to name its full comple- Parent's Representative to legal advice on the position. Passing Of Revered Pastor, Very Rev. M. Canon Farrell, P.P., Abbeyside, Ballinroad, Garranbane

It is with the utmost regret that we record the death of Very Rev. Michael Canon Farrell, the revered and beloved Pastor of the United Parishes of Abbeyside, Ballinroad and Garranbane, which took place after a rather prolonged illness at the District Hospital, Dungarvan on last Monday morning, July 22. He was aged 80 years.

The late Canon Farrell was born at Grange, Clonmel on February 2, 1911, the son of a Tipperary farmer. He spent his boyhood days at home on the farm and received his early education at Grange N.S. before going on to the CBS in Clonmel where he spent two years before moving to Mount Melleray Seminary where he completed his secondary education. He then entered St. John's College, Waterford in 1927 to pursue his theological studies and was ordained in 1934 by Most Rev. Dr. J. Kinane, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore.

Following his ordination, Fr. Farrell was assigned to the Leeds mission and served for three years in the parish of Beston before returning to Ireland as Curate at New Inn in the Archdiocese of Cashel. He returned to the home diocese when he was appointed Curate at St. Patrick's parish in Waterford City on March 19, 1938. Three years later he was transferred to the parish of Ballybricken and Butlerstown where he was to spend the next 30 years. In the mid-50's while there he directed his energies towards the building of the Holy Family Church which was blessed and dedicated in 1954. Also while in

people he served. He celebrated the golden jubilee of his ordination in 1984. He was a man with a big voice and an equally big heart and his passing now, even in the fulness of years, has been the source of widespread regret throughout the diocese but especially among the people of Abbeyside, Garranbane and Ballinroad who came to love and revere

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
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Ballybricken he was assigned as Chaplain to the Mercy Convent a post which brought him much satisfaction.

On June 26, 1971 he was appointed Parish Priest of Abbeyside, Ballinroad and Garranbane and during the ensuing 20 years he worked unsparingly and ceaselessly for the welfare of his flock and the benefit of the parish as a whole. The renovations and reconstructions to the churches and schools as well as the improvements and extensions to the graveyards were all major achievements during his pastorate.

APPOINTED CANON In 1979 he was appointed to the Cathedral Chapter as Canon by Most Rev. Dr. Michael Russell, Bishop of the Diocese, an honour which he richly deserved for his untiring efforts for



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The National Safety Council has issued the following guidelines relating to water safety around the home:— Children should be supervised at all times when playing in or near water - very young children can drown in just a few inches of water. Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

WIN WITH GOD

The first reading on Sunday next describes a miracle, where there was insufficient food, yet, not only was a great number fed, but there was even some to spare. Elisha's miracle did resemble in miniature the great multiplication as recorded in today's Gospel, but, apart from Jesus being the immediate author, both miracles were triggered off by compassion. Indeed, those who witnessed the multiplication would have remembered what their fathers had said about Elisha, whom they revered as a holy man. However, Elisha's work would have conveyed no more beyond emphasising man's impotence compared to God's power, whereas, St. John does unfold the purpose Jesus had in mind, namely, the Eucharist.

God has blessed you with the faith. You may well consider yourself to be small fry, but if you live and work your one talent, you'll find you'll have a superabundance to give to those who are hungry for God. Parents hold a privileged position in relation to their children. Their example stamps their children for life. Imagine a father failing to feed his children on love of God. Let's say, he dies and makes purgatory. He now knows what it means to lose God. His biggest torment would be, the salvation of his children! I've known parents, who gave their children everything except God. And, whether you believe it or not, life without God is an impossible struggle. It has happened in the past and it is happening today, when God is pushed aside, all restraint

St. Paul almost makes an impassioned plea to the Ephesians to live the Gospel he's delivered to them. Obviously, they'd shown great promise, and so he urges them to maintain the high standard to which they'd been called. He reminds them that through Baptism they have been linked and forged into the Body of Christ by the Holy Spirit. So, he tells them that now you have been raised to a new creation, you have only one kind of life open to you. You should, therefore, let God's love shine through your patience, your gentleness, your generosity, your counsel, your understanding, etc. The Body of Christ, the Church, exists to bring her members to eternal life. It is the one great hope for all her members. Whilst Paul is trying to motivate the Ephesians to live for that end, he makes it clear that they must keep within the bounds of faith. He spells it out that he is talking about the faith as delivered by Christ, and placed in the custody of His Church, and that is why he added, they must be part of the living Body of Christ.

Nowadays, so-called Catholics seem to think they know better than Paul. They think they can pick and choose. This morning, July 13th (as I write this), I heard "someone" on the "Saturday Playback" criticise the Cardinal. I missed most of what was said, but I


gathered he felt the Cardinal was unsuited to act as a go-between considering he was unable to smoke the pipe of peace with Fr. Buckley. Clearly, this man does not like the Church. Everyone knows it would be easier to make peace with Dr. Paisley. This gent went on to say, as if it were Gospel, that 90% of the Church were against the Holy Father re. the Church's teaching on the pill and rubber goods. Who told him? Did he pick his figures out of the hat? The Church's mission is to teach holiness. She could never change her role, and she never would. We all know that Christ's teachings can sometimes be hard, but we also know "He has the words of eternal life." And, if the Lord demands sacrifice, He'll provide the helps to cope. Today's readings tell us to trust God.

A SIGN OF THE EUCHARIST

The Gospel tells us, Jesus took the few loaves, offered thanks . . . and gave the vast crowd all they required, and there were 12 hampers filled with leftovers. The crowd, as in the first reading, assumed it was God's goodness, but due to the greatness of this miracle, they were thinking that Jesus was more than an ordinary prophet. They talked and concluded He must be the promised Messiah, the one who'd set them free and make them into a great nation. They were ready to acknowledge Him, and proclaim Him king.

We know from subsequent events that this miracle was a sign of the Eucharist, yet, it also shows the Lord's concern and compassion for thousands stranded and with nothing to eat. If we believe in the Eucharist for what it is, we must understand the duties it places on us of bringing God's love and compassion to those in need. Help and thank God you're able to help, and you'll never want.

Life is never easy. And, we are very human. Be warned. Do not seek help from the world unless you want to be disappointed. You must place your trust in God. He makes life worth living. So, love Him, serve Him and trust Him.

31 Derelict Sites In Dungarvan

According to a report submitted to the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last week there is now a total of 31 derelict sites in the urban area.

The report went on to state under the new Derelict Sites Act, the Council was obliged to identify and compile a register of such sites. Orginally 26 sites had been registered as derelict but the total now was 31.

At present the sites were being valued and all owners would be notified of these valuations and of the fact that they would be liable to a levy of 3 per cent of these values from next January unless the sites ceased to be derelict by that date.

The report then added: "At present there appears to be some movement on roughly half a dozen of the registered sites but it is hoped that this will increase considerably when the owners are made aware of the annual levy payable."

Cllr. Mary Dixon referred to some particularly bad sites in the urban area, one old house in Abbeyside which she described as an absolute disgrace and a death trap for children from the nearby housing estate that went playing in and around the place. It was a miracle that no one had so far been seriously injured there, she said.

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White said that the owner had been notified of the position.

Finally it was agreed that a list of the sites registered

as derelict in the urban be supplied to each member of the Council and that they could then recommend others to the Co. Manager which they considered might also be in-

Spanish Students On English Summer Course

Two weeks ago a group of Spanish students, aged between twelve and twenty-three, arrived in Dungarvan as has been happening during the last six years. This course is run by Patricia Geoghegan with the aid of four Irish teachers.

We are living with Irish families mainly in Silversprings, Springfield and Abbeyside. In the morning we attend classes at Abbeyside School and in Irish friends. the afternoon we participate in different activities; on Mondays and Wednesdays we go on short excursions and on Tuesdays and Thursdays we practice basketball, soccer and learn Irish dances at the Sports Centre. On Fridays we go on a day trip to places such as "The National Heritage Park," Waterford and Cork.

At weekends we remain with our host families and become closely integrated with them. During the evenings, a group of Spanish students organise soccer matches against a local team, while others take part

in the junior tennis championship. At night time most of the older students go out to local pubs and discos where they meet Irish friends.

This year most of the students who came last year have returned, which proves we thoroughly enjoy our stay in Dungarvan.

John Hearn International Cycling Race

Looking for something to do for August Weekend - want a great weekend for excitement, spills, thrills? Make it to Carrick-on-Suir for the John Hearn Memorial International Cycling Challenge Cup Race on August 3, 4 and 5.

on-Suir this August Weekend with the John Hearn Memorial, which starts at Dublin on August 3 and makes its way south through the midlands and to the foot of the famous Comeragh Mountains and Slievemanon where on Main Street, Carrick-on-Suir the riders will then complete three laps of a five mile circuit. 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

O'Ryan and Fahey gave a detailed account of their meeting with officials of Waterford County Council.

The entire scheme is being supplied at present from the Curraghateskin supply where the phosphorus in the water is higher and therefore less corrosive than the village borehole. The changeover will be closely monitored in the coming weeks. The slow sand filters have been re-Waterford furbished. County Council are taking a very serious view of the difficulties being encountered and are doing all in their power to solve the problem.

THE DISAPPEARING **TOURISTS - A MAJOR** FINANCIAL LOSS

Tourists and visiting holidaymakers are, so far, very thin on the ground in County Waterford and from inquiries which we have made, the situation is more or less the same all over the country. A trip around West Waterford during the past week showed the many B & B signs with the additional sign "vacancies", hanging on to all of them.

War which was being blamed but now the lack of tourists is being more freely attributed to the recession which is still affecting both the U.S. and U.K.

As a result of all this, tourism earnings for 1991 are expected to fall £67 million short of the government target, according to tourist industry estimates. The resulting loss to the exchequer could be as high as £33.5 million.

Under the Programme for National Recovery (P.N.R.) the government set a target of doubling earnings from tourism between 1987 and 1992. In the first three years of the P.N.R. the target was exceeded. Now, however, the Irish Tourist Industry Confederation (I.T.I.C.) has predicted that earnings from tourism this year will fall about £67 million short of the government target of £896 million.

It has also predicted that the number of visitors coming into the country this

Originally it was the Gulf year will fall almost half a million short of the 3.6 million which was anticipated. A spokesman for the I.T.I.C. said that the lack of U.S. business was a blow as the fall in the number of visitors from the United States could be as high as

> 25 per cent. The year 1991 so far has certainly been a year in which the estimates and numbers all seem to have gone wrong where the government has been concerned.

Fr. Power was born in Effin, Kilmallock, Co. Limerick and was educated locally and at Mungret College, Limerick before going on to do his theological studies at the Gregorian University, Rome where he was ordained on July 13,

For six years after his ordination Fr. Power taught in the Augustinian College in Dungarvan before going on mission work in Nigeria where he spent many years. He also served in the U.S.A. where he was Pastor of St. Pius V, Buena Park, California and where another Dungarvan Augustinian, Fr. Michael Brennock O.S.A., is serving at present.

Fr. Power has two other brothers and three sisters who are members of religious orders and between them they have a grand total of 280 years service in the Lord's Vineyard.

DAYS TO TAKE CARE

Although up to the time of writing, the weather for the summer of 1991 has proved a total disaster, it's the time of year when tragic accidents can happen to blight and mar what should be a happy, carefree holiday time.

Inevitably there will again be loss of life but much can be done to prevent it if proper care is taken. Apart altogether from the obvious dangers of bathing in the sea, rivers and lakes, there are many unseen dangers, especially for young children and in some cases for the elderly.

Children should be supervised at all times when playing in or near water very young children can drown in just a few inches of water. Where they have access to rivers or streams on farms, safety precautions should be a top priority at all times while wells, water tanks, rain barrels and ornamental ponds should also always be securely covered.

Slurry pits are a particularly dangerous area as has already unfortunately been proved this summer and holes and drains can also prove a hazard for the young as well as for the

Care should be the operative word for all and if care is taken at all times then lives will be saved and heartbreak and tragedy will be averted.

CONSENSUS SAYS NO

We were rather amazed at the feed back to our piece in last week's column which questioned the appointment of a second traffic (and litter) warden in Dungarvan. The consensus was that such as appointment was not necessary.

One person, a professional driver, pointed out that neither Youghal or Fermoy had wardens, stressing that the latter was on the heavy

traffic arterial highway between Cork and Dublin and now for some unfathomable reason, Dungarvan has two. The general opinion is that the town is not big enough to warrant the employment of a second one.

Maybe this accounts for the report to hand which states that for the first time since the Traffic Bye-laws were enacted, parking dockets have been placed on cars parked in Abbeyside. The area of operation has apparently been extended to accommodate the second appointment!

A complaint which has come to us also from more than a few sources was that while one of the wardens is fully attired in his uniform and cap, the other is not so fully attired or capped - the one is clearly identifiable, even from a distance, the other is not. There may be some official reason for this of which we are not aware.

As we understand it, the official position is that the appointment has been made on a temporary basis for the next six months and this will bring us into the new year. It will have to stand until then and the townspeople and whatever few visitors come to the town will have to just grin and bear the situation.

Now we left our home grounds in the month of



the few months when we can sit back and enjoy the garden at its blooming best.

But everything is now growing so strongly that it makes a lot more work than many people think. Desirable varieties need everything from deadheading to trimming, while undesirables such as weeds and bugs, will need control.

On the pruning and trimming front, trim fast-growing hedges such as privet. The lawn mower will be in action frequently, but be careful not to mow too close in hot weather or the lawn will turn brown and patchy.

Water the grass regularly and perk it up occasionally with a liquid feed. Save useable household water as much as possible for use on the lawn and the rest of the garden even if there is not a current shortage of water without such care from all of us, there may be one later

Roses should be at their best by now and prompt dead-heading of spent blooms will ensure a continuing supply of colour.

As you lop these on nonhybrid tea varieties, look amongst this year's growth for strong shoots about nine inches long which can be used for cuttings. These can then be planted in good firm soil to increase your rose stock.

Check roses for mildew, black spot and insect pests such as aphids and be ready to use systemic pesticide and insecticides.

should think about extend-ing the displays of blooms by planting some autumn bulbs such as Belladonna Lily, Diamond Lily and

But most planting will be in the vegetable garden when sprouting broccoli, leeks and savoy cabbage should go in now

Current vegetable crops and especially succulent varieties such as courgettes, marrows and cucumbers, will need regular watering during July heat.

If you have been growing strawberries then try to pick the fruit as soon as it ripens and seek out and discard any that have mould and

Once they have finished producing fruit then pull up plants which are in their fourth season. They are and are best replaced later

One source of new stock is to identify some healthy runners from the younger and stronger plants in the strawberry patch and then anchor these into pots of compost plunged into the ground. These should then take root and become large enough to cut away for planting next month.

Make the most of the abundant clippings, trimmings and so on this month to keep the garden compost heap well stacked. The hotter the weather, the better the heap will decompose and it can be helped by using a proprietory com-post 'maker' or sulphate of ammonia.

Occasionally, turn the sides of the heap into the centre where decomposition is greater and then water to further fuel the

Council Houses Vandalised Dungarvan

In the course of a report on the housing situation at Cathal Brugha Place submitted by Mr. Raymond Moloney, Acting Town Clerk to the July monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council it was stated that at present there were 13 vacant houses in the estate, 10 purchased houses while the remaining 38 houses were all rented.

The report added that in the fact that they were seaccordance with the refurbishment scheme plans for the estate, which had been sanctioned on a pilot basis for 7 houses by the Department, a policy of not re-letting houses as they became vacant was adopted. Many of the houses which did become vacant required considerable works before they could be re-let and it was then decided not to repair these as they would be included in the refurbishment scheme at a later

"Unfortunately," the re-port then stated, "some of these houses have been badly vandalised despite cured by Council staff."

Cllr. P. Power said that while he had supported the original decision not to re-let the houses as they became vacant, in hindsight it had been a mistake to do so. "Some of the houses that were left vacant have been vandalised almost beyond repair," he said.

Cllr. T. Wright said that he was told that in one case a vacant house had its roof stripped by vandals.

The Council unanimously agreed to press the Department for additional funds to continue the refurbishment scheme at the estate.

There's No Plaice Like Rome

PLAICE WITH **ROMAN SAUCE**

Ingredients: 6 fillets of plaice, fresh or 1 lemon freshly ground black pepper For the Sauce: 3oz (85g) butter 4 spring onions 1½ oz (50g) can anchovy fillets 2 tablespoons (30ml) capers 1 tablespoon (15ml) chopped parsley

Method: Thaw the fish if it is frozen. Wash and dry the fillets. Cut six pieces of foil, wrap a fish fillet loosely Lightly butter the foil, put a fillet of plaice on each piece and season with pepper. Grate the lemon rind and reserve. Squeeze the juice of the lemon and sprinkle a few drops over each fillet, using about half. Fold up each piece of foil to make a loose parcel, double-sealing each edge. Put the foil parcels on a baking sheet or in a baking tin and cook at 350F (180C, Gas Mark 4) for 25-30 minutes, depending on the thickness of the fil-


While the fish is cooking trim and chop the spring onions. Just before the fish is cooked, melt the butter in a small pan and fry the onions over a moderate heat for 1-2 minutes to soften them I without browning. Chop or I I finely cut the anchovy fillets and add them to the butter with the capers, and reserved lemon juice and lemon rind.

When the fish is cooked, slit open each parcel, pour the sizzling hot sauce over each fish fillet and served in the foil.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I have just been made redundant and will only get the statutory payment. Can you explain how my lump sum will be worked out? I started work on January 1, 1980 and would expect to finish on June 30, 1991. I am now aged 55. My present salary is £260 per week.

Answer — As all your service was over age 41 you will be entitled to one week's pay for each year of service plus an extra week's pay.

The ceiling on pay is £250 per week.

Each period of 364 days is counted as one year. This means you get an extra day's service for each year and a further extra day for each leap year. When the total number of 364 day years of service is ascertained, if the remaining days come to more than 182 days, this counts as an extra year's service.

Assuming that you had no lay-offs or non-reckonable service your payment would be calculated as fol-



EVERYONE dived out of sight as two gunmen. hands on holsters, faced each other at opposite ends of the mining town's dusty main street.

Two shots rang out, scattering the pigeons from the surrounding roofs. And one man fell to the ground never to rise again.

Almost ever since the first Western movie in 1903 and there have been more than 7.000 to date! - the street duel has been the way to settle things before the final credits.

But that's plumb loco according to the lowdown from the people who know about these things.

The face-to-face duel. best-remembered no doubt in High Noon, just didn't happen in the way the West was really won.

Any differences out West weren't settled that way at all. In fact, in the heyday of Dodge City, Abilene and other towns, there were only

an average of two killings a year, and hardly any of the victims managed to shoot back. The epic face-to-face encounter can be traced to imaginative writers.

If you are interested in what really happened in the West, don't watch Westerns. Most of them grossly distorted history and even made up adventures and reputations for some of the great Western names who were real, such as Wild Bill Hickock, Buffalo Bill and Jesse James.

For one thing, the West wasn't all that wild. Statistics show that it was far less violent than the cities of the north east or certain counties to the south.

But, thought the early filmmakers (and most of them

still do today), what's a Western without violence?

The audience need that climatic shoot-out in the street, or an Indian massacre, or the bloody cavalry charge - or, at very least, a bar-room brawl.

"Elaborately ographed, stereotypical and even stylised in its stages and movement, the 'brawl' provides a more-or-less comic variation of a film's dominant themes," say the authors of a book that is not only a pretty thorough guide to the films themselves, but also the rich and complex cultural background of the Western.

There were certainly some fights in the real West bars. but nothing like the everybody-involved, all-action. exaggerated fisticuffs and bashings with chairs and bottles we often see on screen.

So, what else shouldn't you believe in the Wild and Woolly Westerns?

 Certainly not all doctors whisky-swigging were drunks who sobered up in time to treat a patient (Thomas Mitchell was surely the definitive portrayal).

· And while, of course, there were plenty of old men in the real West, it was the movie business which created the term "old-timer" allowing a whole troop of actors to specialise in making a living in this one part.

 Posses weren't all as bad as they're mostly made out in Westerns. On screen they're at best incompetent and at worst as criminal as those they are chasing;





Death Of Paddy 'Aeroplane' Kiely

The death of "Aeroplane" Kiely, as he was popularly known throughout his long playing career, marked the end of one of the real legendary characters of the Stradbally club and many indeed, are the stories told about the wonderful football displays of this great exponent of the game over the years. He was ever modest about his great football ability and last year when I had the pleasure of talking to him at the Stradbally club celebration of their great five-in-a-row, I didn't find it easy to elicit much detail of his splendid record with the county and club.

"Aeroplane" was the midfielder supreme in the late thirties and early forties and was so named because of special agility and high-fielding ability. Billy Mc-Grath, of the Dungarvan club who partnered him in the centre of the field with the county on many occasions, told me that Paddy was one of the greatest footballers that he had ever seen and many others who played with him or saw him perform, hold a similar opinion.

His playing career began when he was a minor with Kilminion Rovers who won the championship in 1932 and some years later (1937) he won a junior medal with the same club before throwing in his lot with Stradbally with whom he played until his retirement.

He was one of their great players and played a leading role in all their five-in-a-row victories from 1940 to '44. He won numerous other medals and trophies in tournaments and other competitions as well.

At the removal of his remains his friends and admirers turned up in huge numbers and the Stradbally club, many of whom were team mates of him during his playing days, did him full honours. The coffin was draped with the famous Red jersey in which "Aeroplane" played with distinction for so many years.

It was a very fitting farewell to a man who became a football legend. To his wife Madge and other relatives we express our very sincere sympathy.

Munster Finals

A query arose during the past week as to when the last Munster Senior Hurling final took place at Fraher Field, Dungarvan. The information is that it took place on the 11th August 1929 between Cork and Waterford, the score Cork 4-6 Waterford 2-3. The game was refereed by Willie Gleeson, Limerick and on the same day at the same venue in a minor hurling semi-final, Waterford defeated Limerick 8-3 to 1-2. This game was refereed by Phil Cahill (Tipperary).

Football Final

The report also stated that a number of trees at the 'country' end had to be felled because they were found to be in a

It was also announced that an electronic device to monitor the inflow of patrons to the venue, had been recently installed and a report on the operation of the system was given. Concern was felt about the numbers who gain admission to our ground without having to pay and this situation can be highlighted by the newly installed apparatus. As well as old-agepensioners and student card holders, many others it would appear, feel that they have a right to free admission and this matter is now being looked into.

REPORTS

When the Munster Council report was given by Greg Fives, delegates were critical of the ticket allocation for the Munster hurling final. The county secretary stated that although we had received an increased allocation, the demand had also increased and all applications had been treated on a fair basis, but not all applicants could be accommodated.

It was also pointed out that on previous occasions when we had been given a much smaller allocation, that the Board secretaries found themselves having to return unsold tickets on the morning of the match. We could, it was said, find ourselves in a similar situation again, if the final involved was deemed to be less attractive. We had been given 250 tickets for the football final between Kerry and Limerick and the majority of these were not taken and had to be returned. A complaint was also made that in spite of the fact that tickets were unavailable to some applicants here for the drawn hurling final, hundreds of tickets were on sale outside the ground on the day of the match. This is being looked into.

On the report of the Central Council, delegates were advised to have club documents relating to property and investments examined to ensure that these were properly vested in the club and not in the name of individuals. Instances were given where problems arose quite recently (not in this county) because documents were held in the names of the club officers of the day, rather than in the name of the club. All clubs were asked to note.

A 20-year-old unemployed motor cyclist was told by Judge D. P. Sheridan at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday that he needed a shock period to consider his position and ordered that he be put off the road for a month as from Monday next.

Derek Neylin, Shandon St., Dungarvan was appealing against the severity of sentence imposed on him at the District Court when he was convicted on a charge of dangerous driving and disqualified from driving for six months arising from incidents which took place

on October 31 last.

Mr. A. V. Maher, State Solicitor for the Director of Public Prosecutions told the Court that at 2.30 a.m. on October 31, Bangarda Foley was in the official patrol car with another garda at Mary Street, Dungarvan. She saw two motor cycles entering from Mitchel Street and both drove down and went through the red traffic lights at the end of the street. The gardai went in pursuit and the motorcyclists went down Shandon road and on to the by-pass where the gardai failed to stop them. They continued on and then went through the red traffic lights at Kilrush junction and there the gardai lost them.

Mr. Maher said that however Bangarda Foley had identified Neylin as he passed her in Mary Street and she went to his address later to interview him. He subsequently called to the Garda Station and made a statement.

Bangarda Foley in evidence confirmed the facts as stated and added that on the night in question there was quite a few people around the Square when the defendant drove through the red lights. She said that when Neylin called to the Garda Station and made the statement he had told her that he would go out and do the same again.

£5,500 SETTLEMENT

A settlement in the sum of £5,500 was approved by Judge D. P. Sheridan at the Trinity sitting of Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday in a claim brought by Christopher Power, aged 4 years, suing through his mother and best friend, Mrs. Ann Power 18, Boreenatra, Dungarvan in a personal injuries claim for £15,000 brought against Donal Whelan, Coal Merchant and Patrick Whelan of 50, O'Connell Street, Dungarvan.

Mr. J. O'Kelly B.L. (instructed by Murphy Mc-Cullagh & Co.) for the plaintiffs told the court that on October 20, 1989, the child was riding his toy tractor at 20 Childers Estate when a lorry owned by the first named defendant and driven by the second named defendant reversed and collided with him. As a result of the accident, the child suffered facial abrasions and an ear injury and subsequently suffered nightmares for some time.

Mr. O'Kelly added that an offer of £5,000 was originally made but the court was not satisfied that this was adequate because of the nightmares. Since then there had been

no further occurrence of the nightmares and a further £500 had been added to the settlement offer. While he did not still feel that the latest offer was overly generous, Mr. O'Kelly submitted it for the approval of the court.

When Mrs. Power went into the witness box and

told Judge Sheridan that they would prefer to have the matter settled, the set-tlement of £5,500 was approved. Judge Sheridan also allowed a sum of £250 for special damages together with costs.


