LOCAL ELECTIONS

45 Candidates In Waterford Co. Council Election Race

A total of 45 candidates from the four electoral areas of the county had their nominations cleared by the Returning Officer, Mr. B. J. McNally, County Secretary, when nominations closed at 12 (noon) on Saturday last for the June 27 elections to fill the 23 seats on Waterford County Council.

In the Dungarvan area where 7 members will be returned there are 16 candidates, one of which is a woman; in the Kilmacthomas area 10 candidates including one woman are seeking election to the 5 seats; in the Lismore area there are 6 candidates two of whom are women contesting 4 seats while in the Tramore area, 14 candidates, one of which is a woman, are in the hunt for the 7 seats there.

In all, 5 of the 45 candidates are women and on this occasion there is a unique situation in that one of the candidates, Clonea farmer and well-known marathon runner and fundraiser Dan Dineen, is seeking election in both the Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas areas.

When the "Leader" inquired what the position would be in the event of Mr. Dineen, who is facing the electorate for the first time as an independent, being elected in both areas, we were informed that he would then have to resign his seat in one of the areas. This would then create a casual vacancy for that area which the elected members of the Council would then proceed to fill in the usual manner.

All the nominated candidates are at present busily engaged in canvassing for votes in their respective areas and it appears that

candidates are operating on an individual rather than a party basis in soliciting support.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

CLOTHE YOURSELF WITH OBEDIENCE, AND JOIN GOD'S ARMY

In the first reading next Sunday we're told how Adam and Eve are faced with the imponderable consequences of their sin. The writer makes it clear that they were powerless to heal the rift. And, this fact is evident from the promise the Lord made to ransom man by the help of a woman. Now, if you consider the infinite greatness of God, it will help you to understand the enormity of Adam's sin. It matters little what the actual command was, but the fact is, they disobeyed. They were fully aware of the grave punishment that their disobedience would entail, which, in itself, indicates the serious nature of their sin. That alone, you'd think, would be enough to deter them from acting foolishly. Yet, they ignored and insulted God, and their unfaithfulness brought tragedy down upon themselves and all mankind.

The promise of restoring man to God's favour was fulfilled in Jesus. He achieved victory over evil on Calvary. In His mercy, He has invited us to come and share in the booty. Thereby, He has provided us with the means to resist and to overcome the powers of evil, as well as combating our own weaknesses. It means, man is once more one trial. He knows the score and he knows what is at stake. He has been assured by God that if he uses the weapons of prayer and the Sacraments, he is bound to succeed. Failure would be unthinkable!

In the second reading Paul explains that despite the dangers, his faith is the driving force urging him to preach the Gospel. His earnest hope is that the Corinthians will reap the benefits. He knows the greater the response to his message, the more widely it will be diffused. The inevitable result is bound to redound to the great glory of God. Paul is adamant that they must have a clear picture of their destiny, because then he knows that they'll not sell their souls for earthly attractions. The struggle against trials and temptations will be for them a small price to pay for the glories ahead. Paul believes in driving home the fleeting nature of life here compared to the eternal joys of Heaven. It is not so much that he undervalues temporal things, but rather that he does not want people to be side-tracked from the main purpose of life. He even says, their salvation is the object of his

The Gospel relates two incidents seemingly unconnected, and yet, they are closely related. Jesus had cast out a devil, and, whilst the crowd saw God's hand in His work, the religious leaders claimed His power and success was due to the prince of demons. Jesus pointed out the absurd foolishness of their accusations, but in their blind jealousy and hatred they refused to believe. Actually, to accuse Jesus of seeking help from the devil was rank blasphemy. Jesus warned them that God was merciful, but if they were to continue in their obstinate blindness, they'd reap destruction. You see, their sin was not from weak-

ness, but was born from their perverse faith. When Jesus spoke of binding and ejecting satin, He was indicating that the devil's rule was ending. It was a sign that the Messiah had come, and, as John the Baptist had foretold, His reign had begun.

ALL ARE EQUAL BEFORE GOD

All the readings stress that all human beings are equal before God. I'm afraid, if we are to acknowledge this fact, we'll have to change our outlook especially in the way we perceive and treat others. Usually, we base our estimations on what they have or who they are, whereas, in God's sight, all are equal. Jesus is challenging us about the manner in which we treat others. It bears thinking!

Mark tells us that when Jesus was speaking, His mother and some relatives joined the crowd. When Jesus was told they were there, He said "Here are my mother and my brothers. Anyone, who does the will of God, that person is my brother and sister and mother." He did not say "they are more important than my mother." And, neither did He say "my relatives are more important." But, He did say "whoever fulfills the will of God is my brother and sister and mother." He was proclaiming the equality of all in the sight of God. Just imagine, if we were to act like Christ, the effect it would have. It would change you. It would transform the world. And, we'd all be in tune with God's holy will.

It is natural for parents to make every provision for their children's welfare, but you'd expect them to show greater concern about preparing them for eternal life. God has placed an obligation on everyone to preach the Gospel. And, He established His Church to hand on and safeguard His teachings. So, religion is not a matter of opinion. God has distinctly said that He wishes us to take one particular road, the Catholic road. Surely then, once you know the way, you'd do everything possible to help your children to follow God's will. And, it is His will that we should all be members of His Church.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — Although I have been a part-time worker for some years I have only been insured at the full Class A rate since the 6th April this year. Can you tell me what this covers me for and how soon will I be in benefit?

Answer — Class A rate of PRSI covers you for the following benefits: Unemployment Benefit; Disability Benefit; Maternity Allowance; Occupational Injury Benefit; Treatment Benefit; Contributory Widow's Pension; Orphan's Allowance; Deserted Wife's Benefit; Retirement Pension; Contributory Old Age Pension and Death Grant.

To qualify for Unemployment Benefit and Disability Benefit you need 39 weeks PRSI paid and 39 weeks PRSI paid or credited in the governing contribution year, which would be the '89/90 tax year for a claim made any time this year.

If you have previously paid full-rate PRSI, the soonest you will come into benefit will be January 1993

On the other hand if this is the very first time you have paid full PRSI, you will come into benefit as soon as you have 39 weeks PRSI paid, which would be January 1992. The reason for this is that when you take up insurable employment for the very first time you get special pre-entry credits back to the beginning of the contribution year in which you first become insured and for the two previous tax years. These credits allow you to qualify for benefit as soon as you have 39 weeks PRSI paid.

Minister Inspects Lismore's £300,000 Sewage **Treatment Plant**

When Environment Minister Padraig Flynn visited Lismore last Thursday evening his first stop was on the banks of the Blackwater close to the road bridge to inspect the sewage plant of the sewerage scheme which was provided by the County Council in 1986 to collect and trap sewage from the town's population of about 900 people as well as from the local sausage casing factory.

The scheme was constructed to provide a modern system of collecting and treating effluent prior to its discharge to the river Blackwater which has been designated by the E.C. as a salmon river. The entire sewerage scheme for the town cost £766,000 of which £300,000 was spent on the treatment plant.

It was a beautiful balmy evening when the Minister arrived, some time behind schedule due to unavoidable delays in his heavy programme for the day. But he was in humorous mood and as he alighted from his Mercedes he quipped "I didn't see a single pothole in the county on my way here only prosperity and lots of flowers!'

LATE MISS MARY FOLEY



ICMSA CONCERN ON DISADVANTAGED AREAS

Welcoming the announcement by the Minister for Agriculture and Food, Mr. Michael O'Kennedy, on the extension of the Disadvantaged Areas Scheme, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, President of the ICMSA, said that the extension was a welcome relief for 25,000 Irish farmers.

He said that now the speculation about the extension of the Disadvantaged Areas is over he has three concerns

(a) that justice be brought to bear on the areas left out of the extension; (b) that the areas deserving to be re-classified which were unsuccessful, be given just classification and (c) that the farmers benefitting from inclusion in the Scheme received their headage payments in 1991.

INCLUSION OF THE THOUSANDS **EXCLUDED IS PRIORITY**

"While many areas have been included in the Scheme, unfortunately thousands of deserving areas and farms have been excluded. The ICMSA is acutely aware of the severe disadvantage being suffered by farmers whose land was not classified as disadvantaged. Our immediate task is to see that these farmers be included in the scheme in the shortest possible time. In order to bring justice to these areas it is vital that the Appeals Board meet as soon

"Indeed with the outcome of the price negotiations and with the increasing difficulty facing ordinary family farmers, our Government's approach must be to have all of the country categorised as disadvantaged," concluded Mr. O'Dwyer.

Red Hat For Archbishop **Cahal Daly**

In common with all Ireland, the people of the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore rejoiced at the announcement made last week that Archbishop Cahal Daly had been named as Ireland's new Cardinal by Pope John Paul.

Dr. Daly's elevation to the College of Cardinals has come seven months after he was made Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of all Ireland and spiritual leader of Ireland's 3.8 million Catholics in succession to Cardinal Tomas O Fiaich, who died in May last year.

Dr. Daly (73), who will be given his "red hat" at a ceremony in the Vatican on June 28 along with 21 other new cardinals, said the appointment was proof once again of the Pope's deep concern and affection for Ireland. He said he drew great personal satisfaction from knowing that.

FORTY-FIVE CANDIDATES **CHASE TWENTY-THREE** CO. COUNCIL SEATS

When nominations for the June 27 elections to Waterford County Council closed at 12 o'clock (noon) on Saturday last, June 1, a total of 46 nominations were confirmed by the Returning Officer Mr. Brian McNally to contest the 23 seats on the Council. But while there were 46 nominations they related to only 45 candidates as one of the contestants was nominated to stand in both the Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas electoral areas.

Numerically strongest is the Fianna Fail Party with 19 candidates seeking seats in each of the four electoral areas of the county while Fine Gael have nominated 12, Labour 5, Progressive Democrats and Workers Party 2 each with Independents totalling 5.

CYCLISTS TAKE NOTE

Pedal cyclists who run the risk of cycling around at night without adequate front and rear lights on their bicycles should note that at the last sitting of Dungarvan District Court, a cyclist was fined a total of £80 — £40 for having no front light and another £40 for having no rear light — when summoned for cycling without lights after lighting up time. Apart from the risk of incurring such heavy fines, cyclists should realise how highly dangerous this practice is.

FLY-POSTING OFFENCE?

We recall a couple of years ago when summonses were dealt with at Dungarvan Court under the Litter Act and the defendants, a well-known national circus, were fined

for not removing a number of posters displayed around Dungarvan within the time required by the Act.

Last week while travelling in the Ring and Old Parish areas we noticed a number of posters obviously placed by some travelling show and wondered whether similar action was being taken in this case.

Fly-posting is an offence under the Act and the county has been singularly free from it for quite some time now. Let's hope our vigilance is not slipping where this unwelcome practice is concerned.

Plans are at present being made to celebrate in a fitting manner the centenary of the establishment of primary education in Abbeyside. Those of the older generation in the Village can still remember the old school at the "Pond" where many of them received their first lessons in the three R's.

A TEN SECONDS TURN

The traffic lights at Kilrush at the ring road junction just outside Dungarvan which have been the subject of so much controversy ever since they were erected, came up for mention yet again at the May monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council.

At a previous meeting the point was made that the time allowed to motorists approaching the lights from the Waterford direction and turning right to Cappoquin was too short to allow them to proceed before the lights changed colour.

In the course of a letter on this point read at the Council's May meeting, the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn stated that the present phase for the right turning green arrow was 10 seconds and in addition there was a three seconds amber and a two seconds red before the onset of opposing traffic, the latter being to allow vehicles al-

residential areas of the ready commenced the right turn movement to clear the junction.

Mr. O'Flynn's letter then stated: "In regard to the present volume of right turning traffic I am satisfied that the 10 seconds green phase is adequate. I should point out that if additional right turning time is provided for this particular manocuvre it will cause delay to all other vehicles using the junction and in particular will cause delay to traffic approaching Dungarvan from Cappoquin and this in turn may enhance the probability of accidents.

The County Engineer's letter ended by stating, "Accordingly no change is proposed in the existing timing of these lights though the position will be kept under review particularly if right turning traffic volumes should increase."

Commenting on the letter, Cllr. Tony Wright who is a lorry driver employed by Waterford Foods said that a 10 seconds phase to move a heavily laden lorry from a standing start turning right on to the Cappoquin road was not enough and the Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White said that he was driving a car third in line held up at the lights recently and the right turn phase just barely allowed him time to get through the junction.

However, as the County Engineer's letter stated, the position will be kept under review.

DO THEY REALLY TRAVEL THAT **MUCH?**

We read over the weekend a report that most of our Junior Ministers or Ministers of State are claiming mileage at an average rate of 120 miles per day, just short of the maximum permitted. All 15 Ministers of State use their own cars for official use, for which they are allowed a maximum annual mileage of 60,000 miles, or 164 miles per day.

Ministers of State were no longer allowed to use State cars for official use following a cost-cutting measure introduced by the then Taoiseach, Garret Fitzgerald in 1983. But it seems that the new arrangements may cost the taxpayers more than the old system.

By claiming 45,000 miles a year (a spokesman for the Department of Finance stated that few Ministers of State claim mileage near the maximum level allowed) the Junior Ministers of State are entitled to pay-

ments of just over £15,000, about £3,000 of which is spent on petrol. Over the normal five-year term of a government these payments would amount to £75,000 with petrol taking up £15,000.

Not a bad "perk" to add to the princely salaries and allowances which our Ministers of State already enjoy!

NOT BEFORE TIME

At a general meeting of the Bar in the Law Library in Dublin next Saturday the country's barristers will hear the proposals which will radically change the rules of the legal profession. The proposals are aimed at staving off legislation already threatened by the Minister for Industry and Commerce.

The sweeping changes planned will mean that in

future, litigants in the higher courts will no longer be forced to pay for a senior counsel as well as a junior counsel. Clients will not have to go through a solicitor to engage a barrister but will be able to make a direct approach and will be able to negotiate fees. The ban on solicitors becoming judges of the upper courts will be lifted while a legal ombudsman will be appointed to deal with complaints from clients.

But in addition to these very welcome changes, the news that the compulsory wearing of wigs and gowns will end is something that will please the majority of people. This is something which we have advocated more than once in the past and is a change that will do away with an archaic victorian custom and bring the physical face of the lawcourts into the 20th century

The Homeless: Flynn Issues New Guidelines

Mr. Padraig Flynn, T.D., Minister for the Environment, has issued to all housing authorities a set of revised guidelines on meeting the accommodation needs of homeless people. These will be of particular interest in Dungarvan in view of the recent Urban Council discussion on homeless people in the town.

The new guidelines supersede those issued in 1988 and are the result of a comprehensive review of the implementation of the Housing Act, 1988 in relation to the homeless. This review included consultation with voluntary bodies and organisations working with the home-

"It is unacceptable that any housing authority should fail to respond to the full extent of its powers and capacity to the acute deprivation that homelessness represents and I urge the authorities to use fully their powers under the Act to secure accommodation for the homeless.

"I have asked local authorities to direct their attention in particular to the need to establish formal. on-going liaison arrangements with those voluntary bodies who provide accommodation for homeless persons in their areas, and to ensure that arrangements are in place which will provide an emergency response for homeless persons. I've asked for reports from the authorities on the liaison arrangements made in each case," said Mr.

MORE FLEXIBLE FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

More flexible financial arrangements are being introduced where a voluntary body provides accommodation for homeless persons. These allow a housing authority to enter into an arrangement with a voluntary organisation working with the homeless

in the area to make a financial contribution to the body on a regular basis, such as monthly or quarterly, where the body provides accommodation for homeless persons. Up to now, contributions could be made only in respect of accommodation provided for individual homeless persons. Contributions made under the new arrangements will be recouped by the Department of the Environment up to a level of 80% of the expenditure reasonably incurred.

Prune and **Cinnamon Buns**

Ingredients:

225 g (8 oz) strong plain white flour

2.5 ml (1/2 tsp) easy-blend dried

2.5 ml (1/2 tsp) salt

15 ml (1 tsp) ground cinnamon 15 g (½ oz) butter or margarine about 175 (6 fl oz) tepid semiskimmed milk

175 g (6 oz) stoned prunes, roughly chopped finely grated rind of 1 lemon

50 g (2 oz) soft light brown sugar 15 ml (1 tbsp) clear honey 15 ml (1 tbsp) lemon juice Method:

Lightly grease and baseline an 18 cm (7 inch) square shallow cake tin.

Mix together the flour, dried yeast, salt and cinnamon. Rub in the butter or margarine, then beat in enough milk to mix to a soft dough.

Turn the dough on to a lightly floured surface and knead for about 5 minutes or until smooth. Place in a bowl, cover with a clean cloth and leave to rise in a warm place for about 1 hour or until doubled in size.

Knock back the dough and roll out to a 30 x 22.5 cm (12 x 9 inch) rectangle. Cover with the prunes and sprin-kle over the lemon rind and

sugar. Roll up the dough from the longest edge like a Swiss roll and press down well to seal the edge. Cut into six thick slices and halve each slice lightly with a clean cloth and leave to rise in a warm place for about 30 minutes or until the dough

Blackcurrant Muffins

Ingredients:

100g (4oz) self-raising wholemeal

100g (4oz) self-raising white flour 75g (3oz) caster sugai

75g (3oz) blackcurrants, thawed if frozen, stalks removed 200ml (7fl oz) semi-skimmed milk 60ml (4 tbsp) vegetable oil

Lightly grease 12 muffin or patty tins and set aside. Mix together the flours and sugar. Lightly whisk the egg whites until they form soft peaks and add to the dry mixture with the remaining ingredients. Stir lightly.

Spoon the mixture into the tins and bake in a preheated oven at 200C (400F) mark 6 for 18-20 minutes or until the muffins are well risen and golden brown.

Serve immediately, or cool and reheat at 180C (350F) mark 4 for 5-6 minutes. Halve and serve spread with low-fat soft cheese.

Kitchen scraps amuse the kids



GARDENING still tends to suffer from an 'old' image but there is much that can be done to interest children.

They are impatient for results, so involve them in growing quick-flowering varieties. Many are available in seed pellets, easier for small fingers to handle and likely to give better results.

Two easily-grown 'characters' for younger ones are snapdragons (antirrhinum) or toadflax - popularly

known as 'bunny rabbits'. For fast results try Nasturtium or Convolvulus, which come in many colours and actually do best in poorer kept soils. Something a little more exotic and best grown in a greenhouse or conservatory are butterfly flowers (schizanthus).

Poppies are another favourite, both for their strange seed 'shaker' pods as well as stunning blooms. Other varieties worth a try are marigolds, cornflowers, nigella or love-in-the-mist, helichrysum - which can be dried, candytuft and, for a sure hit, sunflower.

entertained by 'tricks' that can be tried indoors with what we regard as kitchen scraps, such as carrot, beetroot and pineapple tops.

The chopped top of a beetroot or carrot can create much amazement by sprouting foliage if stood in a saucer of water.

The exotic pineapple is trickier but more rewarding. Simply slice off the top, enjoy eating the rest, and then trim flesh at the base of the spiky foliage to leave the hard core.

Allow this to dry for a few days to stop it rotting when planted, then pop this into a sandy cactus-style compost and keep plant and soil moist and in good light.

The humble spud can be trained into a spectacular houseplant if allowed to sprout and then potted up. Cut away all but one or two shoots and train this over a basketwork or plastic trellis.

If you ask youngsters to keep some orange or grapefruit pips they can be easily grown into elegant citrus bushes with rich green leaves and, just possibly, some small fruit.

The pips should be pushed into damp potting mixture about half an inch, kept moist in the warmth and darkness of the airing cup-

Lismore Firm Fined Following Fish Kill

A Civil Engineering Company, Insituform (Ireland) Ltd., having registered offices at Deerpark, Lismore were convicted of causing deleterious matter to fall into waters contrary to Section 171 (1) of the Fisheries (Consolidation) Act, 1959, as amended, following the hearing of charges against the Company at last week's sitting of the District Court held in Clonmel.

Evidence of investigations following a reported fish kill in the Glenshelane river near Cappoquin, was given to the Court by Patrick Kilfeather, Water Pollution Officer with the Southern Regional Fisheries Board. The Officer told District Justice Haughton of finding approximately 1,500 dead trout, salmon and other species over a 1.5 mile stretch of the Glenshelane river downstream of Lyre Bridge near Cappoquin on the morning of Sunday, October 8, 1989.

Mr. Kilfeather said that the defendant Company, Insituform (Ireland) Ltd., were engaged in repair work to Lyre Bridge involving pressure grouting and gunitingusing Portland cement. He gave evidence concerning a number of inspections and sampling visits to the Glenshelanc River and of his detecting seriously elevated pH values in the river water below Lyre Bridge due to the discharge of guniting rebound material. He said that despite his advising staff from the Company engaged in the bridge repair works to take precautions so as to protect the river, he still found material being discharged and this was deleterious to the fisheries resource.

TOOK REASONABLE PRECAUTIONS

On behalf of the defendant Company, Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solicitor, Dungarvan called as witnesses Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, Waterford County Council, Mr. Tom Lineen, Senior Executive Engineer. Mr. John McGrath, an employee of the Council, Mr. Louis McQuaide, Director, Ramor Drilling & Pressure Grouting Co. Ltd., Mr. Bernard Harte, Civil Engineer and Mr. Pius M. Walsh, Managing Director, Insituform (Ireland) Ltd. As a defence it was submitted that the works to the bridge were essential and that reasonable precautions had been taken by the defendants. Mr. Walsh in his evidence referred to the possible discharge of agricultural effluent to the river.

Having heard all of the evidence in the case the Justice stated he was satisfied that Insituform (Ireland) Ltd., did cause deleterious matter to fall into waters between the 4th and 7th October, 1989, on the 14th November, 1989 and 15th November 1989. The company were fined a total of £350 and directed to pay expenses of £291.83 and costs of £375 together with VAT and outlay to the

Charges against Pius M. Walsh in his capacity as a Director of the defendant Company in respect of the same three occasions were dismissed as the Justice stated that Mr. Walsh could not be expected to be present at the bridge works at all times and was entitled to rely on the expertise of the persons employed by his Company.

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Library And Sewage Plant On Minister's Agenda In Lismore

The Minister for the Environment, Mr. Padraig Flynn, T.D., had a varied agenda on Thursday evening last May 30 on his trip to Waterford.

In visiting the sewage plant at Lismore the Minister said that since taking on the Environment portfolio, he had been actively concerned about every example he knew of a town where raw sewage was being discharged into a river, as had been the case with Lismore where it was causing severe pollution in the Blackwater. That was because the sewer network in the town was antiquated.

When you think back to that situation, and compare it with this scheme - now providing full secondary treatment of effluent you realise how important sewage plants are, in making life tolerable and civilised in an area," said the Minister. "That's why they're so much a part of the Environment Action Programme. The development of the Water and Sanitary Services Programme over the next decade is going to cost us one billion pounds. Three hundred million of that will go towards providing new and improved water supplies. Two hundred and thirty million of it will go towards providing new and improved sewage treatment works to inland towns. Four hundred million pounds of it will go towards providing modern sewage treatment plants for coastal towns.'

The Minister went on to mention three developments planned for Waterford:

 A modern sewage treatment plant for Waterford City;

 A new water supply augmentation scheme to serve Waterford City and its environs;

 A new sewage treatscheme for ment Tramore.

ONE OF OLDEST IN COUNTRY

The Minister's second task was to re-open the library at Lismore, originally built in 1909 which is one of the oldest in the country. The Minister described as 'marvellous' the renovation of the old building, saying that far too many fine buildings have been allowed to fall into disrepair or put to inappropriate use.

"Lismore has been enriched by the restoration of this building — a fine example of neo-Tudor architecture," he said. "Little wonder, then, that the town is one of a select few in the country recently granted Heritage Status by Bord Failte. Which in turn should give a considerable boost to tourism in the area. It's good also to see such creative use made of computerisation."

The Minister added that what he personally liked best about the re-opened | June 4.

building was how accessible it has been made for people with disabilities.

"In the past, too often, we have planned our buildings without planning them inclusively. If you had poor sight, if you were in a wheelchair, if you were even temporarily using crutches, if you were just getting old, then, quite often, you got the impression that you didn't qualify as a human being," said the Minister. REPLY TO CRITICS AND KNOCKERS OF G.A.A.

Mr. Noel Fleming, Seapark, Abbeyside in the course of a very long letter replies at length to what he describes as "the greatest critics and knockers of our Gaelic games in this great little county of ours." Having watched Waterford play with pride and determination in Thurles on Sunday last, Mr. Fleming states that on returning home the thought came to him that "we have to get to the core of our problems under the headings of Club Structure, Coaching and Training, Development of County Grounds and Press reporting."

The writer then refers to the very successful practice of club amalgamations of the 60's and 70's which resulted in more senior clubs at a higher level releasing greater numbers for county selection in both codes.

Commending the great work being done by the fulltime coaches at school level he says this is a step in the right direction but suggests that "some of our former greats might give a hand periodically to complement this great work.'

Mr. Fleming then states that if the value of each and every club property in the county was to be evaluated the final figure would come to millions. The club developments have left the county grounds in the shade and he poses the question whether the need to maintain two county grounds now pertains when so many club grounds have come on stream.

Mr. Fleming then turns to the heading of press reporting and devotes a long passage of his letter in conclusion to what he claims is the biased reporting campaign pursued in a particular daily newspaper.

Dungarvan C.B.S. Win Munster Football **Title**

Last Wednesday afternoon at sun drenched Kilavullen in County Cork the local C.B.S. secondary school made history when they captured the Munster U-16 1/2 Corn Na Carraige football title — their first ever provincial honour in the big ball code; they had gone close in different competitions on a number of occasions over the last fifteen years, but had never managed to bring home the 'silver.'

Since Christmas, on their passage to the final of this particular competition, which had twenty four colleges involved this year, they had accounted for the scalps of Cobh, Carrick-on-Suir, Blarney and Hospital before meeting the fancied St. Patrick's College from Castleisland, Co. Kerry, in the ultimate decider.

Last Wednesday's final, which was played in sweltering heat, saw the Dungarvan lads dominate the exchanges during the first twenty torrid minutes. At this stage their whole team was playing the more aggressive football and they had John Joe Ronayne in spectacular high-fielding form in lar na pairce. This period yielded 2-4 for the C.B.S. to a total of 4 points for the Kerry boys, who did, however, come back into the game in a big way during the last ten minutes of the first half. It is to the Waterford lads credit that they withstood this onslaught and only allowed their opponents through for one point while clocking up two further minors themselves, which made the score at half-time 2-4 to 0-5 in favour of the C.B.S.

After the turn around Castleisland had a dream start. snatching a goal within seconds to make it 2-4 to 1-5. From there to the last seven minutes or so it was hellfor-leather by both sides with little in it at any stage. The missing of a penalty by Castleisland seemed to be the signal which Raymond Ryan of the C.B.S. was waiting for to 'go for the jugular' as he finished the match with three super points to put the issue beyond contention on a final score of Dungarvan 2-9 Castleis-

All of the others had their moments and in the previous rounds they had been the ones to star.

Congratulations then to the C.B.S on their historic win. They have the kernel of a nice senior football team in this U-16 1/2 squad. St. Paul's of Waterford City won this competition two years ago and went on to contest the All-Ireland this year. Could history re-

Luck was certainly not on our side on Sunday as Waterford's hurlers went within an ace of tearing the form book to shreds and creating the upset of the season by running the raging hot favourites, Cork, to a singe score at Semple Stadium, Thurles.

of fast and skillful hurling and for most of the game, patrons could see very little difference, standard wise, between Waterford and the reigning All-Ire-land champions, Cork. It was a game which saw a determined Waterford team play with courage and commitment and a contest which saw lucky Cork survive to play in the Munster final on the first Sunday in July against Tipperary/Limerick.

Having entered the fray as rank outsiders and under no pressure Waterford took the field very determined to have a 'go' at the reigning kingpins of Munster and Ireland and as the minutes of the first half wore on, Cork were obviously becoming aware that the Deisemen had nothing other than all out victory on their minds. In fact one could sense a feeling of anxiety in the Cork camp as Waterford, playing against the slight breeze, went into a two point lead when Delahunty pointed a free in the 13th minute. REGISTRATION

EVIDENCE

In any objection, appeal, investigation or inquiry, evidence or information shall not be accepted or considered unless applicable to a period not longer than two years prior to the date of the first hearing. The Council or committee in charge may have recourse to video evidence at its discretion.

County Board Chairman Suspended For A Year

County Board Fined £2,000

These decisions by the Management Committee of the G.A.A., were notified to the Board on Tuesday of last week and will be the chief topic of discussion when the full County Board meets at Dungarvan on Monday night next.

Following a number of meetings between a special committee set up by the Management Committee and officials of the Waterford County Board, our of-

ficers were called to Croke Park on Saturday, May 18 to answer charges under rules 12 and 136. The County Board was represented by Eamon Murphy, chairman and Garry Cunningham, treasurer. The County Chairman was subsequently in before Management to answer separate charges under rule 136.

The Chairman was called back on the following Saturday, May 25 when the case made by him was heard over a two hour period.

The above decisions were then arrived at, but were not announced immediately and were notified to the Board and the Chairman by registered post early in the following week.

The Coisde Gnotha were due to meet on Wednesday evening to discuss the Press Release which issued from the county selectors, so this matter was also discussed.

An appeal against the severity of the fine was considered and must receive County Board approval if it is to be proceeded with.

The County Chairman in a local radio announcement stated that he intends to appeal his twelve months suspension.

As is the normal practice (as well as being the general rule), the senior Vice-Chairman takes over, when for any reason, the County Chairman becomes unavailable. Eastern Board Chairman, Frankie Cullinane, was moved to the chair on Wednesday at the special meeting of An Coisde Gnotha last week. He will chair Monday night's meeting.

SELECTORS' STATEMENT

The Coisde Gnotha issued a statement through the County P.R.O. refuting the reckless allegations made by the county hurling selectors. They noted that no copy of the statement had been given to the Board. It also stated that a more detailed statement would issue in due course from the County Board.

The statement with so many gross inaccuracies brought little credit on the composers or on the county and as I wrote last week, the timing of the statement was obvious to everyone.

The County Board are due to meet at Dungarvan on next Monday night and I feel sure that the matter will be dealt with there as under no circumstances can this sort of thing be ig-
