
The first presentation was made to the oldest sister in the group, Sr. Carmel, who has been in Lismore for the

Bombshell As Lismore Industry Announces Closure

that the only industry in the locality was to close down within a month. The shattering news came as a bombshell to the 15 employees of Associated Casings Ltd which has been producing natural casings for sausages and which is located at the old railway station in Lismore since 1985.

The announcement which literally came out of the blue came when Mr. Terry Rudgley, the Managing Director of the English owned company told the workforce that there would be a complete close down of operations as and from the week ending July 20 next. Explaining the reasons for the decision he referred to E.C. regulations Tuesday night proved unand to the excessive cost of modernising the factory premises in Lismore which the company has on lease. Mr. Rudgley subsequently flew back to England and efforts to contact him about a meeting concerning the closure of the plant convened by Lismore Town Commissioners for

successful.

Commenting on the announcement, Mrs. Mary Ryan, Chairman of the Commissioners said that closure of the plant would be a devastating blow to the town of Lismore which was already very badly hit by unemployment.

Juveniles Charged at Dungarvan Court

A 15 year old Dungarvan youth who is at present serving a period of detention appeared before District Justice D. Windle at the Children's Court in Dungarvan on a further series of charges involving stolen cheques and stolen cigarettes. He was also charged with stealing cash, the property of Kenneth Quarry, at Mitchel Street on May 7, with stealing articles of clothing from a Landrover parked at Davitt's Quay on April 30 and on the same date with being in the Park Hotel at Shandon as a trespasser and with stealing £7 in cash at Park Terrace.

The youth was further charged with allowing himself to be carried in a number of cars stolen in the town over the week-end of March 29 last.

District Justice Windle ordered that the youth serve a further 2 years dctention in Trinity House, Dublin.

ASSAULT CHARGES Another local youth appeared on charges of assaulting Michael O'Donnell on two occasions on March 18 and 24 and with being involved with others in a burglary at Keane's Brewery on March 15.

He was sentenced to 6 months detention in St. Patrick's Institution, suspended on condition that he was at home each night between 12.30 a.m. and 6 a.m. for the next 6 months and paid £20 compensa-

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question - I have been on Disability Benefit for some years and my doctor has suggested that I should do some light part-time work. Is it possible to do this and draw my Benefit, and how much are you allowed to earn?

Answer — The rules for Disability Benefit require that you do not do any work unless it is work which you are allowed to do under the Department's Regulations. You must get written approval before you do any work and the maximum you can earn is £24 per week.

The type of work allowed would be:

- work for which no money is normally paid
- work done as part of hospital treatment
- charitable work
- part-time rehabilitative type work

or retraining for other work because you are incapable of carrying out your normal occupation.







It is six years since the that they are removed as last local elections took place but despite this the general public has not displayed any great interest in the opportunity now being afforded them to elect a new Council. Some of the candidates, especially those getting into the electoral race for the first time, have been in the field, testing the water, so to say for quite some time now but it is really only in the last few weeks that the main contestants have gone into action.

Last weekend there were a few big guns brought in to support the local efforts with Minister for Energy, Bobby Molloy doing the rounds in Dungarvan and district with his P.D. candidate and M.E.P. John Cushnahan accompanied by a full muster of F.G. candidates whipping up support for his team.

While many of the candidates, in the literature they give out and statements they make, look for support on the basis of national issues, we feel certain that it is the local issues which people are mainly interested in. Added to that there will, we feel, be a bigger stress on personalities rather than on parties and this, in all probability, could lead to a good deal of cross voting as voters cross lines to support those whom they favour.

At the outset of the campaign efforts were made. first by the Labour Party to have a cross-party agreement concerning the nondisplay of posters in the Dungarvan area and then by the Workers Party seeking agreement to put an end to canvassing outside polling stations. In the event both moves failed which was indeed a pity as we feel that neither of these activities have any beneficial effect for the candidates concerned. It is absurd for anyone to believe that poster displays or subjecting voters entering polling stations to the hassle of last minute canvassing will affect their voting policy. It is to be hoped that those who have placed posters on display will see

in the Midlands complaining that because of the profusion of litter left behind by day-trippers who visit the beach at Tramore during the summer months, she no longer goes there.

The lady described Waterford as a most beautiful county but said that it was being destroyed by litter bugs. Down the years repeated appeals to the public have fallen on deaf ears and it is now more evident than ever that the message has not got home to our young people either as they have become the greatest offenders of all.

But now that the newlyformed Tidy Towns Committee in Dungarvan has initiated an environmental awareness campaign with a special competition for the students of the second level education establishments in the town perhaps the school principals in the primary area would take the cue and arrange a few basic lessons in civics for the pupils in their schools on a regular basis. This could help the situation a great deal.

When people refuse to respond to public appeals, the law can and should be enforced to see that they comply and at Tralee Court recently, District Justice Michael Patwell imposed a fine of £50 with £50 costs, on a man seen throwing a container with chips and the remains of a burger on to the roadway.

The appointment of Mr. Donald Brennan as group chairman at last week's annual meeting of Waterford Wedgwood has been interpreted in financial circles as a flexing of power by the U.S. Merchant Bankers Morgan Stanley. Head of the merchant banking division of Morgan Stanley, Mr. Brennan joined the Waterford Wedgwood board last April, a year after the U.S. Bank had taken a 29 per cent stake in the company with Tony O'Reilly's Fitzwilton.

One of the major financial strategic moves taken by Waterford Crystal in recent months was the launch of the Marquis product under the Waterford brand cut on contract in overseas plants at low cost. Waterford workers claimed such an investment should have been made in Ireland.

Commenting on this, the new group chairman said that it was a fair complaint from the workforce at Waterford when they asked why these products were not manufactured here, thus putting capital into Waterford as opposed to some other production site. But Mr. Brennan then has been quoted as saying, "a sensible man doesn't stick his arm into a tiger's cage without some evidence he'll get it back. You won't put in capital in significant quantities without being able to get it out. This summer let yourself go to seed!

MOST gardeners and houseplant growers like to save money by raising cuttings but few 're-cycle' the seeds from their plants.

However, it does make increasingly good sense to save money in this way as seed prices rise.

True, there is a strong argument that seed 'harvested' and stored at home is unlikely to be as fresh and reliable as that produced commercially, but you can afford to sow generously when your homegrown supply is free!

Of course, you can't germi-nate seeds taken from every plant. Some need highlycontrolled conditions and great patience.

And seeds from plants highly cultivated by man, such as roses and F1 hybrid varieties, are often unreliable, and different and inferior to the parent plant.

But those who try growing from collected seed will not have much difficulty with plants close to the form in which man found them in



rest of the material inside the pod, but this can be done by gently fanning all the pod debris.

The rubbish should blow away leaving the heavier seed to be gathered and placed in carefully labelled envelopes alongside your other supplies until needed for the next growing season.

In the case of plants producing berries or fruit, you will need to wait until these ripen before collecting. They then need to be stored somewhere cool during the win-ter to simulate the cold spell they would normally go through before bursting into life next year.

Once people try seed col-lecting, which is increasingly popular, they tend to experiment more, graduat-

Seed collecting can now start, with the greenhouse and garden now in full bloom, and the secret is to collect the seeds when they are at their freshest, just as they are about to be shed by the plant.

Wait for a warm dry day, to avoid the chance of dampness inducing any contamination and mould, and then collect the seed.

Seed pods should be dried for a few weeks in a dry sunny place such as the greenhouse or an indoor window ledge, before being split open to gather the seed. As with the traditional separation of the wheat from chaff you will need to pick out the seed from the

ing from such simple plants as marigolds to shrubs and trees.

A secret of success is to use a proper seed compost such as John Innes or an own label from any of the supermarket or DIY chains. Be pleased with the savings on your seeds and do not be tempted to sow simply the seed straight into some material dug and sieved from the garden.

If you buy in compost you cut down the risk of infection and give the seedlings the balanced start they need so always re-seal the compost in the bag or container after use, to keep it fresh and bug-free.


Among the more unusual items found in public places have been rare antiques, valuable paintings, prints and even pet mice.

Lost property offices say there are peaks when they can expect a flurry of activity, normally during a big public event.

"Whenever an important event takes place, people seem to get so carried away they forget their belongings, said a spokeswoman for one

of London's big lost property offices.

"If we kept a graph showing the peaks it would always coincide with something like a royal wedding or General Election.

There are also seasonal differences. In spring, people tend to carry raincoats and lose them, while winter sees a run of scarves and gloves.

In America, things are even worse. In Philadelphia somebody forgot an alligator on a bus, while in Chicago, a plain brown paper package containing £500,000worth of uncut diamonds was found - and handed in to the lost property people.


In Washington last year, one young mother actually 'lost' her baby. She left the child on a bus and had to seek a tearful reunion at the bus depot's special lost and found office.

In Britain, a little more than half lost property is claimed by the owners - and it's largely due to diligent staff.

"We spend a lot of money trying to contact owners," said one office. "We make dozens of 'phone calls every day following up clues.

"Then we send letters all over the country and often abroad, informing people we have their goods.

Would-be smugglers have often tried to trick lost property staff. They leave articles on a cross-Channel boat and then try to pick them up



in the office later, thus avoiding Customs.

"But the scheme is useless," explained an.official. "We always refuse to hand over any article until Customs have been informed."

But though we now leave almost £4 million worth of property lying around, the lost property people can still see the funny side of their business - and it usually involves animals.

When small livestock is lost, it's kept in the lost property office for a few days and then sent off to an animal home. If the owner claims it, he must pay for the food eaten during its stay there.


"We frequently have tame mice, hamsters and budgerigars brought in," said a spokesman at a big London British Rail terminal. "But one of our most amusing examples of love livestock was a big cockatoo.

"He was a wonderful talker and spent the day cursing us all. The only thing he hadn't learned was his name and address.
