize a pirate ship. . . . and arrest the persons and seize the property on board. The courts of the State which carried out the seizure may decide upon the penalties to be imposed and may also determine the action to be taken with regard to the ship. . .

As M.E.P. Cushnahan points out in his statement, the Irish Government could, at a simple stroke, radically alter the current unsatisfactory situation by ratifying the U.N. Law of the Sea Convention. It is something concerning which the Irish Fishermen's Organisation might direct their energies instead of mounting their misplaced criticism of the Navy's fishery patrol record. If the Navy is given the power to deal with these foreign thugs as provided by the U.N. Convention it would bring a speedy end to this problem and particularly before there is any loss of

LOOKING BACK **ON THE 1985** LOCAL **ELECTIONS**

As promised last week we continue our look back on the local elections for 1985 this week with a review of what happened then in the County Council elections in the Lismore Electoral Area.

With a total electorate of 5.907, there was a valid poll of 4,316 and the quota for election was 864 votes. Seven candidates contested the four seats to be filled, three Fianna Fail, two Fine Gael and two Labour.

The result of the first count, in alphabetical order, was as follows: Herlihy, Brendan (Lab.) 99; Kennedy, James Gerald (Lab.) 92; McDonnell, Willie (F.G.) 1074; Quirke, James (F.F.) 953; Tobin, James (F.F.) 612; Walsh, James Aidan (F.G.) 758; Wilkinson, Ollie (F.F.) 728.

Willie McDonnell who headed the poll and James Quirke were declared elected in the first count and their surpluses were transferred in the second and third counts when James Aidan Walsh who had then reached 871 was elected.

Both Labour candidates, Brendan Herlihy and James Gerald Kennedy were then eliminated and their votes were transferred in the fourth and final count which left the two remaining Fianna Fail candidates standing, Ollie Wilkinson with 834 votes and James Tobin with 795. With the elimination of James Tobin, Ollie Wilkinson was declared elected to the fourth and final seat. The order of election was Mc-Donnell, Quirke, Walsh and Wilkinson.

The Party preferences as cast then gave Fianna Fail 2,293 votes, Fine Gael 1,832 and Labour 181 which left Fianna Fail and Fine Gael with two seats each.

In the forthcoming June elections Fianna Fail will have two of their sitting Councillors, Jim Quirke and Ollie Wilkinson again contesting but James Tobin who did not allow his name to go forward at the selection convention will be replaced by Lismore Town Commissioner, Mrs. M.

The Fine Gael team for the election was due to be chosen on Tuesday night of this week but not possessing a crystal ball we are not able, at the time of preparing the column, to say what their choice has been.

It would seem, however, on the face of it, and barring the appearance of any strange dark horses on the scene, that the end result for the Lismore Area in the June election will again see an equal divide of the four seats between the Fianna Fail and Fine Gael parties.

Next week we will take a look at the 1985 results in the Kilmacthomas Area.

Time to think dahlia

LATE April marks the start of the planting season for dahlias, one of the most varied and popular of summer flowers in Britain.

The family includes so many types and colours that there are plenty for all needs and sites ranging from cut flowers through to low varieties for border edging right up to leggy examples for a spectacular backdrop.

The size of blooms varies from an inch to about a foot across according to type but they can all trace their history to the first samples brought back by Spanish Conquistadors in Mexico during the 17th century.

Choose

And we British have taken it to our hearts, with our lational Dahlia Society the biggest in the world. Plants are widely available through newspaper and magazine offers as well as nurseries or garden centres.

Before buying, choose an open and sunny position in the garden away from trees and check that the soil is well-drained.

Dahlias do not send down heavy roots so single digging is adequate, although you need to dig in some well-rotted cuttings or tubers. Unsprouted tubers can go in towards the end of April in the South, later in colder areas. Place each in a six-inch hole with the crown about three inches below the surface.

Alternatively, the tubers



can be started in a cool greenhouse in pots or boxes of moist peat in February. The shoots can then be hardened off outside before planting from late May

May is also the time for planting rooted cuttings after ensuring that they are well watered and left to stand for at least an hour before placing in holes suffi-cient to take the root balls. In all cases, the distance between dahlia plantings will depend on the variety.

The family broadly divides in two - border dahlias are usually leggy and three or more feet tall while bedding types are never more than two feet high. For obvious reasons, the former will need securely staking after reaching about nine inches

The plants also hate being dry, so water well during hot periods but be careful when hoeing as it is easy to damage the shallow roots once the plants are established. Hand weeding is probably best.

As the plant develops its fifth pair of leaves it should be pinched back to encourage bushiness and plentiful blooming and always deadhead drooping blooms to encourage more.

OLIVE and cheese bread is a great change from the more usual garlic bread. Serve it slightly warm with unsalted butter.

2 tablespoons (30ml) oil 2oz (50g) butter 8oz (225g) red peppers, seeds and core removed 2 onions, chopped goz (40g) plain-flour pint (450ml) water 2 chicken stock cubes salt and pepper

pint (450ml) milk

Bread:

1 packet white bread mix for a 11b loaf salt and pepper 1 level teaspoon (5ml) dry mustard 30z (75g) mature cheddar cheese; finely grated about 12 stuffed green olives beaten egg for glazing

Heat together the oil and butter. Dice the peppers and fry with the onion for about 5 minutes, until soft but not coloured. Add the flour and cook for one



minute. Add water and stock cubes, bring to the boil, then simmer covered, for 30 minutes, until soft. Rub through a sieve, or pureé in a blender and then sieve. Stir in seasoning to taste, and the milk. Chill. Serve in bowls garnished with parsley and float an ice cube on top. Mix together the bread mix, seasoning, mustard, and all but 1 level tablespoon (15ml) of the cheese. Mix with water as instructed on the packet. Knead, then roll out to an oblong, the length of the tin, and about four times the width. Place the olives at intervals on the dough and roll up like a Swiss roll. Put into the loaf tin and put to rise until the dough reaches the top of the tin. Brush the top of the bread with beaten egg, and spread with the rest of the cheese. Bake (450F, 230C, Gas No. 8) for 35 minutes. Serve sliced, warm from the oven, with the iced soup.


Almost everyone who writes a letter to the Queen gets a replay, although, of course, not from Her Majesty personally, Her Ladies in Waiting do that.





A Night To Remember



ENGLAND 1 REP. OF IRELAND 1

With over two weeks to reflect, I'm still of the opinion that Ireland's display against England was one of the best ever. For England this was the perfect setting, home venue, great pitch, perfect weather and two points to be won from a team still not rated highly by some of the British media.

Graham Taylor's biggest test and he failed it in his selection, 3 centre backs and a midfield over-run by Ireland. Compare Ireland's selection to England's, using the media's rating of the players and only Paul McGrath would have a chance of a first team place with England. Kevin Moran, 35 years of age, of Blackburn Rovers, struggling in the second division would never even be considered. But as I said in my preview of this game, Charlton fits his team into his system — he did exactly that in Wembley and it worked. Having watched it again on video and while I will have many memories of the game, Kevin Moran's display said it all. The game started with a Tony Adams attempted clearance charged down by John Aldridge, England, from their own kick-off were under pressure. Despite their lucky early first goal, England couldn't cope and Ireland's spell of sustained attacks before our equaliser was magnificent. Roared on by the Irish fans, attack after attack rained down on the English goal and from my seat across from the English penalty area, you could see the discomfort of the English defence.

It's history now that Niall Quinn scored and the second half could have seen a second even third Irish goal. Ray Houghton's welcome return to form was marred, somewhat, by his missed chance, but despite this, he was one of our best players on the night.

Ireland under Jack Charlton have come a long way, they proved it again in Wembley, this time even convincing the British Press and T.V. experts, who conceded that England were lucky to escape with a point on a night when they expected two.

For those who witnessed this game it was surely a night to remember, the home side outfought on the field, were out sung off it, as "The Boys in Green," "Molly Malone" and you'll "Never Beat the Irish" echoed across this famous

stadium. It confirmed, yet again, that Ireland's progress on the pitch is matched by their fans behaviour off it.



TROUBLE AT KILBURN

As two of us made our way across London to Kilburn, we suffered our first incident, when an English fan, one of a group of five or six, tried to start trouble. This we easily avoided only to arrive at Kilburn minutes after the Black Lion Pub had been attacked by about 200 English fans. Having met up with our group at the "Coal Pit" we suffered the most serious case of intimidation, when about 20 so called English fans took over our platform, chanting "no surrender to the I.R.A." Thankfully we were directed away from this station by one of our group living in London, who took us on a safer and lest traumatic route to the stadium.

Looking back we were lucky to avoid trouble at Kilburn Tube Station, where security left a lot to be desired. Surely Kilburn was a potential trouble spot, the Police presence was small and not able or seemingly interested in controlling these English fans, who were terrorising Irish fans and commuters alike. Even going into Wembley there was no obvious security procedures like random searches and for Irish fans with English tickets the threats and abuse continued inside the stadium. Thankfully non of us suffered any harm, but it was no thanks to the security arrangements on the night.

On my return from London, my tickets for our next home game had arrived, West Stand Lower, thankfully — all the hassle;' of the Wembley game is avoided. The demand for tickets for this game will grow in the coming weeks — please don't call me.

> Offaly have won the last three Leinster finals and have played in every provincial final during the past nine or ten years, so if they can hit their championship form here on Sunday, they will have a good chance of moving forward to the semi-finals, two weeks later.

Congress Gives All-Clear For Sponsorship

This was the major decision taken by delegates to Annual Congress over last weekend and as a result of the 194 to 96 votes in favour of the Dublin motion, clubs, etc., will now be permitted to have logos on playing gear. The decision will mean an infusion of badly needed funds into the coffers of clubs and County Boards throughout the country and it is known that within hours of the announcement of the decision, firms were showing an interest of becoming involved.

Clubs and Counties do not, however, have permission to proceed with negotiations until Management Committee have issued a directive and guidelines on how the logo advertising is to be handled.

The motion specified that the size of the logo, suppliers brand names or special manufacturers imprints, etc., etc., cannot exceed 50 sq. cm. and 10 sq. cm. (about two inches by two inches square).

Another big surprise was the decision of 165 delegates voting to retain the Australian Rules experiment after one of the most interesting debates of recent times. 119 delegates voted for the abandonment of the compromise rules and made a case to have them discontinued. The decision, however, does not necessarily mean that they will continue — what was decided was that Central

Council may consider continuing with the international series.

WATERFORD MOTION

The De La Salle motion calling for an investigation into the payments made within the Association was spoken to by ex-president, Padraigh O Fainin and by Con Murphy, both of whom expressed serious concern about recent trends in this respect. They

both pointed out that so much was being done by way of underhand payments, that there was an urgent need to have the whole matter investigated.

The President stated that because there was an investigation underway into the appointment of certain individuals, the matter was sub-judice and that the motion should be referred to Central Council.

I will return to the Congress debates and decisions next week.

was in operation but now that it was closed down the Council had the power to move it under the new Derelict Sites Act. "The owners are making no move about it so it's up to us now to use our powers to have it shifted," said the

Deputy. Mr. B. J. McNally, Deputy Co. Manager informed the members that a notice had been served on the Company under the Derelict Sites Act asking for reasons why the plant should not be included in the Register being compiled under the Act. To date no reply had been received from the Company.

The Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne then referred to the ambitions of Dungarvan Golf Club to extend their course at Ballinacourty to eighteen holes and said that the Pfizer Company's valuation on the property proved the problem on which the negotiations

failed. He said that he had written to the Company at the time and suggested to them that in accommodating the Golf Club they would also be accommodating the local community. However the Company held to the valuation placed on the plant which was in excess of £1 million while the Golf Club offer did not come near that figure. Despite his request he had failed to meet any of the Company's principals.

The Chairman said that he had subsequently been informed by the Company that there might be an outside interest in the site but that it would be 6 months before this could be declared. He added that he understood that the Golf Club had now shown an interest in another site and he wanted to assure them that in whatever move they made they would have his
