Bikers Injured In Bank Holiday Fracas

Several people were taken to hospital in Waterford early on Monday last when fighting broke out among bikers gathered near Dungarvan for the Bank Holiday Weekend.

Gardai said that the event was well attended by more than 300, had been relatively trouble free until

Sunday night when it is believed that a row broke out with a number of youths from Carlow.

Several people were injured in the ensuing scuffles and one man was detained in hospital, where his condition was described as "not serious." Gardai made no arrests in connection with the incident.

Moves To Put Clover Meats Into Liquidation

A meeting is to be held in Waterford later this month to formally wind up the affairs of the Clover Meats Company and Billy McCann who took over the receivership of the firm when it crashed seven years ago has confirmed that only preferential creditors, in this case the Department of Labour, would benefit.

The moves to put the company into liquidation have dashed the hopes of compensation for up to 1,000 farmers still owed

£800,000 for livestock supplied by them to Clover Meats factories in Waterford, Clonmel and Wexford.

The farmers, who were unsecured, originally were owed £1.62 million but received 50.9p in the £ as

Popular Publican Seriously Injured In Car-Van Collision

Mr. Maurice Kiely, the popular owner of Bridgie Terrie's licensed premises, The Pike, Killineen, Dungarvan sustained serious injuries when the car he was driving and a van were in collision at Affane Cross

near Cappoquin on last Friday evening.

The accident happened at about 5 p.m. and Mr. Kiely who is principal of MPK Engineering Ltd. based in Listowel was returning home to the Pike at the time. He had just passed through Cappoquin and was travelling on the main road to Dungarvan and the

van had come from the Dungarvan direction and was swinging right at the Cross when the collision occurred.

Mr. Kiely was seriously injured and trapped in his extensively damaged car until units of the Dungarvan and Cappoquin Fire Brigades arrived and succeeded in cutting him free.

He was at once transferred by ambulance to Cork Regional Hospital where he was found to be suffering from fractures of both legs and injuries to his chest and face.

The driver of the van, Mr. David Granleese of

Fivemilebridge, Ballinhasig, Co. Cork was not seriously injured.

On inquiring on Tuesday we were informed that despite his serious injuries, Mr. Kiely was as comfortable as could be expected in the circumstances.

County VEC Is Strapped For Cash

Following the inaugural annual meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee held in Dungarvan last week, the new Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne presided at the first ordinary monthly meeting of the newly constituted committee.

Dealing with financial matters, the meeting was informed by the CEO, Mr. Donal Kelleher that the budgets for the administration of the committee's schools in Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas in the current year were fast running out.

Mr. Kelleher disclosed that in the case of the Kilmacthomas school there was just over £1,000 left in the "kitty" for the year while there was less than

£9,000 left for Dungarvan.

In reply to a question by the Chairman, Cllr. Kyne as to whether the two schools could be kept functioning to the end of the year, the CEO said that they would have enough to keep going for the months of August and September.

Cllr. Paddy Power then asked if the Committee could find themselves in a position of having to close the schools for an extra period in the event of additional funding not being made available by the Department.

Mr. Kelleher said he did not envisage that this would happen as they would be making a strong case to the Department for additional funds.

Pilgrims Report Strange Experiences At Melleray Grotto

At a recent Saturday night vigil at Melleray Grotto, a little girl from Northern Ireland reported to a visiting priest and a sizeable number of by-standers: "When I came to the night vigil on the 25th May, Our Lady came down to me and spoke to me. She touched me on the hand." One could dismiss this as a childish dream were it not that shortly after relating her story, a prominent Consultant Surgeon from the United States travelling with an American pilgrimage reported, "The statue that was there was gone and then there was Our Lady with Our Lord." This lady gave a detailed description of her experiences and found it difficult to reconcile what she had seen with her medical and scientific training.

Her considered opinion after taking advice on the matter was that in fact she had seen Our Blessed Lady. Her opinions were reaffirmed by a fellow pilgrim, a South Korean paediatrician, who also had somewhat similar experiences. Another member of the thirty strong American Pilgrimage, a distinguished author, was amazed at the number of people attending the Saturday night vigil and the serenity and tranquility in the Grotto.

Amongst the hundreds of pilgrims present at the Grotto on that night were many overseas pilgrims and of course hundreds of

Irish people. These came from all over the country, some even from as far away as Letterkenny and Armagh.

Very extraordinary cures have been reported. One young man from County Clare had claimed that his hearing had been instantaneously restored during a visit in August, 1985. Four years later in August 1989, when this young man from Co. Clare returned to give thanks for his instantaneous cure, his visit co-incided with a pilgrim from Belfast who had experienced a similar healing some months previously.

Co-incidentally both ar-

rived at the Grotto at the same time to give thanks and as they did, a most beautiful perfume exuded from the Grotto. This perfume spread on to the roadway, into cars and on to people's clothes. This was experienced by many people from several parts of Ireland. This young man again visited the Grotto recently and not only has he retained his hearing but he has now obtained employment in a branch of the Public Service.

THOUSANDS OF PILGRIMS

Ever since a local young teenager, Ursula O'Rourke reported an unusual experi-

ence at Melleray Grotto on Friday 16th August 1985, and local children Tom Cliffe and the late Barry Buckley reported apparitions of Our Blessed Lady from Sunday 18th to Saturday 24th August 1985, in this secluded area in the foothills of the Knockmeal-down mountains, tens of thousands of pilgrims have visited and prayed at the Grotto.

On several occasions during the August '85 apparitions, Our Lady spoke to the boys giving them various messages for the world. The main thrust of Her message is for the people of the world to return to a life of prayer, frequent reception of the Eucharist, attendance at Mass, particularly Sunday Mass and the renunciation of violence.

The inspiring dialogue between Our Lady and the boys has been printed in leaflet and book form and is available at the Grotto.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

DO THINGS GOD'S WAY

Elijah in the first reading on next Sunday is nourished and strengthened by food provided by the Lord. Before eating, he felt it was the end. Having vanquished the false prophets of Baal, he had to flee into the desert to escape the anger of Queen Jezebel, who'd vowed to destroy him. Feeling helpless, he prayed that the Lord would take him, but the Lord provided him with the strength to continue his work, and he was able to reach Mount Horeb where he did what the Lord had commanded.

Often, our experience in life is not unlike that of Elijah's. As human beings, walking through life's desert, we find life a struggle and were it not for the Eucharist, we'd never be able to reach the heavenly Mount Horeb. You'll have noted the resemblance between Elijah's 40 days in the desert and the 40 years spent by the Israelites wandering in the desert. It was the miraculous food that enabled them to survive.

St. Paul's exhortation in the second reading would apply very aptly to all of us living in West Waterford. Earlier, Paul had warned the Ephesians not to consort with the devil, and urged them to walk and keep company with Jesus. He is saying, stop stealing, control your anger, watch your language and do not harbour bitter feelings. He explains that brooding over insults, imaginary or otherwise, is upsetting and dangerous.

His advice, and it is good and wholesome, is do not allow the sun go down upon your anger. Perhaps in the past you've ignored such advice, and you spent the night turning and twisting! Above all, Paul would like us all to remember that we're temples of the Holy Spirit. He is our guest. He'll never leave us unless we evict Him by sin. Consider well what is at stake. Do not allow the devil to control your life. Even if you have been foolish, get down on your knees and beg for forgiveness. The Holy Spirit will be only too pleased to return and to abide in your heart.

Paul recommends that the best way to subdue and control our evil inclinations is to practice the opposite virtue, such as, restrain anger with patience, beat vindictiveness with mercy, etc. Putting it briefly, he is saying, be like Christ, and His love will shine everywhere you go. Honestly, we do need to mend our ways. Generally, people are very unforgiving. They are not satisfied unless they take an eye for an eye. Oh! it is not just here, it is the same sad story everywhere. Anyway, let us start by changing the attitude locally. And, the way to do it is, put Christ's love into practice in our daily lives. You have a duty in this matter. Surely, if people are hungry for God, it is your duty to feed them. You'll find life will mean more to you, and you'll draw nearer to God.

The other day I thought that few people are happy and contented. Those who have much, clamour for more, whereas, those who've little hanker for what others have got. Some are no sooner married, when they want to hitch

up with someone else. You could parcel all the unhappiness and lable it "the dissatisfied." You see, few are grateful for what they have, and most seem to have lost the art of patience. We are human. We have problems. We must learn to live with them. As Paul said to the Ephesians, do not allow the devil to churn up misunderstandings, and cause untold harm. The majority of broken marriages found on the "little rock," if people were patient, forgiving and trust God, the many homes that have their blinds drawn would ring with laughter and joy. Am afraid, people are forgetting the purpose of life. So, be sensible. Pray, forgive, talk and resolve.

THE GREAT SECRET OF LIVING

Elijah nearly gave up. The Israelites in the desert almost lost hope. The Gospel lets us into the great secret of living. The Jews understood, Jesus was identifying Himself with the Food He was offering, and they were scandalized. They were ready to follow Jesus, the Messiah, but they lacked the faith to accept Him as the Son of God. Why! they said, is He not the carpenter's son?

Jesus explained that the manna and the loaves were food for the body, and those who eat it eventually died, whereas, the Bread He promises will enable those who eat it to live forever. His words are clear. Normally, we are health conscious. You are what you eat, and we do want what is best for us. Yet! when it comes to securing eternal life, we show nothing like the same concern. The Eucharist makes our souls healthy. It unites us with God, and fills us with His spirit. And, it is that same spirit that enables us to walk through this valley of darkness and survive. So, make your Communion more fruitful. Let the spirit of Christ guide you in all you do and say.

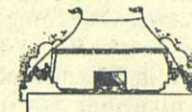

SCOUTING NEWS

The Regional Shield Unprecedented Success

On July 20 and 21, eighteen young scouts from Na Deise region undertook the arduous task of an eighteen mile hike interspersed along the route with some very demanding skill bases. These bases were designed to extract from the young participants the essential skills of scouting. To that end, I can happily report that the boys and girls of this region displayed a very high degree of skill but more importantly their attitude to each task demanded of them was exemplary.

The weekend began with the participants being treated to lunch at the Scout Centre in Mount Melleray. The hike then got underway at about 1.45 p.m. when the Bull Patrol loaded their haversacks onto their backs and made their way towards the gates of Mount Melleray. They were followed at 15 minute intervals by the other patrols who were aptly named Bear and Stag Patrols. Our three units were joined in the hike and skill test by the scout unit from Rathgormac, Co. Cork, who were using this test as a training session for their attempt at the National Scout competition, known as the Melvin Trophy. For the purpose of the weekend the Rathgormac scouts were given the name 'Falcon Patrol.'

None of these young scouts, as they made their way out of the gates of Melleray, could have known what was facing them. The leaders who had spent the previous two days preparing the bases and the camp site, went ahead of the patrols to ensure that the Venturers, who were manning the bases, were in readiness.

All the patrols were expected to keep a log of the events of the weekend concerning their patrols progress. These logs, I can assure you, made for some very comic reading at the end of the event.

The five skill bases on the first day were stretched out over the twelve miles to the overnight camp-site. These bases involved camp-craft, map reading, compass work, first aid and rope work (the rope work having

to be left until after breakfast on Sunday morning). All the bases were dealt with admirably and at the end of the first day all three Na Deise region patrols were within twenty-five marks of each other. Unfortunately for the Falcon Patrol, while their camp-craft was quite good, their hiking skills deserted them, resulting in them trailing badly at the end of the first day.

All four patrols were leg weary when they arrived at the camp site. This was only to be expected as the first part of the hike was a steady uphill gradient for about eight miles. On arrival at the camp site, the patrols soon realised that there was no rest for the wicked. Daylight was beginning to fade fast so the task of erecting the overnight shelters was hurriedly undertaken, with the young scouts showing some marvellous imagination and initiative, considering that their shelters were made from plastic sheeting and rope.

The altar fires were then made ready and each patrol set about the task of lighting the fire to enable them to cook their suppers. While the fires were being prepared the Quartermaster from each patrol was issued with the food for the evening meal (the food was purchased earlier that day by Pat Kiely who was the main driving force behind the Shield Weekend). The menus for the weekend were decided on two weeks earlier by each patrol.

While the scouts were busy practising their culinary skills, the leaders and venturers were treated to a special fry up of barbe-

cued lamb chops, burgers and sausages, all stir fried chow mein by the resident gourmet chaplain, Fr. Lloyd, C.C., Cappoquin.

After supper with the wash-up out of the way, it was time for the traditional camp fire. The timber for the camp fire was provided by the scout centre at Mount Melleray with special thanks to Cathy O'Sullivan.

We would like to say a special word of thanks to Brian Mulvihill, Unit Leader of Abbeyside Scout Troop, who was instrumental in organising the firewood and the altar fires, and for making time to visit us during the event itself.

At the camp-fire each patrol was required to provide a sketch, which they all did with veiled enthusiasm. With the sketches over and many of the scouts looking the worst for wear, John Meskill announced that it was bedtime, for which he received a tremendous cheer.

The second day began with Mass offered by the Cappoquin Unit Chaplain, Fr. Frank Lloyd, C.C. Mass was followed by breakfast and a general clean up of the site. The Bull Patrol left the camp site for the first fun base at 10 a.m. (approx.) The first base on Sunday was situated in the wood on the Lismore road. This was a treasure trail with the treasure at the end being a two litre bottle of orange (that didn't last long after it was found)! The hike home was undertaken in great spirit, the carrot at the end being the meal at Walsh's Hotel. With the finish in sight each patrol set a cracking pace on the road, and all patrols entered into the remaining fun bases with great enthusiasm, those bases being an egg and spoon race at Glenribbon, a game of sack soccer at the Kitchen Hole and a penalty shoot out at the scout den.

While the scouts were testing their goal scoring prowess against Billy Tobin, Pat Kiely was making up the final scores, after

It left the GAA field and marched through the town of Cappoquin watched and followed by a large gathering of townspeople. It ended at the Dane's Field where a special Scamp Day was held for the benefit of the people of Cappoquin in appreciation for their support of the scouting movement in the town. The credit for the parade and Scamp must go to Willie Gallagher who is the Assistant Regional Commissioner for cubs in the region. Willie has given many long years of dedicated service to the scouting movement in the region and his idea to have a parade put the final touch to what was a terrific weekend of scouting.

More Men Than Women Drown

Many more men than women drown — the ratio is 5:1. Male drownings predominate in every age group. 86 Irish people drowned accidentally last year — 72 men / 14 women.

WHY?

Under the influence of alcohol or bravado or foolhardiness, many men put themselves at risk or misjudge the danger presented by water.

Irish waters remain cold even during summer months. They are often deep and sometimes have strong currents. For those who get into difficulties in such waters the outlook is bleak.

The National Safety Council asks people to recognise the consequence of foolhardy behaviour.

BE WATERWISE

1. — Swim With Others — never alone.
2. — Check New Places — ask somebody who knows.
3. — Know The Difference — you may be able to swim in a warm indoor pool, but it is not easy in cold outdoor water — Stay within your depth and swim parallel to the shore.
4. — Take Safety Advice Seriously — special flags and notices warn of danger. Obey them.
 - A Red and Yellow Flag shows the area is supervised by lifeguards.
 - A Red Flag means it is unsafe to swim.
5. — Never swim after alcohol or a meal.

DO SOMETHING DIFFERENT WITH RHUBARB ...



Fold half the rhubarb into the whipped cream. Cut cake in half (as for a sponge sandwich) and fill with the cream mixture.

Use 150ml (1/4 pint) of the reserved juice for the top

ping. Mix arrowroot and a little of the juice to a smooth paste, bring rest of juice to the boil, remove from heat and stir into arrowroot mixture. Return to pan, bring to the boil over gentle heat,

stirring until a glaze is formed. Leave to cool then fold in the remaining rhubarb.

Arrange on top of cake.

Serves six.

A PERFECT choice for making pies and puddings, the rhubarb available at this time of year is equally suitable for light, refreshing desserts. This recipe for a rhubarb and cream filled cake is suitable for a supper party or for high tea.

RHUBARB CREAM CAKE

Ingredients for the cake:

- 175g (6oz) home-produced butter
- 175g (6oz) caster sugar
- 3 eggs, lightly beaten
- 225g (8oz) plain flour
- 2 level teaspoons baking powder
- Grated rind of 1 orange
- A little milk if necessary

For filling and topping:

- 1lb rhubarb cut into 2-5cm (1inch) pieces
- 2 tablespoons water
- 100g (4oz) sugar
- 1 level dessertspoon arrowroot
- 150ml (1/4 pint) whipping or double cream, whipped

Method:

Pre-heat oven at 180C, 350F, Mark 4. Grease and flour an 18cm (7 inch) square cake tin. Sieve together flour and baking powder.

Make the cake: Cream butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. Gradually beat in the eggs. Using a metal spoon fold in the flour mixture and orange rind, adding a little milk if necessary to give a dropping consistency. Pour into prepared tin and take for about 1-1 1/4 hours. Turn out onto a wire rack and leave until cold.

Meanwhile, cook the rhubarb with the water and sugar until just tender, strain, reserving the juice. Leave rhubarb and juice until cold.

ABBEYSIDE SCOUT NOTES

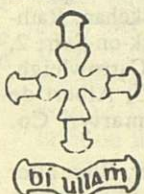

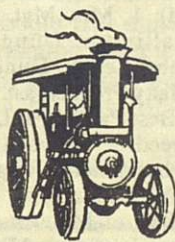

AUGUST used to prompt the question 'wither the weather'? thanks to its changeable skies and a habit of clouding into rain.

Perhaps we should ask now 'wither the weather'? after several parched Augusts scorched our plants and changed the image of this month.

Gardeners, outdoors and indoors, need to watch plants for signs of drying out but we must also do our bit to conserve water, even if your area is not subject to a hosepipe ban.

Cooler

Never water during the heat of day as it wastes water through rapid evaporation and can shock plants as they face the full force of the sun. The end of the day is best as its cooler and allows water to sink deep into the soil to the roots, where it is most needed.

Use a watering can with a rose to try and mimic the effect of rainfall and use waste water whenever possible, perhaps on the lawn and the sturdier plants.

Washing up or rinse water can be used if not full of detergents or murk and mess which might contami-

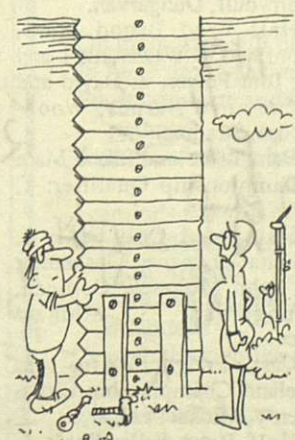

need to raise the butt on plinth.

A cover is also wise, to avoid any risk of children falling in and to deter algae growth.

The butt is particularly useful for supplying soft water for indoor plants, which suffer badly in the heat if you are out a lot and

cannot safely leave windows open.

But even careful watering cannot always stop shrivelled leaves on some varieties such as the Weeping Fig, Rubber Plant, Spider Plant and Palms.

But disfigurement can be stopped through regular misting with a hand sprayer and grouping the plants into displays so that they create a moist environment between themselves.

Another good trick is to place a layer of gravel in a tray and add water up to the top of the gravel. The plants can then be stood on the material to take up water and savour the moist air actually standing in and rotting in water.

A similar 'cocoon' of moisture can be created for individual plants by slipping their pots into larger ones and filling the gap with peat which can be kept saturated.

CO-OPS MERGER PROCEEDING — BUT SLOWER THAN ANTICIPATED

Latest information on the merger discussions between Waterford Foods and Avonmore Foods is that it is hoped to have them completed by the end of September.

Speculation in agribusiness circles that negotiations had ground to a halt has been rebutted but it has been admitted that they have proceeded slower than anticipated to date. One source involved in the talks said that many problems had to be dealt with but added that things like that were to be expected in situations like this.

However, we understand that senior management figures at Waterford Foods have continued informal discussions with their counterparts in Dairygold in recent months. Some of the Waterford personnel are known to favour a merger with Dairygold rather than Avonmore for a number of reasons not the least being its Munster location but such a move seems to be ruled out at this stage.

The advisers to both Waterford and Avonmore are hopeful that the merger talks will be successfully concluded by the end of next month and we believe that both companies are confident they will then be able to secure the necessary shareholders approval for the merger proposals worked out.

BRILLIANT OARSMEN

Our sports stars of the week must undoubtedly be the brilliant Cappoquin oarsmen, brothers Pat and Milo Murray who won the

coxless pairs event at the Home International Rowing Championships at Blessington last Saturday. Pat and Milo who presently hold the national coxless pairs title made a significant contribution to Ireland's senior victory in the international last Saturday when they beat the fancied English pair in a close and very thrilling contest.

A HISTORY OF IRISH STONE BRIDGES

Mr. John O'Flynn, Waterford County Engineer has very kindly sent us some extracts from the very interesting recently published "Irish Stone Bridges — History and Heritage," a book which deals with the development of Road Bridges in Ireland from A.D. 1000 to 1830 and which gives detailed information on a large number of the more historic bridges in Ireland.

The authors are Peter O'Keeffe who, prior to his retirement was head of the Roads Division of An Foras Forbartha and Tom Simington retired County Engineer for Clare County Council.

One of the bridges dealt with in the book is the road bridge over the Blackwater at Cappoquin and much of the information about it was new to us as it must, we are sure, be to most of our readers.

Under the heading "Cappoquin," this is what the au-

thors have to say about the bridge: "In the 16th century the road from Clonmel to Youghal assumed increased importance as an avenue for trade and commerce. One of the physical obstacles was the crossing of the Blackwater. McCarthy Morrogh mentions that Richard Boyle, Earl of Cork, financed the construction of bridges at Cappoquin and on the Nier in the first quarter of the 17th century. The Nier bridge was washed away in 1657."

The account goes on to relate that: "the Down Survey shows a bridge at Cappoquin in 1656. This bridge must have been washed away because in 1665 the Irish parliament passed a special act for building a bridge here. The upper limit on the cost was £600. In 1834 the 'Dublin Penny Journal' published a good sketch of the bridge (a timber construction) and stated that "The bridge existed prior to the time of Charles the Second, as an act was passed during his reign for its repair. It is now exceedingly crazy; the passage of a single individual caused it to tremble from one end to the other." The old bridge was taken down in 1850 when the present five-span masonry arch bridge was built."

Authors O'Keeffe and Simington go on to say that the uniformity of the substantial and well braced trestles supporting the Cappoquin Bridge indicates that this part was newly built in 1666, so the repair work probably referred to the abutments and approach roads. They then refer to an entry in the Council Books of the Corporation under 1672 as follows: "Warrants shall issue for apploting and collecting the twenty pounds four shillings laid on this county towards building Cappoqueen bridge."

IRISH PARLIAMENT ACT

The following is the wording of the Act passed by the Irish parliament in 1665 for "the building of a bridge over the River of Blackwater at Cappoquin in the County of Waterford before 23rd of October, 1666":—

"Whereas the repairing and new building of the bridge over the river of Blackwater at Cappoquin, in the county of Waterford, will be of great use and convenience not only to the inhabitants of said county of Waterford, but also to the several inhabitants of the county of the city of Waterford, the county of the city of Cork, the counties of Cork, Kerry and Tipperary: be it therefore enacted by the King's most excellent majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the lords spiritual and temporal, and the commons in this present parliament assembled, that the said bridge over the river of Blackwater, formerly at Cappoquin aforesaid, be now built and repaired at the charge of the said several counties of Waterford, and county of the city of Waterford, Cork and the county of the city of Cork, Kerry and Tipperary.

"11. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that for and towards the repair and new building thereof, such a sum of money shall be raised out of the said several counties . . . as to the lord lieutenant or other chief governor or governors of this kingdom of Ireland, and the council for the time being, shall be thought fit and necessary for the new building and repairing thereof, not exceeding six hundreds pounds; the same to be raised within such time, and to be divided and apportioned upon the said counties in such manner, as to the said lord lieutenant, or other chief governor or governors of this kingdom, and the council for the time being, shall be also thought fit: and the said several sums to be apportioned upon the said several and respective counties, be levied by distress and sale of the goods of the parties refusing or neglecting to pay the same respectively, or otherwise in such manner, and by such other lawful ways and means and persons, as to the said lord lieutenant or other chief governor of governors of this Kingdom of Ireland, and the council for the time being shall be thought fit."

A GREAT FLOOD

To bring the position up to date the authors then record that the present bridge was erected in 1845-6 with the aid of a loan of £4,000 by the Office of Public Works. There was a great flood in the Blackwater in November 1853 which caused the destruction of about 40 bridges in Co. Cork. A contemporary newspaper report stated that "The new and handsome stone bridge of Cappoquin erected within the last few years and which replaced the old dilapidated wooden one escaped most providentially, without any injury, the

water having formed a passage for itself at a low point of land on the south-side of the bridge by which means the bridge escaped the full weight and fury of the flood."

In the same report it was stated that the wooden bridge which crossed the Blackwater at Ballyduff, four miles upriver, the only one between Lismore and Fermoy was completely carried away in the same flood.

We hope to return to this interesting book for further extracts again soon.

"Irish Stone Bridges — History and Heritage" is published by the Irish Academic Press, Kill Lane, Blackrock, Co. Dublin.

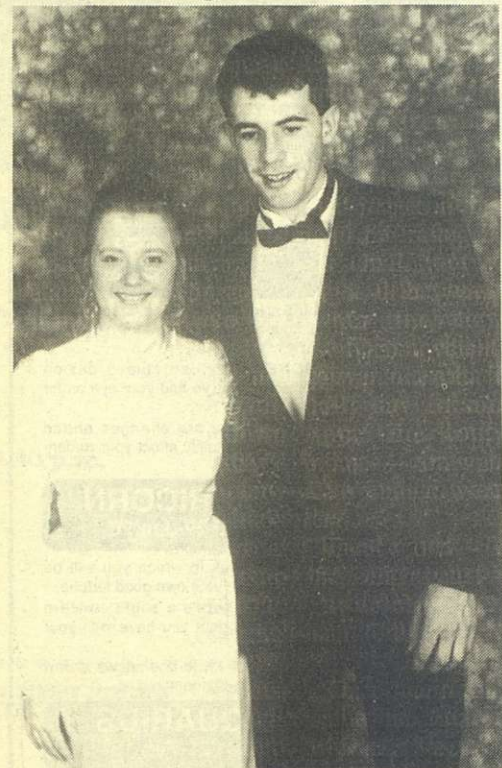

Answer — The class A7, A8, A9, rate of PRSI applies to those who earn less than £60 gross per week. It was decided last year to grant the PRSI tax allowance of £286 to everybody insured at the Class A rate of PRSI. So, even though people insured at the A7, A8 and A9 of PRSI are exempt from paying their share of PRSI, they are, none the less, entitled to the £286 PRSI allowance provided they have earnings of £286 for the year. The PRSI allowance is reduced if their earnings come to less than £286 per year.

Government Must Win Irish Case On CAP Reform — ICMSA

At the meeting between An Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey and the farm organisations last Wednesday, the ICMSA President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, reiterated the need for the Irish Government to obtain due recognition for Ireland in the CAP reform proposals, given the importance of agriculture to our national economy and employment.

The ICMSA assessment of the impact of the CAP reform proposals indicates a 20% fall in farm incomes by 1995, relative to 1990, after allowing for the proposed compensation and the loss of 12,000 jobs in the agricultural sector.

"A unique Irish case can and must be made given our high dependence on agriculture and our high dependency on intervention. Irish agriculture must be exempt from further quota cuts or production restrictions and the onus lies on the Government to make and win this case," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

The ICMSA President also addressed specific areas of immediate concern at the meeting and he especially sought a solution to the serious problem of low cattle prices arising from the present beef tendering system. Mr. O'Dwyer called on the Taoiseach to find additional and substantial export outlets for live cattle trade

to stave off a total collapse of store prices this fall.

"The need for charting the course of Irish agriculture into the year 2000 and onwards is still as important as ever before and I emphasised the importance of implementing the commitment given in the PESP to negotiate a new Development Programme for the industry," he concluded.

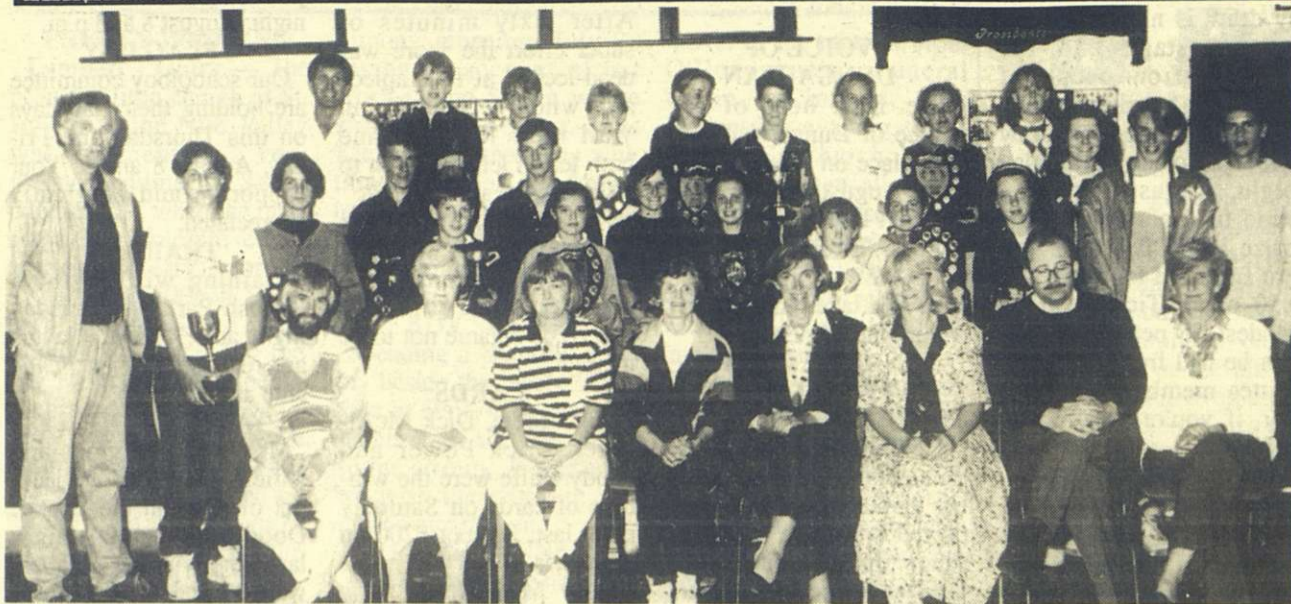

This will likely result in a win for Ballygunner who have just missed out on a semi-final place, but it won't get them back in contention. Clonea could yet be involved in a relegation fight, but a win here would avoid this. Although their prospects of a win are not good, the relegation factor will motivate them into playing at their best.

BALLYDUFF v. DE LA SALLE

Ballyduff have won two matches and this keeps them safe from any relegation worries, but for De La Salle the story is different and another defeat will put the 1990 intermediate champions in serious trouble. Waterford Foods Project Wins EC Grant



Seven Irish firms have succeeded in attracting grants totalling £3.23 million (or 4.23 million ECU) from the European Commission under the "Thermie" Programme for their efforts to become more efficient in using and conserving energy. One of the firms is Waterford Foods plc, Dungarvan, which has received a grant of £514,457 for the installation of a second electricity generating turbine utilising steam which would otherwise be wasted during periods of low steam demand.

The Waterford Foods project which was carried out in association with KKK in Germany and Integrated Energy Ltd., U.K., is estimated to save the Company £333,500 per annum in energy costs.

Mr. Robert Molloy, T.D., Minister for Energy who announced the names of the successful Irish applicants at a function held in EOLAS headquarters in Dublin explained that the "Thermie" Programme, introduced last year by the EC Commission, was designed to encourage the demonstration of innova-

tive technologies in the areas of rational use of energy, renewable energy sources, hydrocarbons exploration and development and solid fuels.

Congratulating Waterford Foods and the other successful applicants, Minister Molloy said that everybody involved could be justifiably proud of their efforts.
