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CO. COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Wilkinson, Kyne, Fahey, O'Shea Are

Poll-Toppers

Most of the political pundits found their forecasts at variance with the facts as the results in each of the four electoral areas came to hand with the completion of the counts in the elections for Waterford County Council which took place in the Town Hall, Dungarvan last Friday and Saturday.

Following an average poll of 62% for the county when the electorate went to the polls last Thursday, June 27, the ballot boxes were brought to Dungarvan and counting commenced at 9 a.m. on Friday morning under the supervision of Mr. B. J. McNally, Returning Officer for the County.

The Lismore and Kilmacthomas areas were the first areas to be dealt with and the counting for these proceeded simultaneously and ran straight through without incident with the final results for both coming prior to the lunch-time break at about 1.30 p.m.

Counting recommenced shortly after 2 p.m. with the Dungarvan and Tramore areas being checked and counted simultaneously and this went on throughout the after-

noon as the fortunes of the competing candidates fluctuated from hour to hour. The rise and fall of the tide continued after the tea break with Independent candidate Bennie Queally first to go out after the third count to be followed by Willie John Kenneally (F.F.) after the fourth count, Dan Dineen (Ind.) after the fifth count, Mario Flavin (F.G.) after the sixth and John Coll (P.D.) after the seventh.

The crunch came in the eighth count with the election of Gary O'Halloran (F.G.) who then reached the exact quota of 858 votes and Nuala Ryan (F.F.) was eliminated and her exit was followed by Paud O'Keeffe (F.F.) after the ninth count.

Six candidates were still standing, fighting for the four remaining seats at this stage and following the

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

DO NOT UNDERESTIMATE GOD

We read in next Sunday's first reading that Ezekiel was sent by God to preach to a rebellious people. Even though they rejected His message, they'll never be able to say that God had no concern for them; and neither will they be able to claim, it was He who broke the covenant. Their attitude and their behaviour show how easy it is to forget God's goodness. Worse still, they indulged in honouring and worshipping the false gods of pleasure, debauchery and wealth. Despite Ezekiel reminding them that there was a God of Israel, they flouted and ignored him. His mission was a failure. History shows, whenever the Jewish people abandoned God, misfortune followed.

Ezekiel had done as the Lord commanded, and so, he knew these obstinate people could never say, they had no choice or did not know better. They were openly at fault. However, the Lord did leave His door open. God did and still continues to maintain His presence. Hence, neither will we be able to say "I did not know." Whilst there's al-ways danger of getting involved in evil, the reading tells us that the way back to sanity and God is well signposted. If you compare what the world offers with the Lord's offer, you'll see there is no choice. Of course you'll find people, who'll allow anyone but Christ to reign over them. These, unless they listen to God, are heading for destruction.

Paul, in the second reading, refers to the honour God conferred on him in letting him have a glimpse of Heaven. This privilege might well have caused him to glory in his own importance, but thanks to God's mercy, his temptations made him conscious of his weakness, and thereby, helped him to bury his pride. In fact, he was so tormented that he had to call on God for help. It is worth considering the providence of God in allowing the devil to harass him, and, indirectly if unintentionally, be the cause of saving him from his pride. Paul, as we saw, did not depend on himself. He fought the devil with prayer, and won. Now, we all experience the thorn of the flesh. No one escapes. Paul is saying, watch and pray. Otherwise you will falter. And, like Paul, we can with God's help make our weaknesses sources of strength.

Paul is under no delusion. He knows he is utterly dependent on God. And true humility, as he said, is knowing the truth about yourself. Hence, to claim credit for the gifts bestowed on us by God would be dishonest. You can understand then what Paul means when he says, we have nothing of ourselves. So, if boast we must, let us boast about God's greatness and His generosity. From what's been said, we can rightly conclude, God has no favourites. He

expects each and everyone to acknowledge and prove their love. The fact God may bestow a special grace on a chosen soul in no way releases that one from having to prove one's fidelity. "To whom much is given, much is required." Make no mistake, those chosen souls become special targets for the devil; and they'll crumble, as some do, should they sit and idly bask in their glory. Read the life of any saint. You'll find it was built on prayer and the Eucharist. You'll find too that he or she was human like yourself, and succeeded because he believed, trusted, loved and fought.

MAKING ENDS OF MEANS

Much of our troubles arise from getting too attached to worldly things. It amounts to making ends of means. Often, we're like the little boy, who is sent for milk. On the way he meets his pals. They're just about to play football and he joins in the game. He forgot about his errand, and when he got home some hours later, and without any milk, he had to pay the piper. Now, the game of life is far too serious to being getting caught up in side-shows.

Mark in the Gospel describes a visit by Jesus to Nazareth. Throughout the land Jesus had won great acclaim, and you'd have expected that His own peo ple would have flocked to welcome Him. But no, they were not impressed. They questioned His teachings and His authority. You could sense a note of jealousy. Why! we know His background. Is He not the carpenter's son? And, who does He think He is? Jesus must have been disappointed. Rejection, as we all know, burns right down to the quick. The message loud and clear is, we must be open to the truth from whatever source it comes. It is evident, because of their lack of faith, Jesus did not remove their blindness. The lesson is, if you want God's help, you must believe. And, the greater your faith the greater will be your love.

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

THE POLL-TOPPERS The highest personal overall vote in the county was secured by outgoing Fianna Fail Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson, the popular farmer from outside Cappoquin who polled a total of 1,287 votes on the Lismore Area.

In the Dungarvan area Cllr. Billy Kyne (Labour) consolidated his seat on the Council with a poll-topping performance of 1,009 votes while in the Kilmacthomas area Deputy Jackie Fahey hit the jack-pot, heading the poll with 1,006. In the Tramore area Deputy Brian O'Shea (Labour) was the poll-topper with a total of 1,094 votes.

Dramatic Recounts For Dungarvan Area

The recount for the Dungarvan area commenced at 10 a.m. on Saturday morning and as it proceeded, tension visibly mounted as each vote was scrutinised. Some minor changes emerged but the Returning Officer announced that these had made no material change in the position and Cllr. O'Riordan was then eliminated after the tenth count.

This left Workers Party candidate Tony Wright (609) and outgoing Indp. Fianna Fail Cllr. In the twelfth and final count, the distribution of Walsh's surplus of 29 votes resulted in Whelan ending up with 699 and Wright 702, a difference of 3 votes between them.

Flynn (F.F.), Hart (Lab.) and Wright (W.P.) were then declared elected without reaching the quota.

This announcement led to a further dramatic turn of events with Whelan demanding a full recount but this was rejected by the Returning Officer who said that he would only allow a recount from the point of Cllr. O'Riordan's elimination.

If anything the tension rose higher as the concerned candidates consulted their legal advisers and Mr. McNally announced an adjournment in the proceedings until after lunch. It was then about 12.30 p.m.

After lunch, Mr. McNally announced that he had received several requests for a recount and he was agreeing to that received on behalf of Sean Whelan.

A full recount then ensued and the end result showed no change but significantly the gap in favour of Wright had increased by five votes over Whelan and the election of Kyne, Kenneally, P., O'Halloran, Walsh, Flynn, Hart and Wright was then confirmed by the Returning Officer. The proceedings finally terminated shortly after 5 p.m.

RECENT DEATHS

Mr. Michael Fives



On Tuesday evening, June 25, the county lost one of it's best known and much loved sons when Michael Fives, Burgery, Dungarvan, passed unexpectedly to his eternal reward while attending that night's meeting at Kilcohan Park, Waterford. Moments earlier he had just seen his greyhound race to victory, when he was taken suddenly ill and died later at Waterford Regional Hospital. His untimely demise leaves a void in our midst that only a man of Michael's calibre could fill.

Michael was one of the gentle giants of this world whose example gave us all food for thought and new perspectives on living. Mick Fives was a colossus, an institution as he touched many lives, enriched them by his outstanding virtues, traits and characteristics. He was indeed a charismatic figure whose enthusiasm for life was infectious.

Michael, farmer and sportsman was born at the farming homestead at the Burgery in 1914. His early education was under the tuition of Micheal McCarthy and Jim Croke school teachers at "The Pond" national school in Abbeyside. Later he transferred to St. Augustine's College where, in the recent past he held the position of President of St. Augustine's Past Pupils in 1972. As a member of the Parents' Committee he did trojan work in bringing about the realisation of one of the Augustinian Order's great ambitions, the provision of a new, ultra modern college in Dungarvan.

An enterprising farmer, Michael to his eternal credit always kept abreast of developments and attended many seminars on the changing face of agriculture. He was a member of the Advisory Committee of Cork Marts Ltd. His advice was always sought and listened to as Michael knew from personal experience what he was talking about.

Because of his very wide sporting interests, Michael became one of the best known personalities in this county and indeed country-wide. Having played hurling and football with Abbeyside in this youth, Michael's life always revolved around the fortunes of his beloved Village.

Over the years he made an enormous contribution the local Master McGrath Monument and its restora-

to the growth and development of the Abbeyside/Ballinacourty Club. For six decades he served as team selector, committee member, club treasurer and long-time chairman, a position he held during the salad days of Dun na Mainistreach. Earlier he had served as chairman of the Ballycoe Club when they won the county junior football title back in 1946. In that era Michael was very much to the fore in Western Board affairs having acted as treasurer and referee while he also served the county as a senior and junior county selector and helped to guide Abbeyside to its first senior hurling county final in 1955.

He was one of the leading figures who assisted with the purchase of the club grounds in the early 60's, and when the continued growth of the club made it necessary to move house, Michael was very much to the fore in the purchase of their present complex in 1979.

His own sons Fr. Colin O.S.A., Greg, Michael and Raymond have carried on the tradition just like Michael's uncle Dr. David Greene, M.D. Bonmahon, who set the seed as the first County Board Chairman.

For a number of years Michael was involved with the Catholic Boy Scouts in the parish and became a Knight Errant in the Senior Section in the early 40's. Later he became Troop Chairman and held the post for five years.

He was involved in the sport of hunting for many seasons and was founder chairman of the Dungarvan Point-to-Point Committee. He was also a founder member of the Dungarvan Harriers Hunt Committee and for many years assisted as committee member with the Dungarvan Agricultural Show. Michael Fives was a major figure in the world of coursing and greyhound racing. In 1983 he took over stewardship of coursing matters for a three year term of office as President of the I.C.C.

Much of the success of the Dungarvan Coursing Club can be attributed to the enormous work done by Michael since his election as club chairman in 1954. As a nominator to the Deise Cup he collected the Blue Riband of Deise Coursing on seven occasions with "Flying Merry," "Fac-totem," "General Boy," "Right Well," "Tender Husky," "Pride of Shour-naught" and "Getting In." During his 35 years at the helm, Michael in his time served as I.C.C. representative and later as a valued member of the Executive. He held a nomination in the Tipperary Cup and visited overseas as a guest of the various national greyhound associations. Michael always took a great pride in the local Master McGrath

tion was in no small way due to his efforts.

On Tuesday evening, June 25, while enjoying the sweet taste of victory, Michael was called home to his Heavenly abode. The legacy of kindness, loyalty, friendship and true sportsmanship which he has left us is much to be grateful for and we, with his legion of friends throughout the land now mourn the passing of this great family man, a man who unselfishly extended his natural caring and attentive character to the whole community.

with a percentage swing in their favour of 6.3 while the main parties dropped one seat each in a swing away of 5.2 per cent from Fianna Fail and of 5.9 per cent from Fine Gael. The move to the left was further accentuated by the election for the first time ever to the Co. Council of a member of the Workers Party.

However, whatever about the ups and downs of the political see-saw, a disturbing factor of the election was that only 62.32 per cent of the total electorate of 37,813 in the county thought it worth their while to vote. While this was a good deal higher than the 54.9 per cent national average it still shows that one voter in every three refrained from voting. Can this be taken as an indication of what Local Government in its present form means to so many people?

The next interest arising from the election results centres on the first meeting of the new County Council which will take place in Dungarvan on Thursday of next week, July 11. It is expected that the alignment between Fine Gael and Labour which was operated successfully during the lifetime of the old Council will continue and this will mean that the combination will control the appointment of chairman and representatives to the various subsidiary bodies to the exclusion of Fianna Fail. We can only wait to see what will happen.

And before leaving this

topic of the elections this week we feel that it is only right and proper to congratulate Mr. Brian McNally County Secretary who was the Returning Officer and his very able staff for the efficient, expeditious and painstaking manner in which they conducted the counts in the four electoral areas, particularly the tension packed final count in the Dungarvan area which finally concluded shortly after 5 o'clock on Saturday evening.

POPULAR CURATE TRANSFERRED

The parishioners of Dungarvan learned with mixed feelings of gladness and sadness last weekend that their popular Curate, Rev. Fr. William Carey was being transferred from the parish. They were sad to hear that Fr. Carey who has served in the parish for the past twenty years is now about to leave but at the same time glad at the news that he has been appointed a Parish Priest. He goes to the Parish of Newtown, Kilmacthomas and will be replaced in Dungarvan by Fr. McNamara who comes from the Holy Family Parish in Waterford City.

We can do not better than repeat the old cliche that what is now Dungarvan's loss has become Newtown's gain as that sums up Fr. Carey's departure from amongst the people of Dungarvan to whom he had become such a popular and beloved priest, who moved around the parish quietly on his bicycle in the course of his pastoral duties during the past two decades.

We congratulate Fr. Carey on his new appointment and wish him many years of continued health to pursue his priestly duties and welcome to Dungarvan, Fr. McNamara who now becomes the new curate in the parish.

LATE NIGHT "RALLY DRIVERS" CREATING HASSLE IN CLASHMORE

We have been receiving complaints about the harassment and disturbance which residents of Clashmore Village are being subjected to by what have been described as "rally drivers" who drive cars at high speeds around the village at the dead of night.

It seems that on several recent occasions, mainly at

weekends, young people who have obviously been out enjoying themselves at discos and dances return to the quiet village and disrupt the peace of the locality by driving their cars at break-neck speeds around the streets.

Many elderly people reside in and around Clashmore, while there are also families with young children and the noise of revving car engines and screeching tyres as these midnight shenanigans take place means that young and old have their sleep disturbed while children are awakened and fright-

ened by the noise.

Residents of the area are now wondering whether a fatal accident has to take place before something is done to put a stop to these midnight capers. Perhaps the Garda Authorities might take a look at the situation and warn those who are engaged in these disturbing acts that unless they desist, appropriate action will be taken against them.

There is a time and a place for everything but Clashmore Village at the dead of night is certainly not a suitable place for "rally driving"!



'Gardens' in boxes need care too

JULY is a marvellous month to appreciate the garden if you are lucky enough to have one.

But all is not lost even if your property has nowhere for a few flower beds and a strip of lawn, because the balcony of a flat, a rooftop or window boxes can all be made to produce colourful displays using tubs, troughs and other containers.

If the balcony or window boxes are particularly exposed then you need to pick plants carefully, either buying sturdy varieties only or placing some stout shrubs in tubs as a screen against the prevailing wind. These will then shelter the less hardy plants.

Climbers are ideal because they quickly become a feature of a balcony or rooftop garden. In the case of the former they will have a flying start if there is a balcony trellis.



Good varieties for this job are ivy - nearly bullet-proof for most locations - honeysuckle - great for its scent -Virginian Creeper and the vine-like Purpurea, which has a rich red foliage.

High rise garden also need more watering than those on the ground. The plants stand in relatively small amounts of soil and dry out quickly in the sun and wind.

And there is also the practicality of watering. For a start, there is no point in having window boxes if opening a window to water or tend the plants automatically lops off the heads of

Similarly, double glazing sometimes makes it awkward during the summer ing frequently.

Run off from watering is a problem too so, when designing your high rise display, ask yourself where surplus water will end up it could drip onto the heads of people using a door below, so check carefully.

The best insurance is to buy trays for your troughs, boxes and tubs so any excess is gathered safely. You can even buy hanging baskets with trays attached but water with care if you use traditional bowl types.

A tight budget is no problem as boxes for your high rise garden can be made easily out of scrap wood protected with one of the many low toxicity preservatives now available.

If you have open railings

around your balcony or roof then place boxes at the edge and plant them with trailing types which can spill over the edges and soften the straight lines of the balcony or roof.

But if the balcony is walled then raise the boxes to give the plants more light and allow some greenery and flowers to drape over the edge. Choose cheap and sturdy varieties for the trailing displays: geraniums, nasturtiums, alyssum, Canary Creeper and fuch-

Lastly, a few practical points. Avoid prickly plants such as roses - you are bound to stab yourself more often in such a confined space. Don't let plants take over and leave nowhere to sit and make sure containers are secure - they are heavy and dangerous if they break



Dungarvan Youth Sentenced For Assaulting Garda

A seventeen-and -a-half-years-old Dungarvan youth who is already serving an 18 month sentence of detention in St. Patrick's Institution imposed on him a fortnight previously, was sentenced to a further six months detention to run concurrently when he was convicted by District Justice Uinsinn Mac Gruairc at Dungarvan Court last week on a charge of assaulting Garda E. Fitzpatrick on March 7.

He was Michael Hallahan, 101 Childers Estate and giving evidence, Garda Fitzpatrick stated that while on duty in the patrol car on the night in question, accompanied by Garda C. Kelleher, he received a report that two youths had been seen interfering with parked cars at Kilrush Filling Station. They went there and found an abandoned crashed car with fresh blood marks in-

They drove around and at 3.50 a.m. they saw the defendant and another youth walking along Mitchel Street. They stopped the patrol car and spoke to the youths, both of whom had blood on their hands. When questioned they refused to explain how it got there.

Garda Fitzpatrick went on to say the Hallahan refused to get into the patrol car and violently resisted being arrested. Eventually they managed to get him in, and when in the car, Hallahan produced a hammer and swung it at witness and then sunk his teeth into witness's right arm.

Garda Kelleher gave corroborative evidence.

The defendant in evidence told the court that it was Garda Fitzpatrick who started the violence. He said that he had a hammer with him which he wanted to fix something at home. He denied swinging it at the Garda and said that he bit the Garda in the arm be-







Colm Bonnar operates in the Regional College for half the year. From a practical point of view, with school time tables in mind, it is not the easiest thing for the scheme to function

in the secondary schools.

The main thrust of coaching scheme must continue to be in the national schools where a greater number of children are available and where the basic skill work is done with the young who are prepared to learn. The coaching committee will always have an open mind as to how the Co. coaches will be best employed for the good of Waterford underage hurling.

This meeting was due to be held on next Monday, but was deferred because of pressure of activity.

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
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
