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Kyne To Head Vocational Education Committee

The inaugural annual general meeting of the newly constituted County Waterford Vocational Education Committee was held at the V.E.C. office in Dungarvan on Tuesday morning last. The meeting, originally called for Friday, July 19, was cancelled when it was found that the nomination of the six non-elected members of the Committee was not in accordance with the regulations of the Vocational Act, 1930.

Mr. Donal Kelleher C.E.O. presided at the outset and called for nominations for the Chair.

Labour Councillors Paddy Power and Lar Hart proposed and seconded their Labour colleague, Cllr. Billy Kyne and in the absence of any further nomination, Cllr. Kyne was declared unanimously elected Chairman to the applause of his fellow members.

Having taken the Chair, Cllr. Kyne, thanked the members for electing him unanimously. Promising to conduct all their meetings in a workmanlike manner, Cllr. Kyne called on all members to work together to achieve the best result with what would be a difficult brief in the coming year.

The election of Vice-Chairman followed and here there was again a unanimous choice when

Cllr. Con Casey (F.G.), who was proposed and seconded by his party colleagues, Cllr. John Carey and Mr. Jim Harty was returned unopposed.

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Poor Prospects For Lismore Industry

Following the recent closure of the Associated Casings factory located at the old railway station in Lismore with the loss of 15 jobs, efforts to secure a replacement industry for the town have so far yielded no results.

Newly-elected Chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Willie McDonnell, Tallow who declared the creation of jobs as a top priority during his term of office, has been informed by I.R.D. West Waterford, the development company established to monitor job creation in the area that Associated Casings were no longer interested in processing casings at the Lismore plant.

It appears that the factory buildings were found to be no longer suitable according to the veterinary standards laid down by the Department of Agriculture and the cost of bringing them up to the required standards proved to be uneconomic.

Cllr. McDonnell has also been informed that the I.D.A. is currently negotiating with an unnamed individual who has expressed

an interest in continuing the operation in Lismore and talks in this regard were stated to be still at an early stage.

In the meantime Mr. John Maloney, Chairman of West Waterford Development Partnership has spent recent weeks researching the market and talking to companies who are currently involved in producing hog casings. However, the present market for these is stated to be very depressed and this trend is expected to continue. In addition the demand for the raw material in the country far exceeds the supply which is keeping prices high thus reducing profit margins.

The I.R.D.'s assessment of the position states that any plant locating at Lismore would have to increase the volume of casings processed substantially in order to be viable.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

FOOD IS LIFE

Back in 1967, following the humiliating defeat of the Egyptians, we read that thousands of them were left wandering in the desert and died from hunger and thirst. It gives us some idea of the hardships and the problems the Israelites had to face as Moses lead them through that same terrain as they made their way to the promised land. Indeed, they did take food and brought some animals like sheep and goats with them, but difficulties were bound to arise considering they numbered over 600,000 and much of the way was through desert lands. Too, they'd often had to fight their way, so that it is easy to understand it took them 40 years to reach their homeland. It is understandable that they'd grumble, because apart from all the hardships and shortages, they had to endure the blistering heat. However, when their discontent became unreasonable, the Lord was inclined to leave them in their stew, but the Lord listened to Moses and stayed His hand.

Moses, through God's mercy, was able to provide them with food to eat and water to drink. So, these headstrong people should have known that the Lord who heard their cries and sent Moses to rescue them, would not then abandon them to a worse fate in the desert. They should have trusted Him. God had made a promise with His people, and He'd see it was fulfilled. But, what about their part of the bargain? They were to live and abide by God's law. Sadly, whilst they gloried in their history, they soon forgot to keep its spirit. You'll note in the Gospel, they were readily able to tell Jesus that His miracle of the loaves paled before the greatness of the manna miracle!

Let's take the second reading and place it into the local setting of West Waterford. St. Paul is reminding you that you've been called and raised to a new life in Baptism. And, he is telling you that as children of God, you've been nurtured and brought up in the school of Christ. He is imploring you to live as a member of Christ's family. Dramatic changes have taken place in society over the past 50 years, and he is warning you not to be mesmerized by their glamour and attraction. Many, who have fallen captive to this new paganism, no longer walk with Christ, and claim to be free to live and to do as they please. Indeed, it may offer you everything, but one thing is certain, it cannot offer you Heaven.

You have a challenge on your hands. Yes, many many Catholics have fallen victims, and abandoned the faith of their fathers. They are a disgrace to God's family. It is sad to see someone being freed from the slavery of sin, and then watch him as he voluntarily puts his neck back into the same snare. These folk will tell you, God's law is too demanding, and too restrictive. Hence, they ditch God, and look for a more accommodating one. Had they but given the matter serious thought, they'd learn that whenever God asks for sacrifice, He

always provides a Simon of Cyrene. Those who strive to walk in the footsteps of the Lord, will tell you that if it is happiness you seek, then this is where it lies. Oh! you've got to fight. You have to trust. But, there's great joy in knowing you are on a winning team. The friends of Jesus will tell you, it is a great help to reflect on the greatness of God. Then, consider your baptismal relationship with Him. You'll find you'll be ready to face any trial to hold on to that love. After all, God is your Father. He loves you. He wants you to come home.

HEAVENLY BREAD

The crowd, after the miracle of the loaves, were excited and intent on finding Jesus. They caught up with Him the following day at Capernaum. He tells them, you come because I provided you with food for your material needs. They were quick to let the Lord know that Moses worked a far greater miracle: he fed a whole nation. Jesus tells them it was not Moses, but it was God who gave their fathers the manna. Anyhow, He said, the loaves and the manna satisfied only temporal needs, whereas He could provide them with a food that would enable them to live forever, and this is the food you should labour for.

Immediately, they asked: what must they do to earn this food? Jesus replied: "you must believe in the one He sent." They said, that's all right, but what proof have you to convince us. Jesus ignores the question, and proceeds to lead them closer to the Eucharist. He tells them, His Father would provide the Heavenly Bread, and almost with one voice they cried, give us this Bread. They were crushed and showed lack of faith when Jesus said: "I'm the bread of life." He was identifying Himself with the food that was to sustain them on their way to eternal life. Hence, if you hope to gain eternal life, you must nourish yourself on the Body of Christ.

Holiday Driving

Everyone knows that December is a bad month for road deaths. What is not so well known is that August is often just as bad. Both of these holiday months are times when people socialise more and, away from the pressures of work, may have more to drink than usual.

This is a part of what holidays are about. But more than one-third of all road accidents are alcohol related. This chilling statistic may bring home the fact that the saying "one-for-the-road" may have more meaning than the usual one. It really is best to "Keep Drink Out Of The Driving Seat".

August is one of the busiest times on Irish roads with many motorists making long journeys to holiday resorts. The National Safety Council is issuing a special appeal to all motorists to be aware of dangers on the road and to take the necessary steps to prevent accidents.

Take time to plan your trip, it's well worth the effort; start a long trip in the morning, after a good night's sleep; plan to drive at times you are normally awake; avoid driving late at night and very early in the morning; take regular breaks (at least every two hours); eat properly, not too much, not too little; share the driving when you can; if you are tired or sleepy, there is only one solution - you must find a suitable spot for a rest; speed limits are there for a reason - so observe them; drivers and passengers should wear their belts on all journeys.

Let your motto be: "PLAN YOUR DRIVE AND STAY ALIVE".

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — My Invalidity Pension includes payment for my son aged 20 who is in college and my daughter who will be 18 in August. She doesn't know if she will be continuing in full-time education. Can you give me details about the new arrangement for child dependents?

Answer — Under the Social Welfare System children are regarded as dependents up to age 18 regardless of whether they are at school, working or claiming a Social Welfare payment in their own right.

Up to now parents receiving long-term social welfare payments continued to receive the increase for school-going children up to age 20 and families on the lone-parents payments continued to receive payment for such children up to age 21.

The new rules which came into effect in July 1991 for child dependents under the Social Welfare System are as follows:

- (1) — Parents receiving long-term Social Welfare payments will continue to receive the increase for school-going children up to age 21.
- (2) — The payment for children will continue to be paid during the summer months provided the child is not claiming a Social Welfare payment in her/his own right.

Up to now the payment for the child stopped in June and was restored when the child resumed full-time education in the autumn.

In your particular case this means that you will be paid for your 18 old year daughter up to October, even if she does not continue in full-time education, provided she is not receiving a Social Welfare payment in her own right.

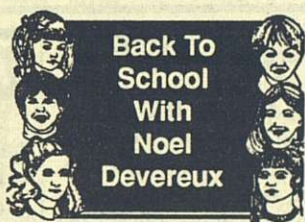

● A frontal view of Noel Devereux's, Mary Street Dungarvan



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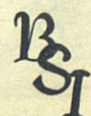
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Awards For Dungarvan Girls Injured In Two-Car Collision

A two-car collision which happened at Grawn, Kilmacthomas on November 12, 1989 was mentioned at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week when Ann McGrath (20) of 12, McCarthyville, Abbeyside and Ella Duggan (21) 59, Mitchel Street, Dungarvan, passengers in one of the cars, sued Thomas Walsh, Georgestown, Kill, Co. Waterford the driver of the other car for personal injuries.

The case came before Judge Sheridan for the assessment of damages.

Ann McGrath in evidence said she was a Quality Controller employed by Waterford Crystal. On the date in question she was a front seat passenger in one of the cars and following the collision she sustained injuries to her neck and lower back and also to the muscle wall of her abdomen. She was still taking pain-killers to ease the pains.

Ella Duggan gave evidence that she had also been a passenger in the car and was also injured but had now recovered apart from occasional pains in the back of her neck.

Judge Sheridan said that it appeared to him that Miss McGrath's injuries had been more serious than Miss Duggan's and while in neither case would he go overboard he felt that both of the plaintiffs were entitled to reasonable damages.

In the case of Miss McGrath he fixed damages at £7,000 with £428.71 to cover special damages and in the case of Miss Duggan he fixed damages in the sum of £4,000 together with £125 to cover special damages. Costs were allowed in both cases.

Mr. J. O'Kelly, B.L. (instructed by J. F. Williams & Co.) was for the plaintiffs and Mr. S. Lanigan-O'Keefe, B.L. (instructed by J. P. Gordon & Co.) was for the defendant.

Court Approves of £7,000 Settlement For Injured Cyclist

Philip French (17), an apprentice carpenter of Ballyduff, Dungarvan, suing through his father brought a personal injuries claim at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week against Maurice Kiely, c/o MPK Engineering Co., 15, Bridge Road, Listowel and Anthony Meehan, Doon Road, Ballybunnion.

Plaintiff claimed that while cycling at the Causeway, Abbeyside on the night of March 15, 1990 he was struck by a truck owned by the first named defendant and driven by the second named defendant. The Court was asked to approve of an agreed settlement of £7,000.

The Court was told that on the night in question the truck crossed into the path of Philip French when he was cycling at the Causeway. He was struck and sustained injuries to his rib, shoulder and knee but had since fully recovered.

The Court was also told of contributory negligence by the plaintiff who did not have lights on his bicycle

at the time.

In approving of the settlement of £7,000, Judge Sheridan commented that in all the circumstances he considered it to be a very good settlement.

Mr. N. King (J. F. Williams & Co.) was for the applicant and M/s. M. M. Halley & Son were for the defendants.

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WHY NOT GIVE US A TRY?

Special Co. Council Meeting To Complete V.E.C. Nominations

A special meeting of Waterford County Council was held in Dungarvan last Friday to deal with the problem which arose from the Council's failure at its previous meeting to nominate a named person among the six non-elected members to be appointed to the County Vocational Education Committee instead of just "a representative of the parents who had a child at the Committee's schools" (in Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas).

A report from the Deputy Co. Manager, Mr. B. J. McNally, on the position, informed the Council members that the Chief Executive Officer of the V.E.C. had informed him that as the Council had not completed the election of members to the Committee in accordance with the relevant sections of the Vocational Act, 1930, it was not open to him to convene a meeting and consequently the meeting intended for July 19 was cancelled.

Mr. McNally then submitted what he described as the only methods he could visualise to give effort to the Council's decision to appoint a parents' representative to the Committee. "I have", the Deputy Manager's report went on to say, "contacted four parents' nominees on the Boards of Management of Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas Vocational Schools with a view to ascertaining, if elected, they would be willing to serve on the Committee". Of those, two did not wish to be considered, one expressed reluctance about the position and the fourth indicated that he would be prepared to allow his name to go forward.

On this basis the Deputy Manager stated that he then contacted the Co. Council Chairman to have a special meeting called to deal with the matter.

At the outset of last Friday's meeting, Cllr. C. O Riain asked if it was considered absolutely necessary to call a special meeting of the Council just to deal with this.

The Chairman, Cllr. W. McDonnell, replied, "I believe it was from the information I received, as I felt we could not let it stand over for so long until the next ordinary meeting".

Blaming the Minister for Education, Mrs. O'Rourke, Cllr. P. Coffey said that when she recommended that parents' representatives should be appointed to Vocational Education Committee she had left the situation very lax by not laying down proper guidelines. "It was she who made a mess of this situation", he said.

Cllr. Con Casey pointing out that a new school year would be commencing soon and it was essential to have a Vocational Educa-

tion Committees functioning said that it was vital for the Council to go ahead and complete the formation of the Committee as quickly as possible.

Cllr. G. O'Halloran then said that the resolution which had caused all the trouble in the first instance had been sponsored by the two Dail Deputies on the Council (Deputies Brian O'Shea and Jackie Fahey). "It's a pity that they did not work out the position before putting the resolution through" said Cllr. O'Halloran.

Deputy Fahey intervened to say that they had made the proposal on their own choice as they thought that parents should be represented on the Vocational Committee. "In doing so we didn't anticipate any of the complications which have arisen," he said.

NO BACKLASH

Cllr. T. Cunningham then asked whether there could be a backlash if an appointment was made from parents who were not afforded the chance of putting their names forward and the Chairman, Cllr. McDonnell said that he did not think so.

Deputy Fahey then proposed that Mr. Noel O'Doherty, 1 St. Garvan's Tce., Dungarvan (who had signified his assent to a nomination) be appointed to the Committee as the Parents Representative and this was seconded by Cllr. B. Kyne.

In the absence of any

other proposal, the Chairman then declared Mr. O'Doherty appointed a member of the Committee. Tributes were paid to the

Deputy Manager, Mr. McNally, by Cllr. Kenneally and Cllr. P. Coffey on the initiative he had taken in resolving the matter.

As the members left the meeting, they were handed copies of an agenda for the inaugural meeting of the Vocational Committee to take place on Tuesday evening.

Waterford Group To Contest All-Ireland

Young musicians from Waterford won many prizes at the Munster Fleadh Cheoil in Glin two weeks ago. While it was a disappointing day for many in the individual competitions, just as in last year's provincial finals our Grupai Cheoil did very well.

BOVINE T.B. ERADICATION SCHEME INTERIM TESTING ARRANGEMENTS

ERAD is advising herdowners whose herds have not been tested in 1991 and who now wish to have their full herd tested, to contact their District Veterinary Office (DVO) for authorisation to have a test carried out by a Veterinary Surgeon (V.S.) of their choice.

The farmer will be responsible for paying the fee which ERAD will reimburse at the current scheme rates (less V.S. withholding tax) as soon as possible following receipt of the test report and other necessary documents.

Blood sampling for brucellosis testing may be required in some areas.

MELLERAY '91

Just a few weeks ago Garrett Morrissey wrote these notes, the cheque is even still in the post!! He shared with us his experiences of annual camp at Garrynagragh, Clonea. They proved very popular with readers.

To keep the balance right and please Mary Robinson we call this week on Niamh, Helen, Edel and Jessica to share with us their experiences of camping at Glenshelane as part of Melleray '91, the camp held to mark 80 years of Guiding in Ireland.

These four young Guide Leaders found themselves appointed to help Jan Bartlett in the running of the Glenshelane end of things at Melleray '91. This is their account.

GLENSHELANE 1991

The scout campsite at Glenshelane was bursting with unusual activity last week, as the Irish Girl Guides took over! The community at Mt. Melleray were slightly bemused as 1,200 women and girls invaded one of their fields, but the warden at Glenshelane seemed to take the 128 Guides who appeared daily on his site entirely in his stride. The girls hiked the 2 1/2 miles from the monastery along the Glenshelane river walk in parties of 64, for the "away a day" and "overnight survival" activities.

OVERNIGHT SURVIVAL

The overnight survival activity, alleged to be the most exciting available at Melleray '91, involved building shelters and cooking over the open fires without utensils. The shelters of builders polythene and bamboo canes, ranged from the stylish to the collapsible, but the majority were adequate, despite the adverse weather conditions.

The Guides were kept warm and approximately dry in the peat moss sacks kindly donated by Bord na Mona, as bivvy bags. However, two groups were washed out and were evacuated to the main marquee at Melleray. The Thursday night group had the added bonus of a camp fire with the local Abbeyside Scouts.

"AWAY A DAY"

The programme for this activity included building rope bridges and pontoons across the swollen Glenshelane river, abseiling, doing trust activities, and generally getting wet, as well as cooking home made bread, "cheesy cabbage parcels" and caramelised apples on open fires.

INTERNATIONAL VISITORS

Among the 640 Guides and young leaders who participated in the Glenshelane activities were visitors from America, Belgium, Canada, Czechoslovakia, England, France, Japan, Scotland, U.S.S.R. (Chernobyl) and Wales. The disabled Guides, known on camp as "Sparrows" were to have joined

in also, but were unfortunately dissuaded by the heavy rain.

A £500 SOLUTION TO COUNCIL BLUNDER

That Waterford County Council made a blunder when it failed to name all six of the non-members to be appointed to the County Vocational Education Committee was suspected even at the meeting at which it took place. The blunder was made when the Council passed a resolution sponsored by the two senior politicians on the Council, Deputy Brian O'Shea and Deputy Jackie Fahey, that a parents' representative (unnamed) be appointed to the Committee and the Council then proceeded to appoint the other five named members.

When the Chief Executive Officer of the Vocational Committee was formally informed of the Council's decision, he, in turn, informed the Deputy County Manager that as the Council had not completed the election of members as laid down by the Vocational Act, 1930, he could not convene the inaugural annual meeting of the Committee.

In consequence of this, a special meeting of the County Council with a one-line agenda which read "Election of one parents representative to the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee", had to be held in Dungarvan last Friday. It was all over in ten or fifteen minutes and the sixth non-member to the V.E.C. was unanimously appointed there.

The cost of convening a meeting of the County Council runs to around £500 or £600. That's what it cost to resolve a blunder which should never have been made in the first instance.

IRELAND IS THE CLEAR WINNER

Despite the image projected by An Taoiseach and the Minister for Foreign Affairs who would like us here at home to believe that

Ireland is a big deal in Europe, it is seldom that we have found reference to Ireland in "Eurofocus", the weekly news sheet for journalists issued by the Commission of the European Communities.

It was most pleasant for us then on getting the most recent issue of "Eurofocus" to find Ireland mentioned in a most complimentary manner.

In an article on the environment dealing with the quality of bathing waters it is stated that the situation was now slightly better in the European Community as a whole.

The article then goes on: "Greece, with its 3,000 islands and 18,000 km. of coastline, can throw its beaches wide open to European tourists this year. The fact is that 94 per cent of the country's bathing waters meet the standards of cleanliness laid down by the European Community. Bathing will also be authorised in Belgium, France, Denmark, Germany and the Netherlands, where nearly 90 per cent of the waters that wash their beaches have been declared clean. But Ireland is the clear winner: 98 per cent of its bathing waters meet the country's own standards, which are much stricter than the Community's".

Now isn't it nice to hear something good being said about Ireland. Here in Waterford our coastline subscribes well to these high standards as we hold four Blue Flag Awards for clean beaches, two in Dunmore East and one each in Clonea and Ardmore. Let's keep up the good work.

SHARP PRACTICE BY TELECOM

We note that the Small Firms Association has strongly criticised Telecom Eireann alleging that its members are getting a raw deal over Telecom's new policy of disconnecting phones without warning.

We also note that a West Cork solicitor has instituted proceedings in the High Court against the same Telecom Eireann claiming that it is not providing the service which it has promised.

It is believed that the solicitor is claiming over £40,000 for what he says has been a series of failures by Telecom to honour commitments given when it installed a telephone in his office in Timoleague eight years ago. He has now had his service disconnected for not paying a bill.

In regard to the policy of disconnecting without warning, the Small Firms Association wants the old system of issuing a "Final Warning" brought back and they point out that Telecom costs 40 per cent more than other European businessmen have to pay for their phone service. No wonder Telecom could report a profit in excess of £90 million on last year's turnover.

We have also experienced a new procedure in Tele-

com policy ourselves in regard to account queries. Up to now all you had to do was to dial the freefone number and make your enquiry which was then dealt with. We had reason to question the most recent account received and when we dialled the freefone number we got a recording in response which kept repeating "your call is in queue, please hold on".

After about four or five minutes we got a "live" response and when we articulated our complaint about the account we were promptly informed that we would have to be charged before the query could be answered.

So now, like the commercial banks, Telecom is charging not only 40 per cent more than our E.C. competitors have to pay, but for practically every hands turn as well. Surely it can only be described as most unfair that subscribers have not only to pay their bills but also for information when they raise any queries about them. It's certainly a good way to put an end to such enquiries but no one except such a monopoly as Telecom is, could get away with it.

BARRISTERS DECIDE TO REMAIN IN THE VICTORIAN ERA

Contrary to general expectations, Ireland's barristers have decided to continue wearing their wigs and gowns in court, for the time being at any rate. A meeting of the Bar Council recently did not favour a move by some junior barristers to drop the centuries old practice of dressing up in wigs and gowns for court

appearances. Public opinion generally favours the dropping of the practice on the ground that it tends to make the lot of litigants who have to go to court more trying and traumatic than it should be. People are not used to seeing people in this old style of dress and are naturally more frightened than when they are faced by a bewigged barrister in court.

Perhaps the Bar Council is afraid that if the members of the bar were to appear in court in ordinary attire sans wigs, a lot of the mystique would be lost and ordinary people would be less afraid than they are.

Despite the Bar Council decision we think that it is time, as we stand on the threshold of the 21st century, that this old Victorian practice, like the archaic laws of the same period, be dropped.

Indeed it has been drawn to our attention that during the course of last week's Circuit Court sitting in Dungarvan, the sultry humid conditions that prevailed throughout Tuesday saw the presiding judge pass word down during the

lunch break that wigs could be discarded during the evening session.

Barristers looked far better without the wigs while the ladies certainly benefited as nothing looks more silly than a misfitting horsehair wig perched on top of a full head of hair.

DUNGARVAN'S NEW FIRE STATION

The County Fire Fighting Service is to get a new £850,000 headquarters fire station in Dungarvan to replace its current base which dates back to 1968, provided that the cutbacks now called for by the Minister for Finance don't again see the project shelved.

Tenders are at present being invited by the County Council for the construction of a new headquarters fire station, repair workshop, drill yard, training and ancillary works on a site at the By-pass road in Dungarvan.

A total of £200,000 has been allocated by the County Council for the new site and an additional £650,000 has been set aside for the building contract.

News of the death of Peter Burke, Keating Street, Dungarvan which took place at the District Hospital on Monday, July 22 was the source of great sorrow to his family relatives but especially to his wide circle of friends.

It was a great blow to him then when a malignant growth in his throat caused him to lose his voice last year but nevertheless he still continued to move around amongst his friends using a notebook which he carried with him to communicate with them. However his health continued to fail and in the end he was admitted to hospital where he died on Monday, July 22.

His remains were removed to St. Mary's Parish Church on Tuesday evening where they were received and blessed by Rev. Fr. C. Kelly, C.C.

On Wednesday morning Fr. Kelly celebrated Requiem Mass for the repose of his soul. The Lessons

were read by Mrs. Annette Geoghegan-Quinn and Margaret Duggan while well-known tenor, Jim Keohan, was the soloist. The Offertory Gifts were borne to the altar by Mrs. May Flynn and Mrs. Bridget Foley.

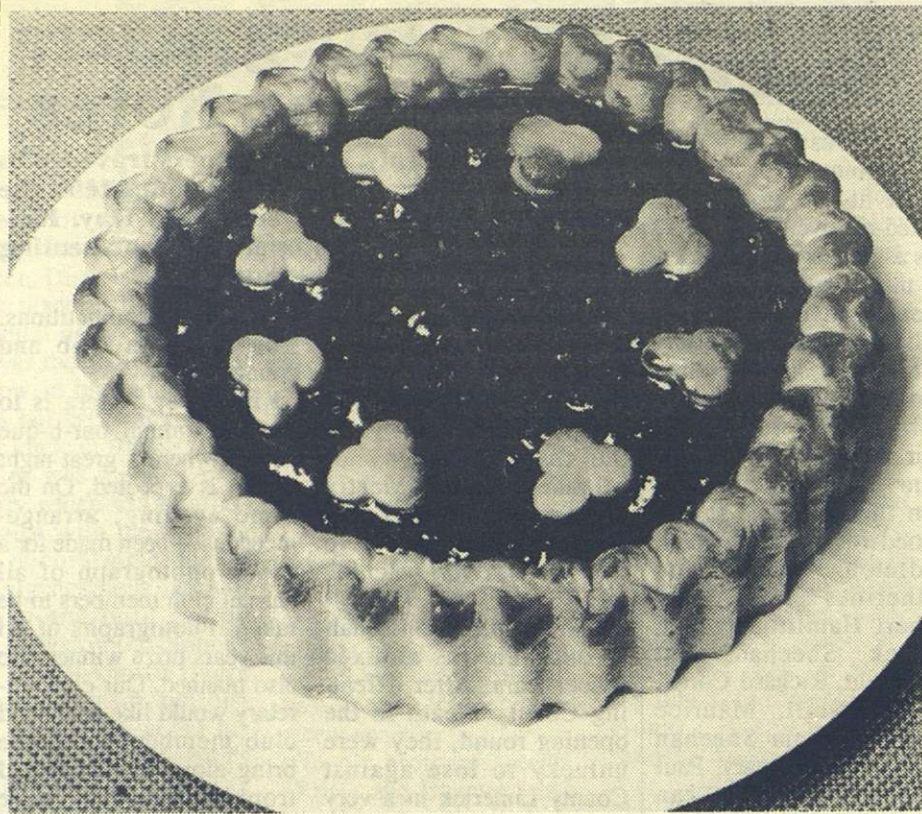

GOOSEBERRY FLAN

Ingredients:
YEAST DOUGH:
 1/2 oz (15g) yeast
 1/4 pint (125ml) milk and water

2oz (50g) butter
 1/4 oz (100g) caster sugar
 1/2 egg
 8oz (200g) plain flour (sieved)
FILLING:
 8oz (200g) gooseberry jam

Method:
 Mix yeast with a little milk, adding gradually about half of it. Cream butter and sugar and beat in egg and one teaspoonful flour.

Add yeast and remaining flour to creamed mixture

with sufficient milk to make a soft dough. Beat until smooth. Cover and leave in a warm place for one hour to rise. Lightly knead and roll to 1/4 inch thickness.

Line an 8-inch fluted flan ring. Trim. Spread bottom of flan with gooseberry jam, and use remaining pastry to decorate. Bake in a very hot oven (450F) for 15 minutes, then reduce heat to 375F for a further 10-15 minutes. Serve freshly made.

Serves four-six.

PIGGERY HEARING

An oral hearing by An Bord Pleanala on the controversial integrated piggery unit proposed for Garran-temple, Knocklofty was held in Clonmel during the past week. A large number of objectors to the project came to the County Council offices to listen to the hearing.

The hearing was held following an appeal by the Marfield Action Committee to An Bord Pleanala against the decision of South Tipperary County Council to grant planning permission to Mr. Tony O'Reilly, Monksgrange, for an integrated pig unit at Garran-temple. A local farmer was named as the second appellant, he was Mr. Tom Dower.

An Bord Pleanala inspector Heuk Van-der Kemp was told by the objectors that the proposed piggery would diminish the quality of life for the people living within a three mile radius. It would have a disastrous effect on the local economy, it would cause serious air pollution and endanger St. Patrick's Well, the Marfield Lake and the river Suir.

WILL the fuchsia replace the rose as our national flower? It's unlikely, but this Mexican native has great claims to being our second favourite.

Like the rose, it is showy and comes in many varieties for different jobs - trailing for boxes and hanging baskets or upright for bushes or standards.

Some will even overwinter outside although, with the exception of gardens in the mild South West, most varieties need the greenhouse or conservatory in winter.

The plant also has a rose-like ease of propagation. Cuttings taken now will quickly multiply your fuchsia stock and you will find no shortage of fuchsia fans keen to swap cuttings from their varieties for some of yours.

This huge range of different fuchsias ranging from

the traditional reds and pinks to mauves, creams, oranges and who knows what else to come, is all part of the plant's appeal.

Keen collectors will take advantage of the many advertisements offering fuchsia collections and some of the rather more light-fingered rather than green-fingered have been known to 'live' a cutting or two from the gardens of others or hothouses at show gardens.

Trailing fuchsias make excellent partners in hang-

ing baskets for petunias and ivy, for instance.

But many fuchsia fans would argue that growing a fuchsia standard is far more interesting. Though they can be bought, there is a lot of fun to be had - and some rewarding compliments - from growing your own.

Choose an upright variety with a single main stem and pinch out any side shoots, although side leaves should be left on until the standard has formed.

Then tie the stem tightly to a cane every few inches to ensure no bends creep into your would-be eye-catcher.

Keep potting-on as the roots fill the existing pot and wait until the stem has reached at least 2 1/2 feet high before pinching out the growing tip. This will

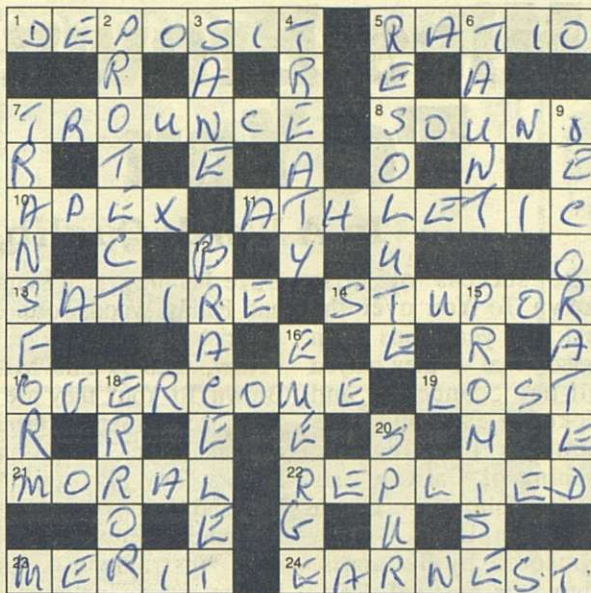

DOGS and cats will be led a dreadful dance this summer – by fleas.

A plague on the scale of the Old Testament is forecast by vets.

One reason is the very mild winter which enabled the old enemy to thrive.

Another is the British obsession with central heating, wall-to-wall carpeting and insulated lofts.

We have made ourselves so comfortable, according to some experts, that the nation's fleas "live a life of luxury."

But, please, if you have fleas in your home, do not feel ashamed.

Author and naturalist Bil Gilbert says that fending off fleas requires almost super-human fastidiousness.

"The view that fleas bother only slob overrates human abilities and badly under rates those of fleas," he says.

ARE YOUR FLEAS UP TO SCRATCH?



"Not only do these little beasts wildly outnumber all pets and pet owners, but they have also developed a lot of sophisticated equipment and tricky moves."

The attachment of the flea to man and his beasts is as old as life itself. Fossilised fleas have been found in amber deposits from the Oligocene period of

40,000,000 years ago.

Since then, according to the Encyclopaedia Britannica, the flea has diversified into at least 1,600 tenacious species.

Cats, dogs, bats, rats, mice and rabbits are among the warm-blooded creatures adopted by fleas, and as far as the flea is concerned, the cosy arrangement is a life-long one.

That can be two-and-a-half years.

One characteristic a young flea has is patience. Each has to find a host of its own.

So, the infant flea, an unprepossessing, semi-transparent, legless maggot, rolls off the host creatures and spins a cocoon in which it lies dormant until it detects the approach of a human or animal which it leaps upon and gorges.

Fleas, even though they are rarely more than 5mm long, are equipped with hind legs so powerful that they can propel themselves 13 in into the air or at a distance, of 8in horizontally.

The flea achieves this athletic feat by flexing an elastic pad beside its hind legs, and then suddenly releasing it – propelling itself into the air like an arrow with a built in bow.

Each time a flea jumps, it is subjected to a g-force 200 times stronger than normal, a strain that would kill most humans.

Bil Gilbert says: "If fleas were as big as men and retained this prowess, they

could jump about 300 ft long, 500 ft high and pull 400 times their own weight."

Some fleas have eyes, but essentially they all depend on their sense of smell to find a suitable host.

For some reason, all fleas avoid horses and people who handle them.

The gravest crimeof which the parasite has been accused is spreading the bubonic plague.

How do you dispose of them?

The ancient Egyptians had a method that was perverse as it was novel. A slave would be daubed with ass's milk and locked in an infested room in the hope that all the fleas would jump on him.

In the Middle Ages, gentlemen and their wives wore flea collars made of poisoned fur. Once the fleas had been trapped, the collar would be removed.

Bil Gilbert's advice is: "We should make the environment as unattractive as possible to fleas by dusting, vacuuming, sweeping and shaking to dispose of as many eggs, larvae and cocoons as possible."

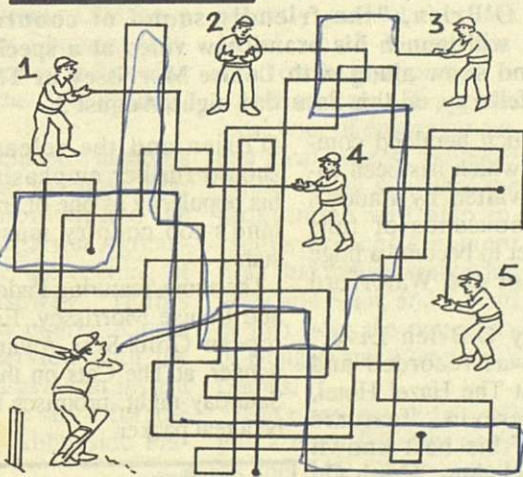
"The bedding used by pets should also be cleaned every week, and sprayed or dusted with an insecticide."

The video, certainly one of the best Irish compilations of its kind, conveys leading modern video photography methods, and the overall production is quite superb.

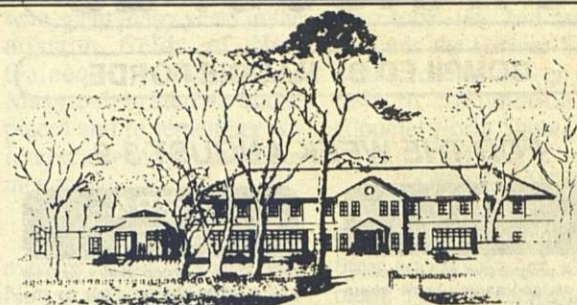

More Memories Of Growing Up In West Waterford

THINNING TURNIPS AND PICKING WHORTS

Recently listening to a radio programme during which two little girls, on holidays from school, were being interviewed, I was amazed that one of them said she was bored as there was nothing to do. My memory immediately went back to the time about sixty years ago when I got my Summer holidays. For me holidaytime was by no means boring. There was plenty to do. There were numerous jobs to be done on the farm.

In early July we were employed thinning turnips, which at that time were a late crop. This was a pretty arduous task. At that time boys were bare-kneed until they reached about fourteen years. To preserve the knees, we used pads made from old jute sacks, rarely seen in recent times. My father always had the furrows softened with an implement called a "scuffler". This was pulled along each furrow by one horse. It had about six long curved claws and mixed the weeds with the clay and narrowed the drill in the process. The mixture left in the furrow formed a sort of cushion and saved the knees to some extent and made life a lot easier. We used no tool of any sort to do the thinning - just the bare hands. The idea was to take away the surplus plants and leave single ones about nine to ten inches apart. This work was always checked by an adult to ensure that there were no "doubblers" left. Double plants never matured properly and too many of them would reduce the yield considerably.

We worked in groups and if there was in a group very small boys or girls the older ones would help by thinning a piece of their drill here and there to ensure that they kept up with the pace. There was no payment for thinning our own farm but if thinning for neighbours we would first make a deal. If a scuffler was to be used we would usually bargain for three pence per fifty yards of single drill, otherwise we would get an extra penny.

On some farms the drills could be about two hundred yards long and we would have to keep going hard all day to earn three shillings. If we were far from home we would take bread and jam and tea or milk with us and we would partake of this twice and have a substantial meal in the evening.

When the thinning was all done we would turn our attention to picking whortleberries, known locally as "Whorts" and in other parts of the country as "Fraocains". These grew on a heath plant that thrives on hill and in woodland. In our parish they were abundant in two particular places - on Carn Glas and in the Strancally Wood near the New Line. The latter was the nearest to us. At the height of the season we used go to that wood in gangs equipped with all

sorts of containers - tin cans, baskets, basins, jam jars and in fact any type of vessel available.

FAMILY GROUPS

We usually picked as a family. Each family had one large container and each picker a few smaller ones. Picking would commence at about 10 a.m. and would continue into the late evening. Picking over we would go to the end of the Gleann Caol where Joe Bubbs would buy our days

harvest. One member of each family would wait for Joe. Sometimes we could be hours waiting but he always came. He used buy whorts down in Ballymacarby and in Lismore on his way back, and from us. The Knockanore pickers who usually confined themselves to Carn Glas would take their pickings to Joe's home at Kilcockin. The whorts were exported to England and were sent daily from the railway station in Lismore and by boat

from Rosslare.

A good days picking would be from six to eight pounds and at six to eight pence per pound the reward was never great. When one considers that whorts are smaller than blackcurrants it is easy to appreciate that it is pretty tedious work to pick them.

One of the hazards of picking in the wood rather than on the hillside was the torment of mosquitoes. They used be particularly blood-thirsty on humid days. We countered their attacks to some extent by using a mixture of camphorated oil and turpentine which we rubbed into our hair and on our headgear.

Even if the income was not great at least we were not bored. — M.M.

DUNGARVAN MART REPORT

There was a much bigger entry of sheep at Dungarvan Mart on Monday last. Trade was good and last week's prices were fully maintained and all lots on offer were sold.

Cattle numbers were smaller. Trade was slightly easier especially for the heavier bullocks and some lots were back £2 to £4 per 100 kgs. Beef and Store Heifers also were somewhat easier. Calf prices continue to be a very lively trade with Simmental Bull Calves making up to £220 each.

Beef bullocks made from £106 to £112. Store bullocks over 500 kgs. made from £95 to £109, cont. to

£113; 400 to 500 kgs, made from £94 to £111, cont. to £116.25; 300 to 400 kgs. made from £96 to £115.50, cont. to £120. Beef heifers made from £96 to £100. Store heifers made from £90 to £97, cont. to £99. Dry cows made from £60 to £72.

Calves: Bulls made from £60 to £220. Heifers made from £40 to £118. Sheep: Butchers lambs made from £36 to £45 or from £7 to £12 under £1 per kg. Factory lambs made from £29 to £36 or from £8 to £11 under £1 per kg. Store lambs made from £20 to £29 or from £7 to £16 under £1 per kg. Breeding ewes made from £25 to £42 a head.

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Violent Thunderstorms

The sizzling heat and very humid conditions which had everyone sweltering last Monday was climaxed in the early hours of Tuesday morning when a number of violent thunderstorms struck most parts of West Waterford.

Vivid lightning flashes accompanied by sharp peals

Despite the violent nature of the storms no serious damage was reported although power blackouts affected some areas for some hours.

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SOUTH EASTERN HEALTH BOARD

The following changes in the Drugs Refund Scheme will come into effect from 1st August, 1991.

With regard to expenditure incurred on prescribed drugs, medicines and medical and surgical appliances, the following refund arrangements will apply:—

For the 2 month period 1st August 1991 - 30th September 1991:—

expenditure in excess of £60 in respect of that period will be recouped.

From 1st October 1991 and in respect of any quarter commencing on January/April/July/October:—

expenditure in excess of £90 in respect of any quarter will be recouped.

Revised claim forms in respect of the scheme will be available from retail pharmacists at the end of August.

The Drug Cost Subsidisation Scheme, whereby a person certified by a doctor and approved by the Health Board as requiring long term medication is required to pay the pharmacist the first £32 per month for their medicines, will remain unchanged.
