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Outrageous Vandalism Condemned By Council

Cllr. D. Goode informed his colleagues at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last Monday night that since his comments on vandalism in the town made at the previous meeting had been reported in the local papers, the flowers on his wife's grave in the Old Churchyard had been scattered and thrown aside. He could not say whether the matter was related to the comments he had made but he thought it was outrageous that such a thing could happen in this day and age.

The Chairman, Cllr. Mary Dixon said that unfortunately such vandalism was going on all over the place. "Wreaths have been taken from graves and smashed and the van-

dalism of graveyards generally is shameful" she said.

The meeting unanimously condemned these acts of vandalism in the strongest possible terms.

Council Call For Children's Playground In Dungarvan

Proposing a motion at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night calling on the Council to provide an enclosed children's playground, Cllr. T. Wright said that a great need existed in the town for such an amenity for the ever increasing number of small children in the urban area.

Calling on the Council to pass the motion, Cllr. Wright also said that the officials should display enthusiasm about the proposal. He suggested that the Causeway Park would be a suitable site for the project and in calling to have it enclosed he meant that the facility should be locked every night.

Cllr. Wright then pointed out that a sum of £6,000 had been included in the Council's estimates to cover an election this year but as there was to be no urban election now or ever again, he thought this money could now be used towards setting up a playground.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan said that while she disagreed with Cllr. Wright's statement that there would never again be an urban council election, she supported the motion.

Cllr. Billy Kyne said that the aspiration was a laudable one which would be

supported by all members but there would be a need for a number of playgrounds to service all areas of the town while in addition to setting them up, the Council would also be required to maintain and supervise them which would prove costly.

Mr. B. White, Town Clerk, pointed out that insurance cover for such projects was a major problem and they would have to be under constant supervision while open to avoid excessive insurance charges.

Cllr. Austin Hallahan recalled that some years ago the local Junior Chamber installed a children's playground at Quann's but it had deteriorated due to vandalism to a stage where most of the equipment had become unsafe. "Perhaps," said Cllr. Hallahan, "we could again induce local organisations like Junior Chamber and Chamber of Commerce to become involved. It should be a com-

munity effort to which we would lend our support."

It was then agreed to agree in principle with the

motion and the Town Clerk was requested to prepare a report on the estimated cost of setting up the project.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

YOU HAVE RECEIVED YOUR ORDERS

Moses, who acted as an intermediary between the people of God, tells his listeners in the first reading for Sunday next that they were privileged in having been chosen to hear the word of God. He is saying, if they respond to God's message, He will make them His own. However, the fact God has revealed Himself to them implies that they should take heed, and, as God said, "I'll be your God, if you'll be my people." So, it is not enough to hear and to believe, God's law must be observed. Moses, through this same reading, is saying to the people of the twentieth century, you are a chosen people, you have been doubly privileged. The message you received was proclaimed by Jesus Himself. And, to ignore His words, is to ignore God. Accept His teaching without question, faithfully obey His Commands and you'll be His faithful people.

In the second reading Paul is saying, those who respond to the promptings of the Holy Spirit are deemed to be the true sons of God. Of course, Paul has not forgotten that we were born through the waters of Baptism into the family of God, where there is love, trust, understanding and confidence. There's no room for disharmony or fear in such a loving family, because fear does not co-exist with love. And, as members of that family, we're not afraid to run to our Heavenly Father or call on Him for help. We feel happy and contented in His presence. He loves us when we trust Him. So, Paul is saying, when we behave as faithful and loving children, we are securing our rights to a share of God's Kingdom. It is understood that meanwhile, whilst we linger here, we must live as befits a child of God, and prove we're worthy to claim our inheritance.

In the Gospel, Matthew takes us into Galilee, and depicts Jesus appearing to the Apostles and the brethren. It is obvious the meeting was pre-arranged by Jesus, which partly accounted for the large gathering. Events show that many of those present had reservations about the Resurrection, but when Jesus showed Himself on this occasion there was no hesitation, they all bowed down and worshipped Him. Jesus spoke, and declared He was Lord of all, and proceeded to authorise His Apostles to go and preach the Good News. One concludes, God's Church had and has the obligation of implementing and of fulfilling the purpose for which Christ came. The Apostles knew well their task would not be easy, but they were neither deterred nor afraid. They remembered that Jesus promised to be with them to the end of time.

You'll have noticed Jesus enjoined two tasks on His Apostles, namely, to baptise and to teach. They were, you might say, to establish a new relationship by bathing the people in the mystery of God the Father, of Jesus His Son and of the Holy Spirit. Baptism thus elevates us to a sharing in the life of the Godhead, which, through the

teachings handed down to us, we are able to care, nourish and develop. Being a Christian goes beyond listening and learning. We must, having absorbed the message, go and join God's army, and proclaim Jesus by word and by example.

LOVE ONE ANOTHER

Recently, referring to the Lord's moving prayer on the eve of His death, I mentioned, He prayed for His Church. He earnestly wanted all members to model and join in reflecting the love that vibrates through the Godhead. The Lord has even assured us that if we love one another, the Father will give us anything we ask. Sadly, people do not seem to be listening. Look at the hatred in Ulster. And, they are supposed to be Christian! Worse still is that everywhere you look, it is the same story. What about yourself? Where do you bury the hatchet? The simple fact is, if you do not love your neighbour, you do not love your God.

The Church not only wants our assent to the mystery of the Blessed Trinity, but she wants us to utilise it as a source of strength. The more you know God, the more you'll love Him, and the greater will be your desire to increase your love. The mystery does provide us with a dazzling glimpse of the Godhead, without which we'd never have known of the existence of the Three Divine Persons. And to know that these Three Persons are equal in all things — equally God, equally eternal, equally powerful etc. — opens up a treasury of information. Jesus told us that through the Sacraments God pours some of that love into the Body of Christ, His Church.

Not only is the Trinity a great mystery, but it is also a side of God we'd never have known had He not told us. Indeed, the Christian believes there is only one God, but to be a Christian, he must also believe that there are Three Persons in one God. This teaching is absolutely basic to our belief, because the whole of the Christian revelation would have no meaning without the framework of the Trinity.

Lecture On "Our Local Heritage"

The audience in Villierstown Church recently for Dr. Patrick Power's lecture on "Our Local Heritage" came from every quarter; Tallow, Cappoquin, Youghal, Ardmore, Dungarvan, Aghlish, Carrickbeg were all represented. Mr. James Villiers Stuart introduced Dr. Power, saying that his recently published book "The History of Waterford, City and County" gave us a new and definitive history of our home county and for this we were grateful.

Dr. Power's talk gave fascinating glimpses into the past of places that show little sign today of the part they played in history. Did the audience realise that Affane, now chiefly recognised by its crossroads, was once a large town, with three fairs held each year? And the Battle of Affane between the Butlers and the Desmonds was fought along the road still called the "Bora Wacra" (Bothar an Achra) which runs between what are now untroubled fields.

The River Blackwater was brought to life as the busy artery of trade, with sailing ships bringing cargoes as far as Lismore, with old Strancally Castle and the "Tower" of Dromana still standing as reminders of the protection they gave from pirates in earlier days. Its tributary of the Bride was important when Richard Boyle, Earl of Cork, promoted the iron industry of Tallow — and incidentally carried out shocking deforestation in his use of timber for the smelting.

Dr. Power also dwelt on the history of Dromana and the Villiers Stuart family, and gave examples of what enlightened landlords they had been, especially in the days of the Land League.

Questions at the end of Dr. Power's lecture gave an indication of the deep and wide interest members of the audience had in the history of their native area. Was the evidence of trine gods in very early days, and the name Medusa an indication of a link with Greece? What signs are there today of the ancient pilgrimage road from Ardmore to Cashel? (soon to be preserved further, thanks greatly to efforts of Mrs. Siobhan Lincoln). Did the Vikings come further west than Dungarvan? In later times did Daniel O'Connell play a role in the land reform as well as the local leaders? Was it true that a Mr. Eeles, who was a scientist interested in electricity, is buried at the top of the Knockmealdown?

Concluding the evening and thanking Dr. Power, Mr. James Villiers Stuart pointed to his recently published book as a source of the answers to many questions, and announced that a copy of the book would be raffled. The lucky winner was Mr. Michael McCarthy of Cappoquin.

The audience later enjoyed a chat, and thanks are due to Mesdames Bridget

Mernin, Pat Ronayne and Marie Ronayne who provided refreshments and to Mr. Michael Power for his book stall. Many of the audience commented on the

finè appearance of the renovated east end of the church, and the setting was enhanced by flower arrangements beautifully made by Mary Sullivan.

BOOKS

For The Record By Brian Lenihan

The long awaited explanation by former Tanaiste and Minister for Defence, Brian Lenihan on the infamous tape revelations in the course of last year's Presidential campaign which he has given in his "For The Record," published last week, throws up more questions than it answers.

If we are to accept Mr. Lenihan's explanation on his behaviour in relation to the tape incident with University graduate Jim Duffy, then at that time, May 1990, he was also medically unfit to hold his positions as Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Defence and should have resigned.

This is what he says (p.22) "I told Duffy in the course of a forty minute discussion that on the night of the 27th January, 1982, I telephoned Aras An Uachtairain and spoke to the President, Dr. Hillery. As this book will clearly demonstrate, what I told Mr. Duffy in this respect was untrue. Since I myself do not remember the meeting with Mr. Duffy my only explanation for telling him such rubbish is that my medical condition at the time was such that I was in a total state of confusion..."

But apart from the questions of all round credibility which the book raises, it is a good read and worth buying if for nothing else than to give the reader an insight into what really goes on behind closed doors and the decisions taken in high places to which the public are not privy.

WATERFORD INTRIGUED HIM

In the chapter dealing with the returns in the Presidential election (p.198) Mr. Lenihan has this to say: "Waterford intrigued me... the swing to me in Waterford was the biggest in the whole country. The vote for Fianna Fail in the '89 election was 34.8%. In the presidential election I obtained 44.5% in the Waterford constituency. This was an increase of 9.7%... the results in Waterford closely mirror the results nationwide.

The turnout in Waterford

(63.7%) is almost identical with the national turnout (64.1%). The result in Waterford is almost the exact same as the national results: Lenihan 44.5% (44.1% nationwide), Robinson 39.6% (38.9% nationwide) and Currie 15.9% (17% nationwide)...

The 240-page book was printed in Ireland by Microprint and the very high quality of the publication clearly demonstrates that there is no need for books to be printed abroad and then imported back as has happened so often in the recent past.

For The Record by Brian Lenihan is published by Blackwater Press and is now available in bookshops at £6.95.

Upgrading Kereen Health Centre

In a letter to the Secretary, Waterford Co. Council, read at the May monthly meeting of the Council held last week in Dungarvan, Mr. T. Byrne, Technical Services Officer, South Eastern Health Board, expressed his appreciation of the efforts of the Council Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne, of Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, of Mr. Jim Shine, Chief Planning Officer and of the Co. Secretary, Mr. B. McNally which have enabled the much needed upgrading of Kereen Health Centre to proceed. "We expect to be in a position to have work commence on the site within a month," the letter added.

£5.17 Million Allocated For County Road Works Scheme

In the course of his very comprehensive report on the 1991 Road Works Scheme for 1991 submitted by him to the May monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held last last week in Dungarvan, Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer stated that the scheme had been prepared against a background of great change in road policy and financing and in the structure, functions and responsibilities of local authorities. Under a new Roads Bill, the Government will establish the National Roads Authority (NRA) which for the future will have overall responsibility for the planning and maintenance of the national roads network.

The report stated that at present Waterford County Council maintained 2,523 Kms. (1,568 mls.) of public road of which 69 Kms. (43 mls.) was classified as National Primary with the bulk, 2,088 Kms. (1,298) classified as County Roads. All but 54 Kms. (34 mls.) of the network representing 97.9% of the total is rolled

and sealed or "dust-free." The County's road system, developed over centuries, was valued at £375 million.

The County, the report added, contains an estimated 560 bridges and culverts (greater than 2 metres span), most of which are masonry arch construction and are at least 100 years

old. They can be valued at over £60 million. Many of these are now coming under increasing stress from the much greater traffic loadings permitted by the EC which must be implemented in Ireland by the end of 1998. As a result, up to one-third of these may require upgrading to cope at an estimated cost of £4 million.

The report then stated that the Road Works Scheme for 1991 as submitted provided for a gross expenditure of £5,715,400 and this included a special major improvement grant of £2 million for works at the Dungarvan Sweep project to be continued during the year.

Mr. O'Flynn pointed out that permanent manning levels on road upkeep in the county had fallen from 197 in 1983 to 141 at present and this level of manpower was not sufficient to undertake the road maintenance task.

In regard to maintenance work on Regional and County roads, Mr. O'Flynn said that it was vital that the Government embark on a further 3-year programme of remedial work while a doubling of the existing funding (to around £0.4m.) was also necessary in the inadequate allocation for surface dressing on National roads.

The Report was adopted unanimously and the Chairman and members of the Council joined in complimenting and congratulating Mr. O'Flynn on the excellence of the report.

Antiquated Local Authority Accounting Systems Should be Scrapped

Deputy Brendan Kenneally speaking on the Local Government Bill during the Dail debate said:—

"I welcome in particular Part 5 of the Bill which refers to Local Authority boundary alterations. In Waterford City we have been looking for a boundary extension for quite some time as the city badly needs to develop on its northern side. While it is true Ministers had power to create such an extension, any Minister would always be reluctant to do so without the agreement of both Local Authorities involved."

"Now that a new Boundary Commission is to be set up, it means that the Minister will have an independent body arbitrating on these applications, which

will make it a lot easier for him to make a final decision.

"I am extremely concerned, and have been for some time at the way accounting procedures operate for Local Authorities. I, as an accountant, have great difficulty in understanding this antiquated system of accounting and I know that many of the other members of my own Local Authority do not understand these accounting Estimates at all."

"Accordingly it is very difficult for them to perform their duties as Councillors and I think it is about time that more commercial accounting criteria were used."

SERVICE CHARGES

Deputy Kenneally then said:—

"I welcome the statement that was made in the house by a Labour Deputy admitting that the concept of Service Charges in urban areas was introduced by Deputy Dick Spring of the Labour Party in 1983. I personally have no problems supporting Service Charges and I have no problem with the concept of Service Charges. However, all around the country the very people who introduced them in the first place are now implacably opposed to them. We in Fianna Fail get criticised for changing our stance but we do not hear of the Labour Party being criticised for changing their stance."

"It has been suggested by a previous speaker in this

house that too much of the resources that are channelled into the South East of the country are coming to Waterford City. I totally reject that. I agree that the South East is the forgotten area of the country and within that region, Waterford, the capital of the South East, is not treated more favourably than any other area.

"Indeed, outside of local Tax Officials, Gardai, etc., Waterford has received nothing extra from any Government. It should be remembered that the South Eastern Health Board headquarters are located in Kilkenny and that the Environmental Protection Agency will soon be located in Wexford. We have been waiting for far too long for our promised Government Decentralisation and I think it is about time that this commitment was honoured."

"I feel that this is an eminently sensible piece of legislation. As has already been pointed out by both the Taoiseach and the Minister for the Environment, this is only the start. It is a start in the shift of real powers from local Management to the elected representatives. The elected representatives are answerable to the people whereas management is not. Accordingly it is only right that there should be such a shift in power and I look forward to further legislation to see this process being proceeded with further."

30,000 Farmers Living In Limbo

Upwards of 30,000 Irish farmers have been living in limbo over the past 12 months since our Minister for Agriculture, Michael O'Kennedy, presented Ireland's submission to Brussels for the Extension of our Disadvantaged Areas.

This was stated by Munster Vice-President I.F.A., D. J. O'Donovan at a major public meeting of farmers in Duhallow.

Mr. O'Donovan claimed that since the Irish proposal for extension of areas arrived in Brussels, EC officials have found our submission lacking in detail, confusing and even contradictory. This has resulted in the Commission referring back to our Department of Agriculture on numerous occasions requesting more information on areas submitted and seeking alterations to our original submission.

He went on to say that the Irish submission was the result of incomplete "hit and miss" surveys taken at random. As a consequence, our submission has undergone substantial chopping and changing at the request of EC officials, and because of the uproar from farmers whose areas have been excluded according to reliable leaked proposals.

"The mess-up of the Irish submission by our Minister for Agriculture has been directly responsible for the 12 month delay in the E.C. Commission approving our proposals," said Mr. O'Donovan.

29 Motions On Co. Council Agenda

The agenda for the May monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held last week in Dungarvan, in addition to 11 listed items, contained no fewer than 29 notices of motion and 3 requests for special reports. The long list of motions prompted the Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne, to appeal to the members to deal with them as briefly and as quickly as possible.

Signpost At Glasha — Cllr. C. O Riain proposed that the Council erect a signpost at Glasha Cross indicating Fourmilewater Church and this was approved.

Local Papers — Stating that it was disappointing that people wishing to consult back issues of local papers including the "Dungarvan Leader" had to travel to the National Library in Dublin, Cllr. Tom Cunningham proposed that the Council investigate the possibility of providing back files in the County Library.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Hurley said they would refer the matter to the County Librarian for his views.

Put Stradbally Back On The Map — Making the complaint that Stradbally had not been put on any map produced by Bord Failte this year, Cllr. Cunningham proposed that the Council request Bord Failte to include the village in all Bord Failte maps produced for promotional purposes for 1992 and subsequent years.

It was agreed to write to Bord Failte with this request.

Social Assistance Recipients — Cllr. M. O'Riordan proposed that the Council condemn the present practice of cutting long-term social assistance recipients from the local Labour Exchange.

Cllr. O'Riordan said that 31 recipients in Dungarvan

had recently been cut off and the reason given was that they had not made a genuine effort to look for work. Some of these were in the over 55 age group and it was well-known that anyone in that group would not get long term employment now, he said.

The motion was supported by Cllr. O Riain while Cllr. O'Halloran said that such action was now making life more miserable for those whose backs were already against the wall.

The Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne said that the efforts of several of the medical referees in these cases left a lot to be desired and Cllr. Wilkinson said that he also wished to endorse this point.

The motion was passed.

Lismore Play Area — Cllr. W. McDonnell proposed that the Council help in turning the spare ground owned by it in Parks Road, Lismore into a play area for local children as recommended by the Parks Road residents and Lismore Tidy Towns Committee. The motion was seconded by Cllr. O. Wilkinson.

When it was pointed out that all that was required was a clean-up of the area, the Co. Engineer, Mr. J. O'Flynn agreed.

Knockanore Is Hard To Find — Stating that some people from outside the area found it extremely difficult to drive to Knockanore, Cllr. W. McDonnell proposed and Cllr. J.

Quirke seconded that the Council erect road signs pointing towards Knockanore from the adjoining towns of Youghal, Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow.

The Co. Engineer agreed that as soon as he got the signs required he would have them erected.

Twig Bog — On the proposal of Cllr. Wilkinson, the Co. Engineer said that plans for improvement works at Twig Bog, Cappoquin would be prepared.

Offaly wrote to the County Manager to convey her compliments and thanks for a few very pleasant days spent touring here.

The visitor, writing from Banagher, stated that having spent a few days touring Co. Waterford last week she wished to compliment the Co. Council on the following: (a) The numerous road signs which were well situated, thus helping the tourist in every way; (b) The forewarning of dangerous bridges and bends which were also well marked with yellow/black paint; (c) The complete absence of potholes even on secondary roads and (d) The neatness and absence of litter in every village and hamlet through which she travelled.

"It was," she added, "very enjoyable with good accommodation and I would recommend it to anyone."

Having paid all these glowing tributes to our County Engineer and his staff, the writer's letter has, however, a little sting in its tail when she states "I believe that the 'only fly in the ointment' might be the difficulty in getting Planning Permission in the County!"

The County Manager has had the letter circulated to all members of the County Council.

RING DOCTOR AND THE PRESIDENT'S AILMENT

U.S. President George Bush is at present taking medication to control an overactive thyroid gland that was the cause of the heart ailment which landed him in hospital a couple of weeks ago.

His doctors have said that the President suffers from Graves disease, a thyroid condition that also afflicts his wife, Barbara.

It is common knowledge that the disease was discovered by Dr. Graves, an Irishman, who pioneered the treatment of the disorder and for whom it is named. But what is not known is that this Dr. Charles Graves was born in Helvick, Ring, in a house overlooking the pier, in the early years of the 18th century and having qualified as a doctor emigrated to America where he joined the medical staff of the

Great General Hospital in Massachusetts.

It was there that Dr. Graves pursued his research and study of the thyroid disorder and discovered how to treat the disease which has since borne his name.

It is also of interest to note that a brother of Dr. Charles, Dr. Richard Graves was the Medical Officer in Ring or Ringville, as it was then known, in 1886, and lived at Mountpleasant.

Because of President Bush's ailment, fresh interest has now been generated in Graves Disease and of course in the man who discovered how to treat it and for whom it is named. We would be most interested ourselves to hear from anyone here or in the Boston area of America who might be able to throw more light on the matter.

THE WATERFORD- AVONMORE MERGER DISCUSSIONS

What has come to be described as the worst kept secret in Irish agribusiness became public knowledge last week-end with the brief announcement released on Thursday that the publicly quoted food companies Waterford Foods and Avonmore were to enter discussions about a possible merger.

Much has already been written and said about this proposal and there are those who favour it, but equally so, there are those who are opposed to the move. However, sources close to the companies consider it inevitable that a merger will now take place. The companies would not have made the announcement unless they were sure that an agreement could be concluded but there is still a great deal of bargaining to take place and it is likely that the merger will not be completed until the end of September.

Since last October rumours had been rife that something was going on behind the scenes but it now transpires, despite the con-

stant denials, that even as long ago as that, I.D.A. executives were having extensive discussions with Avonmore's Chief Executive Pat O'Neill and Stephen O'Connor, his counterpart at Waterford Foods.

It is claimed that part of the interim delay was due to the manoeuvring at senior management level and this led to the many denials about the situation. Now that it could well be that the situation is a fait accompli, it is the problem of the "rationalisation" which will inevitably follow that now looms largest for us here in Dungarvan and West Waterford in general.

Redundancies are expected to be the inevitable result of the merger and these could be to the order of 300 to 500 people which could include managers. These job losses in the local plants and offices coupled with the cutbacks at the Crystal factory will undoubtedly prove a major loss to the economic prosperity of Dungarvan and district, an area which fortunately up to now has succeeded in escaping the worst affects of the various recessions that occurred down through the years.

What the eventual outcome of the merger will be if and when it takes place remains to be seen. It is expected that if the discussions now taking place end in agreement the Waterford Chief Executive Stephen O'Connor will take control of running the merged company for a period of two years before passing the mantle to Pat O'Neill, Avonmore's Chief Executive.

IRISH AID FOR KURDS ON TARGET

Dr. Mary Henry, a Cork born doctor just back from a visit to Iran says that the millions of pounds donated by Irish people to help the Kurdish refugees is "hitting the bullseye" and is absolutely on target. She said that Kurdish relief workers in the mountains of Iran are "delighted and relieved" when they see plane-loads of supplies arriving from Ireland, because they know the boxes will contain exactly what they need.

Dr. Henry, who is attached to the Adelaide and Rotunda hospitals in Dublin and is a member of the Overseas Division of the Irish Red Cross arrived home last Friday after a four-day visit to the refugee camps in Iran in the company of Youghal born Sean Finn, Head of the U.N. Development Pro-

gramme in Iraq and Pauline Cogan, wife of Mr. John F. Cogan, Irish Ambassador to Iran. Mrs. Cogan is the former Pauline Kiely and is a member of the well-known Kiely family of Knockateemore, Abbeyside, Dungarvan.

After the 4-day tour of the camps by the group, Dr. Henry said that she was delighted with the results of the Irish relief effort. She met several doctors who told her their hearts lift when they see Irish supplies arriving because they know they will contain things they need, like baby milk, medicines, soap and water purification units. But she criticised the efforts of other countries who, she claimed, were wasting a lot of money sending "useless" objects.

Dr. Henry who travelled out to Iran on a Red Cross Plane carrying antibiotics, blankets, medicine and baby milk said that further supplies of baby milk were still very badly needed for the big number of infants in the camps.

FUTURE OF LISMORE EMPLOYMENT EXCHANGE

The public disquiet felt concerning the future of the Lismore Employment Exchange as expressed at last week's monthly meeting of Lismore Town Commissioners was, we learn as we go to press, to be raised by Deputy Austin Deasy in the course of the Adjournment Debate in the Dail on Tuesday night.

Deputy Deasy fears that the Exchange may only be kept operative until the end of June as an election gimmick but he was to seek an undertaking from the Minister for Social Welfare that the Exchange would be kept permanently opened as it presently had a signing register of 350 people.

Any move to involve the local garda station in social welfare payments would not, the Deputy held, be suitable as the gardai in the area would not be able to cope with the demands in the Lismore, Cappoquin and Ballyduff areas.

In addition, Deputy Deasy felt that the closure of the Lismore Exchange would be a complete contradiction as the Department had already acknowledged the Lismore area as one of twelve employment blackspots in the country and had been chosen in this context for a pilot scheme for employment.

WATERFORD-AVONMORE MERGER TALKS

Single Sentence Statement Announces Discussions

The following single sentence statement was issued by Sheedy Communications on behalf of Waterford Foods plc on Thursday last May 16: "The Boards of Avonmore Foods plc and Waterford Foods plc announce to-day (Thursday, May 16th, 1991) that they are entering into discussions which may or may not lead to a merger."

The statement was a sequel to a meeting of the Board of Waterford Foods held in Dungarvan on last Thursday morning under the chairmanship of Mr. John Barry which was addressed by Chief Executive Stephen O'Connor.

In recent months rumours have been rife about a proposed merger between the two giant co-ops but up to this, these have been killed off by strong denials. However, the fact that something was going on always remained more a probability than a possibility and this probability has now been confirmed by last Thursday's rather terse announcement.

Should a merger finally be agreed, these who favour the move claim that it will establish a mammoth £1 billion food conglomerate which will be among the biggest dairy groups in Europe.

However, such a merger would certainly have very serious consequences for the workforce at both plants as under the rationalisation process that would inevitably follow anything between 350 and 500 jobs would go.

The final decision on the eventual outcome, once the discussions, will rest with the 12,000 or so shareholders of both Co-ops.

I.D.A. WELCOMES ANNOUNCEMENT

The Industrial Development Association (I.D.A.) has welcomed the announcement stating "we see this as a good move towards achieving the Irish food sector for Ireland to compete more effectively in the food markets of Europe in the 90's."

The I.D.A. which has been working behind the scenes to set up the merger talks for some considerable time points out that "the Authority's target is to see 4 or 5 large scale co-ops emerging from the existing 15 plus larger firms in the sector, with a focus on market led product areas such as food ingredients, speciality cheeses and consumer fresh dairy products areas."

UNION CONCERN

Mr. Tony Mansfield, District Officer, A.T.G.W.U., Dungarvan, stated on Monday that the announcement came as no surprise to the Union despite the repeated denials. "The main concern of the A.T.G.W.U.," said

Mr. Mansfield, "is the protection of employment of our members and we will be insisting that full and proper discussions and negotiations are held on every facet of this vital matter which affects our members, their livelihoods and their families."

Mr. Mansfield went on to again question the role of the I.D.A. in the matter and asked whether the I.D.A. would provide alternative employment of a similar top quality for Co. Waterford in general and the town of Dungarvan in particular to offset any job losses.

SUPPORT FROM I.F.A.

A press release from the Waterford Co. Executive I.F.A. at the week-end stat-

ed that the I.F.A. National Dairy Committee Chairman, Michael Slattery reiterated his welcome for the commencement of the amalgamation talks between the two Co-ops.

Commenting on local concerns over the consequences of rationalisation, Mr. Slattery said: "Amalgamation will only take place if, after thorough consultation with all those involved, the shareholders of both Societies vote overwhelmingly in favour of such a move," and he added, "I.F.A. will be insisting that the major consequences of rationalisation will be greater efficiencies leading to substantial savings which must be reflected in improved milk prices."

DESSERTS (puddings, sweets, afters, call them what you will) that are simple to prepare but give the impression that a great deal of time and effort has been put into them, will earn the cook much praise.

Here are two which not only look delicious, but are delicious.

Cabinet Pudding

Ingredients

- 4oz (100g) glace cherries - chopped
- 1oz (25g) angelica - chopped
- 4oz (100g) sponge cake
- 1oz (25g) ratafia biscuits
- 2oz (50g) mixed peel
- 4 eggs
- 2oz (50g) caster sugar
- 1/4 teasp (1/2 x 2.5ml) vanilla essence
- 1 (600ml) pint milk

Method:

Grease a 2 pint pudding basin or 6 individual moulds. Mix together 1oz cherries and 1/2oz angelica and place in the bottom of the basin or moulds. Break the sponge into pieces, put into a basin and add ratafias,

remaining cherries, angelica and peel, mix well and put into the prepared basin or divide between the moulds. Beat together eggs, sugar and essence. Heat milk to blood heat and gradually beat onto the eggs. Strain the custard into the basin or moulds. Cover with greased foil, allow to stand for 20

minutes. Put the basin into a steamer and steam for 1 hour. If small moulds are used, place them on a baking tin with water to come half way up the moulds and bake at Gas Mark 4 or 350°F for 40-45 minutes. Turn out onto a serving dish and serve with a jam sauce. Serves 4 - 6

Rosy Apple Custard

Ingredients

- 2 1/2 (2 1/2 x 15 ml) level table-spoons custard powder
- 1 (600ml) pint milk
- 2 (2 x 15ml) tablespoons rose hip syrup
- 4 rosy eating apples, well-washed
- A little lemon juice

Method:

Mix custard powder to a thin, smooth paste with the cold milk, pour into a pan and cook, stirring, until custard comes to the boil and thickens. Simmer 2 minutes, remove from heat then blend in the rose hip syrup. Coarsely grate 3 unpeeled apples, add to custard then transfer mixture to 4 sundae dishes. Leave until cold and just before serving, decorate top of each with 4 thin slices of unpeeled apples (first dipped in lemon juice to prevent browning). Serves 4

These Social Climbers Will Hide Eyesores

MANY gardeners are sniffy about nasturtiums, perhaps because they demand so little in the way of care or soil.

But they can be highly effective for quickly and easily creating a splash of colour or coverage in either a new or badly scarred garden, cloaking eyesores until they can be dealt with more effectively.

They can be particularly useful in the long term too, as colourful and tough climbers and the nastier the soil the better.

Give a nasturtium a good soil and it will produce mostly greenery, but give it poverty and it will be a riot of blooms, making it ideal for the often thin soil close to a wall or fence.

And the blooms need not be boring either, for varieties such as the canary creeper will produce lots of feathery yellow ones.

Trellis

Plant nasturtiums no later than the middle of May and they will bloom within a month and carry on until September, but give them some help by attaching a trellis or sheet of plastic netting to the wall or fence.

If you remain unconvinced about nasturtiums and want something more refined then here are some other climbers to think about:

Russian Vine - also known as 'mile-a-minute' because it can cover anything quickly and is ideal for eyesores, but make sure you prune hard in spring or it will choke parts of the garden you do want seen!

Roses - climbers range from traditional dog rose styles to those with complex blooms and make lovely



wall or pergola decorations, but need pruning and protection from aphids and pests.

Clematis - its tendrils enable it to cling well to wooden trellises, making it ideal for training alongside a doorway, but though the top loves warmth, the base must be kept cool and moist - a mulch or a layer of old slates and tiles will do the trick.

Pruning

Hydrangea - climbing types will cling tightly to walls and produce attractive white flowers but need pruning in spring.

Ivy - the old favourite and tough enough to cling onto a cold northerly wall without support but this must be controlled by pruning now. Look out for the attractive variegated types.

Wisteria - gives lovely mauve blooms and while it is limited to sunny and rich locations it needs little pruning.

Virginia Creeper - another favourite and strong climber and at its best in autumn when the greenery turns a rich red.

Good preparation is worthwhile in the above cases, so double-dig the soil so that the roots can establish well for the many years that the plant is likely to be there.

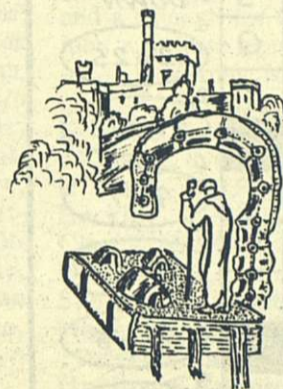

SOUL REASON

Soul Reason are an eight piece band based in the South East. Formed in April 1988, they quickly established themselves as one of Ireland's top 'live' attractions with their dynamic mix of soul and blues. Featuring the music of artists such as Otis Redding, The Doors, Elmore James and The Blues Brothers in their 'live' set, the band found themselves playing to wholly enthusiastic audiences at each and every gig. Couple the music with their stage outfits of suits, hats and shades and you have all the ingredients for an excellent night out.

Initially Soul Reason played solely in the South East area but following a series of very successful residences in the area, the band felt it was time to move out. In November '88 Soul Reason played a short series of gigs in Kilkenny, Tipperary and Wexford and increased their following even more. In the following six months Soul Reason continued to perform all over the southern half of the country and there were frequent trips to Limerick and Cork. In September '89

they took time off from 'live' work to record two tracks at Waterford's Beau Street Studios. The result of this was 7" single featuring two 'live' favourites — "Respect" (Otis Redding) and "Everybody Needs Somebody To Love" (Solomon Burke) — which subsequently went on sale at all Soul Reason gigs. A video for "Respect" was recorded by Windmill Lane Pictures in November '89 and in December '89 the band made their television debut when they appeared on R.T.E.'s Jo-Maxi, where they performed "Everybody Needs Somebody To Love."



In February 1990, Soul Reason recruited Tony Kelly on lead guitar and this added a whole new dimension to their sound as the band moved into a more blues orientated style. In the following months the band stepped up 'live' activity around the country and they had some excellent gigs in Limerick and Drogheda. In August 1990 the band appeared at a major blues festival in Waterford and topped a bill which included Don Baker and Mary Stokes. Also appearing at this festival were the legendary Dr. Feelgood. In October '90 Soul Reason performed a series of gigs in Kinsale as part of the Guinness Jazz Festival where they attracted capacity crowds. They will be returning to Kinsale for this year's festival.

Lucky Waterford Survive At Killarney

Waterford 2-15, Kerry 1-12

Cork beat Kerry in the first round at the same venue last year and then went on to win the All-Ireland, but I doubt if any of our supporters got the feeling that this kind of history will repeat itself after our frightening experience here at Fitzgerald Stadium on Sunday.

After 60 agonising minutes, the feeling was being shared by many of our supporters that our worst fears might be realised and that we would suffer the ignominy of a beating by Kerry in a senior hurling championship game.

Class and experience told in the finish and even if we were the lucky ones, full credit must be given to the players for their intense display of courage and fighting spirit at a stage when it was most needed, that was in the final ten minutes.

Experiences such as this can sometimes have a very beneficial effect, or in other words can be a blessing in disguise. It will make us rank outsiders against Cork whom we meet in two week's time at Thurles and this as we know well, is a role that has always been advantageous to Waterford hurlers.

Of course, it must also be said that it wasn't to win the tag of outsiders for the semi-final, that the team played so poorly at Killarney and one must dig further to try to unearth the reason why.

PROBLEMS

At the moment, things are unsettled in the county and there have been problems within the camp. This situation must have had some bearing on the players approach to the match and while it in no way changed their attitude to winning, it must have exerted some pressures that they could have done without.

Another factor that should not be overlooked is the great strides taken in Kerry in recent times for the improvement and promotion of hurling. The Kingdom are making marked improvement by the year since they returned to senior ranks in 1987.

THE PLAY

Waterford, playing into the breeze had a point in

the first minute when Paudie Prendergast shot over from an acute angle. Brendan O'Mahony equalised for Kerry in the 6th minute. Dermot Henley and Liam O'Connor had points in the 8th and 10th minutes. Then came the shock goal by Kerry full forward John Hennessy who was proving something of a nightmare for Damien Byrne, in the 12th minute.

Liam O'Connor had his second point in the 14th minute to bring us level again, but the next sixteen minutes belonged to Kerry when they sent over six points without reply. This was without doubt the most anxious period for Waterford and when John Hennessy missed what looked like being a certain goal just before he scored points in the 27th and 28th minutes, all Waterford supporters breathed a sigh of relief.

Noel Crowley who had a rather subdued first half, pointed our fifth free in the 30th minute, a minute before we had our second amazing escape. Pat Curran was certainly having a charmed life between the posts. Two Mossy O'Keefe points brought our first half scoring to an end. Now the score was 1-8 for Kerry and 0-7 for Waterford.

Shane Ahearne, not listed on the programme, came on as a sub for E. Cullinane in the 25th minute.

REDUCED LEEWAY

A well taken Dermot Henley point reduced the leeway to a goal in the second minute after the restart, but Hennessy's point brought the gap back to four points in the 5th. Brenner for Waterford who was now coming more into the game and Regan for Kerry exchanged points in the 12th and 13th minutes and this again left the situation unchanged.

Then came Jimmy Beresford's great run that brought him to within 30 yards of the Kerry goal and his point narrowed the home team's lead to a single goal.

Henley reduced the gap to 2 points just a minute before Kerry's third amazing miss and points by Eddie Nolan, who had come on as a sub for Paudie Prendergast and Billy O'Sullivan brought the teams level in the 25th minute (0-13 to 1-10 with just under 10 minutes remaining). Dermot Henley was wide with a scoreable free and Kerry came back to send wide. A Waterford attack came unexpectedly and found Mossy O'Keefe inside the Kerry defence and he blasted home the goal that turned the game around in our favour. Kieran Delahunty replaced Shane Ahearne in the 28th minute and Kerry substitute Paul Healy pointed for Kerry. Two minutes later, John Hennessy, roving all over the field, had a long range point to reduce the gap to a single point (1-13 to 1-12) just on the 30th minute.

Appeal For More Care At Dungarvan Bottle Bank

The Recycling Manager of Cork Rehab, Irene Daly contacted the "Leader" during the week to seek the assistance of the people of Dungarvan and district in regard to the Bottle Bank located at the Council car park at Davitt's Quay.
