WATERFORD CO. COUNCIL Fine Gael-Labour Share Top Posts

At the inaugural meeting of the newly-elected County Council of Waterford held in Dungarvan last Thursday, the Fine Gael - Labour pact which operated for the six years lifetime of the previous Council continued and as a result the coalition succeeded in capturing all the top posts, excluding the Fianna Fail members from all but a minimum share of the appointments.

As exclusively forecast in the "Leader" last week, the new Chairman is Cllr. Willie McDonnell, the Fine Gael member from Tallow who has been a member of the Council since 1979. A well-known business man, farmer and extensive fruit grower in the Brideside town, this is Cllr. McDonnell's first time to be chosen to fill this prestigious position.

He was proposed by his Fine Gael party colleagues, Cllr. Nora Flynn, Cappoquin, a newcomer and the only lady member of the Council and seconded by Clashmore publican, Cllr. Gary O'Halloran.

Fianna Fail then nominated Cllr. Tom Cunningham, Stradbally for the post and he was proposed by his party colleagues, Ballyduff farmer Jimmy Quirke and seconded by Aglish farmer and auctioneer Patsy Kenneally.

In the roll-call vote which followed the only uncommitted vote was that of another newcomer to the Council who brought a Workers Party representation to the Council for the first time ever, Dungarvan Creamery employee, Tony Wright.

The vote resulted in the election of Cllr. McDonnell by 13 votes to 10, the Fine Gael - Labour combination of 12 being joined by Cllr. Wright while the ten Fianna Fail members supported Cllr. Cunningham.

As the new Chairman was invested with the chain of office and took the chair he was applauded loudly.

THE VICE-CHAIR For the post of Vicechairman, the outgoing Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, was proposed by his Labour Party colleagues, newcomer from Dungarvan Cllr. Lar Hart and seconded by Cllr. Brian O'Shea, T.D. Fianna Fail put up the

name of Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson, who was proposed by Cllr. C. O Riain and seconded by Cllr. Patsy Kenneally. A roll-call followed the same pattern as the previ-

DUNGARVAN U.D.C. New Traffic Warden Should Concentrate On Catching Litter Louts

Several members of Dungarvan Urban Council expressed concern about the manner in which the recently appointed additional traffic warden was operating around the town since his appointment at the July monthly meeting of the Council held at the Town Hall last Monday night.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan who raised the matter referred to an order made by the County Manager which appointed James Joseph Landers, "Pineview," Melleray Road, Cappoquin to the position of Traffic and Litter Warden in the town for a period of six months from July 1, and asked if he was to look after the control of litter as well as traffic. Cllr. Ryan said that due to the very bad summer they were experiencing there were not many visitors in town and she asked if it would be possible that the new man would place more emphasis on dealing with the litter problem than with traffic. Major Road Works Project At Sweep Re-Commences

Work on the major road project at the Sweep, Dungarvan has recommenced with the signing of the contract for the £1.7 million first stage to be carried out by Paddy O'Brien Construction (Cahir) Ltd. The matter was referred to in the June Progress Report on roadworks submitted by the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn to the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday as follows:

BANISH DISCIPLINE AND!

Jeremiah in the first reading on next Sunday condemns the leaders of Israel for their failure to guide and lead the people. Have mentioned to you previously that the rulers of Israel enjoyed the twofold power of authority in religious and civil matters. Jeremiah makes it clear that the king and the whole priestly clan had failed to guide their people, who were now like sheep without a shepherd. The consequences were they'd forsaken God, and were involved in every form of pagan practices. The prophet is fearless in laying the blame at the feet of the rulers; and he tells them that their unfaithfulness has not passed unnoticed by God. He tells them that a time is coming when the Good Shepherd would replace these unfaithful servants, and He'd gather the scattered flock and lead them in the ways of God.

Perhaps no image used by the prophets conveys so obligation to lead their children. When parents fail, the

less He is asked to assist. Usually, when people are shackled by sin, God is their enemy.

ONLY ONE ROAD TO HEAVEN

St. Paul in the second reading tells us how Jesus united Israel and the nations of the world into a single people. He broke down the walls of division by the Sacrifice of Calvary. We know, as Paul told us earlier, that we are called and elevated to membership of God's new people through Baptism. And, he now reminds us that the Good Shepherd gave His life to ransom us, and restore us to His fold. We know what happens when people have no shepherd to lead them. whereas those who follow Christ find unity and peace. Only one road leads to Heaven, so do not listen to those who claim to have discovered a new way.

The world is sick. She needs help. And, she'll look anywhere for guidance except to God. Hence, it is up to each of us individually to help by our prayers and

much information about God as comparing Him to the Good Shepherd. The people were all familiar with such a role, and they'd rightly conclude that the Lord would lead, feed, care and protect His flock. It was an every day scene to see the sheep following a shepherd, which they did, because they knew him and trusted him. Hence, the people would have little difficulty in understanding Jeremiah, when he spoke of the Good Shepherd. However, the prophet does take them beyond the horizons of Israel, when he depicts the Good Shepherd in the wider pastures of the world. The Church has now the responsibility of bringing God's care and compassion to the people of the world. Like the shepherd, she leads her flock to the rich pastures of the Eucharist. And, even when some sheep wander among the flesh pots, she never tires of holding out the hand of forgiveness. Whilst all the flock have a duty to present Christ to the world, parents have an added children suffer.

The devil must hate the very ideal of discipline. He must have rejoiced to see man give it a back seat in recent years. Parents no longer exert authority. Teachers have their hands tied. Punishment no longer fits the crime. And, when it comes to God, they only want the "idol" one. As the cook would say "it is a recipe for disaster." It is the pot in which the devil thrives. Sure enough, there's no respect for man or God. The rule would seem to be, and it is growing, please yourself. And, they'll tell you they do not want an interfering God. They want a good time, and they want to be left alone.

God does not want to be ignored. He is adamant that those who die in mortal sin will have no share in His Kingdom. Of course, God is not out to damn people. Like the Good Shepherd He is, He is patient, He'll watch and He'll wait for the opportunity to help. You know, He gave us free will. Hence, He is powerless unour example.

We know the way. Jesus told us, and He has the words of eternal life. When moral standards are falling apart, how can people find the way unless we show them.

The Gospel reminds us that Jesus is the Good Shepherd. The Apostles had been working hard and He decided to take them to a quiet place for rest and discussion. When they arrived, He found a large crowd awaiting them. Jesus was immediately full of concern for their welfare, and His reaction was to feed them with the word of God. So, putting aside all thoughts of rest, He proceeded to instruct them. It follows, the primary function of a shepherd is to teach his flock about God, His love and what He wants them to do. This means, serving God and saving one's soul is what matters. No one changes God's rules, which have eternal values.

Our Co. Council Chairmen Outgoing And Incoming

There was a changing of the guard at the first annual meeting of the newly-elected Waterford County Council when the members assembled for the first time since the June 27 elections in the Courthouse, Dungarvan on Thursday last, July 11.

At the outset, the outgoing Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab.) presided and in the course of his valedictory and having welcomed the seven new members as well as the other members of the 23-member Council who had made it back after the election, he expressed the hope that all would now work together for the betterment of the County and of the Council in the next 5 or 6 years.

Cllr. Kyne then thanked the many voluntary groups which are serving both young and old throughout the county and which he met during the past year and assured them of the continued support of the new Council.

Stressing the importance of tourism to the county, he suggested that the Council should consider a preventive element in litter con-

sizeable investment in refuse collection. He praised especially the work being done by the local tourist groups in Ardmore, Lismore, Ring and Old Parish, Dunmore and Tramore Failte.

Dealing with unemployment which he described as a problem which was growing weekly, Cllr. Kyne referred to the efforts of the County Development Team to promote the county as an industrial base. These efforts he said would have the continued backing of the Council. He pointed out that the Council itself was a significant employer with approximately 522 people employed providing public service for the county with an annual payroll of over £16 million.

Deasy Questions Inequity of **Tax System**

Mr. Austin Deasy, T.D., asked the Minister for Finance in the Dail if he had any plans to create a simplified income tax system incorporating PRSI payments, levies and local service charges and the estimated increase in the standard rate of income tax that this would lead to.

Mr. A. Reynolds - I take it that the Deputy is referring to employee payrelated social insurance contributions, the 1 percent employment and training levy, the 1.25 per cent health contribution, and domestic service charges under local government legislation. The total yield from these in 1991 is estimated at some £716 million, and to collect this amount in a full year through income tax by increasing the standard rate would mean a standard rate of over 40 per cent. A standard rate of this order would be very difficult to contemplate. As the Deputy will be aware, the standard rate has been reduced from 35 per cent to 29 per cent over the past three budgets, and the Gov- manner? For the moment

ernment's aim is to further reduce it to 25 per cent by 1993.

Mr. Deasy — Does the Minister agree that we are really fooling ourselves by pretending that we have a lower rate of taxation than we have? These other forms referred to in the question and in the answer are also taxation. There is a great deal of inequity in PRSI payments and in local charges. People in some areas do not pay local charges at all. The PRSI system is also topsy turvy. Does the Minister see any merit in having a single system and if there was a case for raising money by local authorities to finance local authority projects, then it could be done in a fair and honest

we have the worst of all worlds.

Mr. A. Reynolds - I do not regard PRSI contributions as a tax in the sense that Deputy Deasy does, as one is getting benefit from the contributions. Many trade union workers would look at it in that light. A single rate of tax to incorporate all those things would not be fair and equitable; for instance, Dublin city do not impose water charges and other parts of the country do. These charges are a matter of the local authority concerned. Mr. Deasy — You would hardly call that fair. Mr. A. Reynolds - It is not equitable. Mr. Deasy - One could hardly call the existing system fair and equitable.



get the Incapacitated Child Tax Allowance. Can you tell me by how much this Allowance has been increased?

Answer — There has been no change in the amount of the Incapacitated Child Allowance and it remains at £600. What has happened is that the child can now have an income of up to £2,100 and the parents will still be entitled to the full £600 Tax Allowance.

Up to now, if the child had an income of more than £720, the parents lost £1 for each £1 by which the child's income exceeded this figure. If the child's income came to more than £1,320 the parents lost the allowance completely.

BALLYMACARBRY WATER SUPPLY

A crowd of about forty people attended a public meeting at St. Patrick's Hall, Ballymacarbry on Thursday night 11 July in connection with the poor quality of the Ballymacarbry/Ballyrohan water supply. The meeting was attended by Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan who chaired the meeting, Cllr. Jackie Fahey T.D., Mr. Eamon Mansfield and Mr. Ray O'Dwyer of the engineering staff of Waterford County Council.

Several people connected to the supply aired their views. Complaints were also received on behalf of the many guest houses which are connected to the supply.

Mr. Mansfield stated that there is a serious problem Jimmy Scully and Mary with this water scheme but at the moment the council has no solution to the problem owing to the scarcity of money. At the end of the meeting all present were unanimous in requesting the council to replace the cast iron pipes in the scheme there since 1956 with plastic piping. It seems that rust from the pipes is causing the problem. Mr. O'Ryan and Fahey were requested by the meeting to take up this very serious matter with the County Council. Call For Good Quality Water For Ballymac' Area

Cllrs. Jackie Fahey, T.D., and Ciaran O'Riain joined at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in proposing a motion calling for immediate steps to be taken to have a supply of good quality water made available in the Ballymacarbry area.

Cllr. Fahey said that the problem was a very serious one as a large number of consumers in the area had to put up with a very bad supply at present. Corroded cast iron pipes were being blamed. He said that at a public meeting held the previous Thursday night they heard that horses wouldn't ven drink the water so how could humans be expected to drink it.

water charges for water they could not use. He suggested that the Co. Engineer should come to their next meeting as the people would have to have some answers to the problem.

Mr. John O'Flynn, Co. Engineer, said that it was corrosion in the old cast iron pipes that affected the colour of the water while chlorine introduced to kill bacteria affected the taste. They were investigating the possibility of putting in corrective equipment but the cost of replacing even a section of the corroded pipes would be £130,000. The only long-term solution to the problem would be to have one major regional scheme for West Waterford with a source based in the river Blackwater. "We will do what we can but we do not have the kind of money required and without money you can't do much", the County Engineer added.

WATERFORD CO. COUNCIL CROSSFIRE AS MEMBER QUESTIONS COSTS OF SEMINARS

The newly-elected chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. W. McDonnell crossed swords with newcomer Cllr. Tony Wright of the Workers Party at the first ordinary monthly meeting of the Council held in Dungarvan last Monday when the latter raised the question as to the total cost of sending five members to each of three seminars.

The seminars were: at Ballaghaderreen, Co. Roscommon from July 19 -21 on the subject "An Dramaiocht"; at Inchigeela, Co. Cork from August 3 - 8 on the subject "Is there Local Democracy North or South" and at Gaoth Dobhair, Co. Donegal from September 27 - 29 on the subject "Heritage and the Local Authority".

On the proposal of Cllr. P. Kenneally (FF) seconded by Cllr. C. Casey (FG) it was agreed to send 5 delegates to each seminar on a 2-2-1 division for Fianna Fail, Fine Gael and Labour, the names of the party representatives to be submitted by the Party Whips.

At this stage Cllr. Wright stood up and said that while some seminars were important, many, such as those now before them, were a useless exercise and were no more than a paid holiday for the members going on them.

The Chairman then called on Cllr. Wright to make a proposal if he had one as he would not allow him to make a speech.

Cllr. Wright proceeded to say that the all-in cost to the taxpayers of these three seminars would be about £5,000 when the Chairman again interjected "you can't make a speech".

Chairman - I've told you you can't make a speech.

Cllr. Wright - "In view of the cutbacks in the health and social welfare services, I believe it is immoral to spend £5,000 of the taxpayers money going to these seminars.

Cllr. Wright again rose and asked "will the total cost of these seminars be made known to the general public?"

GUIDE TO SAFE BOATING

Boating activities carry their own hazards, but with a little foresight and planning these dangers can be avoided. The National Safety Council issued the following advice to boating enthusiasts:—

(1) Ensure the craft is seaworthy - check your boat, sails, oars, oarlocks, engine, fuel on board; (2) Inform a responsible person of your intentions, duration of your trip, number and names of persons you have on board, and when you expect to be back. If you do not return on time the rescue services should be notified at once by dialling 999; (3) Check the weather forecast for the areas in which you intend to operate; (4) Check that you have lifejackets or buoyancy aids for everyone on board and also at least one lifebuoy with line attached; (5) If you are undertaking a voyage outside your local area check that you have a properly corrected compass and charts on board for the voyage, and you know how to use them correctly; (6) Any small boat going to sea should have at least two parachute distress flares, two red hand-flares, and two smoke signals on

board. Instructions for their use are on the sides of the signals. They should be stowed in a clearly marked, watertight container; (7) Boats with engines should have all necessary spares including fuel, engine tool kit, spare plugs, small fire extinguisher; (8) All small boats should carry in watertight containers some fresh drinking water, water resistant torch, small first aid kit, knife; (9) All boats irrespective of size should have a small bailer on board. Larger size boats should carry a bucket with

SPRING bulbs act as the curtain raiser for the full performance of summer blooms, but few gardeners look for the encore - a display of autumnlowering bulbs

These can be planted from now onwards to give an extended run of colour and interest in the garden, complementing the rich autumnal browns of the leaves on trees and shrubs.

Some varieties also make good cut flowers to cheer up the house as the nights grow longer and temperatures start falling.

They all tend to prefer sunny well-drained locations, to withstand the cooler and wetter climate of the autumn.

Perhaps these 'other' bulb varieties are neglected by many of us due to the confusing names. For instance, Belladonna Lily and Diamond Lily are among the better known varieties but these natives of South Africa actually belong to the Amaryllis family rather than the Lilies.





ONE catastrophic morning, 65 million years ago, an alien moon appeared in the sky. It weighed 1,000 billion tons, was taller and wider than Mount Everest, and fell to earth at 45,000 mph.

The sea blew up, and one consequence of this awesome event was a huge release of energy, including lashings of nitric acid vapour which in the weeks that followed dripped from the clouds like rain.

And that is what it was: Acid Rain.

This deluge was more ruinous than the Flood described in the Old Testament. Is history repeating itself today?

Some experts say that this poisonous rainfall obliterated immense tracts of vegetation, creating deserts.

The most lordly animals around at that time were the dinosaurs. They had dominated life on earth for 140 million years, but were wiped out swiftly and mysteriously.

Whether this dramatic theory is correct or not, there is evidence of a sudden, brutal curtain fall.

One expert, David Lambert, who has written books on the subject, says: "Disaster fell relatively swiftly. A change in the record of the rocks tells the story. One layer is rich in dinosaur remains, the next has none." He scorns the argument that dinosaurs were smallbrained brutes incapable of adapting to changed conditions; or that they suffered

from glandular defects that sterilised them; or that some were so incompetently built that a slipped disc was sufficient to cause immobility.

"Dinosaurs were not monstrosities," he says. "They were built to cope effectively with the world."

What, then, was responsible for their destruction? Dr Alan Charig of the Nat-

ural History Museum, says: "I know of 90 different explanations.

One is that following a supernova explosion, like the one observed by Chinese astronomers in 1054, our galaxy was showered an immense amount of cosmic radiation. Earth would have experienced a radiation storm equal to the detonation of several thousand million hydrogen bombs.

According to geologist Adrian Desmond, those beasts that did not perish from cellular disruption or cancer would have produced sickly, mutant off-spring. Traces of a galactic blitz at the end of the Cretaceous Age, 65 million years ago, have "actually been detected", he says.

Some scientists believe dinosaurs were poisoned by deadly germs.

Another theory is that small mammals with an appetite for dinosaur eggs were responsible for the demise of the dinosaur.

David Lambert is unconvinced. He points out that crocodiles survive even though their eggs are often eaten by lizards.




been blotted out by clouds of hot, volcanic ash?

"This explanation seems unlikely," says Lambert, "for the simple reason that such isolated disasters couldn't have wiped out species all over the Cretaceous world.

"The likeliest explanation seems to be some sort of sweeping climatic change. Large land areas, once in the tropics, drifted into colder zones.

"Meanwhile, clashing con-











tinents had thrown up mountain ranges, sea areas were redistributed and ocean levels fell. These changes helped bring cold winters to places where such seasons had been hitherto unknown. "The dinosaurs lacked any covering. Uninsulated from

comfort," she said.

LIKE A TORNADO The Chairman, Cllr. M. O'Riordan agreed and said that the new traffic warden was like a tornado that hit the town last week and no one had escaped. "I think that he should be more lenient and compassionate in dealing with people," said Cllr. O'Riordan who added that when he came to town that evening he found the two car parks choc-a-bloc and failed to find a parking place anywhere in the town.

Cllr. B. Kyne said that he would like them to develop the point about concentrat-ing on litter. "We should get more involved in this and I believe if we are to resolve the problem a penalty element will be

necessary," he said. Cllr. P. Power then cited the case of two girls who parked their cars at the

Square at the same time last week. Both went away and each returned after about 15 minutes. One found a parking docket on her car but there was none on the other. "Do the two wardens that we now have work in different areas or do they cover the same areas?" he asked.

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White said that both operated over the same areas.

Cllr. R. Walsh said that he also had received numerous complaints since the new warden was appoint-ed. "I think," he said, "it would be more in our line to use him as a litter warden as there are few enough visitors which he can hunt out apart from crucifying the local people who park around the town.'

The Town Clerk said that they would look into the matter in the light of the complaints made.



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
