The Minister for Education, Mrs. Mary O'Rourke, paid a visit to Lismore last Monday where at 12 (noon) under leaden skies, but thankfully dry for the duration of the ceremony, she performed the official opening of the beautiful new Lios Mhor Mochuda National School.

towering landmark spire of the Church of Ireland Cathedral of St. Carthage, the new school consists of two spacious classrooms and, as the Minister aptly put it, nestles into the Cathedral as children nestle into their parents. It cost an estimated £70,000 and caters for 35 pupils.

The blessing of the new school was performed by Rt. Rev. Noel V. Willoughby, Bishop of Ossory, Wa-Cashel and terford, Lismore.

The Bishop, Minister and other guests gathered at the Deanery on arrival and moved from there to the school where they were greeted at the gates by the children of the school who, very appropriately, sang, "The School Around The Corner," as it is located just around the corner from the Deanery and the Cathedral.

Mrs. Mary England, School Principal and M.C. for the occasion in the course of her introductory speech said that it was an eventful day not only for the school-children but also for their parents and the school staff. She praised the parents for the ready manner in which they gave of their time to activities in the school and for the cheerful way in which they had so successfully participated in the raising of funds to pay for the new school. She also thanked all who had contributed so generously to the funds and expressed profound grati-tude to all for their generosity and support.

Very Rev. Dean Cecil Weekes, Chairman of the Board of Management of the school said that this was a very important day in the history of their community in Lismore. He described Lismore as a town of beauty and peace with a history going back 1300 Carthage.

Pointing out that the new school had been the brain child of Dean Gilbert Mayes (now retired) who had been the Dean in Lismore for 28 years, Dean Weekes said that they were now reaping the rewards of the seeds sown in the past.

Dean Mayes who was making a nostalgic return visit to Lismore for the occasion said that when he first came to Lismore towards the end of 1961 there was no Church of Ireland school in the parish. Pointing to a corner where the new school complex now stands, he recalled that a coach house, stable and store stood there

Built in the shadow of the years to the advent of St. in 1961. In November of that year Jack Nugent of South Mall started work to convert the building and by Easter 1962 they had a teacher with 12 pupils in **CONTINUED ON PAGE 24**

MAXIMUM PENALTIES

The Minister for the Marine, Mr. John P. Wilson, T.D., in reply to a further Dail Question by Deputy Deasy regarding penalties for illegal fishing said:

The maximum penalty under the Fisheries Acts for conviction on indictment for illegal fishing is £100,000. In addition, any fish or gear found on board the vessel to which the offence relates can be forfeited and, in certain circumstances and at the discretion of the courts, a vessel which is before the Courts on a second indictable offence can also be confiscated.

WANTS OFFENDING VESSELS CONFISCATED

Deputy Deasy issued the following statement on the foregoing to the "Leader" last Monday:

"I will be pressing the Minister to have these boats confiscated as it is the only way to stop this outrageous activity. I am well aware that offenders have been caught twice and have not had their vessels confiscated. This relates specifically to Spanish boats which are blatantly breaking the law and which are owned by companies quite willing to pay the fines because of the extent of their illegal fishing and the value of the fish involved. The maximum fine £100,000 but the fine generally imposed is between £10,000 and £15,000."

Waterford Vet's Trial On Murder Charge

A Co. Waterford vet was arrested by Gardai after the body of an elderly carpenter was found lying in a pool of blood near the vet's father's house, a jury at the Central Criminal Court in Dublin heard last Wednesday.

John Phelan, a 33-yearold father of four, of Cove Lodge, Stradbally, pleaded not guilty to the murder of Mr. William Horan (74), at Carrowleigh, Rathgormack, Co. Waterford, on September 29 last year.

The jury of nine men and three women heard that Mr. Horan of Owning, Piltown, Co. Kilkenny, was found lying face down on grass near the home of the accused's father, Mr. Seamus Phelan.

Mr. Michael Walsh, a neighbour of the Phelans, told the court that he was looking out his window towards the Phelan house when a ladder at the side of the house caught his eye.

He saw two men, one in a light-coloured shirt and the other in dark colours, talking, when he saw the man in the light-coloured shirt push the other man.

Mr. Walsh said he then saw the man in the light-coloured shirt moving his arm as though he was cutting blocks with a stick.

At this stage he got into his car, as he thought a burglary was taking place at the Phelan house. He drove to the Phelan house and saw a man lying on the grass.

Witness said he drove to the Garda Station at Rathgormack and returned with Garda James Kelly. The two men then found Mr. Horan's body lying face down in the grass, with a spade beside the body.

Garda James Kelly said there was blood on the ground around Mr. Horan's body. The garda said he saw a spade lying a couple of feet from the body and he noticed what appeared to be blood stains on the spade's handle.

There was a ladder lying on the grass about 10 feet from the body, the garda added.

Earlier, prosecuting counsel, Mr. Maurice Gaffney, SC, said that the dead man was well known in the area and had been fixing roofs.

Mr. Gaffney told the jury they would hear evidence that the accused man was arrested by gardai around 3 p.m. that day and charged with murder.

A subsequent forensic examination showed that blood on the accused's shoe corresponded to the dead man's blood.

WRITTEN STATEMENT

Det. Garda Brendan Cullimore told the jury that he arrested Phelan near Stradbally round 3.15 p.m.

Phelan said to him: "I'm glad it's over. Will some-body do something for my father and old Willy. It's been going on for a while. I'll go with you now. Who will look after the children. I hit Willy Horan on the head with a shovel."

Det. Garda Cullimore said that as he was bringing Phelan to Waterford Garda Station he asked could he stop at Stradbally Church to say prayers. Phelan then said the Lord's Prayer aloud in the garda car.

At Waterford Garda Station, Phelan made a written statement, which he signed. In the statement, Phelan said that earlier that morning a doctor had tried to take away two of his children.

Phelan said he hit the doctor with his head and then left his house and drove to the family home at Carrowleigh.

"I told Willy Horan who works there to f... off and he kind of mumbled," Phelan said in the state-

"He had got down off the roof. He was as old as the hills. I took the ladder off him and told him to f... off. I was in a temper and I picked up a shovel that was nearby and I hit him with it.

"I kicked him a few times when he fell. I kicked him in the face and in the testicles. I kicked him in the nose. Blood flowed from the nose copiously," the statement went on.

Phelan said he told the dog, a three-legged dog called Dusty, to attack Mr. Horan, but the dog wouldn't.

Det. Garda Cullimore said that during the interview, Phelan drank numerous cups of water and complained of being very thirsty.

He told prosecuting counsel, Mr. Maurice Gaffney, SC, that Phelan had said he was in Italy for the World Cup.

Witness told Mr. Patrick MacEntee, SC, for Phelan, that there were two children, aged four and two with Phelan, when he arrested him. He noticed that the children did not have any footwear, but they seemed happy.

Det. Garda Culllimore denied a suggestion that he wanted to get a confession from Phelan on the roadside because he knew that Phelan was mentally ill.

He also told counsel that he did not think any of Phelan's behaviour was abnormal.

When the trial continued last Friday, Dr. Richard Brady, Dungarvan gave evidence that the accused had been taken ill on his way to the World Cup in Italy last June. The doctor said that he believed Phelan was suffering from "manic depressive psychosis" and added that Phelan had butted him when he called to his house several hours before the alleged killing. He had been called by Phelan's wife who had become concerned about her husband's behaviour.

VERY UPSET AND AGITATED

After a recess for the week-end the trial resumed on Monday when Supt. P. J. Hayes, Waterford in evidence said that the accused had appeared very upset and agitated when he went to see him in custody on September 20.

Very Rev. Fr. M. J. Ryan, P.P., Stradbally said that he had known Phelan as a hardworking, conscientious man since he became P.P. at Stradbally in 1985. It became obvious to him last September that he was not well and he agreed with defence counsel, Mr. Patrick McEntee, S.C., that the accused was then a mentally sick man.

The trial continues.



Dungarvan Man Makes Court Threat To Hang Himself

A 20-years-old Dungarvan man who had been remanded in custody at St. Patrick's Institution, Dublin from the previous sitting of the court a fortnight earlier declared at Dungarvan Court last week (Wednesday, April 24) that he would hang himself if he was again to be remanded in custody.

He was William Whelan who gave his address as 38, Cathal Brugha Place but, who was stated to have lived formerly at Childers Estate and he appeared in custody before District Justice Uinsinn Mac Gruairc on a number of charges involving the stealing of Bank Deposit Books and a Bank of Ireland Pass Card with which he had illegally obtained £200 from the Bank Pass Machine on March 17 last and with allowing himself to be carried in four stolen cars on the Easter Week-end. Whelan had pleaded guilty to all charges and had been remanded for a fortnight to come up for sentencing.

Garda Inspector M. De-

laney who prosecuted told last week's sitting of the Court that two further charges were to be preferred against Whelan — one of assaulting Garda Sergeant Thomas O'Grady at Dungarvan Garda Station on April 24 and causing malicious damage to a cell mattress at the Station.

While Sergeant O'Grady was giving evidence about the fresh charges, Whelan started to shout abuse at him and told District Justice Mac Gruairc that the court could lock him up for another 12 or 18 months but he wanted the truth to be told

Shouting at the Sergeant who was in the witness box, the defendant de-

clared that he did not give a f... about him, adding "if I am remanded again I will hang myself!"

Shortly after this, the court recessed for a brief period and on resuming, Mr. Niall King, who appeared for the defendant, stated that Whelan would consent to a further remand to Carrick-On-Suir Court on Thursday, May 2.

District Justice Mac Gruairc then told Whelan that he had endeavoured to do all he could for him and said that he did not want him to be in custody for one day longer than was absolutely necessary. He accordingly remanded him in custody as agreed.ø

Telecom Eireann Announces Details Of New 'Phone Charges

Details of changes in telephone charges were announced recently by Telecom Eireann.

Mr. Fergus McGovern, Chief Executive, in a statement welcoming the price reductions, said that they formed part of Telecom's on-going commitment to lower prices. They will reduce the national telephone bill by 8% or almost £50 million annually when implemented in January 1992.

Details of the changes are as follows:—

Charges for all national trunk calls over 80km (50 miles) will come down by 33% from £1.01 to 67p per three minutes (peak) and from 67p to 45p per 3 minutes off-peak.

• Peak rates apply Monday to Friday 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Off-Peak rates apply all other times.

Many local call areas

will be expanded thus giving increased local coverage for 75% of customers outside the (01) area.

Local calls will be timed at 15 minute intervals for week day peak times (8 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday to Friday). Less than 3% of calls are affected. All other local calls including weekends and public holidays will be timed at 30 minute intervals. Less than 2% of calls are effected. Each timed interval will be charged at the same rate as the preset local call, i.e. 11.17p.

• The fee for operator assisted calls will rise from 20p to 50p while alarm clock calls via the operator will go up from 50p to 75p.

• A charge of 11.17p per call is to be introduced for Directory Enquiries. This will not be charged for enquiries from payphones.

THIS MUST NEVER BE **ALLOWED TO HAPPEN AGAIN**

Last week the entire nation was veritably brought to its knees by the strike action of 1,000 electricians employed by the E.S.B. The strike was about whether or not the electricians should be given a pay increase of two per cent or five per cent in return for past concessions on productivity. That was as the electricians saw the issue but on another level it was whether or not a small but powerful group with a great deal of industrial muscle could drive a coach and four through the Programme for Economic and Social Progress.

The strike went on for five days during which the entire country had to endure a continuation of unannounced power cuts. It is not our intention to rake over the coals of what went on prior to or during the period of the strike but we are concerned that some failsafe system should be introduced to ensure that such a strike will never be allowed to happen again.

It is no consolation for those of us in all walks of life, who are dependant to a major or lesser degree on electricity to have to suffer while unions and employers bicker about their grievances and the Government displays a preference to play politics instead of doing what they should do and govern, as happened throughout last week.

Many will agree with the argument that workers employed in such a vital and public national service should not have the right to ever go on strike. However, our Minister for Labour made it clear no later than last Monday that he would not be in favour of a law banning such strikes.

Perhaps then something should be done to have a sufficient number of trained personnel within the Army who would take-over if the electricians or some other such body in a vital area opted for strike action again. Or maybe some arrangement could be made to enable us to connect into an alternative supply of electricity perhaps from Britain or Northern Ireland. Certainly the monopoly must be broken in some

MAGNIFICENT **RESPONSE TO KURDISH** REFUGEE APPEAL

The appeal on behalf of the Kurdish refugees in Iraq whose desperate plight since the cessation of the Gulf War has been highlighted daily on our television screens met with a magnificent response in Dungarvan and district last week-end.

Staff at the Mercy Convent which was the local collection point were kept busy dealing with the great quantities of adult and children's clothes handed in as well as blankets and nonperishable foodstuffs.

The Dungarvan Soroptomists Group organised the collection of funds in conjunction with the appeal and we understand that here also the public showed a wonderful spirit of generosity as several thousands of pounds which will go towards the purchase of medical supplies and equipment were collected.

The response showed how deeply touched we all have been by the great misfortune which has befallen the Kurds in having to flee the wrath of the fiendish Saddam Hussein who continues to rule in Iraq.

TO BELIEVE?

We have been informed by members of the Government and by Government spokesmen on a regular basis how well the economy is going, how inflation is being kept well in check and how good future prospects look for the country.

However, last week, in his opening address to the Annual I.M.I. Conference which was held in Killarney, Professor Joe Lee of University College, Cork said that we have been deluding ourselves about our economic performance.

We have done this, he said, by looking at averages relative to other E.C. countries but even in the 1960's when we were doing well our growth rate was significantly below the rates of European economies at a comparable stage of development.

Taking our current situation, Professor Lee told the conference delegates that if emigration was counted into our employment figures that it would be running at 30 per cent and not 20 per cent which was the figure currently being quoted. Furthermore, if the proportion of working wives in the labour force was closer to the E.C. average, he said that we would be running at a 30 per cent unemployment rate.

Professor Lee pointed out that in assessing ourselves there are two things to be taken into account: unemployment and emigration as they are the best pointers to long term economic performance. The truth, therefore, was that we had fallen behind most of the economies of the other E.C. countries because we had failed to match the growth rates of even the more backward economies.

Was Professor Lee just scare-mongering when he addressed the I.M.I. Conference in this manner or was he just laying bare the situation as it really is. His picture of the economy is certainly at odds with what the politicians would want us to believe. The question that remains to be answered though is, who are we to believe where these very important issues are con-

During the course of her speech when she performed the official opening of the new Church of Ireland Liosmor Mochuda National School in Lismore last Monday, the Minister for Education, Mary O'Rourke was in sparkling form as she told the V.I.P. gathering of the thrill she had experienced in travelling over the famous Vee for the first time on her way to the Cathedral town.

The Minister had complimentary remarks to make about several among the attendance whom she knew previously and paid a particular compliment to Waterford County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley. She recalled that Mr. Hurley was an old friend of hers as he was attached to the Local Authority in her own home constituency of Westmeath before coming to Waterford. "What was Westmeath's loss has been Waterford's gain", said the Minister, a compliment which will be generally endorsed by all.

As It Was A Century Ago In Knockanore

This week we continue our commemoration of Miss Bridget Budds (in last week's issue due to a typographical error the word 'commemoration' appeared as 'communication') who was born at Kilcockan near Tallow on December 14, 1869 and who died in December 1898 at the early age of 29 years.

Under the nom-de-plume "Heather Bell," she had many of her beautiful poems published during her lifetime some of which have now come to us courtesy of Tom Murray from Dunmoon, Tallow. Last week we published the poem "Carnglass" and continue with another this week.

But first, in order to give readers an insight into the background of this very talented young woman who graced the Knockanore district all of 100 years ago, we will publish extracts from an Obituary published shortly following her demise in 1898 which stated: "On the 16th inst. this genial and talented young lady passed away after a brief illness at her mother's residence. As "Heather Bell" she will be best known to readers of the "Weekly Herald" whose pages so often contained her beautiful poetic contributions . . .

It then goes on: "Of a retiring and unassuming disposition, like the mountain flower she chose for nom-de-plume, her delights were to walk along the slopes of her native Helicon — the green hill of Carnglass — or to pensively stray beside the old adjacent churchyard of Kilcockan in her mother's farm, communing in poetic transport with its voiceless inmates."

The obituary continues: "To natives of Knockanore, at home or abroad, the news of her death at the early age of twenty-nine will be a cause of unaffected sorrow, and must needs bring before their mental ken scenes of the dear old village, and the faces of such genial and noble characters as the veteran "Postman Maurice" so beautifully depicted in, and happily introduced into the writings of the gifted young lady who is now no more. Her remains were laid to rest in the new burial ground attached to the local chapel and many wreaths as tokens of true affection were laid on the green sod that encloses them by sorrowing relatives and sympathetic friends. The Rev. T. Walshe, P.P., Knockanore, assisted by Rev. J. Curran, C.C. officiated at the graveside.

Here then is another of "Heather Bells" lovely poems which tells of the beauties of "Glendine" (its title) as she saw it during her lifetime a century ago-

Glendine, oh lovely calm retreat! The seat of rural peace and bliss Thy bowers how beautiful and sweet When tinged with summers ripening kiss.

There beauty wandering wreaths her spells Among thy stately wood-crowned heights And gently sloping mossy dells Whose wondrous bloom the heart delights.

What charms to captivate the eye Adown thy fern-fringed woodland paths Dim nooks embowered in greenery And tree-girt lonely fairy raths.

Green drooping brambles interwove Oe'r canopy thy babbling mills; And every hazel clustered grove With bursts of wild sweet music thrills.

Exquisite music in whose strains A thousand feathered minstrels join They love thy shady hills and glens O peaceful, beautiful Glendine!

How pleasant thy recesses deep Where dainty wild flowers freely bloom And timid soft grey rabbits peep From out the dusky trees soft-gloom..

Each vista green each sunny mead Hills, glens, glades and mills combine To make thee what thou art indeed A bonny, beauteous spot Glendine.

When first I saw thee, fair retreat Thy every sylvan shade and gleam Thy smile was of so softly sweet A dream of Eden did'st thou seem.

Twas May — the heavens were blue above

The ground rejoiced in the same hue, For stream in every shadowy grove Were lovely odorous bells of blue

FIRE the first shots in the war against weeds and the summer campaign will be much easier.

But holding fire will allow the weeds to gain ground as the warmer April weather injects all-round vigour into the garden.

An early move now also enables the weeding to be done without resorting to 'ungreen' methods such as weedkillers, which can damage the plants you wish to keep as well as being hazardous to apply and a risk to pets and children.

Simple hoeing of flower beds and vegetable plots is just as effective now by simply detaching the weeds from their roots before the pests gain a foothold.

If you must use chemicals – garden paths often require such attention – then use the proprietary gel types which can be dabbed on in a more localised and controlled way.

After weeding, lay a loose mulch of well-rotted garden compost, pulverised bark or old sawdust to a depth of about an inch around flowers, shrubs and small trees. Avoid using peat – a resource which is fast being weed up.

used up.
Mulching will not only
deter the weed heads from
poking through again but
also help keep moisture in
the soil, for April is a surprisingly dry month despite
its traditional reputation for
showers.

In fact, the regular should stand by to water where necessary or the spring vigour of his flowers and vegetables may be set back for the rest of the year by a sudden burst of warm sunny weather.

But that doesn't necessarily rule out the risk of frost either so protect fragile plants with cloches or homemade 'tents' of hessian, plastic sheet or polythene.

Some of the risks can be avoided by choosing higher locations in the garden for such frost-prone plants and using sturdier stock for lower parts where frost will lie thickest.

If the worst comes to the worst you can limit frost damage by spraying or watering affected plants with tepid water, which should also ease any follow-up damage from the contrasting temperature of the daytime sun.

Now is also a good time to check ivy which will otherwise start to run amok and quickly gain a hold on house walls. Clip it close and, if it is a threat to the home or trees, cut the stump as low as possible and paint with an ammonium sulphate solution.

You can cut back overgrown holly, laural, yew and box hedging quite severely now as long as a sharp pair of shears or electric trimmer is used – messy cuts will disfigure and promote infection.

The lawn will now need more mowing and can be conditioned for the coming months using a spring or electric lawn rake to pick out 'thatch', which builds up and hampers drainage and nourishment of the grass.

More Memories of Growing Up in West Waterford REVIVAL OF "THE STATIONS"

I well remember about 1930, the revival, after a lapse of many years, of the old custom of holding the Stations in private houses. This revival came as a bit of a shock to some and spurred many of them into action to bring their homes up to an acceptable standard for the priest and the celebration of Mass. What gave rise to the stations in the first place? Many believe the custom began in penal times when it was against the law to celebrate Mass.

In spite of the prohibition, Mass continued to be celebrated — quite often on the rocks in the open air. If the weather was inclement the celebration had to be taken indoors to houses in quiet places. Because there was a price on the heads of priests, they often travelled incognito — as vagrants or as farm labourers.

With the revival of the stations in my parish came a new zeal for the Catholic faith. The parish was subdivided into station areas consisting mostly of two townlands. It was expected that every household would hold the stations if they could afford it. Stations were held twice a year at Easter time and in the Autumn.

The priest would arrive either on a bicycle or if it was convenient on foot. On the day before the stations, the Mass basket had to be brought to the house either from the church or from where ever the stations were held on that particular day. This was a wicket basket about three feet by two feet and one foot deep. It contained everything the priest needed for the celebration of Mass except the communion breads which he brought himself.

It was the duty of the Mass server, usually a local boy aged 10 to 13 years, to set up the altar. The kitchen table was placed up on two chairs and placed against the wall. On it was placed the Altar Stone, three altar cloths, two wax candles, three prayer charts, and the chalice which was always wrapped in a green beige bag. Nobody was allowed to touch the chalice except the priest. On top of the altar the boy had to place the vestments in the correct order. The priest always checked the altar on arrival to ensure that everything was correct.

Confessions were usually heard in the parlour and penitents went there one by one. At that time most of the people present would go to confession. The server had to make a count of all those intending to receive Holy Communion and some priests were very particular that the count was absolutely correct. Mass over, the priest set about collecting "the dues" from those present. In the meantime the women folk prepared breakfast - usually toast, tea and a boiled egg. The woman of the house used enquire as to how each person wanted their egg done. I remember one particular priest who always said "with another." About eight persons would sit down with the priest two always included in this sitting were the head of

the house and the Mass server.

Station breakfasts were pretty much the same as people would ordinarily have. The only extras would be lump sugar and "station" loaf which could be either a barm brack or a seed loaf. Toast was made in front of the open fire. There was usually an expert toast maker and she could manipulate three forks and would make three cuts at the one time.

USUAL TOPICS
Conversation at the breakfast table was about the usual topics — the weather, the happenings on

weather, the happenings on the farm and maybe some local gossip. I am sure the priest often heard parish secrets at the stations. The Mass server was the first to leave the table as he had to go to school and would aim to be there at about 11 a.m. He was always given a cut of the station loaf well spread with home made butter and two shillings.

I remember on one famous occasion an old woman went to Confession and forgot to close the parlour door after her. The priest was slightly deaf and impatient as well. As the Confession proceeded he spoke to her in a raised tone of voice. "Was it one, or a dozen or a bucketful you stole." The poor woman in an effort to qui-eten him down said "Oh one, one, one father." Down in the kitchen there was a lot of speculation as to what she stole. Eggs were ruled out because of the reference to the bucket. It was not the apple season and potatoes were all safely in barns. The conclusion was that it must have been a turnip. I am sure that old woman had no trouble getting by St. Peter at the Golden Gate! — M.M.

Ingredients:


1/2 lb (225g) dried apricots
1/4 pint (10fl oz) water
20z (55g(brown sugar
30z (85g) butter

30z (85g) caster sugar

Soak apricots in water overnight, drain off surplus liquid. Place fruit in a greased 2 pint ovenproof dish. Sprinkle over the brown sugar. Cream butter and caster sugar together until light and fluffy. Add almond essence and egg yolks, beat well. Fold in flour. Whisk egg whites until stiff and carefully fold into the sponge mixture.

Spread over the fruit and sprinkle over the almonds. Bake Gas Mark 4 or 350F 45-50 minutes. Plums, rhubarb or apples may be used instead of apricots.

Serves 4-5.

Twice'


Later, Connery 'saw' himself die in a hut with one of his African women looking



Pigeon Racing — We would like to take this opportunity to explain some of the facts behind pigeon racing. The day before the race members of our club bring their birds to a marking station. At the marking station rubber rings are put on one of the legs of the pigeons. The pigeons are then put into a special crate and then put onto a pigeon transporter which brings the birds to a race point (e.g. Mullingar).

Then, on Saturday morning the birds are liberated. When the bird comes home from the race the owner of the bird takes the rubber ring from the pigeon's leg and puts it into a thimble that is put into a pigeon clock, which times the bird.

A velocity time is then made for the owner of the pigeon and the highest velocity will win the race.

We hope this information will help people who do not know much about pigeon racing.


